SUBJECT: Report on Catania Province.

TO : Brig-General McSHERRY, DCCAO, AMGOT.

1. In addition to my other duties of a special nature of which a special report has been submitted, herewith, is a brief summary of my observations on the operation and organization of SCAO headquarters, Catania Province.

2. General Estimate SCAO (Lt Col WELLESLEY (BR)): This officer impresses me as being conversant with his duties and problems connected therewith. He seems to have a more thorough knowledge of important details concerning his province than any other SCAO I have seen to date.

3. Relationship SCAO with Italian Prefect: From casual conversation I learned that relationship of our SCAO with the Italian Prefect was harmonious and effective.

4. Physical Set-up of Provincial Headquarters: All officers in one building. His officers are billeted and mess in two main groups. I ate in the Jr. mess and it was the best mess I have seen in Sicily.


5. Problems: (Military: In order of Priority.):

a. Transportation: He has only about 17 trucks for transportation of food. These are captured Italian Army trucks for the most part. States that he needs at least 30 to 35 in order to move daily average of about 100 tons of food. He has a very heavily populated area in and around Catania.

b. Personnel: Needs six administrative men as CAO's at present. Of the thirty-five officers assigned to his province he states twenty-nine of them are specialists. Needs enlisted typists, stenographers, and interpreters who can speak, read and write Italian.

6. Problems: (Civilian: In order of Priority.): Fuel, electric power, construction materials, medical supplies.

7. Conclusion and Recommendations: Believe this SCAO will function quite well if given additional needs of personnel and transportation as indicated above.

SUBJECT: Informal Report on my visit to Messina Province 13-15 Sept 1943 inclusive.

TO : Brig-General McSHERRY, DCCAO, AMGOT.

1. In addition to my other duties of a special nature of which a special report has been submitted, herewith, is a brief summary of my observations on the operation and organization of SCAO headquarters, Messina Province.

2. General Estimate of SCAO, (Lt Col STORY): This man impresses me as rather slow in motion, and inclined to do many things himself rather than to organize his headquarters into an efficient operating team. He has some tact and is fairly active in his own way. Compared with other SCAO's I have seen, I would rate him average. His executive officer, Major DEUTSCH is inclined to "assume command".

3. Relationship of SCAO and Italian Prefect: The necessary contact with the Italian Provincial Prefect in this province is almost non-existent. The headquarters of the SCAO has moved into Messina and out again to a Villa near the junction of the Messina and Milazzo roads. The relocation of SCAO headquarters in Messina should bring about more direct contact between the SCAO and the Provincial Prefect.

4. Physical Set-up of Provincial Headquarters: As explained above this has been unsettled, largely I believe, because Messina was under shell fire and enemy bombardment until 13 September 1943. The SCAO has now moved his headquarters in one building in Messina. Officers will mess and billet together so I understood.

5. Problems: (Military: In order of Priority.):
a. Transportation: Needs at least twenty, 2½-ton trucks for distribution and procurement of wheat and flour.
b. Personnel: Needs four officers with administrative and executive ability. Needs eight stenographers, typists and clerks for his whole province. Needs about two good interpreters for his headquarters. These must be capable of reading, writing and transcribing Italian. Needs one Military Police Company for control, security and administration problem.

6. Problems: (Civilian: In order of Priority.):
a. Grain or flour in sufficient quantities to provide 150 grams per person per day. Population has been existing on 50 grams of bread per person per day for some months. Building material (road and rail), Medical supplies, as parts of Messina Province are now highly malarial in character.

7. Conclusion and Recommendations:

- a. That the following up by this headquarters should be made within ten days to ascertain the relationship between our SCAO Messina, and Italian Prefect of Messina Province, and to ascertain if they are functioning properly.
- b. As people move back into Messina from other towns and from other provinces, the food situation becomes more acute daily. Accordingly, we should augment our provisions of food for this province.
- c. That a Military Police Company be furnished for use in this province.

SUBJECT: Report of Special Mission of Delivery of Flour and other food supplies to Messina Province during period 12-15 Sept/43 incl.

TO : Brig-General McSHERRY, DCCAO, AMGOT.

SECTION I.

