

Combined Chiefs of Staff have approved the following additions to Directive which was sent to you in FAR 131 dated 31 May, 1943.

Paragraph 6A is in addition to paragraph 6 previously sent you. Paragraph 12 is one of the originally omitted paragraphs.

"Para 6A. The first objective must be to get and keep a local government working smoothly so as to relieve the Commander in Chief of all trouble and anxiety as regards civil population. The following may serve as guidance:

"A distinction should be drawn between (A) such organizations as do NOT exist for the benefit and security of the people, e.g., the Party organization itself and all purely Fascist accretions which have been grafted onto the local government system, and (B) those organizations which are of direct benefit to the people and whose removal would adversely affect the efficiency of the administration. The former should be suppressed, while there is a *prima facie* case for maintaining the latter."

Consistent with military necessity, you will conform to the guides herein set forth.

1. There shall be a Military Administration which will show every characteristic of an Allied undertaking. Both the American and British flags shall be displayed at headquarters and posts of the Military Government. The Administration shall be identical throughout the area.

3. Other representatives of civilian agencies of either government shall not participate in the initial stages. Their later participation will be subject, as to time and extent, to decision by the Combined Chiefs of Staff.

4. The Administration shall be benevolent with respect to the civilian population so far as consistent with strict military requirements. The civilian population is tired of war, resentful of German overlordship, and demoralized by the Fascist Regime, and will therefore be responsive to a just and efficient administration. It should be made clear to the local population that military occupation is intended:

1. To deliver the people from the Fascist Regime which led them into the war; and

2. To restore Italy as a Free Nation.

8. All laws which discriminate on the basis of race, color, or creed shall be forthwith annulled. Freedom of Religious Worship shall be promulgated. To the extent that military interests are not prejudiced, Freedom of Speech and Press shall be instituted.

9. Measures shall be taken for the prompt release of political prisoners. Upon their release, they shall be cautioned that political activity on their part, during the period of military government, will not be tolerated. The Special Tribunal for the Defense of the State shall be abolished.

10. Neither local political personalities nor organized political groups, however sound in sentiment, shall have any part in determining the policies of the Administration. It is essential to avoid any commitments to, or negotiations with, any local political elements. Italian political leaders in exile shall have no part in the Administration.

11. The exercise of the Powers of the Crown shall be suspended during the period of military occupation.

13. A plan shall be prepared by you to prevent transfers of title of valuable real and personal property which are intended to defeat, evade or avoid the responsibilities, fines or punishments imposed or to be imposed on present owners or the national government.

## SECTION II

## MONETARY AND FISCAL GUIDES

1. During the initial period of operations, the United States Task Forces will use yellow seal dollars and regular United States coins. The British Military Forces will use British Military Authority notes and British coins, as well as local currency in their possession. Yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes are available in NATOUS and additional shipments can be procured when desired from the United States Treasury and the British Treasury. Records shall be kept of the amount of currencies used by the United States and British Forces.

2. The use of yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes for Army payments to troops and for local procurement shall cease and Allied Military lira shall be used in their place as soon as available, unless the Military Government decides that the time is not propitious for such change. The United States Treasury will have this Allied Military lira currency ready for shipment to any point desired within 4 days after zero hour. Records shall be kept of the amount of Allied Military lira issued.

3. Allied Military lira currency is not intended to replace local lira currency already in circulation, but is designed to supplement it.

4. The rate of exchange between the United States dollar and the British Military Authority note shall be 4 dollars to 1 pound and both currencies shall be made interchangeable at that rate. The United States Treasury will make the necessary arrangements with the British Treasury.

5. The United States yellow seal currency and the British Military Authority notes shall be withdrawn from circulation as soon as it can be satisfactorily accomplished. The date for this withdrawal shall be determined by the Military Government after the operation has begun.

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6. The rate of exchange to be decreed on D-day shall be 100 lira to the dollar and 400 lira to the pound sterling. A proclamation shall be issued requiring all persons to accept the United States yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes at the decreed rate. Transactions at any other rate shall be prohibited. Holders of local and Allied Military lira notes or deposits are not entitled to obtain dollar or pound notes without special permission. They shall obtain dollars or pound notes or any other foreign currency or foreign exchange credits only in accordance with exchange regulations issued by the Military Government.

7. All foreign financial and foreign trade transactions and all exports and imports of currency shall be prohibited except as permitted under regulations to be issued by the Military Government.

8. Under the Military Government there shall be established within the area an Allied Military financial agency. It may establish sub-agencies where deemed desirable.

In so far as its operations relate to the provision of currencies for the pay and other cash requirements of Military formations of either Army, it shall draw the necessary resources from the Military Government currency reserve and will record the debit against the Army concerned in the currency of issue. It is authorized to accept deposits from finance officers and from military personnel of the Allied Armies. In so far as its operations relate to civil administration, it shall draw on the currency reserve and debit against the Military Government.

If found practicable, and desirable, the bank of Sicily under the direct control of the Military Governor will be designated as agent for the Allied Military financial agency. The Military Governor and other Allied Military Authorities, when satisfied that the Bank of Sicily is under adequate control, may use that bank for official business, and by making credits available to it by providing it with Allied Military lira notes, place the bank in a position to finance other banks and branches for the conduct of their business as approved by the Military Government. When other effective banking facilities are not available, the Allied Military financial agency shall be empowered to make loans. These shall be restricted to lira loans except in very special circumstances.

