Reference your message 4278 dated 4 January 1944 and in confirmation of this Headquarters' message 26987 dated 11 JAN 44.

1. (i) It would seem that the statement "few handbooks, guides and special reports have reached officers for whom intended", is hardly correct, for, until the various Headquarters left Tizi Ouzou a very fair supply of intelligence had been obtained and passed to those concerned. Insufficient quantities and non-arrivals may, in some cases, have given cause for complaint, but it is considered that distribution has been carefully made.

(ii) The instance quoted is not clear. Has the material, prepared and approved by all the interested Washington agencies, been requested by the Labour Sub-Commission? A little clarification on this point would seem necessary.

2. A recommendation for more detailed information was passed to London at the end of November 1943.

3. (i) Referring to the request for 25 additional copies of all handbooks, economic reports and guides previously sent. It is pointed out that this request is somewhat vague and if passed to Washington or London by this Headquarters, would immediately be referred back for more detail. Material requested must be specified.

(ii) It is, of course, likely that Washington will not be willing to forward 25 copies - for instance, until now, very few copies of each economic report are forwarded for use in the whole of North Africa.

(iii) It is felt that a certain amount of more up to date intelligence may now be available in Italy which would be of more value than somewhat out-dated material from Washington or London.

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

regarding the establishment of machinery to deal with Local Resources herewith for information.

2. A memorandum on the broad policy in relation to Local Resources and Exports has been supplied to the following:

- (a) Industrial Planning Staff.
- (b) Secretary Allied Intelligence Committee (Major Hinkel).
- (c) Foreign Trade Sub-Commission.
- (d) All sub-commissions under the Economic Directorate.
- (e) All sub-commissions in the Communications Section.

3. Special attention is directed to paragraph 4 of Adm memo No. 78. Further instructions will be issued regarding the type of information required and the methods by which it will be collected, collated and forwarded. In the meantime sub-commissions directly concerned with local resources will continue to collect all available information in their respective fields.

4. Information collected by sub-commissions should be passed through directors to Heads of Sections who will send it to the Secretary A.I.C. for collation.

5. Local resources (other than food) that require to be moved from their present location may not be utilized except by special permission from this Headquarters. Demands should be accompanied by full particulars of the goods and reasons for their employment.

Note: No requests for permission to utilize local resources (other than food) that require to be moved from their present location should be submitted for the present. All such demands will have to be considered by the A.F.L.S. (I) B. under a procedure to be set-up by the Board and notified later.

GUIDE TO INTELLIGENCE PUBLICATIONS (No. 3)

ITALY, FRANCE, ALBANIA, YUGOSLAVIA, GREECE, and BULGARIA

1. This list replaces the "Guide to Intelligence Publications--Italy," dated 25 September, 1943.
2. The publications are available upon application through channels to G-2, OI(Library), 4.F.H.Q., situated in Room 167 (Phone: Area 166) or Ecole Normale (Phone: Portune 115).
3. So far as possible the list has been divided into "Subject" headings, but many G. D. Studies cover so many subjects that analysis is difficult. To discover what intelligence is available on any particular subject in Italy, it is necessary to examine both SECTION A (all sources) and SECTION B (intelligence prepared in Washington, D. C., such as O.F.I. 104 and Strategic Engineering Studies). To determine what intelligence is available on France, Albania, Yugoslavia, Greece, and Bulgaria, it is necessary to examine SECTION C (intelligence prepared in Washington, D. C. and in the United Kingdom).

4. Areas covered as at 21 November, 1943.

ITALY.

- (1) Southern ITALY, up to line Gaeta - Foggia.
- (2) West Central ITALY, west of line:  
Gaeta - Sorè - Rieti - Florence - Spozia.
- (3) East Central ITALY, east of line:  
Morena - Terni - Rieti - Avezzano - Gaierzo.
- (4) Northern ITALY, covers the whole of ITALY,  
North of approximately 44° N. Latitude.

FRANCE.

- (1) Area covered is from Spanish-French Frontier up to a line approximately 40° 30'N, passing through Les Sables - Poitiers - Moulins - Lausanne (U.S.S. Study, prepared in Washington).

