Under Administrative Memorandum No. 74, Allied Control Commission was created as the organ through which the policy of the United Nations toward the Italian Government was to be conducted and the relations of the United Nations with the Italian Government were to be handled. To formulate these policies a highly qualified staff has been assembled from British and American sources.

The Central Economic Committee has been recently created by Administrative Memorandum No. 92 with functions relating primarily to the supply situation but also covering the determination of wages and prices, and thus virtually the whole range of economic problems. Representatives of the Central Economic Committee have indicated the view that Administrative Memorandum No. 92 places on the Committee full responsibility in these fields throughout occupied and controlled Italy. On this conception of the Committee's responsibilities it would seem that policy making functions in economic matters have been largely transferred from ACC to CEC.

This seems to me to be a major change in the existing arrangements for dealing with Italian affairs which presents a number of questions going to the organization and future operation of ACC. In order that the necessary reorganization may be promptly accomplished I suggest that the present position of ACC should be reviewed and request a directive clarifying its responsibilities in the economic field.

SUBJECT: Price Fixing Orders

TO : R.C.A.O. Region II

1. The Central Economic Committee of the Advance Administrative Echelon of AMG fixed uniform prices for certain commodities and has requested that we make these prices effective in Region II.

2. Enclosed are proposed regional orders which have been prepared for this purpose. These relate to:

- (a) Olive Oil and its by-products;
- (b) Hemp of the 1942 and 1943 harvest;
- (c) Wheat;
- (d) Petroleum products.

These orders should be issued immediately.

3. You will note that the order relating to wheat is made retroactive to 1 January 1944, and provides for claims as to past sales to be filed with the Office of the Accertamenti Agricoli Comunali. A similar provision is contained in Ordinance No. 16 issued on 26 December 1943 by the Italian Government as to the four provinces under its control. If this organisation is not functioning in all of the provinces in Region II, you should change the order to provide that claims be filed with some other appropriate Italian organisation. It may also be necessary for you to issue instructions as to the handling of such claims and to provide through AMGA the funds necessary to pay them by an advance on behalf of the Italian Government to the bank through which the farmers are paid for their wheat. It has not been possible to verify here the proper method of handling such claims.

4. According to previous arrangements, it is understood that you will arrange for printing, publication and distribution in Region III.

5. Please forward to this Headquarters 10 copies of each of the orders as issued.

SUBJECT: Transfer of Functions of Central Economic Committee

TO : Commander-in-Chief, AFHQ

1. AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 92 establishing a Central Economic Committee (Italian)(mainland) provides in paragraph 5 of Part I that at an appropriate date to be determined by your headquarters the functions of the Committee will pass to the Allied Control Commission.

2. At a meeting held January 20, 1944 attended by Major General Brian Robertson (Chairman), Brigadier General Hamblen (Deputy Chairman), Hon. Henry Grady, and Brigadier Lush, members representing ACC/AMG, and AMG, ACMW, respectively, and myself, it was agreed that the functions of the Central Economic Committee might be transferred to the Allied Control Commission immediately.

3. It is recommended that the necessary orders supplemental to AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 92 be issued so transferring such functions and terminating the Committee.

2. Requisitions for all supplies required in the six months period from July--December 1944 will be submitted to the Central Economic Committee no later than 15 February 1944.

3. Requisitions will be prepared in strict compliance with reference a. above. In stating requirements for flour/wheat, consideration will be given to the estimate of the 1944 harvest and to the extent to which this will make self-sustaining the area to which the requisition relates.

4. Each requisition will be accompanied by a justification setting forth the basis upon which it has been prepared. In the case of flour/wheat this will include a statement of the total estimated needs for the area less the estimated amount available from local production; the result will show the net amount required.

5. Estimates will be based on the scale laid down in reference b., above but this is not to be considered as authority for any change in the current ration scale.

6. The requisitions are to be forwarded through the Central Economic Committee in accordance with paragraph 4, reference o above. The original and five copies will be submitted. The fifth copy is for the Central Economic Committee.

SUBJECT: Central Medical Supply Depot and
Regional Medical Supply Depots

TO : Public Health Subcommission

15 January 1944

1. Pursuant to directive from the Central Economic Committee, the Public Health Subcommission is authorized and directed to staff and operate a Central Medical Supply Depot and such Regional Medical Supply Depots as may be needed from time to time for the warehousing, accounting for and distribution of medical supplies for the civilian population in Italy.

2. Accordingly, the Public Health Subcommission will have the responsibility for the following functions:

- a. The establishment and maintenance of a system to handle the receipt and proper warehousing of all medical supplies, including all items listed in the list of "Medical Supplies for Occupied Areas" and such other medical items as may be received in Italy for ultimate or immediate civilian use.
- b. The accounting for all such supplies until delivered to Regional Depots and the supervision and control of the payment for the same.
- c. Supervision, through such Regional or Provincial or other warehouses or control points as may from time to time be deemed by it as necessary of such medical supplies to the first Italian civilian users for whom they are intended.
- d. The preparation and maintenance of proper records and inventories of all such medical supplies on hand and awaiting distribution.
- e. The maintenance of an appropriate control system in the various Regional warehouses and the Central warehouse.
- f. Transportation of such medical supplies from the time they reach the Central Depot to the Regional Depots established.
- g. Submission to the Central Economic Committee of proper requisitions for CAD Medical items for the several AMG/AGC areas in Italy.
- h. Submission to the Central Economic Committee of recommendations for the allocations of medical supplies as between the various Regions or other areas in occupied Italy.
- j. The Central Economic Committee will maintain responsibility for the final allocation of medical supplies in occupied Italy.

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- e. The maintenance of an appropriate control system in the various Regional Warehouses and the Central warehouse.
- f. Transportation of such medical supplies from the time they reach the Central Depot to the Regional Depots established.
- g. Submission to the Central Economic Committee of proper requisitions for CAD Medical items for the several AMG/ACC areas in Italy.
- h. Submission to the Central Economic Committee of recommendations for the allocations of medical supplies as between the various Regions or other areas in occupied Italy.
- i. The Central Economic Committee will maintain responsibility for the final allocations of medical supplies in occupied Italy.
- j. Responsibility for the safeguarding, distribution, and payment of medical supplies within established AMG/ACC Regions, will be in accordance with directives to be promulgated by the Public Health Subcommission and the Finance Subcommission.
- k. Prices of medical items will be established by the Central Economic Committee.

