General Azzi behaved in a dubious manner when in Albania and if his treatment was harsh, which I am by no means inclined to think it was, it is considerably less than he deserved. These remarks based on private information obtained from Force 399, and are for guidance, should Marshal Messe return to the attack.

It is noted that a complaint was lodged by General AZZI alleging harsh treatment during his two days detention at 500 Mobile Unit, pending security investigations.

The matter has been investigated and found to be grossly exaggerated.

Whilst it is realised that high ranking Italian officers expect the special treatment due to their rank under any circumstances, it must be born in mind that 500 Mobile Unit is not able to provide the comforts and amenities of a modern hotel. The quarters are mainly designed to house refugees.

Adequate notice of the arrival of the above party was given, but none of the organizations directly concerned with its disposal made any preparation for arranging suitable accommodation. At the same time, 500 Mobile Unit could hardly be expected to bear the cost of any comforts which General AZZI seemed to expect, especially as no funds are available for this purpose.

(1) With regard to the separate complaints raised, the following may be said:-
The party was searched in accordance with security instructions received. The search was however carried out by an officer who used all necessary tact and correctness for this unpleasant task.

All articles were returned before the party left, except certain documents which were returned a few days later and the gold currency which was handed back to the British authorities concerned, with the general's full approval in writing. A balance of 19 gold sovereigns which the party claimed to be their own personal property was returned to him and a receipt is held by this office.

(2) Re-accommodation, it might be said that the whole top floor of the refugee quarters with the exception of one room was placed at the disposal of General AZZI's party. Living and sleeping quarters were separate.

The sleeping accommodation consisted of double bunks and in view of the absence of any mattresses, blankets were issued on the liberal scale of FIVE per man i.e. three more than the summer scale for our own troops.

It is noted that these were served in a hotel or 'hall'.

300 Mobile Unit is not able to provide the comforts and amenities of a modern hotel. The quarters are mainly designed to house refugees.

Adequate notice of the arrival of the above party was given, but none of the organizations directly concerned with its disposal made any preparation for arranging suitable accommodation. At the same time, 300 Mobile Unit could hardly be expected to bear the cost of any comforts which General AZZI seemed to expect, especially as no funds are available for this purpose.

With regard to the separate complaints raised, the following may be said:-
(1) The party was searched in accordance with security instructions received. The search was however carried out by an officer who used all necessary tact and correctness for this unpleasant task.

All articles were returned before the party left, except certain documents which were returned a few days later and the gold currency which was handed back to the British Authorities concerned, with the General's full approval in writing. A balance of 14 gold sovereigns which the party claimed to be their own personal property was returned to him and a receipt is held by this office.

(2) Re-accommodation, it might be said that the whole top floor of the refugees quarters with the exception of one room was placed at the disposal of General AZZI's party. Living and sleeping quarters were separate.

The sleeping accommodation consisted of double bunks and in view of the absence of any mattresses, blankets were issued on the liberal scale of FIVE per man i.e. three more than the summer scale for our own troops.

(3) It is ridiculous to state that meals were served in a 'pot' or 'pail'. China tableware not being available in this theatre of war, all food was served on a tray issue tin plates and tea bowls.

(4) The rations which did not seem to please the General were British Field Service rations and identical to those consumed by the officers and men of the unit.

(5) All interrogations of the party were carried out on the premises by SIO personnel, who to the best of our knowledge did this on a formal and correct manner.

In addition to the above it should be pointed out that the Italian speaking officer of the unit, a Maltese Lieutenant, went out of his way to reduce the so called discomforts sustained by the party and earnestly apologised to the General for the inadequate conditions under which they were forced to exist for two days (actually 36 hours). At the same time the army was given free of charge, 200 cigarettes and a tin of tobacco out of the unit's officers' rations.

In conclusion it might be said that the only time the General voiced a complaint during the two days in question, was that their first broadcast was not properly served. This was immediately rectified and the services of a young Yugoslav were placed at the disposal of the party.

2. General AZZI and his staff arrived in ITALY from enemy occupied territory where they had been in contact with the enemy and with the Allied Military Mission. It was, therefore, necessary that the customary security check should be made. The Army Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission were informed of this in a letter of 16 June 44, reference 2022/90. CSI written by GSI(b) Hq 2 District. The security check was carried out according to normal procedure.
3. The conditions under which General AZZI and his staff were detained are not under the control of this H. A. On this subject reference should be made to GSI(b) Hq 2 District and CSBIC (Sub-Centre East).

It is my duty to inform you that ~~today~~ today, the Division General AZZI, ex-commander of the "Firenze" division, presented himself to this command. He had debarked at Brindisi on 11 June from a barge, together with Colonel of Carabinieri CARRAI Zino; Artillery Major CHIARIZIA Ernesto, Chief of Staff of the Division, and four other lesser officers.

General AZZI expressed his bitterness for treatment received from English authorities, who, right after the Brindisi landing, transferred him and the other officers to Bari by truck, and as soon as they arrived, lead them to a house away from the settled area. They were minutely searched, their weapons were taken away from them, money and documents. They were then subjected to severe questioning.

