1. Preliminary Planning operations for the work of the F.D.R. Section have been evolved as follows:-

- (a) Obtain population figures by Regions, Provinces, & cities and towns over 50,000, 20/50,000, 10/20,000, 5/10,000 populations.

- (c) Evolve Ration Scales and estimate quantities.
- (d) Examination of the Italian Administration of the Rationing System.
- (e) Examine need for vitamised foods.
- (f) Examine self supply classes and their relationship to the Black Market.
- (g) Examine chain of Distribution.
- (h) Examine Storage facilities, including Cold Storage.
- (i) Examine General & local Food Transport facilities.
- (k) Direct feeding of the population of devastated areas.

Progress.(a) Population figures.

The population figures of Regions, Provinces, large cities and towns are essential. The latest available figures are to be obtained. These will be of necessity, only tentative and a census should be instituted by Region. H.Qs and forwarded to A.C., Interior Sub-Commission immediately. Only by obtaining these figures can a permanent ration scale be built up. Appendix 'A' shows a chart which will break down the population figures, will indicate probable self sufficiency and problems of supply and transportation etc when compared with maps and reports of disruption of communications.

(b) Regional Staple (Main) Commodities.

The Italian Ration Scales differ according to the geographical position of the Regions. It is therefore necessary to ascertain the proportions of the

main commodities of subsistence for each Region. A tentative chart for recording the information is shown at Appx 'B'.

(c) Ration Scales.

When the population figures are obtained (para (a)) and the subsistence commodities ascertained (para. (b)) a Ration Scale based upon these and the Caloric values as laid down by M.G.S. (at present 2000 per day per person) will be worked out for each Region for comparison with the existing scale. The continuance or adjustment of the Ration Scale will depend on the Supply and Replenishment position subject to a maximum average consumption of 2000 Calories.

(d) Italian Administration of the Rationing System.

The system of administration will be examined. Adjustments will be suggested where necessary for the better control of Rationing.

(e) Vitaminised Foods.

Cases of malnutrition may be expected to be present, particularly among children. The need for vitaminised foods i.e. chocolate, which are being manufactured in U.S. & U.K. should be carefully examined in conjunction with Public Health Sub-Commission and appropriate recommendation made.

(f) Self Supply Classes - Black Markets.

Under the Italian system of control, producers are allowed to retain portions of their production for their own use. This phase should be carefully examined as there must be many loopholes through which commodities get to Black Markets. If successful remedial or alternative measures were worked out, the supply position would be considerably improved.

(g) Chain of Distribution.

Elementarily the chain of Distribution runs from a producer or importer to wholesaler, to retailer, thence to consumer, although it may well be in many cases the producer sells to a retailer or a consumer. Distribution is a key to the whole Rationing System and it should be examined with a view to eliminating bottle necks, to give wider scope to

Exhaustive enquiries and a complete knowledge of the existing Italian Rationing System would appear to be necessary in order to bring or force surpluses into the general supply.

traders who can handle larger quantities, to "zone" products to save transport, and in many ways to ensure an economic & smooth flow of commodities to the consumer.

(h) & (i) Storage facilities
Local General Food transport
Facilities.

These are vital links in the chain of Distribution & as such should receive particular attention.

(k) Direct Feeding.

It appears essential that Communal Feeding Centres should be set up in devastated areas to provide meals for those people who temporarily cannot fend for themselves.

They can be examined only on arrival in Italy but their importance merit investigation at the earliest possible opportunity.

Examination of the needs of areas can only be undertaken on the spot, as also the setting up of the facilities of the staffing of such centres.

Suppression of Black Market.AMGOT/1057/FSAMGOT H.Q., SICILY2nd October 1943.

TO:- Provincial S.C.A.O.s
(Attention S.C.A.F.O.s)

1. By direction of the C.C.A.O., the police program to suppress black market operations must begin on an Island-wide basis as soon as possible, and will be dependent for its success upon the manner of its application in the various provinces by the respective S.C.A.O.s. In the interest of uniformity the following explanations are made of the general order sent out to the Carabinieri.