1. Minutes # 6 of the minutes of the Central Economic Committee meeting held 12 January 1944 reads in part as follows:

"6.

b. It was agreed:

1. A Central Medical Supply Depot will be established. Operation of the depot will be under the Public Health Sub-Committee while control of the depot and allocation of medical supplies will be under the Central Economic Committee."

2. DCCAG, AGO will issue the necessary orders to establish the depot and to transfer all medical supplies under the control of Region II to the control of the Central Medical Depot.

3. DCCAG, AGO 15th Army Group will issue the necessary orders to transfer all medical supplies under control of Regions III, and IV and under AGO Eighth Army and AGO Fifth Army to the control of the Central Medical Depot.

4. Deputy President, ACC will direct the Italian Government to transfer all imported medical supplies under its control to the control of the Central Medical Depot.

5. It is requested that a copy of these orders be supplied to the Committee for its information.



TO : - Major Van Dusen

1. In view of the approval of a Central Medical AMG Warehouse to be operated by the Public Health Sub-Commission under policies of distribution laid down by the Central Economic Committee the request for adequate personnel, transport and equipment is submitted as being an Advance Platoon, Medical Depot Company (USA) with its complete personnel, equipment and transport. With the arrival of this personnel this Sub-Commission will have the handling of welfare clothing as to warehousing and accounting handled by this group of trained officers and men.
2. A requirement still exists for one trained medical supply officer in each Region established in Italian territory and in addition a minimum of three OR/EM of non-commissioned grade as assistants. On this basis ten trained medical supply officers of the grade of Captain or Lieut. is requested and thirty OR/EM. These officers and men will work in the several Regions as a part of the T/O of the Regions receiving instructions and supervision from this Sub-Commission only.
3. It is known that these officers and men are available in the NATOUS area and could be supplied quickly on request. It is suggested that the undersigned be authorized to take this request for personnel to AFHQ by air for conference with Surgeons Office NATOUS.

1. Reconsideration of action proposed in paragraph 3 basic letter is requested.

2. It is essential that the CEC Staff shall be organized so that it may begin functioning with the least practicable delay. While the two officers in question are not known personally to the undersigned, it is reported that the duties on which they are now engaged do not take advantage of their particular expertise. It is agreed that in general the policy of requesting individuals by name is not desirable. In view of the shortness of the time available for organizing the CEC Staff exceptions to the desired policy appear necessary. If any of the personnel desired are occupying key jobs in AMD there will be full consultation with you prior to making formal demands for their assignment. When individuals are asked for by qualification it is expected that the officers and men produced will be qualified for the duties for which requested. If the contrary should happen they will be returned with adverse reports and AFHQ informed.

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3. It must be presumed that the CEC was organized because of the failure of existing bodies satisfactorily to perform the functions which are turned over to CEC. The tasks which face CEC are onerous and important and must be performed without fail. It must further be presumed that this situation was realized when under the provisions of paragraph 2, Administrative Memorandum No. 92, AFHQ, 19 November 1943, it was directed that the three headquarters concerned would turn over to CEC the necessary staff. The tasks to be performed are of mutual interest to all three headquarters. As long as CEC keeps its demands for personnel to the minimum and proportionately equitably it is hoped and expected that every effort will be made promptly to meet these demands.

Item 3--Consideration of the action taken by the Italian Government in fixing olive oil prices.

Prices now being paid producers of olive oil range as follows:

Apulia-----	2500 lire per quintal
Salerno province--	2400 lire per quintal
8th Army AMG-----	1900 lire "
Region IV (Foggia)	1900 lire "
Region III-----	1900 lire "
Region II-----	1850 lire "

This diversity developed as follows:

At a meeting held in Naples on 23 November 1943 attended by representatives of all regions, 15th Army Group, and Apulia it was decided that the maximum price to producers should be 1900 lire per quintal. Apulia price was then 1720 lire and the Italian Government was not prepared at that time to revise its price upward.

Around December 15 Italian officials in Salerno, without notice to AMG, raised price to 2400 lire. At a later but as yet unascertained date the Italian Government in Apulia raised its price to 2500 lire.

Since then 8th Army AMG has asked permission to raise its price to 2400 lire since producers in that area refuse to sell at 1900 lire while farmers in Apulia are getting 2500 lire. Region IV (Foggia) has also asked permission to raise to 2500 lire.

On 1 January 1944 message was sent to AMG by Brig. Gen. Hamblen stating that reports had been received that the Italian government was considering a change in olive oil and grain prices, and requesting that the Italian government be advised that no change in price be made without obtaining prior approval from CGO.

On January 3 message was received from Major General Joyce stating that the Italian government had been notified as requested.

On January 6 message was sent to AMG by Brig. General Hamblen stating that it was understood here that Italian government had increased price to 2500 lire and requesting an explanation. No answer has thus far been received.

Item 14 -- Consideration of the proposal to establish a central medical supply depot in Nepal and creation of a medical supply section in the Central Economic Committee staff.

1. The position of the supply of medical equipment and drugs, dressings, biologicals, sanitary supplies, etc., has not in the past been completely satisfactory.
2. The need for medical supplies arises immediately a town or district is liberated and these requirements must be met if ordinary human consideration is to be given to the plight of wounded and sick civilians.
3. The Army medical services, in view of their primary commitments, cannot be expected to help much other than in the most serious emergencies. Stockpiles of essential drugs, dressings from AMG resources have therefore to be maintained in forward positions to be ready to meet these emergencies.
4. Following a discussion between the Director of Public Health, 15 Army Group, Colonel Griffin, of AMG/ACC, US Military Authorities in Naples and others, it was decided to recommend that all demands for medical requirements should be prepared centrally, preferably at Naples. Such estimates of requirements, prepared as they are practically wholly on a population basis, present no difficulties and should form part of the normal planning.
5. It is further recommended that the medical stores depot at Naples should become the central depot for the whole of the mainland of Italy and that stockpiles for regional needs be forwarded there for distribution as required on the liberation of a part or the whole of a region.
6. The establishment of such a central depot as this will involve the creation of an adequate office and clerical establishment with the requisite amount of transport for the staff and for transporting equipment to make the depot practically an independent unit.
7. The logical office for the co-ordination of all demands for medical requirements, submission of these demands to AFHQ, control of all imported and local civil medical supplies and issue of all medical supplies for civil use, is the Medical Supply Section of the Central Economic Committee. It is recommended that Colonel Griffin of AMG/ACC be appointed Director of Civil Medical Supplies for mainland Italy to be chief of this section.
8. I approve of turning over the AMG Region 1 medical stores depot at Naples to the control of Colonel Griffin for the establishment of a Central Civil Medical Stores Depot for mainland Italy.

