1. Your FBD/RJ of 19 Feb.

I have sent an official answer and I don't think I need elaborate it further here, except to say that it appears to me from para 4 of the official letter (CC 560 of 17 Feb) that the officer who dealt with this matter was neither aware of the full facts of this particular case, or appreciates the military necessity for the action taken, nor is he aware that such action is in accordance with the policy previously accepted in this and other theatres of war.

I think you will agree that he has "flown off the handle".

2. I have just had a quick run round some of the main refugee camps and saw Oldfield who has just come. His main concern was the continual change of staffs which, though I suppose this has been unavoidable, precludes possibility of continuity of administrative policy which is so necessary in these rather difficult "ad hoc" organisations. It is not my concern of course. I merely mention it as he asked me to put in a word.

3. Accommodation has been arranged here for McCaffrey and he can move in at his convenience. He is carrying out a detailed recce now.

4. I was delighted to put you up the other day. Warn in whenever you want to for meal or bed.

I gather that there has been some difficulty in connection with appropriation of civil inter-urban switchboards by your C.S.O. without reference to others concerned.

2. I enclose herewith a memorandum on the subject drafted by a Senior American member of the Mission and not very tactfully worded. I ask you to overlook any lack of tact in the wording and hope very much that you will be good enough to have the question sorted out.

3. While fully realising the necessity for requisitioning communications for military purposes whenever necessary, I think we ought to think very definitely in terms of other users more especially the civil administration. I gather that machinery exists in the shape of communications boards to consider questions of this sort and it would appear that except in cases of real emergency such boards should be consulted before taking any action of a drastic nature.

4. I had meant to write to you before to thank you very much indeed for your very kind hospitality to my P.A. and myself during our recent visit. It was most awfully good of you to put us up and make us so comfortable.

5. I hope you will succeed in getting McCaffery moved from Matera into Bari. I am sure it will be a great help and convenience to both of you to be alongside one another.

MEMORANDUM TO: G-2, Allied Force Headquarters, APO 512

1. Receipt is acknowledged of your Memorandum GBI/CEN/10/44 of the 14 September 44 regarding the departure of a joint Anglo-American mission whose object will be to go into the question of Italian Government communications with their missions abroad and communications between such missions.
2. As this mission will presumably report in the first instance to Allied Force Headquarters at Caserta before coming on to Rome, we attach a copy of the latest revision of Executive Memorandum No. 46 which sets out the present procedure regarding Italian Government message traffic. We would suggest that this memorandum would repay study by the mission before proceeding to this Headquarters.
3. As commentary on the proposed terms of reference for the mission we should be grateful for some elucidation on point 1 which lays down that the mission shall watch Italian diplomatic communications and their security. As regards point 2, it is our understanding that the provision of suitable means of communications for the Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs and Italian missions abroad is a military responsibility which in the past has been carried out by the Communications Sub-Commission through the Chief Signal Officer at AFHQ. We understand from your memorandum of the reference that this procedure should continue. As regards point 3, we would inquire by what means the mission intend to keep the Foreign Office and State Department informed of the contents of Italian telegrams. As the mission is to be set up within the framework of the Allied Control Commission, we presume that this reporting will be done through normal ACC channels to AFHQ and that it will be for AFHQ to arrange that these communications are forwarded to London and Washington. As regards the suggestion that the mission should also have the function of keeping the Allied Control Commission itself informed of the contents of Italian telegrams we must point out that these telegrams should, as at present, go at once to the Political Section who have to deal with the Italian authorities about all the subjects raised therein. It could only lead to delay if the Political Section did not receive these telegrams at least simultaneously with the mission. As regards point 4, the Communications Sub-Commission has already sent to Allied Force Headquarters full information regarding Italian ciphers in use and as requested in your memorandum, we confirm that these will continue to be forwarded to AFHQ for approval prior to their being brought into use. As regards lines of communications we should repeat that our understanding is that these are under military control and that all information on this subject should only be given by the Chief Signal Officer at AFHQ.

EXECUTIVE MEMORANDUM NUMBER 46

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT MESSAGE TRAFFIC

1. INTERNAL

(a) Italian Government messages within Government territory, except Sardinia, are not subject to censorship; messages may be in clear or in cipher. They may be subject to inspection, if required, to check the official nature of the message.

(b) Italian Government messages to or from Sardinia are liable to censorship; ciphers will therefore only be used on this channel that have been approved by Allied authorities and of which copies are held. The censorship exercised will be laid down by the Communications Sub-Commission from time to time, in accordance with instructions from the military authorities concerned.

2. EXTERNAL

(a) Italian Government messages may be passed over the commercially operated submarine cables from Naples to Malta or from Brindisi to Malta for Italian Missions, etc. abroad. Messages are subject to the approval of the Political Section, A.C.C.; they may be in clear or in the codes and or ciphers approved by Allied Force Headquarters. The detailed procedure for dealing with this traffic is given in Attachment "A".

(b) Italian Government messages may be passed over the commercially operated radio circuits from Italy to the United States or the United Kingdom for any addresses dealt with by the operating companies. On these circuits, messages are subject to the approval of the Political Section and also to Field Press Censorship in case of Press messages; they may only be in clear and will be of an entirely non-secret nature such as press releases. The detailed procedure for dealing with this traffic is given in Attachment "B".

3. GENERAL

Italian Government messages may be passed over Allied operated circuits, telegraph, cable or radio, as arranged with the military authorities concerned from time to time. These arrangements will be made the subject of instructions issued as required.

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ATTACHMENT "A"

PROCEDURE FOR DEALING WITH ITALIAN GOVERNMENT TRAFFIC
OVER THE COMMERCIALLY OPERATED CABLES, NAPLES - MALTA
AND BRINDISI - MALTA.

1. All messages will bear the message instruction "FIL" (to be transmitted by landline or cable only) at the beginning.
2. Outgoing messages may only be addressed to Italian Embassies, Missions, etc. abroad.
3. Outgoing messages for transmission in clear. Messages will be handed in by the Italian Government to the Political Section, Headquarters, A.C.C. Rome. After approval they will be forwarded by the Political Section to the HQ Adjutant's office with an endorsement on one copy "Approved for transmission over commercial cables IN CLEAR" signed by the HQ Adjutant's office and passed to the A.C.C. Signal center for transmission to the military signal office controlling the cable office.
4. Outgoing messages for transmission in cipher. Cipher and clear text copies will be handed by the Italian Government to the Political Section, HQ's A.C.C. After approval they will be forwarded by the Political Section to the HQ Adjutant's office, with an endorsement on one cipher copy "Approved for transmission over commercial cables IN CIPHER" signed by the endorsing officer. A ciphered copy will then be authenticated by the HQ Adjutant's office and passed to the A.C.C. Signal Center for transmission to the military signal office controlling the cable office. A second cipher copy together with a clear copy will be sent by the HQ Adjutant's office to the A.C.C. Signal center, for check; after check, both these copies will be returned to the Political Section with any necessary comment. It should be noted that cipher copies of approved messages may be passed for transmission without being delayed for the check by A.C.C. Signals for agreement of texts.
5. Incoming messages. Incoming messages, in clear or in cipher, will be delivered without delay to the Italian Government. A clear copy of each message will also be delivered to the Political Section.
6. All charges by the cable company will be met by the Italian Government.

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ATTACHMENT "B"

PROCEDURE FOR DEALING WITH ITALIAN GOVERNMENT TRAFFIC OVER THE COMMERCIALLY OPERATED RADIO CIRC ITS FROM ITALY TO THE U.S. AND U.K.

1. Outgoing messages may be addressed to any addressee dealt with by the operating companies.
2. Messages will be in clear only, and will be of an entirely non-secret nature such as press releases.
3. Messages will be handed to the Political Section, HQ., A.C.C. After approval they will be sent to the HQ Adjutant's office with an endorsement on one copy "Approved for transmission over commercial radio IN CLEAR subject to Field Press Censorship approval" signed by the endorsing officer. The messages will then be authenticated by the HQ Adjutant's office and passed to the Field Press Censorship office, Rome. If approved they will be duly endorsed and forwarded by that office to the radio operating company for transmission.
4. Incoming Press messages will be sent by the Field Press Censorship office to the HQ. Adjutant's office A.C.C. which will pass them without delay to the Italian Government, sending a copy to the Political Section.
5. All charges by the radio company will be met by the Italian Government.

1. I attach a draft reply for Captain Stone's signature to a proposal put forward by AFHQ for a joint anglo-American Mission to go into the question of Italian Government communications.
2. The draft was prepared by the Political Section and the Communications Sub-Commission together. The point about which we could not reach agreement was where this Mission would be placed "within the framework of the ACC". In brief, neither of us want to be responsible for it. The case for the Political Section is that three out of four of the terms of reference of the Mission fell outside Political Section competence. The case for the Communications Sub-Commission is that the only term of reference which concerns the Political Section. When you have considered this would you pass on the Captain Stone as a matter of urgency. We must get this to AFHQ before the Mission arrives.

The British and American authorities concerned have been considering how best to ensure that their requirements in the matter of the Italian Government cypher communications with Italian Missions abroad and communications between such Missions are satisfied. These requirements are:

- (a) that no leakage of information to the enemy takes place;
- (b) that we see all Italian messages of possible interest at the earliest possible date and with the minimum of extra work;
- (c) that the British and American authorities are kept informed regarding cyphers and lines of communication used.

For this purpose it is proposed that a small British and American Mission should be set up within the frame work of the Allied Control Commission with the following terms of reference:

- (1) to watch Italian diplomatic communications and their security;
- (2) to provide the Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs and Italian missions abroad with suitable means of communication;
- (3) to keep the Foreign Office, State Department and Allied Control Commission informed of the contents of Italian telegrams;
- (4) to keep the British and American authorities informed regarding Italian cyphers and lines of communication.

The members of the British and American Mission have now been selected and are ready to leave the United Kingdom.

The Acting Chief Commissioner of the Allied Control Commission has no objection to receiving such a Mission and fitting it in to the framework of the A.C.C. provided he is authorised to do so by A.F.H.Q. 2395

If no objection is seen, it is requested that the necessary authority may be given to Captain Stone before the departure of the members of the Mission from the United Kingdom.

The work of reorganizing the Italian Red Cross and of reviving some of its most essential activities meets, under present circumstances, with the greatest difficulties owing the lack of I.R.C. transportation - about 98% of which has been removed by nazi-fascists or destroyed in the war - and to slow postal communications.

Under the circumstances, I venture to submit that the A.C.C. meet the IRC, needs in this respect by considering the possibility of granting the following facilities:

- a) a standing authority for IRC. officials of high rank - namely the President, the Secretary General, and the National Secretary General of IRC. Volunteer Nurses - to travel by air.
- b) authority for certain IRC officials - to be named on each occasion to use W.D. vehicles in order to reach and return from certain IRC. region and travel within that same region for services purposes.
- c) authority for certain IRC vehicles - the numbers of which shall be notified on each occasion - to receive petrol from Allied service stations; the petrol to be signed for not by driver but by the IRC. official using car.
- d) authority for official IRC. Headquarters mail to use - subject to any rule that shall be framed by the competent authorities - ACC. communications lines to and from areas where postal communications have not yet been restored or are still too unreliable or slow for an association, like the IRC., struggling to revive must difficult conditions.

I have the honour to confirm the request made yesterday, in conversation, regarding the use of codes for telegraphic communications between this Consulate General and the Ministry of Foreign Relations of the United States of Brazil, in Rio de Janeiro.