1. In accordance with your oral instructions concerning the delivery of grain and flour and other food products to the Messina Province, the following report is submitted.

2. A total of 150 tons of food, (120 tons of flour, 10 tons of milk, 20 tons of C-rations, American), were loaded and shipped by naval transportation (LCT 198) from Palermo to Messina during night and day of 12-13 September 1943. Arrangements had been made by Lt Col STORY, SCAO, for unloading this shipment at Milazzo. Trucks there had been assembled and a British labor team had been provided. LCT was expeditiously unloaded and much of the flour was distributed direct from the boat to the communes.

3. With respect to the 240 tons of flour shipped on the three Italian schooners from Palermo to Messina during the period 12-15 September 1943, report that this shipment arrived at Messina approximately 30 hours after its departure from Palermo. Lt Col STORY, SCAO of Messina Province arranged the unloading and distribution of the flour. Unloading was completed about 4 PM 15 September 1943.

4. With respect to the delivery of 300 tons of flour from the stock pile at Catania to Messina Province, I have found that 1st Lt LOFASO, the officer in charge of the stock pile, had received instructions issued by you to deliver this amount of flour to the SCAO, Messina Province on call.

5. Lt Col STORY understood that he was to send for this amount of flour for use in Messina Province, and that he had made provisions to begin hauling this flour 16 September 1943.

6. I consulted with Lt Col RODD, SCAO, Enna, at this headquarters on the morning of the 16th of September and he reported to me that he understood that he was to furnish Messina Province 40 tons of flour or grain per day. That at present he was not furnishing that amount, that the procurement and transportation were both not yet up to that figure. That Messina Province is now receiving approximately 10 tons of grain or flour per day from Enna Province.

7. I have found that Major CHAFFIN, (BR), of Civilian Supply section this Hq, had set in motion all the above in accordance with your X

instructions, prior to my arrival. Also found that there was some lack of coordination between the operating personnel involved, largely because of lack of information reaching the proper administration heads. This was easily and properly corrected by me.

8. Lt Col STORY reported to me that to the best of his knowledge the civilian people in Messina Province as a whole were receiving about 50 grams of flour per person per day. That the procurement of the above emergency food would assist him in bringing it up to 150 grams per person per day. However, to do this it would be necessary to continue shipments of grain and flour into his area similar to the above operation every 5 or 6 days.

SECTION II

1. Civilians are clamoring to return to their homes and are using every device possible to do so. As a result of this they crowd on all AMGOT transportation. The drivers of the trucks, and carabinieri, and Military Police, are failing to keep them off.

2. There is much movement by cart, chiefly of household goods. These are a great nuisance on roads, particularly on mountain passes, and are interfering with military convoys, despite the efforts of everyone. This is particularly true in Messina and Catania Provinces at this time.

3. There is some looting by American and British soldiers, mostly of things to make them comfortable such as chairs, radios, tables, and other articles of furniture.

4. The support of the field forces by AMGOT personnel is still very great. The SCAO of Catania Province told me that 60% of the efforts of he and his personnel was in support of the field forces.

5. Transportation of supplies for the civilian population is a very urgent problem.

6. The SCAO of both Catania and Messina Province request that a few good administrative officers be assigned to them who have executive ability. They each stated that they had too many "experts" now. They also reported a great need for a few trained stenographers, typists, and interpreters who could speak, read and write Italian.

7. Recommendations:

a. That we continue our efforts to provide bread in sufficient quantities to Messina Province to keep up a level of 150 grams.

b. That we continue the present efforts to make available additional transportation of dependable character for the entire region.

c. That this headquarters insist that the SCAO headquarters organize administratively so that they can operate as an efficient team. J267

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

I -- GENERAL

1. Definition. Lend-Lease is the transfer to an allied government under the provisions of the Lend-Lease Act, of defense articles, facilities, information, or services. The provisions of this memorandum are not to be confused with Reciprocal Aid (supplies and equipment received by U.S. forces from an allied government), the method for the reporting of which is the subject of another directive of this headquarters, namely, Administrative Memorandum Number 8, en.