SUBJECT: Medical Supply Personnel

1. Under date of 27 November 1944 request was submitted for Medical Supply personnel by letter to the Chief of Staff, HQ., AMG., "Subject: Request for Medical Supply Personnel." Copies of this correspondence are attached. To date this office has no official knowledge of the status of this request.
2. As a result of a conference between the DPM, 15 Army Group and the Medical Supply Office, this Sub-Commission a letter has been written to the Central Economic Committee by the CGAO, HQ., AMG., 15 Army Group requesting that the Medical Supply Officer this Sub-Commission be responsible for all Medical Supplies for 15 Army Group AMG. in addition to ACC/AMG. This same letter also recommended the establishment in Naples of a Central Medical Depot for AMG supplies since at the present time, and for some time in the future, "Medical Supplies for Regions II, III and IV will arrive at Naples."
3. Inspection trip through part of Region II shows a complete absence of proper accounting records with a resultant failure to obtain proper payment for medical supplies. In Region III the Region warehouse was operated by the SAIBO, Naples City, who could not devote sufficient time to have an inventory taken or to establish a proper accounting and warehousing system. Lt. Light (AM) of this Sub-Commission was loaned to Region III on the verbal request of DPM, 15 Army Group AMG and RMAF Region III to put this warehouse in some semblance of order and accomplish an inventory in order the supplies held which belong to Regions II and IV might be released to the proper authorities. Trained personnel for Regions II and IV are not now available.
4. To date the Finance Sub-Commission is unable to furnish this Sub-Commission with an approved formula for a price list. It is understood as a result of a conference that such an approved formula will be available after the Algiers conference.
5. The Finance Sub-Commission, Accounting Division, has approved the system of obtaining payment for AMG Medical Supplies and recognizes the absolute necessity for the Medical Supply personnel requested in the previous letter referred to in paragraph 1.

6. As a result of an informal conversation with representatives of the Medical Section Battous, it is known that trained personnel is available in this theater due to changes in T/C of Medical Supply Depots.

7. If and when the authorization to establish a Central Medical Depot AMI for Italy is received there will be a further requirement for a Medical Depot Company (USA) less part of the enlisted personnel, but including all equipment and transport.

8. It is again requested that favorable consideration be given the request for personnel and that this request be forwarded to AFHQ. If this request is not given favorable consideration this Sub-Commission and the Finance Sub-Commission can assume no responsibility for payment for Allied Medical Supplies turned over to the Italian Government, and this Sub-Commission can assume no responsibility for the proper distribution of those supplies to the Regions and Provinces. Col. Cranshaw of the Finance Sub-Commission concurs in this decision, and has agreed to assist in obtaining an accounting officer for use in this Sub-Commission.

SUBJECT: Summary - Hemp Report

TO : Agriculture Sub-Commission

1. There are now 470 short tons 1942 hemp fibre available in Anzalone warehouses for manufacture or export. In addition there are 297 tons of 1942 hemp fibre and 220 tons of Stoppo Fattini (waste too low for military use) in the warehouses of manufacturers. The status of stocks in manufacturers warehouses is uncertain because not violence has prevented an accurate census.

2. The 1943 crop in Naples area is estimated at 10,700 tons. However 30% not rotted last fall will not come into commercial channels until after July 1944. Thus available fibre prior to July 1944 will not exceed 10,000 tons for all uses. No marketing of hemp fibre to date because growers say price too low and because of bad treatment in past by Anzalone. Status of available stocks of 1943 crop therefore uncertain.

Of 10,000 tons of 1943 hemp fibre to come to market prior to July 1944 roughly 436 or 5,760 tons will fall in the Scolastico (second class) above; another 436 or 5,630 tons will be classified as in the grades of Extra Scolastico Forestiere to Spago Chiaro Forestiere inclusive. The remainder will be 735 tons of Sotto Prodotti (sub products) and 915 tons of Stoppo (waste).

3. Cannot quote prices because present demoralized condition of market. Black Market prices 10 to 100% above AMM legal prices.

4. Military needs not stated but assume military can take entire crop above fishing and essential civilian needs. In past 50% hemp crop exported, 25% used for military and 25% for essential civilian use. Fishing needs Region I and II 750 tons of high grade hemp. Hemp for tuna nets should be released and shipped at once. Further information required on military and essential civilian needs.

5. Sufficient rope making facilities available to absorb most of 1943 crop. Rover needed. Rope now being made by hand process for British Navy and for Air Corps. Some socks being made for British Army. Prices paid for these products out of line with legal price of hemp.

(continued - Hemp Report)

6. Recommendations with regard to the 1942 and 1943 crops:

(a) Raise average ~~minimum~~ price from 1500 lire per quintal to 2250 lire per quintal of raw hemp.

(b) Order the assessing of the 1942 and 1943 hemp crops and be prepared to enforce the order by the use of troops if necessary.

(c) That Mr. Backhouse be made Hemp Controller. In that capacity be requested to review existing hemp manufacturing contracts and be directed to make recommendations to the Central Economic Committee with respect to future manufacturers margins and prices. It is further suggested that Mr. Backhouse be given authority to allocate such existing stocks of hemp to manufacturers to fill military contracts and other authorized needs as are submitted to his office.

7. Plans for 1944 crop must be determined at once. Need 2000 quintals seed of Paine or Uniack variety to be imported from Turkey by Feb. 25. Italian importer in past has been Pottare Gnefrio firm of Naples. Turkish exporter Aliya Yucel, Istanbul, Turkey, Bahce Kapu Mahmut Han, 12. Cable address: Bitki-Istanbul.

