1. Provincial Commissions for Reestablishment of Parolets.

(a) After considerable discussion with the Italian Government, the method to be followed in appointing the Provincial Commissions for Reestablishment of Parolets has been defined in a Directive issued by this Sub Commission on 3 September 1945 (reference 42/42/4/56).

(b) The presiding officer of the Commission (by virtue of Article 1 of Law 100 of 17 July 1944, as modified by Article 2 of Law 3 of 4 January 1945, and which have been duly implemented and are in effect in all territory), will nominate appointed by the President of the Council of Ministers after consultation with the Minister of Grace and Justice and the High Commissioner for Southern Germany. The Italian Government has at present selected the President of the Sub-Commission for each province, whose names will be published in the Gazzetta Ufficiale and duly implemented so that they are to be effective in all territory.

(c) It should be noted that the Commission indicated the should actually appoint the other members of the Provincial Commissions, it has been agreed that the Provincial Commissions should represent the President of the Court of Appeal to nominate the members; the appointment of such members to be made local by formal order of the Provincial Commissioner.

SUBJECT : Legal sub-commission monthly report for August 1945.

LEGAL SUB-COMMISSION

1. In northern Italy the main attention of the Courts is still focused on wrongful possession of arms. There are indications however that the sentences of these courts and the publicity attached to them are having an effect. In Venice for example many piles of arms have been discovered abandoned by the holders, presumably for fear of the consequences of retaining them. The largest number of cases of this nature as in Lombardy where there were 106 trials.

2. There are still a large number of wrongful possession of Allied property. These cases still form the bulk of the calendar in Naples and Livorno, and are on the increase in Venice.

3. There are still numerous cases of counterfeiting. Large quantities are manufactured in Milan, dating from pre-occupation days, which equipped itself against the Allied arrival with large numbers of the U.S. and English money. In addition to the more common lire and 100 currency. The counterfeit currency involved has a total face value of about 300 million lire.

4. Two other serious cases were tried by General Courts, both on charges of murder.

TRIALS

5. The extraordinary courts of justice are making reasonable progress but there is still considerable delay in obtaining from the Ministry of Justice an opinion on the merits of petitions against death sentences. Great dissatisfaction is expressed throughout the world at the length of time taken in the execution of these prisoners.

6. The atmosphere of the trials is becoming calmer and more amiable are being recorded. Out of 49 cases in Liguria 12 death sentences were imposed: in Venezia 11 out of 217. In Lombardy 14 out of 134. In Piemonte 9 out of 136.

7. The number of new cases is decreasing and it is in the opinion of the Minister of Justice that the work of these courts should be brought to a close as soon as possible and all untried cases referred to the regular courts of law. The attitude of the press of the extraordinary courts has been

Monthly Report for August

INTRODUCTION:

The two matters of greatest general interest among the Education Subcommittee's activities of the past month have to do with the situation in Bolzano and Venezia Giulia. The other activities, being for the most part a continuation of the work previously reported, are therefore summarized briefly, and the Director's full report on Bolzano and the complete report of 1st Lieutenant JOHN E. SIMONI, Chief Education Officer for 15th Corps on the progress in Venezia Giulia are given as Annexes 2 and 3.

1 - Regional activities.

1. A meeting of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 18 August. Dates for opening schools for the autumn term, the freeing of occupied school buildings, approval of text books, the future of pre-veduggiori appointments by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the progress of youth activities and especially Boy and Girl Scouts, etc., were among the matters discussed.
2. Operation of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order Number 35. In no region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.
3. Each Regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with provveditori dell'istruz. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and least worst in Venezia where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for him has been inadequate.
4. Lombardina and Venetian Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.
5. Regional text book commissions have approved a large number of new text books for 1945-6.
6. All Regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial



Notes on the progress in Venezia Giulia are given in Annexes 2 and 3.

#### 1. Regional Activities.

1. A meeting of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 18 August. Dates for evening schools for the autumn term, the freeing of occupied school buildings, approval of text books, the future of universities appointed by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the program of youth activities and especially day and night schools, etc., were among the matters discussed.

