Report for April.

1. Shift to North.

The principal concentration of activity in the Education Subcommittee during April was getting ready for the occupation of the Northern Regions, to which Education Officers were sent at the end of the month from all Regions south of Emilia and from Headquarters. This involved the following activities:

a) Final revision of directives. The directives used heretofore were revised to meet the new situation in Northern Regions and to accord with recent Italian Government decrees and A.C. orders and memoranda. These directives, while uniform for all Regions, are issued, in accordance with past practices in this Subcommittee, over the signature of the Regional Commissioner in each Region. They are as follows:

Number 1 -- To Provincial Commissioners: Outlines their responsibilities and includes directives 2 to 5 for their files and directives 2 and 3 for transmission to the Prefect.

Number 2 -- To the Prefect: On confiscation of fascist text books, duties of sindaco, and the turning over of GIL properties to the provveditore agli studi.

Number 3 -- To the Prefect: For all districts: Gives orders regarding confiscation and storage of fascist text books; finding and making ready suitable buildings for school use; opening communal schools; and inaugurating the school lunch program.

Number 4 -- To the Provveditore agli Studi (Provincial superintendent of schools): Clarifies the relations of the Provveditore to Italian law and A.C.; sets up administration and outlines method of appointing personnel; gives specific directives on opening schools and eliminating fascism; provides for such administrative matters as transfers of teachers and students, school organization and programs of study; gives full instructions regarding text books to be used and policies thereof; orders cooperation with prefect and sindaco in finding suitable locations for schools and setting up lunch program; provides for financing of schools; gives orders for the taking over of GIL (Youth Organization) properties for school use and welfare of youth; and provides for systematic reports to

which Education Officers were sent at the end of the month from all regions of Emilia and from Headquarters. This involved the following activities:

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Number 5 -- To the Provveditore agli Studi: For all school heads: Outlines their responsibilities in regard to opening and defascizing schools and rendering reports.

Number 6 -- To acting heads of universities and other higher institutions learning, cultural organizations, etc.: Gives procedures for defascizing personnel, selection of permanent rectors, deans, etc., rendering reports and submitting budgets.

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- b) The Director of the Education Subcommission and Captain MOE, RPO for Piemonte called on G-5, IV Corps in Lucca, cleared directives and plans with him, and arranged that directives signed by Regional Commissioners might be used with a covering letter from G-5, IV Corps making them effective in IV Corps areas. A similar plan was proposed to the SCAG's 5 and 8 Army. The Director of the Subcommission then visited Regional Headquarters of the four northern regions which had not yet begun to function and went through all the directives with them.
- c) A meeting of such Regional Education Officers as were available was held in Rome on 27 April for final briefing on plans for the north.
- d) A small group of Provveditori agli Studi from Central Italy, selected as the best in all liberated territory, were brought to Rome on 27 and 28 April and prepared to go north as civilian specialist assistants to the Regional Education Officers to make up for the shortage of Allied personnel. They will coordinate and supervise the work of provincial provveditori in each Region where they are used, will interpret to them Italian and Allied decrees and orders, and generally assist the Regional Education Officers.
- e) A pool of potential provveditori to head up provinces in the north if suitable personnel should be unavailable locally in some provinces, was prepared with the help of the Minister of Public Instruction. Candidates were called to the Education Subcommission for personal interview.
- f) A list of the educational buildings most important to preserve from requisitioning in the North was prepared, at our request, by the Ministry of Public Instruction, and forwarded to G-5, IV Corps, SCAG's 5 and 8 Army, and Regional Education Officers.
- g) Provisions were made for handling educational matters in Marche-Umbria and Toscana regions, while they remain under AMG, through the Education Subcommission, since no Education Officers were being left there. Any local educational matters still requiring assistance are also being handled by Education Subcommission HQ.
- h) Education Subcommission HQ, cut its strength from four to three officers by sending Major VESSELO to Lombardia as RDO. It also lost, at least temporarily, Major MANNUS to Displaced Persons, leaving only the Director and Executive Officer (Captain VILLA) at Subcommission Headquarters.
- i) Major VESSELO's Survey of Italian Education was mimeographed and forwarded to all Education Officers to give them more complete background for their work.

2. Regional Activities.

Because of the shift to the north at the end of April the regular monthly reports from Regions could not be prepared. Brief statements from the RDO's indicate that in Marche-Umbria, Toscana, and Friuli and Ravenna Provinces of Emilia, schools were functioning, books were distributed, note books (quadrants) were being printed (half a million in Toscana alone), lunches were being served to increasing numbers of children, some building repair was going on,

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2. Regional Activities.

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In general, Toscana (except Apuana province) and Marche-Umbria were in good shape to transfer to the Italian Government. The same was true of Emilia and Romagna provinces in Emilia.

3. Headquarters activities.

a) The Minister accompanied the Director of the Education Subcommission and the RPO of Toscana (Capt. MBE) on a visit to a number of schools in the city and province of Siena and the University of Siena.

b) Requisitions were filed, in revised form, for text book printing supplies and school supplies from the United States for 1945-46.

c) Tabulation of the great number of requests for books and apparatus to rehabilitate libraries and laboratories continued at the Ministry of Public Instruction. Not yet completed. Now requests can be obtained from the north, to which forms have been sent.

d) Cultural Interchange.

(1) Permission to translate has been obtained, gratis, from authors and publishers of five of the books desired for the series on Allied Education. Four of these are either in the press or being translated.

(2) There has been close liaison between the Education Subcommittee and the United States Information Service (OWI), through weekly luncheon meetings and office contacts. Requests received from American and Italian sources are discussed and decision is made as to whether they can be best handled by Education Subcommittee or USIS. The USIS Education Bulletin is prepared in consultation with the Education Subcommittee, and distributed to schools through the Minister. Plans have been made, in consultation with the Minister, for the USIS to print three books for free distribution to school children next fall. One of these, for fifth grade children (11-year-olds) is on the broad outlines of the geography and history of the principal countries of North and South America. The second, for children 14 and 15 years old, describes the making of the American constitution, the American system of elections, etc. The third, likewise for 14-year-olds, deals with the responsibilities and duties of citizens in a democracy -- it will be an adaptation of one of the best American junior-high-school text books on citizenship. The USIS is further seeking translation rights and Italian publishers for the thirty or forty books of juvenile literature selected on the initiative of the Education Subcommittee.

(3) Preliminary contacts have been made with the newly arrived members of the British Council and British Institute. The Education Subcommittee has offered to cooperate with them along the same lines as in the case of USIS. They have indicated, however, that they prefer to make their own direct contacts with the Minister of Public Instruction, but will keep the Education Subcommittee informed of their activities.

(4) Prof. Gaudapuoti, who is supposed to go to the United States to study molecular physics, is still in the case to deliver in Washington.

(5) The Columbia Concert Corporation has requested such information from the Education Subcommittee looking to an interchange of concert artists between the United States and Italy.

4. Minister of Public Instruction.

There have been the usual twice-a-week meetings between the Minister of Public Instruction and the Director of the Education Subcommittee. In addition to matters mentioned above, and very technical matters, the following have been dealt with:

a) A special meeting was held with the Vice President, C. Section, the Education Subcommittee and MEA Subcommittee to discuss the implementation of EAU 127, especially as regards cultural interchange. In addition to expressing his approval of the various already underway in this field, the Minister agreed to appoint two commissions to study means of bringing about an interchange of professors and students between Italy and Allied nations.

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(4) Prof. Cocciagnoli, who is expected to go to the United States to study nuclear physics, is still in Rome due to delays in Washington.

(5) The Glavin Concert Corporation has requested such information from the Education Subcommittee looking to an interchange of concert artists between the United States and Italy.

4. Minister of Public Instruction.

There have been the usual three-a-week meetings between the Minister of Public Instruction and the Director of the Education Subcommittee. In addition to matters mentioned above, and many technical matters, the following have been dealt with:

a) A special meeting was held with the Vice President, CA Section, the Education Subcommittee and MFA Subcommittee to discuss the implementation of EAM 487, especially as regards cultural interchange. In addition to expressing his approval of the actions already underway in this field, the Minister agreed to appoint two commissions to study means of bringing about an interchange of professors and students between Italy and Allied nations.

b) The Minister is considering a decree to facilitate the employment of foreign professors in Italy.

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- c) A decree has been prepared to allow special university examinations for students who were unable to take the regular ones because of work with the Partisans.
- d) The Minister has been asked to prepare a decree which would enable the Allies in the North to pay persons employed as temporary provveditori agli studi at the same rate as permanent provveditori.
- e) It has been suggested that the Minister arrange for a decree that would make the benefits of D.L. 159 retroactive for personnel suspended by AME before July, 1944.
- f) The Minister of Public Instruction, the Minister of Justice and the High Commissioner have finally set up provincial operation committees under D.L. 159 in most of the provinces south of Berlin.

5. Youth Activities.

- a) A working plan for Patronato Scolastico (student aid association) has finally been issued by the Minister.
- b) A temporary resolution of the problem of taking over the property of the Fascist Youth Organization (GIL) by the provveditori agli studi, for Youth activities, has been worked out and put into effect for the North. This provides that the Intendente di Finanza in each province will immediately inventory and take titular possession of the physical assets of GIL, and then promptly turn them over, exclusive of cash and securities, to the provveditori agli studi to be used for athletic, cultural, welfare, and educational purposes for youth.
- c) The American Junior Red Cross is sending 20,000 packages of school supplies, soap, tooth brush, etc., for distribution to needy school children through the Italian Junior Red Cross.
- d) The Boy Scout and Girl Guide movements are growing in importance and in number of participants. Mr. Gatty visited Florence and talked with the leaders of both Scout organizations and those who are organizing Girl Guides. He found considerable activity and growth, and classes for future leaders of troops. Such classes have been underway for months in Rome for leaders of Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

St. George's Day was celebrated by rallies of each of the Scout organizations and the Girl Guides, in Rome and in Florence, involving an aggregate of several thousand children. The Director of the Education Subcommittee and Mr. Gatty visited the Rome rallies. It was good to see great numbers of youngsters out in the beautiful countryside, enthusiastically and with good organization carrying out the typical Scout programs of demonstrations, compositions, camping activities, and games. There was a real scout spirit. For those who are participating, Scouting is replacing the demoralization of hanging around on the city streets, by athletics, organized and constructive recreation.

6. Personnel.

1) The Minister of Public Instruction, the Minister of Justice and the High Commissioner have finally set up provincial operation committees under D.L. 159 in most of the provinces south of Rome.

1. POLITICAL:

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The functions of this body were, in broad terms, to examine all matters concerning the public health of the Kingdom which were referred to it by the Director General of Public Health; to initiate scientific research in respect of all aspects of public health; to compile a list of dangerous trades and to take steps to safeguard the health of all workers, especially women and children. The Council was divided into different sections which studied and advised on a diversity of public health problems, while on matters of the greatest importance, the Council met and voted in full session.

(8) During the war the Council continued to function satisfactorily until the events of September 1943 when it automatically and of necessity ceased to have any further corporate existence. Since then, the General Directorate of Public Health has continued to administer the health services of the country without having a Consiglio to which to refer any problems of a complicated nature.

(9) On 19th April 1945, there was published in the Official Gazette, Legislative Decree of the Chief General No. 136 of the 22nd March 1945 by which there was established a Central Advisory Commission for Public Health, or "Commissione Consultiva Centrale di Sanita". The composition of this Commission is very similar to that of the original Consiglio and its powers and functions are defined by the Decree to be identical with those conferred on the Superior Council for Public Health. The Commission is to hold office for one year after the end of the war, the reason for this being that by then the time will have come for the formation of a fresh Consiglio which can be composed of members chosen from the whole of Italy.

(10) It is felt that the enactment of this Decree is an excellent measure, indicative of the active interest being taken by the Italian Government in all matters pertaining to the health of the Italian Nation.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH MEASURES:

(A) Typhus:

(a) No cases of Typhus have been reported during the month.

(b) Supplies of DDT and Spray-gun have been allocated to all Regional stockpiles for the Northern Regions. On arrival, these supplies will be distributed to the Medical Provincial of each province with instructions as to their use and as a result every province in Italy will have its emergency stock of DDT for use in case any outbreak of Typhus should occur. At the moment, however, it is thought that such a contingency is remote.

(C) Smallpox:

(a) Despite the fact that over a million persons have been vaccinated in Naples Comune and more than two million in Naples Province, Smallpox continues to persist in that area. It is felt that the vaccination programme is not being carried out with the thoroughness and efficiency which is necessary and representations to that effect have been made to the Government. As a result, a special directive has been issued to the Prefect of Naples and an inspector from the Ministry has been sent to Naples to report on the progress of the epidemic and enquire into the efficacy of the prophylactic measures. The Italian Public Health authorities report for the month of April: 271 cases from Naples Province of which 125 occurred in the City and 148 in the Province.

(b) The remaining cases of Smallpox reported in Italy are: 14 from Salerno, 22 from Avellino, 3 from Benevento, 1 from each of the Provinces of Rome, Palermo, Catanzaro and Cosenza, while 6 were reported from Trentino.