The Military Government will control and direct all receipts and disbursements for civil administration purposes, whether by United States or British civil affairs officers, and through the Allied Military financial agency, will provide all funds of whatever currency and receive all revenues and cash receipts. Thus all civil affairs officers will draw funds only from the Allied Military financial agency.

The records of the Allied Military financial agency shall indicate in all cases in what currency receipts were obtained or disbursements made.

9. Upon taking over an area, the military authorities shall proceed immediately to:

- (A) Close all banks and financial institutions and place them under military custody.
- (B) Declare a general moratorium.
- (C) Impound or block for future disposal the funds of enemy government agencies, including government banks.
- (D) Seal all vaults and safety deposit boxes.
- (E) Obtain an inventory of the assets of the banks as quickly as practicable.

10. Holdings of gold, foreign currencies and foreign securities, all national funds and the funds of Fascist political organizations shall be taken into custody as quickly as possible, and shall be deposited with the Allied Military financial agency or banks designated by the Military Government.

11. Banks should be encouraged to reopen for business under the Military Government if and when it deems such action desirable. No governmental or private bank or agency shall be authorized to issue bank notes or lira currency. Access to safety deposit boxes or vaults will be allowed only when a proper system of supervision has been instituted. Gold, foreign currencies and foreign securities, and valuable papers, shall be withheld from the owner against accredited receipt.

12. Before banks are reopened, it should be made possible for them to arrange loans from banks or agencies designated by the Military Government. The lending bank may require as collateral any or all of the assets of the borrowing bank or of the directors thereof, and may accept, as collateral, obligations of the National Government or of its subdivisions.

13. Except where special permission is granted, local banks shall be permitted only lira accounts, but may accept, at the decreed rate of exchange, yellow seal dollars and British Military Authority notes which they shall turn in as directed in exchange for local or Allied Military lira at the decreed rate of exchange.

14. The Military Government shall have authority to maintain the existing tax laws and to raise such contributions for the administration of the country as are consistent with international custom and usage. COMMISSIONERS RELATING TO ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION OF MILITARY GOVERN-

This directive has been agreed upon by the governments of the United States and Great Britain and is transmitted for your guidance in the organization and operation of military government in the territory involved in operation HUSKY. You will be guided in all matters of general policy, such as those of a political, fiscal or economic nature, solely by the directives you will receive from the Combined Chiefs of Staff. Consistent with military necessity, you will conform to the guides herein set forth.

Local branches of government institutions, as well as foreign-owned banks dependent under strict control of the military government shall be ~~closed~~ <sup>closed</sup> until such time as the ~~military~~ <sup>new</sup> government has been constituted. No governmental or private bank or agency shall be authorized to issue bank notes or lira currency. Access to safety deposit boxes or vaults will be allotted only when a proper system of supervision has been instituted. Gold, foreign currencies and foreign securities, and valuable papers, shall be withheld from the owner against account receipt.
12. Before banks are reopened, it should be made possible for them to arrange loans from ~~the central bank~~ <sup>agencies</sup> banks designated by the military government. The lending bank may require as collateral any or all of the assets of the borrowing bank or of the directors thereof, and may accept as collateral obligations of the national government or of its subdivisions.
13. Except where special permission is granted, local banks shall be permitted to open only lira accounts, but may accept at the desired rate of exchange yellow seal dollars and U.S. notes which they shall turn in as directed ~~to the central bank~~ <sup>in exchange for local or u.s. lira at the decreed rate of exchange.</sup>
14. The military government shall have authority to maintain the existing tax laws and to raise such contributions for the administration of the country

as are consistent with International custom and usage. All national tax receipts shall be deposited in ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~Bank or~~ <sup>Under my</sup> ~~banks~~ designated by ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> government.

15. All trustees of the National Insurance Institute shall be placed under military control and its revenues made available to the military government.

16. The railways, postal, telegraph and telephone services, radio and all government monopolies shall be placed under military control and their revenues made available to the military government.

17. None of the tax or other revenues shall be used for the payment of principal or interest on national government obligations.

#### SECTION III

##### ECONOMIC GUIDES

1. Measures shall promptly be undertaken to enable the country's own services of production and supply to assure as far as possible the provisioning of the local population. You are authorised to furnish from all stocks available to you such supplies to the civilian population as military requirements may permit. These supplies, however far feasible, shall be introduced for sale through existing commercial channels under rigid military control. Direct relief shall be employed only where necessary.
2. You will have the responsibility for the procurement of materials deemed essential to re-establish the various utilities. No provision for such materials will be made except on requisitions from A.D.M.
3. Maximum prices and rationing of important staple commodities shall be quickly established. Black market practices and hoarding shall be severely punished.

1. Measures shall promptly be undertaken to ensure services of production and supply to assist us far as possible the provisioning of the local population. You are authorised to furnish from all stocks available to you such supplies to the civilian population as military requirements permit. These supplies, insofar as possible, shall be furnished gratis.

The fascist corporations and their councils shall be abolished. The Military Government should give careful attention to the matter of sound, fair and voluntary labor relations and shall, if necessary, fix hours and wages of labor.

