SUBJECT : Italian Radio Requirements.

1. In planning for communication facilities at Rome when the Italian Government and this Mission (or the Allied Commission) shall have been established in Rome, it seems prudent to assume that the enemy will have demolished the main radio transmitting stations of the Italian Navy and of Italia Radio near Rome. The latter company before the war operated high-power, efficient commercial circuits with Pacific Corporation of America and Mackay Radio and Telegraph Company in the United States. Italia Radio has been merged with Italcom in an enterprise similar to Cable and Wireless.

2. While it is true that the Italian Government, the Armistice Commission and Allied Military Forces will have the use of the Italcom facilities to the U.S.A. and U.K. and to other points reached by the Italian cables directly and through joint cable routes, it is believed that the heavy communication requirements for international service at Rome will require the early replacement of the Italia Radio facilities, assuming their destruction.

3. In order to provide replacement transmitters at the earliest time possible it is recommended that each of the U.S. and U.K. Agencies with which Italia Radio maintained circuits before the war, i.e., Radio Corporation of America, Mackay Radio and Telegraph Company and Cables and Wireless Ltd., be requested by the Combined Chiefs of Staff to ship to Italy forthwith for subsequent transfer to Italia Radio one complete radio telegraph transmitter of not less than 20 kw antenna output. In order that these transmitters may be made available as quickly as possible, they should be supplied, if need be, from the spare facilities of the companies in question, since there will not be time to manufacture new transmitters.

4. The transfer of these transmitters to Italia Radio could be financed by one or more of the following methods:

- a. Out of traffic balances according to Italia Radio from the operation of the circuits in question, over a five to ten year period.
- b. Out of traffic balances accruing to Italcom in the handling of U.S. and U.K. cable traffic over a similar period.
- c. Out of the war insurance funds of the Italian Government to be advanced against, if necessary, by U.N.R.R.A.
- d. Through lend-lease, repayment to be made under a, b., or both.

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While it is true that the Italian Government, the Armistice Commission and Allied Military Forces will have the use of the Italo-American facilities to the U.S.A. and U.K. and to other points reached by the Italian cables directly and through joint cable routes, it is believed that the heavy communication requirements for international service at Rome will require the early replacement of the Italo Radio facilities, assuming their destruction.

3. In order to provide replacement transmitters at the earliest time possible it is recommended that each of the U.S. and U.K. Agencies which Italo Radio maintained circuits before the war, i.e., Radio Corporation of America, Mackay Radio and Telegraph Company and Cables and Wires Ltd., be requested by the Combined Chiefs of Staff to ship to Italy forthwith for subsequent transfer to Italo Radio one complete radio telegraph transmitter or not less than 20 kw antenna output. In order that these transmitters may be made available as quickly as possible, they should be supplied, if need be, from the spare facilities of the companies in question, since there will not be time to manufacture new transmitters.

4. The transfer of these transmitters to Italo Radio could be financed by one or more of the following methods:

- Out of traffic balances accruing to Italo Radio from the operation of the circuits in question, over a five to ten year period.
- Out of traffic balances accruing to Italo Radio in the handling of U.S. and U.K. cable traffic over a similar period.
- Out of the War Insurance Funds of the Italian Government to be advanced against, if necessary, by A.W.T.A.
- Through lend-lease, repayment to be made under a, b, or both.

5. Since the merged Italo Radio and Italo-American Company should receive substantial revenues from the employment of its facilities by allied military and civil agencies and the press, there seems XIX no reason for considering the supplying of such equipment on other than a paid or self financed basis. The sales prices could be established on a basis of not book cost plus a fixed percentage profit, not to exceed say 15%.

6. Consideration may also be given to requesting American Telephone and Telegraph Company similarly to furnish a radio telephone transmitter complete with secrecy equipment, to replace the former radio-telephone circuit between Rome and the U.S.

7. It is assumed that consideration will also be given by the appropriate agency of A.W.T.A. to the furnishing of at least one high-power broadcast transmitter for Rome to replace existing broadcasting facilities, assuming their destruction.

1. Our message NAF 434 of 2 October 1943 made certain proposals with reference to AMPA. The CCS replied by message 351, 19 October 1943, copy of which is attached.
2. Now that the Finance Sub-Commission of the Allied Commission is on the verge of moving to Palermo the final decision is being requested of the CCS on certain points, relating to AMPA. As to the matters raised in the last paragraph of message 351 it is suggested that the information on which the answer can be based should be assembled in Palermo so that we can discuss it with you on our arrival.
3. You may have received from other sources a copy of Message No. 983 of 23 October 1943 from C.F.O., AMG, Sicily, but I am enclosing a copy for your information. When we arrive in Palermo we shall want to discuss with you the question of the control over and the accounting for funds advanced to the Italians, and the procedures set forth in this message, and shall wish to consider further the matter raised in paragraph 5. We shall ask Colonel Graftey Smith and Major McFadzean to participate in the discussions.

Memorandum

Subject: Questions likely to be put to AC by the Italian and which might be put to them in return.

1. If it intended that the currency requirements of the Italian Government will be met?

Answer: By the use of All Lire. In the Isolines press conference of June of 1951, M. Guido of Italy, is might be recalled, said the matter will be explored with the USIS.