(C) Malaria:

(a) Although small quantities of Paris green have reached this country, no bulk shipment has yet arrived and the lack of this commodity was causing the Sub-Commission considerable anxiety. However, once more the Military authorities have demonstrated their sympathetic outlook on the problems of AC and have released 50

(D) It is felt that the enactment of this Decree is an excellent measure, indicative of the active interest being taken by the Italian Government in all matters pertaining to the health of the Italian nation.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH BOARD:

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(b) The remaining cases of Smallpox reported in Italy are: 14 from Salerno, 62 from Avellino, 3 from Benevento, 1 from each of the Provinces of Rome, Palermo, Catanzaro and Campobasso, while 6 were reported from Provincina.

(c) Malaria:

(a) Although small quantities of Paris green have reached this country, no bulk shipment has yet arrived and the lack of this commodity was causing the Sub-Commission considerable anxiety. However, once more the Military Authorities have demonstrated their sympathetic outlook on the problem of AC and have released 50 tons to this Sub-Commission, to be repaid immediately AC shipments arrive. Of these 50 tons, 30 have been allocated to the Italian Government for malaria control work in Southern Italy, Sicily and Sardinia, while 20 tons each have been allocated to Venetia and Emilia Regions. Lombardy, Piemonte and Liguria Regions, where the malaria problem is small, have been allocated respectively 1 ton, 1 ton and 1 ton from small stocks in hand.

(b) Work on the Pontine Marshes under Professor Mancinelli, Special Commissioner of the Antimalaria Committee of Littoria Province, continues but is hampered by lack of transport. It Colonel Spencer, Major Anderson, Major Hill and Captain Mancinelli were able to afford Professor Mancinelli transport facilities through the cooperation of the HQ Transport Officer while they were still temporarily attached to this HQ. But recent developments have necessitated their departure to their proper stations in the North and therefore Professor Mancinelli's scheme has suffered in consequence through shortage of transport. It is not properly appreciated by the Italian authorities that it is quite impossible to have HQ transport over to a civilian agency, even for use in malaria control projects, important as these are.

Furthermore, with the opening up of the new Northern Regions, all transport is at a premium, as well as there being no public utility officers to accept responsibility for vehicles. It has been recommended to Professor Visconti that the Fontaine Marquis are in Italian Government territory and that if transport is being for this scheme, direct appeal should be made to the Government for assistance. This solution to the problem, however, does not appear to have been fully realized or exploited. In the meantime, this Sub-Commission has for a long time past been making repeated efforts to obtain types for the public health authorities and the Italian Red Cross. If these could be made available, many cars belonging to Medici Provinciali and Anti-Socialist Committees, now lying idle through lack of types, could be put into service and the present serious difficulty overcome. The latest information, however, is to the effect that there is absolutely no availability of types of suitable sizes and therefore it would appear that requisitioning of vehicles by the Italian Government is the only possible solution.

(c) Dr. Marzulli of the Malaria Control Demonstration Unit reports that the residual spray work in the Elber fields project is nearing completion and the adult and larval capture phase of the program is about to begin. In late 1950, 1,350 buildings including over 39,000 rooms have been treated in an area embracing approximately 120 square miles. This has required the application of about 12,500 gallons of kerosene and 5,400 pounds of DDT concentrate of which over 1,400 pounds went into the lido di Sesto. In that part of the rural districts completely and where there was an average of 0.50 percent per room, the amount of DDT used was approximately 100 grams per room or 170 grams per person. The treated area has been divided into six districts in each of which a squad for collecting adults and larvae will make systematic collections throughout the breeding season so that a constant check will be kept on the vector density in all parts of the project.

(D) Typhoid:

(a) A small outbreak of Typhoid which occurred in 27th and 28th May 1950 at Camp, Florence, may now be considered as ended.

(b) An extensive report on the San Marino-Rimini epidemic by Professor Basso is to be found in Appendix 14.

(E) Undulant Fever:

(a) Cases of undulant fever are still being reported from Florence, Bologna and the necessity of boiling milk and the avoidance of local cheeses is once more stressed.

(F) Venereal Disease:

(a) As regards the recent times made by the Italian Government concerning the establishment of a 600 bedded hospital in Rome for the treatment of infected prostitutes, referred to in last month's report, a reply has been received in which it is stated that in the opinion of the public health authorities, the number of infected women referred to the San Galliciano Hospital for treatment is very large and that the utilization of 600 beds and suggests that the beds should be sufficient. The reply also states that the length of the period of treatment of the hospital carried by prostitutes as an indication of their freedom from infection.

(b) This reply has been forwarded to the Surgeon, Rome who will be asked to discuss it with the Director of Microbiology from which it was received.

(c) Dr. Mariani of the Malaria Control Administration Unit reports that the residual spray used in the fiber delta project is showing completion and the adult and larval counts phase of the program is about to begin. 30 days from 1250 buildings including over 10,000 rooms have been treated in an area embracing approximately 120 square miles. The area required the application of almost 12,000 gallons of insecticide and 500 pounds of 200 concentrate of which over 11,000 pounds went into the delta di Sana. In that part of the rural districts some 200 adult adults have been treated with 0.5% pyrethrum per room, the amount of DDT used was approximately 100 grams per room in 120 grams per person. The treated area has been divided into six districts in each of which a squad for collecting adult and larvae will make systematic collections throughout the breeding season so that a constant check will be had on the vector density in all parts of the project.

(D) Typhoid:

(a) A small outbreak of Typhoid which occurred in 27th and Enriqueta Ochoa, Florence, may be considered at an end.

(b) An exhaustive report on the San Marino-Rimini epidemic by Dr. B. D. Davis is to be found in Appendix IV.

(E) Undulant Fever:

(a) Cases of undulant fever are still being reported from Pescara region and the necessity of boiling milk and the avoidance of local cheeses is being urged.

(F) Veneral Disease:

(a) As regards the recommendations made to the Italian Government concerning the establishment of a 600 bedded hospital in Rome for the treatment of infected prostitutes, referred to in last month's report, a reply has been received in which it is stated that in the opinion of the Public Health authorities, the number of infected women referred to the San Galliciano Hospital for treatment is a large enough to necessitate the utilization of 600 beds and suggests that the beds should be sufficient. The reply deals also at some length with the general question of the booklet carried by prostitutes as an indication of their freedom from infection.

(b) This reply has been forwarded to the Surgeon, Rome Area Allied Command and has been promised to discuss it with the adviser in forestry from April to 1st known 21st April is taking a deep interest in the matter.

(c) A further communication dated 28th April has been received from the Public Health authorities in which it is stated that the number of beds in the Galliciano Hospital has been increased to 325 and that a further increase to 350 is shortly to be expected. This latter news, in addition, more stringent measures regarding the diagnosis and treatment of venereal infections.

(G) Infant Mortality:

(a) During 1947 there were 2012 live births in Rome and 176 deaths in children under one year of age. This gives an infant mortality figure of 87.6 as compared with 111.5 in February.

(H) Tuberculosis:

(a) The March number of deaths in Rome Comune from all forms of Tuberculosis was 256 as compared with 193 in February.

3. VETERINARY BRANCH.

The Chief of the Veterinary Branch reports as follows:

(A) Liberation of Northern Italy at a time of the year when preparation by the Veterinary Service for the control of animal diseases is essential, creates a real need for organization of aid assistance to that Service in Northern Italy at the earliest possible date. Special emphasis needs to be placed on veterinary biological production because substantial stocks of these products must be at hand for distribution as soon as possible. The location of all Standard zooprofithalms in the North and additional information regarding same is of the disposal of this Branch. The arrival of a Veterinary C.D. Laboratory Medical Supply Unit may prove very timely as the probability that one of the Northern Laboratories will reach it is great.

(B) The Veterinary Services in Southern Italy, Sardegna and Sicily, at present functioning with practically a pre-war degree of efficiency. Commercial veterinarians are available in quantity for this area but qualified Provincial Veterinarians are scarce. Sanitation facilities are now restricted to the point where contact can be made within 24 to 48 hours with any part of the area. The Chief, Veterinary Service in the Ministry has assumed complete responsibility for the portion in this area. Having unforeseen difficulties, little assistance will need to be afforded in the future and the only supplies required are veterinary material. The present plan of distribution for such supplies has proven to be unsatisfactory mainly due to their similarity with medical supplies in general and the comparative lack of tonnage involved. A plan for distributing future shipments of supplies by placing them under the complete control of veterinarians direct from the C.D. Deposits has been agreed upon and will probably go into effect within one month.

(C) Infectious diseases most prevalent during the past month were: foot-and-mouth disease, hog-cholera, sheepscab, brucellosis and leptospirosis. The degree of location of and control measures affected for these diseases has been as follows:

- (a) Foot-and-mouth disease: present with fairly high incidence in the provinces of Sardegna, Rome, Siena, Lucca, Pisa and Florence and sporadic cases have occurred in all Southern provinces in the mainland. 30,000 doses of vaccine have been produced and distributed. Cattle are reaching Rome at a rate of 150 a week to afford material for future vaccine production.
- (b) Hog-cholera: prevalent in practically every liberated province south of Florence with highest incidence in the provinces of Siena, Rome, Viterbo and Naples. More than 12,000 doses of crystal violet vaccine have been produced and distributed with an additional supply in the process of production.
- (c) Sheepscab: present in approximately two-thirds of the mainland provinces with high incidence in those of Rome, Viterbo, Teramo and Perugia. Veterinarians describing the manufacture and use of lime-sulphur dip have been distributed.
- (d) Brucellosis: most prevalent in Pisa, Florence and Savona provinces. Vaccination has been supplied to each prefecture of the above.
- (e) Leptospirosis: High incidence has been reported in Ascoli, Ancona, and Veroli, Marche and sporadic cases have occurred throughout the provinces of the mainland, Sicily and Sardegna. The case of children in a well in Rome Province has been reported to the Army authorities.

The location of all National Supply Units, etc. in the North and additional information regarding same is at the disposal of this Branch. The arrival of a Veterinary V.D. (a) Foot-and-mouth Disease: Cases are with fairly high incidence in the provinces of Sardegna, Umbria, Abruzzo, Liguria, Piemonte and especially Veneto have occurred in all Southern provinces on the mainland. 30,000 doses of vaccine have been produced and distributed. Cattle are reaching 100 a rate of 150 a week to afford material for future vaccine production.

(b) *Big-Obolus*: prevalent in practically every liberated province north of Kinshasa, especially in the provinces of Shona, Basa, Vitoria and Namibia. More than 12,000 doses of crystal violet vaccine have been produced and distributed with an excellent supply in the process of production.

(c) Sheelachobai, present in approximately two-thirds of the examined covarian with high incidence in those of Rose, Viterbo, Talamo and Costa. Particulars describing the sample size and use of flow-sampler dip have been distributed.

(d) Brucelloms: most prevalent in pistols, Florence and Governor's
crucillin has been supplied to each prefecture of the above.

(2) An information circular pertaining to availability and control of various veterinary biologics was circulated to all Regional Public Health Officers, AFM, 5th and 8th Areas for Provincial Veterinarians. The Public Health Officer prepared and arranged for release of a story about the production and use of strain No. 19 Brucella abortus vaccine in Italy.

4. MEDICAL SUPPLY BRANCH:

The Medical Supply Officer reports that:

(A) EMILIA has increased the number of their warehouses and representatives, which has helped a great deal in their distribution problems. Their attention is still one of their great difficulties. Though many of their exhibitors have been worked out, they are still far from operating smoothly. Discussion still exists between EMILIA and Sanita' publicly of the Italian Government over proper management and operations of the organization.

(B) This office made a new directive, AC/3072/2/44, this was published by Civil Affairs Section on April 12th, 1945 and was forwarded to all Regional Public Health Officers and to Provincial Commissioners, to the Public Health Division of the Government and to EMILIA. The above-mentioned directive consolidated all the regulations and distributing system and states regulations on prices of all medical supplies. Products manufactured in liberated Italy at the present time, in sufficient quantity to prevent disease and unrest among the civil population, are cancelled from requisitions from us and us.

(C) Plans have been made and approved for the distribution of medical supplies for Emilia Romagna. Requisitions have been made out and forwarded to the 3 Divisions in the field. These supplies are now ready for shipment to all Regions as per Territory where EMILIA is not operating.

(D) Paris exams and anti-malarial drugs have been released from the COME. Beyond to the Italian Government for distribution in malarious areas. Similar supplies have been set aside for A.G. Territory.

(E) Medical supplies for the 6 months period January 1, 1945 to July 1945 are now arriving from the States. Requisitions will again be filled on a two month's basis for EMILIA and 5th and 8th Areas.

5. RELIEF BRANCH:

The Chief of the Relief Branch reports as follows:

(A) Personnel: No change in officers personnel since last month. Sectional Welfare Officers continued to lose Red Cross personnel who are being absorbed further North. The return of the Southern and Lazio-Romagna Regions to Italian administration through additional work on this Monday.

(B) Food and Clothing: The regular feeding programs are being continued. The National Distribution Decree of 1944 has been supplemented with children's diets with milk and vitamins which has been very helpful. Our institutional surveys have been used as a basis for these various distributions and have proved to be reliable and helpful. The age limit has been raised so that now, adolescents are having the benefits of these additional rations.

The clothing distribution has been entirely from supplies furnished by the Italian Government and from the United States.