8. Normal requirements conservatively 5,000 tons superphosphate, 2,000 tons ammonium sulphate and 1,000 tons ammonium nitrate to prevent drop of 7,000 tons production on same acreage as last year. Urgency of need should determine whether available fertilizer should be used on hemp or on food crops. Quality of crop will also suffer if no fertilizer received.

Item #6-- Consideration of a retrospective price increase for the 1943 wheat crop
(Regions III and IV)

Prices being paid for wheat are as follows:

Region I 500 Lire per quintal

Region II 300 Lire per quintal

(There have been complaints that Region II prices are under Reg. I)

Region III official price 300 Lire but verbal promise has been made that more will be paid retrospectively.

Region IV same as Region III

The verbal promises of Regions III and IV to pay more than 300 Lire (no figure was given the farmers as to the amount of the promised increase) were necessitated in order to get the wheat in.

It appears that there is at least a moral obligation to pay the promised increase. Furthermore, reversion now to the 300 Lire price after promising to pay more would probably have a very detrimental effect so far as getting in the 1944 crop.

Lt. Col. Verrell estimates that the share of the 1943 crop involved in Regions III and IV amounts to around 50,000 tons or 50,000 quintals. On this basis the total price to be paid would be between 275,000,000 and 300,000,000 Lire (based on an increase of 250 to 300 Lire).

Item #8: Consideration of coal prices.

There are two principal problems: 1. Determination of prices at which coal in stockpiles owned by private companies in the Naples area shall be sold to the army for use in plants producing materials for military use, to ANG/ACC for use by hospitals, bakeries, and other essential civilian users and to private Italian companies.

2. Prices at which imported coal shall be sold to essential civilian users such as hospitals, bakeries, and gas plants

1. PRICES OF COAL IN THE POSSESSION OF PRIVATE OWNERS IN THE NAPLES AREA

There are at present some 23,000 tons of coal (part good German coal and part Cardinian coal) owned by approximately 12 private firms in the Naples area. This coal is subject to allocation by the Coal Section. At present 2,000 tons have been allocated to ANG for use in hospitals, bakeries, etc., 500 tons from the Ilva plant at Torre Annunziata for the gas works at Castellammare, and 400 tons a month for the next three months to the Director of Works, AFIO, Adv. Adm. Sub.

It appears that the German portion of this coal was purchased by the present owners at prices of 300 to 400 lire per ton. These prices reflected (a) an exchange value for the lire well above the present level of 100 to the dollar and 400 to the pound, and (b) an unknown but substantial subsidy by the Italian government through the coal monopoly operated by the Italian State Railroad system.

It was decided as a matter of policy at the Algiers price conference that all imported products should be charged to the Italian government at landed cost. Exceptions are to be made in cases ^{of} basic products which have a material effect on costs of living. It was considered that coal is such a product and should be subsidized by the Italian government so that it might be sold at a lower price to consumers. No prices were set at Algiers but the general discussion favored 1200 for high grade imported coal.

The following possible solutions to the problem of pricing privately owned coal are suggested:

a. The private owners sell their German coal at the current CIF cost of imported coal or 2500 to 3000 lire per ton. This would result in windfall profits for the present owners.

b. The present owners sell at the lire price they paid of 300 to 400 lire per ton. Because of the devaluation of the lire and the general rise of prices this would impose a severe penalty on the owners.

c. Assuming an arbitrary pre-war value for the lire of 4 cents, multiply the price paid (300 lire) by this figure to arrive at an equivalent price in terms of the present lire of 1200 lire. This is the price proposed by ANG/ACC for coal not being imported.

d. A combination of solutions a and c with the private owners selling to the Italian government, the Director of Works, or ANG at a price determined on the basis of (c) above and these buyers selling to non-subsidized users at the price of imported coal of equivalent grade (2500 to 3000 lire per ton) or to subsidized users at the price of 1200 lire per ton.

e. Sale of Sardinian coal from stockpiles at the prices proposed by ANG/ACC for new imports of such coal--namely, 350 and 650 lire per Metric ton, CIF mainland ports.

For any given stockpile of coal, the Coal Section should make a determination as to whether it is German or Sardinian coal and the grade thereof. This being done, the formula decided upon to determine the price could then be applied without further reference to the Central Economic Committee.

2. PRICES OF IMPORTED AND EXPORTED COAL IN THE BRITISH

The Economic Directorate of ANG/ACC has recommended that imported coal be sold on behalf of the Italian Government at a price of 1200 lire per Metric ton CIF Italian ports. Landed cost of such coal is 2500 to 3000 lire. Therefore, the subsidy borne by the Italian government on coal for essential civilian needs (principally civilian hospitals and barracks) would be 1300 to 1800 lire. Sardinian coal would be sold on the mainland at prices of 350 to 650 lire CIF Italian ports, depending on the grade.

Importations of coal have been reckoned by the Coal Section as follows:

January, 64,625 tons; February, 77,550 tons; March, 8,600 tons; and April, 77,950 tons. The following breakdown of January imports indicates the proportion subject to the subsidy: Military needs (including military trains, hospitals, and industrial plants manufacturing goods for the army) will account for all but 10,000 to 12,000 tons of the 64,625 tons to be imported in January. Civilian needs (10,000 to 12,000 tons) will include 7,550 tons allocated to ANG and 2,000 to 4,000 tons required to operate civilian trains. (The State Railroads are now preparing a report for the Coal Section breaking down use of railroad coal as between military and civilian trains.)

The 7,550 tons allocated to ANG will be divided as follows:

Civilian Hospitals, 1,500 tons and gas plants, 6,350 tons. However, only about 3,000 tons of the 7,550 allocated to ANG will be good British or American coal (landed cost 2500 to 3000 lire) and thus subject to the subsidy.

The subsidy apparently will apply, therefore, to 3,000 tons of imported British or American coal allocated to ANG plus that portion of British or American coal required to operate civilian trains. Since the subsidy will range from 1300 to 1800 lire per ton it may be assumed to average 1550 lire per ton. In this event the subsidy will amount in January for ANG coal (excluding an as yet undetermined amount for operation of civilian trains), to 3,000 X 1550 lire or 7,650,000 lire or \$77,500.