2. As Your Excellency is aware, my mission, though ostensibly consular, is also, confidentially, diplomatic. My appointment to Rome with the status of Consul General, and not with the status of Minister, was only made to comply with the wishes of the Supreme Allied Command.
3. The exchange of correspondence with my Government and the reception of instructions theretofrom, as well as the mere presence of Brazilian troops in Italy, should amply justify an exception to the rules now applied as regards the use of codes by the Consulates of the United Nations. I may add that, during the height of the Tunisian campaign, in March 1943, AFHQ made no objection to my employing codes, in Algiers - notwithstanding the fact that I was then, with no specific rank, a diplomatic observer of one of the United Nations, with no forces in the battle.
4. I feel sure that, with your approval of this point of view, the Supreme Allied Commander in Chief will grant the above mentioned request, and I therefore would be very grateful to Your Excellency for taking the matter up with AFHQ.

I. Postal. The bulk of the traffic, that between provincial capitals and communes, is of course already passed through civil mail services. Cutting-out the Regional Commissioner's Office will accelerate the service between provincial capitals and the Government, as the civil mail service is, generally, as good as the A.C.C. courier service.

2. Telegraph

a. The situation of Italian Government in respect of telegraph communications from Rome to the provincial capitals of provinces under its administration is still not at all satisfactory.

b. This is chiefly due to a bottleneck at Naples, due to the inadequacy of telegraph terminal equipment at the Naples office. The matter is in hand and the situation should improve materially in about 10 days time.

c. It will also be considerably eased by the commencement of operation by Italian Government of direct submarine cables to Sicily and Sardinia. These are also expected to be in operation in about 10 days time.

d. In short, it can be safely assumed that the communications of the Italian Government by telegraph to all provincial capitals within their administration will be reasonably satisfactory in about a fortnight but not before.

3. Telephone

Telephone communications of the Italian Government with their Provinces will be inadequate to deal with routine information matters for some considerable time.

The deliberations of the Regional Commissioners' meeting has brought to light the necessity and expediency in territory handed back to the Italian Government of the employment by HQ ACC and all the Sub-Commissions of Italian Government channels of communication to Prefects in the Provinces, rather than ACC channels through the Regional Commissioners.

With the attenuated staff in the Southern Regions not only will it be impossible for the regional staff to distribute instructions and disseminate information but policy demands that this should be done through the Italian Government. For example, if information is required on technical matters such as agricultural prospects, industrial installations, crime statistics, etc., the Italian Government should be requested to have the information furnished by their Prefects and other officials rather than the Regional Commissioner through his Provincial Officers. I suggest that this equally applies to representatives of Sub-Commissions in the field. There would, of course, be no harm, and in fact benefit, in informing Regional Commissioners of the instructions sent forward and the information requested by the Italian Government.

3. If you agree (and you may wish to raise this at a Vice Presidents' meeting) I will draft instructions to Vice Presidents.

1. Reference is made to your letter A/CC 311.2 of 5 July 1944, and our reply of 18 July 1944.

2. Military operation of the CAGLIARI-PALERMO and NAPLES-PALERMO submarine cables will cease on 20 August 1944. G-2, AFHQ, have ruled that there is no objection to the return of these cables to the Italian authorities, provided the Allied Control Commission maintain close supervision of the traffic passed.

3. It is therefore requested that you set up the arrangements by which this supervision can be effected.

4. Operation of these cables must be undertaken using Italian equipment and personnel. In the case of the Naples terminal, it will be necessary for the Italian authorities to provide a new landline between the cable house at Posillipo and their cable office. The present landline between Posillipo and HQ., PBS, is still required for Allied Military use. At the Palermo terminal, it will be necessary for the Allied Military authorities to maintain close supervision of the cable house at Mondello, until measures have been taken by this Headquarters to safeguard the security of the NAPLES-MALTA cable which passes through the cable house.

When this circuit is in operation it is intended to cease military operation of the Naples-Palermo, Anzio-Maddalona and Palermo-Cagliari cables. Subject to G-2 concurrence, these cables will be returned to the Italian Government to operate using their own equipment.

3. = It is not intended to repair the Anzio-Palermo cable, which is broken in several places.

4. = Your para. 4 is not entirely understood as the Italian Government have been authorised to file official messages through the ACC ever since the inception of the Naples-Palermo-Cagliari cable circuits. The total volume of traffic passed on this circuit has never exceeded twenty-five percent of the available capacity. It would appear, therefore, that the present cable links between Italy, Sicily and Sardinia have been adequate for all Allied and Italian official traffic.

COMMUNICATIONS CENSORSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES IN MEDITERRANEAN THEATER

1. With effect from 25 July 1944, responsibility for coordination of communications censorship policy, procedure and practice in the Mediterranean Theater is transferred from INC Section to G-2 Section, Allied Force Headquarters, to be exercised by Communications Censorship Sub-Section.

2. Responsibilities of Communications Censorship Sub-Section, G-2 Section, AFHQ, are:

a. Coordination of communications censorship policy, procedure and practice throughout the Mediterranean Theater within the framework of the overall policy defined by the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean Theater, and by the Combined Chiefs of Staff.

b. Definition of the communications censorship duties and responsibilities of the component parts of the Mediterranean Theater and such other areas as may be placed under command of the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean Theater.

c. Allotment of all communications censorship personnel throughout the theater to carry out these commitments in the most efficient and economical manner and operation of censorship of troop and POW communications.

d. Advanced censorship with armies.

e. Collation and dissemination to the military user agencies, to Imperial Censorship, and U.S. Office of Censorship, of intelligence gained from censorship throughout the theater, and dissemination within the theater of information obtained by military and civil censorship organizations outside the theater.

f. Liaison with the Service des Contrôles Techniques de l'Afrique Française (French postal, telegraph and telephone censorship), and any other censorships set up by indigenous governments in the theater.

g. Planning for future operations and training of the necessary personnel.

3. Press and radio censorship will continue to be the responsibility of INC Section, AFHQ.

4. A Censorship Advisory Committee is created, under chairmanship of the A.C. of S., G-2, or his representative, to consider aspects of information derived from censorship, the committee to consist of representatives of G-1 (Br), G-1 (US), G-2 (C1), G-2 (CC), G-5, CEMA and PWB.

1. Lieutenant-Commander GELISHINSKY (USSR Navy) called on us to-day with reference to handling telegrams originating from Advisory Council for Italy for transmission to Moscow.

2. The Lieut.-Commander stated that, since he had agreed with the Acting Chief Commissioner to limit traffic on the radio link operated by the Russians, he would like to know whether he could file routine messages with ACC.

- (a) Traffic is estimated not to exceed 500 groups per day.
- (b) Messages would be filed in clear (which includes Russian, however).
- (c) Soviet delegation would prepare messages on forms as required by us and with required number of copies.

3. ACC Signal Center can handle such an amount of traffic without detriment to other traffic on the understanding that

- (a) only messages with "Routine" precedence will be filed;
- (b) traffic will be routed to AFHQ for transmission to destinations;
- (c) messages are authenticated by proper authority.

4. Request ruling on following:-

- (a) Should traffic as covered in paras 1 & 2 be handled by ACC.
- (b) Should Adjutant's Office authenticate on basis of stamp of Soviet Delegation, or should political Section ACC also approve messages.

Colonel Henderson opened the meeting with the statement that the question to be discussed was the terms and conditions of the lease of certain cable terminal equipment now in Malaya by Italcable to Cables and Wireless. Colonel Henderson stated that the Italian Government was not rested as under present conditions no such leases could be entered into by Italcable without the approval of the Italian Government.

Mr. Spinelli asked if it would be acceptable if equipment were delivered from Italy rather than Malaya, and it was agreed that such action would be acceptable if equipment were available. Discussion took place as to what equipment was required and Colonel Harde son brought out that from the correspondence, the only equipment involved was the artificial lines now at Malaya necessary for duplex working of both types of cables originally terminating at Malaya.

A suggestion by Dr. Spinelli that cable be brought in and out of Malaya instead of transferring terminal equipment to Gibraltar was rejected on the basis of military security. On the assumption that only the Malaya equipment was available, discussion took place on the terms of rental. It was agreed as follows:

1. Term - 6 months after cessation of hostilities between the United Nations and Germany.

2. Responsibility for transport of equipment from Malaya and delivery to Cables and Wireless in Gibraltar to be Italcables. Diplomatic action required for such movement to be taken by the Allied authorities.

3. An agreed detailed list of equipment involved will be established by Italcables and Cables and Wireless by 24th July 1944, at the latest. Cable and Wireless will arrange for a trial to Malaya with representatives of Italcables to explore possibility of equipment available there. It was pointed out that no equipment could be removed from Italy which might be needed for future Allied requirements.

4. Cables and Wireless would be responsible for the return of equipment to Malaya in same condition as received subject to normal wear and tear, and would replace any irreparably damaged or destroyed equipment rather than make financial compensation.

5. Italcable and Cables and Wireless to agree on value of equipment.

6. The meeting was adjourned to be held at the same place at 1600 hours.

My dear Mr. Ambassador:

On July 24th this office informed Allied Force Headquarters that the radio station of the Soviet Representation to the Advisory Council went into operation on 22 July using frequencies 10500, 9200, 6400 and 7000.

The Commission is in receipt of the following message from Allied Force Headquarters, relative to this matter:

"Arbitrary use of radio frequencies by Soviet Representation in this theater is not acceptable.

"Frequencies 6400 Kcs and 7000 Kcs have previously been authorized for other fixed Allied military circuits. Use of these frequencies on the Moscow circuit will seriously degrade military communications in this area.

"Frequencies 10500 Kcs and 9200 Kcs are clear and may be used on the Rome-Moscow circuit. These frequencies in addition to 5700 Kcs previously cleared for use on the Rome-Moscow circuit by the Soviet Representation should be adequate from the standpoint of propagation and number of frequencies needed for this link.

"Advise Representation accordingly and report action."

It is requested that use of frequencies 6400 Kcs and 7000 Kcs be discontinued and that frequencies 10500, 9200 and 5700 Kcs only be used as the frequencies on the Rome-Moscow circuit.

Will you please confirm in order that report can be made to Allied Force Headquarters.

1. Reference is made to the directive on "Direct Communication between ACC and American and British Governments," letter AG 387.4-1 MSS-AGM of 19 February 1944. It will be observed that while "direct communication on matters of routine between Headquarters, Allied Control Commission and the British and American Governments" was there authorized, it was also stressed that "insistence has been put upon the principle that all matters of real substance must be referred through this Headquarters to the Combined Chiefs of Staff and not to a particular department of either the American or the British Government."

2. It has come to notice that on a number of occasions of late the established channels of communication through this Headquarters have not been followed. Attention is drawn to the instances set out below.

3. The "Overall Civilian Supply Program for Liberated Italy - Preliminary - Allied Control Commission, Economic Section, March 3, 1944" was not known to this Headquarters until brought to its attention by the Combined Chiefs of Staff in CAL 327, a copy of which is inclosed. The CCS there point out that this document, of primary interest to the CCAC, was received in Washington through other than military channels and was only accidentally brought to their attention after much delay. The "Overall . . . Program" was seemingly first made available in Washington by its inclusion in the "Report of the Hon. Henry F. Grady to the Department of State, March 28, 1944." AFHQ had to request copies by cablegram (F 31844 of 13 April).

4. The "Comments by the Allied Control Commission on the report of the FMA Survey Mission to Italy, dated February 5, 1944" were sent direct to Mr. Leo Crowley, Administrator, FMA, and others, by letter of April 1, 1944, from the Executive Officer, Economic Section, ACC. There was neither coordination with this Headquarters, nor transmittal through channels. A report which was here regarded as a number 2511 examples of inaccuracy and misstatement reached Washington without AFHQ having any opportunity to offer corrections. While the "Comments on Section IV of the FMA Report on Economic Activities of ACC" were annexed to the "Report of the Finance Sub-Commission, Hq., ACC for March 1944" and thus came to the knowledge of AFHQ and of the CCS - Mr. Tirana had

already taken the comments of this and other Sub-Commissions directly to the FEA.

