7. BLACK MARKET - PLANS TO REDUCE IT.

Lt. Col. Snook attended at 11.00 hours to explain the plans to reduce the Black Market. He specially asked Supply Officers to give the police information on which to act, such as amounts of grain allowed to be held by different classes of people, etc. The Chairman stated that the date on C.O. No. 5 for declaration of stocks had now been fixed as 15.10.43. Col. Zellers thanked Lt. Col. Snook.

6. REPORTS ON FOOD SITUATION.

The Chairman referred to Supply information. HQ must know in particular (a) what the provinces have got and (b) what the provinces want, otherwise nothing can be done to help them.

5. NEW RATIONING SCHEME NOV. 43 - FEB 44.

Major Nolen explained the new Rationing Scheme, Nov. 43 to February 44. It was necessary for HQ to know how many producers' and how many consumers' cards were required; a reasonably accurate estimate; more cards will be available on 15 Oct. S.O's should not over-indent.

Cards are to be distributed by Nov. 1. No special allowances for heavy workers, expectant mothers, etc.; a flat rate of ration is issued for everyone.

Agrigento brought up the question of current contracts for Electricity. The Chairman pointed out that the Electric Company may have to increase their charges for electric current if the price of coal or oil makes this necessary.

The Chairman referred to the lack of uniformity in the terms used for Solid Fuel. The types are:

- (1) Steam Coal. (mineral coal, used also for anthracite).
- (2) Lignite (Calabria, Sardinia).
- (3) Vegetable Coal (Charcoal - household uses).

It is extremely doubtful if anthracite can be imported, and steam coal must be used in lieu. In addition to the above, there is the item "Coke".

Major Nolan dealt with General Order No. 4. There was a slight mistake in Article 2 of the original, and the NEW ORDER No. 4 is the same except for the correction of this mistake. He explained that every merchant must hand in a Price Schedule. These need not be checked in detail, but they should be retained by S.O.'s for checking prices as and when required. The prices on the Schedule to be mainly those in effect on 9th July.

The Chairman pointed out that published prices must not exceed the maxima laid down by HQ AGOF.

The Chairman asked Catania why meat prices had been fixed there above the maxima. Catania said they had not received Order No. 4. The Chairman explained that there must be no difference in prices between two adjacent provinces, of more than, say, 10%. This is to stop goods going over the border unnecessarily. Any transfers between provinces should be arranged by agreement of the SCAO's concerned.

- (2) Purchaser may then draw the supplies from the AMGOT Warehouse on production of the original of the Issue Voucher and the Bank Deposit Receipt.
- (3) Where the purchaser cannot in the first place be named, S.O's will prepare an Issue Voucher in respect of each sale and it will be the responsibility of SCAG's to see that payment is made by the purchaser promptly.
- (4) At the end of the month, SCAG's will submit in duplicate to E.S.D., (a) List of Sales (supported by 2 signed copies of the Issue Voucher) and (b) List of Stocks on hand.

(All the above do not apply to Region No. I).

Hospitals may have eggs and meat. With reference to dried and tinned fish, the general principle is to keep them on the Island, and not export.

Colonel Zellers said he could not make a promise, but the CSO is trying to ensure a fair distribution of transport throughout the provinces.

Agricultural Control - The Chairman read his proposals dated 19/9/43 and gave the broad outline of the new scheme.

SECRETREGION 4Copy 18^aCIVILIAN REQUIREMENTS (Supply).1. General.

The annexed appendices 'A' to 'G' inclusive contain the estimated minimum requirements of Region 4. Quantities listed in Appendices A, B, C, D and E are based on the schedules contained in Sect. XVII Paper 5. Quantities listed in Appendices F and G are based on estimates of urgent requirements for an initial reeducation of Agriculture and Public Works, that will, by increased local production and distribution, return their weight many times within the first post armistice year.

2. Food. (Appendix A).3. Clothing. (Appendix B).

It is considered that the Region can be temporarily self-supporting in clothes and shoes except in Rome and such industrial towns as Segni. The small quantity of clothing and shoes listed was arrived at by assuming that the drill in any community for obtaining clothing and shoes would be a well organized collection of these articles from the rich and well to do, and by requisitioning them if appeals for voluntary donations failed to produce the required quantity.

4. Medical Supplies. (Appendix C).

Statistical data and information from sources showing disease prevalences and medical needs together with recent experience in other areas and data concerning population distribution, local resources, etc., have been considered in arriving at the listed basic medical needs.

5. Petroleum Products. (Appendix D).

Certain special and heavy oils are not included in the first 60 day period requirements in the overall schedule. These are key products. For example: in electrical installations if the transformers were sabotaged by having the oil drained off the operation of the plant would be completely held up until the proper oil was obtained. Therefore a proportion of all the lubricants listed in the schedule is included in the requirements of the first 60 day period.