SUBJECT: Central Supply Administration for Allied Control Commission and Allied Military Government.

To: Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations and Security Intelligence

I. The Problem:

1. There is need for a central supply administration for locating, listing, segregating and controlling the resources of Italy; for collecting and evaluating the requirements of the Regions under ACC-AMG control, the sub-commissions, and agencies of ACC-AMG; for transmitting to Regions and sub-commissions requirements of the agencies of the Armed Forces; and for allocating materials and equipment to specific plants, industries, Regions, and agencies.

II. *Op.* Facts bearing upon the problem:

1. Operations in Italy will be confronted with the scarcity of materials and equipment to fill the requirements of essential industries needed by the Allied Military effort and the minimum needs of the Italian civilian economy.

2. Thorough knowledge of the availability of materials and equipment must be obtained: from stocks on hand, adjusted monthly to actual supplies available; production, actual and estimated by months; other sources of supply, in nearby areas or other imports. In devastated areas, salvage and cannibalization will form important sources of materials and equipment, record of which must be obtained.

a. Stocks are difficult to locate, since much material can be found in not generally known places. Intensive surveys and searches will be required to compile reliable data on precise locations, ownership, and inventories.

b. Materials and equipment so located will have to either moved to locked warehouses, or listed on sworn statements with withdrawal forbidden under severe penalties.

c. Regions and various agencies have made individual surveys for specific items, but the information has not been available in a central responsible agency, so that direct allotment or assignment for specific jobs has not been feasible.

d. Regions and lower level offices do not have the personnel, time, nor specialization to uncover sizeable quantities

of needed materials. Special officers from the Sub-Commissions of Headquarters, AC, should be temporarily assigned to the Regions, under the direction of the Regional Chief Civil Affairs Officers, for the purposes of material surveys, but transmitting their reports and information directly to the Central Materials Administration at A.C. Headquarters. These officers should have knowledge of the materials for which they search. Regions will retain copies of listings within their own areas.

e. Findings of materials or equipment should be reported by cities (or communes), provinces and regions; listing actual locations, ownership, quantity, type, condition, etc. Listing by lowest echelon of locality permits utilization as near to points of need as possible, saving undue depletion of individual areas, saving transportation, and permitting quick inspection at any time.

f. A sample form for survey is attached as Appendix A. Place for sworn signature of owner is provided, and receipt for notice of freezing with penalties for illegal removal. It is intended that all materials and equipment designated for survey be listed fully. A suggested list of essential materials and equipment is attached as Appendix B.

g. On the same forms, the survey will include the essential data on the facility examined: product, production capacity, actual current production, raw materials used and their sources, fuel consumption, power consumption, current and maximum employment, wage scale, and other pertinent information. If in damaged or run-down condition, needs for repairs and time to recondition will be included. This will permit evaluation of which plants to concentrate materials, which to cannibalize, and where to direct efforts in quickest rehabilitation with the least outlay of time and materials.

h. Copies of surveys previously made by Regions, Sub-commissions, and agencies will be procured and checked. Civilian sources of information will be studied, and civilian assistance used as far as practicable.

i. Recommended personnel for assignment to Regions for survey purposes is shown in Appendix C. The process of survey will be a continuing one, as Regions are constituted and areas opened. More intensive searches will be required in the devastated areas and should be undertaken as early as practicable, in the Army Group areas. Salvage operations, cannibalization, and extreme means of material procurement should be immediately undertaken.

j. The Central Supply Administration will accumulate, segregate, and record all supplies from all sources of information available.

5. Accurate knowledge of precise requirements for materials and equipment, broken down into specific facilities, projects or purposes; and by locations in cities, provinces and/or Regions; is essential to proper distribution of resources.

a. Requirements for critical materials should be submitted as immediate, and projected ahead for three months by months, so that allocations and processes of procurement and delivery can be completed. What, where and when needed should be the basis of requests for material. Requirements should be resubmitted each month, with such revisions as conditions have occasioned.

in accordance with instructions of APLKING

b. Regions, Sub-commissions, or agencies will submit these requirements for critical materials and equipment to the Central Supply Administration, who will collect, evaluate, and totalize them, making specific allocations from known materials where the supply of such materials is insufficient to meet needs.

c. Where materials are available within Regions, and ample for general use, clearance through the Central Supply Administration would be unnecessary. Lists of the materials requiring clearance would be published.

d. From the deficiencies determined as incapable of fulfillment from Italian sources, for materials and equipment deemed essential to the Allied war effort, the Central Supply Administration will compile phased schedules of requirements from overseas, and submit such requirements to higher authority for procurement.