5. A system of control shall immediately be established for the import and export of goods by local business concerns and a license required for such shipments. In determining what exports shall be permitted, paramount consideration shall be granted to the needs of the military forces and the local population. Exports shall be permitted only to friendly countries.

## MEMORANDUM FOR DRAFTING DIRECTIVE TO PROPERTY CUSTODIAN

## A. Scope of Authority for custody of Property:

## 1. State owned or controlled property:

In general P.C. will act as custodian only for state property which is not in possession of some other branch of Allied Forces and which:

- C.C.A.O. directs P.C. to take in custody
- P.C. determines is of such nature and value that it should be taken in custody for benefit of Allied Forces or inhabitants territory.

Where uncertainty exists whether such property is state property within interments of International Law and rules of Warfare matter shall be referred by P.C. to Legal Division AMGOT for investigation and decision. State monopolies operated primarily for revenue purposes will be under custody and supervision of Financial Division AMGOT.

P.C. will act as custodian for private property which is not in possession of other branches of Allied Forces and which:

2. Funds received by P.C. may be commingled in one general account after recording source thereof, and may be utilized for any proper purposes in the administration of the duties and functions of P.C. regardless of original source.

3. Funds may be advanced by P.C. from general account to business or enterprises in his custody, where such action is advisable in interests of Allied forces or for benefit of inhabitants of occupied territory. If it becomes necessary to advance money or credit for any business or property in custody of P.C., and funds are not available to P.C., the matter will be referred to Financial Division ANGOF for investigation and action.

4. Custodian may disburse funds from general account for following purposes:

- (a) Reasonable compensation to such numbers of civilian employees on his staff as may reasonably be necessary including compensation to casual employees.
  - (b) Purchase or rental of: office space, furniture, equipment, supplies, light, heat, or water, telephone, telegraph, postage, transportation facilities and other services or commodities necessary for proper functioning of the office and administration of P.C.
5. Accounts and records of P.C. will be audited periodically by financial division ANGOF, which will at request of P.C. examine method of accounting and bookkeeping and make recommendations to P.C. thereon.

It is suggested that serious consideration be given to a provision in the directive that in accordance with Paragraph B(a) of proposed draft all industries, mines, utilities, communications systems, transportation systems, and food processing and distribution agencies (not in possession of Armies) which come into custody of P.C. shall be supervised by Supply Division of ANGOT. Some such action seems contemplated by the Plan inasmuch as Supply Division is provided with Specialists and Engineers in those fields and in the field of Labor whereas P.O. is not so provided. The result of this would be that industrial supply and labor policies would all be coordinated for supervision of operations in one division, equipped with Specialist personnel therefor, and in the same division which is responsible for procurement and distribution of the products etc. of those industries. It may be said that the P.C. should supervise the operations and the experts on Supply Division act as advisors. This may result in a division of responsibilities and duplication of personnel inasmuch as Custodian is responsible for the preservation and care of the particular property whereas Supply is responsible for the economic development of the country as a whole to furnish supplies and food for benefit of all inhabitants. Procurement of food, supplies and facilities for inhabitants is one of the most certain methods of restoring peace and order in the territory - a military necessity - and would seem to justify and warrant Custodian permitting Supply to supervise operations of industrial property in his custody.

If the suggestion is adopted Custodian would be required to keep records of property taken, prepare inventories, and account for all income received by him from such property together with disbursements. It would be his duty to arrange with Finance Division for advances or loans for such properties where necessary and to see that the industries were not being wantonly and wilfully dissipated. In addition, P.C. would remain responsible for supervision of property of a nature not included in above, i.e., hotels, apartments, mercantile establishments, public buildings, operas, museums, theaters, etc. Any specialist personnel required for supervision of such type property would be rather uniform in experience and would not duplicate specialist personnel in Supply Division.

Fire protective agencies and passive air defenses are being provided for so that civilians in large centers may not only continue but expand facilities for their own protection against fire and air raids.

8. Property

The property of all Allies requisitioned by the Fascist regime will be taken over and administered for their benefit, as well as abandoned property or property belonging to absentee owners.

9. Administration

Civil Affairs Officers will be placed in each province and each county of over 12,000 population as military administrators. These men have been picked for their ability and long experience in the administrative field.

10. Antiquities, Fine Arts and Monuments

These will be preserved and their export forbidden. Compare with German and Italian repudiations in this field.

11. Education

As soon as possible all schools will open and continue their work on democratic lines. All Fascist teachings will be eliminated and educational experts provided by ANGOT to insure this end.

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AGENDA FOR THE MEETING BETWEEN JOINT PLANNING STAFF AND PSYCHOLOGICAL WARFARE BRANCH

I. Better control and coordination of combat propaganda (leaflet and radio) during HUSKY.

Combat propaganda can only become fully effective if it is a recognised function of an operational force. To this end

(1) An officer of the staff of the General Commanding the forces engaged in HUSKY should be given the responsibility of directing PWB combat propaganda during the course of HUSKY.

(2) The necessary PWB personnel should be attached to the staff of the Force Commander in order to insure the integration of combat propaganda with military operations. This applies not only to front-line propaganda but to radio and leaflet work originating in North Africa.

II. In view of the enlarged scope of HUSKY and the possibility of sudden changes, it will be necessary for PWB to be integrated more closely in all future military plans and operations.

