With reference to your pencilled note on the attached memorandum, the answers seem to me to be the following : -

- (a) the wholesaler;
- (b) from the Italian Customs vocabulary.

Gasoline which was taken out of bond in Sicily was sold to the civilian population at a price including Customs duty, so that the Italian Customs officials have a legitimate claim for the recovery of such dues.

I am aware that your department likes away from anything to do with Finance; and if there is a Finance Officer everywhere that there is a Supply Officer he would assume the necessary responsibilities. But it is most unlikely that as the advance proceeds north any Finance Officers would be retained in ports specifically for the purpose of handling Civilian supplies. You must admit that it would be entirely inequitable for you to hand over Civilian supplies free of duty to an Italian wholesaler to be passed on to the public at a price including Customs duty, without making some effort to enable the Italian authorities to collect the difference.

It is believed that payment of the 51st Italian Army Corps stationed near Cantamura was effected out of funds advanced by ANGOT to the Banca d'Italia. A full report is urgently required on this or any other cases that have arisen. It may be possible to show that funds of the Banca d'Italia existing before occupation were used for effecting this payment.

I write to acknowledge the receipt of and to thank you for your C.M./15/134 of 17th October, and C.M./15/144 of 18th October.

With reference to the latter, the opening of Post Office Savings Banks must always be depending upon the availability and distribution of funds in contra-distinction to the deposit banks, the Post Office Savings Bank is unable to compute the demands that might be made upon it; and to open a Branch in the Province of (a) and not in the Province of (b) would lead to considerable traffic from (b) to (a) of depositors. If your Finance Officer in conjunction with the Intendents is satisfied that sufficient funds are available in all Post Offices, I am in agreement that they should be opened. But I would indicate that it has not been found possible to do this in either Legion I or Legion 5.

Subject: Advance Supply Section, A.O.C. Headquarters.

1. Requests have been received at this Headquarters in the past week for us to co-ordinate for General Robertson's Headquarters and others, the following matters of concern to all Southern Italy irrespective of administrative boundaries:

- (a) Rail movements for civil supplies and personnel (copy attached).
- (b) Coal requirements and organisation of distribution.
- (c) Petroleum requirements and organisation of distribution.
- (d) Shipping needs.
- (e) Allocation and movement of wheat surpluses in Foggia, Matera and Potenza.

2. This Headquarters undertook the co-ordination of bids for shipping for all Southern Italy civil supplies so that Adv. Adm. Scholten, A.P.M. would not have to deal with a number of agencies in the civil supply field, at the same time recognising that we were out of our administrative sphere in so doing. While it was possible to handle this single additional assignment with the limited staff allotted in our AS/10, it will be quite impossible to cope with the demands outlined in paragraph 1 above. Moreover, if the A.O.C. supply organisation is to accord with the rest of the re-organisation, which assigns this Headquarters the primary responsibility of caring for 4th, 5th and 8th Armies, duties such as the above should be handled by a separate Headquarters.

3. Therefore it is recommended that a small Advance Supply Section of A.O.C. Headquarters, Valnera, be established urgently at Naples to deal with these and similar problems for all Southern Italy considered as an economic unit. The attached will indicate the type of requests now being handled here which should be handled more properly by such a group. The personnel required is indicated by the questions raised in paragraph 1. Major Chayton now at Naples might form the nucleus for the group.

4. Your early consideration is requested in view of the pressing nature of the problem involved. May we be advised by signal of any action taken.

Subject: Currency

It is reported by Lieutenant Lord Middleton, the Liaison Officer of the Allied Military Mission in Syria to, that you advised with the banks should not be authorized to change Maltese and other currencies now circulating illegally in your area. I can readily understand that certain troops arrive with such currencies and that they expect to change them at the General Pay Office, but I am surprised to hear that such notes are actually in circulation and would be most interested to learn if they pass freely and without discount. It is not our policy to allow Italian banks to become holders of foreign exchange, obtaining thereby a claim on one of the Allied countries. An additional reason is that large quantities of Algerian francs were taken from North Africa by the Germans and Italians; and that any public recognition of such currency would allow hoards to be unloaded.