2. Statutory Requirements.

a. In accordance with the Lend-Lease Act of 11 March 1941 (Public Law 11, 77th Congress; 55 Stat. 31; 22 U.S. 411, and following sections), the War Department is required to maintain complete records of all defense articles, facilities, information or services transferred to foreign governments under the provisions of the Act.

b. All transactions carried out in this theater which result in aid or assistance being rendered to a Lend-Lease country, as defined above, will be included in this record, and will be reported as prescribed herein. Shipments consigned to the Theater Commander earmarked for transfer to a specific Lend-Lease country after arrival will not be reported. However, a separate statement will be prepared to report all diversions of such shipments from the country for which originally intended. This statement will be prepared in accordance with the form attached hereto (Appendix Number 1), and will be marked clearly to indicate the country for which originally intended, and the country to which diverted.

II - TRANSFER PROCEDURE

1. Method of Transfer.

a. Normal

All transfers of U.S. property, facilities, information, or services, to a Lend-Lease government from stocks on hand in this theater will be authorized and directed by the Theater Commander. Normally, issues will be made by the Commanders of the base sections, XII Air Force Service Command, and by the Director

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General of Military Railway Service. For the purpose of effecting formal transfer, the issuing unit will prepare a shipping ticket, tally-out ticket, or similar issue voucher in sextuplicate. Such issue voucher will include a description of the items transferred, the unit and total dollar value thereof, and the unit or organization to which issued. It will be marked clearly "ISSUED TO (name of service of allied government)", and all copies will be signed in ink by a duly authorized commissioned officer of the receiving government. Estimated prices will be indicated as such on shipping tickets, with the basis therefor. For other than Air Corps technical supplies, specific letter or cable authority from this headquarters will be cited, and in the case of Air Corps technical supplies, WD Circular AG 452 (9 June 43) OB-S-U-M 23 June 43, subject: "Policy Relating to Supply of Maintenance Parts for American Built Aircraft and Aeronautical Equipment Operated by Allied Forces" will be cited. One copy of the shipping ticket will be delivered to the receiving officer, one copy will be retained by the issuing officer, and four copies will be forwarded to the appropriate base section, Air Force Depot, or the Director General, of Military Railway Service, as the case may be.

b. Emergency.

Authorized issues made in the field by commanders of combat units will be supported by four signed copies of shipping tickets which will be forwarded, through channels, to the appropriate base section commander, as outlined in paragraph 1a above.

2. Valuation.

All transfers of property or services of any nature to a Lend-Lease government, as provided herein, will be evaluated in terms of dollars. Standard list prices or catalog prices will be used wherever possible. In the absence of list or catalog prices, prices will be estimated, using for that purpose any information available. Such estimates may be made by the general purchasing agents, SOS, MATUSA, base sections, Air Service Command, the Director General of Military Railway Service, or local issuing officers. If, after exhausting every known source of information, it is determined to be impossible to place a value on any particular transfer, a supplementary statement will be attached to the report listing in detail the purpose classification, item, and quantity transferred, whether for military or civilian use, the recipient government, and the branch of service responsible. This statement will contain a complete description of the item transferred, using standard U.S. nomenclature and part number wherever possible, in order that a value may be assigned upon receipt of the report in Washington.

III - REPORTING PROCEDURE

1. Records and Reports.

To insure that a proper charge is made against the allied government concerned for deliveries of Lend-Lease supplies and equipment from U.S. stocks, commanders of the base sections, XIII Air Force Service Command, and the Director General of Military Railway Service, will, as of the end of each month, summarize on "Report of Lend-lease Transfers", IAD Form No. DDA 7B (Appendix No. 1) all

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Shipping tickets, tally-out tickets, or similar issue vouchers, A separate form will be submitted by each supply service. Reports will be submitted in quintuplicate, supported by copies of shipping tickets, tally-out tickets, or similar issue vouchers, in triplicate. Separate reports will be rendered for each government. Negative reports will be submitted, where applicable, on the required form.

2. Period of Report.

The first report under this directive will cover all deliveries of Lend-Lease supplies and equipment up to and including 30 June 1943, and will reach the Lend-Lease Section, Finance Department, Headquarters MATOUSA, APO 534, U.S. Army, on or before 1 October 1943. Reports for July and August will also be submitted on or before 1 October 1943. Subsequent reports will be submitted as of the end of each month, and will reach this headquarters not later than the 15th of the month following. Shipping tickets already forwarded to this headquarters will be summarized by the Chief Finance Officer in his initial report.