2. The Carabinieri Reali, in addition to its normal duties, has been designated as the responsible enforcement agency, and copies of the attached order, in the Italian language, are being distributed to that organization through its own channels.

3. General Order No. 5 (Revised) prescribes the maximum amounts of various commodities which may be retained without a declaration having been filed, and house-to-house searches should be initiated immediately for the purpose of locating and sequestering any unlawful excesses. Goods so seized should be stored in a central repository in each comune, under the control and subject to the disposition of the S.C.A.O., and should be so marked as to be identifiable in court as evidence; otherwise considerable quantities of goods may disappear subsequent to seizure.

4. The Legal Division has ruled that under Article IV of General Order No. 5 (Revised) the maximum amounts specified in the Schedule apply to any premises, dwelling or household, regardless of the number of individuals residing in or connected with same.

5. Under Article V, General Order No. 5 (Revised), the removal or transportation of certain commodities, including grain, is prohibited after 1st October 1943, except by permission of the S.C.A.O. or his representative. To implement the provisions of the said General Order it will be necessary to exercise very strict control over the transportation of such commodities, especially grain; otherwise any person possessing an excess could simply haul it away and sell it on the black market. Therefore, a manifest must be required for every shipment of commodities the amounts of which are limited in the Schedule. Since a large proportion of the transportation is by carts, each carrying a comparatively small quantity, it is recognized that the issuance of the required number of manifests constitutes something of a problem. It is suggested that such manifests be issued by communal conscripti (where there are on record the amounts of grain, etc., to be turned in by each producer) to the producer, the latter being required to fill in the name, identity card number and thumb print of the driver before permitting the cart to leave his premises.

6. It is suggested that each conscription number consecutively the manifests

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6. It is suggested that each consortio number conserved in the manifests issued by it, maintain a record of same, and take up a file each such manifest upon delivery of the load covered by it. The recipient, if other than the consortio, should be required to receipt for the load on the back of the manifest. There should be furnished by the consortio to the Carabinieri the pertinent information with reference to any manifest not turned in within a reasonable time, in order that investigation may be made to determine what disposition has been made of the load covered by the missing manifest.

7. All police officers should be required to furnish to persons from whom they seize commodities receipts showing the exact type and amount seized, said receipt to bear the signature, rank and organization of the officer in charge, if seizure.

8. Comments on Special Police Instructions - Black Market.

(a) As a matter of convenience, the supplies of manifest blanks referred to in Paragraph 3 (b) (iii) have been forwarded to S.C.A.O.S.

(b) Section 3(b) (iv), referring to military vehicles and to civilian vehicles under military guard, does not contemplate the stopping and searching of such vehicles by civil police, it merely requires that upon observing such a vehicle they make a report of the time, place and identifying markings of the vehicle.

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(c) Section 3(c) (iii), referring to searches and confiscations after 31st October, is not to be interpreted as prohibiting house-to-house searches before that date, same being authorized by General Order No. 5 (Revised). After 31st October 1943, all grain which has not been delivered to the Consortium (except seed and producers' food) is subject to confiscation without court procedure under the provisions of General Order No. 3. Under General Order No. 5 (Revised) commodities seized prior to 31st October 1943 may be finally disposed of only by order of a Military Court.

(d) Section 4(b) ".....reports on the activities of all police agencies.." has reference to those police agencies not under control of Group Commanders of the Carabinieri, i.e. the Agents of Public Security, Finance Guards, Municipal Police and Special Police. Any or all of these agencies may and should be used by S.C.A.O.s to reinforce the efforts of the Carabinieri Reali in black market suppression, and S.C.A.O.s should arrange for weekly reports (as prescribed in 4(b) (1) to be submitted by them, copies of said reports being furnished to the Group Commander for incorporation in his weekly report to his higher commanders.

