SUBJECT: Communications Sardinia.

1. Reference is made to attached which contains the essential parts of a verbal report made by Lieut. Raymond A. Clark, Allied Censor Control Officer in Cagliari, to Lt. Col. Donald D. Hoover, Deputy Chief, Censorship Branch, AFHQ.
2. It would appear that cable heads have not been seized and sealed in Sardinia, particularly those cables which terminate in Axis held territory.
3. Doubtless you will want to have this matter checked upon your return to Sardinia. It would be appreciated if we could be informed of the steps taken. Information with respect to available communications facilities is most useful to the Commission, especially since the use of radio by the Italian Government will apparently be non-existent.

On 6 December Your Excellency addressed a letter to me regarding certain factories in the Naples Area. I have just received information from our AMG officials which indicates that every effort is being made to reestablish industry wherever possible.

a. Silfurificio Italiano. This firm is working for the Royal Navy.

b. Ansaldo. In spite of very heavy damage to this plant, the Army and Navy authorities are planning to give all possible work to this firm.

c. Rosbrini-Farelli-Ansaldo and Ucciso. Because of the difficulties of transport, it has not yet been possible to complete the investigation of the industrial possibilities of this plant.



SUBJECT: - PERFORMING OF MILITARY BASE FORMATION IN SICILY

1. HQ "SABAUDA" Div -- SICILY, is at the moment being importuned by soldiers and by relatives of dead, missing or PW troops, for a clarification of their family affairs. These family affairs are often in a very pitiful state owing to the fact that an exact definition of the individual's position is lacking. Nor is a clarification of the position possible without the aid of all relevant documents. These in turn would have to be looked for at the Base formations which were once functioning in the island. (i.e. ZONES, DISTRICTS, DEPOTS).

2. Therefore it would be necessary to start gradually reforming those same functions. This would also enable US to take steps to form local elements into labour units, to be employed on the work of reconstruction on the island started by the Allies.

3. Instead of the two ZONE HQs; nine DISTRICT HQs; seven Regimental DEPOTS; three Arty DEPOTS and one Engineer DEPOT which existed before, we could for the time being set up the following:

Military Zone PALERMO

DISTRICTS of PALERMO -- MESSINA -- CATANIA.

Three Inf Regt Depots (selected from those units which have been least damaged).

One Arty Depot (selected from those units which have been least damaged).

One Engineer Regt Depot (selected from those units which have been least damaged).

These bodies would have to find, collect and catalogue the documents of those which have not been reconstituted, in relation to which they will act as a kind of skeleton office.

4. We ask you to bring this to the notice of the Chief of Allied Forces so that we may have, if possible, authorization to put this plan into effect.

1. This instruction is issued in continuation of this HQ letter of even reference dated 15 Nov 43 and deals with the provision of supplies for the Italian Army & Air Force.
2. The Italian Navy will be retained under arrangements to be made by the Naval Staff.
3. From the joint or vice of maintenance the Italian Armed Forces are divided into two categories:

- (a) CATEGORY I:
These troops employed in the forward areas or contact zone under command of Fifth or Eighth Armies.
 - (i) CATEGORY II:
These troops employed on the I. of C or Communication Zone and those belonging to organised liaison units on the I. of C or Communications Zone scheduled for employment in either category I.A or II.
- b. (a) Personnel in category I.A will be retained on the scale laid down in APPENDIX I.A.
(b) Personnel in category I.B will be retained on the scale laid down in APPENDIX I.B.
- c. It has been decided that all Italian military personnel in category I.B employed as auxiliary physical labour and dock clearance, work in depots etc. can, at the discretion of the G.O.C. No 2 District and G.O. Regiomontane Zone Section, be issued with 2 cans 1/2. meat or suitable equivalent in addition to the scale laid down in APPENDIX I.B.
- d. Supplies for Italian Armed Forces will arrive in pre-arranged ships from the U.S. and will be identifiable by a special marking. All supplies arriving in the Italian Army or Navy areas will be cleared by P.D.C. depots in the Italian Army and supplies arriving in the Italian Navy areas will be cleared by the U.S. Navy.

