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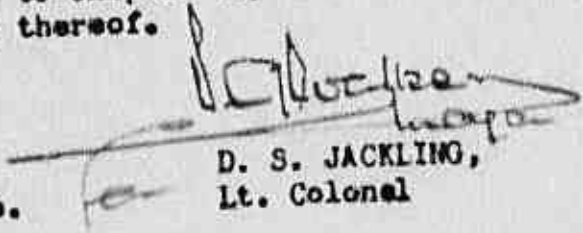

The contents of this Manual include Passive Air Defense (P.A.D.): Measures, Organization, Operations and Training. The practical experiences of campaigns in the North African Theater have demonstrated that the effects of enemy air attack on military personnel and installations can be minimized by the application of P.A.D. measures under a central control. The need for P.A.D. depends upon the situation. The completeness of P.A.D. depends upon the Commander. Security is the responsibility of command.

Although this Manual was designed primarily for American Forces, it can also be used by British P.A.D. Officers. Main variations in terminology will be found in "Appendix B".

(Tentative)CHAPTER I
GENERAL

1. PURPOSE - This Manual is designed primarily, for use by P.A.D. Staff Officers as a guide in their establishment of P.A.D. It may be used also by organization commanders, and staff officers whose duties include operations, plans and training.
2. DEFINITION - The term Passive Air Defense (P.A.D.) as employed in this Manual, means measures taken to counteract the effects of enemy action such as those caused by air attacks, bombardments, delayed action mines and booby traps. It does not include passive measures such as barrage balloons and smoke coverage, whose mission is to harass and prevent effective enemy action. These latter measures are a part of the active air defense.
3. MISSION OF P.A.D. - The mission of P.A.D. is to mitigate the effects of enemy air attack on personnel, stores and equipment in order that the disruption of normal operational functions is reduced to a minimum.
4. APPLICATION OF P.A.D. - The application of P.A.D. will vary with the situation.
 - a. In Tactical Forces in the field under combat conditions, P.A.D. consists of normal security measures. Added P.A.D. measures must be taken when units are bivouaced or quartered in or near towns and cities.
 - b. In Base Sections, P.A.D. consists of reinforcing and coordinating normal security measures through a P.A.D. Control Center.
5. MANUAL SECURITY MEASURES - The subject matter of normal security measures, listed below, is covered in official publications. Further reference must be made to pertinent publications issued in the Theater of Operations concerned.

- a. Blackouts and Dimouts.
- b. Personnel Protection.
- c. Air Raid Warning.
- d. Fire Prevention.
- e. Unexploded Bombs, Mines, and Booby Traps.
- f. War Gases.
- g. First Aid.

CHAPTER II

ORGANIZATION

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SECTION I

PERSONNEL

6. FULL TIME PERSONNEL - Army, Task Force, Base, District and Sub-Area Headquarters should normally employ full time P.A.D. Staffs. It is the responsibility of British Commanders to request that P.A.D. personnel be included in their War Establishment as required. U.S. Manning tables and tables of organization do not include personnel specifically for P.A.D. It is, however, within the responsibility of the U.S. Commanders at their discretion to provide personnel for full time P.A.D. work. Full time P.A.D. personnel when appointed for the P.A.D. sections of the Headquarters, should work under G-3 (G-Ops).

7. PART TIME PERSONNEL - In formations where no special P.A.D. staff is authorized, Commanders are responsible that personnel are detailed to carry out necessary P.A.D. work in addition to other duties. Each Corps, Division, Regiment or Separate Battalion require one part time P.A.D. officer. Companies or similar units require two part time N.C.O.'s.

SECTION II EQUIPMENT

8. EQUIPMENT FOR FULL TIME PERSONNEL - The only extra equipment needed by full time personnel is a switchboard and telephones. Such equipment will be arranged locally.

9. EQUIPMENT FOR PART TIME PERSONNEL - Part time personnel, and units furnishing specialized services will use organic equipment.

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OPERATIONS

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SECTION I TACTICAL FORCES

10. EXTENT - The situation determines the extent of P.M.D. operations.

a. When large units are bivouaced in towns and cities they may be required to establish a P.M.D. Control Center similar to that set up in Base Sections. (Paragraphs 15 - 18.)

b. Smaller units such as Regiments and Battalions may establish a Regimental or Battalion P.M.D. Control Center. For example:



NOTE: 1. Control Center should be established at battalion level to dispatch P.M.D. Services, such as light Rescue Squads; to units which need assistance.

2. Regimental level there should be a Control Center to coordinate the battalions. For example: if a battalion bivouacs, barracks, or supply room has received a heavy bombing, it may be necessary to call on adjoining units for P.M.D. Services. This would be handled through a Regimental Control Center. Also, since some battalions may not be self-sufficient they may find it necessary to call on adjoining units for assistance. This will be directed through Regimental Control Center.

11. FUNCTION OF P.M.D. OFFICERS - The function of full time and part-time P.M.D. Officers are:

a. Advise the Commander of matters pertaining to P.M.D. and Civil

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b. Smaller units such as Regiments and Battalions may establish a Regimental or Battalion P.M.D. Control Center. For example:

NOTE: Control Center should be established at battalion level to dispatch P.M.D. Services, such as Light Rescue Squad, to units which need assistance.

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11. FUNCTION OF P.M.D. OFFICERS - The function of full time and part-time P.M.D. Officers are:

a. Advise the Commander on matters pertaining to P.M.D. and Civil Defense organization, operation, and training.

b. Proper training and operational plans that will extend to the troop level.

c. Provide operational control for P.M.D. Services and coordinate other services.

d. Receive, consolidate and interpret data on P.M.D. activities.

e. Maintain P.M.D. records.

f. Make necessary inspections to determine the efficiency of P.M.D. operation and training.

g. Establish and maintain liaison with Civil Defense through proper channels.