SUBJECT: Medical Supply Personnel
THRU : The Administrative Directorate

1. Under date of 27 November 1943 request was submitted for Medical Supply personnel by letter to The Chief of Staff, Hq., AMG., "Subject: Request for Medical Supply Personnel." Copies of this correspondence are attached. To date this office has no official knowledge of the status of this request.

2. As a result of a conference between the DPH, 15 Army Group and the Medical Supply Office, this Sub-Commission a letter has been written to the Central Economic Committee by the DCCAO, Hq., AMG, 15 Army Group requesting that the Medical Supply Officer this Sub-Commission be responsible for all Medical Supplies for 15 Army Group AMG. in addition to ACC/AMG. This same letter also recommended the establishment in Naples of a Central Medical Depot for AMG supplies since at the present time, and for some time in the future, Medical Supplies for Regions II, III and IV will arrive at Naples.

3. Inspection trip through part of Region II shows a complete absence of proper accounting records with a resultant failure to obtain proper payment for Medical Supplies. In Region III the Region Warehouse was operated by the SAPHO, Naples City, who could not devote sufficient time to have an inventory taken or to establish a proper accounting and warehousing system. Lt. Light (QM) of this Sub-Commission was loaned to Region III on the verbal request of DPH, 15 Army Group AMG and RDPH Region III to put this warehouse in some semblance of order and accomplish an inventory in order that supplies held which belong to Regions II and IV might be released to the proper authorities. Trained personnel for Region II and IV are not now available.

4. To date the Finance Sub-Commission is unable to furnish this Sub-Commission with an approved formula for a price list. It is understood as a result of a conference that such an approved formula will be available after the Algiers conference.

5. The Finance Sub-Commission, Accounting Division, has approved the system of obtaining payment for AMG Medical Supplies and recognizes the absolute necessity for the Medical Supply personnel requested in the previous letter referred to in paragraph 1.

6. As a result of an informal conversation with representatives of the Medical Section NATOUS, it is known that trained personnel is available in this theater due to changes in T/O of Medical Supply Depots.

7. If and when the authorization to establish a Central Medical Depot AMG for Italy is received there will be a further requirement for a Medical Depot Company (USA) less part of the enlisted personnel, but including all equipment and transport.

8. It is again requested that favorable consideration be given the request for personnel and that this request be forwarded to AFHQ. If this request is not given favorable consideration this Sub-Commission and the Finance Sub-Commission can assume no responsibility for payment for Allied Medical Supplies turned over to the Italian Government, and this Sub-Commission can assume no responsibility for the proper distribution of these supplies to the Regions and Provinces. Col. Crawshaw of the Finance Sub-Commission concurs in this decision, and has agreed to assist in obtaining an accounting officer for use in this Sub-Commission.

SUBJECT: - request for medically-supply personnel.
FROM: 1 - the Director, Public Health Sub-Commissioner
TO: 1 - Chief of Staff, H. M. A.

1. The pharmaceutical and chemical industry of Italy has been located in Naples and Milan in the past, and both of these places are now unable to supply any merchandise to the drug trade. At this time, an important factory is situated in the largest chemical plant in Naples which prevents any attempt at continuation of operations. The plants in Milan are obviously under German control. Even if these chemical and pharmaceutical plants were available for resumption of operations, there is a current shortage of glassware suitable for chemical operations or packaging of drugs. There is not available at this port chemical supplies or packaging of drugs. Since will not be available for this commercial venture for many months. It is therefore necessary that the drug and chemical requirements of the entire Italian population be supplied from allied stocks. Provision has been made for the acquisition of these required stocks. In order that the present black market in distribution of these required stocks may be controlled, it is the opinion of this Sub-Commissioner that the control of warehousing and distribution must remain in the hands of qualified medical supply officers for many months. The use of Italian distributors under either A.M.C. or under A.M.A. is considered most impracticable until Allied forces have completely withdrawn from Italy. The Sub-Commissioner of Industry and Commerce has requested this Sub-Commissioner to continue the control of imported medical stores after the transfer of the regions to the Italian Government, pending a decision as to the ultimate disposal of such medical supplies. This has been requested in an effort to maintain control of imported medical stores, so that these stores might be transferred to another region, or if turned over to the Italian Government, satisfactory payment will have been accomplished. It is the further opinion of this Sub-Commissioner, that the control and distribution of medical supplies is of secondary importance only to the distribution of food supplies. The medical supply division of the Public Health Sub-Commissioner will be the last division of this Sub-Commissioner to turn over its responsibilities to the Italian government, and it is therefore essential that adequate personnel be available to make the control of medical supplies a continuous operation throughout the several regions to be established.

2. As a result of the reports of inspection made by the various members of this Sub-Commissioner, it is considered essential that provisions be made immediately for the assignment of properly trained personnel to supervise and direct the warehousing and distribution of medical supplies in the Central warehouses in each region, and in the larger and more densely populated regions where medical supplies in quantity must be warehoused and distributed.

5363

5. This personnel must be thoroughly familiar with medical supplies and have a good knowledge of warehousing procedures and be capable of preparing a clear and accurate requisitions (Anchors) for medical supplies required for a class and separate requisitions (Anchors) for medical supplies required for a period of six (6) months in advance to be stored in the central regional warehouse, and three (3) months for the larger provincial medical stores. This personnel must also know how to keep accurate accounting records and have a thorough knowledge of light-weight mechanics.

6. It is considered of paramount importance that there be no conflict with the above noted qualifications in such respect shown by the qualifications and experience which will be the handling of medical supplies, working directly under the direction of the head of the medical supply section and assigned to one particular unit. In turn our own personnel and adequate records are required to take full charge in order that a proper and adequate control may be made of medical supplies throughout the entire Italian section. For this reason it is requested that ten (10) officers, having the qualifications mentioned in para. 5 above, of the rank of captain or least Lieutenant be obtained immediately and that a further two (2) persons for an officer that they may arrive at this Headquarters as soon as possible and receive the necessary additional training required prior to assignment to hospitals and obtain the necessary additional training required prior to assignment to hospitals.