As you know I have been aware for sometime of the existence of R.M.A. Lira (Tripolitania) notes in Apulia. But I should hesitate to publicise that such notes are not legal tender, as any such notice would have the effect of placing all R.M.A. notes under suspicion. You are aware of my conversation with O.C. S6 Area on this subject at least 5 weeks ago; and his reply did not encourage me to recommend any further notices to the British Army that any currency in their possession was not legal tender.

I realise that the present position is anomalous and that I appear to be condoning the circulation of a currency which is in no sense legal tender in this country. But you cannot prevent the soldier, sailor or airman from Tripoli leaving with some notes in his pocket, and unless you thoroughly frighten the Italian population - with the resultant stigma of all R.M.A. notes - I doubt whether any useful action could be taken on this side of the water. In this connection I enclose copy of a letter to the D.P.I.O.

I enclose copy of a letter I have just written to Rooney which more or less explains itself, although you may think that I am rather contradictory. But I do feel strongly that if I arranged for a notice to be published to the Italian civil population informing them that one sort of R.M.A. note, which unfortunately looks very much like the other, should not be accepted, I can foresee a general suspicion towards all R.M.A. currency and even the possibility of it going to a discount on the A.M. Lire.

I should be glad to learn whether you think that a small publicity drive in Tripoli and Malta indicating that their domestic currencies are not repeat not legal tender in Sicily and Italy would have beneficial results. I know that in Tripoli it has all been said before, but I am not sure if the Tripoli Times and Notices in all the Transit Camps might not have some effect.

1. The subject of imports of food for the Italian Army was raised with General Robertson yesterday on the suggestion of Lt. Col. Norbert. He pointed out that in the four provinces of Apulia alone, 200,000 soldiers were eating out of civil stocks on the basis of 350 gm. ration daily.

2. He agreed that importing food for the Italian Army was no concern of AMG. He stated that he had queried A.F.C. as to the responsibility of his R.I. for maintenance of Italian Army, taking the position that he should only be responsible for maintaining those troops which are organized and are either fighting or working for us. He felt that he could not undertake the feeding of all the casual unattached Italian soldiers who were not in units actually working or fighting with the allied forces. The Allied Military Mission at Trinidian will be advised as to the decision of A.F.C. on the matter.

3. A.F.C. stated that they have put in for supplies for the Italian Army in the regular way along with 8th Army rations. I passed on to A.F.C. the information supplied to me by Capt. Burke, Supply Officer on Col. Norbert's Staff, giving the Italian Government's estimates of what the Italian Army in Apulia needs in the way of food supplies through Feb. 15.

The same has been discussed with Brigadier Falloona,
D.Q.M.G., A.F.H.Q. Adv Adm Roh, who states that no definite
decision has been made on the rolling stock to be left in the

recommendation that one train a day be allowed to run between

The exact distribution as between freight and passengers would

1. Brigadier Fellowes, D.A.D.M., A.G.O. has advised Mr. [redacted] to make a comprehensive statement of the exportable surpluses of grain from the provinces of Foggia, Potenza and Salerno. Together with this he would like us to state requirements for areas in southern Italy such as Naples, Luri, Brindisi, Taranto and Bari. He does not want us to make arbitrary allocations of the staff but would like us to work out allocations with his staff (Major G.B. Thomas, D.A.D.M.) on the basis of the rail facilities available. Major Thomas will be in Naples from the 23rd on at A.G.O. Mr. [redacted] also.
2. The C.A.O. has written a memorandum to General McNaught pointing out that this and similar problems ought to be handled in one central place for all Southern Italy, irrespective of the administrative boundaries. It was further recommended that an interim section of AGO in Palermo be set up in Naples. It is not known what action has been taken, but meanwhile it would be helpful if you would undertake to sort out this problem.

