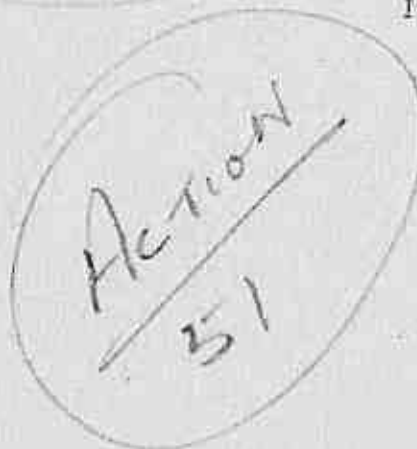

Maj. Petter (1/4 Pantelleria) and Capt. Shure (1/4 Lampedusa - Linosa) arrived here at about the same time a few days ago.

2. As it had already been decided to put Maj. Petter in charge of all 3 islands he coordinated his own + Capt. Shure's requests, enquiries etc. and then dealt with Divisions and myself for all three islands.
3. Acini has been taken direct by Maj. Petter on all questions raised in the reports and he states that he is satisfied on the whole with the solutions offered him.
4. He has obtained two boats from Trapani and with one that is almost ready at Lampedusa he is satisfied that he can maintain communications with Sicily - all mail to + from the islands will be called for at his office when the boats put into Palermo.
5. It was decided that we would not cancel our demands to APTA for five reserve launches as the craft now available are at best a makeshift means of communication and would be little use in an emergency.

2. As it had already been decided to put Maj. Petter in charge of all 3 islands he coordinated his own & Capt. Stone's requests, enquiries etc. and then dealt with Division and myself for all three islands.
3. Action has been taken direct by Maj. Petter on all questions raised in the reports and he states that he is satisfied on the whole with the solutions offered him.
4. He has obtained two boats from Trapani and with one boat is almost ready at Lampedusa. He is satisfied that he can maintain communications with Sicily - all mail to & from the islands will be called for at his office when the boats put into Palermo.
5. It was decided that we would not cancel our demands to ABTA for two more launches as the craft now available are at best a makeshift means of communications and would be little use in an emergency.
6. As regards recent political developments, I have told Maj. Petter that whilst he receives other instructions he should carry on as before.
7. Capt. Stone returned to Lampedusa with the Argentine Lt. from Pantelleria who came over with Maj. Petter. He has given to hand over to his Lt. (for Maj. Petter). Maj. P. will go to Lampedusa as soon as he can.

FINANCE

GENERAL. Up to the present time Pantelleria has been self supporting financially. In 15 weeks its income of lire 1,931,262 has all been obtained from local sources. The expenditure totals lire 689,285, leaving a surplus of lire 1,241,977, which together with a sum of lire 230,000 brought in by Amgot, gives a balance in hand of lire 1,471,977. (see attached Income and Expenditure Acct).

1. TAXES. No taxes, excise licenses or any form of taxation has been collected so far. Tax rolls for 1943 containing State, Provincial and Municipal taxes were given to the Bank of Sicily, who acted as Esattore, on 31 January 43 but the rolls were subsequently lost when the Bank building was destroyed by bombs.

At least two of the bi-monthly payments must have been collected before our occupation. The money collected was held by the Bank and was presumably part of the 3 million lire stolen from the bank safe.

The only records on the island of these payments are the receipts held by the payers.

The rolls of State and Provincial taxes will have to be obtained from Trapani. The rolls of Municipal Taxes are available and collection could commence at once.

Of the Tax collecting staff, the Esattore, who was also the Bank manager, fled to Italy before the Invasion, but his place could be filled by the cashier who is still on the island. The staffs of the Agenzia degli Imposti and of the Ufficio de Registro are also available.

2. BANK OF SICILY. There is only one bank on the island, which is a branch of the Bank of Sicily. The building was completely destroyed and I understand that a sum of 3 million lire was stolen from their safe. So far only lire 65,621 has been recovered.

The books were saved and show approximately 2,000 credit customers totalling 20 million lire. The major portion represents savings and about one-third is due to clients who have left the island.

The cashier and teller are still here and would be capable of running the bank.

In order to assist trade and employment it is essential that the islanders be allowed to withdraw some of their credits from the bank and would recommend that the bank be opened.