The General and the officers were later lodged in common premises containing double beds without straw, and were given troop rations in a pot (literal translation. - rail).

At 1400 hours today, the General and the officers were released at liberty in order to present themselves to the Italian Authorities, with the admonition to remain yet a few days at the disposal of the English Command.

The officers were given back their weapons and paper currency, but gold currency and the more important documents were held back.

The 277 non-coms and troops who landed in Brindisi by the same transport used by the officers, have not yet reached Bari.

He deserted his troops after the battle of KRUJA August, 1943, later founded mountain troops Command but had no troops. Some of his original soldiers are with ABBASKUPI but for the most part they have either gone over to the Germans or are dead.

Dear General:-

As you know, the "Firenze" Division, stationed in Albania on the date of the Armistice, lined up against the Germans after September 8th.

After having suffered serious losses in the battles which took place in the third ten-day period of September, the division was compelled to withdraw to the mountains and to disperse by logistic necessity into nuclei of a hundred men each who continued to carry on guerrilla warfare in various localities, always under the orders of the Divisional commander General Azzi.

However, it appears that on February 10th, Gen. Azzi became ill in Corchiano and his troops were in serious difficulties as far as food, clothing and ammunition were concerned. After that date there was no news of General Azzi and his troops with the exception of that given by the London Radio on March 27th last that "Italian alpine troops fight side by side with Albanian patriots."

You certainly are aware how much I am concerned in the fate of our units and I would, therefore, be very grateful to you if you would periodically inform me of any news which comes into possession of the Allied Military Authorities be it in Naples or in Algiers.

In thanking you in advance for your courteous reply, I take this opportunity of expressing again to you, my dear General, my highest esteem.

SUBJECT: Repatriation of Colonel S. M. Manno

TO : Headquarters, Allied Armies in Italy

1. It is requested that the case on the release of Colonel S. M. Manno be reconsidered for the following reasons:

a. Colonel Manno evaded capture by the Germans, and, with the help of the Intelligence Service succeeded in reaching Cyprus, was transferred to Egypt with General Carta and Colonel Negrone who had also succeeded in leaving Athens. General Carta and Colonel Negrone were transferred to Italy while Colonel Manno was interned in a PW Camp and treated as such, although not a PW. It is possible that being treated as a PW and not transferred to Italy as were his companions caused Colonel Manno to protest angrily against such treatment, and thus give rise to the impression that he was a Fascist and anti-British.

b. The Comando Supremo has made special application to again examine the case stating that Colonel Manno is of a noble Piedmontese family, an officer of great valor, deeply devoted to the House of Savoy and to the old military institutions. He is temperamentally against meddling in politics and is extremely devoted to duty and military honor.

c. General Dapino, Deputy High Commissioner for Prisoners of War, stated that he would stake his honor on Colonel Manno's integrity.

2. I appreciate that in certain cases it may be undesirable to convey to the Italian Government facts concerning PW which show cause for non-repatriation. In this case, a confidential report to me would be of great help.

Dear Maj. Campbell,

Following the conversation held by us yesterday, May 29, I wish to submit to you the case of Col. Manno, who is now interned in Camp 308 M.E.F. in Alexandria.

I do not know this officer personally; however, according to what has been told me by superior officers, colleagues and inferior officers, who know him very well, Col. Manno is a member of a noble Piedmontese family; he is an officer of great valor, deeply devoted to the House of Savoy and to old military institutions. He is temperamentally against meddling in politics, and is extremely devoted to his duty and to military honor.

At the time of the armistice Col. Manno was Deputy Chief of the General Staff of the 11th Army in Greece.

In order to evade capture by the Germans and to be faithful to his oath, he succeeded, with the help of the Intelligence Service, in reaching Cyprus, and from there he was transferred to Egypt. General Carta and Col. Negrone who succeeded in leaving Athens, and in reaching Egypt by the same means were transferred to Italy, while Col. Manno was detained, to be later repatriated; although he was not a POW he was interned in a POW camp and treated as such.

We believe this treatment must have caused great sorrow to Col. Manno, who probably has made a protest against it.

In reference to the above-mentioned question I should be very grateful if you would examine again this officer's position, especially because what has been attributed to him in letter Q.S. 360 of May 2, if confirmed by facts, might have the most serious consequences on the officer's future.

Your Excellency:

I acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 30 April, No. 12740.

I am directed to inform you that the reason why Colonel MANNO is not to be brought back from the MIDDLE EAST is that he is reliably reported to be pro-German, a Fascist and anti-British.

In view of the above report from a high authority, the General Officer Commanding this Sub-Commission has directed me to point out that all applications to the Allies for the return of prisoners of war should first be submitted to a careful check in order to ensure their suitability for repatriation in the present circumstances.

It will be appreciated if you would cause this point to be brought to notice of all concerned with the framing of applications for repatriation.

I have today informed the Comando Supremo that 228 Italian officers who are serving with the CUNEO Division will be at the disposal of the Italian authorities on their arrival in ITALY.