2. Can what basis will currency be provided to the Italian Government?

Answer: In view of the limited supply and of the large demands on the AC for currency, it is necessary to retain it. Furthermore, in view of our natural concern over the problem of inflation and other matters, the AC must exercise some control over currency availability. Accordingly, for the immediate future the Italian Government must submit a statement of the amounts of currency needed and the purposes for which needed. Looking ahead, budgets of revenues and expenditures for, say, 6 months and a year should be prepared by the Italians for the information of the AC.

3. Presently the Isolines will argue for a modification of the exchange rate, so as to appreciate the lire.

Answer: This matter has been left before the COO for decision. For the information of the Italian officials concerned, however, our view (or "my own view") is that the answer is likely to be negative.

4. What policy does the AC intend to follow with reference to the Italian public debt?

Answer: (a) It is clear that the service on the debt must be maintained or reduced. CCS has been requested to authorize us to provide all lire to the Italian Government as needed for this purpose.

(b) The postal savings system should be maintained or re-established, and all lire can be made available as needed.

(c) The AC would like to be informed as to the following:

(i) What proposals do the Italians have to make in reference to the marketing of long-term bonds (\$,000 million lire bonds)?
(ii) What proposals do the Italians have to make for marketing or registration bonds in Italian-held Italy so as to control smuggling from Germany to Italy?
(iii) What proposals do the Italians have to new issues of government bonds?

5. What policy does the AC intend to follow with reference to financial institutions?

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(b) The postal savings system should be maintained or re-established, and all lire can be made available as needed.

(c) The AC would like to be informed as to the following:

(i) What proposals do the Italians have to make to the reference to the maturing 3-year bonds (1,000 million lire "bonciari") and the maturing 1 to 12 month Treasury notes ("ordinary bonds")?
 (p) What proposals do the Italians have to make for marking or registering bonds in allied-held Italy so as to control smuggling from Germany-held Italy?

(5) What proposals do the Italians have as to new issues of government bonds?

5. What policy does the AC intend to follow with regard to financial institutions?

Answer: We are prepared to support all measures to enable these institutions (bank, social insurance agencies, commercial insurance companies), to function normally, and will supply all lire as needed for this purpose.

6. What do the Italians propose to do about the State Monopolies and the State Lottery?

Answer: What supplies do the monopolies need? The AC would like to have an analysis of the rates and revenues of the monopolies, together with any proposals for increasing the revenues.

7. What program for increased tax revenue do the Italians have to propose?

8. What programs for overhauling and reducing expenditures do the Italians have to propose?

9. As to the general problem of inflation:
 (a) What is the current and prospective situation?
 (b) What is the program for control which the Italians are now enacting or which they propose to implement?

10. What are the views of the Italian Government as to wage readjustments, and what is considered to be the relation of any such policy to the problem of inflation control?
11. As to a series of problems relating to supply and price control information and views are desired from the Italian Government along the following lines:
- (a) Internal production:
- (1) Estimates of stocks on hand and forecast of production during the coming 6 months and 12 months. In particular what is the current wheat situation as to fall plantings and production forecast?
- (2) Materials needed for increasing production, such as seed, fertilizer, farm machinery, fuel, labor.
- (3) Price-control system of regulations being currently enforced, particularly with reference to basic commodities such as wheat, flour, pasta, olive oil, cheese, etc., for the purpose of encouraging production and discouraging and rationing scarce supply.
- (4) Current situation with reference to hoarding, rationing, nature and extent of the black market, nature and extent of subsidies.
- (5) Transport problem relating to internal production.
- (6) Estimates of principal imports, particularly as to foodstuffs, fuel, manufactured consumers goods, production goods such as machinery, etc.
- (d) Obtain a memorandum from the Italians on the present trend of legal and black market prices and what program should be adopted to control them.

Dear Brigadier,

Although we have never seen anything in writing, rumour has it that you are about to become responsible, inter alia, for the financial administration of Region 2 and the Regional Civil Affairs Officer has therefore directed me to send the attached copy of a brief report on the present position.

(2) Owing to the difficulties of communication, shortage of staff and lack of transport it has not been possible to pursue the same policy as in Italy and we have more or less had to plod along as circumstances and common sense dictated. I do however feel that some form of standardised procedure is necessary for the whole of Italy and it would be extremely useful if a meeting of Regional Finance Officers could be arranged in the near future. In the meantime I am endeavouring, with obvious limitations, to agree broad lines of policy with the Italian Minister of Finance who is extremely reasonable and capable. Discussions have always been conducted on a friendly basis and differences of opinion have been few, but I think there ought to be some more permanent form of liaison than the half day per week which is all that can at present be spared.

(3) Public Finance:

For several reasons it was soon necessary to deviate from the policy laid down in the various Financial Instructions. In the first place all Region 2 was occupied during the period when there were only two Finance Officers and it was therefore essential to make the fullest use of the available machinery. Secondly, a number of C.A.O.s showed a complete lack of responsibility in the manner in which they handled public funds and were obviously less capable of conducting financial affairs than the Italian officials. Thirdly, the recognition of the "badoglio "Government" made it seem essential that financial control should be exercised as far as possible at the centre and should be done in such a way that further centralisation or even a handover could be effected in the shortest manner possible. The following scheme was therefore brought into force:

(5) Public Finance.

