SUBJECT: Personnel for Supply Administration, Engineering
and Industrial Materials.

To: D-C/S, Operations and Security Intelligence.

1. Initial personnel is required to adequately fulfill the mission of centralized supply administration for Engineering and industrial materials within Headquarters, ACC-AMG; to meet the requirements of the Engineering Materials section of the Allied Force Local Resources Section (AFLRS) established 11 November 1943, under G-4, AFHQ, in their Adm. Memo. No. 77. Under Memo. No. 78, 12 November 1943, the Italian Board of AFLRS was set up for the Mainland, similar to the Island Board previously set up for Sicily.

2. In Par. 5 (c) Memo. of MGS-AFHQ, 12 November 1943 (Ref. 23), "the ACC/AMG representative (on AFLRS) will only make available to his local Board such local resources AS ACC/AMG HEADQUARTERS HAD INSTRUCTED MAY BE MADE AVAILABLE". Par. 6, same memo states, "In providing for civilian needs throughout the whole of Italy including SARDINIA and SICILY, ACC/AMG will often have to transfer surpluses from one area to another area, and representatives of ACC/AMG on local boards will need to work very closely with ACC/AMG HEADQUARTERS in that connection". And in Par. 9, "From ACC/AMG standpoint, this policy should insure (c) authoritative information to guide ACC in its development of local industry and resources.

3. Par. 5, Hq. AMG memo. of 24 November 1943, subject "Local Resources", specifies that "local resources (other than foods) that require to be moved from their present location, may not be utilized except by special permission from this Headquarters". Study of such demands and recommendations thereon, based upon a comprehensive knowledge of overall resources and requirements of all agencies, would be a function of supply administration, under the Industrial Planning Staff.

4. The above policies from AFHQ and Hq. AMG are quoted to affirm the need of a central supply administration on engineering and industrial materials WITHIN ACC/AMG Headquarters, to develop and coordinate information on overall resources and requirements, make allocations, for all of Italy, including Sardinia and Sicily, for critical engineering and industrial materials. The formation of the "Ministerio della Produzione Bellica", - War Production Board in our terminology - and corollary agencies for industrial rehabilitation and materials, would form a counterpart on the Italian government side

With which the Industrial Planning Staff would have liaison and coordination in its field of operations.

5. The recommendation of the Industrial Planning Staff, submitted 18 November 1943, does not conflict with the above policies, but implements them. The function of collating information on resources, requirements, and allocations has been currently delegated to the Industrial Planning Staff by the AFLRS (Italian) Engineering Materials Committee at the Conferences held at Naples. The fulfillment of this mission has already been inaugurated by the Industrial Planning Staff.

6. Based upon the organization chart and proposed Table of Organization (incl. 1), it is recommended that G-1 be requested to supply the personnel needed, as per attached letter, (incl. 2). The consensus of opinion of Army personnel, as gleaned at the meeting of representatives of P.B.S., British District No. 2, CEMEC, I.B.S., etc., at Naples on Engineering Materials, was that they would welcome ACC/AMG taking over the job of survey, location, and disposition of local resources, when ACC/AMG became organized to do so. It is a big job.

7. Attention is invited to Par. 4, Hq AMG, memo of 24 Nov. 1943, subject "Local Resources", which states "Information collected by sub-commissions should be passed through Directorates to Heads of Sections who will send it to the Secretary of Allied Intelligence Committee for collation". Under plans developed at the Conferences at Naples on Engineering Materials it was the decision of the conference that the Industry and Commerce Sub-commission submit data from all sub-commissions within the Directorate and from Regions, on resources and requirements, directly to the Industrial Planning Staff for compilation, segregation, and source of information for all agencies concerned, and for submission of reports as required; as well as liaison with AFLRS of AFHQ (Italian) on materials discussed herein. Industrial Planning Staff would develop directly similar information from agencies outside AMG/ACC, such as PBS, IBS, British Districts, Navies, CEMEC, etc., on these materials. The interposition of A.I.C. in the flow of this information and of supply records would produce duplication and delay, without economy of personnel.