5. The March report of the Finance Sub-Commission, at p. 17, speaks of a number of studies on currency and exchange problems, and states that "these studies have been summarized in memorandum of 29 March which has been transmitted to the Combined Civil Affairs Committee of CCS. A copy of this memorandum is attached as Annex ix "C". The document thus referred to is a letter 13106 from Col. Foley to Col. Adams, Subject: Request by Badoglio Government that the dollar value of the lira be increased." It was at any rate not transmitted through C-5 Section, and it is believed that it became known in Washington by reason of being transmitted directly to Mr. Grady. The document reached London only as an Annex to the Finance Sub-Commission Report for March.

6. In the letter of the Executive Director, Bureau of Areas, Foreign Economic Administration, to Mr. Alberto G. Antolini, dated May 26, 1944, there appears this direction:

Reports. You will be responsible for information and special reports requested from time to time by the Administration and by other agencies of the Government. This type of report will be cleared by the Vice-President of the Allied Control Commission, channeled through regular State Department media.

It is to be stated clearly that, until otherwise ordered, with civilian just as with Military personnel of the Allied Control Commission, direct communications with the departments of either Government, other than within the authority granted by letter AG 387.4-1 of 15 February, are not permitted.

7. With the increasing importance of agencies dealing with relief and supply, and with several recent instances of officers and civilians being sent into this theater to report on various aspects of civil affairs, it is important to ensure that normal channels of communication be observed. It is therefore requested that the reason and necessity of the established mode of communicating be impressed upon all concerned.

1. Reference attached copy of back slip from GSO, AFHQ, dated 27 June 44, above subject, to C/S thru MSG, U-3.

2. The first point to a precise is that the total maximum signal personnel requirement of A.A.C. is very small, far less than that required for the smallest military formation headquarters, and that the subject is presumably only being raised on this level as a matter of principle.

3. Referring to the recommendations made in para 5 of slip:

a. ACC must locate its headquarters at the seat of government. This will certainly be also a major military signal centre which can provide the main teletype and telephone outlets until such time as they can be provided through civil resources entirely.

- b. (1) There are no suitable U.S. or British civilians available, nor likely to be.
(2) There is no objection to the use of limited service personnel, and in fact MSGs have been used for some time.
(3) A minimum of military staff will be insisted on for security reasons.

4. a. The staff considered essential for the proper functioning of ACC in the situation that will exist after the transfer of the Italian Government to Rome is listed as Appendix "A" attached (Incl #2).

b. This situation will make a minimum demand because of the elaborate and complete automatic system in Rome and because of the possibility to accommodate all of ACC and the Italian Government in the one area, and in the same city as a main military signal center. It is therefore suggested that this staff form a permanent irremovable cadre.

e. Although it is hoped this situation will remain, it can not be definitely guaranteed. In the past it has been necessary to locate AGC Headquarters not at a main signal center (Brindisi period), when it was then necessary to provide direct AGC radio service with AFHQ. It has also been necessary to split AGC Headquarters and to station the greater part away from the Italian Government (Salerno-Naples period). It has also been necessary to establish Advance Headquarters (None occupation period). There can be no guarantee that similar situations will not recur.

d. In addition to the cadre proposed in sub-paragraph b, it is therefore suggested that additions be made by AFHQ (CS) authority from whatever resources are at his disposal to meet unforeseeable circumstances arising from time to time.

5. This is exclusive of the Army Sub-Commission. This forms part of AGC, but has previously always been separated from it. Its communication requirements are quite separate and distinct from the remainder of AGC, and there is nothing to be gained from any centralization. It has its own communications personnel and resources, which will not be affected.

1. When ACC first was established in Bari, a signal detachment was furnished them by AFHQ from AFHQ resources in order that they might have direct communications with this headquarters. Since that time, ACC has moved into a split location, one echelon being in NAPLES and one being in SALERNO. The signal detachment was supplemented at that time and now consists of a total of approximately three (3) officers and thirty-six (36) men from both U.S. and British sources. In view of the continued pressure on reduction in the number of signal personnel being used in the theater, it is felt that consideration should be given to the establishment of a policy on the furnishing of communications to this particular agency.

2. Initially ACC required special communications to this headquarters since no other suitable means of communication was available at their location in BAHJ. In their present set-ups, the NAPLES echelon is immediately adjacent to PBS which has excellent facilities for communication to AFHQ. The rear echelon of ACC at Salerno is now served by teletypewriter, telegraph printer, and telephone systems connected through NAPLES.

3. It is believed that the situation in Italy is such as to warrant consideration of:

a. Adopting a general policy that ACC will locate its headquarters in the immediate vicinity of some of the larger AFHQ, SOS or L of C installations from which they can obtain most of their signal requirements. It is possible that they may still, under such an arrangement, require a U.S. and/or British Cipher Team.

b. Requiring ACC to obtain suitable qualified civilians to operate the message center, messenger service, teletypewriters and switchboards. AFHQ-NATOUSA would help train these people if necessary. (Cipher teams as needed from AFHQ-NATOUSA source).

4. If it is decided that this particular agency should have a complete signal communication detachment of its own from AFHQ-NATOUSA sources, then it is felt that a provisional U.S. Signal detachment, as well as a provisional British Signal detachment, should be authorized so that these teams may be set up on a definite, recognized basis, and not be withdrawn indefinitely from other signal units.

5. Recommend that:

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a. ACC be required to locate its headquarters in immediate vicinity of one of the larger established military headquarters, drawing on such headquarters for necessary signal service.

b. ACC begin at once:

- (1) the acquisition and training of civilians whose loyalty is certain (US or British citizens) or,
- (2) The use of limited service personnel, or
- (3) A combination of above--if security demands make the use of military personnel in certain phases of signals imperative.

3. When cables numbered 2 and 3 are in working order, it would appear possible to free either cables 4 and 5 for the Italian Government (A/I letter 2720 X 1, dated 24 June, suggests that these should not be used for military purpose), or, alternatively, cables 6 and 7.

4. The Italian Government is very badly placed regarding telegraphic communications with the islands of Sicily and Sardinia. It has

no communication with Sardinia, not even radio, and its communications with Sicily by land lines is overloaded. When the six cables (Nos. 2 - 7) are working, it would seem that two might well be spared from military use.

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

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NOTE OF INTERVIEW

14 June 1944

MR. Smiljanic of the Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council in Naples called on 14 June to discuss the telegraphic facilities available to the Delegation. He said that although the Delegation had been established in Naples for over two months, facilities were still unsatisfactory.

With regard to telegrams in clear, the Delegation was permitted to communicate with Yugoslav Legation, Algiers only, and permission was requested for the same facilities to be granted for Yugoslav Embassy, London; Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Cairo; and Yugoslav Embassy, Washington. MR. Smiljanic said that so far as he knew there were no limitations on the traffic which the Greek Delegation wished to send, and he could not understand the reasons for what appeared to be unfavourable discrimination.

With regard to cipher telegrams, the Yugoslav Delegation were not allowed to send any at all, whereas the Greek Delegation were sending to Algiers and Cairo.

MR. Smiljanic left with me the attached copy of a letter which he had received from the Signal Officer at PBS. He said that he was unable to understand paragraph 2b, because signals in cipher had already been received by the Yugoslav Delegation in Naples from Cairo. Mr. Smiljanic added that although the correspondence with PBS did not specifically include Washington, he would like facilities to that place also.

He added that he had mentioned the difficulty to Mr. Kirk, who said that he would raise the point with the Chief Commissioner and with Captain Stone.

My dear General:

Thank you for your letter of 29th May; the lines of policy of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, outlined in paragraph 2 of your letter appear quite satisfactory so far as Allied Governments are concerned.

There is just one point that might receive consideration, and that is the question of Italian Government traffic over seized cables. We have received a bill (for about eight hundred dollars) from the Gibraltar office of Cables and Wireless for Italian Government Foreign Office traffic, which we have passed to the local office of Cables and Wireless for them to collect from the Italian Government.

Apart from the financial difficulties of transferring credits in present circumstances, it is perhaps questionable whether a commercial company is justified in charging for services part of which are being carried out over seized Italian cables, for which some compensation may be claimed by the Italians at a later date. It would seem preferable that these charges should be held in a suspense account to be settled together with other claims after the cessation of hostilities.

If you agree with this, perhaps you would raise this minor point and recommend that the term "and co-belligerent" be added to "Allied" in para 2 b of your letter.

SUBJECT: Precedence of Messages

1. Concerning the question of precedence of messages brought up recently in your morning conference, I have had a statistical check made for two periods to see how the distribution of precedences falls. I do not believe this is out of line very much, with the exception that the percentage of messages classed "urgent", I am informed, comes almost entirely from Civil Affairs Branch. I have not checked their individual messages on which these figures are based. I note however that the percentage in the later period is less than that in the earlier period.

2. Close watch is being kept on precedence classifications by the Adjutant, who makes a practice of bringing to the attention of the classifying officer any cable which he considers improperly classified. I have also told him, in cases of doubt to refer the message to me.

1. Certain correspondence on the matter of transfer of Italcable apparatus from Spain to Gibraltar has been in progress through political channels.

2. It is understood that the submarine cable system in the M.T.O. is under the direction of AFHQ vide AFHQ Signal Instruction No. 104 dated 10 February 1944.

3. In order to avoid any action being taken that is not in full accord with the plans of the combined Signal Board, copies of the correspondence are enclosed as Inclosures #1 - #6.

4. We should be grateful for information on the policy that is going to be adopted on the Italcable submarine cable circuits from Rome; in particular, whether these cables will be classed as military or commercially operated, and, if the latter, whether it is the intention to utilize the personnel of Italcable on the operating of the circuits.

5. In the meantime we are proceeding with the arrangements for a meeting between Cables & Wireless and Italcables in Naples, and the subsequent drafting of a cablegram from the Italian Government to the Italian Embassy in Madrid, on the assumption that the proposed lease of equipment is in accordance with the policy of the Combined Signal Board.

Subject: Proposed purchase of Italcable apparatus in Spain by Messrs. Cable and Wireless Ltd.

The Spanish Government have asked Messrs. Cable & Wireless Ltd. to supply them with 30 miles of deep sea cable. The Spanish Government have been informed that permission will be given to Cable & Wireless to export 15 miles of cable on the conditions proposed by the Company, namely that they should in return be given permission to export Greed and Duplex apparatus belonging to their Vigo and Bilbao stations which is now useless because of an interruption of cables.

2. The Spanish Government have been informed that the question of the remaining 15 miles of cable is under consideration. The position is that the Company would agree to supply these 15 miles in return for export permits covering the apparatus belonging to the Malaga station of Italcable which Messrs. Cable & Wireless are anxious to purchase from Italcable. Messrs. Cable & Wireless representative in Madrid has discussed this proposed purchase with the Italcable representative there, who says however that he requires instructions from the Italian Ambassador.

3. The Italian "artificial line boxes" are the only ones available for working the Rome-Malaga cables as soon as they are restored, and the matter is, therefore, of direct interest to all the United Nations. We should be grateful if you would take the matter up with the Italian Government and do anything you can to secure their agreement for the sale and the issue of the necessary instructions to the Italian Ambassador in Madrid.

Subject: Italian Cable Apparatus at Malaga

Referring to conference of my Under-Secretary, His Excellency Mario Fano, with the Director of the Telecommunications Sub-Commission of the A.C.C., and to the letter of the A.C.C. dated 21st May, the Italian Government - while desiring to assist in every way the Allied war effort cannot with propriety insist that Italcable Company should sell the terminal equipment of its Malaga station to Cables and Wireless, Ltd. It is prepared, however, to instruct Italcable to lease the equipment in question to Cables and Wireless for the period of the war and six months thereafter.

The Commissioner for Italcable is situated in Naples and it is suggested that the nearest representative of Cables & Wireless be sent to Naples to negotiate the terms of the lease with the Commissioner.

After the terms of a lease have been agreed upon and approved by this Ministry, appropriate instructions can then be sent to the royal Italian Ambassador at Madrid.