7. It is noted that personnel personnel may be available to assist these medical officers if it is considered necessary that a certain number of them be available to handle in this work, both in the central regional warehouse and in the lower level warehouses in Italy. These men should be thoroughly familiar with the general and class medical stores. These men should be thoroughly familiar with the necessary supplies required in a medical corps, and sufficiently qualified to handle over the command of a corps for short periods should the officer be away from over the command of a corps, so that these men should be of a grade of not less than an Lieutenant colonel, or above. These men should be of a grade of not less than a Captain, and preferably of the grade of Captain, etc., and if possible should have a good knowledge of Italian, although this is not imperative.

8. It is requested that a minimum of thirty (30) days be obtained immediately on the same priority as the officer personnel, for the same reasons indicated in paragraph 6, supra.

1. Reference a memorandum, Views of the Economic Directorate, ADG/AMC, on Price Policies in Italy. Copy is attached.
2. This Committee concurs in the memorandum except paragraphs 10 and 18.
 3. With respect to paragraph 10 the Committee recommends that petro-
lous products should be charged at landed cost, and that retail prices should
be established sufficient to cover landed cost, distribution costs, taxes,
and a reasonable profit. It is recommended that a retail price of 16 lire
for gasoline, 14.10 lire for kerosene, and 14.20 lire for gas oil be estab-
lished and a compensation fund be set up to provide for adjustments when the
elements used in establishing this price are more definitely determined.
 4. With respect to paragraph 18 the Committee agrees that the necessary
staff be organized to set up and operate a proper system of accounting for
imports and exports. It does not recommend the creation of a separate agency.
Since this system will be applicable to imports and exports from points in
all parts of Italy, it is recommended that it be set up under the authority
of the Central Economic Committee, rather than as a part of a sub-commission,
even though it may be desirable to attach this staff to the appropriate
sub-commission.

1. Organization and composition of the Committee.

The following organization of the Committee was agreed upon.

- a. Chairman: Major General Sir Brian H. Robertson, DSO
- b. Deputy Chairman: Brigadier General A. L. Hammill, D/B/CIO
- c. Chief Executive: Lt. Col. A. I. Henderson, Food Controller.
- d. Col. C. A. Spofford stated that he would serve temporarily as the AFHQ representative during a shortage of a permanent representative.
- e. With reference to a representative of ADG 15th Army Group, the Chairman stated that he proposed referring to a letter he had received from Brigadier Lush on this subject, suggesting that the representative from ADG 15th Army Group be Lt. Col. Gerry.
- f. It was decided that it would be desirable to have a transportation representative on the Committee and Brigadier A. A. Fellowes, Chairman of Flimbo Transportation Committee, was designated, with Col. C. A. Fitch, Chairman of the Internal Transportation Sub Commission as alternate.
- g. Lt. Col. C. R. Merrill: Chief, Economics and Supply Division, ADG 15th Army Group.
- h. Col. Spofford suggested that a representative of the Finance Sub-Commission be on the Committee, but it was decided that any technical financial advice should be obtained on specific proposals before being considered by the Committee.

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1. The Chairman stated that he proposed to take up the revision of administrative memorandum No. 92 to accomplish necessary changes to effectuate these decisions and that he believed they would be acceptable.
2. Consideration of procedures and Staff.

The Committee will initially be composed of the following sections:

- a. Supply;
- b. Distribution;
- c. Transportation (including shipping) and warehousing;
- d. Industry;
- e. Financial section, to deal with rice, wages and black market returns;
- f. Statistics.

The following points regarding procedure are agreed upon:

a. The Chairman stated that a section would go out from headquarters stating the functions and methods of procedure of the committee.

b. Privileges of the Committee may be given by the Chief Executive on behalf of the committee.

c. It was noted that the Committee was authorized to communicate directly with all corps and areas, but it was decided that such direct communication would be used only in those cases where communication through channels was not considered satisfactory. In all cases of direct communication, all intermediate headquarters will be kept fully informed.

d. The Committee will meet fortnightly. The second meeting will be held in approximately ten days on a date to be fixed by the Chairman.

e. The Chairman directed that a paragraph be inserted in the administrative instructions stating that requirements for requisition, office equipment and personnel be met by AG 15th Army Group Headquarters and AGO. Expendable office supplies, facilities and accommodations will be provided for the Committee by the Commandant, Army, AGO. AGS (adv) will requisition from the Commandant for the above.

f. The Chairman stated that the Committee should, if possible, be given its own Table of Organization.

3. Relations with Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board.

The Chairman stated that liaison between the Central Economic Committee and the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board is assured by the fact that, while the nature and purpose of the two bodies are distinct, they both have the same chairman and Deputy Chairman and the Chief Executive also attends the meetings of the latter in his capacity as representative of AGS (adv).

4. Consideration of Prices of Imported Petroleum Products.

It was decided that, pending determination of a basic price policy, price would rest in those given in a Flombo message trans-

graphed on 20 December 1943 to ACC-Apulia, AMG 15th Army Group, AMHQ-Rear and repeated to AFHQ and Fct G - Flambo. Those prices are: Petrol - 11 Lire per litre; Kerosene - 10 Lire per litre; Gasoil - 9,25 Lire per litre, effective 1 Jan 1944.

5. Consideration of wage and tariff matters of the Italian State in ways.

The Deputy Chairman referred to correspondence received from the Italian Secretary of State for Railways and Highways regarding increase in wages of Italian railway workers and also in passenger tariffs. It was determined that the increase in passenger tariffs should be made uniform throughout the various sections of the Italian mainland. It was further determined that increases relating to bombing and the war situation should be eliminated in those areas where conditions no longer warrant them, if present, and that this policy should be considered in establishing uniform wage rates. The Chief Executive was directed to make necessary investigations and prepare the directives required to implement this policy.

Consideration of the proposed increase of passenger tariff was postponed until the next Committee meeting because of lack of information available in support of the proposal.

6. Report of the Joint Supply Situation.

The WGS (AFS) representative presented a report on the general supply situation as of 27 December 1943. No action was found necessary. A similar report is to be presented at each Meeting of the Committee.

7. Other Matters.

The Deputy Chairman cited a request made by a representative of Region 13 to PTS for flour for issue on the basis of need and experience. His opinion that requests of this type should be transmitted through the Committee. It was decided that in the future all emergency requests for military stocks should be submitted to the Committee.