8. Appendix C-3, Directive No. 1, 10 November 1943, does not include industrial materials in categories of information gathered by A.I.C., while Par. 3, Appendix C-5, directs Industrial Planning Staff to obtain information from Sections, Sub-Commissions, etc., and as delegated at Conference, from outside sources on Engineering Materials.

ORGANIZATION OF SUPPLY ADMINISTRATION

1. The proposed organization of the Supply administration under the Industrial Planning Staff will be subject to alteration as the more complex situations of a devastated Northern Italy are exposed. With survey and record operations completed and an continuing method of survey in operation immediately behind the advancing troops, expansion in personnel is not anticipated.

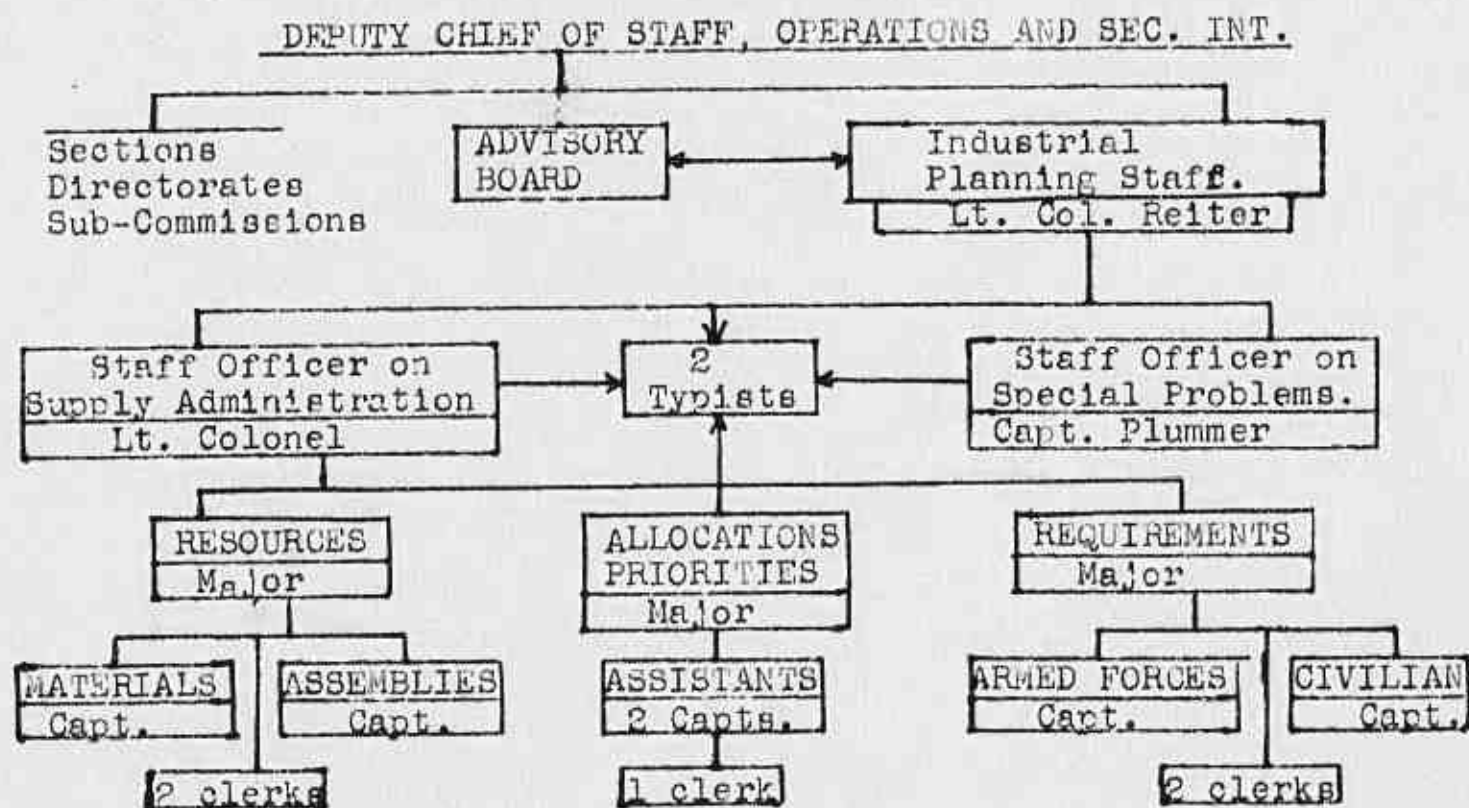

2. The ADVISORY BOARD will be composed of representatives of appropriate Sections or Sub-commissions, to meet weekly or as often as required for the purpose of presenting and adjusting requirements, supplies, allocations, etc., and advising on matters concerning supply. Decisions will remain with the Industrial Planning Staff.

3. Resources and Requirements will maintain statistics. Allocations Section will derive basic information from other Sections. Allocation and Priorities Section can at present co-ordinate supply problems.

1. Information required of AMG/ACC by the Engineering Materials Sub-Commission of AFHQ Advanced Administrative Echelon will consist of an inventory of local supplies and monthly productive capacity for the seven main categories of materials listed in par. 2, together with estimates of minimum civilian requirements. The AMG/ACC responsibility for determination of supplies on hand and productive capacity rests with the Sub-Commission listed opposite each category. The responsibility for all estimates of civilian needs rests with Industry and Commerce Sub-Commission, to be estimated for a period of one month in advance.

SUBJECT: Personnel for Industrial Planning Staff.

To: G-1, Allied Military Government.

1. It is directed that the following officers be assigned to the Industrial Planning Staff, for the operation of a central supply administration on engineering and industrial materials (resources, requirements, allocations, etc.) in connection with organization of Allied Force Local Resources Boards (AFLRB).

- a. One (1) Lt. Colonel, section chief.
- b. Three (3) Majors
- c. Six (6) Captains