1. It is the intention of Marshal Badoglio to provide the Crown Prince with an entirely fresh personal staff. The existing staff are an unsatisfactory collection and Badoglio holds them responsible for the recent unfortunate incident of the Crown Prince's giving an interview to the "Times" correspondent.
2. Both Badoglio and Messe are most anxious to appoint General Pralomo, who was recently nominated as relief for General Castellano, to the staff of the Crown Prince. As relief for Castellano in substitution for Pralomo they now wish to appoint General Frattini who is a P.W. in U.S.A. and whose name is included in the first priority repatriation list submitted by me to you. Frattini speaks English well and was at one time Military Attache in Japan.
3. I would be glad if you would let me know if you agree to accept Frattini in place of Castellano so that Pralomo can be appointed to the Crown Prince's staff. I recommend that if possible we should meet Marshal Badoglio's wishes in this case.

I. General BENCIVENGA in Rome has now replied to the effect that:-

- (1) He read and approved completely the text of the declaration which General GARIBALDI proposed to make on reaching liberated Italy.
- (2) He knew about General GARIBALDI's meeting with MUSSOLINI in early October 1943.
- (3) He considers GARIBALDI's present attitude to be sincere and to give no cause for suspicion because the latter has only slightly compromised himself with Fascism.
- (4) He thinks that he would be of use from a Propaganda standpoint because of the attraction of the Garibaldi tradition.

II. In view of the above, it is NOT considered that there are now adequate security grounds for interning General GARIBALDI, and it is recommended that he be released and instructed to report to the Italian Authorities. The latter should, however, be requested to keep him under constant supervision.

Report of Interrogation of General Ezio GARIBALDI

1. NARRATIVE

Subject crossed the lines on the morning of the 4th May 1944 in the neighbourhood of CASTEL DI SANGRO. (For fuller details see Main 8th Army Interrogation Report, ref. R.I.P./SR/2 dated 10.5.44.)

3. PAST HISTORY

(a) Birth & Family: Subject was born in ROME on 1st Jan. 1894. He is a grandson of the Italian national hero, Giuseppe GARIBALDI, and the son of General Giuseppe GARIBALDI and of Constance HOPECRAFT of LONDON. Subject is married to a niece of Judge HOY, a former Attorney-general in the U.S.A. Both his wife and daughter are now in hiding in ROME. Other members of the family are two sisters in ROME and one in America, and three brothers, PEPINO, RIGGIOTTI and SANTE all of whom are believed to be in German-occupied Italy.

(b) Career

(i) Pre-Armistice Activities: Subject was educated in Italy and took a degree in engineering. In 1912 he participated in the Greek war of liberation as a member of the Garibaldi Legion under his father's command. He ended this campaign with the rank of Sergeant. On the outbreak of the 1914-1918 war, he first enlisted as a volunteer in the Garibaldi Legion in France and on Italy's entry into the war he joined the Italian Army as a Lieutenant. He was severely wounded and awarded the Silver Medal 'Per il merito di Guerra'.

By the end of the war subject had attained the rank of Major. Subject is a Comandeur de la Legion d'honneur, a Grand Duke of Lithuania, and a holder of the Médaille Militaire and the Medaglia d'Argento al Valore. At the conclusion of hostilities subject accompanied his brother General Peppino GARIBALDI on a financial mission to the U.S.A. on behalf of his Government. The following year (1919) subject visited MEXICO on a similar mission again with his brother. He returned to Italy in 1920 leaving for Washington a few months later, via MEXICO. Subject was immediately despatched to Mexico on a mission connected with oil concessions, recalled by MUSSOLINI at the end of 1924, and offered the post of Italian Minister Plenipotentiary to Peru. Illness prevented him from accepting this post and from then on, he devoted his entire energy to the perpetuation and propagation of the GARIBALDI tradition. He founded the GARIBALDI periodical 'Gancia Rossa', and the 'Federazione of Italian Combatants', thereby amalgamating some 300 odd independent Garibaldi Associations. In addition he was instrumental in raising the pensions allocated to Garibaldi legionaries and improving their conditions generally. MUSSOLINI, however, restricted the scope of the Legion by limiting its membership and forbidding the recruiting of young elements. Adherence to the Fascist Party was not essential to admission into the Garibaldi Legion. This became compulsory only in 1937 when the whole organization came under the general direction of the Secretary of the Fascist Party.

In 1925 subject joined the Fascist Party, justifying his action to his legionaries by claiming that only by identifying himself with the Party could he secure maximum advantages and privileges for the Legion. Since the perpetuation of the Garibaldi tradition formed the basis of his 'raison d'être', he was prepared with this end in view to accept help from any quarter. To

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use his own words "he did not mind who tolled the bell provided it rang with the name of Garibaldi". As a logical sequence therefore, he accepted in 1928 the appointment of deputy representing the Garibaldi Association. He retained this seat until 1938. Apart from his continued exertions on behalf of his own Association and of two missions outside Italy, subject declares that his political activity, in addition to a few commemorative speeches, was conspicuous for his opposition in 1939 to an Italo-German financial and economic understanding which, to his mind, would lead inevitably to a full military alliance between the two countries. This opposition he justified on the following grounds:-

- (a) For sentimental reasons connected with the Garibaldi tradition.
- (b) In view of the ineradicable hatred of Italians towards the Germans.
- (c) On account of Germany's avowed territorial aspirations which would reduce Italy ultimately to the status of a conquered territory.
- (d) The fundamental difference between Fascism and Nazism.