(A) Insecticides and Fungicides.

The provision of these is of extreme importance. The stock and crops of the region is subject to severe attack by many and varied pests. All destruction of these pests will save stock and improve morale.

(i) Animals.

If the insecticides are not provided animals will be sickly (if not dead), and draught power, meat and milk production, and breeding will suffer immediately. Loss of draught power on the farms would be especially disastrous.

(ii) Plants.

Vines and tree crops are completely dependent on plant protection measures. Summer and winter vegetables also need protection.

Vines, trees and crops, if untreated, may be an absolute failure. The major proportion of the years supply of pest destroyers is essential during winter and early spring.

B. Artificial Fertilizers.

5185
In the past year in Italy, fertilizers, especially phosphates, have been lacking, with resultant drop in crop production. If the ensuing crop is to be prevented from becoming even less productive and the need for greater imports of foodstuffs avoided, fertilizers must be supplied and applied at the proper time.

For cereals, nitrogen is especially valuable. A ton of sulphate of ammonia might save 3 tons of imported cereals. Root crops need phosphate; for sugar beet and potatoes the use of superphosphates would produce increased crops equal in energy value to three times as much cereals.

The listed quantity of various fertilizers is designed to permit efficient crop rotation.

C. Seed Potatoes.

Potatoes are a staple food in a large part of Abruzzi, and this department normally provides also a part of Rome's requirements. A good potato crop will go far to lessen cereal imports. Vigorous imported seed may produce double the tonnage. One hundred thousand tons of potatoes for consumption and one hundred thousand tons for seed were imported from Germany in 1942.

D. Reconstruction (Appendix G)

Shortage of tools for either civil or military endeavour, much emphasised by experiences in Sicily, is a serious handicap to satisfactory progress. Much repair and maintenance work will be urgently needed on water supply and upon roads, bridges and docks. The list of tools and materials as submitted will reasonably well supply ten thousand workmen.

TO : The Adjutant General, War Department, Washington (25), D. C.

1. Reference FHGDS 8015B, 14 August 1943, Reference No. W7363/1346 *177*
and FHGDS 818E 1902B, 20 August 1943, Reference No. W7836/3807.

2. Herewith is estimate of minimum civilian aid requirements for "WINDSOCK". All estimates submitted are based on calculated minimum requirements, however, from experience gained in MALICIOUS, limitations of shipping and anticipated port berthing facilities will limit calling forth full estimated needs as listed. Therefore a straight cut of twenty-five per cent from full estimates on all commodities except coal in both areas North and South of SEMOLINA will be the basis for actual requisitions. This will apply to last three months of 1943 and first three months of 1944. Coal estimates are cut 50% in last three months 1943, and about 60% in first three months 1944, because of expected limitations of berthing space.

b. Army requirements are included in the above figures, on the assumption that they will be met through savings in rationing civilian and industrial consumption.

c. No local resources have been considered in the above figures but are mentioned in our cable No. FHGDS 801S, 14 August 1943.

4. Petroleum Products:

a. Basis of estimates:

- (1) Civilian consumption reduced to lowest level which will maintain the minimum supply of essential consumer goods and services.
- (2) Civilian facilities are permitted to operate at the lowest levels compatible with the provisionment, health, and security of the local population and the occupying forces in accordance with what is understood to be the policy of the United States.
- (3) Civilian industries are permitted to operate to the extent that their production is necessary for the minimum essential requirements of the local population, for the needs of the occupying forces or for the manufacture of exportable surpluses desired or required for United Nations' use.

b. Estimates cover passenger cars, trucks, and buses, agricultural tractors, wagon axles, general industrial requirements, household requirements, railroads, public utilities, harbor craft and port facilities.

c. In the following tables of minimum requirements, Area I is HORRIFIED; Area II is that part of WINDSOCK South of SEMOLINA, inclusive; Area III is that part of WINDSOCK North of SEMOLINA exclusive; Area IV is GRUMMET and JACKSTAY.