(2) This office has a new directive, AC/3000/12/14, that was submitted by Civil Affairs Section on April 10th, 1945 and was forwarded to all Regional Public Health Officers and to Provincial Commissioners, to the Public Health Division of the Italian Government and to ENRICA. The above-mentioned directive consolidates all the requisitioning and distribution system and states regulations on release of Italian medical supplies. Products manufactured in liberated Italy at the present time, in sufficient quantity to prevent disease and urgent needs for civil population, are cancelled from requisitioning from US and UK.

(3) Plans have been made and approved for the distribution of medical supplies for March 1945. Requisitions have been made out and forwarded to ENRICA to be filled. These supplies are not ready for shipment to all regions in the territory where ENRICA is not operating.

(4) Plans for an anti-malaria drive have been released from the ENRICA. Request to the Italian Government for distribution in malarious areas. Similar supplies have been set aside for a 3 territory.

(5) Medical supplies for the 6 months period January 1, 1945 to July 1945 are now arriving from the States. Requisitions will again be filled on a two months basis for ENRICA and 5th and 6th armies.

5. WELFARE SERVICES

The Chief of the Welfare Branch reports as follows:

(A) Personnel: No change in officer personnel since last month. Hospital Welfare Officers continued to issue Red Cross personnel who are being assigned North. The return of the Southern and Sanio-Medica Hospitals to Italian administration shows additional work on this Welfare staff.

(e) Food and Clothing: The regular feeding programs are being continued. Extra National distributions 500,000 and 100,000 have been supplied to children's diets with milk and vitamins which has been very helpful. Our institutional surveys have been used as a basis for these various distributions and have proved to be reliable and helpful. The age limit has been raised so that now, adolescents are having the benefits of these additional rationing.

The clothing distribution has been entirely from supplies furnished by American Relief for Italy and given out through ENRICA.

This Branch, through close cooperation with the Industry and the Commerce Sub-Committees has made available to the Italian Red Cross and to the Order of Malta certain salvage materials such as canvas, mattress covers, extra findings, mosquito nettings, cot covers, etc., from which much needed clothing is made both for children and adults. We hope by continuing and enlarging this program so that no Quartermaster salvage will have to be sold on the market, but will be used into the hands of war-torn and reliable Italian Welfare organizations and that it will be converted into needed products. It is hoped that salvage material can be made into clothing by factories of the North at least until these factories are supplied with raw materials. ENRICA and representatives of the Welfare are also working to have salvage made available to them. We are working on a plan to have our stores, for instance ENRICA, buy all released salvage materials. They will then make distribution to the other Italian agencies of the materials they need. With this will and diversified distribution it is hoped that some clothing, at least, will not be the most needy of the people of Italy.

(C) Again blankets can be mentioned in the clothing category. The 182,700 blankets given to the Public Health Sub-Commission for distribution have been distributed to hospitals and other elementary institutions. Plans are being worked out to make personal distributions to needy people through the E.C.A., or other recognized Italian relief agencies. The Italian Red Cross has given invaluable help in this program. We must mention again the splendid cooperation of the American Relief for Italy and the E.M.A.S.I., whose trucks and services were made available. More than ten public spirited women of Rome made a very complete survey of all institutions in the area. The distribution of blankets was made upon the findings of this survey. Several of the women who had made the survey offered to go on the trucks which were making the distribution of blankets, with prepared lists of the number each institution needed and also duplicate receipt for our records. The fine contribution of service by these women not only adds a more equitable distribution possible but lessened the usual time necessary by half. These blankets have greatly lessened suffering and the recipients have expressed sincere gratitude for them. One of the most grateful groups were the people of Sardinia. The Liaison Officer at Bari and proper officials in the various distribution centres are kept informed. The following allocations were made and most of the blankets have been distributed.

(C) In consequence of these changes, the Naples Corps has now only one Medical Officer and one Sanitary Officer, the Umbria-Marche Region has only one Medical Officer and one Welfare Officer, while the Toscana Region Staff has been reduced to two Medical Officers and one Sanitary Corps Officer, and it is anticipated that in the near future the staff of these Regions will suffer further reduction.

(1) Because of the considerable reduction in the total personnel of the Sub-Commission, the tasks for the Northern Regions have, therefore, to be cut to an almost dangerously low level and some apprehension was felt as a result at this HQ. Fortunately events have taken such a favorable turn in the North that all recent reports indicate the preservation of hospitals, water supplies and essential services with the consequent diminution of danger to the health of the civil population. It is felt therefore that in view of the excellent prevailing conditions, the attempted Nor-Sern Public Health teams will be sufficient for the tasks which lie before them.

(2) The departure of these officers is a matter for sincere regret, as all, in their various spheres, have carried out their duties in an exemplary manner.

SUMMARY:

1. POLITICAL:

The Italian Government has appointed a Central Advisory Commission for Public Health. This is a temporary body taking the place of the Interministerial Committee for Public Health which in the past had advised the Public Health Division of the Ministry of Interior on all matters pertaining to the health of the nation. It is anticipated that with the liberation of the North, the original Superior Council for Public Health which fell into Germany in September, 1943 will be re-constituted in the future. The term of office of the Central Advisory Commission is for one year after the cessation of hostilities.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH:

(a) No cases of Typhus were reported during April. Steps have been taken to provide the provision of the pest with stocks of anti and sera-gamma in the form of serum as has already been done for the regions of Italian Government territory.

(b) Many cases of typhus continue to be notified from Naples City and Naples Province. However the fact that over three million inoculations have been performed. It has been felt that the mass vaccination program in Naples should be continued and representation to this effect have been made to the Italian Government on a report of which a detailed report has been sent to Naples to investigate and report on the situation there. 274 cases have been reported from Naples Province during April; 62 from Avellino; 14 from Salerno; 6 from Grosseto and 1 from each of the provinces of Rome, Palermo, Genoa and Turin.

(c) Naples. During the month the military authorities finally agreed to allow the disinfection of the town of Fiume to be repaid when it stocks are finally moved. Of these 50 tons, 30 tons have been allocated to the Italian Government and 20 tons have been given to British and American troops. The anti-malaria program of the Naples Province continues under the direction of Professor Macdonald, Medical Commissioner of the Anti-Malaria Committee of the Fiume Province, but is hampered by the lack of transport. The Public Health Sub-Commission has had to withdraw its activities during the month due to the departure of four officers posted during the month. Every effort is being made to obtain extra for vehicles required for anti-malaria work that these efforts have not been successful. It is felt that the only solution for this problem is for the Italian Government to regulate the transport required to bring the personnel in the operation.

The other Public Health Commission project is nearing completion and the public and general officers should be the program is about to begin. So far some 4,500 buildings including over 30,000 rooms have been treated in an area of approximately 100 square miles.

(d) A small outbreak of typhus which occurred in an anti-related outbreak in the Province of Palermo is now under control.

(e) A certain number of cases of typhus have been reported from the Province of Palermo.

(f) The Italian Government has referred to the Anti-Malaria Commission actions concerning the establishment of a 100 bedded hospital for infected persons.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH

(a) No cases of Typhus were reported during April. It is to be noted that the activities of the North with attacks of 20% and even more in the same manner as has already been done for the remainder of Italian Government territory.

(b) Many cases of an illness which is to be notified from Naples City and Naples Province despite the fact that over three million vaccinations have been performed. It has been felt that the whole vaccination program in Naples should be overhauled and re-evaluated to this effect have been made to the Italian Government as a result of which a medical inspection has been sent to Naples to investigate and report on the situation there. 274 cases have been reported from Naples Province during April, 62 from Avellino, 11 from Salerno, 6 from Benevento and 1 from each of the provinces of Pavia, Palermo, Catanzaro and Reggio.

(c) Malaria. During the month the military authorities kindly agreed to send these sub-commissionary files to the military authorities kindly agreed to voluntarily arrive. Of these 30 tons, 30 have been allocated to the Italian Government and 10 tons each have been given to Sicily and Venezia Regions. The anti-malaria project on the Pontine Marshes continues under the direction of Professor Marshall, Special Commissioner of the Anti-Malaria Committee of the Italian Government, but is hampered by the lack of transport. The Public Health Sub-Committee has had to withdraw its assistance during the month due to the difficulty of obtaining tires for their vehicles in the city. Every effort is being made to have as far as possible required for anti-malarial work but these efforts have so far been unsuccessful. It is felt that the only solution for this problem is for the Italian Government to regulate the transport required to keep the project in full operation.

The other Delta demonstration project is nearly completed and the 1350 buildings including over 30,000 rooms have been treated in an area of approximately 120 square miles.

(d) A small outbreak of Typhus which occurred in an area referred to as the Italian area in Palermo is now being treated.

(e) A certain number of cases of Typhus fever are still reported from the Italian area.

(f) The Italian Government has replied to the sub-commissionary recommendations concerning the establishment of a 600 bedded hospital for infected prisoners in Rome. The reply has been submitted to the military authorities and it is understood that the whole problem is at present under consideration by the Italian Government.

(g) The infant mortality rate for Rome was 87.4 in March as compared with 111.5 in February.

(h) The number of deaths in Rome Province from all forms of disease 2821 in March was 256 as compared with 190 in February.

3. SUMMARY

It is considered that the veterinary services in Italian Government territory are now functioning with the same efficiency as was to be found in the pre-war days and that as far as this sub-commission is concerned, nothing further remains to be done in that area.

Foot and Mouth disease, cow cholera, sheep scabies, brucellosis and longusstrachetia have all been reported from different provinces during the past month. Courses of instruction on bovine sterility and artificial insemination have been conducted for veterinarians in the provinces of Rome, Viterbo and Frosinone during the month. Information concerning the availability and procurement of veterinary supplies has been circulated to all national public health officers during the month.

4. VETERINARY SUPPLY:

ITALIA has increased the number of its warehouses and representatives but is still hampered by lack of transport. A directive dealing with the requisitioning and distribution of medical supplies and the fixing of prices of Allied medicines has been sent to all RFFE, Provincial Commissioners, Italian Government and ARMA. Arrangements have been completed for the shipment of supplies to all the regions in Northern Italy. Supplies to cover the first six months of the current year are now beginning to arrive.

5. RELATIONS:

The regular feeding programmes are continued and children's diets are being supplemented by milk and vitamins distributed by the site legation indistinctly. Quantities of 27,000 units of vitamins such as carotene, vitamins covered are not covered have been obtained through the German Sub-Committee and handed over to the Italian Red Cross and the Order of Malta. This large material is then passed to Italian welfare organizations which convert it into such needed and serviceable garments. A widespread distribution of blankets has been made during the month and the following quantities have been sent to the regions indicated:

THE SAN MARINO-HIDALGO ENTERIC OUTBREAK

1. GENERAL.

The epidemic described here is the San Marino-Hidalgo Enteric Outbreak may be said to have had its beginning early in the Summer of 1944, spreading until about the middle of September when a massive infection of the exposed population occurred. Before the outbreak was resolved some five months later in February 1945, slightly more than 1100 cases of enteric disease had been reported in the civilian population of the sector. Apart from any interest which the magnitude of this epidemic might evoke, there is the story of how it was dealt with as an epidemic within what was then a forward area crowded with combat and service troops. We have again an example of the direct correlation between pestilence and war with accompanying civilian health services unable to cope with the many problems.

2. GEOGRAPHY OF THE AREA

The sector in which the outbreak occurred involves an area of approximately 250 square miles, extending for 10 miles along the Atlantic coast of Italy and inland some twenty-five miles. The region is chiefly agricultural, much of it consisting of fertile rolling hills. The lower coastal area has a high water table, in many places water lies within five feet of the surface. There are numerous small hamlets, and for the most part shallow wells supply the major water requirements. The City of Rimini and the Republic of San Marino are the principal landmarks. The Republic lies inland about fifteen miles from the coast and is part of a chain of elevations which run parallel to the coast and which may be considered to be the foothills of the Apennines.

Before the present war, the area was a popular summer resort and the Republic, connected with the City of Rimini by a highway and an electric railway, was a favorite summer spot. Militarily, the sector became important because it controlled ingress to the Po Valley from the Adriatic Hills. The Germans consequently constructed in it numerous strategic points, which constituted part of the Gothic line.

3. PRELIMINARY FACTORS:

The region was normally known to be one in which typhoid and para-typhoid

THE SAN MARINO-REPUBLIC OF SAN MARINO

1. GENERAL:

The disease described here as the San Marino-San Marino Enteric Outbreak may be said to have had its beginning early in the Summer of 1944, continuing until about the middle of September when a massive infection of the exposed population occurred. Before this outbreak was resolved some five months later in February 1945, slightly more than 1500 cases of enteric disease had been recorded in the civilian population of the sector. Apart from any interest which the magnitude of this outbreak might evoke, there is the story of how it was dealt with as an epidemic within what was then a forward and crowded with combat and service troops. For here again was an instance of the direct correlation between pestilence and war with international civilian health services unable to cope with the many problems.

2. TOPOGRAPHY OF THE AREA

The sector in which the outbreak occurred involves an area of approximately 250 square miles, extending for 10 miles along the Adriatic coast of Italy and inland some twenty-five miles. The region is chiefly agricultural, much of it consisting of fertile rolling hills. The lower coastal area has a high water table, in many places water lies within five feet of the surface. There are numerous small hamlets, and for the most part the hills are steeply the major water requirements. The City of Rimini and the Republic of San Marino are the principal landmarks. The Republic lies inland about fifteen miles from the coast and is part of a chain of elevations which runs parallel to the coast and which may be considered to be the foothills of the Apennines.