The speech, subject states, aroused violent criticism and incurred FARINACCI's particular antagonism. In another speech, subject protested against the abolition of the festival in commemoration of the unification of Italy (20 Settembre). MUSSOLINI had in this connection deferred to the wishes of the Vatican as a result of the Concordat. Subject also protested against the racial laws in an article in his own "Camice Rosso". This periodical appears to have been exempt from political censorship and not subjected to Press directives.

In an attempt to win Britain's goodwill and understanding over the Abyssinian dispute, subject was despatched to London to make unofficial approaches to leading political and financial personalities. During his stay in Great Britain he won the sympathy of Sir Samuel Hoare, Sir Robert Vansittart, Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, the Prince of Wales and Lord Horser. He was also received by the Archbishop of Canterbury and by many outstanding social and political figures in London. Sir Samuel Hoare was kind enough to communicate to him, unofficially, the terms he proposed to place before Laval in an attempt to liquidate the Abyssinian question. These included an assurance of British and French friendship towards Italy, the apportioning of two thirds of Ethiopia to Italy and a loan to the latter of two hundred million sterling for the development of Abyssinian resources. The mission, though recognized as eminently successful, incurred Count Grandi's displeasure because of its unofficial character.

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Shortly afterwards, subject visited France with one hundred Legionaries on a mission of goodwill. Again he met several outstanding personalities, including Pétain, for whom he still retains considerable admiration. He also founded an Italo-French Committee.

During the period under review, subject was instrumental in gathering the other members of the Garibaldi family into the Fascist fold. Peppino (Giuseppe) had left Italy in 1924 as a declared anti-fascist, and had settled in the U.S.A. Owing to the divergence in their political opinions and (subject added hastily, as an after-thought) Peppino's neglect of the Garibaldi Veterans and lack of initiative in allowing d'ANNUNZIO to displace him in the Fiume incident, direct relationship between the two brothers did not occur until 1938. Subject had then gathered that Peppino was in extreme financial straits and undertook, after consultation with Mussolini, to arrange for his brother's return to Italy and for his financial rehabilitation. In return, it was arranged by subject for his brother to write to the Duce, recanting his former political views and signifying his adherence to Fascism. Mussolini made capital out of the propaganda value of this conversion of an illustrious name by giving wide publicity to the letter which, subject later admitted having dictated himself.

RICCIOTTI, who had gone to France and posed as an anti-fascist, had been instrumental, as an agent provocateur, in the unmaking of many anti-fascists in Italy. This, coupled with his various shady financial activities, eventually earned him a sentence of 18 months imprisonment in a French gaol. RICCIOTTI appeared to have indulged in similar activities in Spain and eventually drifted to Cuba whence he was returned to Italy under police escort. Subject again used his influence with Mussolini to secure financial provision for the family's black sheep, while drawing, at the same time, on the Garibaldi Legion funds to a certain extent.

SANTE, who had formed a Garibaldi Association in France with the support of French left-wing elements had been arrested by the Germans in Bordeaux. Subject invoked Mussolini's aid who promised to have SANTE released and eventually brought to Italy.

In 1939 as a result of a quarrel with FARMACCI which from press polemics degenerated into a bout of face slapping in the House of Deputies, subject was deprived by MUSSOLINI of his seat and sentenced to 13 months' house detention. In 1940, subject was pardoned by the Duce and offered the post of Consigliere Nazionale which he accepted, without, however, participating in any further political activities.

After the fall of France subject advocated the setting up of an autonomous province of NICE to act, in his opinion, as a buffer state. To this end subject organized "Gruppi d'Azione Mazzardi" both in Italy and in France in order to agitate and eventually to bring about a coup d'etat in NICE, thus presenting the world with a 'fait accompli' on the Rhine, being pattern. Subject states that he submitted his plan in a promemoria to the King and to Prince Umberto and saw the latter in his connection. Prince Umberto, himself in favour of the scheme, undertook to submit it to MUSSOLINI. The latter, however, had more ambitious plans and would not even entertain the idea.

Subject did not contribute in any way to the Italian war effort until July 1943 when, with the honorary rank of Console General of the Black Legion in Albania (but, subject insists, retaining the Garibaldi red tie), he was designated by MUSSOLINI to Lubiana to settle the differences that had arisen between Black-shirts and the regular Italian army. With the fall of the Duce, subject considered his mission ended and returned immediately to Rome where he met General ARMELLINI and placed himself at the disposal of the King and the RADOGLIO Government. Subject adds that he had endeavoured to see RADOGLIO, but the latter could not grant him an interview. He was arrested, however, by General ARMELLINI, then in the process of integrating the Black Legion into the regular army, that the fact of his being on active service at the time of the fall of MUSSOLINI entitled him to an interview.