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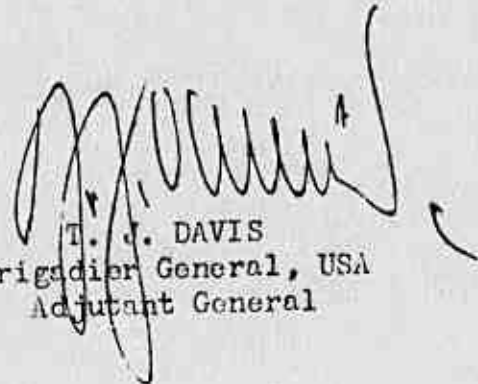

Submitted herewith are availability of supplies for civilian requirements, refer your 14 August No. 7363, you 20 August No. 7835 and 7836, and your 21 August your 7939. 5172

1. FOOD and INCIDENTALS: Due to late supply situation, basic ration to reduce is recommended change cheese 1 ounce per ration to one half ounce per ration and substitute for one half ounce of cheese 2 and one half ounces of meat and vegetable stew. If you accept requirements of cheese would be B 1875; C 1597; D 1875; and for meat and vegetable stew, B 8437; C 7189; D 8437. Soap, Matches, Milk, Soup, and Flour can be supplied as requested. Until October 1st Toilet soap will not be available. Flour will be hard wheat flour suitable for paste. It is assumed that NORTH AFRICA will supply dry vegetables. Also we believe that despite French reports, NORTH AFRICA has also a surplus of wheat. Every effort should be made to purchase NORTH AFRICAN wheat for relief feeding. Sugar and a limited amount of olive oil substitute may be made available here, but doubt that in first ninety days wisdom of broadening basic ration. Want your comments and estimate as to minimum olive oil substitute is required from US. No C or K rations are included in estimate and we assume that sufficient quantities are on hand in event you contemplate using them as introductory ration for period not to exceed 3 days. We assume local supplies of salt is part of basic ration and is not included.

2. Medical Units: Biological Unit, Tropical Unit and CAD Basic Medical Units can be made available in quantities requested if the requisitions are phased with convoys so as to spread requirements over entire period. All units will be made 100 % complete that are shipped after November 1st. 90 % complete will be the CAD Basic Medical Units shipped prior to November 1st, and 75 % complete will be the Tropical Units.

3. Sanitary Units, Engineers: Items are available in specified quantities.

4. Sanitary Units, Quartermaster: Items are available in specified quantities if requisitions with convoys are phased, so as to spread over entire period the requirements.

5. Clothing: No shoes or clothing are available from War Department for civilian relief. Request your views as to quantity and type of such of these items as you think absolutely essential.

6. Coal: The final decision between UK and AGWAR as to the source of coal required for WINDSOCK is expected and will be forwarded to you as soon as possible. Meanwhile, requisitions for small amounts should be placed on UK as listed in your cable 7835 of August 20.

THIS WILL APPLY TO LAST THREE MONTHS OF NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY THREE AND FIRST THREE MONTHS OF NINETEEN FORTY FOUR. COAL ESTIMATES ARE CUT FIFTY PER CENT IN LAST THREE MONTHS NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY THREE, AND ABOUT SIXTY PER CENT IN FIRST THREE MONTHS NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY FOUR, BECAUSE OF EXPECTED LIMITATIONS OF BERTHING SPACE."

Procedure determining requirements, procurement and transportation civilian supplies for HUSKYLAND. In view of previous cables on this subject, CITE our 92 April 12 and 9723 of May 6 and Medical Supplies cables exchanged between AFHQ, ALGIERS, and War Office, CITE you AG 8971 and LONDON NO. 76834, it is evident that a definitive procedure to handle all categories civilian supply for AMGOT must be established on a combined basis and clearly understood to avoid duplication of bidding here 5160 and in UK. In view of urgency HUSKY operation and without prejudice to future arrangements between US and UK governments and decisions of combined Chiefs of Staff, CCS took note at 80th meeting that War Department would expedite planning and necessary coordination with British with regard to supply and civilian population and administration civil affairs necessary immediately upon occupation enemy territory HUSKYLAND.

Therefore Allied Forces Headquarters should submit promptly to CCS for War Department its estimate even if tentative to total AMGOT civilian needs by item quantity priority desired destination and markings in 15 day cycles from D Day to D plus 90 including medical and sanitary supplies and barter goods required to supplement local supplies and production. Upon receipt and consideration your requirement by War Department source of supply as between US and UK will be discussed with appropriate US and UK authorities and requirements which UK is unable to supply which we assume to be the majority will be filled by War Department. In connection with requirements, studies being made by War Department which should enable us to make suggestions which may be helpful.

Civilian agencies including Office of Foreign Relief and Rehabilitation have been advised accordingly. War Department will assume that requisitions include provision for such essential civilian supplies for which shipping is allocated. No special provision will be made for civilian supplies except on receipt of special requisitions from you. Special requisitions for subsistence, medical supplies, clothing or other special items deemed necessary to meet essential civilian needs should be submitted to PEMBARK at earliest possible date to permit advance procurement without sudden demands on the market which would indicate operations contemplated. Further assume that Allied Force Commander will include in his requisitions for engineering materials those items deemed essential for emergency reestablishment of utilities in occupied area if necessary to meet military requirements and that such work be undertaken by the military, using troops.