For several reasons it has been necessary to deviate from the policy laid down in the various Financial Instructions. In the first place all Region 2 was occupied during the period when there were only two Finance Officers and it was therefore essential to make the fullest use of the available machinery. Secondly a number of C.A.O.s showed a complete lack of responsibility in the manner in which they handled public funds and were obviously less capable of conducting financial affairs than the Italian officials. Thirdly the recognition of the Dado-Glio Government made it seem essential that financial control should be exercised as far as possible at the centre and should be done in such a way that further centralisation or even a handover could be effected in the shortest time if possible. The following actions have therefore brought into force:-

- (a) Comunal expenditure: Comunes requiring advances for any purpose, including relief, apply to the Prefect who staffs the request and passes, reduces or refuses them. In the event of a request of part or in being granted a guarantee is drawn in favour of the Comune on a special account opened at the Banco d'Italia in the Provincial capital and called the "Comunal Advance Account". All charges are signed by the Prefect and his Chief Accountant and countersigned by the Provincial C.A.O. who has the right, if considered necessary, to alter the decision of the Prefect. All cases where the advice of the Prefect and his staff is not accepted must be reported to the Regional Finance Office.

/ (o).....

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(b) Provincial expenditure: Money required to meet the deficit on the budget of the Provincial Administration is drawn in block amounts from a special account opened at the Banca D'Italia and called the "Provincial Advance Account". Cheques on this account are signed and are subject to the control as laid down in paragraph (a) above while the actual disbursement of the money is effected through the normal channels.

(c) State expenditure: All State expenditure is paid directly or indirectly, by the Banca D'Italia which continues to keep the records maintained hitherto. Where State expenditure exceeds revenue the deficit is made good out of an account known as the "State Advance Account". Where authority for recurrent expenditure would normally emanate from the responsible authority now devolves upon the Intendente di Pisa who keeps records of all such transactions in duplicates so that one copy can be forwarded eventually to Rome.

(d) State Railways: These are being financed through the Cape Compartimento who runs an account with the various Provincial branches of the Banca D'Italia.

(e) Social Insurance and similar institutions: Financial agreements are negotiated by the Regional Finance Officer, the Banca D'Italia and the senior officer of the institution concerned.

In order to offset an excess in currency all accounts opened in accordance with the above provisions will have cumulative credits which will not be cleared by the Allied Military Government. Ceteris paribus a part of any additional cash put into circulation returns to the banking system by way of deposits. The main outlet for such cash would be investment in Treasury Bills and other Government Issues but since an occupying power is not in a position to absorb money in this way it is a reasonable alternative to finance state deficits by over drafts at the Central Bank and thereby make Lire 100,000,000 of physical cash cover expenditure of something like Lire 1,000,000,000.

To provide the Banks with the necessary cash the form supplied by ANFA is being divided among the provincial branches of the Banca D'Italia according to their probable requirements. At each Provincial capital there will be two accounts. No. 1 account will be operated by the C.A.O. of the Province and will be used to meet all Provincial Imperial expenditure in respect of Intendente etc., and No. 2 account will be under the control of the Regional Finance Officer. In practice No. 2 account will only be operated over when it is necessary to finance any small distribution of cash within the Region. It is simply a means of keeping the Banks liquid throughout. The amount of the deposit may vary according to the size of the total for the Region will always be the same.

(e) Social Insurance and similar institutions. Financial agreements are negotiated by the Regional Finance Officer, the Banca d'Italia and the senior officer of the institution concerned.

In order to effect an economy in currency all accounts opened in accordance with the above provisions will have cumulative deficits which will not be cleared by the Allied Military Government. Ceteris paribus a part of any additional cash put into circulation returns to the banking system by way of deposit. The main outlet for such cash would be investment in Treasury bills and other Government Issues but since an occupying power is not in a position to absorb money in this way it is a reasonable alternative to finance a state deficit by overdrafts at the Central Bank and thereby make Lire 100,000,000 of physical cash cover expenditure of something like Lire 1,030,000,000.

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(4) Accounts:

An office has been set up and is preparing current accounts for the early stages of the occupation to meet shortage of transport. Future accounts will only show the Imperial expenditure of the C.A.O.s while a separate return will be rendered to the Chief Finance Officer showing the state of the bank account's opened according to the provisions of paragraph (3) above.

(5) Banks:

All banks in Region 2 have been opened on the basis of the letter attached as Annexure 1. They were opened at different dates in the various districts according to the circumstances prevailing, particularly the supply of cash, but at no time have restrictions been placed on the amounts which can be withdrawn from accounts.

The Banca d'Italia is operating as the banker's bank in all Provincial capitals and holds any cash surpluses and supplies any funds that are necessary for the operation of the commercial banks.

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(6) AMPA:

In this financial set-up there appears to be no need for a branch of AMPA. Vague rumours have been heard that the British and American Governments regard the Banca D'Italia with some disfavour but in the absence of specific instructions to the contrary it is being used in a somewhat extended form as the Central Bank and is performing the role played by AMPA in Sicily.

(7) State Debt:

The opening of the banks was not followed by a "run" but in the future, both in Region 2 and, a fortiori, in areas such as Naples and Rome, the problem of the status of the national debt may lead to some difficulty. From the practical standpoint the case for accepting the servicing of the debt obligations of the Italian Government is overwhelming as it will prevent the banking and insurance system from becoming virtually insolvent with all its attendant evils. The argument often advanced that the payment will increase the burden on the British and American taxpayers is only true insofar as the relatively small cost of the paper, printing and transport of the necessary bank notes is concerned. I am not aware of what, if any, backing has been given the various occupation currencies but at most it can only be an earmarking of securities which cannot in any sense represent a burden. The Italian Government will eventually accept responsibility for the currency issued and in these circumstances there is a strong argument in favour of any financial solution which is clearly in accordance with the interests of both the occupying and occupied country. The suggestion that we do permit the servicing of the debt is merely a particular application of the general thesis that, even where we have a clear right to do so, the status quo should not be upset unless we have something solid to gain by it. In this particular instance we only stand to lose. It should also be noted that in the four provinces being administered by the King the debt is being serviced.