8. The meeting adjourned at 1400 hours.

Establishment of the Central Economic Committee (Italian Mainland) 1
Civil Food Controller (Italian Mainland) 11
a 1- ESTABLISHMENT OF CENTRAL ECONOMIC COMMITTEE (ITALIAN MAINLAND)

1. To insure the necessary coordination and control of civilian supply and economic matters in occupied or controlled territory of the Italian mainland, there will be established in RAFFLES a Central Economic Committee under the Chairmanship of the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer or his Deputy, responsible direct to this headquarters. In addition to the chairman, there will be one senior representative of AGO 15th Army Group and one senior representative to be designated jointly by the Allied Control Commission and AGO Headquarters. The representative of AGC/AGO will be the executive vice chairman. The vice Chairman and the representative of AGO/AGO 15th Army Group will devote their full time to the work of the committee.

2. Such other personnel as may be required will be made available by the Allied Control Commission, AGO Headquarters and AGO 15th Army Group upon the request of the committee. Necessary vehicles and other equipment will also be provided by these three headquarters as requested by the committee.

3. The functions of the Central Economic Committee will be as follows:

- a. To determine the essential requirements of the civilian population.
- b. To control and allocate local resources of essential civilian supplies in coordination with the Local Resources (Italian) Board, and particularly to control the collection and distribution of wheat and olive oil. ----over

- a. To coordinate the work of the AGO/AMG representatives on committees and sub-committees of the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board.
- b. To make necessary arrangements for the receipt, warehousing and distribution of supplies imported for the civilian population.
- c. To establish the prices at which supplies imported for the civilian population will be sold, and to establish uniform or standard prices & for such other essential commodities or services as may be considered necessary.
- d. To establish such uniform or standard wage scales for civilian employment as may be considered necessary.
- e. To coordinate requests for transportation of civilian supplies by facilities under the control of the allied military services. The internal transportation sub-commission will exercise such functions as may be delegated to it by the Central Economic Committee and shall be subject to its authority insofar as matters outside the jurisdiction of the AGO are concerned.
- f. To coordinate the use of motor and sea transportation under control of AGO/AMG in the transportation of civilian supplies, including the requisitioning and pooling of civilian motor transport if this should be necessary.
 1. To undertake such additional functions as may be recommended by the committee and approved by this headquarters, or as assigned to it from time to time by this headquarters.
 2. To facilitate the formulation of a comprehensive program for the distribution of essential civilian supplies, copies of all outstanding requisitions for each area or region will be forwarded immediately by the responsible higher headquarters to the committee at PLAMCO. All future requisitions will be forwarded through the committee for concurrence or comment.
 3. In the discharge of its responsibilities, the committee will make the maximum use of Italian governmental agencies, the existing machinery of AGO/AMG, and the facilities of the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board. At an appropriate date to be determined by this headquarters, the functions of the Central Economic Committee will pass to the Allied Control Commission.

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6. The representatives designated by AGO/AMG and AMG 15th Army Group will report to the chairman of the committee in NAPLES as soon as possible and not later than 30 December 1943. Accommodations for the committee and attached personnel will be given priority over all other AGO/AMG personnel except those of Allied Military Government Region III.

7. Direct communication between the committee and AGO/AMG areas and regions on the mainland is authorized, but arrangements for such direct communication will be coordinated with the appropriate higher headquarters. Within the scope of its assigned functions, the decisions of the committee will be binding upon all AGO/AMG organizations on the mainland and its orders will be enforced by them.

8. Movement matters will be dealt with through local movement channels or coordinated with movements, PLANS, as directed by the chairman.

11—CIVIL FOOD CONTROLLER (ITALIAN MAINLAND)

1. The situation in regard to supply and distribution of food for the Italian civil population is grave, and is liable, if unrescued, to have an adverse effect on our ability to conduct operations. It may be desirable in certain cases to accept some diversion of military transport and/or supplies in order to alleviate situations which would result in internal security commitments, rather than to allow such internal security commitments to arise. The primary interest of this headquarters, in meeting the minimum food requirements in ITALY is to avoid interference with military operations. It is an over-riding military consideration that the Civil population be fed. In emergencies where this consideration involves direct interference with military build-up and maintenance, the decision of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, will govern. Machinery for dealing with such matters is, therefore, being established immediately.

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2. The machinery for the execution of this policy will be that of the Central Economic Committee established by Section 1, above, under the Chairmanship of the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, AFHQ Advanced Administrative Kohlson (PLANS.)

3. Colonel W. H. Russ, GOC, United States Army, is hereby appointed additional Vice-Chairman for food control and Civil Food Controller for the mainland of ITALY.

4. The duties of the Civil Food Controller for the mainland of ITALY are:

- a. To coordinate the requirements for foodstuffs for the civilian population and insure that these requirements are placed upon this headquarters through the approved channels.
- b. To keep under constant supervision the food situation in the occupied portions of the mainland of ITALY.
- c. To keep under constant supervision the status of the distributing agencies available for the distribution of the food stocks to civilian consumers.
- d. To bring to the notice of the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer at the earliest possible moment any situation which is likely to create a civilian food crisis which might be prejudicial to the conduct of military operations.

5. The Civil Food Controller shall consult with the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer and a representative of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, on all cases brought to notice under 4d. above. If, as a result of this contact, it is considered that the situation brought to notice by the Civil Food Controller is in fact such as may prejudice military operations, then this situation will be brought to the notice of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, and his directions obtained. The Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, AFHQ Advanced Administrative echelon is hereby authorized to divert, under direction of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, the minimum army resources for the minimum time necessary to correct the situation under discussion. General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, is authorized in his discretion to limit military operations for this period to such an extent as shall be deemed necessary by him to compensate for the diversion of the military resources in question.

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1. To insure the necessary coordination and control of civilian supply and economic units in occupied or controlled territory of the Italian mainland, there will be established in Nicosia a Central Economic Committee under the chairmanship of the Deputy Chief of Staff, responsible directly to this headquarter. In addition to the chairman, there shall be one senior representative of each 15th Army Headquarters and one senior representative to be designated by the Allied Control Commission and its headquarters. The representative of the 15th Army Headquarters will devote their full time to the work of the committee.