1. Reference your letter 37/150/9 dated 12 May 1944. The Italian Government has been approached on the subject, and their reply is attached. Arrangements for a meeting between Cables & Wireless and Italcables are being made.

2. The whole policy on the operation of submarine cables in the Mediterranean theater of operations is controlled by AFHQ, and is laid down in AFHQ Signal Instruction No. 104, dated 10 February 1944.

3. It is not clear from the correspondence whether the Chief Signal Officer, AFHQ, is aware of the prospective lease of equipment, or whether such lease is in full accord with the plans of the Combined Signal Board.

Dear Commander Stone:

The Rose radio in a transmission given on 24th instant (a portion of which I include), informed that messages sent through the S. Sede (Vatican) from places in liberated Italy to regions of Italy controlled by the Germans, do not arrive at destination.

From information received by the Italian Military Authorities it seems indeed that messages sent from soldiers to their relatives in occupied Italy and forwarded by the S.M.R.E. in accord with the Allied Authorities, and through the Vatican, have not been forwarded by the competent allied officers.

It has been ascertained on the other hand that similar messages, forwarded through the diocese of the Bishop of Lecce, have been delivered as usual.

The fact that these messages are not forwarded may easily cause great disappointment and discouragement to those soldiers whose families are still in occupied territories and for whom these messages represent the only means of obtaining news from their relatives.

I would be most grateful, dear sir, if you would kindly do your best towards removing if possible any obstacles which may have arisen in this important service which was begun in accord with the Allied authorities, with the best of hopes.

Central Agency - The question of Correspondence between Persons Separated by the War.

There are many units dispersed on both sides of the frontiers and a good many soldiers stranded inside the territory occupied by the enemy. 1. Supplementing my letter dated 22 April, file no. as above, there is forwarded herewith a copy of an agreement executed May 11th between PWB and the Italian Ministry of Communications, pursuant to which PWB agrees to restore to EIAR the control of its administrative and operational divisions, leaving the program division under control of PWB.

2. With reference to para 3, the following should be noted. Originally in the negotiations, PWB proposed that the expense of programs should be prorated between EIAR and PWB based on the relation between the hours devoted by EIAR stations to broadcasts for Italian listeners and the hours devoted to external broadcasts (Balkans, etc.). The Ministry of Communications, however, contended that EIAR should bear the full expense of all such programs as its contribution as a co-belligerent. Moreover, it proposed that EIAR should reimburse PWB for all program expenses retroactive to the date of the Armistice, on the grounds that EIAR in liberated Italy would have spent such sums in the furtherance of the Allied war effort had EIAR been allowed to retain control of its programs. The offer was accepted, as set forth in para 3.

Dear Captain Engler:

Thank you for your letter of May 3rd and particularly for all your help in getting SCM's approved for U.S. troops and attached American civilians.

With reference to pickup and delivery arrangements by the Italian P.T.T. on the one hand and Cables & Wireless on the other, I do not think it will be necessary to enter into any contractual arrangements between P.T.T. and the commercial companies. This is because terminal and transit charges are fixed by the Convention, as stated in my letter of 3 May, so that the only details left to be worked out are the physical ones of transfer points and operating routines.

I am of the opinion that it would be unwise to initiate discussions on these relatively simple matters at this time so long as the question of resumption of external electrical communications is still hanging fire. If we should approach the Italians now on pickup and delivery arrangements, they will either feel that we are about ready to initiate external service or if not, we will only stir them up to increased demands for it.

When AFHQ is nearer to a favorable decision on this matter, it will be a simple matter at that time to work out the details with the Ministry of Communications.

Dear Capt. Stone:

Sender's Composition messages for U. S. troops and attached American civilians became available for the Italian mainland on 1 May. Sicily will be included within a few days by using the military cable from Palermo to Naples, as is already being done on EFM traffic. As soon as the cable facilities from Cagliari are improved we will endeavor to add Sardinia.

With reference to your letter of 22 April, as you know, the G-2 people have rejected further civilian external Italian traffic. The subject will however undoubtedly be raised again shortly.

I concur wholeheartedly with your statement that pickup and delivery service had best be left with the Italian P.T.T. Italcable was not in my mind. The point I sought to raise was that RCA and Cable and Wireless should enter into some contractual arrangement for this service as they are not able to render it themselves. And it ought to be done before commercial traffic is authorized, as the division of tolls, the physical handling and the bookkeeping must be worked out. If authorization were a present reality for example, there would be a hell of a mess to determine who would handle and collect for what.

General Tully should be back before long, and in the meantime I'll keep you posted on any developments.

Dear Captain Engler:

Thank you for your letter of 17 April; I am very glad to learn of the moves that are being made in the subject of cable and radio traffic of all classes from Italy. A word has been put in from here with MAI and no opposition need be expected from there on SCM's for American troops.

After SCM's are provided for, the next step seems to be civil personal cables and radiograms. There is likely to be difficulty over civil commercial traffic, as this is not yet permitted over the external mail service, which is strictly confined to private personal letters. The matter is therefore one of broad policy, and this will be raised by this headquarters; on the other hand, introduction of personal telegrams is merely an extension to an existing approved service and only depends on traffic capacity being available.

The delivery and pick-up of external traffic will, I think, best be left in the hands of the Italian Posts and Telegraphs. It is not considered that it is an appropriate time to attempt to resuscitate the Ital-Cables internal service; it would involve allocation to them of exclusive internal wire circuits already in extremely short supply, over which they would pass only the external traffic, and that only as a competing agency with the Government, since Ital-Cables have as yet no cable or radio outlets of their own.

The resumption of internal telegraphs over the Government system has been authorized up to the line of postal services. This at the moment includes: Naples Province (including Naples City) up to the line of the rear Army boundary (practically, the River Voltumno) and Avellino province, and the whole of the ten provinces under Government control on the mainland, and all of Sicily. There is no service to Sardinia (or Corsica), but the permission to use the Cagliari-Palermo cable for civil traffic which you anticipate will be of assistance, though these traffic transfers between civil and military offices do not work very expeditiously. There is at the moment a bottleneck bet-

ween Naples and Salerno for civil telegraphs, but steps are being taken to clear this.

The question of the permission to resume external cable and radio traffic has already been raised with AFHQ in my letter DCC 311.2 dated 13 April, to which a reply is awaited.

SUBJECT: N.I.A.R.

TO : Military Government Section, AFHQ, AR 512

1. Reference is made to your letter of 10 April under reference WIS 091.6-2, together with Inclosure, P.M.B "Revised agenda for the Discussion of Certain Problems Pertaining to the operation of Radio Broadcasts in Italy", dated 25 March 1944.

2. The inclosure is a revision of a draft memorandum dated 25 February 1944 on the same subject. The earlier draft was submitted to the undersigned and the revised draft includes certain of his recommendations such as, for example, the proposal to permit RIAA in liberated Italy to take over the responsibility for technical operation of the stations subject to certain safeguards. On the other hand, the revised draft inserts additional material hitherto not submitted to the Commission, as, for example, the greater part of the last paragraph.

3. This question has been the subject of discussion with P.M.B officials and the Under-Secretary of State for Communications and considerable progress has been made toward reaching a common accord on terms acceptable to P.M.B, the Ministry of Communications, and this Headquarters. Certain discussions in this respect have taken place this week. As a result of these and earlier discussions, the P.M.B officials have revised their own views as to certain points in the memorandum dated 25 March, such as, for example, the penultimate paragraph in the answer to Q, since P.M.B now agrees that the question of treatment of funds should be resolved by the Finance Sub-Commission of A.G.C. and the Ministry of Finance. Moreover, since the 25 March memorandum was written, the Ministry of Communications has proposed that RIAA should assume the full expense of P.M.B programs as an additional Italian contribution to the Allied war effort.

4. The inclosed letter from P.M.B dated 20 April will indicate the fluid nature of the situation. Since it has therefore advanced

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beyond that set forthwith in the memorandum dated 25 March, it does not seem desirable to enter into discussion of a memorandum which will no doubt be further revised by PWB.

SUBJECT: Italian Civil External Communications

To : A.F.C. (Attention: C.G.C.)

1. Further to this Headquarter's letter DCC III.2 dated 15 April 1944, when the matter of opening external communications with Italy is being considered, it is thought that the question of the location of the commercial cable terminal should be reviewed.

2. At present, the commercial cable terminal (Cables & Wireless operated Naples-Salta cable) is located in the I.B.S. Signal Office. The radio terminals of both Cables & Wireless to U.K., and R.C.A. to U.S., are located in adjacent rooms in a civilian building, several blocks away from the I.B.S. office, and the cable and radio censors' office is being established on the same floor of this building.

3. The location of the commercial cable terminal within a military occupied building will lead to considerable operating difficulties when civil cable communication is permitted. There will be difficulties over establishment of civil censorship (for which civilians will probably be employed), over access by civilians to the office, over the flow of messengers in and out of the building, etc.; the normal diversion of traffic between the alternative outlets required for efficient utilisation of traffic capacity and for security reasons will also be difficult to arrange.

4. The necessity to ensure, as far as is possible in a theatre of war, that the various competing carriers can obtain access to the commercial traffic also requires to be kept in mind. If the cable terminal remains in the I.B.S. building, it is thought that, owing to the difficulties outlined in para 3 above, little commercial traffic will be ²²⁸ with this outlet. This will result in confining the traffic over ²²⁸ carriers to the R.C.A. radio circuit. On the other hand, if the cable terminal is rendered accessible to civil use, cables will be routed at Gibraltar to the Azeras, and so reach the Western Union and Commercial Cable companies, and the route will be available for return traffic by these carriers.

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5. It is not thought that removal of the cable terminal from U.S.A. will have any adverse effect in the handling of the present traffic. Little use is made of the cable for military traffic, for which the military outlets appear to be adequate and to provide within themselves sufficient alternatives in case of temporary failures. Press messages, which constitute the bulk of the present cable traffic, originate in the Press Correspondents' office in the same building as the radio terminals, where also is located the Field Press Censorship.

6. It is therefore recommended that, when the resumption of external civil cable and radio communications receive favourable consideration, the cable terminal should be moved to the commercial carriers building.

SUBJECT: Italian Civil External Cable and Radio Communications

TO : A.F.H.Q. (Attention: Chief Signal Officer)

1. Reference this HQ cable No. 2584 of 7 April, and your reply F 30593 dated 11 April (copies attached for reference).

2. The question was raised because the transfer of the Cable and Radio Censorship Section from Palermo to Naples was ordered, and officers have arrived in Naples, which led us to assume that the early resumption of civil external telecommunication facilities was contemplated.

3. It was also known that permission had been given for the commercial cable and radio companies to begin operation on the cables from Naples and Brindisi, and to install and operate radio services from Naples to the United States and United Kingdom, and that these channels are in effective operation, and in a position to accept civil traffic in addition to Press.

4. As however cable F 30593 dated 11 April states that the resumption of civil external telecommunications is not in early prospect, the policy that is being followed is not clear to this Commission; in order to clarify the situation, a statement on the subject would be welcomed.

MEMORANDUM FOR Mr. James M. Minifie, PWB, Room 22, Singer Bldg., Naples

On page 29 of PWB Report No. 12 dated March 28, on Conditions in Liberated Italy, it is stated that postal services in liberated Italy were officially restored on March 20. This date is correct only as to Naples and Avellino provinces. The resumption of internal postal services, including Sicily and Sardinia, (except for the four southern provinces of Apulia where there was no cessation of internal postal services) began in January and was progressively extended. External or international mail services to all but enemy countries and occupied territory were officially opened on February 16, except for Naples and Avellino provinces. Moreover, the list of provinces in your story omitted Bari, Brindisi, and Catanzaro.

This error, while perhaps not important, serves to illustrate the desirability of checking with the appropriate sub-commission of A.C.C., in this case the Telecommunications and Posts Sub-Commission, releases which emanate in Naples and which are frequently limited to Region III affairs and not to liberated Italy as a whole. I observed a similar inaccuracy in a recent story on food rations.