(8) Post Offices:

Instructions have been issued to open the Post Offices, where physical circumstances permit, for normal deposit business and for effecting the payment of various personnel as hitherto. The Banca D'Italia will hold any surplus cash and make good any deficiencies.

(9) Liaison with Minister of Finance of Badoglio "Government"

The Regional Finance Officer has had a number of meetings with the Minister of Finance to discuss problems of mutual interest. As far as possible a common financial policy is being pursued in the two areas.

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Instructions have been issued to open the Post Offices, where physical circumstances permit, for normal deposit business and for effecting the payment of various personnel as hitherto. The Banco Central will hold any surplus cash and make good any deficiencies.

(9) Liaison with Minister of Finance of Federative "Government".

The Regional Finance Officer has had a number of meetings with the Minister of Finance to discuss problems of mutual interest. As far as possible a common financial policy is being pursued in the two areas.

Speaking with authority of BADOGLIO JUNG made earnest appeal to CACCIA this evening for consideration between Italian and Allied Governments of such questions as following before it was too late. (1) Fixing of price of wheat for all ITALY. Time for Autumn sowing is at hand and in our mutual interest it is urgent that maximum areas should be sowed for wheat. (2) Inflation. Connected with this is question of exchange rate about which Italian Government have had no answer.

He made it clear that his present approach was not to ask for favours. It was to try to evolve a coordinated governmental plan in advance. That would admittedly be in Italian interest but it would also serve Allied War effort, if what Allies required was order in their back areas. In any event he would like to know whether it was the intention of the American and British Governments to discuss these matters with ~~the~~ Italian Government. Even a negative answer would be better than the present state of uncertainty.

We regret very much that MORGENTHAU could not have seen JUNG whose statement emphasises and amplifies our previous recommendations. It is now evident that man required should be someone qualified to speak for both treasuries. In short what Italian Government wants is a man who can say yes or no to questions of high policy.

1. Brigadier Hamlyn explained that he had sought the meeting class in order to obtain the benefit of DSS documents on a draftable sailing with procedure in handling exports from Italy, and asked because he wanted to root the full staff be passed one copy of the draftable to the Combined Chief of Staff, which had been tentatively approved by staff officers at DSS.

2. Brigadier Hamlyn [copy attached] followed. 2. Disposition of the cable (copy attached) followed. The principal source of substance resulting from the discussions was the elimination of the phrase indicating that purchases prior to Italy or Italy or report would be on some other plus basis. Who would bear the loss in this instance? It was not considered necessary to discuss in detail except to agree that it would be reflected in the first instance in a discrepancy between the price paid for goods for export and foreign exchange received from sale of exports. Of course if the foreign exchange is not carried in Italy's books, any such loss would not be directly visible. The USA official pointed out that this pricing problem would not once arise due to conflicts of interest. For example, North Africa can afford to pay the U.S. price for sulphur, since it is only a small element in cost of manufacture of products in which it is used (such as wine). Such persons (like NAM) interested in price control in North Africa are eager to keep the price of imports down, while, of course, officials in Italy (whether Italian or Allied) are interested in having exports pay their way.
- (c) Considerable discussion developed over the question of the cable settings. First, the paying into blocked accounts the foreign currencies paid for Italian imports. It was realized by everyone present that it could not be carried just how much foreign exchange resources would be utilized. But one USA official pointed out that the existence of such resources might throw some light on the question of what crops delivered by French forces to the mines in Sardinia are to be paid for.
- (d) The USA officials raised the question, arising out of the above, of how French North African exports to Sicily were to be paid for. Colonel Butterworth replied that so far the USA was buying the goods in North Africa and the AGI then drew them from the Army and handled the question of possible payment to the French, etc.

4. Brigadier Hamlyn then asked a few questions about the functions and organization of NAEU. Mr. Royce outlined them, explaining that the primary of NAEU has been to "screen" French North African requests for civilian supplies in order to scale them down to necessities. It arranges the necessary payment, although since North Africa has ample dollars and sterling balances that is not a difficult problem. The NAEU itself handles no funds.

The Brigadier then asked tentatively what sort of agricultural and other technical advisory activities had been carried out in North Africa by the NAEU. Mr. Royce was at once interested, apparently enlisting a possible entry for his civilians into the Italian areas. He said he thought the NAEU had been able to do a good deal of advising particularly in agriculture in North Africa which had increased output. Now, he explained, civilians had been made ready here and in London and Washington for entry into Italy after the Army gets ready to admit them, but he complained that by then much valuable time would have been lost. Colonel Butterworth agreed to have his staff discuss some supply problems and procedures with NAEU officials, and indicated that Lt. Col. Vivian Smith would be brought in on the financial side.

On 21 October Mr. Herbert informed Brigadier Hamlyn by phone that the NAEU has appointed a committee consisting of Messrs. Stein and Dolphin to consider such matters as were raised at the above meeting. Brigadier Hamlyn expressed interest and said Lt. Cdr. Southard would soon be available at N.A.U., A.P.M.Q., should discussions arise of matters likely to be of interest to the Financial Division of the A.C. Mr. Herbert expressed the hope that he might be included in such discussions.