3. Bi-Monthly Reports

The Chief Finance Officer, this headquarters, is charged with the responsibility of consolidating Lend-Lease reports, and of rendering cumulative reports as of the last day of the months of August, October, December, February, April and June, to the International Aid Division, Headquarters, Army Service Forces, Washington 25, D. C.

4. Classification

All transfers reported will be classified in accordance with the attached "Purpose Classification for Lend-Lease Transfers" (Appendix No. 2). All items falling within a single purpose classification will be summarized in one dollar figure, and no detail by item will be reported within the classification.

5. Instruction for Preparation.

The attached form will be reproduced on 8 x 13 paper, and will be prepared as follows:

a. Column (1) Enter purpose classification number and description, in accordance with Appendix No. 2.

b. Column (2) Enter the dollar value of transfers for military use made during the period covered by the report.

c. Column (3) Enter the cumulative dollar total of transfers for military use to reflect total transfers for the current and all previous reports.

d. Column (4) Enter the dollar value of transfers for civilian use made during the period covered by the report.

e. Column (5) Enter the cumulative dollar total of transfers for civilian use to reflect total transfers for the current and all previous reports.

f. Column (6) Enter total transfers both civilian and military for the period covered by the report (Column (2) plus Column (4).)

g. Column (7) Enter cumulative transfers for both military and civilian use to reflect total transfers for current and all previous reports (Column (3) plus Column (5).)

SUBJECT: Civilian Ration for Italy
TO : 15th Army Group for AMG
Joint Asst. Chiefs of Staff for Armistice C.C., Tizi Ouzou

I. ACTION REQUIRED BY AMG.

A. Temporary Ration Scale.

1. Conditions relating to availability of supplies for civilian use make it imperative that you reducible your efforts to use local foodstuffs to the maximum, supplementing with AMG supplies only in an emergency.

2. Refer to AG 400-1 (AMGOT) 31 Aug 43, with special emphasis on pars 1 and 5 (Annex I).

3. It will be impossible to exceed the total provision of basic items ex U.S., as phased for AMG Regions, which has been agreed as follows:

October	15,000 tons
November	35,000 "
December	50,000 "
(Jan., Feb., Mar., 1944)	total of 175,000 tons as yet unphased.)

4. To assure adequate subsistence for civilian population and to properly control the distribution of AMG supplies;

(a) You will adopt a ration scale which will not exceed an average maximum of 2000 calories per person daily, as provided by Basic Ration for Italian Subsistence (ANNEX II). This was prepared by AFHQ medical and nutrition experts.

(b) Use as reference all available data including:

(1) Basic Ration for Supplemental Feeding
(Annex III)
Cheat

(2) Caloric Content of Local Foodstuffs
(Annex IV)

(3) Italy: Subsistence Deficiencies and
Supplies (Annex 7)

Local foodstuffs to the maximum, supplementing with AMG supplies only in an emergency.

2. Refer to AG 400-1 (AMGOT) 31 Aug 43, with special emphasis on pars 1 and 5 (Annex I).

3. It will be impossible to exceed the total provision of basic items ex U.S., as phased for AMG Regions, which has been agreed as follows:

October	15,000 tons
November	35,000 "
December	50,000 "
(Jan., Feb., Mar., 1944 total of 175,000 tons as yet unphased.)	

4. To assure adequate subsistence for civilian population and to properly control the distribution of AMG supplies,

exceed an average maximum of 2000 calories which will not provided by Basic Ration for Italian Subsistence (ANNEX II), as was prepared by AFHQ medical and nutrition experts.

- (b) Use as reference all available data including:

- (1) Basic Ration for Supplemental Feeding
(Annex III)
Caloric Content
- (2) Caloric Content of Local Foodstuffs
(Annex IV)
- (3) Italy: Subsistence Deficiencies and Surplus (Annex V)

5. You will reexamine immediately the present ration established in par 4 to insure that the maximum caloric standards in Regions I, II and III are not exceeded.