4. A CENTRAL SUPPLY ADMINISTRATION, in Headquarters of A. G. C. and A. M. G. is essential to the orderly control of scarce materials and equipment. Its functions would be

a. Arrange for surveys and searches for materials and equipment, using such personnel as can be made available, under the direction of the Regions.

b. Advise the Industrial Planning Staff where deficiencies in procurement are expected so that plans can be made for increased supplies by coordination between Sections, or such means as may be devised.

c. Act as central office of record of supplies, requirements, and allocations, as described above.

d. Act as administrator of supply, requesting alterations of requirements, utilizing its staff to check where doubts exist; checking reported supplies; and making allocations based upon established priorities. Where deemed necessary, a reserve stock-pile will be maintained for emergency purposes or future anticipated needs.

e. Compile phased schedules of requirements from overseas, and submit such requirements to higher authority for fulfillment.

f. A proposed Chart and Table of Organization for the Supply Administration is attached in Appendix D.

A SUPPLY ADMINISTRATOR be appointed, under the Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations and Security Intelligence, with full powers of allocation of materials and equipment among Regions, Sub-commissions, and agencies, subject to priorities established by higher authority, and based upon full information as to available supplies and requirements, obtained as described hereinbefore, and to perform other functions of supply as set forth in Par. 4; with an appropriate staff as indicated in Appendix D.

2. Pending the establishment of a Supply Administration, the Industrial Planning Staff be directed to initiate the preliminary functions of the Supply Administration, in

7. SHIPPING AND SHIP-BUILDING: Steel plate, welding equipment, acetylene generators, calcium carbide, cutting torches, oxygen cylinders.



SUBJECT: Local Resources for the Use of the Armed Forces

The following information is intended as an advance indication of the broad Policy which has been agreed in relation to LOCAL RESOURCES and EXPORTS.

LOCAL RESOURCES.

1. An AFHQ LOCAL RESOURCES (ITALIAN) BOARD is now being set up to control the local procurement of supplies, services and facilities available to the armed forces within ITALY (including SICILY and SARDINIA).
2. This Board will co-ordinate all Navy, Army and Air Force requirements from local sources and lay down the procedure for procurement of them.
3. Working under the central Board there will be local Boards (similar to the one already functioning in SICILY).
4. ACC/AMG will be represented on the central Board (and local boards) and will advise the Boards what local resources are and can be made available to them, i.e., all such local resources as are not essential to civilian requirements.
5. The way in which the Boards will work, is broadly as follows:
  - (a) the Navy, Army and Air Force in any one area will make known their requirements to the local Board.
  - (b) the local Board will then ascertain from its ACC/AMG member what local resources can be made available to the armed forces and will authorise their procurement.
  - (c) The ACC/AMG representative will only make available to his local Board such local resources as ACC/AMG Headquarters has instructed may be made available.

- 6. Because there are surpluses over civilian requirements, in one area, or developable resources, it does not follow that these surpluses and resources can be made available to the armed forces in that area.

In providing for civilian needs throughout the whole of ITALY (including SARDINIA and SICILY), ACC/AMG will often have to transfer the surpluses of one area to another area, and the Reps. of ACC/AMG on local Boards will need to work very closely with ACC/AMG Headquarters in that connection.

- 7. On the other hand (after providing for essential civilian needs) ACC/AMG will do everything possible to meet the full requirements of the armed forces -- by making available surpluses -- by placing at their disposal local industry, services and facilities -- by fostering increased production of foodstuffs -- and generally assisting in the development of those industries which can produce military requirements.
- 8. It follows of course that ACC/AMG Headquarters will work in the closest liaison with the central AMHQ LOCAL RESOURCES (ITALIAN) BOARD, which is expected to start work by the beginning of Dec.
- 9. From ACC/AMG standpoint, this Policy should ensure:
  - (a) the systematic utilisation and allocation of local resources between civil and military
  - (b) prevention of competitive buying
  - (c) authoritative information to guide ACC in its development of local industry and resources.