The political situation seems to be clearing up with no evident opposition on the part of the ITALIANS to things that we direct them to do. The only matters on which they seem to be some-what sensitive are those involving their Governmental status and such things as internal prestige and exchange rates. I believe that our position in all these matters will be easily accepted and I think that the long term armistice will be signed about the middle of next week.

I have a report this morning that some additional trouble has developed in the FRENCH National Committee, but reports on that matter will be largely rendered by Mr. MACMILLAN and Mr. MURPHY and possibly by General SMITH. I personally have little concern as to how the Committee organizes and operates so long as General GIRAUD retains a sufficiently strong position in the FRENCH Military World to control effectively FRENCH forces in the MEDITERRANEAN and to continue to operate his forces under my general direction.



785015THE PROBLEM OF PUBLIC FINANCES, PRICES, AND INFLATION CONTROL IN ITALY1. Elements of the problem

It is apparent, on the basis both of our experience in Sicily and on the foregoing, we have received from Italy, that the condition of the Italian public finances and the general price situation in Italy present a serious problem to the Military Government and the Allied Commission. The usefulness of Italy as a base for continued military operations would be greatly prejudiced should the financial situation materially deteriorate.

Briefly, the situation is this:

(a) Public expenditures in Italy are high and will continue to be high. The Italian Government may be able to reduce certain military expenditures; but the necessity of continuing military operations together with the costs during a period of readjustment of industry and agriculture are likely to hold total public expenditure at a high level.

(b) The public revenue system of Italy is badly disturbed. Tax collections are likely to be below normal and the capacity of the Government to borrow was already exceedingly low before the invasion took place. The Government, in order to pay its current expenses, was increasingly dependent on borrowings from the Central Bank, which, by July 1942, were resulting in increases in currency issues of from 8 to 10 billion lire per month.

(c) Allied operations in Italy are now, and are likely to continue, at a level which gives rise to heavy cash expenditures in the area of occupation. This is an additional factor of an economy short.

(d) Savings channels are also unlikely to be operating in a normal manner. Insurance, Postal Savings, and bank deposits may be slow to resume their former rates of increase. This means that a larger-than-normal part of the national income will be available for direct civilian expenditure on consumer goods and services, and hence will further stimulate price increases.

(e) Commodity inflationary factor is likely to be the dominant factor in aggregate wage payments due to the unemployment resulting from industrial dislocation. This factor will be partially offset by relief payments which will to an extent replace wages in the economic structure.

(f) The principal deflationary factor is likely to be the decrease in aggregate wage payments due to the unemployment resulting from industrial dislocation. This factor will be partially offset by relief payments which will to an extent replace wages in the economic structure.

- (c) Allied operations in Italy are now, and are likely to continue, at a level which causes rises to military expenditure in the area of occupation. This is an additional factor of inflationary power.
- (d) Current channels are also unlikely to be operating to a normal manner. Insurance, postal services, and such departments may be slow to resume their former rates of increase. This means that, initially, the industrial part of the national income will be available for direct civilian expenditure on consumer goods and services, and hence will further stimulate price increases.

- (e) Commercially, undoubtedly continue to be acutely scarce, which will play into the hands of commodity speculators and black-market operators. This will accentuate the inflationary effects of the above situations. However, some amelioration will be provided by the cessation of the drains of goods to Germany, and possibly also by the decreased Italian military requirements.
- (f) The principal deflationary factor is likely to be the decrease in aggregate wage payments due to the unemployment resulting from industrial dislocation. This factor will be partially offset by relief payments which will to an extent replace wages in the income stream.

This monetization, as distinct and only to call attention to various phases of the whole problem, with special emphasis on the financial side. And in Society have confronted the problem with a local control program which takes into account, if not all, of the aspects.

2. As a practical problem, the situation may be presented as twofold:

- (a) Income must as far as possible be diverted from expenditure on consumer goods and services and directed towards increased savings and tax payments.
- (b) Supplies of goods and services must be increased as far as possible, and their distribution must be forced so as to keep black-market operations at a minimum.

3. Problems involved in attempting to divert income from expenditure on consumer goods and services.

- (a) It will be essential to examine and reconstitute the public revenues. To some extent this will be effected by putting in motion the existing tax

action machinery and enforcing the existing tax laws. To some extent it may also involve the tapping of new tax sources. The major elements include the following:

- (1) Collection of existing taxes. There is a natural tendency, in a time of great confusion, for so routine and unpleasant a matter as tax collection and payment to be allowed to lag. One clear element in the problem of inflation control is to see to it that the existing taxes are enforced and that collection is prompt and complete.
- (2) Existing tax rates may be too low and will need to be revised. Entirely new taxes may also be desirable. This problem calls for competent and rigorous study and prompt recommendation.
- (3) The monopolies of the State are not now operating in Sicily and may be inoperative elsewhere in the occupied territory. Insofar as the Military Government considers the monopolies as a desirable element in the revenue structure, they should be overhauled and put in operation. In Sicily this concerns only tobacco and matches, and the job is under way. On the mainland much is also involved.
- (4) The lottery is an element in the revenue system which requires study to determine whether the Military Government wishes to see it reopened. It will probably be found to be inoperative throughout the occupied territory.
- (b) The Italian Government, prior to its surrender, was borrowing increasingly unable to borrow money. Normally, the Southern Province and Communes operate at a deficit which is covered by the National Treasury. The National Government itself has, of course, had huge deficits since it declared war. Borrowing is the only way in which such deficits can be financed without materially contributing to inflation, since the alternative is resort to currency issue -- directly or via the Central Bank. One relatively simple step by which public borrowing can be restored is to reopen the Post-Saving System -- a step which is being reviewed in Sicily. We must consider what further steps the Italian Authorities can take to revive the flow of funds into the public treasuries, whether through public loans, loans from industry, or forced savings.
- (c) Private savings channels can be reopened with less difficulty. The AMG in Sicily has already laid the groundwork for removal of restrictions from the banks. In some parts of South Italy banks are being reopened immediately. In re-establishing the Social Insurance system, every effort must be made to maintain the level of contributions so as to reduce the need of deficit financing. Other forms of insurance institutions, including the State-owned life-insurance institute, need to be examined to determine how soon and to what extent they can