To the Italian Return Committee:

1. This instruction is issued in continuation of the in letter of even reference dated 15 Nov 45 and copies will be supplied to authorities for the Italian Army & Air Forces.
2. From the point of view of maintaining the Italian armed forces are divided into two categories:
 - (a) Category A: Those assigned to the forward areas or combat zones under command of Fifth or Eighth Service.
 - (b) Category B: Those groups employed on the I or C or Communications Zone and those balanced to organization Italian units or with I or C or Communications Zone attached for employment in other categories.
3. The Italian Army will be rationed under the following lines:
 - (a) Personnel in category A, will be rationed on the scale laid down in Annex 1.
 - (b) It has been decided that all Italian military personnel in category B, employed in sections physical labour etc., each day ration, which is to consist of the G.C. No 2 meal ticket and 0.6. Potassium salt per service, one, at the rate of 2 cans 7.5 millilitres each meal, to be rationed to the men in the same manner as the men in the Italian Army.
4. Rations for Italian armed forces will consist in measured rations from the U.S. ration tables arriving at certain rates.
5. Troops in category A, will be rationed in accordance with the arrangements made by the Italian authorities for a two day series ten days apart.





MEMORANDUM FOR: Brigadier Guterbeck, Allied Control Commission, Naples

The Italian Authorities have raised the question of the disposition to be made of Italian motor vehicles in Sicily. It is stated that there are from 750 to 800 vehicles of which 400 to 500 are estimated to be road-worthy.

If these vehicles are to be returned to the Italians they intend to allot them to various governmental services in proportion to the relative urgency in their requirements.

Will you kindly discuss this matter with Colonel Spofford and find out what policy is to be pursued? If they are to be given back to the Italians, this headquarters would like to be informed of the approximate number that can be counted upon.



SUBJECT: Postal Matters Foggia and Benevento

To : C.C.A.G., A.M.G., 19th Army Group

1. On 15 December your office authorized the transfer of Italian postage stamps from Foggia for use in the four provinces of King's Italy, with provision that replacement of the transferred stamps be made when postal communications are reopened.

2. The Under-Secretary of State for Tele-Communications and Posts had arranged to send an officer to Foggia to effect the transfer. The officer has not been sent due to the fact that the Under-Secretary of State has received information through Italian sources that the safe of the Provincial Office of the Posts and Telegraphs in Foggia has been broken into and the stamps of the value of several million lire removed. It has been suggested that this was done by Allied colored troops who were billeted in the post office building. If such is the case your office doubtless has information relative to the matter. In any event would you obtain the facts and make them available to this headquarters.

3. It is understood that the post office building in Foggia is no longer used by the Allied forces either as billets or for offices. If this is true, it is assumed that AMG officers have taken charge of the building and have re-established the Italian Post and Telegraph employees in the building for the purpose of reorganization against the time when postal and telegraph services can be restored. It is appreciated that this is a matter clearly under the jurisdiction of your office, and we are not in any way attempting to inject ourselves into the matter. In our dealings with the Italian Government, it would be most helpful if we were in a position to inform the Under-Secretary of State for Tele-communications and Posts the present status of the Italian Posts and Telegraph organization in Foggia. Would you inform us please?



I have always been afraid that failure to get the facilities of the Seminary would impose a considerable reduction on the number of officials that could be accommodated at Salerno. I should like to advance the suggestion that possibly the archbishop might be persuaded to make available a proportion of the living quarters at the Seminary for some of your officials in consideration of your refraining from requisitioning his property.

In a similar connection, the Allied Control Commission is being pressed for data as to your government's requirements for housing in Rome. I know that this matter has been under discussion for some time between your representatives and Captain Scotten of the Commission. I hope that these gentlemen will soon arrive at a satisfactory estimate in order to make a timely representation of Italian requirements to the Allied Authorities.

MEMORANDUM TO: Military Government Section, A.F.M.Q.
SUBJECT : Complaint of Yugoslav Nationals

At the request of the allied military authorities in charge, fourteen Yugoslav officers and civilians (Chetniks) were removed from the Bari camp where they had been creating disorder and disturbances in conflict with the majority of other Yugoslavs at Bari who are Partisan supporters. Food and shelter have been furnished them at a camp at Pisticci in the province of Matera. They have now complained of their treatment and have requested that the following message be transmitted in their behalf to the Royal Yugoslav Government in Cairo:

"Allied Authorities deported us, against our own will, on the 15th December from P.W. Transit Camp Bari to former Yugoslav confinement Camp Pisticci, province Lecce. Our movement is here restrict, till now we have not excommunicated at all. We are in extremely bad situation. The questions of our supplies, clothes, and means are not regulated. Hygienical conditions in this malaria area are wicked. Our duty and desire is to join to the regular Yugoslav royal Army. We demand that all time since we arrived in Italy, but all our requests remained without results. We please for urgent intervention."