Subject was pardoned by the Duce and entered the post-war political scene. He was not participating in any further political activities.

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(ii) Post-Armistice Activities: Having heard rumours that MUSSOLINI, after his rescue by the Germans, had returned to Italy and was considering the setting up of an Italian Republic, subject called on the German Ambassador in Rome, VON RAHM, and applied for permission to contact MUSSOLINI on the grounds of his old friendship with the latter. VON RAHM promised to help, but in the meantime subject, having learnt that MUSSOLINI was at Rocca delle Caminate, decided to visit him without any further delay. Subject added, for the information of the interrogators, that he was anxious to discuss the form of republic his old friend contemplated in view of the strong Carabinieri republican tradition.

Subject interviewed MUSSOLINI at Rocca delle Caminate early in October. He asked the Duce what were his future intentions. These, the Duce replied, were too vast to be described in a few words. Subject then suggested that the only possible republic should be a liberal and democratic one on the Swiss pattern. It would therefore be necessary for MUSSOLINI to establish a system and ensure a German withdrawal from Italy, since the Italian situation was not

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abhorrence for both. Furthermore he would have to come to terms with the Allies and the King. In order to save the country from political division it might even become necessary for MUSSOLINI to withdraw from the political theatre. MUSSOLINI replied: "I do not believe in republics; this is only a trap to catch the unwary" (La repubblica e uno specchio per le allodole). "I will form a republic on the German pattern, with a Fuehrer who will be called the Duce". Subject saw no point in any further discussion and left.

Asked how he reconciled his statement of allegiance to the King and Badoglio government with this clandestine and self-imposed discussion with a virtual outlaw on a proposed change of constitution in the government of his country, subject replied that his acceptance of monarchy was in any case a matter of expediency in the interest of national unity and not a binding allegiance. Subject added that had he found MUSSOLINI in a receptive frame of mind he would have been prepared to undertake a mission on his behalf to the Allies.

On his return to Rome subject realized that by virtue of his name and following, MUSSOLINI would use fair means or foul to ensure his presence in Fascist republican Italy, and he therefore decided to liquidate his affairs, place his family in safe hiding and finally to cross over to liberated Italy. An additional reason for these precautions was the promulgation of a law requiring the presence in northern Italy of all heads of independent organizations under threat of immediate arrest or of sanctions against defaulters' families. Subject whom BADOGGIO had removed from the command of the Garibaldi Legion owing to his long-standing association with fascism, and replaced by his brother, Peppino, had been re-instated, however, by republican fascist decree and was therefore liable to reprisals for non-compliance. Subject moved his family from Viale Rossini No. 9 to a safe hiding place and rendered himself as inconspicuous as possible.

Subject communicated his intentions to an old friend Padre MAGNI, Head of the College of Jesuits in Rome and an ardent sympathizer of the Allied cause. Padre MAGNI, undertook with the connivance of the Portuguese Ambassador in Rome to provide subject with fake Portuguese papers which would enable him to leave Italy in the garb of a priest. Subject's intention, at the time, was to meet "his old friend", Sir Samuel Hears, and through the latter's intercession, to make himself acceptable to the Allied authorities in Southern Italy. After due consideration, subject states that he found it beneath his dignity as a soldier to exploit this form of subterfuge and decided to take the bolder course of crossing the lines.

Through his membership of the Tevere-Reno Rowing Club and an acquaintance with a certain Mario BALDIZZI, subject, in addition to the following names of personalities in liberated Italy: Principe CAERCCIOLO and Enrico MUSSO of the

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Through his membership of the Tevere-Reno Rowing Club and an acquaintance with a certain Mario BILDAZZI, subject, in addition to the following names of personalities in liberated Italy: Principe CAROCIOLO and Eurico RUSSO of the Confederazione Generale del Lavoro, obtained an introduction into the Partito d'Azione resistance group. He made the acquaintance of SCARVELLA-MARETTI, owner of an estate "La Pavone" in the neighbourhood of the capital, and it is there that subject met two very active supporters of the underground movement, DON VALENTINI and DON FERDINANDO GIORGI. These priests, who had taken refuge in the catacombs, undertook to provide him with forged documents in the name of GALLBERTI Ezio to facilitate an eventual journey across the lines. They also introduced him to BENCIVENGA, head of the Partito d'Azione in Rome. BENCIVENGA fully approved of his intention of crossing into liberated territory and told him that they all realized that subject's adherence to the Fascist Party had only been maintained in order to secure the maximum advantages for his Garibaldi veterans. BENCIVENGA, whom subject met on three separate occasions in different hiding places, instructed him to send the following radio message on arrival in Naples: "Voluturno Roma Viva Garibaldi".

