1. Confirming verbal notification it is reported that Dr. Gill W., despatch rider between this HQ and Toscana Region was involved in an accident yesterday morning 16 October 1944, at San Quivico. This information was received by this office over the telephone from Toscana Region.

2. It is understood that Gill has been removed to 21 C.C.S. suffering from a leg injury but full details are not yet available. The motor cycle is now at the Northern Barracks Siena from where it will be collected by Toscana Region and returned to this HQ at the earliest opportunity.

At 2300 hours, 22 August 1944

Sgt Knight of 6623 Regulating Co. Traffic Control Post "R" telephoned to report the injury of Pvt Ross, messenger for A.C.C.

The T.C.P. is located 12 miles south of Rome (near Albano) but Ross was injured south of there (probably near Terracina) continuing on his journey until he could carry on no longer.

Sgt Knight was taking Pvt Ross to a hospital for first aid treatment altho there may be greater medication needed.

TO : Lt. Mc Phail, Motor Transport Officer, Hq. A.C.C.

1. At 1920 hours, 22 April, a call was received from Lt. Derby, Adjutant, Salerno Hq. A.C.C., that a convoy of 9 A.C.C. dump trucks, 2½ tons had just arrived at that Hdqs. Private Louis A. D'Angelo Jr., attached to Salerno Hdqs., was in charge of the convoy. All drivers were Italian civilians, residents of Salerno, who had been hired by A.C.C. for this purpose. enroute to Salerno, on the Autostrada somewhere between Naples and Pompeii, one of these trucks ran over and killed a British soldier hitch-hiking on the road. An ambulance was passing and removed the body. M.P.'s patrolling the highway took statements at the scene of the accident and ordered the convoy to proceed. Upon arrival at Salerno, Pvt. D'Angelo reported to the Motor Officer Rear Hdqs. and made a statement of the accident giving all the facts of the case known to him. In addition he filled out Accident Report Forms and turned them over to the Adjutant.

2. In my phone conversation with Pvt. D'Angelo it appears that the Italian driver was not at fault. The British soldier evidently walked into the side of the truck and was thrown under the wheels without the driver knowing that he was hit. Testimony of another British soldier sitting in the front seat with the driver seems to bear this statement out.

3. Lt. Derby, the Adjutant is in possession of all statements. Pvt. D'Angelo can be located at Salerno Hdqs. I advised Lt. Derby to inform Sub-Area 94 Hdqs. at Salerno of the accident and to be guided by their suggestion as to the disposition of the Italian driver pending investigation.



To: Director General

i. Collision, Castel Franco, 1640 hours, 21 February 1944.

ii. Narrative: Extra 735-037 east, with pusher engine 744-109 on rear end, handling 30 empty box cars, stopped with rear engine partially in tunnel, to work up steam. Two motor cars, coupled, in charge of T/4 J. A. Pickett, with Pvt. J. W. Wilson operating car, hauling 17 I.S.R. employees, approached from west and collided with rear of pusher engine 744-109.

iii. Cause: Driver of motor cars unable to see end of train account smoke in tunnel.

iv. Damage: Lading - None.

Equipment - Motor car No. USA-R-1-92017, had radiator, fan assembly, water outlet for cylinder head and muffler damaged.
Track and structures - None.

v. Personal injuries:

Military personnel injured:

T/4 J. A. Pickett, received cracked pelvis bone, cuts about face. Possibly out of service three to four months.

Pvt. James W. Wilson, received minor cuts on both legs, received first aid. No time lost.

6. Investigation: Investigation developed that train had stopped at 10:30 to blow up steam in both engines. Pusher engine 744-109 was partially in tunnel, and a great quantity of smoke filled entrance as well as accumulating outside of tunnel. Motor car, which was moving in same direction as train, received clearance at Montenollo, and was to proceed with caution, account extra 756-037 not having arrived Arpino at that time. As motor car approached tunnel, Mr. Wilson did not see rear of engine because his vision was obscured by thick smoke until too late to stop movement. Italian crew had not sent flagman back to protect train when stop was made. There is no operator stationed at Castel Franco, nor is there a passing track at this point.

7. Responsibility and Discipline: Responsibility rests with Italian crew on pusher engine, for not protecting rear of train. No discipline was assessed against USA personnel.



SUBJ: Motorcar Accident near Tizi Ouzou - 20 Oct. 68.

DATE: 20 January 1969.

1. Action, para. 5, daily bulletin no. 16 of 16 Jan. 68. This obviously refers to a motor car accident which took place while Capt. ERNST HAAS and myself were proceeding, as an advance party for Dr. A. C. J., while moving to PALESTINE.

2. We left TIZI OUZO about 1610 hrs. Thurs., 28 Oct. 68 in a British Utility truck driven by a corporal. (I took his name and particulars but, owing to subsequent moves, I cannot now find them.) About 5 miles from TIZI OUZO, on the ALGERIA road, there was a large motor truck (native) stationary at the side of the road (to own side) with some natives on the road apparently talking to the driver. The road was quite straight.

3. We approached at about 20 mph. and made to stop on this right side of the truck. Our driver blew his horn and all the natives moved to one side except one old man, an Arab. The driver seemed to expect him to move also, and better his course. The old man, however, did not move and was struck by the radiator of the car.

4. The driver immediately stopped and got out. The Arab was lying on the ground in front of the car. He was not under the car and the wheels had not passed over him. The car may at once backed away and I saw there was nothing to be done except get an ambulance. I, therefore, stayed with the Arab and sent Capt. HAAS in the utility truck to TIZI OUZO for an ambulance intending him to bring the Army Ambulance which usually stops outside the dispensary, TIZI OUZO. However, he returned in about 1 hr. with a civilian French doctor and ambulance who removed the Arab to hospital.

5. The Arab was an old blind beggar of the poorest class and his blindness obviously largely contributed to the accident. He was evidently on the road by himself as none of the Arabs with him paid any attention to his after the accident and went off almost immediately.

6. I told the driver of the truck to report the accident on his return to TIZI OUZO. Owing to the delay caused by the accident, we did not reach ALGERIA till nearly 2000 hrs. and left next morning by plane for TIZI OUZO. At TIZI OUZO, however, I sent a short report to Dr. TIZI OUZO.

7. If any further particulars are required, I shall be pleased to give them.

8. Capt. ERNST HAAS is at present on tour but will be available later to confirm the above particulars.

CLAIMS AND HIRINGS, ALGIERS GARRISON.

SUBJECT: Traffic Accident - 5 kms from Tizi Ouzou en road to Algiers.
28 October 1943.

Ref:- 6/31028/16/A.

Camp Commandant,
Military Government School & Holding Centre.

1. On 28 Oct 43 at 1600 hrs a military vehicle believed to have been a British Utility knocked down and seriously injured an Arab 5 kms from Tizi Ouzou on the road to Algiers.

2. Two of the occupants of the vehicle were said to have been officers. Whilst the driver and one officer went in search of an ambulance, the other officer, who was a Major, stayed with the injured man. This officer, who spoke French very well, said to a witness that he came from L'Ecole Moderne, Tizi Ouzou, and was on his way to Algiers but would be returning to Tizi Ouzou.

3. Have you any report in regard to this incident. If not, can you trace the Major referred to. The number of the vehicle is believed to have been M.58218307.
