Each crate holds 42 Sortie boxes, inside each of which there are, on an average, 100 prints. Thus, when all is finished, a total of 2,058,000 prints will have been examined by hand - say 2 million for the sake of round numbers. My own share will be about 300 crates, or 1/2 approximately.

It is too soon yet to give a precise estimate of the number of photos which will be retained, but it is almost certain that it will be just about 1/3 of the grand total. This includes both the sorties for Name and for England.

There still remains to be sorted a residue of 80-90 crates, out of the original 356, at the Seafireman before the work is finally completed. This is some of the best stuff and has to be done carefully. For this reason I have finally refused L.T.A.P. the last party for which I am eligible being scheduled to leave on October 15th.

To : Lt. Col. J. J. Ward Partridge, M.A.

1. SAPINSA. None have proceeded since. 14 more crates were received on 1 Oct 45, but have not been sorted. A large load of prints was sent for salvage on 27 Sept, (for onward transmission to War-loc for mailing), and another load is rapidly accumulating.

Up to the present the equivalent of 30 crates of sorties (44 boxes to a crate) have been selected here for retention (not including those destined for England - at present amounting to about 10 crates). All these sorties have had damaged boxes replaced and are arranged in consecutive order.

2. BRITISH SCHOOL. Work here is not completed, except for final catalog. All sorties have had damaged boxes replaced; un-boxed sorties have been boxed and numbered, and the whole assembled in consecutive order.

The residue of the unnumbered prints - a large amount - left on 27 Sept 45.

It is estimated that we have at the British enough crates already ready to pack all the released material at the British School and also those at the Supreme司令部.

3. PALAZZO PAPALEO. All the prints here previously unboxed and in a shooting seen, have been boxed and arranged in consecutive order. As they are almost all photoplates, it is presumed that prints will be packed for good location or transmission at some future date. A final load of prints for salvage left here on 27 Sept.

Archives Academy. No action is contemplated by the Library Staff here until packists can be got to the Xmas.

1. SAPIENZA. Work here proceeded rapidly. 14 more cases were received on 1 Oct 45, but have now been sorted. A large load of prints was sent for salvage on 27 Sept, 1945, and transmission to Naples for mailing, and another load of rapidly accumulating.

Up to the present the equivalent of 50 cases of sorties (44 boxes to a case) have been salvaged here for retransmission (not including those retained for England - it amounts to about 10 crates). All these mortals have had damaged boxes repacked and are arranged in consecutive order.

2. BATTAGLIO SCHOOL. Work here is now completed, except for final crating. All sorties have had damaged boxes repacked; un-boxed sorties have been boxed and numbered, and the whole assembled in consecutive order.

The residue of the unwanted prints - a large amount - left on 27 Sept 45.

It is estimated that we have at the SAPIENZA office, already ready to pack all the selected sorties at the Battaglio School and also those at the Accademia itself.

3. PALAZZO PAPALEO. All the photos here previously unboxed and in a shoebox mess, have been boxed and arranged in consecutive order. As they are almost all pictorial, it is requested that plots will be asked for from London for Washington at some future date. A final load of prints for salvage left here on 27 Sept.

4. American Academy. No action is contemplated by the Library Staff here until packages can be got for the boxes, as soldiers and others have free access to the documents. Prints were opened so that all could see the contents. I have given photo. V.W. BROWN, Acting Librarian of the contents of each case (in quadruplicate), and of boxes they also hold the cover traces for them.

5. Scienze Institute. Fired up on 20 Sept 45; this revealed the equivalent of about 6 crates not yet examined. I had previously been told to believe that all work here had been completed.

NOTES ON AIR-PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE UICHE MEDITERRANEAN AREA FOR
HELD IN 20216.

Note: I crate contains 4,000(+) photographs and measures approximately two feet six inches in length by two feet in height. Crate weight runs over 200 lbs.