III. Relation of PWB to AMGOT.

(1) The enlarged character of HUSKY will result in greater responsibility on the part of PWB in propaganda to enemy-occupied territory. Such propaganda can play a major part in reducing the demands on military personnel for forcible pacification. PWB will, therefore, be required to recruit in the United States and Great Britain highly qualified personnel for its work after the occupation of any enemy area.

(2) In any plan for occupying Italy or a part of Italy, the relations between PWB and AMGOT will have to be more precisely defined than in the plan for NORFORTED.

III. Relation of PWB to AMGOT.

(1) The enlarged character of HUSK will result in greater responsibility on the part of PWB in propaganda to enemy-occupied territory. Such propaganda can play a major part in reducing the demands on military personnel for forcible pacification. PWB will, therefore, be required to recruit in the United States and Great Britain highly qualified personnel for its work after the occupation of any enemy area.

(2) In any plan for occupying Italy or a part of Italy, the relations between PWB and AMGOT will have to be more precisely defined than in the plan for HUSK/FID.

Copy of telegram from Allied C in C to Combined Chiefs of Staff  
dispatched May 17 repeated to Troopers and Midgast for information.

Begin:

1. I wish to draw your urgent attention to the importance of psychological warfare for the HUSKY operation. Having regard to the risks we are accepting, I consider it essential that every effort should be made in advance to weaken the resistance of the enemy. All our information goes to show that the Italian troops will fight bravely in defence of their own territory. In consequence, the cost to us of the operation may depend very largely on the extent to which we can undermine their morale beforehand.

2. In my opinion the policy of psychological warfare for HUSKY laid down in your telegram No. Fortune III of April 16 is not sufficient for this purpose and will not succeed in making any substantial contribution to the operation. The reasons on which I base this opinion are:-

- (a) Intimidation of the Italians by threats, as directed in points 1 and 2, will not itself achieve our object. Unless we can offer them a way out from the war, they will see no alternative other than to rally round their leaders. This is exactly what we wish to avoid.
- (b) The encouragement of passive resistance and sabotage of the Italian war effort, recommended in point 3, is unlikely to produce results which will be of any real assistance to HUSKY.
- (c) The assurances about Italy's future to be given under point 5 are not sufficiently explicit to be convincing, while the withholding of such assurance until immediately before invasion takes place deprives them of any value for the operation. In view of the time required, even under the best conditions, for propaganda to take effect, and of the measures taken by the enemy to prevent us reaching our audience we shall need all the interval between now and D-Day to put our message across and if we postpone it until the eve of the operation, it will be entirely lost in the heat of the battle.

5. I, therefore, strongly recommend that the Statement of Policy be amended, as follows:  
Point 5 - During the period before invasion takes place, we should constantly emphasize to the Italians:-
  - (a) that the choice between a continuation and a cessation of hostilities rests with them,
  - (b) that a cessation of hostilities

(a) that the choice between a continuation and a cessation of hostilities rests with them,

(b) that a cessation of hostilities on their part will be accepted by the Allies as evidence of good fulfilment, entitling them eventually to a "peace with honour".

(c) that the policy of the United Governments pledges full nationhood for Italy after the decent of the Axis and the removal of the Fascist Government, and assures full benefits as provided in the Atlantic Charter.

(d) that in consequence Italy has every interest in ceasing hostilities and that the only obstacle to honourable peace is the policy of the Fascist Government.

4. Our propaganda would be greatly strengthened by an Allied statement on the above lines issued as soon as possible. Pending itself on such a statement, our propaganda could develop between now and D-day an effective campaign in which the advantages of surrendering would be balanced against the consequences of resisting, and in which blame for continuing a hopeless and unpopular war could be placed squarely on the Fascist Government.

5. The above recommendations are in line with those sent to you by C in C Mid-East in their telettran No. CC/207 of April 26 in which I entirely concur.

Dear Whittle,

Herewith a note on the points raised in the papers enclosed with your letter 16/Abd/1237 (P.I.) of November 5th.

I doubt whether it is accurate to say, as your letter does, that the Legal Adviser "has very grave doubts" as to the legality of a number of the actions taken. I understand his contention to be that assuming that the action in question can be shown to have been necessitated by the condition of affairs in occupied territory, it is under the applicable rules of international law. If so, I think that he is perfectly right and that Major Dawson's views are based on too narrow an interpretation of the rules in question.

I shall be happy to discuss the question further if you wish to do so. I return the papers enclosed in your letter herewith.

I propose to discuss this question on the assumption that the measures under consideration can be shown to be (paragraph 6 of Colonel Hone's memorandum)  
"for the general benefit of the administration, the inhabitants, the banks and  
their creditors". Whether this is in fact so is beyond my competence, but I  
mention the point because Colonel Maxwell suggests in his memorandum of  
July 12th, 1941, that in addition the octroiance at any rate of some of the  
measures in question may not be justifiable on this ground. Insofar as this  
may be so, the following observations would not be applicable.

2. On this assumption I am in full agreement, with the conclusions as to the position under international law reached by Colonel Hone in his admirable memorandum, and I do not want to repeat what he has said. I agree with the distinction which he draws in paragraph 6 between the position in the United Kingdom and that in occupied enemy territory. In the former case we have full powers of legislation and control over enemy property, and the use of those powers is only limited by considerations of policy and the view that the adoption of a policy of confiscation would be inconsistent with the modern tendency of international law. In occupied enemy territory our powers over enemy property are definitely limited by such provisions as articles 49, 51, 52, 55, 55 and 56 of the Land War Regulations.