2. Reopening of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order Number 37. In no region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.

3. Each regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with "provveditori" and staff. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and in the North where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for him has been inadequate.

4. Lombardy and Veneto Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.

5. Regional text book commissions have approved a large number of new text books for 1945-6.

6. All regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial Commissioners, are making a drive to clear schools from troops, refugees, and political parties in time for the autumn opening. In Piemonte 55 schools are occupied by Allied troops, 11 by Italian troops, and 32 (mostly in Turin) by Italian civilians -- political parties, "anti", and occasionally refugees. Many of these will be ousted in September. The worst situation is in four provinces of Venezia -- every school in the city of Padova is wholly or partly occupied; in the province of Treviso Allied troops have 18 schools, political parties 13, refugees 11 -- these, plus 305 schools damaged or destroyed by war, make nearly half the schools of the province unavailable, and there is little hope of relief since troops are moving into the four northern provinces.

7. Repairs of schools are under way in all regions, but are slow largely because of lack of material. 3120

8. Universities and other higher institutions are now, practically without exception, closed and reorganized throughout the North. The



The War Veterans Dispersal Division in Lombard, Illinois has furnished some surplus war materials to the Boy Scouts through the National Education Officer. 22. Education in Vienna is being organized according to plan. The Government attitude of the National Education Committee is causing dissatisfaction, but in a lot of this and other problems, remarkable progress has been made. See last Lt. GIMMETT's full report in Annex 3.

### II - Headquarters activities.

13. AFM has completed its survey of school regulations. It shows that 603 schools were under regulation on 1 August, of which 232 will have been discontinued by 1 October. The situation generally should continue to improve except in the South where early movement is not anticipated. An AFM Administrative Committee is to prepare an action memorandum to Administration educational facilities in the earliest possible date.

14. An agreement has been reached with the Ministry to permit provosts and staff appointed and recommended by AFM to participate in national examinations for permanent positions in Vienna of state Civil Service rank.

15. Arrangements have been made to facilitate transfer of teachers who formerly taught in territory now under Yugoslav jurisdiction, to Italian provinces.

16. The Ministry's consideration on elementary school text books has approved the effort of books for 1945-6 -- not too good, for the most part, but at least there will be some competition for provincial editions. Allied press will probably be supplemented by paper released to the cost of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce, but this is still under negotiation.



Catholic University in Milan was organized under Executive Decree 76, modified, of agreement with the Vatican, to let the special religious body which exists between the University and the Vatican. The separation committee has submitted its report, which will be accepted and put into effect as a result of approval from the Vatican. The University of Milan elected as rector the man who, though not supported by the Christian community, had served as rector under the Italian Republican regime; this caused some in outlying areas to be perturbed to resign, and new elections will be held later.

Building programs are under way for all damaged university buildings and projects are being made for the longer range construction.

9. The summer holidays in five provinces of Piemonte Region have been very successful, the ones in Turin opening a second session for 2500 children. No Scouts are increasing in number anywhere, with Scouts at a much slower rate.

The Carabinieri Dispatch Division in Lombardy region has furnished some supplies and materials to the Boy Scouts through the Regional Dispatch Office. Lombardy held a training course for Scout leaders 10-12 August, on a wooded tract located, without charge, to the Boy Scouts for nine years, by the owner, Signor Dece. In Vercelle, Italian soldiers obtained the use of a hall, and football, wrestling, table, etc., from this unit, for a Scout troop.

10. School lunch program are being set up for the opening of schools -- they have been approved for all communes in Venezia.

#### 13. Requisitionary activities.

13. The Government has completed its survey of school requisitions. It appears that about 100 requisitions were submitted on 1 August, of which 252 will have been submitted by 1 September. The requisitions are being processed by the Government and are being forwarded to the appropriate authorities for their consideration. 17. The detailed study of Italian education, its history and present organization, prepared by Major A. C. VESCHIO and presented to the Minister by the Education Subcommission, is to be published in Italian by Garzanti, of Milan, to whom the Minister has given publication rights.