It would be unconscionable to attempt to deny nationals of a member of the United Nations from communicating with their Government, and it is recommended that the message be forwarded to the proper Yugoslav authority. It should be accompanied however with appropriate extracts from the attached report of an investigation carried out by the Provincial Public Safety Officer of Matera province, 2nd Region, A.M.G. and in particular the last three paragraphs.

Subject: Reconstruction of Overhead Lines in Calabria and Iucania.
To: The Under-Secretary of State for Telecommunications and Posts.

1. Referring to your letters numbered 74/Gbr of 4 December and 190/Gbr of 19 December on the above subject, proposals have been placed before the Chief Signal Officer, District 2, for the reconstruction of overhead lines in accordance with your minimum programme. In these proposals however the consumption of certain stores has been limited as follows, to allow for a possible shortage of stores in the area at present occupied by the Germans:


(1) Galvanised iron wire 4 millimetres diameter - consumption limited to a maximum of 25% of your total stores in the area occupied by the Allies.

(2) Bronze wire 3 millimetres diameter - consumption limited to 20% of your total stores in the area occupied by the Allies.

2. As discussed with Colonel Rosani, it is expected that you will use these stores for the more important lines on the minimum programme, the remainder of the lines to be reconstructed from salvaged material.

3. You will be informed as soon as permission has been obtained from the Chief Signal Officer, District 2, for the work to begin.

4. As regards transport, an effort is being made to obtain two heavy trucks and two light vehicles from Sicily, the former for transport of men and materials, and the latter for survey work.

1. Reference attached basic letter AG 311.3(IMSAC-1) HQ IBS, APO 550 dated 2 November 1943, above subject with two indorsements and two inclosures.

2. Report mentioned in para 5d of Incl. 2 to basic communication upon request of IBS was returned by HQ AMG to IBS without action.

3. The questions raised in paragraphs 5c and 5d of inclosure #2 basic communication has been referred to AGC for determination of policy. There is also a request for payment to be made by the Italian Government in communications materials such as copper wire, insulators, poles, and other materials expended by United States Signal Troops for rehabilitation.

4. On 2 August 43 Chief Signal Officer 15th Army Group issued Operation Instruction No. 15 with respect to the policy - Restoration of Civil Telephone and Telegraph Services in Sicily. Paragraphs 3 to 7 inclusive of such instructions are quoted:

"Within the general policy laid down in this letter Commanders 7th and 8th Armies will take every opportunity to facilitate the restoration of Civil telephone and telegraph services, detailed action being co-ordinated by their Chief Signal Officers and Civil Affairs Officers.

'In areas not in the sphere of direct interest of armies such matters will be dealt with by the Signal Officer on the Staff of AMGOT.

'All local, intraurban, telephone services will be restored to civil use, as far as possible having regard to essential military requirements, and will wherever possible be operated by civil personnel.

'Civil telegraph services will be restored wherever this does not conflict with military needs, but such services will for the present be open for use only for military purposes and for such civil government traffic as may be expressly approved by AMGOT. These services will be operated wherever possible by civil personnel.

'No new construction or appropriation of routes or terminal equipment or changes of circuits will be made by civil authorities without the consent of the Signal Officer concerned.

'No reserves of equipment of any kind will be drawn on for civil services without the approval of the signal officer concerned, except for work under paras 4 and 5.'

5. The S.E.T. (non-government owned) telephone company will doubtless have a substantial claim for local telephone service and facilities furnished Allied Forces, for use of long-distance circuits and facilities, for stores taken and requisitioned. It is understood that bills or claims have not been presented or any payments made by Allied Forces to S.E.T.

6. It is also suggested that the telephone company may claim that labor performed by Allied Forces on the property was or is of little value to them on the ground that much of the work was performed in order to meet military requirements and that a considerable amount of re-arrangement will be required before full civilian use can be made of the property.