3. The question must therefore be considered on the basis of the rights and duties of an occupant. It is true that neither the Land War Regulations nor the textbook writers give much assistance on the particular points which arise. But I think that the latter is governed by two general principles, of which the second is not less important than the first: (1) the doctrine of military necessity must be confined within reasonable limits - otherwise it would justify many of the actions of the enemy in occupied European territories which we and our Allies have stigmatised as illegal; (2) it is the duty of the occupant to not cover the whole ground, and for the rest recourse must be had to the second principle.

4. To some extent the action taken in regard to the control of banks is justifiable under a reasonable interpretation of military necessity, for the occupant is clearly entitled to take the necessary steps to prevent trade with the enemy, either by the banks or by their customers. But this admittedly does not cover the whole ground, and for the rest recourse must be had to the second principle.

5. In this connection, article 43 of the Land War Regulations is important. No doubt the concluding words impose a definite limitation on the legislative power of the occupant, and it is important to maintain this limitation. But ultimately results from the fact that the occupant is not the Sovereign. But it should be observed that the article also imposes a definite obligation on the occupant "to re-establish and ensure as far as possible public order and the economy".

5. The question must therefore be considered on the basis of duties of an occupant. It is true that neither the Land War Regulations nor the textbook writers give much assistance on the particular points which arise. But I think that the matter is governed by two general principles, of which the second is not less important than the first: (1) the doctrine of military necessity must be confined within reasonable limits - otherwise it would justify many of the actions of the enemy in occupied European territories which we and our Allies have stigmatised as illegal; (2) it is the duty of the occupant to ensure so far as possible a decent existence for the inhabitants of occupied territory.

6. To some extent the action taken in regard to the control of banks is justifiable under a reasonable interpretation of military necessity, for the occupant is clearly entitled to take the necessary steps to prevent trade with the enemy, either by the banks or by their customers. But this admittedly does not cover the whole ground, and for the rest recourse must be had to the second principle.

7. In this connexion, Article 43 of the Land War Regulations is important. "No doubt the concluding words impose a definite limitation on the legislative power of the occupant, and it is important to maintain this limitation, which ultimately results from the fact that the occupant is not the Sovereign." But it should be observed that the article also imposes a definite obligation on the occupant "to re-establish and ensure as far as possible public order and safety", the reason being that the authority has in fact passed into his hands.

8. In my view this certainly covers action which can be shown to be necessitated on the grounds set out in the first paragraph of this note. To take a very simple case; we have this over and over again that it is the duty of the occupant to see that the inhabitants of the territory do not starve, and if he finds that the existing law does not give the administration the necessary powers to ensure this object (e.g., if there were no power to requisition privately owned stocks of foodstuffs or to control prices), he would certainly be entitled and bound to use additional powers for the purpose, and would not be deserted from doing so by his obligation to respect "unless absolutely necessary, the laws in force in the country". This principle would certainly cover action which was necessary "to prevent violent economic collapse and widest read distress consequent upon our military occupation of the territory" (paragraph 11 of Colonel Hone's memorandum).

9. It follows from the above that I do not agree with the much narrower view of the rights and duties of an occupant set out in Major Hanson's memorandum. In particular I do not agree that Article 23(h) of the Land War Regulations forbids some of the action taken, such as a moratorium. The object of that provision was to prevent enemy subjects as such from being deprived of recourse to the courts of law to enforce their rights; it is not in my opinion applicable/

-2-

applicable to a measure of general application such as a more strict, which is not directed against enemy subjects as such and is imposed in the general interests of all the inhabitants of the territory. The question of the extension of the Italian courts in occupied territory only arises incidentally in this connection, but if it were found impossible to allow those courts to function, it would be the duty of the occupant to put something temporarily in their place, so as to enable the ordinary rights of the inhabitants, insofar as they were unaffected by special legislation, to be enforced.

- I am asked to advise "as to what action should be taken in order to cover ourselves in this matter". This question falls into two halves: (1) action to cover ourselves as against Italy; (2) action to prevent our measures and their consequences being questioned in the local courts.
- 9. (1) is a matter to be dealt with by appropriate provisions in the peace settlement. It is too early yet to consider what form these provisions should take; they would probably have to be in somewhat general terms, and they may differ according to the ultimate fate of the various territories concerned; the provisions required in the case of any territory which was ultimately returned to Italy would probably differ from those required in the case of territory which was annexed or set up as an independent State, e.g., Ethiopia. It would, however, be desirable that the authorities in occupied territory should be having notes of the points which will require to be covered in the peace settlement, so that they may be in a position to produce proposals when required; and they will no doubt be alive to the necessity of taking in a position to show the justification for the various forms of action taken, and to account for all property, State or private, which has come under their possession or control.
- 10. As to the second point, so long as the occupation lasts, the "sanction" for the measures in question would derive from enactments issued by or under the authority of the G.O.C., which would prevent such action being questioned, during the occupation by such courts as are functioning. When the future of the territories has been settled, legislation by the then Sovereign will almost certainly be required to validate the action taken during the occupation. Insofar as any of these territories may become British, this would be a matter for internal arrangement. In the case of Ethiopia, this would have to be arranged with the Emperor, and it may be desirable, if the arrangements now under contemplation go through, for such legislation to be passed without waiting till the end of the war. In the case of any territories which are returned to Italy, the peace settlement should contain provisions which would oblige the Italians to enact new legislation necessary for this purpose.