6. Every effort will be made to provide foodstuffs in the order of priority from:

- (a) Local resources entirely.
 - (b) Local resources plus minimum amount of AMG supplies.
 - (c) AMG supplies entirely (emergency).
7. Action taken on above will be reported to AFHQ.

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1. Since Basic Rations for Italian Subsistence, cited in par A 4, has been based on estimated figures, it is necessary that you initiate a careful and comprehensive study of the actual minimum nutritional maintenance needs of the people now under your control in Regions I, II, III and in other Regions as they come under AMG.

2. A consolidated report of this study should be forwarded to AFHQ by 1 December 1943. Upon receipt, the Temporary Ration scale, par A, will be reviewed.

II. ACTION REQUIRED BY ARMISTICE C.C., TIZI OUZOU.

A. 1. You will review immediately your ration plans for those Regions (not including Regions I, II and III) to come under your control using all available data including those in Annex I - V (inclusive).

2. Submit the results of your studies to AFHQ by
1 November 1943.

B. 1. Upon assuming authority over a Region you will supplement your preliminary estimates by a comprehensive field study of the actual minimum nutritional maintenance needs ~~in~~ ~~of~~ ~~each~~ ~~an~~ area(s).

2. A report of this study should be forwarded to AFHQ sixty (60) days after taking over active control of a Region.

SUBJECT: Civilian Supply in Occupied Countries.

TO : All concerned.

1. The Commander-in-Chief, Allied Force, is responsible for the administration of occupied territory, including the procurement and distribution, where necessary, of minimum essential civilian supplies. For a period, presumed to be not less than 90 days, beginning with occupation and ending at the discretion of the Commander-in-Chief, Allied Force, such civilian supplies will be procured and distributed by military agencies.

2. The Military Government Section, this headquarters, will be responsible for the estimation of minimum essential civilian requirements, through coordination with the General (G-4) and Special Staff Sections, this headquarters, and for the coordination of supply plans and requisitions with Task Force Commanders.

3. This headquarters will be responsible for review and coordination of Military Government Section estimates with regard to the overall supply plan, and for review and forwarding of all requisitions from Task Force Commanders to appropriate supply agencies. The Military Government Section, this headquarters, will be responsible for the review and edit of requisitions to eliminate items and quantities which are not essential.

4. Task Force Commanders will be responsible for the preparation of phased lists of minimum essential civilian supplies, in normal Army requisition form, as soon as planning for an occupation permits. All such requisitions will be forwarded direct to this headquarters.

5. Initially, the Task Force Commander, later the General Officer Commander-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, will be responsible for calling forth supplies previously requisitioned, and the requisition of such additional supplies as determined normally by actual survey of occupied territory as may be found necessary to meet the minimum essential needs of the civilian population. However, before calling forth additional supplies, he will take fullest advantage of existing local resources and captured material available to him. He will insure that requisitions are in accordance with approved policies. The General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group will include in his requisitions those items deemed essential for emergency re-establish-

the Commander-in-Chief, Allied Force, such civilian supplies
be procured and distributed by military agencies.

2. The Military Government Section, this headquarters, will
be responsible for the estimation of minimum essential civilian
requirements, through coordination with the General (G-4) and
Special Staff Sections, this headquarters, and for the coordination
of supply plans and requisitions with Task Force Commanders.

3. This headquarters will be responsible for review and co-
ordination of Military Government Section estimates with regard to
the overall supply plan, and for review and forwarding of all re-
quisitions from Task Force Commanders to appropriate supply
agencies. The Military Government Section, this headquarters,
will be responsible for the review and edit of requisitions to
eliminate items and quantities which are not essential.

4. Task Force Commanders will be responsible for the
preparation of phased lists of minimum essential civilian supplies,
in normal Army requisition form, as soon as planning for an
operation permits. All such requisitions will be forwarded direct
to this headquarters.

5. Initially, the Task Force Commander, later the General
Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, will be responsible
for calling forth supplies previously requisitioned, and the re-
quisition of such additional supplies as determined normally by
actual survey of occupied territory as may be found necessary to
meet the minimum essential needs of the civilian population.
However, before calling forth additional supplies, he will take
fullest advantage of existing local resources and captured [REDACTED]
material available to him. He will insure that requisitions are
in accordance with approved policies. The General Officer
Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group will include in his re-
quisitions those items deemed essential for emergency re-establish-
ment of utilities in the occupied areas if necessary to meet
military requirements.