2. These officers should be industrial engineers of the planning and statistical types with broad knowledge of materials and industry, preferably with industrial or mechanical engineering education. Officers who have served with the Ministry of Supply (British) or War Production Board or Headquarters Army Service Forces (U.S.) would be preferred to those with experience with the Armed Forces.

3. It is also directed that the following E.M. or O/R be assigned to the Industrial Planning Staff, in connection with above and other operations. They have none now.

- a. Two (2) clerk-typists, for general use.
- b. Five (5) clerks for supply operations.

4. While operations are more intensive in the earlier phases of information procurement and organization, the continuing processes of detailed surveys and supply operations will become more complex as we move into the Northern industrial and devastated areas. Early assignment of this personnel would expedite the execution of missions.

1. Born - July 4, 1899.

2. Place - Waterbury, Connecticut.

3. Education:

- (a) Georgetown University School of Law, degree LLB, 1925.
- (b) George Washington University, degree A.B., 1927.
- (c) Member of District of Columbia Law Bar.

4. Experience (Civilian).

(a) For 20 years he has been engaged in simplification and standardization work carried on by industry and government. He was employed at the National Bureau of Standards, U. S. Department of Commerce, from 1923 to 1933 in work in commercial standardization. He supervised and edited the preparation of manuscripts for directories of standards and specifications and various editions of the Standards Yearbook. During the year 1931, he served as Liaison Officer on the staff of the American Standards Association in coordinating the standardization activities of that organization representing industry with those of Government.

(b) From 1933 to 1936, he was the official representative of the National Bureau of Standards on the staff of the National Recovery Administration. He served as Code Advisor on more than 150 codes covering a variety of commodities and services with particular regard to quality and performance on the basis of established standards and specifications. He later became an Assistant Deputy Administrator. In addition, he made legal studies of price fixing provisions in codes to determine their economic effects on the consuming public.