(e) Section 4(b) (1), "Total number of cases referred to the police" should be construed to include those cases initiated by the police. Under "Value of confiscated property" should also be shown the type and exact amount of such property, such as the number of quintals of wheat or the number of litres of olive oil, etc., seized in a given week.

(1) Definition.

"Preservation" is the prevention of spoilage of raw and processed food commodities. This includes use of methods involving the use of extremes of cold.

- (c) That Agriculture Sub-Commission is responsible for keeping Ind and Comm informed on estimated production.

- Yes*
- (d) That "nutrition" is of extreme importance in connection with food supply and Public Health, as the Sub-Commission responsible, is vitally concerned and is therefore included as one of the Sub-Commissions involved in food supply and to be included in conferences on this subject.

1. It is noted that the responsibility for Rationing and Price Control is divided between Economics and Supply Division and Agriculture Division. In view of the forthcoming directive laying down maximum Ration Scale -- and its importance -- it is considered necessary that Rationing and Price Control should be channelled through one Division only -- namely Economics and Supply Division.

2. It is noted that the processing of agricultural products is a responsibility of the Agriculture Division.

Having in mind the large normal surpluses of fruits and vegetables, and as it may not be possible to export all the surpluses of the forthcoming harvest, it is anticipated that considerable quantities will have to be processed and stockpiled for later export (to the mainland and elsewhere) and for military consumption.

If this surmise is correct should not the responsibility of manufacture, canning, stockpiling etc be the job of Economics and Supply Division?

3. There is also no indication as to which Division will be responsible for the rather considerable work of Export.

1. Effective immediately the civilian Supply Division will be reorganized. The previous functions of the Division will be divided among the following Divisions which are hereby established:

- (a) Economics and Supply Division.
- (b) Transportation, Communication, and Utilities Division.
- (c) Agriculture Division.
- (d) Labor Division.

2. The particular functions of these Divisions will be as follows:-

(a) Economics and Supply Division: This division shall be responsible for estimating and meeting essential civilian requirements; for supervising the rationing system of the territory, other than in respect of agricultural products; for the survey, development and control of natural resources of the territory, other than agricultural resources, to the extent required by the interests of the Allied Forces or the economy of the territory; for supervising price control, other than in respect of agricultural products; for the development and regulation of industrial and commercial enterprises and activities, other than those engaged in furnishing transportation, communication, or utility services; and in general for taking necessary measures to restore channels of supply and distribution and to rehabilitate the economy of the territory.

(b) Transportation, Communication and Utilities Division: This division shall be responsible for rehabilitating and maintaining a system of civilian transport, whether by rail, water, highway or otherwise; for the regulation and control of existing civilian transport facilities or agencies; and for arranging transport required for civilian supply, mails, and civilian personnel, as may be required for the rehabilitation of the economy of the territory. This division will not be responsible for AMGOT organic transport, that is, for operation, maintenance or control of (i) British or American Army vehicles, (ii) civilian and captured vehicles required for transport of AMGOT personnel or property in addition to Army vehicles.

This division shall also be responsible for rehabilitating, and maintaining civil communications, and for the regulation and control of existing communication facilities, including telephone, telegraph, cables and radio; for the rehabilitation, regulation and control of electric, gas and water utilities; and for the rehabilitation and supervision of public works, including roads, bridges, water supply, sewers and sanitary facilities.

(c) Agriculture Division: This division shall be responsible for the supervision of agriculture, including cropping and production, methods for improvement of agriculture and processing of agricultural products; for rationing and price control of agricultural products; for estimating and meeting agricultural requirements; and in coordination with the Economics and Supply Division for the collection and distribution of all agricultural products and edible commodities; also for the supervision of forests and fisheries.

(d) Labor Division: This division shall be responsible for the supervision and control of all matters relating to labor supply, including the regulation of wage levels for both civilian and military labor; the supervision of regional and provincial labor offices and all other matters affecting labor in the territory.

However, before calling forth additional supplies, he will take fullest advantage of existing local resources and captured stores.

The General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group will include in his requisitions those items deemed essential for emergency re-establishment of utilities in the occupied areas if necessary to meet military requirements.