I am sure you will understand that this letter is written in a spirit of helpfulness and not criticism.

1. With reference to the radio circuit in operation for communication with Moscow. We have received a notification from Allied Force Headquarters that there is no objection to the use of the frequencies of 16,500 k/cs and 5,700 k/cs, but that it is requested that the frequency of 4,400 k/cs should not be used as it is liable to cause interference with Allied operations.

2. It is thought that this frequency of 4,400 k/cs will not in any case be of much value for communication with Moscow; if, however, a frequency near 4,000 k/cs is required, an allotment in this band will be made if you desire. Should you require a crystal for operation on the allotted frequency, one can be furnished.

3. Would you also be good enough to inform me of the approximate location and power of the transmitter or transmitters that you are operating in Italy.

1. At the time of the Italian Armistice I.A.F. equipment was badly scattered throughout Southern Italy. Shortly thereafter, Allied Units, with or without authority seized or requisitioned considerable quantities of material, frequently giving no receipt and in many other cases an illegible one. (See attached information on typical cases).
2. Since there is practically no replacement of necessary communications equipment it is considered essential that as much of this equipment as possible be returned to the Italian Air Force.
3. In view of the above it is requested that all British and American Ground Units and Air Force Units under your Command be circularised with a view to obtaining information on any Italian Air Force communications materials which may be in your possession and that a report thereof be made to this office. Information furnished should include description of equipment, type, serial number, quantity, condition, present use, whether considered essential to the unit, source from which obtained - if known - and address of unit having present possession.
4. It is requested that this matter be expedited in view of the serious shortage in the Italian Air Force.

ITALIAN AIR FORCE COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT
SEIZED BY ALLIED OFFICERS

On September 19th 1943 a Receiving and Transmitting Truck and Trailer Unit, Type R.T. 310 (Lorry License No. 30513 and Trailer License No. 0420) was seized by an Officer of the 8th Army on the road between Gioia del Colle and Taranto. The signature on the receipt is illegible.

On September 25th 1943 a "Captain" Jewel of the R.A.F. took from the I.A.F. Stores No. 304 (Bitonto) a transmitting trailer A.T. 800, License No. 3770.

On September 30th 1943, on the Pari Taranto Road near Gioia del Colle, a British Officer requisitioned a D.F. Trailer, License No. 4282 and refused to give particulars.

On October 1st 1943, near the I.A.F. Stores No. 158, (Pari), a receiving trailer, License No. 9266, was requisitioned by Lieutenant Regan of a Canadian Squadron stationed at Leverano and no regular receipt was given.

MEMORANDUM FOR: Brigadier General T. J. Tully, U.S. Army

Captain Angier telephoned me while he was here and I find that he shares my view that RCA should be permitted to carry senders' composition messages as I have recommended. I have received, however, a most surprising letter from INC dated 19 March, file No. GCB/554-1. If as much time and ingenuity were spent in doing something positive for American troops instead of mustering specious arguments in defense of the present situation, we might accomplish something toward correcting a state of affairs, the result of which--regardless of intent--is discriminatory against American personnel.

The fact is that British troops may send SGM's from Italy even to the U.S., whereas American troops and Naval personnel are denied this privilege. To argue that the British troops really do not enjoy this privilege because their messages transit Cairo is as specious as to argue that Americans do not have air mail service to the U.S. merely because their letters may transit Dakar and Natal. I know of no reason why SGM's can not be censored and sent over the RCA circuit, or the Mackay circuit from Algiers if censorship could be better applied at the latter point. The RCA circuit is carrying such traffic east bound, but at least such privileges should be extended to our American forces and the traffic should be carried by American companies. Moreover, I submit that if something is not done to correct this situation, it is likely to become the subject of the liveliest inquiry in Washington.

INC states that there is no official request at hand. I am prepared to file one on behalf of the Army and Naval personnel of this Commission if this is necessary to meet that technical objection and I am sure that there are other commands equally anxious to see American troops have this privilege.

2. The desirability of additional British and American commercial facilities to operate from Rome has been emphasized in recent communications to Washington. They have been informed that RCA have duplicate equipment located at Naples which could be made available at Rome. Subject: Military Censorship

Dear Captain Stone:

I have received your letter of the 24 inst.

The study on this matter reveals the following details:

1) The news that Italian troops were in the line and that a battalion of the Parachute Division "NEMBO" and of the 10th Regiment of Arditi were among them at the front, was broadcast by Radio-Bari one month ago. Therefore, the "Corriere" did not violate military censorship, since that item of news had already passed the military censor of Radio Bari.

2) Second Lieutenant Federico Frascani was authorized by the S.M.R.E on 3 December 1943 as war correspondent, and attached to the 1st Motorized Group.

I inform you, however, that Second Lt. Frascani, by order of S.M.R.E., has been notified to stop this work and report to his unit of origin.

3) Precise agreements have already been made with Capt. Squair for a cautious military censorship in regard to the "Corriere". Another item of news published in the "Corriere" referring to the part played by the "Garibaldi" division in the campaign conducted by Marshal Tito in Yugoslavia, has already been cleared with said Allied officer. The same news had already been broadcast by the London Radio and re-broadcast by Radio-Bari, two months ago.

I am glad that with these explanations, the bad impression--as you have written--gotten by Allied Military Authorities due to alleged violations of censorship on the part of the "Corriere" is hereby erased.

I have issued orders to the effect that the Italian censor forbid publication of military news prior to agreement with Capt Squair.

The Spanish Government have asked Messrs. Cable & Wireless Ltd. to supply them with 30 miles of deep sea cable. The Spanish Government have been informed that permission will be given to Cable & Wireless to export 15 miles of cable on the conditions proposed by the Company, namely that they should in return be given permission to export Creed and Duplex apparatus belonging to their Vigo and Bilbao stations which is now useless because of an interruption of cables.

2. The Spanish Government have been informed that the question of the remaining 15 miles of cable is under consideration. The position is that the Company would agree to supply these 15 miles in return for export permits covering the apparatus belonging to the Malaga station of Italcable which Messrs. Cable & Wireless are anxious to purchase from Italcable. Messrs. Cable & Wireless representative in Madrid has discussed this proposed purchase with the Italcable representative there, who says however that he requires instructions from the Italian Ambassador.

3. The Italian "artificial line boxes" are the only ones available for working the Rome-Malaga cables as soon as they are restored, and the matter is, therefore, of direct interest to all the United Nations. We should be grateful if you would take the matter up with the Italian Government and do anything you can to secure their agreement for the sale and the issue of the necessary instructions to the Italian Ambassador in Madrid.

1. Reference attached letter from Marshal Nesse, Chief of the Italian Supreme Command, and copy of the reply from this Headquarters.

2. Instructions from Censorship Branch, INC, approved and transmitted to this Headquarters through R.G.C. with covering letter MSG-000.73-2 of 8 November 43, indicated that it would "be necessary for a small number of personnel selected by Security to be employed directly by allied Censor Control officer for re-censorship duties".

3. According to the same instructions such personnel must be paid from AGC funds at rates to be laid down by this Headquarters.

4. This Headquarters is in general agreement with the views expressed in Marshal Nesse's letter. The work of Italian Army officers is being subjected to re-examination by Italian civilians who are approved by (British) F.S. or (American) C.I.C. It appears that at present the principal requirement for the employment of such civilians is that they have not been members of the Fascist party. This doubtless limits the field of selection to the point where competent and acceptable re-examiners are sometimes difficult to locate.

5. The following proposals are, therefore, submitted for your approval:

a. The number of personnel to be employed directly by Allied Censor Control officers to be limited to one such person for each Allied Censor Control officer.

b. This personnel to be acceptable both to Allied Security and to the Italian Servizio Militare d'Informazioni (S.M.).

c. There would, of course, be no objection to selected Italian military personnel being used for re-examination purposes. Nor would

there be any objection to civilian personnel from within the Censorship Commissions being used for censorship re-examination purposes. But, in both cases, such personnel would continue, naturally, to be paid only by the Italian authorities. In view of the Italian Government's changed status as a co-belligerent, this Commission feels that the requirement that re-examination personnel be paid from A.C.C. funds is no longer desirable, and recommends that this requirement be waived.

Dear Marshal Messe:

Reference your letter No. 30593/S dated 18th February, 1944.

This Headquarters agrees in most respects with the views expressed in your letter, and will raise the matter with the Allied Censorship authorities with a view to reaching a satisfactory agreement.

Entire relinquishment of all re-censorship cannot however be expected, and the number of Allied officers qualified to perform this work is so limited that some employment of selected Italian civilians must be made. It is hoped however that, by keeping this number to a small figure and by agreeing that the selected personnel should be acceptable to S.I.M. as well as to our authorities, agreement can be achieved.

SUBJECT: Military Censorship

TO: Allied Control Commission

It has been brought to my attention that a number of Italian civilians have been called into various provincial censorship commissions and directed by Allied officers to re-examine correspondence already censored by the military censorship sections of the commissions concerned.

I had already been informed of this by several provincial commissioners. I had not thought it necessary to bring up the matter because often, as for example in Bari, it was a question of single civilians who might simply have been termed secretaries to Allied Officials.

Today, however, I have received news that at Bari, since the 2nd of February, a higher office of censorship, made up of eight Italian civilians chosen on the spot, has actually been functioning. These employees review and exercise control over correspondence already censored by the Military Censorship Section of the Provincial Commission.

On the basis of the agreement reached with the Allied authorities, an Allied officer was to have been assigned to each Provincial Censorship Commission, with the task of supervising the work of the commission itself. There is no objection to an Allied officer being present at each Censorship Branch to regulate the process of censorship. Today, however, a most serious objection has arisen, that of Italian civilians being called to re-examine correspondence already censored.

I feel compelled to refer this matter to the Allied Control Commission for the following two reasons:

1. For the reason of military prestige, the work of officers of the Royal Army, the Royal Navy and Royal Air Forces cannot be subjected to control by indiscriminately selected civilians.

2. For reasons of discretion, indiscriminately selected civilians should not be allowed to examine private correspondence. In view of the extreme delicacy of the work, the censors of the military censorship sections are most carefully chosen from among officers, and the necessity of possessing the particular qualifications of reserve and trustworthiness is always kept in mind. The indiscriminate hiring of civilians must in no case be allowed to violate the security that must at all times be given to confidential correspondence.

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I fully accede to your wishes that Allied representatives be present during the process of censoring and, where they think it necessary, that they control the work of the censors. I am willing to give careful attention to any information which the Allied Control Commission might care to communicate to me concerning any difficulty encountered in this work, and shall immediately seek to provide remedies. I ask in return that the Allied Control Commission be kind enough to insure that no Italian, except officers of the provincial censorship commissions, be permitted to examine private correspondence.

SUBJECT: Changes in AR 380-5 affecting Security Classifications.

TO : All Concerned.

A. C.

1. The Combined Chiefs of Staff have approved an agreement made between the American and British Services on the definition, classification, and handling of matters to be safeguarded. Procedures, names, definitions, and handling hereinafter set forth are to be put in effect by all War Department Offices and United States Army Headquarters at 0001Z, 15 March 1944.

2. Instructions to the same effect are being issued for the same effective date to the United States Navy and to the British Armed Forces.

3. It is contemplated that a complete revision of Army Regulations 380-5, embodying all the details of the agreement, will be printed and distributed by the War Department on or about 1 April 1944.

4. From 15 March 1944 to date of receipt of AR 380-5 revision, the policy hereinafter outlined will be followed by all concerned. No change in the classification of existing documents is necessitated by this agreement.

COMBINED SECURITY CLASSIFICATIONS AGREEMENT

5. Need for Classification. - To safeguard official matter, it must be examined and graded into categories so that it may be recognized and accorded proper handling. To grade matter accurately and uniformly, the following general policy and definitions have been agreed upon by the Combined Chiefs of Staff to become effective 15 March 1944. The detailed instructions based thereon will be issued by the several services concerned not later than 1 April 1944.