2. Such other departments may be required will be made available by the Allied Control Commission, HQ Headquarters and HQ Services, upon the request of the committee. (Aviation, Vehicles and other equipment, etc.) will be provided by the committee.

3. The functions of the Central Economic Committee will be as follows:

- a. To determine the essential requirements of the civilian population.
- b. To control and utilize local resources of essential civilian supplies in coordination with the Local Resources (Fiscal) Board, and pastoral supply to control the collection and distribution of meat and dairy oil.
- c. To coordinate the work of the ACC/OCU representatives in committees and sub-committees of the Local Resources (Fiscal) Board.
- d. To make necessary arrangements for the receipt, warehousing and distribution of supplies allotted for the civilian population.
- e. To establish the prices at which supplies imported for the civilian population will be sold, and to establish uniform standards of measurement under the control of the Allied Military Services.
- f. To establish such units as are required for certain exploratory work as may be considered necessary.

- g. To coordinate requests for transportation of civilian supplies, including the requisitioning of civilian vehicles, aircraft, ships, etc., and transport in time of war.
- h. To maintain liaison with the Civilian Affairs Committee, the Civilian Transport and Supply Committee, the Civilian Affairs Committee, the Civilian Affairs Committee and the Civilian Affairs Committee.

To facilitate the formulation of recommendations for the dismantling of essential industrial complexes, groups of interested persons from each committee of the Central Economic Commission will be formed. These committees will be responsible for the preparation of recommendations for the dismantling of industrial complexes, which will be submitted to the Central Economic Commission.

5. In the absence of the Commissar of the Central Economic Commission, the members of the Central Control Commission, the Commissars of the People's Commissariats of the USSR as well as possible members of the Central Control Commission, will be given the right to act as members of the Central Control Commission.

6. The representations made by ACC/AMC and URG/AMC before December 20, 1945, concerning the preparation and submission of recommendations for the Central Control Commission, will be taken into account in URG/AMC report to the chairman of the Central Control Commission, which will be presented at the Central Control Commission, October 1945.

7. Direct communication between the chairman of URG/AMC and URG/AMC members on the subject of the preparation and submission of recommendations for the Central Control Commission, will be established, the preparation of which will be organized in accordance with the instructions of the Central Control Commission.

8. The decision to submit a single document to the Central Control Commission on the basis of the reports of the committees of the Central Control Commission, may be made by the chairman of the Central Control Commission. In case of disagreement between the members of the Central Control Commission, the chairman of the Central Control Commission may make a decision in accordance with the majority of votes.

9. The chairman of the Central Control Commission, as well as the members of the Central Control Commission, will be entitled to receive compensation for their work in accordance with the regulations of the Central Control Commission, or the Central Control Commission may establish a special financial plan for the Central Control Commission.

10. The members of the Central Control Commission, who have been appointed by the Central Control Commission, will be entitled to receive compensation for their work in accordance with the regulations of the Central Control Commission.

11. Decree of the People's Commissar of the Central Control Commission on December 20, 1945, will be issued by the Central Control Commission on December 20, 1945, and will be valid until the Central Control Commission has been dissolved.

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6. The representatives designated by ACC/AM and 15th Army Group will report to the chairman of the committee in U.S. units on possible and final report to 20 December 1945. Recommendations for the conditions and standard reports will be given prior to the other ACC/AM personnel except those of allied military government, sect. III.
7. Direct communication between the committee and ACC/AM areas and regions in the mainland is authorized, but arrangements for such direct communication will be coordinated with the appropriate higher headquarters. Within the scope of its responsibilities, the committee will be authorized to furnish information to the commandant of the theater through local liaison channels or movement routes, T-20, to directly to the Commandant.

III - CIVIL AND CITIZENSHIP (T-20) SECTION

1. The committee is directed to supply and distribute to the civilian population in the states, and to liaison, if required, to have an overseas escort on our embassy to conduct negotiations. It may be desirable in certain cases to make available to the committee liaison officer and liaison in each individual state which will be responsible to coordinate, regular train or ship communications with the committee to obtain the maximum interest of the members of the committee. It is the commanding officer's responsibility to insure that the liaison officer established by Section I, above, under the chairmanship of the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, ACC/AM, approves administrative liaison (T-20).
 2. The objectives of the executive and liaison will be set at the General Committee Committee established by Section I, above, under the chairmanship of the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, ACC/AM, and shall be to insure that those requirements are placed upon this liaison officer through the liaison officer.
- (a) To keep under constant surveillance the status of the distribution of supplies.
- (b) To keep under constant surveillance the status of the distribution of personnel.
- (c) To keep under constant surveillance the status of the distribution of equipment.
- (d) To take in action of the military forces and to coordinate with the military forces.

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5. The Civil Food Controller shall consult with the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer and a representative of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, on all cases brought to notice under 4, d, above. If, as a result of this contact, it is considered that the situation brought to notice by the Civil Food Controller is in fact such as may prejudice military operations, then this situation will be brought to the notice of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, and his directions obtained. The Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, AFHQ Advanced Administrative echelon is hereby authorized to divert, under direction of the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, the minimum army resources for the minimum time necessary to correct the situation under discussion. General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, 15th Army Group, is authorized in his discretion to limit military operations for this period to such an extent as shall be deemed necessary by him to compensate for the diversion of the military resources in question.

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

SUBJECT: Central Economic Committee

TO : Major General Kenyon A. Joyce, Acting Deputy President, ACC.

1. I enclose for your advice information copies of letter from CAC to General Robertson, together with a draft charter for the Central Economic Committee which it has been decided to appoint on the mainland.
2. The papers are en route to General Robertson by courier and the plan will not be implemented until his approval has been received.
3. As you will see, AMC/ACC must find a really good man; as Executive Vice Chairman in the event that General Robertson is agreeable for himself or General Hamblen to serve as Chairman; or as Chairman, in the event that neither he nor General Hamblen take office.
4. We have undertaken on your behalf that you will appoint a really good man to this job, as it is obvious that he must be acceptable not only to AFHQ but to 15 Army Group also. The officer whose name was mentioned here is Colonel Evans, who would be very acceptable at AFHQ, but I realize that this means reflecting his either permanently or temporarily, depending on the future, from his present executive functions in his Sub-Commission.
5. We shall, of course, be entirely satisfied at any selection you make.