1. AMG Region II has complained that they are having difficulty in getting in their wheat because they are not allowed to pay as high a price as the price which was authorized in Region III. I pointed out to the Supply Officer, Region II, that this is a problem for AMGOT H.Q. Palermo to decide since they are responsible for the administration of this Region, but that I would pass on the information to Palermo with a copy to AMG Region III, so that Region III could provide Palermo with the information necessary to make their decision.

1. I write to refer to the signal ANFOR 475 of 23 Oct, copy of which was marked by Signals for B.G.S.

2. The printing presses and plates of the Banca d'Italia are located at Aquila, about 50 miles North East of Rome. Our last information from the Italian Government is that the Germans surround the town of Aquila but have not yet destroyed the printing presses or the plates for noteprinting. We are also extremely anxious that these plates should not be destroyed as their destruction will entail the continuance for many months of shipments of Allied military lire from Washington, both by sea and air, thus employing valuable military transport.

3. In addition to the aspect of sabotage mentioned in the signal, it may be possible, if tactical reasons permit, to instruct the Allies to refrain from bombing and shelling these buildings.

4. I should be grateful to learn if you are able to take the action proposed in the signal so that I can duly inform A.F.S.C.

I asked the Allied Military Mission last week to take this matter up with the Italian Government and find out whether they would be prepared to take over and intern civilians arrested and recommended to be interned for the duration of the war or sentenced to periods of over six months' internment. The matter is still under consideration but it is understood that this is likely to be agreed to.
2. I have spoken to G.S.I.(b) 15 Army Group, who agree that for the time being the existing procedure should continue to be followed (outside the area in Apulia under the direct control of the Italian Government) namely, that civilians arrested and interned by the military in army areas should continue to be disposed of through normal P.O.W. channels.

1. Reference the letter you left with me from the Head of the Stato Maggiore, you may wish to pass on the following comments which are all that occur to me at first blush.
 2. The Allied Military Authorities are operating the ports of BARI and BRINDISI. They are not operating, and do not intend to operate, any of the small ports. Arrangements are being made, however, for the import of such foodstuffs and other civil supplies as are absolutely essential to the civil population through these two ports. When the Allied Military Authorities lose interest in a port and remove their installations therefrom, it can, of course, be used for essential civil imports. The port of Reggio is now being so used and will continue to be. In such instances as this, unloading and warehousing will be done entirely by Italian authorities.
 3. In the case of Bari and Brindisi and other ports where the military are interested, the unloading and working of the ship will be done by the military authorities, calling upon the civil authorities where necessary, especially with regard to trucks, and the warehousing will be done by the appropriate Italian Government Agency.
 4. In this connection it would be appreciated if the Director of Supplies for the Italian Government would issue a Directive to all Consorzio Agrario officials, especially those in Bari and Brindisi, that they will warehouse all civilian imports and defray all expenses in connection with such warehousing, including labor to unload the trucks. They should also be directed to obtain guards from the appropriate Italian Army Unit. The Consorzio in Bari is doing all of the above at my request, but they should have a directive from their own officials, particularly in regard to the payment of the ~~expenses~~ involved.

- (3) When an ordinary telephone is used over direct Carrier channel between HQ's the conversation may be considered secure but on such a circuit it is possible for the operator to overhear (although it is unlikely that he will have time to listen) and therefore plans made for the distant future will not be discussed.
- (4) Ordinary telephone lines are liable to interception by enemy. High Level matters will not be discussed. Ordinary routine matters can be discussed, but Security precautions will be taken. Conversations will be guarded and coded speech used.

6. Anti-Malaria Discipline.

Battle experience in Southern Europe reveals the urgent need for improving anti-malarial discipline.

Sicily, Sardinia and the whole of Southern Italy are amongst the most dangerously malarial places in the world during the summer and autumn. Rigorous attention will be paid by all ranks to malaria precautions up to the end of November.