7. It is submitted that the questions submitted by the basic correspondence will likewise arise with respect to other privately owned utilities such as the electric industry.

8. Your comments with respect to this matter are requested.

REMARKS TO: Military Government Section, Berlin.

REASON: Complaint of Foreigners

At the request of the Third military government in Berlin, foreign military officers and civilians (including our members from the Third Army) where they had been employing German and Czechoslovak as well as with the majority of other foreigners at first were given temporary passes. These and others have been remained since at a cost of 100000 to the province of Berlin. They can be considered of their own accord and have generated considerable foreign exchange by providing an added benefit to the local foreign community in Berlin.

Military authorities informed us, against our very will, on the 12th January 1944, that they had to return these foreign officials and civilians, because of the present situation in Berlin. We request it to be investigated. If you have not received a call, or have no authority and information, the majority of our citizens, Germans, and others who are regulated, especially officials and their families have not received. We urge that action be taken to see that all foreign officials and their families are returned. In this regard, we hope all other countries will act similarly, and we hope Germany's foreign officials will be granted the same privilege.

It would be understandable to attempt to deny information of a number of the above names and their families, as far as possible information, and to be requested that the message be forwarded to the foreign foreign authorities. It should be emphasized however that appropriate requests from the American government for information can be sent by the American military liaison officer of Berlin, Berlin, Berlin, and in particular the 2nd US Army Headquarters.


2. Re censorship sections may not be recruited from within the Commissions if such personnel is to be paid directly by the Allied authorities. Italian state employees are forbidden, by Italian law, to accept payment either regular or casual, from any other source but that of the Government which employ them. I understand that Italian ex-prisoner of war personnel from North Africa will be selected for re-examination purposes.

3. All mail posted by Italian units served by British APO's in forward areas is to be bagged by the unit and labelled "Allied Civilian Censorship Toronto". These bags should be over labelled in forward areas to Base 6 and conveyed to destination through APO channels. No loose mail should be accepted by British APO's for civil addressees in Italy.

4. Correspondence between civilians and Allied troops is forbidden on the Italian mainland. Troops will shortly receive orders to this effect. Sicily and Sardinia are not included.

5. Please let me have your postal, telegraphic addresses and telephone numbers.

6. I understand that you are working directly under Lt Colonel Hoover. But if I can help at any time with information or advice please let me know.

Marshal Nisse is undertaking a detailed study of the conditions of military workers in Allied ports with a view to improving their condition and efficiency. Attached herewith is a note from him on the subject, emphasizing the bad working conditions. The question of shoes seems to be the principal difficulty, as the Marshal has stated to me that there are virtually none in Italian stocks in the Island and on the Mainland.

The Marshal's note is passed to you for such action as can be taken to meet his recommendations. Is there anything that you wish the Commission to do, particularly to the end of obtaining shoes from Allied sources?

It would be appreciated if the following message from the Vatican authorities might be transmitted to Monsignore Mimmi, Archbishop of Bari. Begins. "British Minister to the Holy See on instructions from the Government states that Allied military authorities propose to use seminary of Molfetta (presumably the regional seminary, the property of the Holy See) as a military convalescent home.

2. Y.E. is directed to settle this question with the appropriate authorities in accordance with the following instructions: (1) The Holy See agree that the premises of the said seminary may be used as a convalescent home if the regional seminary can continue to function and find other premises. (2) You should ensure that a regular act of transfer is drawn up with a detailed inventory and corresponding pledge of restitution. (3) You are further directed to refer any other similar cases which may subsequently arise to the Holy See, giving your opinion about them and making such proposals as appear necessary.

3. The Holy See regret to have as yet no news of Southern Italy. Y.E. should endeavour to convey some information on the subject to the Holy See, if necessary by means of the kind offices of the military authorities. News is particularly desired of Cardinal Ascalesi; of the Bishop of Cava and Sarno and of the Abbot of the Holy Trinity at Cava Dei Tirreni who are reported to be no longer at their posts; and of the Diocese of Campobasso whose Bishop is reported to have met a tragic death.

4. His Holiness blesses Y.E. and charges you to convey his paramount blessing to all the Bishops and to the faithful." Ends.