We here come to the phase of inflation control which is not purely financial or monetary, but is related to the whole problem of production and, to some extent, of exports and imports. The following paragraphs attempt no more than to outline the more conspicuous elements in the problem, which, no doubt, have occurred to the appropriate Sub-Commission.

(a) The heart of the Italian supply problem is to be found in the ~~agricultural~~
agricultural and ~~industrial~~
~~and industrial~~ production. This does
not be overemphasized. The guiding principle is that Italy can (and normally
does) go a long way towards feeding and supplying itself, and every effort must
be made to restore this situation with the least possible delay. In determining
the allocation of goods and shipping space for Italian civilian supply, emphasis
should be placed on those imports which will contribute most effectively to in-
crease Italian production. It is assumed that there will be no significant export
from Italy of products essential to the Italian supply situation.

- (b) The black-market needs continually to be studied in order to determine
its main source of supply. Its orientation, and the most probable factors (whether
actual or imagined) within its territory, especially withholding, improper price
control methods, or what not) giving rise to it. It is also ~~also~~ ~~especially important~~
important to get some idea of the actual extent of the black market in various commodities.
E.G., if 75 per cent of wheat supply is being handled through the black market,
something is radically wrong and the problem is obviously acute; if only 5 per cent
is being handled, the problem may very likely be safely ignored if other problems
are more pressing.
- (c) The factoring system needs constantly to be reviewed, in order to determine
what relation it bears to living nodes and whether it is as liberal as
possible supplies permit. Increases in ratios deprive the black market of
customers.
- (d) The legal price system also needs continuous study in order to ensure its
being as realistic as possible. Whatever formulae are used in fixing or otherwise
regulating prices, the regulations cannot be enforced if they bear to reasonable
relationship to the prevailing cost situation.
- (e) The enforcement of whatever retarding and price-control systems are
established calls for persistence and energy. Everyone associated with the
Military Government has a share in effective enforcement, although the police and
Customs, inspection of persons and seizure of supplies and imprisonment,
confiscation of stocks, and other forms of cutting off supplies from violators.

(o) The enforcement of winter rationing and price-control systems are established cells for persistency and energy. Everyone associated with the Military Government has a stake in effective enforcement, although the Police and Legal Divisions are most closely involved and responsible. Some of the important enforcement devices are: posting of price-lists, closing of shops of charlatanics, imposition of prompt and severe fines and imprisonment, confiscation of stocks, and other forms of cutting off supplies from violators.

(p) It has been the experience in Sicily and will certainly be that of AMG on the mainland that lack of transport aggravates the supply situation and is thus related to the problem of inflation control. Whatever can be done to provide transport to the civilian economy will contribute to easing the supply shortage and consequently will ease prices.

6. As a means of measuring the trend of prices and of the cost of living - and without which it will not be possible to see which way we are going - it will be necessary for the AMG, either in collaboration with the Italian Government or separately, to prepare price and/or cost of living indices. These indices must measure "refective" rather than official prices. Such a project has gotten slowly under way in Sicily but it needs to be pushed to completion.

We are preparing drafts of memoranda on the financial aspects of these problems. Other Sub-Commissions may wish to prepare memoranda on the aspects of the problem outlined in Section 4 above, with a view to subsequent joint consideration of the entire problem.

a. That owing, probably to a slip up at Brig. Rubine's suggestion we communicated directly with the French regarding the payment for the recent sulphur shipment, the letter had gone from us to the French before having been cleared by him with Washington. I offered to try and withdraw the letter from the French but he said that he was perfectly satisfied with the method suggested and anticipated receiving the concurrence of Washington within a day or two.

b. He was very anxious to have a round table conference on the payment for exports to North Africa. I replied that we also were extremely keen on producing a plan and that I 3087 in fact had given instructions for an overall plan including exports not only to North Africa but to the government's combined boards, etc. to be prepared and that this plan was to contain financial clauses as to the means of payment. I undertook that we would clear this matter at a conference with him before cabling the full plan to the Combined Chiefs of Staff.

1. During the initial period of operations the UNITED STATES and BRITISH TROOPS will use Allied Military Lire. If adequate supplies of Allied Military Lire are not available, the UNITED STATES TROOPS will use Yellow Seal Dollars and regular US coins and the BRITISH MILITARY FORCES will use British Military Authority Notes and British Coins, as well as local currency in their possession. Yellow Seal Dollars and HM notes are available in HONGKONG and additional shipments can be procured when desired from the UNITED STATES TREASURY and the BRITISH TREASURY. Records shall be kept of the amount of currencies used by the UNITED STATES and BRITISH FORCES.