1. Total originally accepted:
 - (a) 2 million photos (480 crates) general pool
 - (b) 400,000 photos (100 add crates) to American Academy. This latter constitutes a self-contained unit, already catalogued, and it is omitted from remaining calculations.
2. Reduction effected:

Approximately two thirds of the two million have been weeded out and destroyed as redundant, leaving a total of about 700,000 photos in 621 in the general pool. Of these some 30 crates (120,000 photos) of duplicate character are destined for England.
3. There remain to be housed therefore approximately following, additional to the 100 crates at the American Academy:

30 crates odd at Palazzo Taverna (Branch School)	115 crates between British and Swedish Schools

4. It is estimated that a room 15 feet by 12 feet with a single door will house 52 crates. The problem of storage therefore lies in how much space there is available, and in certainly not in unmanageable problems.
5. Thanks to the initiative Capt. J. S. P. Bradford and of officers and men loaned by the Air Forces a great advance has been made in ordering the collection. All stores are now noted and boxed neatly, together with their names which prove to identify them. Estimated weight is:

 - (1) Preparation to send the collection (at present) to the University of the Allied Countries "is awaiting"

1. Total originally accounted:
 - (a) 2 million photos (489 crates) general pool
 - (b) 400,000 photos (100 odd crates) to American Academy. This latter constitutes a self-contained unit, already catalogued, and it is omitted from remaining calculations.
2. Reduction effected:

Approximately two-thirds of the two million have been weeded out and destroyed as redundant, leaving a total of about 700,000 photos in all in the general pool. Of these some 30 crates (120,000 photos) of a duplicate character are destined for England.
3. There remain to be housed therefore approximately 500,000 photos, (addition to the 100 crates at the American Academy):

30 crates odd at Palazzo Piovere (French School)
115 crates between British and Swedish Schools
4. It is estimated that a room 15 feet by 12 feet with a single door will house 52 crates. The problem of storage therefore is less one of space than of weight, and is certainly not an insuperable problem.
5. Thanks to the activities Capt. J.S.P. Bradford and of other officers and men loaned by the Air Forces & Fleet Advance has been made in ordering the collection. All portions already sorted and boxed serially, together with film strips which serve to identify them. Required are still:
 - 1) Permission to make the collection (at present in the custody of the Allied Commission "for eventual scientific use") generally available.
 - 2) A considerable amount of sorting into approximate regional groups.
 - 3) Copies of the cover-traces, which form an essential visual catalogue of the material held. The original cover-traces are now in the hands of the distributor.

TO : Lt. Col. J.B. WARD PERKINS.

1. SPIENZA. 3 1/2 Tons of photos left for salvage this week. This will be the first consignment to show a big financial profit, which is to be paid through Industries S/C to Finance S/C. Earlier payments had been offset against the costs of installing pulping plant and acids.

Sorting continues. Emphasis is laid on the fact that "Snow-cover" is often deliberately retained as certain features are more clearly shown under these conditions, and sometimes it is the only cover in existence of a given area.

Packing lists of the contents of the crates of retained photos are being prepared. These lists and those for the British School will be placed in File 20216/6. The crates will each have a stencilled reference number on the outside. This series will be R.1, 2, etc.

The crates for England will be stencilled E.1, 2, etc.

What is to be done with all the sound empty cardboard boxes? There are approx 800 at the British School and several thousand at the Sapienza.

It would also be helpful to know, as soon as possible, whether the crates of selected photos at the Sapienza are to be sent. It will require several trips and trucks to move them.

If there are any crates left over are they to be sent to the Palazzo Farnese?

Dear Colonel,

Some three months ago I wrote to say that I hoped that it would be possible to arrange for some of the air photos of the Greek Govt. Survey Dept. to be placed at our mutual disposal. Unfortunately this has not proved practicable as I have not been able to return to Athens to deal with the M.A.I.U. East officer who was going to supply the paper and chemicals.

However I should add, so that you will not think that the matter is shelved, that progress has been made in another direction. Ever since I was in Athens in July I have been busily engaged in selecting the most valuable from among the 2 million air photos taken over by us, which cover the North shores of the Mediterranean, and include some of Greece (more are at Cairo). This task is now all but completed. It is hoped (but this is still "sub judice" and strictly confidential) to effect their transfer eventually to certain of the "Allied" Schools and Institutes in Rome, whither Ward Perkins returns in January as a civilian and Director of the Br. School.