6. Requisitions will be compiled and submitted by supply
branch: Quartermaster, Medical, Engineer, etc. (U.S.); and Supply
& Transport, Medical, Ordnance, etc., (Fr.) using appropriate
standard forms insofar as is practicable. In all cases, re-
quisitions will be accompanied by sufficient information to ex-
plain and justify the use to which the supplies are to be put.

7. It will be the responsibility of the Supply Services
(U.S. and Br.) to meet requisitions approved by this headquarters.
U.S. Agencies will stockpile, within the theater, appropriate
amounts of approved items of civilian supply in accordance with
approved requisitions, by drawing upon the following sources, in

1. The following material on ration requirements for relief in Italy is based on minimum physiological needs of the various classes of population present. It must be emphasized that the figures given are only estimates based on the limited information available. These figures should only be used for the preliminary calculations needed to initiate the relief program. A careful study of nutritional requirements should be immediately initiated by the Military Government Section to determine actual nutritional maintenance needs of the Italian people. When the results of this study are completed they should form the basis for shipment of food products for relief of food shortage in Italy.

COMMAND AND ADMINISTRATION OF SICILY

1. GENERAL. a. In accordance with policy for the organization and military administration of ITALY contained in Administrative Memorandum Number 63, this headquarters, cs, No. 1 District has been established to provide for the command and administrative control of SICILY as part of the British L of C (Communications Zone).

b. It is intended that the whole of SICILY, including the AGADEAN Islands, shall eventually come under the control of No. 1 District. While, U.S. field formations, U.S. supplies and base depots remain on the island, there will be an interim period in which the island will be divided for administrative purposes into:

- (1) No. 1 District controlling the former 8th Army area.
- (2) Island Base Section controlling the 7th Army area.

As U.S. field formations are withdrawn from SICILY the area controlled by the Island Base Section will reduced to an area around PALERMO in which U.S. stores and depots will be located until the base section is closed.

c. The boundary between No. 1 District and Island Base Section area will be defined by this headquarters based on recommendation of the General Officer Commanding, No. 1 District in consultation with the Commanding General, Seventh Army and the Commanding Officer, Island Base Section. Subsequent changes in the boundary will be similarly defined as they become necessary. The General Officer Commanding, No. 1 District will be responsible for defining boundaries of Base Areas within No. 1 District, and will report them to this headquarters.

2. COMMAND. a. No. 1 District will be directly under command of this headquarters.

b. Island Base Section will remain under command of Commanding General, Communications Zone.

c. Headquarters, Seventh Army and Headquarters, 30 Corps, and all troops assigned to these formations will be under the command of this headquarters for all purposes except administration as defined in par. 3, below.

d. Troops in SICILY assigned to 15th Army Group and No. 2 District will remain under the command of these formations for all purposes except local administration as defined in par. 3, below.

e. Command of Antiaircraft units under the operational supervision of AA and CD Section, this headquarters, will be in accordance with Operation Memorandum Number 12, this headquarters, cs.

3. ADMINISTRATION. a. No. 1 District will be responsible for:

- (1) Local administration of all British troops, except for discipline and military secretary matters with regard to troops under command of 15th Army Group, 30 Corps and No. 2 District, who will remain under 15th Army Group, this headquarters and No. 2 District respectively, for these purposes.
- (2) Supply of items common to ground and air forces for all British forces in SICILY.
- (3) Supply of motor transport petrol for all British and U.S. forces in No. 1 District.
- (4) Delivery of U.S. supplies which are unloaded at ports in No. 1 District to U.S. depots, in conjunction with the Island Base Section.

b. Island Base Section will be responsible for:

- (1) Administration and supply of all U.S. troops.
- (2) Supply of items common to ground and air forces for all U.S. forces in SICILY.
- (3) Supply of motor transport petrol for all U.S. and British forces in Island Base Section.
- (4) Delivery of British supplies which are unloaded at ports in Island Base Section to British depots, in conjunction with No. 1 District.


c. Common supply policies and their execution, and other matters of international concern as long as Island Base Section continues to exist will be coordinated by Headquarters, No. 1 District in consultation with Island Base Section.