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2. Owing to lack of Allied Military Lire, Yellow Seal Dollars and HM notes have to be used, their use for Army payments to troops and for local procurement will cease and Allied Military Lire will be used in their place as soon as available, unless the MILITARY GOVERNMENT decides that the time is not propitious for such change. The UNITED STATES TREASURY is producing supply of AM Lire currency for shipment to any point desired. Requisitions by the MILITARY GOVERNMENT for this AM Lire Currency will be met as quickly as possible. Records shall be kept of the amount of AM Lire issued.

3. Allied Military Lire currency is not intended to replace local lire currency already in circulation, but it is designed to supplement it.

4. The rate of exchange between the United States dollar and the British Military Authority note shall be 6 dollars to 1 pound and both currencies shall be made interchangeable at that ratio. The United States Treasury will make the necessary arrangements with the British Treasury.

5. The United States Yellow seal currency and the British Military Authority notes shall be withdrawn from circulation as soon as it can be satisfactorily accomplished. The date for this withdrawal shall be determined by the Military Government after the operations have begun.

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Dollars and Lira notes have to be used, their use for Army payments to troops and for local procurement will cease and Allied Military Lira will be used in their place as soon as available, unless the Military Government decides that the time is not propitious for such change. The UNITED STATES Treasury is producing a continuing supply of All Lira Currency for shipment to any point desired. Requisitions by the Military Government for this All Lira Currency will be met as quickly as possible. Records shall be kept of the amount of All Lira issued.

b. Allied Military Lira currency is not intended to replace local Lira currency already in circulation, but $\frac{1}{4}$ is designed to supplement it.

c. The rate of exchange between the United States dollar and the British Military Authority note shall be 4 dollars to 1 pound and both currencies shall be made interchangeable at that rate. The United States Treasury will make the necessary arrangements with the British Treasury.

d. The United States yellow seal currency and the British Military Authority notes shall be withdrawn from circulation as soon as it can be satisfactorily accomplished. The date for this withdrawal shall be determined by the Military Government after the operations have begun.

e. The rate of exchange to be decreed on D-day shall be 100 Lira to the dollar and 400 Lira to the pound sterling. A proclamation shall be issued requiring all persons to accept the United States yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes at the decreed rates. Transactions at any other rate shall be prohibited. Holders of local and Allied Military Lira notes or deposits are not entitled to obtain dollar or pound notes without special permission. They shall obtain dollars or pound notes or any other foreign currency or foreign exchange credits only in accordance with exchange regulations issued by the Military Government.

f. All foreign financial and foreign trade transactions and all exports and imports of currency shall be prohibited except as permitted under regulations to be issued by the Military Government.

g. Under the Military Government there shall be established within the area an Allied Military financial agency. It may establish sub-agencies where deemed desirable.

In so far as its operations relate to the provision of currencies for the pay and other cash requirements of Military formations of either Army, it shall draw the necessary resources from the Military Government currency reserve and will record the debt against the Army concerned in the currency of issue. It is authorised to accept deposits from finance officers and from military personnel of the Allied Armies. In so far as its operations relate to civil administration, it shall draw on the currency reserves and debit against the Military Government.

If found practicable, and desirable the Bank of Italy and/or ^{the}
Bank of Naples under the direct control of the Military Governor will be
designated as agent for the Allied Military financial agency. The Military
 Governor and other allied military authorities, when satisfied that
the Bank of Italy and/or Bank of Naples is under adequate control,
may use that bank for official business, and by making credits available

The Military Government will control and direct all receipts and disbursements for civil administrative purposes, whether by United States or British civil officials, and through the Allied Military Financial Agency, will provide all funds of monetary and revenue to all personnel and sub-recipients. Thus All Civil Affairs officers will draw funds only from the Allied Military Financial Agency.

The records of the Allied Military financial agency shall indicate in all cases in what currency receipts were obtained or disbursed immediately.

9. Upon taking over an area, the military authorities shall proceed immediately to:

(a) Close all banks and financial institutions and place them under military control.

(b) Require a general muster.

(c) Demand or seek for future disposal the funds of enemy government agencies, including government banks.

(d) Seal all vaults and safety deposit boxes.

(e) Obtain an inventory of the assets of the bank as quickly as practicable.

10. Holding of gold, foreign currencies and foreign securities, all additional funds and the funds of present political organisations shall be taken into custody as promptly as possible, and shall be deposited in the United Military financial agency or in such depository as the Military Government may designate.

11. Banks should be encouraged to resume their business under the military government if and when it does not affect their shareholders or the economy of the area concerned. No governmental or private bank or agency shall be authorized to loan bank notes or like currency except to finance war expenses under the military government, and when it does not affect their shareholders or the economy of the area concerned.

12. Against securities received,

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13. Before banks are repaid, it should be made possible for them to arrange loans from banks or agencies designated by the Military Government. The lending bank may require as collateral any or all of the assets of the borrowing bank or of the directors thereof, and may accept, as collateral, obligations of the National Government or of its subdivisions.

14. Except where special permission is granted, local banks shall be permitted only lira accounts, but may accept, at the decreed rate of exchange, yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes which they shall turn in as directed in exchange for local or Allied Military Lira at the same decreed rate of exchange.

15. The Military Government shall have authority to maintain the existing tax laws and to raise such contributions for the administration of the country as are consistent with international custom and usage. All national tax receipts shall be deposited in the Allied Military financial agency or in banks designated by the Military Government.