1. For the information and approval of the C.S.A.O. there is attached the plan of internal operations of the Section referred to above.
2. It will be noted that reference is made in Annex III to Plan C that a police force be organized directly by and under the authority of the Military Governor. This is advisory only to the C.S.A.O. and only to be resorted to if, as and when ordered by the C.S.A.O.
3. Annex IV to Plan C of the attached is also purely advisory to the C.S.A.O. and represents a study of the situation that will exist should local law enforcement agencies collapse utterly and a condition of open rebellion develop against the authority of the Military Government.
4. In the opinion of this Division one of the best guarantees that such a situation will not develop is to provide adequate support for the Civil Police agencies at all times. Anything that could be construed by the population as inadequate support to the civil agencies upon the part of the Military Government might be regarded by lawless elements as an encouragement to attempt a trial of strength with the civil law enforcing agencies.
5. This plan in its entirety has my approval and subject to such revision as may be directed by the C.S.A.O., will be the basis upon which the supervision of the Civil and Special police of AMGOT will be exercised by this Division.
6. It is contemplated that frequent revision of the foregoing will be both desirable and necessary as the conditions become better known. This will be done and timely information conveyed to your office on all points affecting matters of policy or of importance.

4. In the opinion of this Division one of the best guarantees that such a situation will not develop is to provide adequate support for the Civil Police forces at all times, so that they can be sustained by the population in analogy to its support to the civil agencies upon the part of the public. Govt. must not be regarded by itself alone as an encouragement to stamp out raiding of farms, etc. the civil law agencies oppose.
5. The plan is to direct here for approval and subject to such revision as may be directed by the C.C.A.O. will be the basis upon which the operation of the Civil and Special police of H.A.R.P.E.S. will be exercised by the Division.
6. It is contemplated that frequent review of the program will be both desirable and necessary as the conditions become better known this will be done and timely information conveyed to you before any all possible affecting matters of policy & of importance.

DIVISION OF PUBLIC SAFETYCivil Police Section.I. PLAN FOR THE CONTROL OF CIVIL POLICE.1. The Tactical Situation.

- a. Tactical Control. Two contingencies are considered:-  
(1) Progressive occupation against resistance.  
(2) Complete occupation as the result of rapid reduction of the resistance.
- b. AMGOT Control. Two contingencies are considered in the shift <sup>to AMGOT</sup>:-  
(1) Progressive shift, by areas, from tactical to AMGOT control, until the whole of HORNED/ED is occupied.  
(2) Shift of whole of HORNED/ED from tactical to AMGOT control.

2. Civil Affairs Operations of Tactical Forces.a. Control by Tactical Commanders.

- (1) Control will be exercised entirely by the tactical commanders. CAPOs, under directions of CAGs, attached to staffs of tactical commands will act in an advisory capacity only. The use of the civil police in this period is dependent entirely on conditions found and the orders of the tactical commanders, who will enforce the Proclamations, Ordinances and Regulations with the forces under their command. The developments in this period will influence the plans for the shift from the tactical to AMGOT control.

3. Operations of AMGOT during the Period of Tactical Control.

- a. Headquarters AMGOT. During this period the Public Safety Division will be completing plans for the organisation of the civil police system when the control changes.
- b. CAPOs. The field CAPOs will operate under the direction of the tactical commanders but will be required to report on the developments of the situation.
- c. Liaison with Tactical Commands. For the purpose of securing early information on the developments of the situation to make plans for the shift of control to AMGOT it will be necessary to have direct liaison with the tactical commands.

4. AMGOT Control.a. General.

- (1) Before HORNED/ED is completely occupied, civil police in areas outside the combat zones may be controlled by AMGOT.  
(2) After HORNED/ED is completely occupied, civil police of the whole area may be controlled by AMGOT.

- 2 -

- b. Based on these contingencies, plans for the control of the civil police must include:-  
(1) Preparation for the shift from tactical control in any part or all of HONDURAS.  
(2) Control in each area that will fit into a centralised control of HONDURAS later.  
(3) Centralised control of HONDURAS.  
(4) Control of HONDURAS that will fit into later consolidation with larger areas.

5. Preparation for Control by ARMY.

- a. Early contact will be made with tactical commands through liaison officers sent forward to secure the following information:  
(1) Police Control. Civil police agencies on duty and the 443<sup>rd</sup> Wing information on each:-

Jurisdiction
Functions
Strength
Officials
Records
Training
Techniques.