4. MOVEMENT AND TRANSPORTATION. a. Movement between No. 1 District and Island Base Section will be coordinated by Headquarters, No. 1 District in consultation with Island Base Section.

- b. Island Base Section will be responsible for the operation of ports and transportation agencies within Island Base Section area.
- c. The control of movement and transportation within No. 1 District and of movement through No. 1 District, will be exercised in accordance with a directive to be issued separately by this headquarters to the General Officer Commanding, No. 1 District.
- d. No. 1 District and Island Base Section will deal direct with 15th Army Group and No. 2 District with regard to details of movements of units between SICILY and ITALY.
5. DEFENSE. a. The final garrison of SICILY will probably comprise British garrison battalions and one Italian infantry division.
- b. While U.S. and British field formations remain in the island, the Commanding General, Seventh Army and General Officer Commanding, 30 Corps will be responsible for the ground defense and security of Island Base Section area, and No. 1 District, respectively. When field formations are withdrawn, the General Officer Commanding, No. 1 District will assume responsibility for the ground defense and security of the whole of SICILY including Island Base Section area.
- c. Naval defense of ports and coastal area, and antiaircraft defense, will be carried out in accordance with policy contained in Operation Memorandum Number 12, this headquarters, es.
6. MILITARY GOVERNMENT. a. General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group will continue to act as Military Governor (SICILY) until the military government of the island is under control of this headquarters.
- b. The existing system of Allied Military Government, under the direction and control of the Chief, Civil Affairs Officer, will remain in operation.

The purpose of (2) is to facilitate quick reference on the part of the transmitting agency - Tampa Section.

NOTE: ROUTINE CABLES ARE TO BE PREPARED IN THE FORMS PRESCRIBED FOR THIS SECTION.

2. Submission: Preparation and initials:

- (1) All cables will be submitted by the initials of the originating office, typed in the upper portion of the cable, and initials will appear in the lower left-hand corner of the blank. Such initials will be on the carbon copy only.
- (2) All cables will be authorized for transmission by the signature of the Adjunct General of this organization, or of one of his specially appointed assistants.

SUBJECT: Motor Vehicles and Gasoline Conservation

To : All heads of Sub-Commissions, Sections, Commands,
R.C.A.F., Region 1.

Requisitioned civilian passenger motor vehicles, (not load-carrying vehicles) now in use by A.F.S.-A.C.F. personnel on the Island of Sicily will be returned to owners or custodians, effective immediately, unless such successor will be seriously detrimental to vital projects. Vehicles it is found necessary to retain under the above exception will be reported to this Headquarters on or before 5 Oct. 1945 by letter stating the necessity for their retention and the type of vehicle.

2. Effective immediately no additional civilian passenger motor vehicles will be requisitioned by A.F.S. personnel without prior approval of commanding officer.

3. Civilian passenger vehicles, requisitioned or rented on own basis, shall not hereafter be used for any purely personal transit, i.e., from office to office, office to home, vice versa, or for any other than official purposes.

4. Motor vehicles released in accordance with paragraph 1 will be delivered to headquarters garages, (1 or 2), Palermo. Details of all known facts concerning vehicle will be made the subject of letter to this Headquarters, and will include (a) make, (b) model, (c) body type, (d) license or serial number, (e) owner's name, (f) source from which obtained, (g) date obtained, (h) commission, sub-section or branch returning, (i) other known facts which may assist in return of vehicle.

5. Captured stocks of gasoline are rapidly becoming exhausted and drastic reductions have been made in allotment of gasoline to A.F.S.-A.C.F., effective 1 Oct. It is necessary that utmost conservation be exercised to reduce use of gasoline.

1. This Directive indicates the policy for "screening" Italian officials which will be carried out by all means.

2. The screening will be the responsibility of the S.A.O. and will be aimed to eliminate officials of the following categories:

- (a) Fascist and Nazi sympathizers;
- (b) Those who have actively helped the enemy;
- (c) Those potentially dangerous to the security of the United States or to allied Government administrators;
- (d) Nazi supporters;

3. Unless such officials have already been investigated to the satisfaction of the S.A.O., the following measures will be adopted:

4. The S.A.O. will prepare a list classifying the Major Officials and classifying the list of officials who are to be screened. A list of classifications attached (Annex 1) which may be added and according to any special regional requirements.