BENCIVENGA undertook furthermore to announce subject's crossing to members of the Partito d'Azione on this side. Subject submitted to BENCIVENGA the draft of a speech he intended to make on the wireless in liberated Italy, and the latter made several amendments and suggestions. Subject felt that BENCIVENGA's recommendation would go a long way towards counter-balancing any adverse attitude which the Allies might adopt towards him in view of his long association

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with Fascism. Questioned about ARMELLINI, subject stated that he had not seen him again, but understood from DON VALENTINI that he was in hiding in ROME and was BADOGLIO's representative there. Subject also learnt from VALENTINI that Generals ENCIIVENGA, ARMELLINI, CAZZOLI and MONTI were members of the Centro Militare and that General CARBONI (Interrogator's comment: Former Head of SIM) was commanding a group of Partisans near Rome, who were in W/T communication with Allies.

Subject added that until his first attempt to cross the lines he led a very retired life but moved in and about ROME under his own name and driving his own car. In the latter connection he managed to obtain a German circulation permit through his secretary, Signorina Rina VITALE (Via Flavia N.5), whose acquaintance with a Police agent "Franz" enabled subject to secure the necessary document personally from Col. FURCK (Top floor of Albergo Quirinale). Subject described "Franz" as thin, dark hair, of medium height, speaking fluent Italian and probably an Italian. He always wore a raincoat.

It was during this period that subject was able to assist in the escape of certain British P/W, among whom a Capt. MacGowan whom he fetched from a point 300 kilometres away from ROME to the Istituto di San'Arcisio, near the outskirts of San Callisto, Via Appia, and delivered into DON VALENTINI's safe keeping. Subject understands that Capt. MacGowan is a nephew of General Montgomery and hopes that his action will be recognized as a further proof of his bona-fides. Another British escapee whom subject claims to have helped was one captain to the 8th Army whom he succeeded in smuggling into the Vatican.

3. ESCAPE NARRATIVE

(a) First Attempt: This took place on 31 December 1943. Subject, accompanied by DON GIORGIO and Ingegnere INGEGNOLI of the Partito d'Azione arrived at Pescasseroli on 1.1.44 where he was the guest of Don Antonio PANDOLFI who is known to have aided many British P/Ws to escape. Subject discussed with the latter details of an operational plan to be carried out in the Gioia Vecchia-Berona area by Partisans and Allied troops. Subject is ready to communicate these details on request. After hiring a guide the party lost its way in a snow storm and was compelled to return to Pescasseroli where he was advised by DON PANDOLFI to give up the attempt by the Cassino route owing to weather conditions.

(b) Second Attempt: This was made on 2 February 1944 via Monte Tranquillo, Campelli, Sora, Frosinone, Sezze and the vicinity of Lake Fogliano. Subject was stopped by the Germans near the Mussolini Canal and conducted to an S/S post where an Oberleutnant, Heinrich STUMM, interrogated him, looked at his false identity papers but neglected to search him or his belongings. When it was

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(c) Third and Last Attempt: On 26 April 1944 subject, accompanied by a Ten. TECCHI of the Alpini, Marino Pietro, a guide, and a Ten. IZZIRELLI who fell out

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of the expedition later on, started out for Pescaseroli. Two days later they reached Civitella and via Monte Greco eventually came to the Sangro river which was forded at midnight of 3rd May. They made contact at 6 a.m. of May 4th with the Scots Guards Bde. at Castel di Sangro.

4. STATEMENT OF INTENTIONS & POLITICAL VIEWS

Subject gave the following reasons to explain why he crossed the lines:-

- (a) His constant friendship for England and France.
- (b) The fact that his mother is English and his wife American.
- (c) His loathing of the Germans and his conviction from the beginning that Germany would lose the war.
- (d) His hope, in this tragic moment for Italy, to be able to create a Legion of Garibaldi volunteers who, side by side with the new Italian Army, would contribute to the rebirth of Italy.
- (e) Subject states that he asks for nothing except to be allowed to fight with such rank as the authorities may wish to assign to him.
- (f) Subject is satisfied that he has a clear conscience and has no past misdeeds to his debit. He is not a Marcia su Roma or a Sciarpa Littorio, and has not taken part in any of the Fascist wars, not even in the present one, with the exception of his 25 days' liaison duty at Lubiana. His collaboration with Mussolini was always prompted by his solicitude for the Garibaldi veterans and tradition.

5. COMMENTS

Subject went to great lengths to point out that he had not played an active role during the Fascist Regime. He has deemed it prudent, however, to provide himself in advance, of evidence of his bona-fides in the eyes of the King and the Allied authorities, viz:-

- 1. His acquaintance with eminent Allied personalities.
- 2. His timely declaration of loyalty to the King after the fall of Mussolini.

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1. His acquaintance with eminent Allied personalities.
2. His timely declaration of loyalty to the King after the fall of Mussolini.
3. The ready acceptance of his motives by the Partito d'Azione, and their collaboration.
4. His aid to escaped British Prisoners of War.
5. His unconditional offer of collaboration with the Allies.
6. The risks and hardships incurred by him in crossing the lines. (Subject argues that he could have remained in Rome or even accepted to collaborate with Mussolini with little personal risk.)
7. The fact that he has left his family in Rome.