EXPORTS.

10. After civilian needs, C.C.S. priority exports, and requirements of the armed forces have been met (in that order), ACC/AMG is responsible for exporting such surpluses as it may decide.
11. Pending the issue of a detailed directive the method of dealing with exports from ITALY (including SICILY and SARDEGNA) will be as follows:

CHANNEL OF PROCEDURE.

- (a) ACC/AMG will advise available exports to MGS.
- (b) MGS will negotiate the sale of exports, and all enquiries, correspondence, and negotiations with Govts, Ministries and Agencies outside ITALY will, provisionally, be conducted through MGS.

BUYING PRICES AND ACCOUNTING PROCEDURE WITHIN ITALY.

ACC/AMG will agree or if necessary fix a fair price to be paid to the supplier. As a broad basis, this price will be determined by manufacturing or production cost, including a fair margin of profit.

ACC/AMG will pay in A.M. lire for goods to be exported, recording quantity purchased and shipped, and accounting money thereon expended as straight expenditure by ACC/AMG.

1. The attached information is intended as an advance resume of the broad Policy which has been agreed, with other interested AFHQ Sections, in relation to Local Resources and the needs of the armed forces.

2. It is expected that AFHQ LOCAL RESOURCES (ITALIAN) BOARD will commence work at FLAMBO by the end of this month.

3. We have also indicated the broad Policy which should be adopted in relation to Exports, pending the issue of a detailed Directive, because certain aspects of both Local Purchase and Export are immediate problems with you.

4. The whole question of Buying and Selling Prices for Exports and Imports (their relation to inflation and Italian economy) is the subject of our immediate attention. It is planned to discuss this matter with you shortly and then to forward our joint recommendations to the C.C.S.

ALLIED FORCE LOCAL RESOURCES (ITALIAN) BOARD

1. Pursuant to Administrative Memorandum No. 77, this headquarters, cc, the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board is hereby set up to carry out the policies of this headquarters in regard to the local procurement and allocation of supplies, facilities and services, except rail and water transport and petroleum, required by the military within the Italian Mainland, now or in the future, occupied by the Armed Forces under the command of this headquarters.

2. The Board will coordinate all Navy, Army and Air Forces requirements from local resources and decide on policies and procedure for the procurement of them. It will allocate to the interested agencies of the Armed Forces the local resources available for each.

3. In giving effect to paragraph 3 of Administrative Memorandum No. 77, this headquarters, cc, the Board will work in liaison with the Allied Control Commission and Allied Military Government.

4. Nothing in this Administrative Memorandum shall abrogate the responsibility of the Allied Control Commission, or Allied Military Government to utilize and develop the local resources of ITALY.

9. There will be a permanent joint U.S. and British Secretariat of the Board responsible for maintaining records of all meetings and furnishing the secretarial requirements of the Sub-Committees referred to in paragraph 12 below.

10. The Allied Control Commission will provide the Board with information regarding local resources of all kinds and also state the minimum needs of civilian requirements. The Board will, in coordinating the needs of all interested agencies of the Armed Forces with the needs of the Control Commission, allocate to the Military agencies concerned the local resources available for each.

11. Any matters for decision by higher authority will be forwarded by the Chairman to this headquarters.


12. To assist it to carry out its functions, the Board may establish Sub-Committees as necessary. The membership and duties of these Sub-Committees will be determined by the Board, which will insure that all interested parties are represented.

13. Additional Boards, where necessary, under the Chairmanship of the Base Section Commander (American) or Commander Base Sub-Area (British), as the case may be, may on the advice of the Board, be set up as necessary to deal with local questions. The names of any additional Boards set up will indicate the areas for which they are responsible to the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board set up by this memorandum. (AG 321(AFHQ)GDS-AGM)

ITALIAN TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS : RELATIONS BETWEEN THE MOVEMENTS AND  
TRANSPORTATION ORGANIZATION OF THE ALLIED MILITARY FORCES, AND THE  
TRANSPORTATION ORGANIZATION OF THE ALLIED COMMISSION.