We cannot yet be sure that these photos selected (including those of Greece) are "in the bag" but we hope so. The precise details of how these sorties can be subdivided geographically for separate countries have yet to be worked out in full, and there are several big snags inherent in attempting a classification of this kind (as one sortie often covers several countries). But those of Greece were mostly taken for mapping (at a scale of about 1:12,000), and thus confine themselves to that country and are fairly easily picked out. I expect that Ward Perkins would be able to give you further information later.

I thought it would be a good idea to explain this side of the air photo question, and what I have been able to do, as it was only possible to give Major Cooke a brief and preliminary idea when I was last in your office.

In a week or two I am due to leave for England to rejoin the Pitt Rivers Museum.

SUBJECT : Conservation of Air Photos (Final Report).

TO : Director U.P.A. and A. Subcommission, HQ AG.

1. A total of 2,050,000 prints were taken over from MAAF of which about 1/3 were selected as essential. These are now curated and stored in several depositories, i.e. the British and French Schools, the American Academy and the Swedish Institute. The chosen portion are arranged in consecutive order and each of the above institutions holds a list of the portions held by it, and also of those held by the others.

2. A Glossary of technical terms used in connection with these Air Photos, and notes on the use and maintenance of Air Photo libraries have been prepared, and were shown (for information) to the above-named repositories by whom they were returned until such time as the final transference of these photos, into their hands, makes it possible to hand over these documents on a permanent basis.

3. Further action required can be postponed until the arrival of the Director of the British School. In the meantime the photos are safely stored and are not being touched. It is not expected that any problems are likely to arise in the immediate future.

Each crate holds 42 Scartie boxes, inside each of which there are, on an average, 100 prints. Thus, when all is finished, a total of 2,058,000 prints will have been examined by hand - say 2 million for the sale of round numbers. My own share will be about 340 crates, or 3/4 approaching tally.

It is too soon yet to give a precise estimate of the number of photos which will be retained, but it is almost certain that it will be just about 1/3 of the grand total. This includes both the sorties for Rome and for England.

There still remains to be sorted a residue of 80-90 crates, out of the original 356, at the Sapienza before the work is finally completed. This is some of the best stuff and has to be done carefully. For this reason I have finally refused L.L.A.P. the last party for which I am eligible being scheduled to leave on October 18th.

1. SAPIENZA. Work here proceeds apace. 14 more crates were received on 1 Oct 45, but have now been sorted. A large load of prints was sent for salvage on 27 Sept, (for onward transmission to Naples for pulping), and another load is rapidly accumulating.

Up to the present the equivalent of 50 crates of sorties (44 boxes to a crate) have been selected here for retention (not including those destined for England - at present amounting to about 10 crates). All these sorties have had damaged boxes replaced and are arranged in consecutive order.

2. BRITISH SCHOOL. Work here is now completed, except for final crating. All sorties have had damaged boxes replaced; unboxed sorties have been boxed and numbered, and the whole assembled in consecutive order.

The residue of the unwanted prints - a large amount - left on 27 Sept 45.

It is estimated that we have at the SAPIENZA enough crates already empty to pack all the selected sorties at the British School and also those at the Caprienza itself.

3. PALAZZO ZAHNESE. All the photos here previously unboxed and in a shocking mess, have been boxed and arranged in consecutive order. As they are almost all plot-less, it is presumed that plots will be asked for from London or Washington at some future date. A final load of prints for salvage left here on 27 Sept.

4. American Academy. No action is contemplated by the Library Staff here until packicks can be got for the boxes, as nothing has been done to the

as soldiers and others have free access to the basement.
Specimen crates were opened so that all could see their con-
tents. I have given Prof. VAN HUREN packing lists of the
contents of each crate (in quadruplicate), and of course

5. Swedish Institute. Tidied up on 20 Sept 45;
this revealed the equivalent of about 6 crates not yet
examined. I had previously been led to believe that all work
here had been completed.