6. Definitions. - For the purpose of agreement, the following definitions apply:

- a. Documents - Any form of recorded information.
- b. Material - Any article, substance, or apparatus.
- c. Handling - Care in transmission and custody.
- d. Distribution - Extent of actual or authorized issue of specific matter.
- e. Cryptographic System - Code and/or cipher and instructions thereto.

f. Registered Matter (Document) - Any classified document or device registered usually by number and periodically accounted for.

g. Order of Battle - Important dispositions of our forces with the identities of the units and formations composing those forces in or adjacent to operational theaters.

h. Munitions of War - Any item used for war.

7. Categories. - Official matter requiring classification shall be examined and graded under one of the following categories:

a. Top Secret (Signal abbreviation TOPSEC)

b. Secret

c. Confidential

d. Restricted

8. The United States regards TOP SECRET as a subdivision of SECRET. On the other hand, the British regard TOP SECRET as a distinct category. Although this difference of view is recognized, it is immaterial to this agreement under which working uniformity is obtained by the adoption of agreed definitions, exemptions, and rules of treatment, for the handling of all classified matter.

9. Providing the following definitions and rules for handling are mutually accepted and rigorously implemented, the difficulties can be overcome.

10. Top Secret. - Certain secret documents, information, and material, the security aspect of which is paramount, and whose unauthorized disclosure would cause exceptionally grave damage to the nation shall be classified TOP SECRET.

11. The following are some examples of matter which will normally be graded TOP SECRET:

a. Plans or particulars of future major or special operations.

b. Particulars of important dispositions or impending moves of our forces or convoys in connection with a, above.

c. Very important political documents dealing with such matters as negotiations for alliances and the like.

d. Information of the methods used or success obtained by our Intelligence Services and Counter-Intelligence Services or which would imperil secret agents.

a. Critical information of new and important munitions of war, including approved scientific and technical developments.

f. Important particulars of cryptography and cryptanalysis.

12. Secret. - Documents, information, or materiel, the unauthorized disclosure of which would endanger the national security, cause serious injury to the interests or prestige of the nation, or any governmental activity thereof, or would be of great advantage to a foreign nation shall be classified SECRET.

13. The following are some examples of matter which will normally be graded SECRET:

a. Particulars of operations in progress.

b. Plans or particulars of operations not included under TOP SECRET.

c. Instructions regarding the employment of important new munitions of war.

d. Order of battle information and locations and moves affecting the order of battle.

e. Knowledge of enemy material and procedure, the value of which depends upon the enemy not knowing that we possess it.

f. Vital military information on important defenses.

g. Certain reports of operations containing information of vital interest to the enemy.

h. Adverse reports on general morale affecting major operations.

i. Important improvements to existing munitions of war until accepted for service.

j. Photographs of vulnerable points or vital installations under our control.

k. Certain development projects.

l. Important cryptographic devices unless assigned to a lower category.

14. Confidential. - Documents, information, or materiel, the unauthorized disclosure of which, while not endangering the national security, would be prejudicial to the interests or prestige of the nation, any governmental activity, individual, or would cause administrative embarrassment, or difficulty, or be of advantage to a foreign nation shall be classified CONFIDENTIAL.

15. The following are some examples of matter which normally will be graded CONFIDENTIAL:

- a. Matters, investigations, and documents of a personal and disciplinary nature, the knowledge of which it is desirable to safeguard for administrative reasons.
- b. Routine operational and battle reports which do not contain information of vital interest to the enemy.
- c. Routine Intelligence reports.
- d. General military radio frequency allocations.
- e. Military call signs, unless so collected together that they reveal the order of battle.
- f. Meteorological information of designated areas.
- g. Unit movements of non-operational significance in areas within or adjacent to operational theaters.
- h. Certain technical documents and manuals used for training, maintenance and inspection of important new munitions of war.
- i. General tactical lessons learned as a result of operations.
- j. Aerial photographs of territories under our control in or adjacent to operational theaters.

16. Restricted. - Documents, information, or material (other than TOP SECRET, SECRET, or CONFIDENTIAL) which should not be published or communicated to anyone except for official purposes shall be classified RESTRICTED.

17. The following are some examples of matter which will normally be graded RESTRICTED:

- a. Information of moves of non-operational significance in areas remote from theaters of war.
- b. Training and technical documents for official use only or not intended for release to the public.
- c. Certain routine documents relating to supply and procurement.
- d. Aerial photographs of territories under our control remote from operational theaters.

e. Photographs of enemy, enemy occupied or dominated areas except those which reveal secret sources.

f. Strength returns of units remote from operational theaters.

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

18. Grading. a. The designation of persons responsible for grading and regrading will be a function of the proper authorities.

b. Each document should be graded according to its own content and not necessarily according to its relationship to another document. This also applies to extracts from graded documents.

c. The grading of a file or group of physically connected documents shall be that of the highest graded document therein.

19. Regrading. - It is the obligation of all authorities to keep classified matter constantly under review and to downgrade it as soon as conditions permit.

20. Transmission of Certain Messages by Electrical Means. - Messages which have been transmitted or are to be transmitted in a high grade cryptographic system of one nation will not be relayed or transmitted by the other nation between point of origin and destination by electrical means in clear language or unapproved "scrambler" system, or low-grade cryptographic system.

21. Handling (Treatment). - No person is entitled solely by virtue of his rank or position to acknowledge possession of classified matter. Such matter is entrusted only to those individuals whose official duties require such knowledge or possession.

22. SECRET. - Secret matter will be handled in accordance with the following rules:

a. The highest grade cryptographic systems available will be used for the transmission of secret messages.

b. Secret documents will be transmitted only by officially designated courier in double sealed envelopes, the inner one being marked SECRET, and will be opened only by the addressee or his authorized representative. Where officially designated courier service is not available, secret documents may be transmitted by registered mail service or mail service superior to registered mail service, if the service is completely within national control.

c. Transmission and custody of these documents and materiel will normally be covered by a receipt system and registered documents and materiel periodically accounted for. It is mandatory that registered documents be covered by a receipt system.

d. Secret messages will not be transmitted by electrical means in the clear, except over approved circuits and providing the rule in paragraph 22a, pt violated.

NOTES: (1) An approved circuit is a circuit approved by the Theater Commander

(2) This item will not appear in United States regulations on

e. It is the responsibility of the commissioned officer or equivalent
civilian holding custody of secret documents to insure that all security precau-
tions are taken to guard such documents at all times.

23. TOP SECRET. - Top Secret matter will be handled in accordance with the
above rules with additional safeguards as follows:

a. Under no circumstances will such matter be transmitted by registered
mail.

b. Under no circumstances will messages so graded be transmitted by
electrical means in the clear.

c. It is mandatory that transmission and custody of such matter be
covered by a receipt system.

d. TOP SECRET documents will be handled only/persons specifically design-
ated and may not be disclosed to any person solely by virtue of his rank or office.

24. CONFIDENTIAL. - Confidential matter will be handled in accordance with
the following rules:

a. CONFIDENTIAL documents, except registered, will be transmitted by
approved official means. Registered confidential documents will be handled in the
same manner as registered secret documents.

b. It is the responsibility of the commissioned officer or equivalent
official holding custody of CONFIDENTIAL documents to insure that proper appropriate
security precautions are taken at all times.

25. RESTRICTED. - Restricted matter will be handled in accordance with the
following rules:

a. Restricted documents will be transmitted by such approved channels
as will provide a reasonable degree of security.

b. Registered restricted documents will be transmitted to and from
foreign countries in the same manner as registered secret documents.

1. This is in reference to your letter of 29 January in which inquiry was made as to whether the restoration of civil communications by cable depends on:

- (a) Arbitrary date of restoration of services?
- (b) Availability of skilled cable censorship personnel?

2. There are a number of factors involved, each of which have a bearing upon the restoration of civil communications by cable. The availability of physical facilities, military requirements, release of facilities for civil use, the availability of censorship personnel, and compliance with security requirements such as the operation of facilities by Allied personnel.

3. It would therefore seem that the restoration of civil communications does not depend completely on either one or the other of the situations presented.

SUBJECT: Tentative project to save from destruction the installations of the radio transmission stations of the E. I. A. R. of Rome.

SERVICE MEMORANDUM

It is evident that upon the arrival of allied troops in Rome the German command will give orders to destroy the Radio transmission stations of the E. I. A. R. of Rome.

It is also evident that the enemy for propaganda reasons will make Radio ^Rome function until the last moment. The destruction of the installation will be carried out by demolition squads.

In these conditions we take into consideration the immense benefit that the Italian propaganda would derive if these installations would be saved.

We propose the employment of paratroop units, which would be dropped on the Capital a few hours before the arrival of the allied troops. These paratroops could at least attempt to save the installations of Santa Palomba and Prato Smeraldo that should be regarded of patriotic value.

The writer, who is a member of the paratroop division "MEMPHIS" and who because of having belonged to the E.I.A.R. for ten years knows perfectly the installations, reserves that this memorandum is taken into consideration to furnish additional details on the project.

SUBJECT: Direct Communication between ACC and American and British Governments.

TO : The G.O.C. in C., ACMF
(Attention: Chief Commissioner, ACC)

1. Attention is drawn to our Message 44015 of 28 January 1944 authorizing direct communication on matters of routine between Headquarters Allied Control Commission and the British and American Governments. This directive was issued in pursuance of the policy of decentralizing the problems of civil affairs arising in Italy - to which policy this Headquarters still adheres. (In this connection reference is made to AFHQ letter on "Exercise of Certain Functions of President, Allied Control Commission, to the G.O.C. in C, ACMF, 28 January 1944.) Since the despatch of Message 44015 cogent reasons have been advanced by certain Staff Sections at this Headquarters why the authority to communicate directly upon "matters of routine" should be more accurately defined. Supply and personnel, in particular, are matters which must be dealt with through AFHQ. Insistence has been put upon the principle that all matters of real substance must be referred through this Headquarters to the Combined Chiefs of Staff - which represents the sole authority under which AFHQ operates - and not to a particular department of either the American or the British Government. In order that this vital principle of Allied action may certainly be observed in practice, it has been decided that Message 44015 should now be supplemented by a more specific directive.

2. The matters of routine on which direct communication between the ACC and the two Governments is authorized are for the present limited to the following:

Inquiries as to the whereabouts and welfare of individual civilians
Listing of displaced persons
Condition of private property
Civil postal administration
Procurement of publications
Statistical and like technical information
e.g., public health records
criminal records
industrial reports
agricultural reports
Routine reports required by AFHQ to be periodically submitted, 225
as directed by AFHQ

My dear Stone:

Reference is made to your letter of 27 January 1944 concerning your proposal that communication agencies in U.S.A. and U.K., which operated direct radio circuits with Italy before the war, should assist in the reestablishment of such circuits by the shipment of spare transmitters to Italy for transfer to ITALO Radio.

This matter was considered by the Combined Signal Board, AFHQ, on 26 October 1943, and forwarded to the British Joint Communications Board, London, and the Combined Communications Board, Washington, on 29 October 1943, with a copy of the letter of transmittal to you.

To date we have received no information concerning action taken by either the British Joint Communications Board or the Combined Communications Board, although we were informed about two months ago that the matter was under consideration by the latter agency. I will be glad to advise you when we receive further information in the matter.

Under the present policy of the Joint Chiefs of Staff concerning the establishment of radio stations in occupied countries for communication with the U.S., the RCAF station has been constructed at Naples. This, together with the Cable and Wireless radio station which is to be established in that city for communication with the U.K., appears to meet the present requirements in Italy for commercial radio facilities. Of course further consideration will be given to the matter if and when the need for additional commercial circuits arises.

Reference your memorandum of 18th. February.