18. The new program for teacher-training schools, prepared by a Ministerial commission, was submitted to the Education Subcommission for criticism. A long report from the Education Subcommission and two all-day conferences with the commission have resulted, it is believed, in a considerable improvement in the program, which was already a long step in advance of the old one.

19. The Minister is making assistance from the Education Subcommission in regard to a new program of physical education. Materials have been received from the United States and requested from Great Britain to help the commission, which has to start from scratch, the previous physical education program having consisted largely of fascist propaganda and military drill.

20. The plan for a central reference catalogue of all book libraries to enable both Italian and foreign students to avail themselves of the rich but scattered and badly catalogued materials, has moved forward, with the preparation of a detailed plan and budget by a Ministerial commission.

21. Harvard University has been made in the joint publication program of the Minister of Public Instruction, ISIL, and Education Subcommission. Book manuscripts have been received and others are in preparation for a series of educational monographs to accompany the ISIL Education Bulletin, and to be distributed gratis to teachers. A Professor Ciavolitti has arrived from Washington and is pushing the publication of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on North and South America for elementary schools and 20,000 copies of a book on civics for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.

22. An arrangement has been made with the Library of Congress for purchase of books in America for Italian Universities and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can set aside books to be purchased in Italy. The Minister of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 Lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a credit of 200,000 in Great Britain, balanced by British Council and Embassy expenses in Italy and accounted for book purchases through commercial channels.

23. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students to Great Britain. The Minister of Public Instruction has also provided for

A preliminary Council has been set up in Washington and is pushing the publication of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on North and South America for elementary schools and 2,000 copies of a book on division for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.

22. An arrangement has been made with the Library of Congress for purchase of books in American for Italian universities and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can use books to be purchased in Italy. The Minister of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a credit of 200,000 in West Africa, balanced by British Council and Embassy agencies in Italy and arranged for book purchases through commercial channels.

23. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students to Great Britain. The Minister of Public Instruction has nominated the students. A considerable fund has been raised for scholarships for Italian advanced students who wish to study in the United States. The Minister has appointed a committee to work out plans for selection of the students, in cooperation with representatives of the United States Embassy and the Education Subcommission.

24. Aid for the Scout movement continues. \$150 for the non-confessional Boy Scouts has been received from the International Boy Scouts.

25. In general, the Education Subcommission has acted as a clearing house for a great variety of activities, information, and counsel. Allied agencies in Italy and individuals and organizations in Allied nations such as the Education Subcommission for information, counsel, and contacts with Italian agencies. Conversely the Ministry of Public Instruction and Italian organizations and individuals turn to the Education Subcommission for information from and contacts with the Allies. The fact that the Education Subcommission has had two years of intimate contact with Italian Education, cultural institutions,

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and persons, and that members of the Subcommission are specialists in education, and additional organizations and personnel in the Allied countries such as the other Allied countries in Italy, among its services to be such used and arranged. Only the nature of wide general interest are mentioned in these respects; a continuous stream of such activities flows through the Subcommission in a two-way air in between Italy and the Allied, with not infrequent addition from one Allied country to another or one Italian agency to another. In Annex I, the principal lines of contact are illustrated.