SECTION II
BASE SECTIONS

12. EXTENT - The extent of enemy activity is the determining factor of P.A.D. operations. Where there is activity and the Base Section is extensive in area, with high concentration of troops and installations, additional P.A.D. Control Centers may be required. The operations in the following paragraphs are based on average situations.

13. FUNCTIONS OF P.A.D. STAFF OFFICER - In addition to the duties listed for P.A.D. Officers in paragraph 11, the P.A.D. Officers of Base Sections normally have additional functions. These are:

a. Recommend P.A.D. Staff Section for a Base District when military installations exist which warrant such establishment.

b. Arrange plan for mutual assistance between Districts when such is possible.

c. Devise P.A.D. scheme for military installations too small to be established as Base Districts.

d. Recommend subdivisions of the Base District into sectors when necessary. Consideration will be given to geographical barriers, communications, and distribution of supplies and personnel. Sectors will be constituted to be as self-sufficient as possible.

e. Establish Control Centers to direct P.A.D. Services and to coordinate other services.

14. PLANS - P.A.D. plans for a Base Section normally include a Pre-Occupation, Interim, and Final Plan. These are prepared by the P.A.D. Staff Officer.

a. The Pre-Occupation Plan is issued as a part of a movement order. During this phase all general and special staff officers concerned must be contacted to assure coordination.

(1) "P.A.D. Staff Officers Preplanning Check List", Appendix A-1, names the officers and states the subject matters which are to be coordinated before the Pre-Occupation Plan is issued.

(2) "P.A.D. Pre-Occupation Plan", Appendix A-2, indicates the P.A.D. measures that may be coordinated in the planning phase.

b. The "P.A.D. Interim Plan", issued within 24 hours of occupation, serves until the Base installations become more stable. Normally, the Interim Plan is too Pre-Occupation Plan with an Appendix.

(1) "Appendix to Pre-Occupation Plan", Appendix A-3, adds the detailed information needed to complete the "Pre-Occupation Plan" - and to establish the "Interim Plan". Such information can be secured only after occupation.

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c. The "P.A.D. Final Plan" will replace the "Interim Plan" and will be issued when installations become stabilized.

(1) "P.A.D. Final Plan", Appendix A-4, is a form indicating the P.A.D. measures that may be applied in a static base.

15. CONTROL, GENERAL - In situations requiring a P.A.D. Control Center, it is generally necessary to subdivide the area into sectors and to establish and maintain Sector Control Posts. Such Posts will be coordinated through the P.A.D. Control Center.

a. Factors determining the maximum size of the sector are:

(1) Topography, which will include all geographical barriers such as distance, rivers, etc.

(2) Lines of communication, which are required for rapid reporting, coordinating and dispatching.

(3) The dispersion of military installations and personnel.

16. P.A.D. CONTROL CENTER - The Control Center directs P.A.D. Services and coordinates such other services as may be required at an incident.

a. The minimum personnel required for operations in the P.A.D. Control Center during enemy action are: P.A.D. Controller (P.A.D. Staff Officer), switchboard operator, and two clerks. Two messengers with transportation should be detailed to report on alerts.

(1) The duties of the personnel are:

- (a) Receive and dispatch air raid warnings to those concerned.
- (b) Receive incident reports, dispatch P.A.D. Services and coordinate other services as the situation requires.
- (c) Keep and consolidate records of all incidents such as: number, type and patterns of bombs, and all damages and casualties.

b. Telephones will be the primary means of communication. In the event of breakdown of telephone communications, messengers will be employed.

- (1) P.A.D. Control Center requires a telephone switchboard.
- (2) Report forms used by Control Center in receiving incident reports by telephone should be the identical form as used by the reporting agency.
- (3) "P.A.D. Control Center Telephone Switchboard", Appendix A-6, indicates the lines of communication required from the Control Center.

c. "Services", Appendix A-7, indicates the services directed and coordinated through Control Center. The composition of services directed is covered in paragraph 21. Services coordinated are listed in paragraph 22.

d. Incident Reports from Section consist of "Preliminary, Interim, and Survey Reports".

- (1) "Preliminary Report" gives immediate available information.
- (2) "Interim Report" gives further information and also may request additional assistance.
- (3) "Survey Report" gives complete information as soon as possible after Preliminary or Interim Reports.

NOTE: See Appendix A-5 for report forms.

2. Daily reports concerning availability of P.A.D. Services should be received from Sector Controllers and others concerned.

16. P.A.D. CONTROL CENTER - The Control Center directs P.A.D. Services and coordinates such other services as may be required at an incident.

a. The minimum personnel required for operations in the P.A.D. Control Center during any action are: P.A.D. Controller (P.A.D. Staff Officer), switchboard operator, and two clerks. Two messengers with transportation should be detailed to report on alerts.

(1) The duties of the personnel are:

(a) Receive and dispatch air raid warnings to those concerned.

(b) Receive incident reports, dispatch P.A.D. Services and coordinate other services as the situation requires.

(c) Keep and consolidate records of all incidents such as: number, type and patterns of bombs, and all damages and casualties.

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(1) P.A.D. Control Center requires a telephone switchboard.

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(3) "P.A.D. Control Center Telephone Switchboard", Appendix 4-6, indicates the lines of communication required from the Control Center.

c. "Services", Appendix 4-7, indicates the services directed and coordinated through Control Center. The composition of services directed is covered in paragraph 21. Services coordinated are listed in paragraph 21.

d. Incident Reports from sectors consist of "Preliminary, Interim, and Survey Reports".