The British Government hope that the Allied military authorities will be able to assist in the transmission of the information desired by the Holy See as stated in the third paragraph of the above message. Favourable action on this may well facilitate agreement on requisitioning. They similarly trust that a satisfactory arrangement may be reached with the Archbishop of Bari as regards the use of the Molfetta seminary, since an agreed solution in the present instance may do much to facilitate matters in future cases." 90!

The British Minister to the Holy See has informed the Papal authorities of the intentions of the Allied Command as regards the requisition of the seminary at Moscetta in the manner indicated in S3 of this Office's memo. No. 11/34/1501 of November 16th. He has made it clear that the Vatican was being informed solely as a matter of courtesy.

2. The Vatican has replied that, since the seminary is the property of the Holy See, the latter's consent is necessary before it may be used for other purposes. The Italian Government have always sought the prior consent of the Holy See in such cases and, in fact, when they proposed to requisition this seminary in 1940, they abandoned the proposal at the request of the Holy See. The Vatican further pointed out that President Roosevelt's message to the Pope of July 10th, 1943, contained an assurance that papal property in Italy would be respected.

3. The Vatican, however, agrees to the use of the seminary as a convalescent home, if the inmates can continue their work in other convenient premises. Instructions on this subject for delivery to Monsignore Minni, Archbishop of Bari, are being telegraphed to this Office and will be passed on to the M.G.S. in due course for transmission.

Lt. Col. Denmore has informed me that he has not had contact with you since the latter part of November. I recall having seen your report of 17 November and the letters written by Gibson Graham.

I note that you have been attending meetings of the Transportation Committee at Naples. I am very anxious to learn the exact position of the Shipping Sub-Commission with respect to its relations with PLAMCO and PLAMCO's position with respect to coastal shipping.

Has there been a clarification of the matter or a definite policy laid down with respect to craft not under command of Allied Naval Authorities? Does PLAMCO control all coasters and other small craft which are not under Allied Naval Control? If so, by what directives? Also, if so, what responsibilities are left for the AMG Shipping Sub-Commission? Please telegraph your answers to the above.

I understand that you have left three officers at Palermo to look after shipping matters. Are these officers assigned to AMG HQ Region I, or are they a part of the Shipping Sub-Commission carrying out field functions?

If you have submitted draft of proposed "functions" for Shipping Sub-Commission to HQ AMG or AMG, copy of same would be appreciated. Information in connection with plans you have prepared, even though tentative, will be helpful; also your thoughts as to the personnel required for the Shipping Sub-Commission. "Number 40 dated December 13: Considering technical consultations discussions are reported in my dispatch 31564, November 22, I have reached certain conclusions with Anglo-Americans, partly in agreement, concerning financing and rehiring of officials, installations and personnel in Italy and for colonies. I have reported, by mail, in detail on this subject awaiting for Your Excellency's approval various solutions, agreed upon or otherwise; however, Anglo-Americans have now advanced a request which I make as a preliminary step, submitting solutions in question and soliciting, in case of extreme urgency, telegraphic instructions from Your Excellency. In conformity with explicit wishes of Anglo-Americans, the indicated instructions should authorize me to initiate immediately first measures necessary to align personnel and offices with new needs of the war; to start providing necessary repatriation and to immediately release to a minimum the salaries of officials and employees to be repatriated.

For following considerations, in the interests of Anglo-Americans, determine those measures:

1. Italy, as long as possible, their financial aid to prolonging the period during which the League can manage its balance of its own funds; this period could be delayed by further negotiations.

2. Offices not considered indispensable to be closed.

3. Appropriate repatriation of officials and employees not included in recommended negotiation or are unable for service with central administration, owing to opposition of the same.

4. Few individuals who do not offer sufficient guarantee of political loyalty to be received from negotiation staff.

The main points of the final Anglo-American "recommendations" which we previously reported in detail represent in fact conclusions of an agreement in principle and in part the essential conditions presented for future financing apart from any kind of agreement are summarised below:

(a) Negotiation - necessary delegation, first ministerial one, one economic delegate d'Affaires, second ministerial one, the Minister (agent). One press attaché (refer to No. 35), one red cross delegate, at present in London, one naval attaché, and one general in charge of consular statistics. Offices of military and air attachés to be closed. Taking into consideration various Spanish American single recommendations, a nomination for each post has been made.