The following action will be taken:—

- (a) There will be strict compliance by all concerned to the current ruling on Mepacrine administration. It must be realised that the supply of this medicament in the correct amount may be quite as vital to the efficiency of the soldier as is the supply of ammunition.
- (b) Close attention will be paid by all ranks to AFHQ G.R.O. 1941 and the pamphlet entitled "Anti-Malaria Campaign B.N.A.F." which is attached thereto, or in the case of Middle East troops to the pamphlet entitled "The Prevention of Malaria".
- (c) There will be no relaxation of essential malaria precautions, even in battle areas. Apparent absence of mosquitoes should not be regarded as implying freedom from the malaria danger.
- (d) In view of the impossibility of ensuring the continuous and constant use of mosquito nets at night in forward areas, much greater insistence than heretofore will be placed on the wearing of protective clothing (Slacks, long sleeves, etc.) and also upon the use of mosquito repellents. Repellents should be applied as a drill in the same way as anti-gas cream is used when a gas attack is imminent.
- (e) Anti-malarial exercise will form an integral part of battle training.

There must be no delay in setting to work on anti-larval operations (canalisation, dredging and paragreening, flogging) as soon as new locations are occupied. Site selection should also be regarded as of primary importance.

- (a) The following important amendments to the Army Act appear in the Army and Air Force (Annual) Act, 1941:—
Section 47 Sub-Section (1) — for "Field Officer" substitute "Lieut-Colonel" and add at end "Provided no charge against a Field Officer shall be dealt with summarily under this Section except by a General or Air Officer authorised to convene a General Court Martial."
Sub-Section (2) After first para (B) insert "(C) Any deduction authorised by this Act to be made from his ordinary pay."
Section 137 Add at end Para (2) "Or by Authority dealing summarily with charge under Section 47 of this Act."
- (b) The effect of these amendments is as follows:—
(i) That charges against officers of the rank of Major (substantive, Not substantive, Temporary or Acting) may be dealt with summarily under the provisions of Section 47, as in the case of junior officers. The amendment provides however, that no Field Officer shall be dealt with summarily except by a General or Air Officer authorised to convene a General Court Martial.

Thus, Brigadier even though he may hold a General Warrant and be empowered to deal summarily with junior officers, cannot make an award against a Field Officer.

(ii) that no authority dealing summarily under Army Act Section 17 with an offence may award against an Officer subject to his right to have trial by Court-Martial stoppages of pay to make good compensation for any expenses, loss, damage or destruction occasioned by the commission of the offence. Such stoppages may be awarded either in addition to or in substitution for the punishment prescribed in Sub-Section (2) of Section 17.

(iii) It is important to bear in mind—

(a) that stoppages may be awarded only when particulars of the charge over that the alleged loss or damage was occasioned by the negligence or incorrect conduct of the officer concerned and where the amount of the loss or value is stated in the particulars and proved.

(b) that unless the authority dealing summarily with a case under Section 17 of the Army Act intends to award a reprimand or severe reprimand only the accused has the right to elect trial by Court-Martial.

SUBJECT: Civilian Supplies in the Zone Area.

1. Captain Batt and Captain Bentz met with Col., Fifth Army and 3/4, Italian Base Section, Naples, on 19 October 1945, to present needs for civilian supplies in the Zone Area.
 2. Directive of the zones already requisitioned under date of 7 Oct., by direction of General Hartshorn, for the 90-day period, November 1, 1945 - February 1, 1946, was presented.
 3. Colonel Robert V. Dolgclair, Jr., 3/4 Base Section (recently designated as such) was not wholly familiar with the plans for supplies to Rome. He was advised whether the Base Section will have jurisdiction for example, over the port of Civitavecchia.
 4. For that matter, General Romeo, Commanding General of the 11th Section and Colonel Tate of Col., Fifth Army, both told us that this latter has not been definitely determined.
 5. Captain Batt expressed a desire to have Fifth Army supply him and 3/4, Base Section, that it would accept the storage of food and medical supplies requisitioned.
 6. Colonel Dolgclair declined to do this. He would not go further than to say he would have "no objection" to the commencement of the supplies in Afrim. When I saw Colonel Tate later, he refused emphatically to send a message directing that the material be loaded. He said it was much too early for this and outlined reasons on the military situation, supporting his position that the supplies should not be mailed forward at this time.
 7. He indicated a line on the map and said that when our troops reached that position it would be time for us to discuss the loading of Section IV supplies. I will watch this carefully.
 8. Colonel Tate would say by return that the ships can be loaded in a week and will occur in two days; that there are and will be plenty of transports available, and he promised definitely that he will have the counters signed, civilian supplies at Civitavecchia by the time that port is opened.
- On this point that Civitavecchia might not be captured soon
and after that, all things being equal, the
best place to store supplies is in Afrim.*