(c) From 1936-1941, he served as Chief of the Consumer Standards Section of the National Bureau of Standards and directed work in procurement and in commercial standardization in connection with procurement policies and procedures of governmental agencies (State, county and municipal) throughout the country. For his work in this field, he was made an honorary member of the Governmental Purchasers Group of the National Association of Purchasing Agents. He represented the Department of Commerce on the Standards Council of the American Standards Association

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and also on several technical committees of that Association. He was a member of the U. S. Department of Commerce Legislative Committee whose function was to consider legal matters of interest to or affecting the Department. He directed studies of Federal and other governmental specifications and standards with respect to conservation of scarce materials and the use of substitute materials which led to the development of a program for the issuance of Federal Emergency Alternate Specifications. He is author of a publication entitled "Standardization Activities of National Technical and Trade Organizations in the United States".

(d) In 1940 he was designated by the National Bureau of Standards as Liaison Officer with the War Production Board and the Office of Price Administration in matters relating to standards and specifications and conservation of critical and strategic materials.

(e) In 1941 by direction of the Secretary of Commerce, he was detailed for the duration to the War Production Board to accept assignment as Chief of the Materials and Requirements Branch of the Bureau of Governmental Requirements. This work consisted in determining requirements of critical and other materials for the maintenance and operation of essential services of governmental agencies throughout the country in the interest of defense, safety, and health of the people; also in facilitating the use of specifications and the utilization of substitute materials in an effort to conserve critical materials for the war effort.

5. Experience (Military).

(a) This officer is performing the duties of Chief, Standards and Specifications Section of the Conservation Branch, Production Division, Headquarters, Army Service Forces.

(b) In addition to serving as Chief of the Section, his present duties carry a broad responsibility in fields dealing with simplification, standardization, and conservation. They include coordination of the standardization and simplification activities of the War Department, and the elimination of critical materials from equipment and supplies, wherever possible. He attends a number of industry meetings held under the auspices of the War Production Board with respect to simplification and standardization problems as they concern the armed services. He is the War Department's Alternate Member on the Standards Council of the American Standards Association. He is also Liaison Officer between the Production Division and the Conservation Division of the War Production Board in simplification and standardization matters.

(c) He has cooperated very closely since 1925 with the Standards Division, Planning Branch, then located in the Office of the Assistant

Secretary of War, in his capacity both as a civilian and as a reserve officer.

(d) He accepted appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps on March 24, 1930, and prior to his current tour of active duty has had the following periods of active duty training:

1. This report after circulation to sub-commissions and corrections based upon their recommendations was submitted to your office. Major Driffield-White received additional comments from other sources and returned to Ind. Plan. Staff. for further check. It is now enroute with our files.

2. In meantime Col. Evans received similar priority report, based upon same criteria as ours, from Italian government. Our office prepared report for Col. Evans giving our views, favoring our set-up, due to military aspect, rather than civilian priority.

3. Attached copy indicates situation in so far as Italian conference is concerned for final agreement or exchange of views.

4. Upon return to our hands in Naples, 1st would favor obtaining concurrence of 15th Army Group before your ~~approval~~ final approval and establishment as guide or directive.

SUBJECT: Survey of Sicilian Industrial Plants and Material Stocks.

TO: Deputy C. of S. (O&S. I.)

1. The attached memorandum outlines a plan for surveying a selected list of important Sicilian industrial plants and their stocks of raw materials.

2. Purpose of such a survey is to determine which plants in Sicily might be used to produce goods needed to further the war effort or meet essential civilian needs and to find where raw materials possibly more useful to us elsewhere are now located.

3. The proposal has been discussed informally with Col. Young of Security Intelligence and Major Alexander of Region I. Both have approved the proposal.

4. If the survey is undertaken it is important that an officer with a broad knowledge of chemical engineering be assigned to this project, particularly in surveying plants in the Eastern part of the island, since most of the important plants in that area are in some branch of the chemical industry.

5. It is estimated that the survey could be completed in about 15 days by two officers using the procedure outlined in the attached memorandum.