(b) Closure all royal concessions in Portugal and her colonies. I have made my special reservations on this point.

(c) All Institute of Culture to be closed. Only the Italian schools in Portugal that can continue to function on a minimum scale and with our own funds may be allowed to continue until end of school year; other schools to be closed. I have also made all possible reservations on this point.

(d) 25 to 50 percent reduction on all salaries and office expenses.

Your Excellency is directed to settle this question with the appropriate authorities in accordance with the following instructions: (1) The Holy See agree that the premises of the said seminary may be used as a convalescent home if the regional seminary can continue to function and find other premises. (2) You should ensure that a regular act of transfer is drawn up with a detailed inventory and corresponding pledge of restitution. (3) You are further directed to refer any other similar cases which may subsequently arise to the Holy See, giving your opinion about them and making such proposals as appear necessary.

The Holy See regret to have as yet no news of Southern Italy. Your Excellency should endeavour to convey some information on the subject to the Holy See, if necessary by means of the kind offices of the military authorities. News is particularly desired of Cardinal Arcivescovo; of the Bishop of Cava and Sarno and of the Abbot of the Holy Trinity at Cava dei Tirreni who are reported to be no longer at their posts; and of the Diocese of Campobasso whose Bishop is reported to have met a tragic death.

HIS Holiness blesses Your Excellency and charges you to convey his paramount blessing to all the Bishops and to the faithful."

I am taking steps to inform the appropriate Allied Military authorities of the contents of this message so that they may be prepared to discuss the matter further with Your Grace at the earliest opportunity. I

4. Few individuals who do not offer sufficient guarantee of political loyalty to be removed from legation staff.

The main points of the final Anglo-American "recommendations" which as previously reported in detail represent in fact conclusions of an agreement in principle and in part the essential conditions presented for future financing apart from any kind of agreement are summarised below:

(a) Legation - necessary clerks, first secretary one, one counselor chargé d'Affaires, second secretary one, the Minister (absent). One press attache (refer my No. 39), one red cross delegate, at present in Lisbon, one naval attache, and one counsel in charge of consular chancery. Offices of military and air attaches to be closed. Taking into consideration various specific American-Anglo recommendations, a nomination for each post has been made.

(b) Closing all royal consulates in Portugal and her colonies. I have made my special reservations on this point.

(c) All Institute of Salazar to be closed. Only the Italian schools in Portugal that can continue to function on a minimum scale and with our own funds may be allowed to continue until end of school year; other schools to be closed. I have also made all possible reservations on this point.

(d) 25 to 50 percent reduction on all salaries and office expenses.

SUBJECT: Crews of the Navy and Merchant Marine

MEMORANDUM FOR: His Excellency, the Chief of Government

I consider it necessary to bring to the attention of your Excellency the situation that has developed relative to shore leave for the crews of Italian warships and merchant ships touching Allied ports.

1. Since the 14th of October the Italian Navy and Merchant Marine have lent their aid to the Allies in accordance with Italy's co-belligerency and even before this our units cooperated with the Allied Navies. It has therefore been more than two months since the Italian Navy first commenced to work wholeheartedly toward furthering the common cause. Until now however, none of our sailors, soldiers or merchant seamen have been able to obtain liberty ashore in Allied Mediterranean ports.

2. The various local Allied headquarters have so far denied them any special privileges, citing the following reasons:

- (a) Warships in outside ports:
Location near prison and concentration camps, and an absence of sufficient quarters to house personnel during their off-time ashore.
- (b) Warships at Malta:
Resentment of the population against Italy because of the great number of serial attacks made against the island.
- (c) Ports in Egypt:
Presence in these ports of Greek and Yugoslavian elements that might create disorders if Italian sailors were allowed to circulate freely.
- (d) Ports in Libya:
Presence of the Italian population.
- (e) Ports in French North Africa:
Presence of the French population, difficult to control, and likely to rebel at the presence of our sailors.

3. Similar reasons have been given by the Commander in charge of the Mediterranean Fleet, the authority to whom we are responsible for naval matters. It is furthermore necessary to point out that all the areas mentioned are under the military control of the Allies, who should therefore be empowered to intervene effectively to prevent any manifestations of disorder or resentment and to repress them as soon as they are discovered.