(1) "Preliminary Report" gives immediate available information.

(2) An "Interim Report" gives further information and also may request additional assistance.

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NOTE: See Appendix 4-5 for report forms.

e. Daily reports concerning availability of P.A.D. Services should be received from Sector Controllers and others concerned.

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- (3) A "Survey Report" gives complete information as soon as possible after Preliminary or Interim Reports.

NOTE: See Appendix A-8 for report forms.

e. Daily reports concerning availability of P.A.D. Services should be received from Sector Controllers and others concerned.

f. The operations of a P.A.D. Control Center require the use of control panels and maps.

- (1) The control panel should show the number of P.A.D. Services available, location by sectors, and other information as required to keep the Control Center informed.
- (2) "P.A.D. Control Center-Control Panel", Appendix A-8, is a type of control panel that may be used.
- (2) The maps should contain information of all pertinent data, such as: sector boundaries, posts, P.A.D. Services, etc.

g. Liaison must be established and maintained between the P.A.D. Control Center and the local Civil Defense Control Center. The general policy concerning relationships between Passive Air Defense and Civil Defense is covered in Chapter 6.

17. SECTOR CONTROL POST - Sector Control Post directs the P.A.D. Services previously designated by Control Center and reports all incidents to Control Center, together with any requests for additional assistance.

a. The Control Post should be established with a unit which is a part of, and likely to remain stable in, the Base.

b. The minimum personnel required for operations during an alert are: Sector Controller (or duty officer), a clerk, and two messengers. There should be at least one person in the Control Post at all times.

c. When an incident occurs, and there is reason to believe that there are casualties, the Sector Controller will:

- (1) Send out one Light Rescue Squad immediately.
- (2) Notify P.A.D. Control using "Preliminary Report".
- (3) If necessary, appoint an Incident Officer or NCO to take charge and keep the Sector Controller informed.
- (4) Submit complete information of incident on "Survey Report".

d. Daily reports regarding availability of P.A.D. Services will be made to Control Center as directed.

e. Records should be kept of all incidents and P.A.D. activities.

18. UNITS - All units must be familiar with the P.A.D. plan of the area. Each unit should prepare instructions to insure proper functioning in the area P.A.D. plan. Certain units will furnish P.A.D. Services.

a. Every unit should post fire watchers and fire guards during alerts and know what action to take when an incident occurs in the area.

- (1) Fire watchers should report all fires.
- (2) Fire Guards should be prepared to furnish initial fire *339* protection.

(a) "Fireguard", Appendix B-1, lists personnel and equipment.

- (3) When an incident occurs:
 - (a) Take all emergency measures with available facilities.
 - (b) Appoint an officer or NCO to take command at incident.
 - (c) Report incident to Sector Control Post and request assistance if necessary.

b. Units furnishing P.A.D. Services to Control Center or Sector Control Posts will report their status daily. Any changes in location of the

(3) If necessary, appoint an Incident Officer or NCO to take charge and keep the Sector Controller informed.

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(1) Fire Watchers should report all fires.

(2) Fire Guards should be prepared to furnish initial fire *339* protection.

(a) "Fireguards", Appendix B-1, lists personnel and equipment.

(3) When an incident occurs:

(a) Take all emergency measures with available facilities.

(b) Appoint an officer or NCO to take command at incident.

(c) Report incident to Sector Control Post and request assistance if necessary.

b. Units furnishing P.A.D. Services to Control Center or Sector Control Posts will report their status daily. Any changes in location of the unit will be promptly reported.

CHAPTER IV SERVICES

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SECTION I TACTICAL FORCES

19. GENERAL - a. The services required by Tactical Forces engaged in combat, are provided by normal security measures.

b. Tactical Forces, when not engaged in combat, may require services comparable to those required in Base Sections. These services are covered in paragraphs 20 - 22.

SECTION II
BASE SECTION

20. GENERAL - P.A.D. Services are units or personnel directed through P.A.D. Control Center. Other services are coordinated through Control Center.

21. DIRECTED THROUGH CONTROL CENTER - a. Light Rescue Squads. Each company or similar unit will form and train at least one Light Rescue Squad. Their functions will be the removal of casualties wherever possible, and to render First Aid when necessary.

(1) "P.A.D. Training for Companies or Similar Units", Appendix C-5, states the training required for these squads.

(2) "Light Rescue Squads", Appendix E-1, lists the personnel and equipment.

b. Heavy Rescue Squads. These are composed of personnel selected from engineer units possessing equipment required for the removal of trapped casualties.

(1) Paragraph 28 f. deals with the training required for these squads.

(2) "Heavy Rescue Squads", Appendix E-1, lists the personnel and equipment.

c. Work Parties. These are employed in situations which require manual labor. No special training is necessary. The equipment needed will depend upon the situation.

(1) "Work Parties", Appendix E-1, lists the personnel.

d. Ambulances. The P.A.D. Control Center will normally direct ambulances during alerts. A driver and medical orderly should be assigned to each vehicle.

22. COORDINATED THROUGH CONTROL CENTER - These services, normally employed for security measures must be coordinated through Control Center.

e. Some, such as blockades, personnel protection, fire prevention, etc., do not require specialized personnel.

f. Others require specialized personnel. These are supervised or directed by the following agencies:

- (1) Air Field Training.
- (2) Fire Fighting.
- (3) Medical.
- (4) Military Police.
- (5) Criminal Investigation.
- (6) Signal.
- (7) Supply (Statistics).
- (8) Quartermaster.
- (9) Post Hospital.