PROPOSED SURVEY OF SICILIAN INDUSTRIAL
PLANTS AND RAW MATERIAL STOCKS ON HAND

1. Purpose of survey: Sicily has a number of industrial plants which in the past have produced goods useful to military operations or in meeting essential civilian needs. The purpose of this survey would be to determine present status of those plants, problems involved in getting them back into operation, and the quantity of raw materials and finished goods on hand.

2. Procedure: A list of 161 Sicilian industrial plants secured by Region I from an industrial survey of the island made some time ago by the Bank of Sicily has been analyzed and 52 of the plants listed have been classified as worthy of study by us. Sulphur mines and power plants were not included in the original list and have not been considered here since they are being handled separately by Region I. Most of the plants excluded from the list of 161 are small flour mills and wineries. Flour mills appear to be operating generally as wheat becomes available and wineries are not important to us. List of the 52 plants to be surveyed is attached hereto.

a. A questionnaire has been prepared (draft attached). This would be filled out by the plant manager or owner with the survey crew checking the answers where there was reason to believe they had been falsified. Answers requested would provide us with essential data required to determine whether we could get needed production from a given plant; machinery, labor, raw materials and power required to operate the plant; and present stocks of raw materials and finished goods.

b. The survey would be made in three parts: (1) provinces of Messina, Catania, Siracusa, and Ragusa; (2) provinces of Trapani and Agrigento; (3) province of Palermo. A list of plants arranged by provinces and cities so as to form itineraries for the survey crew is attached. The survey crew on its trip out would distribute the questionnaires to plant managers, explain purpose of the survey, and arrange to pick up the completed forms a few days later. After completing distribution of the questionnaires in the eastern provinces, for example, the survey crew would backtrack on the route covered and pick up the completed forms. Similar procedures would be followed for the Western provinces and for Palermo province.

c. It is anticipated that plant managers will tend to overstate requirements and understate stocks on hand. Therefore, when picking up the completed forms the survey crew would make personal inspections of plants being surveyed if there were any reason to believe answers had been falsified. Col. Young has suggested that detailed examinations be made of two or three plants to serve as a guide to honesty of plant managers generally.

d. The survey crew would check its list of plants for each province or large city with the local CAO to determine whether any important plants had been omitted. According to Major Alexander the CAO's will cooperate in this since no previous survey of Sicilian industry has been made (with the exception of sulphur mines and power plants) and one is needed.

e. Since most of the Sicilian plants worthy of study are in some branch of the chemical industry, at least one of the two officers on the survey crew should be a chemical engineer capable of evaluating chemical plant operations and talking intelligently to managers of such plants.

1. For the purpose of general planning, the important industrial materials of Italy are shown on the attached tabulation, with the approximate percentage of self sufficiency for the items in which shortages existed prior to 1942.

2. The percentage figures of self-sufficiency are approximate and are based upon figures and conditions between 1938 and 1941, as available in surveys and handbooks at our disposal.

3. Under conditions that might exist during future Allied control: possible destruction of industries using critical raw materials; dislocation of requirements, due to specific needs of the Allied Forces, rehabilitation demands, etc.; criticalness and percentages of self-sufficiency will vary considerably from the figures presented. Frequent revision of a critical item list will be necessary as more exact current information becomes available.

4. The list is divided into four categories:

a. MATERIALS ENTIRELY IMPORTED; for which there are practically no sources within Italy. Extreme conservation and control will become essential.

b. MATERIALS PRODUCED DOMESTICALLY IN PART; but insufficient to meet normal industrial requirements. Controls will be necessary in proportion to current deficiencies.

c. MATERIALS AMPLE FOR NORMAL NEEDS; which are produced within Italy in quantities to meet normal requirements.

d. SURPLUS INDUSTRIAL MATERIALS that may be available for export.

8. These categories serve as guides to the closeness of supervision that may be required over inventories, improper distribution and usage, and other factors involved in safeguarding our interests.