Before the present war, the area was a popular summer resort and the Republic, connected with the City of Rimini by a highway and an electric railway, was a favorite sightseeing spot. Militarily, the sector became important because it controlled ingress to the Po Valley from the Adriatic side. The Germans consequently constructed in it innumerable strongpoints, which constituted part of the Gothic line.

3. PROBLEMS AND FACTORS:

The region was normally known to be one in which typhoid and dysentery were common. Reported cases in the Province of Rimini generally averaged some thirty to eighty per year and there in the Republic, about thirty. The greatest prevalence occurred during the Summer and early Fall months. During the Summer of 1943 there was a sharp outbreak of enteric diseases in the Republic of San Marino which was traced to a fault in the drainage system which resulted in cases. Thirteen (13) cases were observed in the Republic, of which ten (10) were still known to be eliminating organisms in August 1944.

In normal times water supply and waste disposal facilities were generally

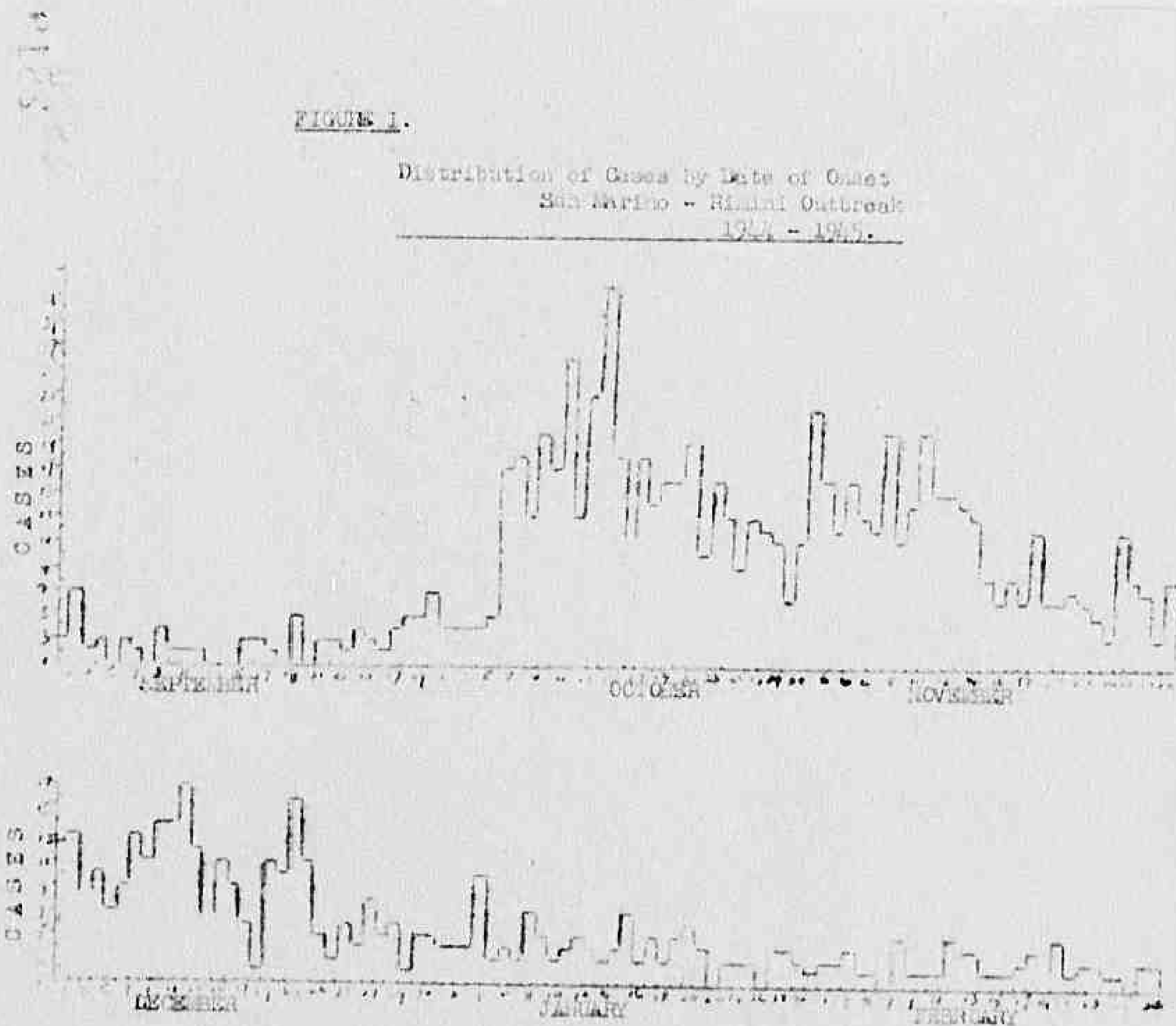
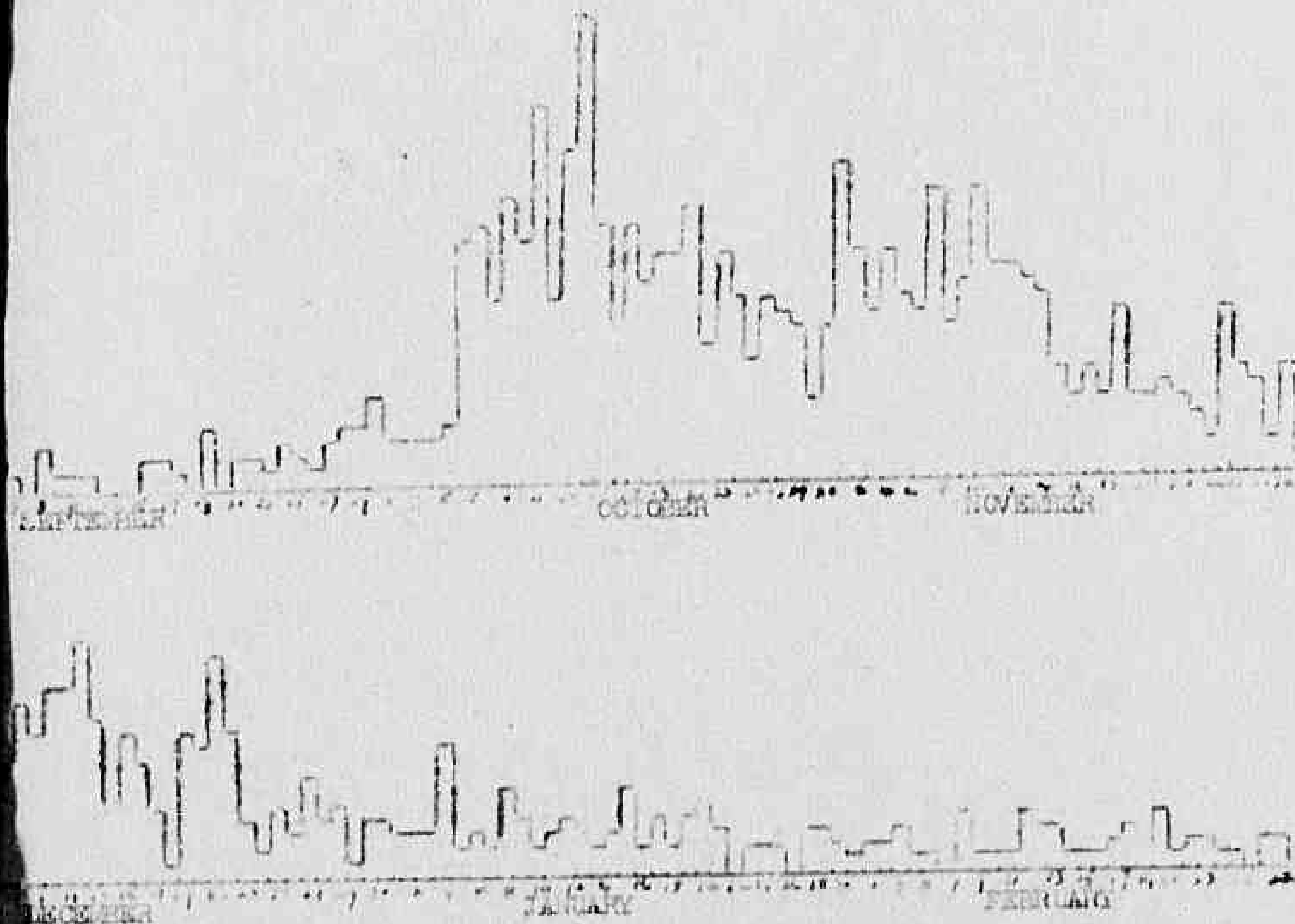

of the Republic. From the bombing of the City of Lima began in November 1913, there was a further migration into the Republic so that by August 1914 there was an estimated total of 36,000 refugees inside the Republic which prior to the war had a normal population of approximately 1,000.

The bombing of the Ayala River and a Forest by allied troops started the cholera epidemic. The epidemic was the cause for a great influx of refugees into the Republic which brought the total, calculated on the basis of various sources, to approximately 60,000 persons, many then five times the population of the Republic, between the 15th to 20th of September. Such a large influx of refugees caused a great deal of suffering and with the war conditions, the houses, churches, convents, schools, etc., and the relief hospitals at Jaramilla and others, the animals and the available property.

Overseas accounts describe conditions which indicate that it was practically impossible to sleep in a shelter lying down. The size of the camp which at the time had a population of 30,000 was reported as having been completely depopulated. Water was in such a state of pollution that it was not safe to drink and such water as was consumed was from shallow wells or springs located near the shelter. There were flies in great numbers. Usually, there is clear evidence that many of the refugees were ill with cholera. Symptoms and characteristics of the disease were listed in reports of contemporary witnesses of both Lima and the Republic of San Marino for the months of July and August.

6. INTERNATIONAL COMMISSIONERS OF THE RED CROSS

With the liberation of the City of Lima on the 1st September, administration of the area was made by public health officials of the Allied Military Government. However, as may be seen in Figure 1 which shows the distribution of cases by type of onset, the outbreak was in the incubation phase and the cases of illness which were actually reported during the last week in September and the first two weeks of October gave no hint as to what was yet to come.

First indications of a serious epidemic outbreak appeared during the third and fourth weeks of October when many cases began to appear both in the Republic of San Marino and Rimini, Romagna. Hospital facilities which had been set up in the City of Lima to deal with civil war casualties were made available for hospitalizing the epidemic cases. Hospital facilities were also available within the Republic for those who became ill.

When it became apparent that the situation was suggestive of an epidemic, control measures were initiated following a program organized by Lt. Colonel A. F. S. Thompson, RMC, Assistant Director of Hygiene, Eighth Army, and Colonel C. J. Parham, M.C., AUS, Senior Public Health Officer of the Allied Military Government Section, Eighth Army. The program will be referred to further in this report. The undersigned officer was assigned the task of studying the epidemiological characteristics of this epidemic.

a. Origin of Cases:

Study of case records began on 1 November 1941, into furnished by the Civilian Health Officer of the Republic of San Marino and the Commune of Rimini. It was soon apparent that a significant proportion of the cases reported in Rimini Commune had a common antecedent residence in the Republic within a period of 30 days preceding the onset of their illness. Of the Rimini Commune cases, 88% reported residence in the Republic prior to illness. Of this number 119 or 54.5 percent began ill within a month following their departure from the Republic. The mean interval as calculated for this group was 14.7 days with a standard deviation of ± 8.4 days.

Similar mean intervals were computed after ascertaining the cases on the basis of diagnosis. It is of interest to note the variations. For the typhoid cases, the mean interval was 11.2 days with a standard deviation of ± 5.5 days. For the Paratyphoid group, 10 ± 3.2 days, and the "enteric" group, 11.0 ± 6.4 days.

of case reports began on 1 November with data furnished by the Guatemalan Health Officers of the Republic of San Marino and the Committee of Rimini. It was soon apparent that a significant proportion of the cases reported in Rimini occurred in a common residential residence in the Republic within a period of 30 days preceding the onset of their illness. Of the 300 Rimini Committee cases, 285 reported residence in the Republic prior to illness. Of this number 149 or 51.5 percent began ill within a month following their departure from the Republic. The mean interval as calculated for this group was 14.5 days with a standard deviation of ± 8.4 days.

Similar mean intervals were computed after separating the cases on the basis of age group. It is of interest to note the variations. For the 15-24 age group, the mean interval was 13.2 days with a standard deviation of ± 6.5 days. For the 25-34 age group, 10 ± 8.2 days, and the "entire" group, 14.0 ± 8.4 days.

Cases which developed within thirty days following intercourse from the Republic were also grouped by the place of exportation, and in the Republic, and the distribution shown in Table 1 indicates the correlation which existed between mobility and the spread of the disease. It should be pointed out that the figure given as the total for the City of San Marino, no way to come that inaccurate because of the possibility of counting the city with an unvisited area in the Republic.

3. Analysis

A total of 1,338 suspected cases was recorded, 810 by the Republic for the period 1 July 1944 to 10 February, and 528 by the Government of San Marino for the period 1 September to 10 February. Thirty of the cases reported by the Government of San Marino resulted in the elimination of 13 cases which came from other countries and which could not be correlated in any way with the San Marino-Minimal outbreak.