- (1) Paragraph 28 L. deals with the training required for these squads.
 - (2) "Heavy Rescue Squads", Appendix B-1, lists the personnel and equipment.

2. Work Parties. These are employed in situations which require manual labor. No special training is necessary. The equipment needed will depend upon the situation.

- (1) "Work Parties", Appendix B-1, lists the personnel.

4. Ambulances. The P.A.D. Control Center will normally direct ambulances during alerts. A driver and medical orderly should be assigned to each vehicle.

22. COORDINATED TECHNICAL CONTROL CENTER - These services, normally employed for security measures must be coordinated through Control Center.

5. Some, such as blackout, personnel protection, fire prevention, etc., do not require specialized personnel.

6. Others require specialized personnel. These are supervised or directed by the following agencies:

- (1) Air-Sea Training.
- (2) Fire Fighting.
- (3) Medical.
- (4) Military Police.
- (5) Chemical Warfare.
- (6) Signal.
- (7) Repair (Utilities).
- (8) Quartermaster.
- (9) Bomb Disposal.
- (10) Engineer (General Service).

CHAPTER V TRAINING

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SECTION I GENERAL

23. GENERAL - P.A.D. training is divided into two phases; namely, for P.A.D. organization personnel, and for units. The extent of this training is determined by the need for P.A.D. operation. (Ref: paragraph 10.) All training will be supervised by P.A.D. staff officers.

SECTION II

P.A.D. ORGANIZATION PERSONNEL

24. P.A.D. STAFF OFFICERS - The training should be conducted by an experienced P.A.D. Staff Officer and includes:

1. General training in all P.A.D. measures and services.
 2. Extensive training in P.A.D. organization, operations, and training.
 3. "Training Program for P.A.D. Staff Officers", Appendix C-1, indicates the scope of training.
25. PART-TIME P.A.D. OFFICERS AND NCO'S - The training of part-time P.A.D. Officers and NCO's will be supervised or conducted by P.A.D. Staff Officers.
- A. The scope of this training should include organization, services, operations, and training.
 - B. Appendices C-2, C-3, and C-4, state the scope of this training for the personnel of units indicated.
 - (1) C-2 "Training Program for P.A.D. Officers of Corps, Division, Regiment, and Battalion".
 - (2) C-3 "Training Program for P.A.D. NCO's of Companies or similar units."
 - (3) C-4 "Training Program for Sector Controllers".

SECTION III

UNIT

26. GENERAL - All Units should have general training in Passive Air Defense. This includes normal security measures and the establishment of light rescue squads. Certain units will furnish specialized services. This training should be conducted by personnel of the appropriate Arm or Service.
27. ALL UNITS - The general training in Passive Air Defense should be conducted by the P.A.D. NCO's under the supervision of the P.A.D. Officer concerned.
- A. "P.A.D. Training for Companies or Similar Units", Appendix C-5, indicates the scope of this training.
 28. SPECIAL UNITS - The training of specialized services is the responsibility of the unit commander providing these services. (Ref: paragraph 22 b). Further references should be made to the appropriate Training Manuals of the service concerned.

CHAPTER VI

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN PASSIVE AIR DEFENSE AND CIVIL DEFENSE

SECTION

I General

2. Appendices C-2, C-3, and C-4, state the scope of this training for the personnel of units indicated.

- (1) C-2 "Training Program for P.A.D. Officers of Corps, Division, Regiment, and Battalion".
- (2) C-3 "Training Program for P.A.D. HQ's of Companies or similar units."
- (3) C-4 "Training Program for Sector Controllers".

SECTION III UNIT

26. GENERAL - All Units should have general training in Passive Air Defense. This includes normal security measures and the establishment of light rescue squads. Certain units will furnish specialized services. This training should be conducted by personnel of the appropriate Army or Service.

27. ALL UNITS - The general training in Passive Air Defense should be conducted by the P.A.D. HQ's under the supervision of the P.A.D. Officer concerned.

B. "P.A.D. Training for Companies or Similar Units", Appendix C-5, indicates the scope of this training.

28. SPECIAL UNITS - The training of specialized services is the responsibility of the unit commander providing these services. (Ref: paragraph 22 b). Further references should be made to the appropriate Training Manuals of the service concerned.

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SECTION I GENERAL

29. GENERAL - Passive Air Defense and Civil Defense are closely related. The policies governing these relationships are determined by the conditions in occupied areas.

SECTION II POLICY FOR PASSIVE AIR DEFENSE AND CIVIL DEFENSE IN OCCUPIED ENEMY TERRITORY AND IN THE TERRITORY OF A CO-BELLIGERENT POWER

30. GENERAL - Passive Air Defense in occupied territory, as elsewhere, is a normal military duty and will be carried out in accordance with military instructions on the subject.

b. Civil Defense in occupied territory is only of importance where it affects military requirements. It is the duty of the Military Government Administration or Allied Control Commission to provide such Civil Defense Measures as are required by the military.

2. In any area of military importance, Passive Air Defense and Civil Defense will be closely related. Therefore, it is essential that the two be planned and executed together under the direction of the Military Commander.

31. RELATIVE IMPORTANCE OF CIVIL DEFENSE TO MILITARY REQUIREMENTS - a. Civil Defense will be a military necessity in those areas where its failure will hinder military operations.

b. Civil Defense may be of importance, even in areas of no military value, if the failure of the Civil Defense organization is likely to result in damage to essential services, stocks of food, serious problems of unrest, refugees, starvation, or disease amongst the civil population.

c. Where it is necessary to raise the standard of Civil Defense to meet military requirements, some assistance from the military will usually be necessary. This may be accomplished either by giving directions or advice, or by making available essential equipment or supplies which cannot otherwise be obtained by the civilian authorities.

