1. Minutes of previous meetings.

- (a) In the absence of Lt. Col. Charles Tolstoy who was sick by order of J. Clayton, Vice Chairman at 1000 hours.

(b) The minutes of the previous meeting were taken as follows.

(a) Proprietary record.

The chairman raised the question as to whether any further action was required from him or by the District concerning the single agent for training Lt. Col. Lindsey. It was agreed that this was now a matter for the Allied Forces Local Resources (Sicily) Board.

(b) Proprietary record.

The chairman pointed out that the revised list of frozen materials proposed by Lt. Col. Lindsey had been received. It was agreed that this was now a matter for the Allied Forces Local Resources (Sicily) Board.

3. Report for Civilian Contractor, "Acting For Army."

Colonel Reuter stated that this matter was not yet fully resolved. Colonel Lichten who was not present and he had instructions to allow the item to lapse.

4. Licensing.

Colonel Lindsey stated that all locally produced vehicles would be available for roads but that no import or temporary vehicles would be permitted to be used for this purpose. It was required as assurance that locally used vehicles would be used for road transport work and this assurance was given by Lt. Col. Felwick.

5. Control of Civilian Transport and Petrol.

Colonel Garret pointed out that there was control of vehicles on the road. Licences were issued to very wide categories of persons and the conditions for the use of the vehicles were not sufficiently precise. Specific instances were admitted by Col. Garret where investigations had been made by the District and the chairman pointed out that requirements would be made. It was also agreed that very specific instructions would be issued as to interpretation of schedule "A" of AFHQ Administrative Instruction No 12 so that licences would only be issued in essential cases and for specific purposes.

6. Unauthorized variation of licence conditions.

Colonel Garret stated that increasing numbers of civilians were undergoing in the armed service parts of military uniforms. He chairman pointed out that this situation, however, agreed that action should be taken to inform the civilian population that it was an offence to be in possession of any issued military equipment.

- (b) Transport materials. The chairman pointed out that the revised list of transport materials promised by I.D.C. and J.A. District had been received. It was agreed that this would now be taken for all available local resources (Sicily) local.
2. Transport for civilian contractor working for I.D.C. Colonel Dickey who was not present and had instructions to follow the item to largely.
3. Bummers. Colonel Lindley stated that all locally produced bitumen would be available for roads but that no imported military bitumen would be permitted to be used for this purpose. Required a guarantee that locally used bitumen would still be used for road repair work and that assurance was given by Lt. Col. Dickey.
4. Control of Civilian Transport and Police.
- Colonel Garret pointed out that there was no considerable misuse of petroleum and that there were too many civilian vehicles on the road. Licences were issued to very wide categories of persons and the conditions for the use of the vehicles were not sufficiently precise. Specific instances were submitted by Col. Garret where investigations had been made by the I.D.C. district and the chairman promised that inquiries would be made. It was also agreed that more specific instructions would be issued as to interpretation of schedule one of MIL Adminstrative Instruction No 12 so that licences would only be issued in essential cases and for specific purposes.
5. Unauthorized wearing of licensed uniforms.
- Colonel Curry stated that increasing numbers of civilians were appearing in the streets wearing parts of military uniforms. The chairman pointed out that this responsibility in the first instance laid with the armed forces. However, agreed that action should be taken to inform the civilian population that it was an offence to be in possession of any issued military equipment.
6. Carrying of arms by civilians.
- Colonel Garret stated that when a number of houses were searched in the I District instances occurred which could not be discovered. It was asked for information as to who was authorized to carry arms among the civilian population. Lt. Col. Dool took placed that outside of C.R. 5339 civilians only army personnel of persons were allowed to carry firearms such as bank employees, post office officials and гардии in local garrisons. Colonial Curry pointed out that while W.O. 3430
was appropriate and that action should be taken by the

not be reduced. It was agreed that the same should be
left in Colonial Co-operation Dept.

11. Necessary for Control No. of Islands, amount & kind.

In question of how far an I.L.I.T. supplement
was required. It was generally agreed that the
existing arrangements of the I.L.I.T. should be
left as they were. It was agreed that the same should be
left in Colonial Co-operation Dept.

12. I.L.I.T. fitting.

In question of the fitting of the I.L.I.T.
agent will be on Friday, 4 February 1944, at 1000 hours at the
Headquarters.

13. Other business.

In consideration of the fact that C.I.C.
intended to hold a meeting of co-operative
agents and that some supplies of coal & iron might be
available at short notice and inquiries could be made by
agents such stocks were available. Colonial Curry stated that

Colonel Curry believed it was better to buy hams & hams
supplies of straw could be found and it would be better to work
with this and in view of the fact that his instruction has
been issued for the provision for Army purposes of all other
articles of imported wheat and said that they would be
unavailable at 200 lire per quintal or less. Colonial Curry stated

available.

5. Purchases of Fins, Eggs, etc. by flat tax.
Colonel Curry stated that in his opinion the flat
tax opportunity for the removal of the existing restrictions
prohibited the purchase by the Army of such food as fish,
and poultry. It was agreed that these restrictions should not
be encroached.

10. Economic Administration. Ordinance No. 12.

On chairman's suggestion that this ordinance had not
been issued by General Colonial Gammie supplies - copy from P.D.
1942. It was agreed to discuss this matter on the following date
June 15.

11. Necessary for Continuation of Island Admin. Economic Order.

In question of how far the Economic supplement
this Decree was discussed. It was generally agreed that the supplement
should be issued for the maintenance of this Island although its economic
value is reduced. It was agreed that the matter should be
submitted to the Economic Coordination Board.

12. Negotiating.

In next meeting of the Island Co-ordination
Board will be on Friday, 4 February 1944 at 1000 hours at the
Headquarters.

13. Other Business.

It was decided to issue a contract for
dissemination required 10 tons of coal to 10 tons in flat tax.
Colonel Curry said that some supplies of coal might be available
in small quantities and suggested that regulations should be
drawn if such stocks were available. Colonel Curry stated that
it would be difficult to requisition of the Island Co-ordinating
Board to obtain that information in time. It was agreed to
submit to the Planning Officer, first ministry of Finance, a
request.

14. Stand Point to S.
Colonel Curry took a copy of information on 3rd
May to stand the Chairman of the Finance Committee and