Of the corrected total of 1,301 suspected cases, 1,172 or 91.1 per cent had a positive enteric infection. Inasmuch as cultural studies could not be undertaken for the cases from the Republic because of limited laboratory facilities, diagnosis of most of these cases was made on the basis of clinical and serological findings. This has significantly distorted the proportion of typhoid and Paratyphoid cases actually diagnosed.

Table 2 shows the distribution of reported cases by diagnosis.

For the period 1 July 1944 to 28 February, 1945, by the Bureau of National Affairs, and for the period 1 September to 20 February, 1945, by the Bureau of National Affairs, the following information is reported by the Bureau of National Affairs in the elimination of 45 cases which came from other companies and which could not be contacted in any way in 1945:

Of the combined total of 1861 suspected cases, 2352 or 25.4 per cent had a positive serologic infection. Inasmuch no culture studies could not be undertaken for the cases from the Republic because of limited laboratory facilities, 14,704 of most of these cases was made on the basis of chemical and serological findings. This has significantly affected the proportion of typhoid and paratyphoid cases actually diagnosed.

Table 2 shows the distribution of answers by age group.

On the basis of clinical reactions and clinical findings the San Marino cases appeared to be approximately twenty percent epidemic and forty percent Paratyphoid "B". On the basis of more complete laboratory studies, twenty-four percent of the clinical diagnosis cases were found to be typhoid, fifteen percent Paratyphoid "B" and 57 percent "enteric".

A total of 286 isolations were made by the San Marino Bacteriology Laboratory (Antisera), including cultures of previously known carriers in the Republic. The isolations sent to London and Rome for bacteriological studies. In late results have been received on seven (7) of the isolations, two (2) being reported as type "A", four (4) as type "B", and one (1) type "C".

C. Onset of Illness:

The distribution of cases by reported date of onset of illness shown in Figure 1 reveals a significant rise on the 7th October when 16 cases were reported as having become ill. Prior to this date the greatest number in any one day was six. From the 7th October a progressive increase apparently occurred until on the 15th October when 31 cases are reported to have become ill.

A second major peak apparently developed early in December with the highest number of cases, 16 occurring on 11th December following which a steady drop developed, continuing to the end of February 1945.

Assuming an incubation period of 11 to 20 days, it is possible to arrive at an estimate of the probable date of infection and it is apparent that on the basis of this hypothesis, the massive infection took place during the period between the second and the fourth week in September. This correlates with the previously cited information that it was precisely at this time that the population within the Republic was at its highest level and environmental hygiene at its worst.

The decline which took place following the peak suggests the probability that, throughout an organized and intensive control measures did not get under way until the last week in October, the decline could not have been related to such measures. However, immediately following the liberation of Rimini a large number of the released left for their homes outside the Republic. However, immediately following the liberation of Binadi a large number of the refugees left for their homes outside the Republic. Quite naturally the chances for spreading infection were significantly reduced with the consequent effect upon the further development of cases.

The peak which occurred in December was for the most part composed of secondary cases. In a number of these the original contact case had previously been known, but infection had apparently been passed on before the source case was isolated.

1. Case Relationships and Clusters:

It has been impossible to work out in detail the manner in which the outbreak developed. Even under normal circumstances this would have been a tedious task. However, analysis of the Binadi Commune data reveals that multiple cases in a household or family occurred in 56 instances and involved 165 individuals of a total of the 343 positive cases recorded in Binadi Commune.

Persons predominated in this group, aggregating almost 60 percent, suggesting the probability that risk of infection is greater among females because of their contact with ill members of their family.

Case studies of this group were made to determine whether the multiple bacteroid cases were contemporaneous or sequential in origin. Of the 39 bacteroid cases, 20 were reported as occurring in 20 and 19 were reported as occurring in 27. In 10 patients, an infection of the bacteroid had a history of typhoid and paratyphoid.

Thus far 51 or 9.3 percent of the clinical bacteroid cases have been found to be simultaneous or sequential in origin. Of these examinations of cases of typhoid. Of these cases by the San Marino Hospital and the remainder 12, Paratyphoid.

In five cases, 20 were found to be involved in apparently infection to at least the other members of the family. Young people were characteristically most often affected, approximately 50 percent of all cases having involved individuals over 10 and under 30 years of age. Slightly more than 20 percent of all positive cases reported were in the 10-20 age group.

Patients were in excess in all age groups over 19 and as Table 3 shows also outnumbered males for the total experience.

Because reliable population data are not available a precise evaluation of age and sex differences is not possible. Such a proportion as is noted in the table may be due to factors such as:

- (1) Young males in the Italian population at risk because of service in the Italian Army, being prisoners of war or having been taken by the Germans for forced labor.
- (2) Possible immunity resulting from typhoid infection contracted during service in the Italian Army.
- (3) Greater exposure risk of infection because they generally are the more ill members of the family.

The factor of time being fewer Italian males at risk was evaluated on the basis of an analysis of the cases which occurred in the Republic of San Marino and were reported cases. These were classified as to whether they were Italian or San Marino citizens and by age and sex.

Table 4 shows the distribution of these cases. 24.5 percent of the San Marino male cases were between the ages of 20 to 29 years. For

One carrier was admitted to hospital several times as was a man of 2 years old. Children of natural parents born in absence of the last individual were positive for S. typhosa. Children were also isolated in the urine.

1. Age and Sex:

Young people were characteristically most often affected, approximately 50 percent of all cases having involved individuals over 10 and under 30 years of age. Slightly more than 50 percent of all positive cases reported were in the 10-29 age group.

Married men in excess in all age groups over 19 and as Table 3 shows also contributed most for the total experience.

Because reliable population data are not available a precise evaluation of age and sex differences is not possible. Such discrepancy as is noted in the data may be due to factors such as:

- (1) Power males in the Italian population at risk because of service in the Italian Army, being prisoners of war or having been taken by the Germans for forced labor.
- (2) Possible immunity resulting from inoculation on received during service in the Italian Army.
- (3) Greater exposure risk of females because they generally are the mainstay of all members of the family.

The factor of there being fewer Italian males at risk was evaluated on the basis of an analysis of the cases which developed in the Republic of San Marino and were reported there. These were classified as to whether they were Italian or San Marino citizens and by age and sex.

Table 4 shows the distribution of these cases. 24.7 percent of the San Marino male cases were between the ages of 20 to 29 years. For female the figure was 14.4 percent. This would appear to be a significant difference. It therefore is not unlikely that part of the excess of females in the 20-29 group may be attributed to the hypothesis that there were fewer males at risk in this population fraction.

In general the data support the premise that families are exposed to greater risk of infection because they were other risk members of the family.

It was felt that mass immunization would be impractical because of the dispersal of contacts over a wide area. This would require considerable extra personnel and in any case would not substantially alter the course of the outbreak as much as prompt discovery and isolation of cases.

Furthermore there was discovery of a ring on the part of most of the Italian physicians in the area that immunization using an attenuated of Typhoid fever was dangerous because of the so-called "negative phase" phenomenon. Immunity as it was referred to a number of individuals already infected with typhoid fever and subjects to immunization received, it was felt that this might further precipitate their condition against mass immunization at a later date.

However it was recognized that the physicians and other personnel working in the isolation hospital be immunized. Immunization was also made available for close contacts and others who were in the area. During January 1952 the civilian physician who was acting as Director of the Hospital, and two other members of the staff, a nurse and a clerk, developed typhoid fever. Only then was it discovered that despite the vaccination made, less than half of the hospital staff submitted to immunization.

A Spring immunization program has been planned in the area to include 6,000 persons in Pavia and Pavia Province. The program will be on a voluntary basis, except for school children and other residents of Italian law to be immunized. The program has already started and judging

Inasmuch as it was probable that a number of individuals already infected would become sick. Suspects are immunization received, it was felt that this might further prejudice public opinion against mass immunization at a later date.

However it was recommended that the physicians and other personnel working in the isolation hospital be immunized. Immunizations were thus made available for case contacts and others who worked there. Early in January 1945 the civilian physician who was acting as Director of the Hospital, and two other members of the staff, a nurse and a clerk, developed Typhoid fever. Only then was it discovered that despite the vaccination mass, less than half of the hospital staff submitted to immunization.

A Spring immunization program has been planned in the area to include 60,000 persons in Parma and Ferrara Provinces. The program will be on a voluntary basis, except for school children and others required by Italian law to be immunized. The program has already started and judging from the numbers already vaccinated, should be successful.

The vaccine being used is Italian vaccine produced by SOLAYO and used for by the two Provinces.

d. Environmental Sanitation:

Reference has already been made to the unsanitary state of sanitation in the area. The most serious situation was that in the City of

Harbor which had been severely battered.

The civilians crowded about water pumps had not been killed previously by the civil water engineer. Bombing and shelling produced numerous fatalities in the water mains and some 60 interruptions were found in the sewerage system.

Most habitable buildings remained more or less unharmed by civilians who returned after Hualto City was liberated. Allied troops had also billeted in the city, further contributing to crowding.

Orders were issued to prevent further ingress of civilians into the city unless it could be shown that adequate housing was available. Furthermore, on 26 October, the Republic of San Marino was placed "Out of Bounds" to everyone, military as well as civilians; no one could enter or leave without authority from the area commandant. However, despite the precautions taken, some movement did occur because of the critical military value of policies.

27 December, Royal Army Spain, as had succeeded in capturing a child-stationed water supply to the inhabited part of the city. Public latrines were built in strategic parts of the city under the direction of Deputy Assistant Director of Hygiene of the Area and the 19 Field Army Unit. After a cleaning service was reactivated and refuse containers were distributed.

An extensive reconstruction project is now under way in Hualto City under Allied Military Government direction, and the sewerage system is being repaired.

Water supply in the Huachile of San Marino is still a problem because it has not yet been possible to restore electricity required to operate the water pumping machinery. Meanwhile water is supplied to those areas which are without, by water carts and containers. A limited quantity is being pumped to the city of San Marino by means of a fuel operated pump.

It may be of interest to comment on the slightly exaggerated importance which was attached to disinfection by the civil health authorities, the apparent lines being to practically eliminate the town with crowded and ill. Limited supplies of alcohol were made available to help with the requirements of domestic hygiene.

Campesinos constituted another problem because the pressing agricultural emergency required to empty fields had been put out of operation. Trucks were reported to be stuck in the mud on the roads. The transport situation to supply liniment such as alcohol to disinfect cesspools was frequently interrupted. This practice indicates the urgency of the case, because best medical disinfection of wastes is desirable. Typical and particularly organisms are spread and are distributed by the other more viable organisms generally present.

Environmental sanitation remains a serious problem. However, considerable progress is being made and the situation is not much more improved than it was before the war.

On 20 October, the Republic of San Marino was placed "Out of Bounds" to everyone, military as well as civilians; no one could enter or leave without authority from the area commander. However, inside the perimeter, there were no movements and because of the practical difficulty of policing.

Casapola continued another problem because the laundry operators customarily required to empty them had been put out of commission. Baskets were reported to be in these circumstances here as casapola became full. The temptation to employ disinfectant such as cresol to disinfect casapola was apparently uncontrolled. This practice defeats the purpose of the casapola because bacterial decomposition of wastes is desirable. Typhoid and dysentery organisms are suppressed and eliminated by the other more stable organisms generally present.

Environmental sanitation remains a serious problem. However, considerable progress is being made and the situation is now much more improved than was previously believed possible.

6. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS:

- a. An outbreak of typhoid and dysentery had never been developed in the San Marino - Rimini Commune area on the Adriatic coast of Italy during August and September 1944, resulted in 1132 known positive cases.

b. The preceding causes were extensive overrunning of defenses and contact of many persons under irreparably bad sanitary conditions with individuals already ill.

c. On the basis of laboratory findings, typhoid infection was found to predominate.

d. Multiple household cases occurred in 66 instances involving 167 individuals, or 42 percent of all the family cases reported in Rimini District. Families predominated in these household groups, averaging almost 66 percent.

e. Careful attention was paid to the initial outbreak cases have identified 51 individuals who are eliminating organisms, by typhoid and 12 paratyphoid.

f. The data appears to support the hypothesis that typhoid cases in various outbreaks for the reason that they are exposed to a greater risk of infection because they nurse the sick to a greater extent than is usual.

g. The outbreak resulted in 33 known deaths having a case fatality rate of 8.1 percent. There was a positive correlation with age.

h. Control measures were essentially those of case finding and hospitalization, the fundamental cause of the outbreak having remained itself. It is believed that prompt isolation of suspected cases effectively limited the number of secondary cases which might otherwise have resulted.

i. The characteristic difficulties of lack of civilian hospital, laboratory, and transport facilities were encountered. Health Area Medical Services rendered invaluable assistance.