32. CLASSIFICATION OF AREAS FOR CIVIL DEFENSE - a. The relative importance of Civil Defense to military requirements will be defined by classifying areas of occupied territory as follows:-

- (1) Class "A" - Areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as a military necessity. Every possible assistance is to be given to the organization of Civil Defense, including, if necessary, the loading without charge of essential equipment and the provision of essential facilities.
- (2) Class "B" - Areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as of military importance only insofar as there may be repercussions on the military in the event of failure of the Civil Defense organization. In these areas such equipment as is available may be sold or rented to the local authorities.
- (3) Class "C" - Areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as of no military importance.

b. The classification of areas as above, and their re-classification according to changing circumstances, will be the responsibility of Army Commanders in the Combat Zone, and of the District or Base Section Commanders in the Communications Zone (LC).

33. RESPONSIBILITY FOR CIVIL DEFENSE IN CLASSIFIED AREAS - a. In Class "A" areas, pending the establishment of the Military Government Administration, the local military Commander, assisted by Military Government officers, will be responsible for organizing minimum standards of Civil Defense.

2. Where it is necessary to raise the standard of Civil Defense to meet military requirements, some assistance from the military will usually be necessary. This may be accomplished either by giving directions or advice, or by making available essential equipment or supplies which cannot otherwise be obtained by the civilian authorities.

22. CLASSIFICATION OF AREAS FOR CIVIL DEFENSE - a. The relative importance of Civil Defense to military requirements will be defined by classifying areas of occupied territory as follows:-

- (1) Class "A" - areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as a military necessity. Every possible assistance is to be given to the organization of Civil Defense, including, if necessary, the lending without charge of essential equipment and the provision of essential materials.
- (2) Class "B" - Areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as of military importance only insofar as there may be repercussions on the military in the event of failure of the Civil Defense organization. In these areas such equipment as is available may be sold or rented to the local authorities.
- (3) Class "C" - areas in which Civil Defense is regarded as of no military importance.

b. The classification of areas as above, and their re-classification according to changing circumstances, will be the responsibility of Army Commanders in the Combat Zone, and of the District or Base Section Commanders in the Communications Zone (LC).

23. RESPONSIBILITY FOR CIVIL DEFENSE IN CLASSIFIED AREAS - a. In Class "A" areas, pending the establishment of the Military Government Administration, the local military Commander, assisted by Military Government officers, will be responsible for organizing military standards of Civil Defense.

- (1) When the Military Government Administration or Allied Control Commission has been established, it will be their responsibility to organize and supervise Civil Defense services in accordance with the requirements of the military Commander.

b. In Class "B" areas, organization and supervision of Civil Defense will be the responsibility of the Military Government Administration or Allied Control Commission. If coordination with the military is required, such coordination will be the responsibility of the local military Commander.

24. RESPONSIBILITY FOR PROVISION OF EQUIPMENT FOR CIVIL DEFENSE IN CLASSIFIED AREAS - a. In Class "A" areas, it is a military responsibility to decide the requirements and to provide any necessary equipment or material.

b. In Class "B" items, it is the Military Government Administration or Allied Control Commission responsibility to decide the requirements and to provide such equipment as is available. This equipment may be sold or rented to the local authorities if it is within the limits of transportation allotted by the military to the Military Government Administration.

2. If equipment is available, the Military Government Administration or Allied Control Commission may sell or rent it to suitable applicants from Class "B" items.

35. ADVISE ON PASSIVE AIR DEFENSE AND CIVIL DEFENSE - The P.A.D. Staff Officer, of the Military Commander, will be responsible for giving advice on all matters concerning Passive Air Defense. This will be done through the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3.