4. For first matter, General Juno, Commanding General of the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Army, both told me that this matter has not been definitely determined.
5. Captain Latt expressed a desire to have Ninth Army notify AAF, and SOS-AirUSA that it would accept the tonnage of food and medical supplies available.

6. Colonel Colclander declined to do this. He would not go further than to say he would have "no objection" to the commencement of loading of supplies in Africa. When I saw Colonel Tate later, he refused explicitly to send a message directing that the material be loaded. He said it was much too early for this and outlined plans on the military situation, supporting his position that the supplies should not be called forward at this time.

7. We requested a line on the map and said that when our troops reached that position it would be time for us to discuss the loading of Legion IV supplies. I will watch this carefully.

7. Colonel Tate would not say more than that the ships can be loaded in a week and will come in two days if there are enough ships available, and he promised definitely that he will have the constants available in Africa.

8. There is the point that certain vessels might not be accepted some days after June is taken, although the prevailing opinion seems to be that the port will fall at the same time.

9. General Juno sat in with Colonel Tate and myself at this meeting and expressed similar views. It is suggested that an inquiry might be made by Major Todd to confirm Colonel Tate's statement that plenty of constants will be available in Africa and that supplies can be loaded as quickly as he says.

The Director of the Merchant Marine/Italian Merchant Marine has been informed of the interest CGC has in sailing and motor ships of small capacity, to be utilized for the supply of the liberated territories while the Italian Republic will immediately provide an audience so as to enable them to be retained as soon as possible.

A list of the sailing ships lying in the port of Salerno is enclosed.

For those ships, the Director of the Italian Merchant Marine will provide for their freight as soon as CGC presents specific requisition with regard to indications, port or loading and destination.

For the non liberaled for those ships (not in convoy) it is considered that, where practicable, a port "steamer" freight will be a greater value than a recognition or time charter. The present shipping situation has proved that we can supply all such ships as small or medium capacity also. In fact, upon request of the Allied Forces, the Italian Merchant Marine has already maintained all ships and motor ships of up to 500 tons gross weight. These have been put in a pool together with the other ships retained by the allied forces for convoy.

The Italian Merchant Marine possesses and can provide and with others of less capacity than 500 tons gross weight, and also with ships of greater capacity which, owing to their low speed (less than 9 knots) have been required from convoy services.

In the meantime, the following have been signalled:

This Headquarters was already in receipt from APIN of a copy of a letter to the Adjutant General to the Forces signed by a Committee of Persons interested in the Preservation of Monuments and Works of Art and forwarding such briefer lists of monuments in Sicily, Lucania, Calabria, Apulia and Sardinia. The new lists will prove a valuable supplement.

3. At the end of September this Office prepared and forwarded to APIN for transmission respectively to the Civil Affairs Sections of the War Department, Washington, and the War Office, London, gatherings of material of various sorts relevant to the Preservation of Monuments and Works of Art in Sicily. The gathering for London was not received by APIN and this Office is preparing two copies of a duplicate gathering, one copy to be forwarded to London and one to be filed by APIN.

4. It is the intention of this Headquarters to send such gatherings in triplicate at approximately monthly intervals to APIN. The copies for Washington and London are accompanied by requests that they be brought to the attention of the interested civilian committees.