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3; POST OFFICE. This is closed. A sum of lire 28,353, together with a stock of stamps, was taken over after the occupation.

LEGAL.

1. GENERAL. Prior to Allied occupation or one court, presided over by the Pretore, functioned on the island. The Pretore was Greco Salvatore who was appointed by Trapani and who returned to Sicily, together with his clerk, shortly before the occupation.

There was also the Office of Conciliamento and a native of the island, Ing. Valenza, was appointed honorary (unpaid) Conciliatore. The Office does not appear to have functioned at all.

There were also four lawyers on Pantelleria. Two of them, Valenza Michele and Lauria Giovanni, are still here; the other two, Brignone Michele and Pina Tommaso, were deported. All had private practises.

2. PRESENT POSITION. The only court functioning now is the Summary Military Court which tries all violations against the Proclamations, as well as all offences against the Italian Penal Code. The approximate number of offences against the Italian Penal Code is 40% of the total number of all offences.

There are also numerous cases of a civil nature involving division of property, matrimonial matters, etc., which can only be dealt with in an Italian civil court and on which we can at the moment only offer advice.

It is therefore recommended that:-

- (a) The Italian court be re-opened.
- (b) The Pretore or other qualified official be sent from Sicily (Trapani).
- (c) The office of Conciliatore be re-opened.

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CIVILIAN SUPPLY DIVISION.

GENERAL. The island depended almost entirely on its exports of wine, grapes and raisins for its income, together with its sales to the large Italian and German garrisons in later years. The island does not produce food in any quantity and has always been dependent on its imports for its feeding.

It would be better to substitute pasta for the meat and rice.

Bakeries have been opened this week for the civilian population.

2. TRANSPORT. Enemy transport has been repaired and is being used on enemy fuel.

A bus service has also been instituted to deal with the re-grouping of the population on the island.

3. AGRICULTURE. This month the crop of stalkless raisins, approx. 700 tons, was sold to A.F.H.Q. at 6 francs per pound and we are awaiting confirmation. They require the raisins in 10Kg. boxes and approximately 70,000 boxes are required to complete the order. Also 2,800 Kgs. of nails and oiled paper are necessary.

There is also approx. 500 quintals of Malaga raisins at about lire 2,500 per ql. and some 100,000 litres of Moscato wine at say 18 lire per litre unsold. Both these products were

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Normally sold in Sicily.

In order to assist the food question I would recommend that the following seeds be shipped over for sale to the farmers:-

Potatoes	200 quintals

Coarse salt is needed, 50 quintals, for curing skins.

Another crop normally exported was capers, of which there are 4,000 qls. The average selling price was about 800 lire per ql. but I presume that they would have no market value in these times.

4. FISHING AND SEA TRANSPORT. It would be of great value if the Pantescan sailing boats which were caught in Sicilian Harbours at the time of our invasion could be returned to us. Not only would they resume fishing and ease the food situation but they would also be utilised for the exchange of commodities with North Africa, Sicily and Lampedusa. They would also be used for bringing over the food supplies from N. Africa and obviate the use of military transport.

The list of boats ~~are~~ attached.

5. CIVILIAN LABOUR. Employment on the island has always been restricted to agriculture and the employees of shops, traders and commercial houses of Pantelleria town.

Since the occupation some 300 men were employed by the military on essential works, together with another 250 employed by us. The military have now left and the only men employed are those working for Amgot.

Most of the agriculturalists are also owners of their land and are working gathering the grape crops, preparing raisins, etc., but the real stumbling block is the lack of ready money owing to the closure of the Bank. If the bank was re-opened rebuilding of houses, warehouses, shops, etc., would be intensified and employment given to many.

6. ELECTRICITY AND WATER. To obviate the transport of kerosene for lighting purposes from the mainland electricity is being provided to the villages. The power is from enemy generators running on enemy fuel and the fixtures and wiring are also enemy property. A charge of lire 20 per month is made for each 20 watt lamp placed in the house.

The water used by the householders is rain water which is collected in cisterns under the houses. During the dry months this is amplified by water carts to deliver to houses, they drawing their water from the two wells near the port. The wells have been put right and tested and the electrical pumps repaired.

PUBLIC HEALTH DIVISION.

35

The ex-Italian Naval Hospital has been converted into a civilian hospital, staffed by Italian Medical Officers and orderlies. There are besides four civilian practitioners and one dentist.