1. I have not the slightest intention of imposing political censorship. The existing policy is that there should be no political censorship and I have no intention of departing from this.
2. I am only concerned with cases where the matter involved seems likely to give rise either to disorders or to the dislocation of the administration of the existing form of government. In such cases the possible repercussions on the military effort of the Allies clearly render censorship necessary for military reasons.
3. In the case of the declaration by the six parties on which I had to take action the other night, I naturally thought that the censors would exercise their discretion and cut out only those portions of the declaration which might be described as potentially inflammatory. I never intended a stop on such portions of the declaration or of Massock's message as were harmless from the military point of view.
4. I would be glad if you would communicate the above to the correspondents concerned and especially to Massock and please also tell Massock from me that I much appreciate his cooperation in a question in which there appears to have been a misunderstanding regarding my orders.
5. You may naturally release all portions of messages dealing with this

Subject: Release by Associated Press of six-party
declaration

In case of future repercussions I submit the following
points for your consideration:-

(a) Facts

1. The inflammatory declaration made by the six
parties was communicated to various correspondents, and
Massock of the Associated Press filed a story on it at
6.30 p.m. on February 17. His story was a very much
watered down version of the original and I think it must
be allowed as a perfectly legitimate action on the part of
a correspondent.

2. The AFHQ censor passed the story for transmission
because, as he informed me, the AFHQ Directive to censors
was to allow free political expression - I asked him to
trace this directive for me, but he could not do so: I do
not think that it exists. It must, however, be said in
his favour that a very large number of stories violently
critical of the King and the Badoglio Government have been
allowed to pass without comment, and a general impression
has been formed that political polemics are not banned.
Whether in this case the message was calculated to endanger
military security - in which case he should have stopped
it - is a moot point.

3. The AFHQ censor, when summoned by you, understood
that the whole message was to be stopped - he therefore
persuaded Massock (who acted handsomely in this matter) to
send a message himself to his office stopping his own
previous message. The censor also sent the requisite
directive to the War Department.

4. The chief of the Associated Press in ~~London~~, on
hearing of this action, cabled his office to the effect that
the stop should be ignored and that the ACC was overrunning
2215 / its

its powers in imposing "political censorship" (as it undoubtedly appeared from the suppression of the whole message).

5. You asked that this second message should also be suppressed and another directive was sent to the War Department.

6. This morning you said to me (and I think that this is what you probably also said to others who misunderstood you) that the only censorship you intended was military censorship, i.e. that all incitements to disorder and revolution should be suppressed, but that the other parts of the declaration, or comments on it, were not banned. Is this correct?

(b) Comments

1. Retroactive censorship won't work for mechanical reasons. Once a message has been transmitted it is almost impossible to suppress it. I expect you know that, with the RCA set-up, a message is on an editor's table in New York within five minutes of leaving here. Conversely, coded messages to the War Department take considerably longer. It is almost certain that Massock's message, received in New York at 1.30 p.m. would appear in the American evening press long before the War Department received the stop. But even if not, the message would be public property in the A.P. office in New York and the stop would attract immediate comment and magnify the importance of the story.

2. I feel bound to say that (although it goes without saying that such an inflammatory declaration could not be published in Italy and indeed could in any case have been squashed in the usual way by PWB) I am not sure that the harm possibly done by Massock's story is greater than the harm done by suppressing it. Had I been in the censor's place, with his background, I doubt if I should have suppressed it. The press is powerful and even the Maletland-Wilsons and Alexanders can't stop a story for very long; and public opinion is apt to run high against any suppression. Moreover, is it not fair to suggest that Massock's story would in fact cause no more excitement in the Allied Press than do the frequent lenunciati 2215 of the British Raj, freely and frequently published by Indian nationalists?

3. As you know, questions in Parliament have been asked, and the London press has made a great to-do about censorship at the Anzio beachhead. It is a bad moment for any further example.

4. I appreciate your difficult position and want to do all I can to avoid any further trouble for you. May I take the definite view with all correspondents that the only ban was on "incitement to disorder" and that no other **stop** in the declaration does or did exist?

5. I am extremely sorry you could not find me last night. As I am the only PRO I cannot be on the end of a telephone always. From Tuesday next I will have another officer and a telephone in my flat and will be available at any time.

True sequence of paragraphs has undergone a random arrangement and reestablishing the normal sequence will give you the original message.

1. Combined Chiefs of Staff have advised that UK and USA have reached agreement relative resumption Italian external postal service. Service should be resumed 16 February simultaneously with all Allied and non-enemy countries. Until additional shipping facilities are available service will be limited to personal communications only.
2. Not necessary to advise Rome before resumption of service. Sufficient if (a) simple notification of opening of service is sent in first mail despatched to such countries for which direct outward mails are made up and (b) postal administration HQ, such countries, are informed that inward mails can be accepted by those routes specified, subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by orders issued by CINO.
3. Postmaster Generals of UK and USA will prepare respective press notices which will be released 16 February in London and Washington. Press notices suitable for Italian public will be prepared and issued by ACC on February 16. PWB at AFHQ request that such release be coordinated with PWB representative at Naples before issuance.
4. Combined Chiefs of Staff have recommended that such press release be restricted to simple statement that International Postal Service is being restored to Sardinia, Sicily, and 10 mainland provinces. Announcement should state that until further notice service is restricted to unregistered letters and post cards, not exceeding 40 grams in weight, of a purely personal nature, financial, commercial, or business

Allied Control Commission will ensure that Italian postal service disseminates necessary instructions as to type of correspondence permitted, date of resumption, countries with which service will be resumed, and that all inward mails must be routed in accordance with detailed instructions as distributed by Universal Postal Union Convention to the postal administrations or as may be promulgated by application to the UK or USA post office departments.
6. Since no information received from Combined Chiefs of Staff reference rates, suggest adoption rates of 1.5; 2.5; and 4 lire as recommended your second course action in FADIDA 2141 of January 25.
7. IEC request all censorship representatives be advised.

1. The policy and explanation therefor with regard to telephone switchboards in the western part of Italy is given herunder.

2. (a) As it can be expected that in the more Northern parts of Italy all civil telephones & equipment will be either fully damaged or totally destroyed by the Germans, it is essential that military switchboards and telephone lines are conserved as much as possible in the more easterly parts.
- (b) Each L of C centre or port will require trunk communication with other centres and will also require local telephone communication within the centre or port and to outlying units and localities. It is considered that:
- (i) to obtain the optimum results from a limited number of trunk circuits
 - (ii) to produce a rapidity of trunk switchboard operation so that a common user trunk service will satisfy the demands of all user services with the exception of plotting and similar lines.
- In towns where the local automatic switchboards are undamaged, the best local communication can be given by utilising these switchboards. However, the tracoon's automatic works on the system that both the calling and the called subscriber must clear down before the apparatus is released. Consequently, supervising conditions at the trunk switchboards must be provided to ensure:
- (i) that the trunk lines are not kept busy after the calling subscriber has hung up his receiver
 - (ii) that the calling or called subscriber's telephone is not held after he has finished his call, thus impeding him from making further calls.
 - (iii) The only trunk switchboards available in the area which can give the supervisory conditions on the terminal side of a call from one subscriber are the ET trunk switchboards, specifically designed for this purpose. These have specifically designed as trunk switchboards, sufficient operators can be employed to ensure good trunk service. It is recommended that by taking over these switchboards for military use the civil trunk will have to be accommodated on board unable to give similar supervisory conditions or the same rapidity of operation, but it is certain that the relative importance of military and civil trunk circuits in Italy is so great such that the military are entitled to the civilian have

In each Local Centre or port will require trunk communication with other centres and will also require local telephone communications within the centre or port and to calling units and localities. It is considered that:

(i) to obtain the optimum results from a limited number of trunk circuits

(ii) to produce a variety of trunk switchboard operation so that a common user trunk service will satisfy the demands of all user services with the exception of long distance and similar lines.

In towns where the local automatic switchboards are unengaged, the best local connection can be given by utilising these switchboards. However, the Tricross's automatic works on the system that both the calling and the called subscriber must clear down before the apparatus is released. Consequently, supervising conditions at the trunk switchboards must be provided to ensure

- (i) that the trunk lines are not kept busy after the calling subscriber has hung up his receiver
- (ii) that the calling or called subscriber's telephone is not held after he has finished his call, thus incapsulating him from making further calls.
- (iii) that the only trunk switchboards available in the theatre which can give the supervisory condition on the termination of a call, from an auto subscriber are the ST trunk switchboards, specifically designed for this purpose. Also being specifically designed as trunk switchboards, sufficient operators can be employed to ensure good trunk service. It is appreciated that by taking over these switchboards for military use the civil trunks will have to be exchanged or become unable to give either the supervisory condition or the same reliability of operation, but it is certain that the relative importance of military and civil trunk circuits is truly in at present such that the military as opposed to the civilian have the better facilities.

Consequent to the above:

- (a) In important Local Centres and Ports, where there are auto exchanges, the ST or civil switchboards will be employed on the military trunk switchboards, the civil trunks being disconnected on some other manual exchange.
- (b) All local subscribers, Military and Civil, will be given service on the auto type exchanges, except where special arrangements make such a practice impracticable (e.g. long lines, etc.).

- (c) Trunk exchanges will only carry trunks and junctions to other exchanges and will not carry local subscribers as direct connections to them.

3. The a/m policy has or will be implemented as follows within 2 Districts:

- (a) BALI. The SET exchange has been taken over as the military LD exchange. Local magneto subscribers and a proportion of junctions to all other exchanges have been connected to BART CENTRAL (200-line Central Switchboard). All local subscribers are to be connected, where possible or where special circumstances do not obtain, to the automatic exchange.
- (b) BRINDISI. The SET exchange will be taken over as the military LD exchange. All local subscribers will be connected, where possible or where a special circumstances do not obtain, to the automatic exchange. Local subscribers who cannot, for technical reasons, be connected to the automatic exchange may be connected to the LD switchboard. - (c) TRAPANO. The SET exchange will be taken over as the military LD exchange. All local subscribers will be connected, where possible or where special circumstances do not obtain, to the auto exchange. Local subscribers who cannot, for technical reasons, be connected to the auto exchange should be connected to any other existing exchange (e.g. 24 Gv) rather than be connected to the LD exchange.
- (d) BARI/TU. The SET exchange (one position only) will be taken over as the military LD exchange. All local subscribers will be connected, where possible or where special circumstances do not obtain, to the automatic exchange. Local subscribers who cannot, for technical reasons, be connected to the LD switchboard. A separate magneto switchboard is not justified in this case.

I have read the two memoranda sent you by Badoglio on the subject of E.I.A.R.. I am afraid that there is no trace of the original draft letter which you sent me on the subject, although I am practically certain that I sent it on and signed it as it stood to A.F.H.Q.. In any case I have had no come-back up to date.

2. After reading through all the papers on the subject I feel that it would be a good thing to have a meeting either at Naples or Bari of any representatives the Italians wish to nominate, and on our side such representatives of A.C.C. as you consider should attend together with representatives of P.W.B..

3. I would propose ordering the assembly of a committee as above and would also suggest that you should be the chairman. We could then from this committee procure either the solution which you and I consider to be the right one or at least we will be able to expose the objections hitherto advanced by P.W.B. in such a way as would enable us to press our case to best advantage with A.F.H.Q..

4. The above procedure should at any rate crystallise things and bring matters to a head more effectively than writing on the subject to the remote controllers in Algiers.

SUBJECT: No. 2 District Communications Policy

To : GOC, No. 2 District, Genoa

1. A protest is made against the summary appropriation of the civil interurban switchboards within No. 2 District by the CSD without prior reference to either this Commission or to the Italian Government.

2. In order to avoid exactly such action, Communications Boards have been set up on which both this Commission and the Italian Government are represented. The charter of the Communications Board (Italy), which meets under the chairmanship of the CSD AGMF, reads..."to co-ordinate demands for telecommunications originated by allied forces...on the Italian Civil...authorities...". This (Italy) board decides policy, not detail. The charter of the Communications Board (No. 2 District), which meets under the chairmanship of the CSD No. 2 District, reads..."To co-ordinate and arrange the communication requirements of all services, allied and Italian, civil and military, in No. 2 District...".