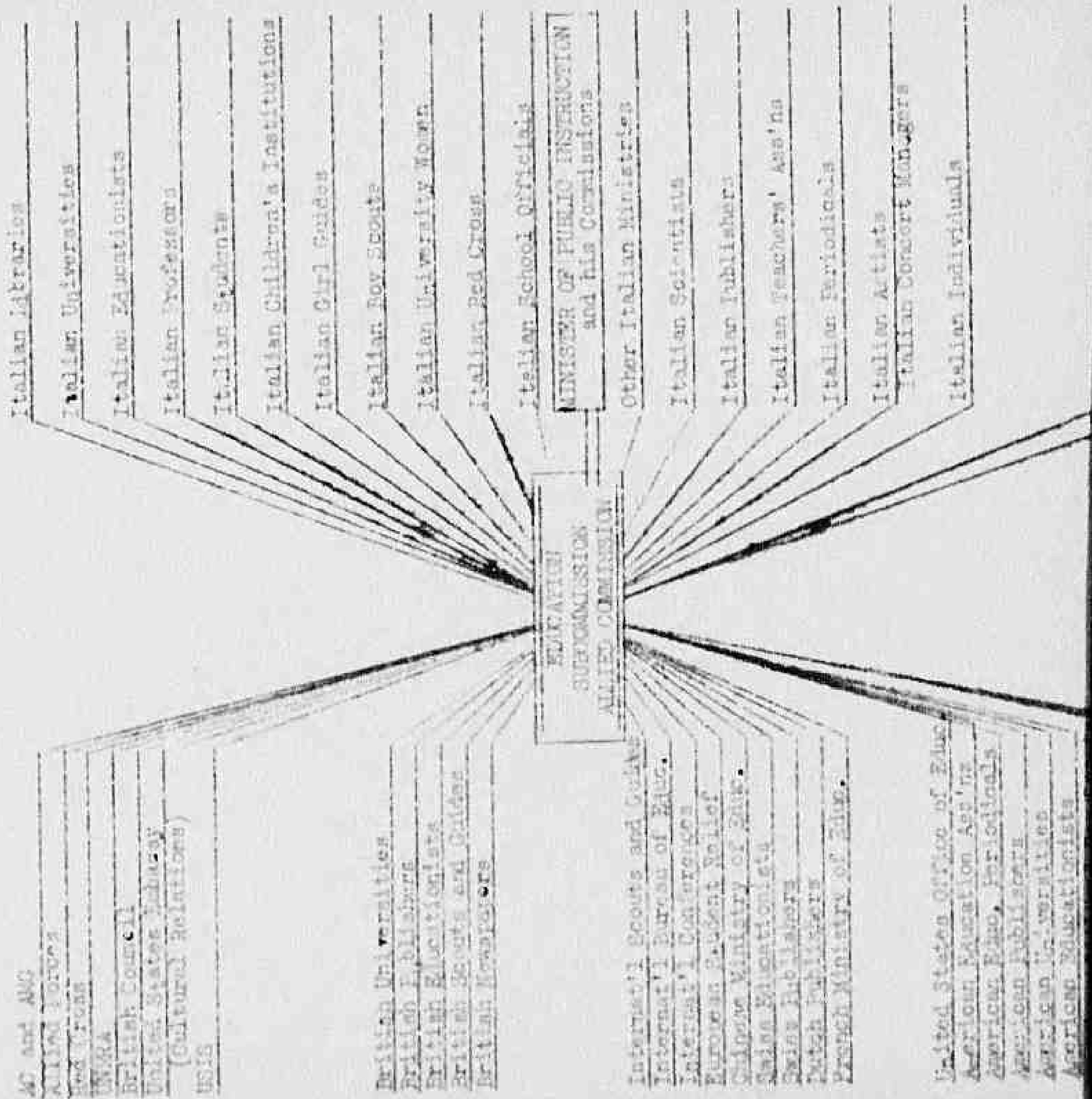




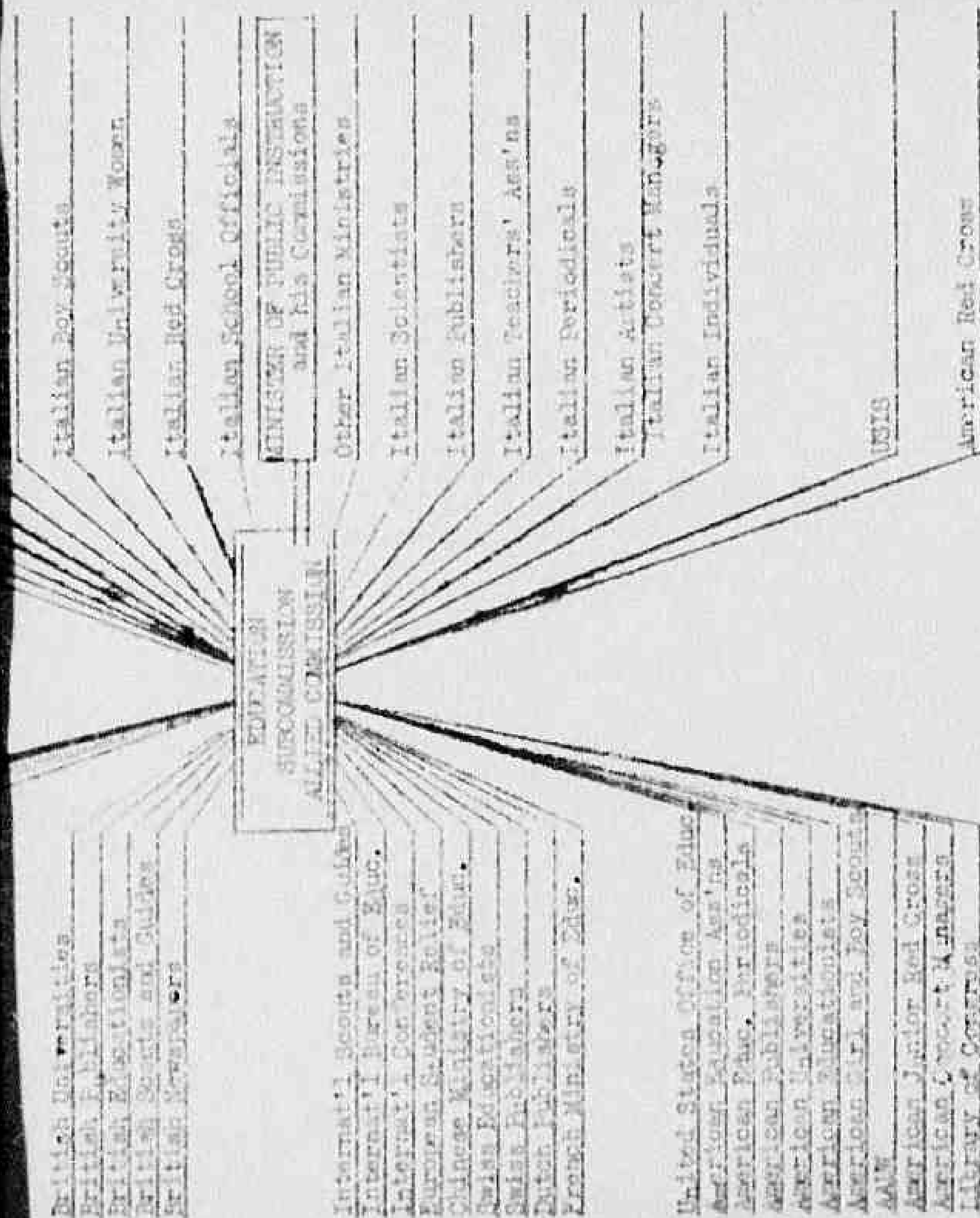

After 100, the Carol was successively a part of the Frank Empire, a fiefdom of the Bishops of Trent and Brixen, and an independent feudal fief of the family in the County of Tyrol, from which the region derived its name. In 1303, when this family died out, the Carol became a part of Austria under the Hapsburgs, and so remained to the close of the first world.

Italian Irredentists, even before 1915, had been urging that Trent, the province just south of Bolzano, which had for the middle aged been included in the Tirol in spite of its predominantly Italian population, be attached to Italy. Then, in 1915, Germany and Britain were bargaining to get Italy to join their respective sides in the conflict, Italy made the annexation of the South Tirol her price. Austria agreed to ceding Trent, which was ethnically Italian, but refused Bolzano, which in history, race, language and



culture was almost pure German. crass of the strategic value of the language itself, at the north boundary of Bologna, however, Italy insisted on the domination of Bologna (a well, Italian) and in this in the state of Bologna in May 1915, and Italy came into the war on the side of the British and French.

At the time of the Treaty of London, the inhabitants of the land, Italy appeared to have agreed to Italy, but the Treaty of London held. Later, Woodrow Wilson authorized that a declaration of justice had been concluded -- on how many historians and humanists.

But at the 1919 Peace Conference Italy was not agreed to guarantee minority rights to these people. Among them is a group, prepared in the office of the Provincial Commissioner, showing the linguistic distribution of Salerno Province and the German-speaking communities which border it.