I -- RAILWAYS

1. This directive deals with the respective responsibilities for the control and operation of ITALIAN railways of:

- a. The Movement and Transportation organizations of the Allied Military Forces, including the Military Railway Service \*
- b. The Internal Transportation Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission, and the Transportation Sections of the Allied Military Government, 15th Army Group.

2. The directive also defines the relations between a. and b. above.

3. a. The responsibilities of G-4 (Mov & Tn), this headquarters, and the staffs and services operating under its control\* are laid down in Administrative Memorandum No. 13, this headquarters, dated 20 October 1942. The instructions contained in that memorandum are a guide to the general policy to be adopted by the Allied Forces for establishing their movement and transportation organizations in occupied territory.

b. These instructions, with any amendments in detail which may from time to time become necessary, will continue to form the basis of the movement and transportation policy to be followed in all parts of ITALY occupied by the Allied Forces under command of this headquarters.

\*NOTE: Instructions covering the establishment on the mainland of ITALY, and the functions of AFHQ Advanced Administrative Echelon (FIAMBO) are given in Administrative Memorandum No. 67, this headquarters, etc. In this directive, FIAMBO will be regarded as the appropriate military authority, and the Movements and Transportation organizations under its control as the appropriate Movements and Transportation organizations, in all cases covered by the responsibilities of FIAMBO as given in Administrative Memorandum No. 67.

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ADM MEMO #76 (Cont'd)

4. The responsibilities of the Director General, Military Railway Service, for the development and operation of all Italian railways are given in General Order No. 60, this headquarters, cs.

5. a. The responsibilities and functions of the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission are given in Allied Control Commission Planning Directive No. 7 dated 26 September 1943, Appendix "F". (NOTE: To be reissued with slight amendments shortly).

b. Of these responsibilities and functions, those concerned with the control, supervision and operation of Italian railways will only be applicable to those sections of railway which are from time to time returned (by the Allied Military Forces) to civilian administration under the supervision of the Transportation Section, Allied Military Government, or the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission. (Reference is made to paragraph 1, General Orders No. 60, this headquarters, cs).

6. In those parts of Italian territory where the railways are under the control of the Allied forces, through their Movements and Transportation organizations, the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission will detail personnel to be attached to the appropriate military Movements and Transportation organizations. Such personnel of the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission will be commanded and administered through normal Allied Military Government or Allied Control Commission channels. Detailed allocations of staff will be made in accordance with direct arrangements between G-4 (Mov & Tr), this headquarters, and the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission.

7. The responsibilities, so far as the subject of this directive is concerned, of the personnel of the Transportation Sub-Commission referred to in paragraph 6 above, will be:

a. Liaison and cooperation with Movements and Transportation personnel of the Allied Military Forces.

b. To coordinate at the appropriate levels, all demands made by the Allied Military Government, the Allied Control Commission and the Italian authorities, for movement designed to meet civil needs, and to establish relative priorities between those demands.

c. To represent such requirements to the military Movements and Transportation staffs concerned, in order that these bids may be considered by the military authority in common with bids for military requirements.

d. To make preparations for taking over the supervision of any parts of the Italian railway systems returned to civilian administration as described in paragraph 5 b above.

c. To agree with the appropriate Movements and Transportation staffs of the Allied forces what portions of the Italian railways the movement and Transportation staffs will recommend to the Commander-in-Chief, Allied Force, for return to civilian administration under the supervision of the Transportation Section of the Allied Military Government or of the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission.

NOTE: Such portions of the Italian railways will not be handed over on the orders of the Commander-in-Chief, Allied Force, to civilian administration until

- (1) the Allied military forces have no further vital interests in the area concerned.
- (2) the Internal Transportation Sub-Commission is in a position to provide such supervisory Allied personnel as the Sub-Commission considers necessary
- and (3) the Italian railway administration is capable, in the opinion of the Commander-in-Chief, of operating sufficiently to meet essential needs, the portion of railway concerned.


II - INLAND WATERWAYS AND HIGHWAYS (Except local bus and tram services)