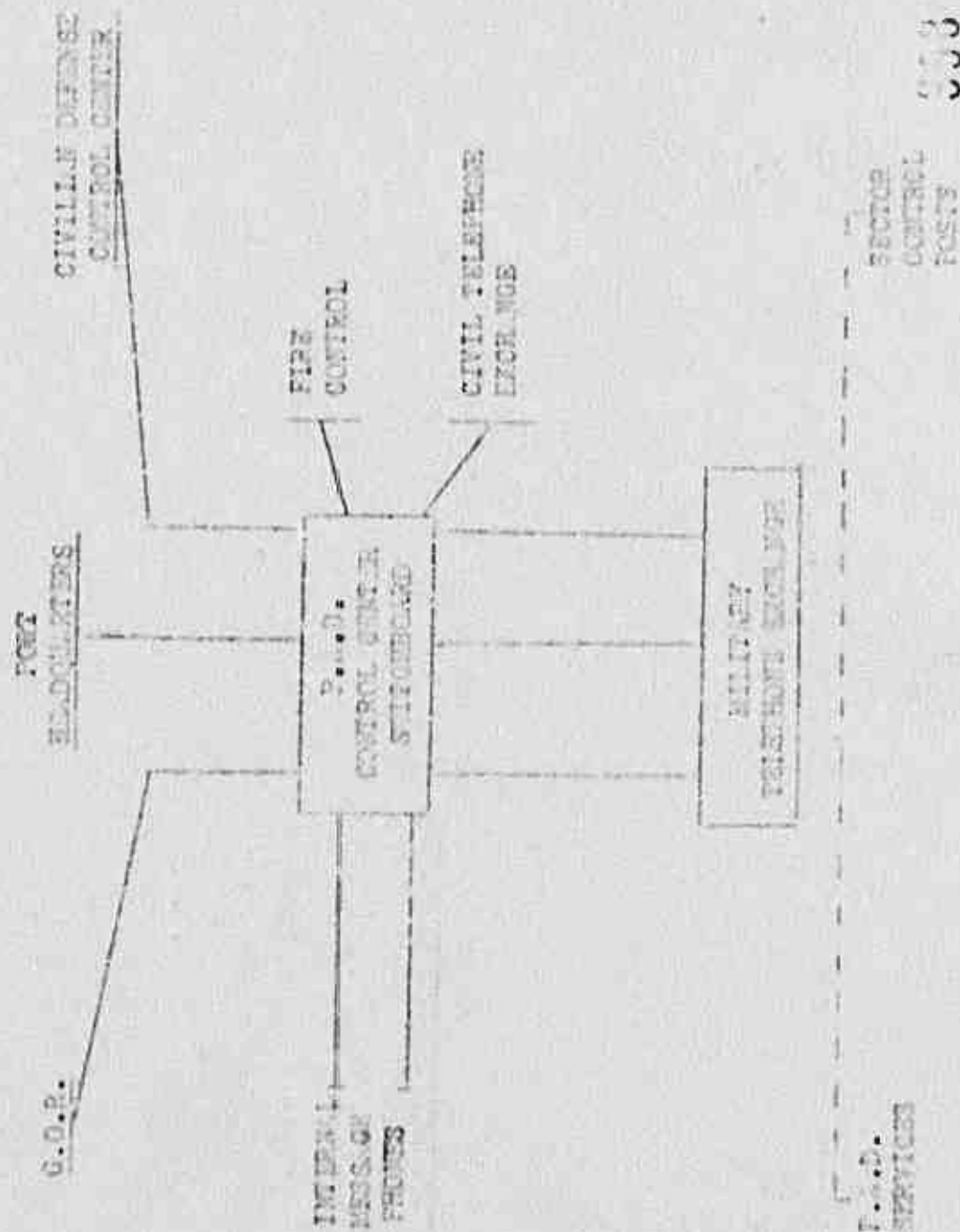

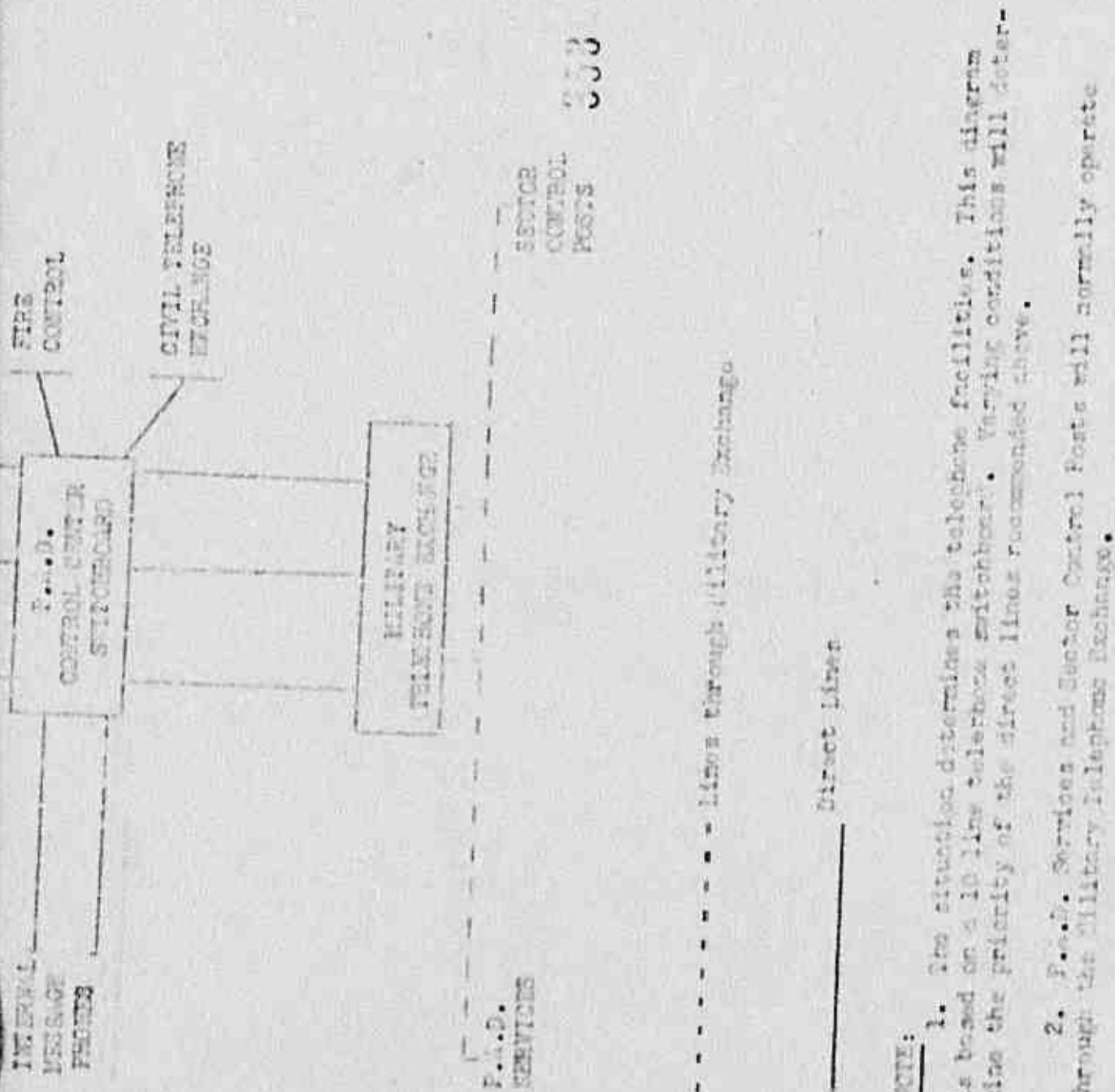

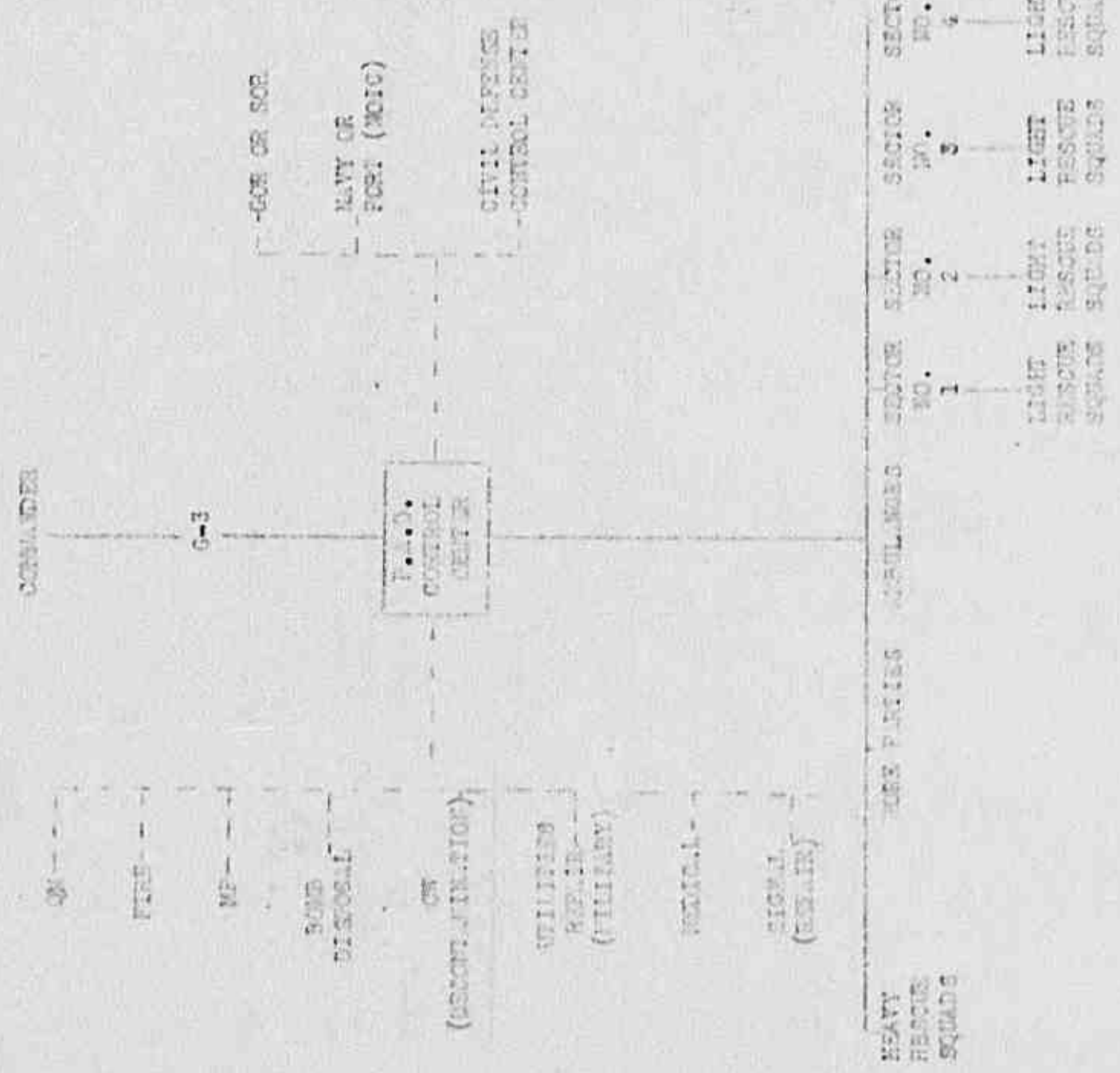

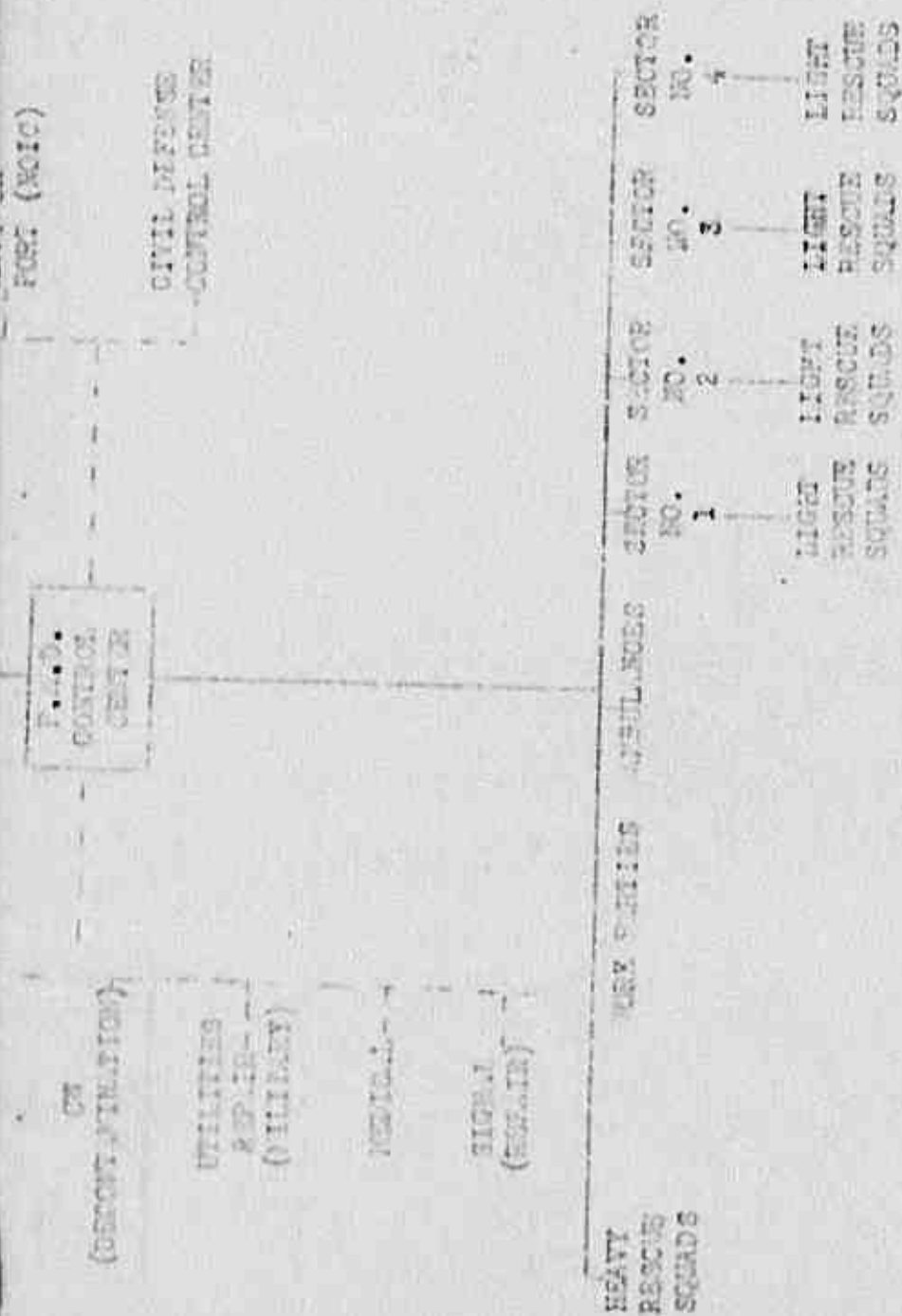

APPENDIX C-5

F.A.D. TRAINING FOR COMPANIES OR SIMILAR UNITS

1. The composition of the company or similar unit and the nature of its primary function will determine the extent of F.A.D. measures.

2. Instruction in normal security measures is an integral part of unit training. F.A.D. training consists of these measures, plus instruction in light rescue squads, fire watchers and fire guards, and F.A.D. control within the unit. Paragraphs 3, 4 and 5 suggest unit training to be given by F.A.D. ECO's, in these additional subjects.

3. LIGHT RESCUE SQUADS - a. Companies or similar units will provide at least one light rescue squad. Smaller units of 50 men or over will provide one light rescue squad.

(1) Each squad will consist of an ECO and 6 enlisted men. These men will be detailed according to a duty roster but will stand by in the event of an alert.