16. All branches of the National Insurance Institute shall be placed under military control and its revenues made available to the Military Government.

17. The railways, postal, telegraph and telephone services, radio and all government monopolies shall be placed under military control and their revenues made available to the Military Government.

18. None of the tax or other revenues shall be used for the payment of principal or interest on national government obligations.

"The Directive of the Combined Chiefs of Staff laid down that the
dissemination of this kind was to be beneficial, and that the
Allied troops had some as liberators. From this it would be
difficult, even if it were practicable, to suggest that no social
contacts should exist between A.M.C.U. Officers and the local population.
Indeed, I do not think that such a measure would be either reasonable
or desirable, inasmuch as the Administration is to be, as far as
possible, indirect, and liaison and propaganda and competent
are to be used in conducting the administration, under the general
guidance of the C.O.A.D.U. It is therefore necessary that they shall
have contacts with the local population, enable them to judge the quality of Italians
who they suspect and their possible influence in the administration.

I am, however, of the opinion that contacts of a purely social nature
are neither becoming nor desirable. I should be particularly appre-
hensive of military culture arising from the entertainment of army officers
by Italians and, as you know, I have warned all Officers of the dangers
of this in the course which we held at Cirea. "In any event, social
activities such as appear to be suggested exist and are inappropriate
in time of war in occupied territory."

In general conclusion I think usual contacts with Italians should
be left to those persons and occasions from which a useful result may
be expected from the point of view of the administration, and that

2. Reference his point 2, this draft of cable by Brig. HANLEY has not gone forward. Col. HANLEY wishes to submit it in a complete study embracing the machinery of the supply notes as well.

In reference his point 6, this should now be taken to mean that the full figure of the required establishment can be made up by this arrangement. As much will be done in this direction as is possible.

Reference to the report under "Cross Point re N.Z.", there exists no difficulty in attaching personnel on the W.T. or otherwise to that of another "number instruction", without resorting to "cross posting" within a command which is also practicable.

3. Reference cable from this R.Q. No. 5165 dated 17th Sept., Capt. H. H. HAY left this morning for ORNAGLIE via STOCCOLMA with L.R. 23, R.R.C. 200. His purpose is enclosed herewith. The reason for this broken account is that Report, HOLMES decided later to "cross post" 200,000 for his personal use. His receipt will be obtained on his return to this R.Q.

4. Request in above mentioned cable is confirmed that you should ship by air to Britain 300,000 L.R. 60,000 (F.I.T.W. allotted) in varying denominations. While it is necessary that notes should be available to parties leaving here in amounts not less than £1. L.R. £10, it is probable carriage and shipping space will always be a factor of difficulty. On no consideration therefore the request in the cable should be interpreted to mean £10s of the amount sent in £.V. L.R. notes up to £10 and £5 in £1,000 notes.

5. Reference his point 1. Col. HANLEY's recommendations should be complied with.

My Dear Brigadier;

For what it is worth, I am enclosing copy of a letter addressed to the C. in C., by one Haldane. I have sent a copy to Region 2 in case Giennade is still to be found in Calabria. You might run across him in Rome.

We can still get no decision about splitting AMGOT Headquarters from Region 1. At the time of writing, the G.C.A.O., D.G.C.A.O., C.G.O., G.I.O., and D.P.H., are all absent on work connected with regions other than Sicily. You may have heard that I am sending [unintelligible] air with L. 100 million to Brindisi in response to an urgent appeal from Masso Mariano to Macmillan. I do not understand the reasons for using such an extraordinary channel of communication, but it points to an evident and unavoidable lack of contact between the two ends of Region 2. They are beginning to ask for more P.O.'s and some accountants; and I should like to know whether you efforts to send some financial staff here for training "in situ" met with any success. Spofford is not back yet, and we remain in a general ignorance of the staff position in particular and long range planning in general.

The opening of the banks in the provinces has gone quite well, unaccompanied by any rush, but not many new deposits have yet been received. When the mainland positions become rather more clearly defined, we will lift all limitations. A scuttlery advance of 20 miles by a German panzer division would bring the public to the guichets.

AMPA/Accounting seems to progress smoothly and I trust that particular bobby is laid. If and when we trisect our existing staff some accountancy breakdowns will be inevitable.

During the issue of complete instructions on accounting for goods and supplies arranged between the British Army and Africa, simple records will be maintained by all British Regiments, formations and units which may issue or receive stores, stores, supplies and services. The records should not include needs and services provided by the British Army for the personnel of ANFOR, except food, medical, hospital, transport, welfare, etc. It is stores and services so provided for which account in turn issued to the local authorities and population, e.g., Army Biscuits provided for sale to the civil population, and works services for the civilian population or local authorities arranged by the Army on behalf of ANFOR, which are to be accounted at this stage.
2. Receipts must be accounted for all such issues of stores, supplies and services to ANFOR. Similarly, receipts will be given to ANFOR for all goods and services supplied by the British Army from that organisation.
3. The records will be forwarded on the first day of each month to the Financial Officer (British), A.F.M.Q. The first record will be rendered on 1st October, 1945, and will contain all relevant transactions up to that date, whenever possible,oucher numbers will be quoted on the records, or in entire, partial copy of the records will be forwarded therewith, but care must be taken not under reading one copy of such vouchers.
4. Reports and other accounting units will render fit records when applicable.
5. ANFOR will indicate on their demands whether or not the goods and services are for the civilian population or local authorities.