6. Requisitions will be compiled and submitted by supply branch: Quartermaster, Medical, Engineer, etc. (U.S.); and Supply & Transport, Medical, Ordnance, etc., (Br.) using appropriate standard forms insofar as is practicable. In all cases, requisitions will be accompanied by sufficient information to explain and justify the use to which the supplies are to be put.

7. It will be the responsibility of the Supply Services (U.S. and Br.) to meet requisitions approved by this headquarters. U.S. Agencies will stockpile, within the theater, appropriate amounts of approved items of civilian supply in accordance with approved requisitions, by drawing upon the following sources, in

1. The following material on ration requirements for relief in Italy is based on minimum physiological needs of the various classes of population present. It must be emphasized that the figures given are only estimates based on the limited information available. These figures should only be used for the preliminary calculations needed to initiate the relief program. A careful study of nutritional requirements should be immediately initiated by the Military Government Section to determine actual nutritional maintenance needs of the Italian people. When the results of this study are completed they should form the basis for shipment of food products for relief of food shortage in Italy.

The diet should contain a minimum of 30 grams daily of class 1 protein (animal, pulses, or fish origin) and 14 grams daily of fat of plant or animal origin. The remainder can be made up of class 2 protein and carbohydrate. Whole milk or milk products from which fluid mix can be reconstituted should be reserved for expectant and nursing mothers, and children under 3. $\frac{1}{2}$ litre per day is desirable.

Vitamin content of diet should meet minimum requirements if full advantage is taken of the use of local fruit, vegetable and sea food supply.

1. Olive oil and olive oil residues will be subject to control similar to that in force prior to our occupation.

2. In particular the following regulations will remain in force:

A. Those defining the persons who are allowed to retain olive oil and the quantity which they are permitted to retain. Arrangements should be made for the withdrawal of ration coupons in respect of these persons.

B. Those stipulating conditions of ammass, sale, distribution, sampling and classification of oils.

C. Those affecting the method of rationing.

3. Crop estimate to hand at the moment indicates that production this season is likely to be satisfactory and the maximum ration should be fixed as from 1st November, 1943 at 3 liter per person per month. If subsequent information suggests that this should be decreased or could be increased, the matter will be reconsidered. In the absence, therefore, of any subsequent instructions the maximum ration for all provinces is fixed at the quantity mentioned above.

The cost per person per month at the ration fixed above will be about 11 lire. This expenditure on such an important item of diet will be considered excessive. It compares with 48 lire per month per person for bread and pasta at the maximum permitted ration.

5. A schedule is attached (Appendix A) fixing prices for edible olive oil for this season's crop. It will be observed that the classification has been simplified and edible oils are now graded into 4 categories. This is regarded as a sufficient division, having in mind the fact that 80% of all oil consumed in Sicily is in the lowest grade (not exceeding 7% acidity) and almost the whole of the remainder consumed is in the next highest category.

6. Prices for non-edible olive products are attached (Appendix B).

7. The prices fixed from producer down to consumer are standard for the whole Island with the following exceptions:

Information desired by your 4036 of August 6th cite SPILA. Latest estimated of French authorities which are not fully concurred in by MAEB indicate wheat and barley produced this year in North Africa is not sufficient to meet needs of civilian population until the next harvest. Shortage is stated to be wheat 270,000 tons; barley 250,000 tons; total 520,000 tons. French have made commitments to release 30,000 tons of wheat during next 3 months for military government stockpile but may require replacement before next summer. 10,000 additional tons of flour are required during next 3 months for civilians in HORNIFIED including Pantellaria. Total required during next 3 months ending October 10th for both civilians in HORNIFIED and military are 21,182 tons of which Army requirements are 11,182 tons have been ordered from Penbark. Total quantity to be shipped from the US is 21,182 tons plus undetermined requirements for post HUSKY operations. Estimates for civilians in post HUSKY being submitted in reply to your 3604 of July 28th.