  
(2) Military Control -- actually assigned to control of civil population.  
(3) Regulations in effect -- in addition to Proclamations and Ordinances.  
(4) Strength, dispositions and functions of military police and/or tactical forces assigned to control of the civil population.  
(5) General conditions.
- b. Preparation of Plans. When the foregoing information is complete detailed plans will be made for the use of the civil police available, dates on which they can be placed on duty, duties to which they can be assigned, method of exercising supervision over them, reorganisation in the event of a breakdown and the forces necessary to support the civil police in the event of breakdown.
- c. Implementation of Plan.  
(1) When the plan for control in a particular area has been approved the necessary orders to put it into operation will be issued. In the execution of the plan provisions must be made:-

The organisation of such a force will be limited in general to cities over 10,000. These will be divided in 3 classes as follows:-

- (1) 10,000 to 30,000.
- (2) 30,000 to 75,000.
- (3) Over 75,000.

b. The municipal force will become a part of the civil police force for the whole area if and when it is organised.

2. Decision.

The decision to organise a separate municipal force will be made by the C.G.A.C. on recommendation of the Commissioner of Public Safety, thru channels.

3. Jurisdiction.

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The jurisdiction of the municipal force will be limited to the particular municipality. The jurisdiction in relation to other police agencies will be determined by the Commissioner of Public Safety thru channels.

4. Authority.

Authority for the organisation will be contained in the proclamation providing for the organisation of the Civil Police Force. Should the necessity for the organisation of the municipal force arise in an individual municipality before the civil police force for the whole area has been organised, the Proclamation may be issued in the individual municipality.

5. Selection and Training of Personnel.

Personnel will be selected from residents of the area, preferably residents of the municipality, under direction of the Commissioner of Public Safety.

6. Organisation.

The municipal police force will be organised on the following general lines:-

- (a) Population 10,000 to 30,000 - to be composed of a Headquarters and a Uniform force.
- (b) Population 30,000 to 75,000 - composed of a Headquarters, Uniform Division and a Criminal Investigation Division.

It shall be given the title contained in the Proclamation. This organisation shall include mercantile forces organised in individual municipalities, and shall be under centralised control for the area.

2. Decisions.

The decision to organise this force will be made by the C.C.C.D., on recommendation of the O.P.S.

3. Jurisdiction.

The force shall have complete jurisdiction throughout the area. Separate municipal forces will be made part of the force.

4. Authority.

The authority for the organisation of the police force will be contained in the Proclamation.

7. Duties.

The force will be empowered to enforce the laws specified in Proclamation.

ANNEX IV to PLAN C.Plan for Supporting Forces.1. General.

- (a) Forces to support the civil police agencies and enforce Military Government are necessary for the following reasons:-  
(1) To prevent a sudden collapse of the civil police organisations.  
(2) To support the civil police organisations in the event of a collapse.  
(3) To enforce the laws of the Military Government.
- (b) The initial phase of Military Government will be a crucial period and if a sudden breakdown of the civil police organisations occurs, or if conditions are so chaotic that the laws of Military Government cannot be enforced without assistance from the Military, serious consequences may result. Swift and effective action may be required before the civil agencies can be completely organised.
- (c) An emergency may cause a sudden use of tactical forces. Such action should be averted because it is an improper use of tactical forces and may destroy the good effects of Military Government previously produced. A force trained and experienced in police work is obviously preferable for this duty.
- (d) This plan provides for the use of Supporting Forces, preferably Military Police (British or American), to support the civil police in the period when control shifts from the tactical forces to AMGOT and immediately thereafter. The figures contained herein are on the basis of the American Military Police Battalion (Zone of Interior). The situation may so develop as to make possible the early relief of these forces.

2. Assignments.

- (a) A total of 5 battalions assigned exclusively to Civil Affairs are required. They should be assigned as follows:-

RAGUSA, SIRACUSA, CATANIA.	1 Bn.
MOSCHEA.	1 Bn.
PALERMO.	1 Bn. 1 Co. att.
TRAPANI.	1 Bn. less 1 Co.
ACRIGLIO, MESSINA and CALTAGIRONE.	1 Bn.

- (b) Units of these battalions should be decentralised so as to provide a supporting force in each province.

Annex IV to PLAN C. (Contd.)Plans for Supporting Forces.3. Control.

- (a) A Staff Officer should be appointed to the Staff of the Military Governor or the C.C.A.O., to co-ordinate the operations of the Troops with the Civil Affairs Plan. He should recommend the strength of the force in each province.
- (b) A unit should be assigned to each province. The unit commander should be responsible for performance of the duties assigned to the supporting force and should serve on the staff of the Provincial C.A.O.

4. Duties.

- (a) The supporting forces should be given the exclusive mission of controlling the civil population. Their specific duties should be:-
  - (1) Enforcement of the Proclamations, Ordinances and Regulations of the Military Governor.

In addition, forces garrisoned in the area should be assigned the mission of controlling the population in the event of emergency which is out of control. In such a situation the tactical commander should assume complete control.



There is attached a table showing the number of W.Os, O.R. and E.M. required for this Division at Headquarters and in the Field.

These figures are based on HORNIFIED and on the distribution of C.A.P.Os authorised in Appendix 'D' to the AMGOT plan.

It is felt that no C.A.P.O. can be expected to function effectively in a town if he has not at least one N.C.O. who can be responsible for the office during the C.A.P.Os absence. As will be seen from the notes at the foot of the table a proportion of the Sergeants and Corporals allocated to these duties should be stenographers or copy typists.

No allowance has been made for drivers for the transport requested in my UAM/7836/CA of 12 June 1943, or for batmen.

As there are no Italian speaking officers in this Division, it is suggested that as many as possible of the personnel be supplied should be able to speak and interrogate in that language. This is especially necessary in the Prisons branch. Experience in civil police work is also highly desirable.