6. APPRECIATION & RECOMMENDATIONS

From a security angle two aspects of the story appear suspicious:-

- (a) His residence and comparative freedom in Rome prior to his first attempt to escape, with the probable knowledge of Germans and Italians alike.
- (b) The remarkable oversight of the SS Oberleutnant in failing to have subject searched at the time of his arrest near Lago di Folignano.

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Confirmation by our organization in Rome (BENCIVENGA, ARMELLINI etc.) of subject's contacts with the Partito d'Azione should dispose of (a) and dispel the suspicion that (b) was anything more than a very lucky oversight. Conversely, lack of proper corroboration by our Rome organization will inevitably place subject in a precarious situation.

Subject's relationship with the Fascist regime can best be described as a case of mutual exploitation, the Regime making capital of the Garibaldi name and tradition in an attempt to link in historical continuity the Fascist revolution with the "Risorgimento", and subject in his turn extracting the maximum material advantages for himself, his family and the remnants of the Garibaldi saga. However, his past intimacy with the Duce, the various delicate missions undertaken on behalf of the latter, and the handsome offers made to him by the Duce since the Armistice may cause him, even today, to be regarded by Republican fascist elements as an exploitable, if unconscious, trait-d'union with their followers on this side. It would therefore appear undesirable to allow him, at any rate for the moment, unrestricted activity in liberated territory.

It is suggested therefore that, even if the veracity of his story is corroborated, subject be handed over to the Italian authorities with the recommendation that :-

- (a) A full interrogation be carried out, particularly on the period between 25 July and 8 September 1943.
- (b) Maximum propaganda use be made of his presence in liberated Italy, and
- (c) That he be kept under constant but discreet surveillance.

I know, on the other hand, that a brother of his, Ricciotti, had established contact with the Allied Authorities.

I am anxious to tell you what I know regarding these two gentlemen:

- 1. Ricciotti--Apparently in disagreement with the fascist regime. He was in France, instead, as an agent of the fascist police who mainly reported activities of the antifascist refugees on French soil.
- 2. Ezio --Consul General of the Fascist militia. He was one of the most conspicuous exponents of the Party.

It would be well if both of them were to be put out of circulation and placed where they could do no harm.

On receipt of your Memorandum MGS 014.33 of February 16th, this office telegraphed to the British Consulate-General at Tangier informing them that Vitale's request for permission to return to Italy had been granted by all the authorities concerned, asking them to arrange for him to be informed, to supply him with an Inter Allied Laissez-passer and to give us notice of his arrival. A telegram was received in reply from the Consulate-General saying that the British and American Security authorities in Tangier were very anxious that he should remain there at least until the end of April, because he was employed on some important local work, and that, failing further word from us, they proposed to place the case in abeyance for the time being. We informed the Political Section of the Control Commission of this and have not taken any further action in the matter. We propose to reconsider the case at the end of April.

1. On 1 January Marshall Badoglio wrote General MacFarlane requesting the repatriation of Dr. Massimo Adolfo Vitale. On 20 January Captain Stone, Deputy Chief Commissioner replied to General Badoglio that the letter had been forwarded to the appropriate quarter for action. Also on the 20 January Major Doe, Secretary General, wrote C.-in-C., A.F.H.Q. requesting that Dr. Massimo Adolfo Vitale be repatriated if there was no objection on the part of A.F.H.Q. However, this letter has not been answered to the knowledge of this Headquarters.

2. The subject has now been brought to the attention of this office by Regional Commissioner, Region II, who states that Dr. Vitale's son, an Italian Captain Liaison Officer with the Hq. 71 Sub. Area, is asking that the matter of his father's repatriation be followed up. SUBJECT: Repatriation of the surplus officers of the Italian Division "Garibaldi".

On reorganizing the Italian Division "Garibaldi", fighting in Montenegro at the orders of the II Partisan Corps, 29 officers were considered surplus. These officers would be of the greatest use in Italy.

The Division Command therefore, following instructions from the Supreme Command, gave notice on 10th April last to the competent Command of the Popular Yugoslav Army of Liberation, for the purpose of obtaining, the authorisation for these officers to repatriate with the Italian airplanes returning, as soon as the sick and gravely wounded had been brought back.

Since up to date we have had no reply from the Yugoslav Army, nor has any officer been repatriated, we take it that a final agreement could not be reached on the subject.

In consideration of the moral and material discomfort which these officers are suffering and who as early as September, 1943, decidedly turned their forces ~~and~~ against the Germans, we beg you to request the Allied Forces Command of the Middle East to try and obtain a favourable solution of the question, through Marshal Tito's Command.