4. The proposals made by the Commander in charge of the Mediterranean Fleet for bettering the conditions of our crews are reasonable enough, but are not conclusive to a final solution of the problem.

In regard to warships, the possibility of drastically reducing crews has been mentioned. But even a reduction of some hundred men would not alter the problem.

Concerning warships and merchant ships now working with the Allies, it has been proposed instead to "attempt to persuade our crews, explaining to them the necessity demanding such action, and repeating that the situation is only temporary" -- but for how long? While a program of persuasion would have some success with warship crews, the same cannot be said for the units of the Merchant Marine, for whom any limitation of personal liberty is considered contrary to the labor contracts and the democratic principles affirmed by the Allies.

5. Many revolts aboard merchant ships have demanded intervention. For example:

(a) On H. M. S. Pozarica, Capt. Giurinti, of the Italian Military Mission to the Allied General Headquarters, found it necessary to intervene in order to calm the feelings of the sailors, who rebelled at their prolonged confinement and who pointed out that as co-nationals, enrolled as volunteers on Allied merchant ships, they should enjoy ever so much more personal liberty.

(b) On the hospital ship Toscana, which had carried wounded English and American soldiers, shore leave has been prohibited even in Sicilian ports, as well as in ports of French North Africa, with considerable discontent among the crew because of this incomprehensible restriction. (See inclosure.)

It must also be kept in mind that the sailors of our Merchant Marine wear civilian clothes and not a uniform which, being more easily discernable, might be the cause of revolt on the part of local inhabitants.

6. This Ministry earnestly requests the Anglo-American authorities to grant recognition of a privilege which seems directly and closely connected with the status of co-belligerency governing the activities of our navies. There are no end of incidents which emphasize increasing difficulties that will continue to prevent the effective employment of our navy's services if these unjustified restrictions on the freedom of personnel should be allowed to persist. I consider it necessary that the matter be carefully studied by the Allied Control Commission inasmuch as the problem is not only military but above all political.

TO THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF OF THE MEDITERRANEAN AREA

Following a visit by me to the hospital ship Toscana, it is my duty to inform you of the requirements which must be met before the ship can in the future be employed by the Allied Nations. A most dissatisfied feeling has grown up among members of the crews as a result of orders given by the British authorities intended to prevent the crew from obtaining any liberty ashore.

Since the 8th of October, when the Toscana left Taranto, the ship has touched at the ports of Sicily and at Tripoli, Alexandria, Phillipville and Algiers. In none of these ports was the crew allowed to go ashore. The men know of no reason for these restrictions, seeing that, since the Armistice, they have been loyally serving the Allied cause.

The same feeling is prevalent among the crews of all merchant ships that have been compelled to remain in port for long periods for repairs or other reasons.

I must inform you that if these measures are continued in force, extremely grave consequences will follow and commanders will find it more and more difficult to maintain discipline aboard and to keep their crews happy in the execution of their duties.

I hope a way may be found to permit the crews of all Italian ships to go ashore subject only to whatever reasonable restrictions may be necessary because of local situations.

TO : Allied Military Mission, Brindisi (THRU AMG 15 Army Group)

1. Attached is a copy of a letter which was received by the Directors of the School "Figlie di S. Anna", ordering the School premises to be requisitioned for use as an Italian Military Hospital.

2. As will be seen, copies of the letter were also sent to the Prefecture, the Provveditore, and the Reserve Military Hospital at Matera, but no official request was made to this HQ.

3. It would be much appreciated if you could please take action to see that such requests in future come, via you, to this HQ.

4. In this case, it is not considered that the request is justified. The School in question is the only School in Matera which has so far been able to open. Since the School-question is a very pressing one, and many of the Schools in Matera have been of necessity occupied by Allied troops in training, it is not considered desirable that the little school space that remains should be interfered with unless absolutely necessary. (It may be pointed out that the School in question, though a Church-School, is being used at this moment for the holding of general examinations, owing to shortage of space).

5. Prior to our arrival here the School had been requisitioned as a hospital, but AMG cancelled the arrangement because in three months there were about three patients. If required, it is requested that a wing of the Ospedale Civile be taken over by the Military.

6. I am instructing the Directors of the School in question to take no action in the matter.