5. If any communication is addressed from AMGOT 15 Army Group to Brigadier French in reply to his covering letter for the lists mentioned in para 1 above, it is requested that it be suggested that such material be forwarded in several copies as the facilities for reproduction here are very limited, both as to materials and personnel. This Headquarters received from Washington a set of maps of monuments in various cities which it wished reproduced for distribution to CAs, but it proved impossible to have them photographed in this area. This matter will be raised in the covering letter of the next gathering forwarded to Washington and London.

SUBJECT: Monuments and Works of Art in Southern Italy.Headquarters,

You will no doubt have received copies of a list of ancient monuments in Region II from the War Office. I retained one copy of this list here so as to visit myself some of the principal monuments in the course of my tour. The following notes may be of some interest to you and may be transmitted to A.F.C.O. for the information of the War Office with reference to the attached letter.

APULIA.

Broadly speaking the Provinces of Lecce, Taranto, Brindisi and Bari have suffered no war damage except for certain areas at Taranto itself. You may assume, therefore, that with the exception of Taranto none of the monuments referred to in the Apulia list have been damaged. Separate notes will be sent on Taranto in due course since I personally have not yet had the time to visit the town itself.

I have myself visited the following places listed and can confirm that the monuments in those places are all undamaged:- ACQUAVIVA DELLE PONTE, ALTAVERA, BARI, BITTRO, BRINDISI, GIOJA DEL COLE, GRAVINA, LECCE, MELA, MONOPOLI, METAPOLI.

BRUMANA.

I have not yet visited Brumana sufficiently to have a complete picture but the following notes may be of interest.

Matera is wholly undamaged except for a few small splinters on the side of the Cathedral. The facade and side doors of the Cathedral are untouched. Matera has a number of other monuments of considerable value beyond those given in the list or indeed referred to, and all these monuments are happily intact.

Potenza on the other hand has been considerably damaged as a town. The Cathedral which appears to have no artistic value has suffered a direct hit in the chancel but is otherwise structurally sound. The neighbouring Archbishop's Palace has been burned. The Provincial Museum received a direct hit and is entirely destroyed together with virtually all the contents. The curator is in process of picking up a few fragments. The temple at Sibari is untouched as is, I understand, the Carthusian Monastery at Padula.

Generally speaking, the Italian authorities had packed up the contents of nearly all the museums, Potenza was an exception, and these may generally speaking be said to be intact.

CALABRIA.

The temple sites and the Castle at Crotone are all right and Catanzaro is entirely intact but Consenza has been severely damaged. Catanzaro Marina has been badly knocked about.

The museum at Reggio, Calabria, is a new building which had not yet been occupied as a museum. It has been considerably damaged but I understand that the contents of the old museum were safely stored in the interior.

MEMORANDUM: Control of Release of Imported Stores

To: M.G.C., A.F.M.C.

1. The attached memo to the Allied Military Mission from this HQ releasing 20 tons of milk from imported stores to AGO Army raises the problem of who will control these imports once they are brought into the country.

2. When the Central Commission is set up to operate in Italy it seems obvious that they should control the distribution and release of all imported commodities. We have asked the Commission to call forward the head of their imports branch to take over the work of coordinating requirements and bidding for tonnage and taking charge of civil supplies when they arrive for all Italy at the earliest possible moment.

3. Until this officer arrives and his HQ takes over the administration of the whole rear area, which we hope will be possible, at least on the supply side, within the next week or ten days, and in view of the fact that this is the only central AGO HQ here, we will assume responsibility for the control and release of imported stocks on the mainland of Italy.

4. Please advise if this arrangement is not satisfactory.

I discussed the question of refugees from 8 Army area with the G.S.C., General MacFarlane and Lt. Col. Confort last night. General MacFarlane was of the opinion that all Italian civilian refugees from the forward areas were the responsibility of the Italian Government and he instructed Lt. Col. Confort to see the Italian Government this morning and make arrangements for the reception of these refugees in suitable areas in Southern Italy. I informed General MacFarlane that the numbers might be considerable and that in any event there were at the present approximately 400 refugees who were on their way back and who would require accommodation. General MacFarlane suggested that as an interim measure they might be taken over by Brigadier Venables and his Sub-Commission. Perhaps Colonel Hayes will take this matter up at once with Brigadier Venables and the Military Mission as I understand from MSG, 8th Army that this matter is very urgent.