1. Ref your letter 12372 dated 11 May 1944 and numerous discussions with General Infante.
2. A message from AFHQ states that Major De Salis cannot be spared from his present tasks and suggests that it is no longer necessary for Major De Salis to visit Italy.
3. It is suggested that it may be possible to avacuate small numbers of special lists of lists showing types, numbers and priority can be provided.
4. I have discussed this matter with General Infante and understand that it is impossible to provide such lists as you asked for, and, that while the visit of Major De Salis is not essential, it is desirable that he should visit Italy when it is possible to spare him. I shall therefore notify A.P.H.Q. to this effect and shall be pleased if you confirm that you agree.
5. When speaking with General Infante it was decided that now that it was considered possible to repatriate some 500 Italians per month from Albania and Greece, that specialists could be selected from these parties.
6. I would like to point out that the repatriation of men from Albania and Greece would automatically result in demobilization of similar numbers either from the army in Italy or from those repatriated.

1. Reference your unnumbered signal dated 6 May repeated to A.C.G. It was ruled that no large scale evacuation of Italians from ALBANIA was practicable or desirable on grounds of security.
2. The German drive against the Partisan bridge-head in Southern Albania has again brought this problem into prominence.
3. The Naval Authorities have expressed the view that a limited number of Italians evacuated by Italian vessels engaged on operations to Albania would have a valuable effect on the morale of Italian crews.
4. At a meeting of SAC to-day, SMC stated that from a security angle it should be possible to handle up to 500 Italians evacuated per month.
5. My confirmation be given that the evacuation of 500 per month would not be regarded as a large scale evacuation which was prohibited in your signal under reference.
6. Would emphasize that the continued presence of a large number of Italians in guerrilla areas without any prospect of reducing their numbers, presents a serious problem and may adversely affect current operations.

In reply to your memorandum SF/101/7/Comd of the 21st April, it is considered inadvisable in the present circumstances to permit the Italian Government to approach Albanian authorities through Ankara with a view to arranging the repatriation of Italians in Albania. Apart from the undesirability of allowing the Italian Government to get into direct touch with a puppet government under German control, it seems highly improbable that the German authorities would acquiesce in any such proposal.

2. In the event of it being considered an Allied interest to arrange for the repatriation of these Italians, it would be less open to objection from the point of view of the A.C.G. should the Allied authorities themselves undertake discussions through the Turkish Government.

3. Copies of this correspondence are being sent to the American Political Adviser and the British Resident Minister's Office at Allied Force Headquarters.

SUBJECT: Repatriation of Senior Italian Officers.

Dear Marshal Messe,

With reference to your letter n.15257 dated 20 September 1944.

The High Commissioner for Prisoners of War was asked to state his views regarding the repatriation of the officers you mention.

This he did in his letter 1007/Mil/C2 di prot 22 July 1944 when he stated that no employment could be promised and that other Italian Officers had been prisoners for a much longer period.

I wrote Allied Force Headquarters on 26 July 1944 stating that the Italian Government would accept the repatriation of the officers mentioned with the exception of PAVESI and LEONARDI.

I pointed out that it would embarrass your Government to have the Admiral and the Commodore returned - this information being given to me by General Gazzera, and also what General Gazzera had said in respect of the length of time the officers had been held Prisoners of War.

Notification of expected time of arrival has not yet been received, but the delay in the repatriation may be due to lack of shipping space under existing conditions.

Inasmuch as it appears that the British Authorities of Asmara, represented by Brigadier S.H. Longvigg, OBE, Chief Administrator H.C.B.M.A. Eritrea, desire a request from the Royal Italian Government, I am very glad to declare that --provided the Allied Authorities do not have any particular objection of which I am unaware--the repatriation of Dr. Fernando Tarizzo would be very much welcomed, as he is a fine professional, a serious person who suffered much at the hands of Fascism, and whose family lives in Rome.

Dear Marshal Badoglio:

I very much regret the delay in replying to your letters of 20 and 22 February with reference to securing the repatriation of Colonel Natale Leopoldo and 2nd Lieutenant Li Voti Pietro di Giuseppe.

As you may know, we have been endeavoring to secure on behalf of Marshal Messe a revision of the present restrictive policy of AFHQ in this respect, and with that objective in mind it has been arranged with Marshal Messe to submit specific lists of 25 officers at a time for whom repatriation is being urgently pressed. The first of Marshal Messe's lists has already gone forward to AFHQ and the remainder are being held pending, we hope, favorable action on the first list. In order to have a coordinated program with some prospect of favorable handling by AFHQ, our suggestion would be to have the names of officers in which your office is specially interested included in subsequently revised lists of Marshal Messe.

If you concur with this suggestion, we can return to Marshal Messe for such revision the five remaining lists which we are holding here pending action on his first list.

SUBJECT: Repatriation of sick or wounded Italian prisoners of war.

The landing of sick or wounded Italian POW at Taranto has given rise to great difficulties in hospitalization, because of the deficiency of local hospital facilities, which impose the necessity of further travel to Bari.

In consideration of the above, and also because of better sanitary facilities for unloading hospital ships, and great hospital space available for prompt aid (much better established in Bari than at Taranto), it would be more suitable to use Bari as a landing port for hospital ships, rather than Taranto.

I will be grateful for any action you may take in this matter.