3. Previous protests have been made over similar action in No. 2 District, and Minute 7 of the meeting of the 6 Dec 43 reads... "The situation with respect to the taking of facilities without notice was discussed and the CSD No. 2 District announced that as a result of the operation of the board, the centralised control, and the information now available and to be made available to his office, there would be no occasion for such action in future".

4. The technical necessity for the action taken is not raised at this time, although the technical considerations stated are not by any means agreed with and as far as is known such action is unexampled in any other theatre of war or even in other areas in this theatre.

5. It cannot be admitted however that it falls within the powers of a District to decide what communications are necessary for the Italian Government nor to take action on matters seriously affecting the efficiency of the Government without consultation with this Commission; if such unilateral decisions are accepted, the functions of this Commission are reduced to a watching brief and the purpose of the Communication Boards is nullified.

Subject: Postal and Telecommunications Services in Region 3.

To: Deputy Chief Commissioner, Allied Control Commission.

1. Your attention is drawn to the arrangements that have been made in the Naples area on both Postal and Telecommunications services, which should not, in the opinion of this Sub-Commission, have been concluded without reference to higher authority, and which, by diverging from the systems in force in the rest of Italy, are causing considerable confusion.

2. Postal.

(a) Stamps. - Italian stamps have been locally overprinted "Governo Militare Alleata" for use within Naples. This action has not been taken elsewhere and has resulted in the creation of philatelic curiosities and a stamp "Black Market" with discredit to the Allied administration, and will cause considerable confusion in the establishment of inter-provincial and foreign mail services.

(b) Rates. - A rate of postage of 50 centesimi on postcards and open letters for local delivery within the Naples area has been authorised. This rate is entirely arbitrary and not in accordance with the rates elsewhere.

3. Telecommunications.

Rates. A new system of charging for telephone service has been authorised within the Naples area. Besides altering the system in force elsewhere, the net result has been a rise in rates of about 300 per cent, creating a very difficult situation for the resumption of centralised control.

4. Conclusion.

Apart from the question of the correctness of the above instructions it seems evident that local actions on such matters is in any case inadvisable and should not have been undertaken without reference.

A general directive on these matters is being issued, which will require amendment or cancellation of the local instructions, but I should be grateful if the attention of Region 3 could be drawn to the subsequent difficulties caused by their actions for their future guidance.

The attached is a draft letter for your consideration on the question of review of the EIAR situation. However, not knowing the present status of PWB in Italy, I have left blank the headquarters to which the letter be sent--i.e., AFHQ or ACMF.

Although PWB has taken over the operation of the EIAR Stations in liberated Italy, it apparently has shown no interest in the question of the collection of the broadcast listeners' tax for the current calendar year--a subject which should be resolved at an early date. Moreover, I have never understood why PWB's directive for propaganda should give it control over more than the program department of EIAR--leaving to the Italians the Technical and Administrative departments.

For security reasons, references b and c are not forwarded with the draft letter but I am attaching them to this memorandum for your ready reference.

1. References - all relative to above subject -

- a. Ltr (translation) 103/Gbr, with two exhibits, from the Italian Government dated 7 December 1943, to A.C.C. (Incl No. 1).
- b. Msg 13/16 - 1488 dated Dec 161820A from A.C.C. to A.F.H.Q.
- c. Msg 36/21 - 1732Z dated Dec 211747A from A.F.H.Q. cite PHMRC from MCCHRISTAL to A.C.C.
- d. Ltr (copy, AG 676.3 No. A.C.C. dated 20 Dec 43, to the Italian Government (Incl No. 2).
- e. Ltr (translation) S/8.5/263, from the Italian Government dated 4 Jan 44, to A.C.C. (Incl No. 3).

2. The Italian Government requested, (reference 1 a), that E.I.A.R. be placed under its own management subject to Allied supervision, technical advice and aid. Based upon a detailed investigation (exhibit 2 of reference 1 a) made at the request of Italian Ministry of Communications, the Italian Government stated that E.I.A.R. is capable of directing its own affairs both technically and administratively. The Commission concurred in the Government's request and recommended to your headquarters (reference 1 b) that Bari radio personnel payroll be returned to E.I.A.R. as well as its administration and direction, with Allies retaining full control over policy and programs. The matter was not favourably considered by your headquarters (reference 1 c) on the grounds that it was considered hazardous to propaganda channels and that propaganda requirements would not permit a change at the present time. The Italian Government was informed (reference 1 d) with respect to the above decision.

3. The Italian Government, through the Ministry for Communications, has suggested (reference 1 e) a reconsideration of the matter and requests that the Under-Secretary of State for Tele-Communications and Posts be invited for a discussion of the problem with the Allied authorities having jurisdiction.

4. Attention is directed to information and points made by the Italian Government as reflected in references 1 a and 1 e.

On 17 January the Commission received a further letter (S. 5/8.5/304) with respect to this matter from the Italian Government, in which

the following statements were made:

"While waiting for this reexamination, this Ministry deems it proper to indicate the three departments of the E.I.A.R.:

1. Technical (projects, plants, broadcasting, maintenance)
2. Artistic (programs, news bulletins, and propaganda)
3. Administrative and Commercial (book-keeping, propaganda and development)

"While PNB has taken possession of the first two branches of the E.I.A.R., it has shown complete disinterest, for the present, in the third, which concerns, subscription statistics, payments in arrears (morosita), new subscriptions, payment rules, subscription takings, etc.

"While the broadcasting end of it may belong to one sphere of the company's activity, the administrative organization the control of payments, the verification of new subscriptions and the registration of changes, constitute the patrimony of the Company which it is absolutely necessary in the national interest to safeguard.

"While the technical and artistic personnel of the E.I.A.R. stations has been directly taken over by PNB, that of the subscription accounting has been abandoned and left to itself.

"No one has concerned himself with modifying the broadcasting legislation (which in the present abnormal situation requires laws and dispositions necessary for rendering feasible the taking in of installments and their crediting to the Italian Finance Ministry), nor with keeping the subscription forms up-to-date, nor, above all, with creating a central administrative nucleus which must provisionally replace the general office of the E.I.A.R. in Rome; no one on the occasion of the New Year issued a general directive for calling upon the subscribers to pay, the postal officers to collect, the offices of the Registry (Registro) to verify the payments.

"It is evident that, however the peripheral stations of E.I.A.R. may now be operated, a central office should be set up as quickly as possible to supervise all patrimonial, administrative, and accounting matters relative to the company itself.

"The Under-Secretariat for Communications, on which the E.I.A.R. depends for functional enactments, naturally had preoccupied itself with the formation of the central office, reserving for itself the duty of having an Italian Tribunal (Tribunale) appoint a general commissioner who would assume the powers of the administrative

council and of the presidency of the company.

"The formation of this office, the modification of broadcasting legislation, the setting-up of a central administration (which among other things must furnish funds for paying the personnel and the expenses of those offices not managed by PWB) required the giving of factual information and contact with the various managers (reggenti) of the stations. These, however, were refused by PWB."

5. It is suggested that this matter is of sufficient moment to justify careful re-examination and the adoption of arrangements whereby E.I.R. operations will meet Allied requirements and at the same time substantially comply with requests made by the Italian Government. It is urgently recommended that the requests of the Italian Government be re-examined in the light of information herewith submitted and that in the event favorable consideration cannot be had upon this showing, an officer authorized to make proper and necessary arrangement be sent here from your headquarters.

6. May this matter be considered as urgent.

On the urgent necessity of allowing the Italian Government to establish a "Commissariato Generale E.I.A.R." in order to maintain in the national interest the important administrative organization of the Company.

It is well known that the E.I.A.R. does not consist only of Radio Pari, but of all the Radio broadcasting stations in Italian territory. It is a limited corporation with its own capital, its own stock holders and an independent administration; it owned radio transmitting stations, disturbance stations, store houses, materials and property.

In order to control the radio broadcasts, the Allies have taken over all the above property, both on the mainland of Italy (Bari, Naples,) in Sicily (Palermo Catania) and in the Colonies (Tripoli).

The Italian Government has asked several times why the Allies who have never taken over the property of Italian Firms, though they exercise everywhere a strict control, as far as the E.I.A.R. is concerned they have actually occupied the stations and taken over directly a good part of the staffs, thus eliminating the central organization of the Company.

It seems to the Italian Government that though the radio is a means of war and propaganda should be one of the main concerns of the Allied Authorities, it should be possible to find "modus vivendi" so as not to disorganize completely the administration of the Company, and to conciliate the double necessity, on the part of the Allies, of independence of direction, and on the part of the Directors of the company, of financial and administrative control. We believe that with a certain amount of comprehension, good will and impartiality the question could be solved fairly and justly, as it has been done with all the other private companies, and particularly with the telephone Co. which are certainly of equally great importance as regards the war.

Several times, efforts have been made to show that the E.I.A.R. is perfectly able to manage itself.

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Several times, efforts have been made to show that the E.I.R. is perfectly able to manage itself both technically and administratively and that therefore,

it could be returned to its own independent management, with the precise agreement that it should cooperate with all the Allied organizations that are to control broadcasts and to follow the advice and technical directive given by those organizations.

Leaving aside for the moment the solution of this problem, which is handled in another memorandum, it is considered advisable to outline the organization of the E.I.A.R., which is divided in three large branches:

1. Technical (projects, plants, broadcasts, maintenance)
2. Artistic (programs, newspapers and propaganda)
3. Administrative and commercial (accounts, propaganda and developments).

While the PWB has taken over the first two branches of the E.I.A.R. it has totally disregarded up to now the third branch, and therefore everything that concerns subscribers statistics, regulations on the payments etc.

While the Radio broadcasts can represent only an incidental part of the Company's activities, the administrative organization, the control of the payments, the verification of the new subscribers and the settling down of variations of the various movements, represent instead the basis of the company which it is absolutely necessary to safeguard, both in the national and in the company's interest.

While the technical and artistic staffs of the E.I.A.R. stations have been taken over directly by the PWB, those that look after the subscribers accounts have been completely left to themselves.

Nobody has yet taken care of modifying radio legislation (which in the present abnormal situation needs laws and regulations to provide for the payment of the installations payments to the Italian Ministry of Finance); and of bringing the card files to date, and above all of creating that central administrative nucleus which must for the present take the place of the general management of the E.I.A.R. (with its head office in Rome) who has at the beginning of the

be followed.

Even in this case the E.I.A.R. will not lose its legal characteristic of limited corporation and would consequently maintain all its own central and outlying independent organization.

These are the three main basis on which could be built a definite agreement, such as to allow the Italian Government to dispose freely of the E.I.A.R. and the Allied Government to have the control of the radio broadcasts.

The problem anyway is complex and delicate and should be urgently examined so as to be able to reach a definite solution.



Czernin has told us of your requirements and I am glad to know that we can be of some service to you and to the Commission. He is bringing back with him a set and an operator with a plan to work from Rome to our H.Q. in Monopoli. I am afraid that it just isn't possible to provide you with a second set and operator for your own H.Q. which would give you direct contact with Rome. The telephone system, however, between Naples and Monopoli is adequate, and I feel that we shall be able to pass on to you in reasonable time and in guarded language anything that comes through to us.

In this connection, would you please let us know on what extensions you can be called by day and by night?

You may not know that we have a strong team going into Rome with 'S' Force under Major M. Munthe. He has a set and an operator with him and a plan to work back to us here. I should be grateful if you would agree to our recalling the operator who is going in with Czernin as soon as possible after Munthe's party reaches Rome. Our acute shortage of trained personnel makes it imperative that I should warn you of this now. Munthe's set could, of course, continue to carry your traffic.

Thank you again for the interest you show in us and for the help you so frequently give.