The hospital is fairly well stocked with medicines but needs vaccination serums and dental products as per attached list.

There is also one mental case, PUCCI Giovanni, who is under restraint at the moment. We have no facilities for this type of case and would recommend that he be transferred.

RELIEF. In the early days after the occupation relief was given in food, but this month it was altered to a Cash relief, based on the same scale as in use in Sicily. There are approximately 300 families on relief at the moment with about another 100 to be added on further investigation. Not all these people are actually paupers; some have money in the bank but no actual means of livelihood. Practically all were employed in Pantelleria town, which no longer exists.

PUBLIC SAFETY DIVISION.

There are 25 C RR. and 1 Officer on the land and nine police stations. The CC.RR. badly need uniforms and are at present dressed in all types of military, semi-military and civilian clothes.

A building has been adapted as a prison, although up till the present offences have been punished by fines.

There is no Fire Brigade or Civil Defence on the island.

Some 6,000 Identity Cards have been prepared and are ready for issue with the exception of the photographs. If photographs are essential, the necessary materials must be supplied from outside sources.

EDUCATION.

There were on the island 13 schools up to the fifth class prior to the occupation. There were also 24 teachers, of which 19 are still here.

Subject - Setting up Meteorological Observing Station on Pantelleria

1. Communications

- a) Fullaphone to Lampedusa This was discontinued about a week ago when the operating detachment of 323 Wing was withdrawn on instructions from 242 Group. It has now been moved to 897 AMES site and passed as in good order by Lt Luxton, A Form Sign attached 242 Group who supervised the change over. Communication with Lampedusa has not been resumed as presumably the watch there was discontinued without some arrangements having been made to open up again when ready on the new site. A letter has been sent via Sousse on the 21st by F/Lt McLaren asking that a daily call be made from Lampedusa and arrangements have been made at this end for 897 AMES to listen out at 1100 hrs daily wef 22nd. Lt Luxton has awaited air passage to Lampedusa for three days but repeated requests to 242 Group have produced nothing. He returned to Tunis on 21st but as he may still be some days getting across to Lampedusa, the letter was sent to try to speed up resumption of contact between Pantelleria and Lampedusa.
- b) W/T to mainland. This is done by 897 AMES to Tunis Fighter Sector at Sebala, using a GP set and three operators. It is an aircraft plotting wave and the CO of the unit F/L Hall stated that he could not make regular collection of Fullaphone reports and transmission of met messages. In any case it was prob ble that his unit would not be remaining on the island for more than a few weeks.
- c) For future operations It will be necessary to send a fully equipped W/T unit (1 Corporal Mechanic and 3 operators was suggested by Lt Luxton) in order to collect and transmit regular weather reports from Pantelleria and Lampedusa as the present local services are uncertain and inadequate.

Further to our conversation (Col Spofford and Major Petter) in Algiers re the above subject, I contacted 216 Gp RAF at LaMarsa, but they cannot lay on any ferry service unless they obtain orders through higher authorities. They suggest that Amgot Headquarters should apply through usual channels.

There is a service running at the moment from LaMarsa via Sicily, Pantelleria and back to LaMarsa which commenced on 9 September and runs alternate days. The plane has a capacity of one hundred pounds and a place for one passenger.

This service is run by NAAF with the photographic section under Major Humbrecht.

The service is actually irregular and does not always run on its stated days.

I would suggest that a definite ferry system be asked for say twice weekly.

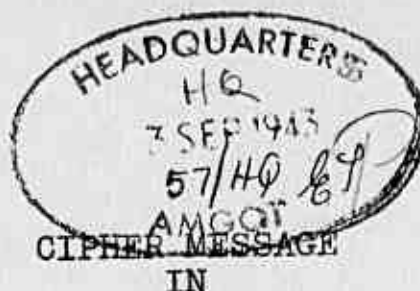

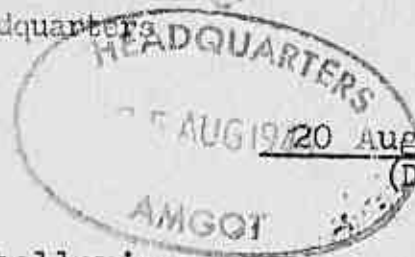