In summary, South Italy, now under Italy, and North Italy, now under Austria, have a common history, common language and culture, common determination to be considered as one people. This desire was violated by the creation of Salerno to Italy after the First World War, but was intensified by Italy's failure to accept Italianization of the region. So the strategic reason (control of the Brenner Pass) for Italy's keeping the territory, and added economic reasons -- the forests and water power of the province are of considerable value to Italy. Whether these factors will outweigh the desires of the inhabitants in a question which will be decided at the proper time.



Meanwhile the present Italian Government is pursuing a liberal and unapologetic policy in regard to the recommendations for the closing of cultural centers to the people, and the Allied Military Government has a policy no less liberal.

3. General Educational Policy. Shortly after the formation of Bolzano, the Director of Education of Allied Commanders recommended to the Vice-President of the Civil Affairs Section that the Italian Government be granted the right to schools in their own mother-tongues. A similar policy had been recommended for Venezia Giulia, and was subsequently adopted there. A discussion of the case followed by the Director of Public Instruction was followed by a decision of the Council of Ministers to allow cultural autonomy to all municipalities in the Val d'Aosta, Bolzano, and Venezia Giulia. This was later confirmed for Bolzano when the Prefect of Bolzano visited the President of the Council in Rome.

In cooperation with the Regional Education Office, the Prefect set up a committee of school officials to prepare a plan for the introduction of German-language schools, and the Provincial Commissioner appointed a vice-president (Father Scharl) to supervise such schools. This plan was submitted to the Director of Public Instruction, who removed it in substance, but retained a number of changes in detail, where it was recommended Italian law (the concept, it provided for a part-time school for German-speaking children). He likewise had certain provisions regarding the school hours in German, and the school hours in Italian, and Italian-speaking children so as to maintain mutual understanding and tolerance. The Director's suggestions have been accepted by the local committee.

In essence, the plan provided that all Italian in the province must have a German and vice versa, but that the principal language of instruction in each school shall be that of the children's home. In addition made to the plan at the office was of 29 August provided that in the secondary schools children who are already bilingual may study English or French in the secondary schools.

The plan has been approved by the Education Subcommittee and, in general, by the Provincial Commissioner.

4. Language. The Director and lower authorities of the principal problems involved in opening of a school in a language secondary schools (examination of professional and academic standards) in the German language. This autumn in the absence of the Director of Education was that language. 1. INTRODUCTION.

## a. Education Division.

The Chief Education Officer for Headquarters, 13 Corps, Allied Military Government, 1st Lt. JOHN F. BROWN, reported for duty on 30 July 1945.

The first task undertaken by the Education Officer was the selection of a qualified and efficient staff for the Education Division.

Civilian education specialists were employed as soon as possible to deal with the large load of routine administrative problems arising from the many schools which the schools were deprived of proper leadership.

## 2. General School Picture.

The extensive Report on Education in Venezia Giulia, by Lt. Colonel  
CAMERON W. BASHINGHAM, Director of Education Subcommission, has been used  
as the basis for the work accomplished and in progress since 1 August 1945.

Extensive conferences and interviews were held during the first  
two weeks of August with Italian and Slavic committees and with individuals  
interested in school welfare. The total school picture for the region  
became clearer - more based on the immediate objectives.

As a result of these conferences a new name was adopted for the  
office of the Provveditorato agli Studi and Provveditorato agli Studi.  
The following was agreed upon:

- a) The "Provveditorato agli Studi" to become the "Governin-  
tendente Scolastico (Superintendent of Schools).
- b) The "Provveditorato agli Studi" to become the "Govern-  
intendente Scolastico" (Office of the Superintendent of Schools).

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before the setting of up of local government, establishing a uniform system of local government in those parts of the Territory of Western China occupied by Allied Forces, the Chinese School Commission of the National Education Commission of each Area, Correlate, Related District, collaborated with the Education Division and participated in the planning for the opening of Chinese schools. (See over, these conditions insisted that their schools be completely autonomous and independent from the Italian schools with a Governmental supervision of their own).