GENERAL

1. The rapid development of the military situation in northern Italy during April has brought the activity of the officers of this Subcommission into its final phase. The surrender of the Germans automatically removes that portion of its work which concerned the protection of Italian monuments during battle operations. Its chief work now are those of requisition of buildings, first-aid to war-damaged monuments, and the recuperation of the displaced objects of art. The latter has assumed tremendous importance and is well in hand.
2. As a result the movement of the officers of the Subcommission has been considerable and their powers have been strained to the extreme. Their present posts are as follows. Lt. Col. Gardner is at EMILIA, Lieut. Capt. UMBR, Capt. McGinn, and Major Bell are in LOMBARDIA, Capt. Entwoven is with PLEISTINE Region, Capt. Harrist is with VENEZIA Region, Capt. Keller is with aid, 5 Army, Maj. Newton is with aid, 8 Army, and Capt. Pinant is with EMILIA Region. Three officers have been removed from activity; Capt. Penroyer has been borrowed for emergency work with the Displaced Persons Subcommission, and Capt. Brooke and Craft-Murray have been assigned to 8 Army for AUGUSTA. Lt. Col. De Wold, Lt. Col. Ward-Pat and Capt. Moore are at HQ. AC.

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LADIC

3. All the Region of LADIC has been handed back to the Italian Government.

UMBRIA-MARCHES

4. This region has now passed under the control of the Italian Government. Before the hand-over, however, the most important projects had been well in hand or completed. In UMBRIA, at PERUGINO the repairs to the Duomo are practically completed and the work on the Palazzo Publico advancing satisfactorily. The work on the churches at TUDICI is also in hand. In the MARCHES, AS, still has much work to be finished. The museum treasures have all been recovered from beneath

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5. The bus is at P.O. 25014. was opened to the public. The transportation (2 bus 45) was marked by an exhibition number 25014, also with a copy of the plan of Pietro Porcino.

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6. Generally no work in FLORENCE, PISTOIA and AREZZO Provinces continues satisfactorily; that in the Provinces of CROSSINO and SUFFI, which are now being handed over to the Italians, has been slow owing to the inactivity of the Italian officials.
7. Progress is noted in the work on the devastated regions and at S. Stefano at FERRARA. The work on the Bulla is completed. Air-raid protection is being carried out systematically and the Government.
8. In EMILIA Province work proceeds at S. Martino and the Collegiate at MODENA, at REGGIO, at BOLOGNA, at GALLURA, at CARPI, at Sassuolo, and at Carpi. The work at ROMA - S. Maria, at LUSTE - S. Maria, at PISA di LUSTE, at SICCONE, at SICCONE, at PRAGUEVA has been practically completed.
9. At PISTOIA, the churches of S. Demetrio and S. Giovanni Battista and the Palazzo del Reale are receiving attention.
10. In ALESSANDRIA Province no reports have been received from the Superintendent as to the work on San Giacomo at PERUGINA and the Collegiate at CASTEL D'ALBA. The best restoration in Tuscany has been sent to take charge of the threatened frescoes in the Collegiate at SAN GIULIANO.
11. In PIA work continues on the Church, S. Paolo e Rita d'Arena, S. Cristoforo, S. Domenico, the Cappuccini, S. Cecilia, S. Nicolo in Borgo, S. Stefano, S. Michele, Santa Sofia, S. Biagio in Salsomaggiore, etc Royal Palace, and S. Piero in Grado outside the city.
12. In LIGURIA urgent repairs were undertaken to prevent the collapse of S. Prudente, and salvage operations continue in the Cathedral, the Synagogue, S. Giovanni, and SS. Annunziata del Gradi.
13. Many buildings need attention in the recently liberated province of APUZIA.

14. Until the advance to the north this Region had been under control of a S of both 5 and 8 Armies. Assistance had been previously given to PZEF, TAFEL, TAFEL, and PZEF. Both the advance, as advance reports have been received on the completion of operations at FUSCULO, OTTOMIA, LULA, GASTAL MOUNTAIN, AGACUL, PLAS. TAFEL, BESO D. 26. The Italian Government has appointed Prof. Luigi Venturi to head an Italian Section to collect information on works of art which have been removed by the enemy.

27. The Ministry of Public Instruction has supplied this Subcommission with lists of Italian personnel in the art-field in northern Italy. Names have been submitted to officers in the north.

28. The Superintendent of Galleries at Bologna furnished a preliminary list of monuments damaged in the Bologna and Bologna provinces. The Ministry furnished a similar list of damaged monuments for Parma and Modena. The Vatican sent in a detailed report of damage to churches in Pavia.

PLANNING - GENERAL

1. During the first three weeks of April, the Branch was mainly occupied with final planning for N. Italy. The most important development in this connection, was the temporary authority, for the issue of clothing and Italian Military rations to Patriots in Centres or Hospitals, issued by AFM on 14 April, pending a decision on the matter by the Combined Chiefs of Staff.

In the middle of the month Major Smea held three short courses with 5 Army, for the purpose of giving Allied Officers from the Northern Regions, instruction on the Allied Commission Plan for Patriots in N. Italy (94/Pat of 7 Apr 45), and of showing them Patriot Centres already in operation. The numbers of officers attending these courses were as follows:

It has been difficult to make detailed plans for hospitalization, owing to the uncertainty as to where, and how much medical treatment will be required; the Ministry of Occupied Italy however agreed that if, and when, it was necessary to evacuate Patriots to civilian hospitals, special wards would be set aside for them. This has now been put into effect in various places, e.g. Modena, where 150 Patriots have been admitted to the hospital.

CENTRES

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In the middle of the month Major Snow held three short courses with 5 Army, for the purpose of giving Allied Officers from the Northern Regions, instruction on the Allied Commission plan for Patriots in N. Italy (94/Fat of 7 Apr 45), and of showing them Patriot Centres already in operation. The numbers of officers attending these courses were as follows:

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CENTRES

2. One of the first results of the Allied Advance was that the Patriots Centres at Florence and Pavia passed from 5 Army control to Poona Region. It also enabled many Patriots to return to their homes in Bologna and other areas, and it is hoped that, with the consequent reduction of numbers in Ravenna and Florence, it may be possible to close these Centres in the near future.

By the end of the month new centres had been opened at Modena and Bologna; the numbers encountered however in the Massa and Ferrara areas, did not call for the establishment of centres with permanent accommodation in these places.

DISARMING

3. The only report of disarming up to the end of April, came from Bologna, where on 25 April, approx. 4,000 Patriots handed in their arms, at a most successful parade, held by General Major Clark and attended by a number of senior Allied Officers.

It is known that since then disarming parades have been held at Modena (800 to 10,000 Patriots), Verona (5,000 Patriots), Vicenza (7,000 Patriots), and Torino. While plans were in hand 10 smaller parades at an early date at the following places:

MEASURES TAKEN BY THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

4. The Ministry of War has announced its intention of issuing a special medal ribbon for Patriots.

The Ministry of Occupied Italy has transferred to the Allied Commission the sum of 3 million lire, in reimbursement of funds expended in connection with Patriots, prior to 1 April 1945. The Ministry has also stated that combatant Patriots will be granted the same family allowances as are given to members of the fighting forces.

PERSONNEL

TO : CIVIL AFFAIRS SECTION.

1. The Sub Commission has studied the Italian Government's plan for the holding of municipal elections which are scheduled on the pre-Fascist law of 1915. This revealed that the proposed system was antiquated, cumbersome and contained many substantial defects. First, it was cumbersome, might lead to early the corruption of voters and electoral officials, misuse of the ballot by voters, and political party pressure. There was accordingly reason to doubt the possibility of an independent, free and secret vote being obtained under the proposed system. Some of the principal defects were: (a) no formal nomination of candidates prior to voting; (b) no official ballot paper; no control of absenteeism in the polling places. The Italian Government has currently no intention of introducing any measures to be used, should be taken prior to the holding of elections to secure that under the control of the Government. The Government was also informed that the editor of the Italian press could not communicate the holding of elections in the territory under the 1915 system and that substantial improvements and amendments thereto leading to establish an truly democratic procedure on that day to be made as far as the Territory was concerned.

2. Shortly before the advance to the north, the Government again raised the subject of the appointment of Prefects and other senior officials in the local of Italy presumably as a result of the position of affairs in the local of Italy officers exclusively by Italy on the basis. Government had plan and it was agreed that similar such arrangements were ultimately for all to decide. It was, having regard to present conditions, proper for the Government to have at once facility to express their views thereon. It was, therefore, arranged that the Government should submit the names of persons they suggested for appointment as Prefects and other officials in the northern provinces and that these could be considered by the Government. This to 31 March 1942, 13 officials nominated by the Ministry of Interior with 43 failed to move to new positions. Their services are urgently required. Ten of these officials have been granted and three family reasons. The Government is beginning to be aware of certain of the officials who had been included in the pool of officials for use in the north of Italy and which would be required. 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6. Contact has been maintained with the appropriate departments of the Ministry of the Interior with regard to routine matters concerning the appointment, transfer and removal of officials. These included arrangements for the temporary appointment of a new Prefect for Sion. The final appointment was left to the Ministry, in view of the importance of the position of that province to the Italian administration. A vacancy at Vice Prefect was also filled at Sion. Similar subordinate offices were dealt with in respect of other provinces.

7. While the Ministry of Interior has completed the investigation of the cases of all its officials in connection with espionage, and has initiated proceedings against some 315 officials, the actual trial of the cases has proceeded slowly. Only twelve cases were concluded in the month of April, leaving 177 to be concluded before 15th July next. This manufacturing position has been pointed out to the Minister of Interior and he has been asked to give an assurance that the outstanding cases will be concluded in time.

8. At the request of the Ministry of Interior, and was requested to endeavor to locate and protect the files and records of the Ministry of officials of the Italian administration which were reserved by the Republican Fascists to their departure from Rome and which were now thought to be in Vienna.

9. Answers to questions on matters of interest and future policy regarding subjects within the interests of the Sion Commission were provided for Civil Affairs Section's report to ARMC.

The total collapse of the Germans and unconditional surrender in the first week of May, makes further comment unnecessary.

3. MEDICAL.

Health continues to be good. The epidemic of typhoid fever at A.S. Examination Camp No. 27, PIAZZA has no loss. A mass radiography test was carried out on the inhabitants of CIVIGLIA Reception Centre by the Civil Health Division, which revealed that 6% had some form of tuberculosis.

(iv) Food Supplies.

During the month a similar form of registration for would-be repatriated Italians to that in use at S.B.A.B.P., with certain modifications was adopted for Italy.

SVZ-Sa, BARI and GINE CITT. Genoves were inspected during the month, also all Camps on the Adriatic coast, where improvements in the sanitary conditions were carried out. Water supply at GINE CITT. was tested and improved.

(iii) Health.

Health continues to be good. The epidemic of typhoid fever at Evacuation Camp No. 27, FIANCOSA has ended. A mass radiography test was carried out on the inhabitants of GINE CITT. Reception Centre by the Italian Health Division, which revealed that 68 had some form of tuberculosis.

(iv) Food Supplies.

Over 1,700 Allied Nationals in Rome are receiving extra food on medical grounds.

4. ITALIAN REFUGEES.

During April, approximately 3,000 Italian refugees arrived in Rome from the North, the majority coming from the RIMINI area. The first party of 400 persons were returned to their homes in the Emilia area. 1591 Italians coming from Sicily, Sardinia or the South were repatriated.

5. REPatriation.

(a) General.

Further restrictions and difficulties regarding repatriation were cited. The French authorities agreed to accept their own nationals without prior reference to Paris, and arrangements were initiated to repatriate the first group of

French nationals. The Belgian authorities are likely to adopt a similar policy.

The British Embassy, Rome, is now authorized to grant visas for the U.K. to British born women married to Italians without having to refer cases to the Foreign Office.

The granting of M.T. to U.S. citizens has been greatly speeded up, and the U.S. War Shipping Board is willing to supply accommodation to U.S. civilians in Naples awaiting repatriation.

The Egyptian authorities have requested that no further visas be granted to Italians to return to Egypt.

ALLIED MILITARY COMMISSION

1. In preparation for the Allied services it was necessary to provide legal personnel for the northern regions before any further territory was actually occupied. The consequent withdrawal of officers from the Italian-Italian regions and from Naples (where the military police of the number of cases heard by US Courts during the month. In certain areas, such as the inland portions of UMBRIA-MARCHE, the withdrawal of Allied troops has led to a reduction in the number of crimes committed, or at least the withdrawal of US troops has reduced the number of crimes detected. In most districts however the differences have continued, but have been referred to the Italian Court for trial.

2. There has been little serious crime. The General Court sitting in Florence for the hearing of espionage cases concluded the calendar of cases immediately ready for trial and was therefore closed. The Military Court in Rome continued to hear cases until about 20 April 1945. There is still a small number of cases awaiting trial in this area. Of the espionage cases reviewed in this area during the month, 2 death sentences were pronounced, 2 prison sentences were affirmed and 1 conviction was quashed.

3. There were 3 other General Courts held during the month; two were out the killing of Allied personnel. In one case the accused were acquitted in the other, which arose in Italian Government territory and was therefore tried under Italian law, a sentence of 15 years imprisonment was imposed. The third case was the trial of a man, 21 years of age, who was charged with the murder of a man, together with two of his assistants. The allegation of the prosecution was that over a long period of time the accused had obtained registration and had authorized the treatment of the accused from the hospital of a man named investigation. After a long and detailed trial, before a court which included one official officer who was a specialist in venereal diseases, the accused was acquitted.

4. Apart from these cases the type of crime has remained substantially unchanged. The number of Allied officers from the part of the area appear to be on the increase.