5. The R.D.O. will distribute, through his S.A.O.s and C.A.O.s, Schedule A list classifying the list of officials who are to be screened. A list of officials attached (Annex 1) which may be added and according to any special regional requirements.

6. The completed forms will be forwarded to the C.A.O., who, after coordination with the C.A.O. and Local Security Services such as S.S., O.C.I., or F.B.I., will make his recommendation and forward the form to the S.A.O., who will act as follows:

(a) In the case of the minor officials (List "B") who are not members of a national agency such as the C.I.A., Postal Services, etc., decide what, if not they remain in office.

(b) In the case of major officials who are members of

b. The S.C.A., will distribute, through his S.C.A. and C.O.S. Section in the approved form (Appendix II) to be completed by the Italian officials concerned and returned by them to the issuing C.A.O. Supplies of checks are obtainable on request from this HQ, or may be drawn by Regions, provided that no alteration is made to the standard forms.

c. The completed forms will be forwarded to the C.O.S., the C.O.S. consultation with the C.A.O., and Local Security Services such as S.P.A. or S.M.I., will endorse his recommendation and forward the form to the S.C.A.O., who will act as follows:

- (a) In the case of the minor officials (List "A") who are not members of a national agency such as the C.O.D. or Postal Service, a letter will be sent to the S.C.A.O. to decide whether or not they remain in office.
- (b) In the case of minor officials who are members of a national agency, the S.C.A.O. may decide to retain them in office, but, if in his opinion they should be dismissed, the consent of the head of the appropriate specialist or Technical Division at Regional HQ must be obtained (e.g. if the S.C.A.O. is of the opinion that an Italian transport official should be removed for any of the reasons mentioned above, he should obtain the consent of the Chief Transport officer at Regional HQ, before taking steps to dismiss the official). In the event of disagreement between the S.C.A.O., and the head of the Division, or in the absence of such an officer, a panel decision will be made by the S.C.A.O.
- (c) In the case of major officials (List "B"), the S.C.A.O. will make his recommendation as a further endorsement on the standard form forwarded by the S.C.A.O., and C.A.O., and will forward it to the C.O.S. at Regional HQ, the Chief Public Safety Officer; in conjunction with the Supt. of Special Police, such military Intelligence services as may be available, and with the regional and other technical division concerned will recommend to the S.C.A.O., whether the official ought to be retained.



I - FOOD HANDLERS' EXAMINATIONS

1. The attention of all unit commanders is directed to the provisions of Section IV, Circular No. 218, NATCUSA, 9 November 1943, wherein paragraph 13e (2) of AR 40-205 is construed to mean that bacteriological and microscopic examination of stools of food handlers, will, when possible, be made regularly on all prisoners of war and civilian personnel employed as food handlers, cooks, kitchen and mess attendants in American messes in this Base Section.

2. The term "regularly" is interpreted to mean that stool examinations, will, when possible, be made initially upon employment of such prisoners of war or civilian personnel and be repeated regularly at least every four months. More frequent examination will be done when deemed desirable by the surgeon of the station or command or when the medical history indicates that the examinee may be a carrier of causative organisms of intestinal disease.

II - FEEDING OF LABORERS

1. Effective 23 December 1943 dehydrated soup will be served at each mid-shift lunch period to all civilian laborers employed by this Base Section.

2. The soup is now available for issue by the Quartermaster who will honor requisitions of units or installations when such requisitions are approved by the Section or Service Chief. The basis for the requisition will be one 5 pound tin of dehydrated soup for each 100 men per serving, and will be drawn by the requisitioning unit for periods of not less than one week.

3. The soup will be served hot and the preparation thereof, including improvised equipment, will be the responsibility of the employing unit. Employees will be required to furnish their own containers. Care will be taken to avoid waste or serving an amount in excess of that authorized.

4. The employee will not be charged for the soup.

5. The chief of each employing section or service will be responsible for the operation of the plan within his section or service. (AG 230 EPBPA)

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