It is requested that the personnel asked for should be available when regional government of HORNIFIED is established.

Memorandum on POLICY in OCCUPIED TERRITORY.

25

1. The object of this memorandum is to define a policy of continuity covering the general range of Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention and Civil Defence in any occupied territory.
2. The Civil Defence of occupied territory will vary in its degree of value and importance to Military operations and Allied Policy. This degree will have to be decided by the Tactical Commander on the spot. The system of Civil Defence already existing in the territory concerned must be the basis on which we must work, subject to minimum requirements which will be based on facilities for providing extra appliances and material.  
Generally, however, the following are the main divisions of Civil Defence -
  - (a) In Ports and Bases, Civil Defence is of paramount importance since the dislocation of Public Services and the existence of an uncontrolled, panic-stricken population must hinder the free movement of Military Personnel and Services.

Uncontrolled fire would deprive the Army of storage space and would also offer a valuable guide to E.A..

(b) In large towns, other than Bases, the free passage

The buildings generally are fairly fire resisting as very little wood is used in their construction - the contents would be the main risk. In the larger towns the Commune Police are trained fire fighters.

ADAPTORS WILL BE NEEDED to break down the 8 - 10 mm. screw couplings of the local hose to our 2½ in. instantaneous couplings, and stand pipes with adaptors would have to be carried on our appliances to fit the hydrants which exist in the larger towns.

TOWING VEHICLES or a type to carry extra hose and the crew should be provided with the T.P.s as it might prove impossible to obtain local vehicles in time for immediate action.

There is attached a table showing the number of W.Os, O.R. and E.M. required for this Division at Headquarters and in the Field.

These figures are based on NORMALISED and on the distribution of C.A.P.Os authorised in Appendix 'D' to the AMGOT plan.

It is felt that no C.A.P.O. can be expected to function effectively in a town if he has not at least one N.C.O. who can be responsible for the office during the C.A.P.Os absence. As will be seen from the notes at the foot of the table a proportion of the Sergeants and Corporals allocated to these duties should be stenographers or copy typists.

No allowance has been made for drivers for the transport requested in my 141F/7836/CA of 12 June 1943, or for batmen.

As there are no Italian speaking officers in this Division, it is suggested that as many as possible of the personnel be supplied should be able to speak and interrogate in that language. This is especially necessary in the Prisons branch. Experience in civil police work is also highly desirable.

It is requested that the personnel asked for should be available when regional government of NORMALISED is established.

1. This paper has been examined in 'G' (Mint). It is considered that the situation in NORIN-EDD in regard to civilian P.A.W. requirements has been fully recited. Enemy air attack on his own country is likely to be confined to military objectives and utilities.
2. In regard to equipment, NORIN-EDD has been an active military base for three years, and it has been heavily bombed recently. Civil defence should be fairly well organised, with adequate equipment at hand. To import the large quantities shown on the schedule appears over-insurance, and can only be done at the expense of essential operational tonnage.
3. It is proposed to ask 'G' to have available on call in North Africa not more than 5% of the equipment shown on page 2 of the Civil Defence Advisor's paper. Special consideration should perhaps be given to medical stores.
4. Will you please lay down a policy in regard to those commitments.

Memorandum for discussion with (Mint)

1. This memorandum deals only with the requirements for defence of non-military areas. Military and Naval establishments including harbours and ports will be defended by the respective services.
2. It is felt that very substantial stocks of equipment will remain in the area which were provided by the Axis, and as this will be distributed throughout the area, it is unlikely to be evacuated.
3. It is impossible to foretell what attitude the Axis will take towards bombing their own cities, but it would seem probable that they would be unlikely to concentrate on towns and cities unless they were likely to be military objectives.
4. Under the circumstances it is proposed that a small stockpile of equipment should be collected in North Africa to be called forward as required. This equipment should be 50% of that proposed by Captain Franks.

In reply to questions put to me.

Question 1.

Number of P.D. officers, fire advisors, civil defense liaison officers dependent upon the organization contemplated and the functions of those offices.

(a) I understand it:

(1) The Commanders will be responsible for security of base, will be responsible for minimum attendants, fire prevention, fire fighting, air raid discipline, remote parties, community services, military, demolition, protection of vital points, etc. They will organize military and civilian to this end, using military personnel.

The active civil defense services will be required to cooperate in securing the base against the effects of air attack; therefore, it is up to the base Commander to see that such civil defense services as contribute to their security are as efficient as possible and that their organization fits into his P.D. scheme as closely as possible.

(2) Therefore the P.D. officer, the Long Range Superintendent, the CDS, the USA, and any officers operationally responsible for organization of the Civil Defense Officers or the appropriate service who they require to be done by the civilians.

(3) "Military necessity" will be applied to the military command a whole or any service which contributes toward its security i.e., fire prevention for the while base is a military necessity and will be exercised by the military operational staff through the Civil Defense staff whose civil action is required. The P.D. staff officer is in a different category as his function commitee military and the civil defense organization.

It is recommended that a fairly senior officer should form part of the I(3) staff at HQ to carry out liaison duties with the civil side. It is also recommended that in an Allied force the civil section attached to HQ should have equal representation of the various nations involved." (Paragraph 29)