(2) The suggested minimum equipment for each squad is: 2 picks, 2 shovels, 1 stretcher, and transportation. The suggested equipment for a static installation is: First Aid Supplies, 2 stretchers, 4 blankets, 3 picks, 3 shovels, 2 axes, 2 back saws, 1 short ladder, 1 medium ladder, 2 crow bars and one iron shed lever. Equipment will be stored where it is easily accessible, and a periodic check made to insure completeness and condition.

b. The function of light rescue squads will be the removal of casualties from demolished structures where technical engineering skill is not required. These squads will be trained to deal promptly with casualties of their own unit, but may be subject to the call of Battalion Controller or higher echelon controller, in the event they are needed in other areas.

4. Light Rescue Squad Training will include the following subject matter:

- (1) Action on alarms and call-out.
- (2) Reorganization and leadership at incidents.
- (3) Appraisal of damage to buildings.
- (4) Rescue by debris clearance.
- (5) Recovery of the dead.
- (6) Damage to utilities.
- (7) Rescue in presence of poison gas.
- (8) Team training.

(9) Frequent incident drills will be held to check on state of

(2) The suggested minimum equipment for each squad is: 3 picks, 3 shovels, 1 stretcher, and transportation. Equipment will be stored where it is easily accessible, and a periodic check made to insure completeness and condition.

These squads will be prepared to deal primarily with casualties of their own unit, but may be subject to the call of Battalion Commander or higher command controller, in the event they are needed in other areas.

c. Light Rescue Squad training will include the following subject matter:

- (1) action on alarm and assignment.
- (2) investigation of conditions in buildings.
- (3) investigation of damage to buildings.
- (4) rescue by ladder placement.
- (5) Recovery of the dead.
- (6) Damage to utilities.
- (7) Action in case of water gas.
- (8) First aid.

4. FIRE RESCUE AND FIRE SQUADS - a. Companies or similar units will provide fire protection and fire squads.

(2) Fire Squad consisting of three men, one, should be equipped with a suitable fire pump unit, two buckets, two fire extinguishers.

b. The function of all units should be given instructions to the nature of fire protection and fire squads. This will include the use of alarm pumps, pump area and fire extinguishers.