5. There has been no report of any US Court case having been held in any of the newly liberated areas.

6. The additional cases entrusted to the Italian Courts as the result of the above policy have increased the already heavy burden on those Courts. Nevertheless

In most instances however the offenses have continued, but have been referred to the Italian Courts for trial.

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3. There were 3 other General Court cases held during the month; two arose out of the killing of Allied personnel. In one case the accused was acquitted. In the other, which arose in Italian Government territory, it was the first time since the Italian law, a sentence of 15 years imprisonment was imposed. The third case was the trial of two, Dr. VIGIS, Chief Director of the Race Hospital in Naples, together with two of his assistants. The allegation of the prosecution was that over a long period of time the accused had provided registration and had authorized the premature release from the hospital of diseased prisoners. After a long and detailed trial, before a court which included one local officer who was a specialist in venereal diseases, the accused were acquitted.

4. Apart from these cases the type of crime has remained substantially unchanged. Thefts of Allied stores from the port of Ancona appear to be on the increase.

5. There has been no report of any MG Court case having been held in any of the newly liberated areas.

6. The additional cases entrusted to the Italian Courts as the result of the above policy have increased the already heavy burden on these Courts. Nevertheless they are doing their best to cope with their difficulties and are continuing as much as possible with the Allies in the disposition of cases affecting Allied interests. The situation is still not entirely satisfactory in the areas around Bari and Naples where large scale thefts from the various depots and stores continue.

7. Further sessions of the Court of Cassation took place in April and May 1945. They were largely concerned in the trial of Fascist officials.

8. In order to provide a number of men for trial for these crimes in north and Italy who have been convicted since the end of the war, the Italian Government has asked a number of Italian Courts of Cassation to hear cases. These Courts consist of a panel of 5, the president being a judicial officer and the 4 lay members being selected from a list supplied by the State. This Court was asked to hear two in the territory and was put into operation immediately upon the entry of Allied troops into the area. These Courts appear to have had an unfortunate reputation from the local population: owing to the time taken in the formation of the Court panels and

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the "institutional" period of the trials, the courts will not be ready to hear their first cases for about a month.

ECONOMIC POLICY AND REVENUE IN ITALY

9. As a result of the decision to establish, upon initial occupation of the northern territory, a cordon sanitaire so as to prevent or at least delay the spread of inflation from southern Italy it has been necessary to suspend for the north the operation of a number of Italian Government decrees which had been brought into operation by AM in the territory previously occupied. A special AMG order was accordingly published in the Gazzetta Ufficiale suspending the operation of these laws until further notice.

10. The publication of this order represents an extension of the principle of implementation hitherto adopted. Previously the only order in the Gazzetta were simple orders bringing into operation, in their entirety, approved Italian decrees. The present order utilizes the Italian Official Gazette as a channel for the publication of AMG orders suspending or modifying Italian decrees which had previously been approved. The Minister of Justice is entirely in agreement with this form of procedure.

11. To all to some extent the void created by the suspension of these decrees the following General Orders have been issued.

General Order 41, establishing wage rates and price levels in the north;
 " " 40, fixing corn rates and agricultural rules.
 " " 42, fixing transportation rates.

AMG IMPLEMENTATION

12. In addition to the General Orders mentioned above, the following General Orders were prepared.

General Order 39 and 38 A for Italian frontier control;
 " " 43 for control of civilians in their relations with surrendered German troops;
 " " 44 for control of currency and exchange rates.

ITALIAN LEGISLATION

13. After prolonged negotiations, the Italian Government finally issued the Decree for the constitution of CIP as the body for the control and distribution of petroleum products throughout Italy.

14. A decree has been passed abrogating all limitations on the freedom of listening to radio broadcasts. The limitation had, in practice, been suspended since the armistice, but two cases were recently discovered in which charges were still listed as "pending" for the offense of listening to the German radio in 1942.

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CIVIL AFFAIRS SECTIONMonthly Report - April 1945

General.

1. a) During the month the Vice President, Civil Affairs Section and Heads of Sub-Commissions visited SCAO, IV Corps to tie up plans for Northwest Italy.
- b) The final plan of the Section for Northern Italy was issued.

Refascism

2. A decree establishing Special Courts of Assize to try civilian collaborators has been adopted (ILL 142 of 22 April 1945). It has been implemented for Northern Italy and is intended to prevent the functioning of illegal popular courts and other forms of summary justice in the recently liberated territories. The Bench consists of a professional judge and four popular judges chosen from panels of local persons of accepted probity. The panels are prepared by CLNs of the provincial capitals. No reports have as yet been received regarding the functioning of these courts, but they are expected shortly.

3. General Order 35 which is intended to accomplish a preliminary epuration of employees of Government offices and parastatal institutions in North Italy and which was modelled after the basic Italian epuration law, ILL 159, is in effect in most of the North territory. Most of the Government officials who fled to the North and who cannot be charged with criminal responsibility are expected to be affected.

4. New decrees which are expected to become law very soon have been discussed at length with the Govt and deal with the extension of the procedural time limits for certain epuration proceedings, the substitution of judges by lawyers and law professors as presidents of commissions of first instance, the forfeiture of corruptly gained wealth during the fascist regime, and the disqualification of persons of specified Fascist antecedents from holding managerial positions in important companies.

5. As to Epuration generally, in the Principal Ministerial about 26,000 of the 45,000 employees have been scrutinized 6,300 have been sent for trial; of these, 2,770 cases have been concluded, resulting in 700 dismissals. In addition, there have been numerous compulsory retirements and other lesser punishments.

Mine Clearance

6. There are now four Italian Mine Clearing Companies operating under Allied Commission. The two Companies at PESCARA are being moved into EMILIA Region for work in that area. The Company at LIVORNO is under orders to move into North Italy with the 75 CXX when he moves. The 5th Company formed at CORTINA will be moved to the 75 CXX when he moves.

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Mine Clearance

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7. On the civilian side, a new Zone has been opened in EMILIA Region and has begun operations. A number of Italian officers earmarked for the Northern Regions have gone forward to form new Zones if they are required.

8. Information is not available as to the extent of minefields in the North but it is thought that with the rapid advance of the Allies the enemy had little time to lay minefields outside last winter's line.

9. It is now considered that Mine Clearance should be given higher priority than it has had in the past and that more Italian Military personnel should be allotted for this work and that the necessary equipment and transport should be released at an early date.

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- 2 -

10. Visits were paid to the squads working in EMILIA Region. In this area 674 minefields have already been located. Good work is being done, but lack of transport is a considerable handicap.

11. A visit was also paid to TOSCANA Region where Zone 5 Mine Clearing organization is working. Replacements of the officers sent to the north have been made but here again lack of transport is the drawback to the expansion of the scheme.

12. Many thousands of mines have been lifted during the month. The figures reported are over 133,000.

Distribution of Clothing

13. During April a small quantity of repaired clothing was received from the Commerce Sub-Commission (1,300 blouses, 1,200 pairs of trousers, 600 overcoats, 2,800 pairs of shoes, etc), and distributed to Patriots Branch and Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUB-COMMISSION

14. The Italian Government's proposed system for the conduct of municipal elections, based on a law of 1915, has been examined and found to be an antiquated one which lends itself to corruption. A recommendation for the amendment of the law before elections are held has been sent to the Government. The Government has also been informed that the holding of elections under the 1915 system will not be countenanced in AMG Territory unless a more truly democratic procedure is adopted.

15. A Directive has been issued to senior AMG officers setting out the policy to be followed and the attitude to be adopted by AMG to the CLN in Northern Italy. This Directive states that although it is the policy of the Allied Commission to support the Italian Government, the CLNs must be treated with the courtesy due to their political position and their past labours; the advice of the CLNs should be sought and acted upon in so far as it does not conflict with the Policy of AMG.

16. Shortly before the advance to the North, the Government again raised the subject of the appointment of Prefects and other senior officials in the North of Italy and the possibility of the CLN desiring to fill such offices exclusively by their own nominees. Conversations took place and it was agreed that whilst such appointments were ultimately for AMG to decide, it was proper for the Government to have an opportunity to express their views thereon and it was arranged that the Government should submit the names of persons they suggest for appointment as Prefects and Questors in the Northern provinces and that these would be considered by AMG, together with any nominees proposed by the CLN or from any other source.

17. Contact has been maintained with the Ministry of Interior regarding routine matters affecting the appointment, transfer and removal of officials in AMG Territory.

18. The Ministry of Interior has completed the sputation investigation of all its officials but actual trial proceedings have progressed slowly. The Ministry

LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUB-COMMISSION

14. The Italian Government's proposed system for the conduct of municipal elections, based on a law of 1915, has been examined and found to be an antiquated one which lends itself to corruption. A recommendation for the amendment of the law before elections are held has been sent to the Government. The Government has also been informed that the holding of elections under the 1915 system will not be countenanced in AMG Territory unless a more truly democratic procedure is adopted.

15. A Directive has been issued to senior AMG officers setting out the policy to be followed and the attitude to be adopted by AMG to the CLN in Northern Italy. This Directive states that although it is the policy of the Allied Commission to support the Italian Government, the CLNs must be treated with the courtesy due to their political position and their past labours; the advice of the CLNs should be sought and acted upon in so far as it does not conflict with the Policy of AMG.

16. Shortly before the advance to the North, the Government again raised the subject of the appointment of Prefects and other senior officials in the North of Italy and the possibility of the CLN desiring to fill such offices exclusively by their own nominees. Conversations took place and it was agreed that whilst such appointments were ultimately for AMG to decide, it was proper for the Government to have an opportunity to express their views thereon and it was arranged that the Government should submit the names of persons they suggest for appointment as Prefects and Questori in the Northern Provinces and that these would be considered by AMG, together with any nominees proposed by the CLN or from any other source.

17. Contact has been maintained with the Ministry of Interior regarding routine matters affecting the appointment, transfer and removal of officials in AMG Territory.

18. The Ministry of Interior has completed the epuration investigation of all its officials but actual trial proceedings have progressed slowly. The Ministry has been requested to ensure the Allied Commission that outstanding trials will be concluded within a time programme.

19. The Sub-Commission conducted a survey of local government conditions in the provinces of FORLÌ and RAVENNA which were found to be satisfactory.

20. There is some reluctance, prompted by economic reasons, on the part of Italian officials to proceed to Northern Provinces. Conversations have taken place with the Ministry of Interior regarding this attitude and it has been urged that in the event of their services being required, the arrangements made to effect the speedy arrival of officials are maintained.

EDUCATION SUB-COMMISSION

21. Move to the North. - The activities of the Sub-Commission were concentrated on getting ready for the occupation of the Northern Regions, to which Education Officers were sent at the end of the month from all Regions South of Emilia and from Headquarters.

22. Meeting in Rome. - A meeting of Regional Education Officers was held in Rome on 27 April for final briefing on plans for the North.

23. Civilian Specialist-Assistants. - A small group of Provveditori agli Studi from Central Italy were brought to Rome on 27 and 28 April and prepared to go North as civilian specialist-assistants to Regional Education Officers to counter the shortage of Allied Personnel.

24. Umbria-Marche, Toscana, Emilia. - In Umbria-Marche and Toscana Regions and in the Provinces of Forlì and Ravenna schools were functioning, books were distributed, note books were being printed (half a million in Toscana alone), lunches were being served to increasing numbers of children, some building repair was going on, and a few derequisitions of buildings were taking place.

25. SIENA. - The Minister of Public Instruction accompanied the Director of the Education Sub-Commission on a visit to a number of schools in the city and province of Siena and the University of Siena.

26. United States Information Service (USIS). - There has been close liaison between the Education Sub-Commission and the United States Information Service (USIS). Requests received from American and Italian sources are discussed and decisions are made as to whether they can best be handled by Education Sub-Commission or USIS. The USIS Education Bulletin is prepared in consultation with the Education Sub-Commission, and distributed to schools through the Minister.

27. Publication. - Four of the five books for which permission to translate has been obtained gratis are either in the press or being translated; these are for the series on Allied Education.

Plans have been made for the USIS to print three books for free distribution to school children next fall.

The USIS is seeking translation rights and Italian publishers for the thirty or forty books of juvenile literature selected on the initiative of the Education Sub-Commission.

28. British Council and British Institute. Preliminary contacts have been made with the newly arrived members of the British Council and British Institute.

29. Cultural Interchange. - A special meeting was held with the Vice President, Civil Affairs Section, Monuments and Fine Arts Sub-Commission, the Minister of Public Instruction and this Sub-Commission, to discuss cultural interchange. In addition to expressing his approval of the actions already underway in this field, the Minister agreed to appoint two committees to study means of bringing about an interchange of professors and students between Italy and Allied Nations.

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30. University Examinations. - A decree has been prepared to allow special university examinations for students who were unable to take the regular ones because of work with the Partisans.

31. Examinations. - The Minister of Public Instruction, the Minister of Justice and the High Commissioner have finally set up provincial operation committees under ILL 159 in most of the provinces south of Emilia.

32. Youth Activities. -

a) A working plan for Patronato Scolastico (student aid associations) has finally been issued by the Minister.

- b) A temporary resolution on the taking over of the property of the Fascist Youth Organisation (GIL) by the Provveditorato agli Studi, for youth activities, has been worked out and put into effect for the North.
- c) The American Junior Red Cross is sending 20,000 packages of school and toilet supplies for distribution to needy school children through the Italian Junior Red Cross.
- d) The Boy Scout and Girl Guide movements are growing in importance and in number of participants. There were rallies in both Rome and Florence on St. George's day, involving thousands of children.