General MacFarlane stated that it might be necessary for the Central Commission to assist the Italian Government over the feeding of the refugees. He saw that the problem might become a very large one, a great number of refugees coming back comparable to the Belgian refugee problem in the last war. Would Colonel Hayes please tie this up with Brigadier Venables and the Italian Government through Lt. Col. Confort.

2.0 P.Y.REMARKS.

1. The A.P.M.C. Local Resources (ITALY) Board is hereby set up to decide policies in regard to the local procurement and allocation of supplies, services, facilities and transportation required by the military within the Italian mainland, now or in the future, occupied by the Armed Forces under the command of this H.Q.
2. The Board shall co-ordinate the requirements of the Army, Navy and Air Forces to prevent competition in the acquisition of local resources. It is also responsible to see that compatible with requirements of the Armed Forces, local procurement of supplies, services, facilities, logistic and transportation interests as little as possible with the essential economic requirements of the territory.

3. The Board will be constituted as follows:

7. There shall be a permanent Agent of the Board whose sole duty will be to conduct negotiations for maintaining contacts of all kinds and continuing the representation of the Board in the United States and elsewhere.
8. The Central Committee shall be asked to provide the Board with information concerning the local conditions and circumstances required to fulfill its functions.

9. To assist it to carry out its functions the Board shall establish a Local Committee, of which the following may be members:

- (a) Local People's Comittee.
- (b) Local Propaganda and Education.
- (c) Local Organization and Conditions.
- (d) Local Press and Information.
- (e) Local Economic and Conditions.
- (f) Local Social and Economic.
- (g) Local Political and Conditions.
- (h) Local Cultural and Conditions.

The members of the Central Committee will be determined by the Board to consist of three persons, the Chairman and two others, to be appointed by the Board. The Central Committee will be responsible for carrying out the functions of the Board, and will be entitled to receive the services of all local personnel required to fulfill its functions.

1. The attached memorandum outlining the functions and make-up of the A.G.S. Local Resources (Italian) Board is forwarded for your information.
2. It should be noted that this Board will deal with local supplies only, and will have nothing to do with imported supplies, which are covered in AGS/109/24 dated 26 Oct. 43.
3. Likewise it has nothing to do with allocations of local supplies which are of interest only to civil population, except in so far as they require military facilities for movement, for example, the grain surplus in Foggia, Matera and Potenza. These will be allocated by the Control Commission in collaboration with AGS 15 Army Group, but such allocations should be in closest collaboration with the Transportation Sub-Committee of the Resources Board, in order that they may be determined in close conformity to military transportation requirements.
4. Under paragraph 10, it will be noted that Local Boards will be set up, presumably with parallel representation, to deal with local resources problems. If the need is demonstrated in any area under your control, will you take the initiative in setting up a Local Resources Board along these lines.

20. Oct. 43.

1. Region III has just advised that they are fixing producers price on Olive Oil at 19 lire for superfine, scaling down normally for lower grades. They are maintaining the price of wheat at 300 hard and 200 soft for this years crop.
2. Will you advise this Reg. how these prices compare with the prices for similar commodities in Sicily. I note that the Olive Oil is well under the maximum set in AMC/3004/43 dated 1. Sept. 43, which allows a price up to 25 lire per litre for Olive Oil of a similar grade. Likewise the wheat price is well under the 400 lire level set in Sicily.
3. However, if these seem to be fair prices in Region III, I can see no point in not letting them stand for Region III, and Regions II and IV as well. Perhaps we will be more successful in controlling inflation here.
4. This whole subject of prices and price control might well be reviewed by an appropriate officer of the Control Commission when they take over. It must be decided finally by some body which has the power to act for all Italy as an economic unit. A copy of this letter is being sent to the Control Commission for their information.

Although no provision is made for this possibility, this section is still to be maintained completely.