LEGAL SUB-COMMISSION

33. The provisions of Allied legal personnel for the Northern Regions has become effective during the month with the result that the activities of the Allied Military Courts in existing AMG areas has been curtailed, and the number of cases tried by such Courts has been substantially reduced. This does not indicate a reduction in crime of the type normally handled in these courts. Theft and illegal possession again form the bulk of the AMG Court cases.

34. a) There were few cases of serious crime tried in AMG Courts. One case, involving the death of an Allied Officer, occurred in Italian Government Territory and was therefore tried under Italian law. The accused was sentenced to 13 years imprisonment.

b) Considerable local interest was caused by the trial of Prof. DE AMICIS and DR. ELASIO, Directors of the Fate Medical Hospital in Naples, on charges alleging the improper release by them from the hospital of uncurved prostitutes. The trial lasted 3 weeks; the accused were acquitted.

c) Of 5 espionage cases reviewed, 2 death sentences were confirmed, 2 prison sentences were affirmed, and one conviction quashed.

35. The reduction in the number of cases heard by AMG Courts has involved an increase in the already heavy load borne by the Italian Courts. In Naples these Courts are doing their best, but they have heavy lists of arrears; in Toscana they are glad of the opportunity of undertaking the additional work and are producing very satisfactory results.

36. The economic policy originally planned for the northern territory has been slightly modified. This has necessitated a further Order in the Official Gazette to suspend from operation the Italian laws increasing rates of salaries and allowances which are in force in the South. General Orders, 40, 41 and 42 were drafted to establish the economic policy in the North and to provide rules for agriculture and transportation rates.

37. The Italian Government finally passed, at the request of Allied Commission, the decree constituting I.I.P. as a legal body. This decree, which has been accepted as satisfactory by AMG, Allied Commission and the Italian Government, represents

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34. a) There were few cases of serious crime tried in AMG Courts. One case, involving the death of an Allied Officer, occurred in Italian Government Territory and was therefore tried under Italian law. The accused was sentenced to 19 years imprisonment.

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37. The Italian Government finally passed, at the request of Allied Commission, the decree constituting J.I.P. as a legal body. This decree, which has been accepted as satisfactory by AFHQ, Allied Commission and the Italian Government, represents the results of 11 months' negotiations to establish the relationship between J.I.P. and the Italian oil industry.

PUBLIC HEALTH SUB-COMMISSION

38. The Italian Government has appointed a Central Advisory Commission for Public Health. This is a temporary body taking the place of the Superior Council for Public Health which in the past had advised the Public Health Division of the Ministry of Interior on all matters pertaining to the health of the nation. The term of office of the Central Advisory Commission is for one year after the cessation of hostilities.

39. Small-Pox.

a) Many cases of smallpox continue to be notified from Naples City and Naples Province despite the fact that over three million vaccinations have been performed. It is felt that the whole vaccination programme in Naples should be overhauled and representation to this effect have been made to the Italian Government as a result of which a medical inspector has been sent to Naples to investigate and report on the situation.

b) 274 cases have been reported from Naples Province during April; 62 from Avellino; 14 from Salerno; 6 from Grosupono; and 1 from each of the Provinces Rome, Palermo, Catanzaro and Comobasso.

40. Malaria.

a) The Military Authorities agreed to lend this Sub-Commission fifty tons of Paris green. Of these 50 tons, 30 have been allocated to the Italian Government and 10 tons each have been given to Emilia and Venezia Regions.

b) The Anti-Malarial project on the Pontine Marshes continues, but is seriously hampered by the lack of transport.

c) Every effort is being made to obtain tyres for vehicles required for anti-malarial work but without success.

d) The Tiber Delta demonstration project is nearing completion and the adult and larval capture phase of the programme is about to begin. So far, some 4,350 buildings have been treated.

41. Undulant Fever. - A certain number of cases of undulant fever are still reported from Toscana Region.

42. Hospitalization of Prostitutes. - The Italian Government has replied to this Sub-Commission's recommendations concerning the establishment of a 600 bed hospital for infected prostitutes in Rome. The reply has been submitted to the Military Authorities and it is understood that the whole problem is at present under consideration by AFHQ.

43. Infant Mortality. - The infant mortality rate for Rome was 67.4 in March, as compared with 111.5 in February.

44. Tuberculosis. - The number of deaths in Rome Commune from all forms of Tuberculosis in March was 256, as compared with 190 in February.

45. Veterinary.

a) It is considered that the veterinary services in Italian Government Territory are now functioning with the same efficiency as was to be found in pre-war days and, so far as this Sub-Commission is concerned, nothing further remains to be done in that area.

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- b) Foot and Mouth Disease, hog cholera, sheep scabies, brucellosis and laryngotracheitis have all been reported from different provinces during the past month.
- c) Courses of instruction on bovine sterility and artificial insemination have been conducted for veterinarians in the Provinces of Rome, Viterbo and Grosseto during the month.
- d) Information concerning the availability and procurement of veterinary supplies has been circulated to all Regional Public Health Officers during the month.

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46. Medical Supplies. -

- a) ENI-DEA has increased the number of its warehouses and representatives, but is still hampered by lack of transport.
- b) A Directive dealing with the requisitioning and distribution of medical supplies and the fixing of prices of Allied medicines has been sent to all ARMs. Provincial Commissioners, Italian Government and ENI-DEA.

47. Welfare. -

- a) The regular feeding programmes are continued and children's diets are being supplemented by milk and vitamins distributed by the Ente Nazionale Distribuzione Soccorso per l'Italia.
- b) A widespread distribution of 137,000 blankets has been made during the month.
- c) Quantities of salvage material, canvas, mattress covers, etc., have been obtained through the Commerce Sub-Commission and handed over to the Italian Red Cross and the Order of Malta. This salvage material is then passed to Italian Welfare organisations which convert it into much needed and serviceable garments.

PUBLIC SAFETY SUB-COMMISSION

48. Frontier Control. - 560 Carabinieri and 1,200 Guardia di Finanza from Southern Italy have been assigned to work under the direct orders of the Italian Frontier Control Detachment CIC which is responsible for control of movement at the Northern Italian Frontier.

49. Carabinieri for Northern Regions. - The spearhead force of 5,600 Carabinieri has moved into the Northern Regions. A second "wave" of 4,000 men is moving forward.

50. Carabinieri Strength. - ARMs have authorised an increase in the CC RM dealing to a total of 65,000. However, no rations or clothing can be made available for the additional 10,000. It is hoped that an adjustment will be made with the Italian Army whereby rations and clothing will become available.

Prison Disturbances. -

51. On 5 April 1945, 100 prisoners at Regina Coeli Prison, Rome, crashed the outer gate and 23 succeeded in escaping. 4 were wounded by Carabinieri who had been called to assist.

52. On 14 April 1945, the Prison at Spoleto had its second riot in five months. Serious damage to doors and furniture resulted. Leaders were reportedly from a group recently transferred from Regina Coeli to relieve the overcrowding there.

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being supplemented by milk and vitamins distributed by the state. *Distribuzione Soccorso per l'Italia.*

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53. Portofino was the scene of a serious meeting on the part of some 450 Italian military prisoners on 20 April. The entire prison was in the hands of the prisoners for a while. CC RN and Civil Police - with armoured cars and machine guns - arrived and order was restored.

54. Sora Prison, near Frosinone, staged a riot on 29 April with the prisoners holding guards as hostages and doing considerable damage before order was restored.

55. Public Demonstrations. - Reports received from the CC RN Headquarters and the Italian Director of Public Security indicated a general feeling of resentment among the populace in Italian Government Territory as a result of rumors to the effect that Jugoslavia intends to annex Trieste. Many demonstrations and impromptu parades were held in protest, the participants being for the most part students and disabled war veterans.

56. Rear Army Security Control Line. - With effect from 28 April 1945 the Rear Army Security Control Line was adjusted to run through Porto Corsini, Ravenna, Forlì, Pesaro, Firenze, Prato, Pistoia, Lucca, Massa, Viareggio; these towns are exclusive of the Army Control Zone.

57. Fascist "ONCHI" Group. - 31 members of the "ONCHI" Group of Fascist Republicans in Rome were arrested. Eleven were subsequently released, and twenty interned. Those who escaped are not likely to become a danger to the Allies, and the Italian authorities will keep their future conduct under observation.

58. General Security Situation. - With the end of the war in sight, Italian criticism of the Allies was not so pronounced. Posters and press articles laboured the theme that Trieste must always remain Italian, and the capture of Fiume by the Yugoslav Partisans was regarded with apprehension by most Italians. The attack by the French in Aoste and the claim to Italian colonies in Africa by Ethiopia did not ease the matter.

MONUMENTS, FINE ARTS & ARCHITECTURE SUB-COMMISSION

59. Initial reports have come in concerning the condition of the recently liberated cities in the North. Damage is generally slight and the most serious situation so far reported is that at Verona and Vicenza where many of the important monuments have been damaged; Venice is untouched, as is the Abbey at Pomposa; in Bologna damage to the monuments in the centre of the city has been slight with the exception of the damage to S. Francesco, the Archiginnasio and the Ponte.

60. Deposits.

a) The deposits of the museums at Bologna and Ferrara have for the most part been returned to these cities and at Parma the deposits from the Museum at Tarento have been found safe.

b) Florentine deposits removed by the Germans from Palazzo Strozzi and Palazzo Medici to places in the Italian Tirol near Bolzano and Merano are now safe in Allied hands. It would therefore appear that the major removals from the Florence area are now under Allied Control.

61. During the month an officer from SHAPE visited this theatre to establish an Intelligence Liaison with this Sub-Commission for securing information concerning the German or Italian personnel connected with removals of Italian art to the North or to Germany.

62. The Italian Government has appointed Prof. Lionello Venturi to head an Italian Section to collect information on works of art which have been removed by the enemy.

63. The Ministry of Public Instruction has appointed Dr. Bianchi Bandinelli, a distinguished art historian and member of the University of Florence, to the post of Director General of Antiquities and Fine Arts.

64. The 10th gathering of material was sent to Washington and London, and the first set of microfilms covering the objects missing from the Montecassino deposit was despatched to London.

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PATRIOT CENTRES.

65. The most important development during the April was the temporary authority for the issue of clothing and Italian military rationals to Patriots in Centres or Hospitels, issued by ARHQ, pending a decision on the matter by the Commanding Chiefs of Staff.

66. As a result of the Allied Advance the Patriot Centres at Florence and Pesina passed from J Army control to Tuscan Region, and the liberation of Bologna and Ancona enabled many Patriots to return to their homes in these areas. By the end of the month new centres had been opened at Modena and Bologna.

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67. The first report of disarming came from Bologna, where, on 25 April, approximately 4,000 Patriots handed in their arms at a most successful parade attended by General Mark Clark and a number of other senior Allied Officers.

68. The Ministry of War has announced its intention of issuing a special medal ribbon for Patriots and the granting to combatant Patriots the same family allowances as are given to members of the fighting forces.

DISPLACED PERSONS & REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION

69. During the month the restrictions regarding repatriation were in some cases modified and a similar form of registration for repatriates to that used by UNRRA was adopted.

70. Plans were made for the immediate supply of medical stores when the North was liberated. A medical store was started at Macerata and a roster of civilian doctors prepared.

71. Aversa, Bari and Cinecitta' Centres, as well as the Camps on the Adriatic Coast, were inspected during the month. Health continued to be good. Mass radiography of 500 inhabitants of Cinecitta' Centre showed that about 60 had some form of tuberculosis. The epidemic of typhoid at No. 27 ASD Evacuacion Camp, Florence, abated.

72. Over 1,700 Allied Nationals in the Rome area are receiving extra food on medical grounds.

73. Approximately 3,000 Italian Refugees arrived in Rome during the month, the majority coming from the Rimini Area.

74. 400 Persons were returned to homes in Ortona area, and 1,501 Italians with homes in Sicily, Sardinia or the South were repatriated.

75. During the month arrangements were made with the French Authorities for the repatriation of French nationals without prior reference having to be made to Paris. Formalities were initiated for the repatriation of the first group of French Nationals.

76. The British Embassy, Rome, is now permitted to issue visas for the UK to British born women married to Italians, without consulting the Foreign Office.

77. 40 persons of 5 different nationalities were repatriated and 50 WTA were granted during the month.

78. At the end of April, 76,479 persons were recorded with the Record Bureau of the Sub-Commission. The location of approximately 60,000 of these is known, and the balance of approximately 16,000 are known to have been in Italy within the past year.

79. UNRRA have taken over the responsibility of Financial Assistance Advanced for United Nations Nationals and Stateless Displaced Persons in the Rome Area. From 1st June, UNRRA will make payments throughout Free Italy, with the exception of 13 recently liberated provinces, where payment will continue to be made by this Sub-Commission.

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80. No decision had been reached regarding the reimbursement of the group of persons repatriated to Tripolitania at the end of the month, but on 7 May instructions were issued to repay each individual up to L. 10 sterling.

81. During the month the Banca d'Italia was authorised to make 2,125 payments totalling 6,125,250 lire; 3,734 persons were scheduled to benefit from these payments.

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