With the outbreak of 1941, many new conditions reported to the Education Officer that they could not any longer offer their maintenance and collaboration in the opening of their schools to a body which did not recognize them as the official local government. The individual members were then invited to participate in a general Slavic conference, but each refused.

The heads of these conditions, however, continued to impart specific orders regarding the Slavic schools, causing some degree of confusion about the teacher's and students. They refused to recognize that their school was legally appointed Superintendent of Schools for each Area.

In March 1941, General, the Chinese School Superintendent appointed by the NIA, refused to give the officers of the Government Commission of Education of Correlate, and continued to act as the School Superintendent for the Area. A special order from the Area Superintendent was required to terminate the use of the staff from the body needed office space for the Government. A similar situation developed in Tientsin with another Group School. At Tientsin, the committee refused and refused further action against the all legally concerned.

Included all the schools under the supervision and control of each Governmental Commission and Allied Military Government became a major task which is well on its way to reality, but still requires continued local instructions of the Education Officer and the Government.

Upon arrival of the Education Officer all schools had been officially closed, but those of Correlate Area. Instruction was given to begin formal examinations starting from 15 to 20 August, that officially closing the school year 1941-2 also for Correlate Area.

### 3. School organization.

In order to meet the needs of the characteristic Chinese Slavic situation and at the same time retain the basic Slavic school organization system and give the Slavic population its own

c) Upon recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools, the Education Officer would appoint an advisory school committee, one Italian and one Slovene, composed of six educators representing their entire Slav or Italian community, to aid and counsel each Inspector in his work.

## II. PUBLIC RELATIONS.

The Education Officer has participated at various Press Conferences replying to questions brought forth by interested individuals and the public in regard to the school prospects for Venezia Giulia.

The Allied Information Service (A.I.S.) has cooperated well with this Division and has published in both Italian and Slovene newspapers "the joint" items as regards the opening and functioning of schools.

On 3 September at 1945 hours the Education Division will open the series of Radio Program presented by Allied Military Government over the Trieste Radio Station. Specific and brief information on the opening and enrollment procedure for the elementary and secondary slavic schools will be broadcast. Professor Barget of this staff will be in charge of the program in Slovene. It is the first Education program of a series to be presented weekly both for Italian and Slav consumption. (With this procedure it is hoped to break down the barrier created by the M.G. by their refusal to participate in further collaboration with Allied Military Government - and, as concerns this Division, with Education).

The Primorski Dnevnik (Slovene Communist paper) among its many attacks on Allied Military Government activities in this Territory has not spared the Education Division. The main attacks have been over the appointment of the Sovraintendenti Scolastici and the rights of the Education Division to control and supervise the Slovene schools.

## III. PUBLIC APPOINTMENTS.

The first task to be undertaken was the selection of qualified men to head up the Sovraintendenze Scolastiche of each area. The respective Area Commissioners, upon recommendation of the Education Officer, appointed as Sovraintendenti Scolastici the following individuals:

The "Ingegnere di Zona", Slovene and Italian, to assist the Sovraintendente Scolastico in his difficult task of supervision and control over all schools have been appointed for Gorizia; for Trieste they have been selected and will be appointed soon. For Udine the selection of a Croat representative has been difficult, because of the lack of qualified personnel available.

Professor Rado Anton, of Union Public Schools, had been originally appointed as the "Ispettore di Zona" for Gorizia upon recommendation of the HIC, but with the posting of 30-11, Professor Rado resigned the appointment and was by Allied Military Government. (This action required an immediate change of plans, for Professor Rado had been selected to represent the Slovene Schools for Trieste!).

#### IV. RECRUITING

Special Section and combination sections of the Area Education Commission for the education of school personnel have been established. School personnel from all school personnel are being submitted to these commissions. It is expected that the most thorough job of separation ever done in Italy by Allied Military Government will be done in Venezia Giulia Territory.

#### V. TRANSFER AND REEMPLOYMENT OF TEACHERS

Teachers from the Carso and Istria who have lost their positions because they were required to leave their "old" have been requested to ask for transfer to a new in Italy. They were asked to list ten "old" in order of preference. While waiting for transfer they will remain assigned at one of the Superintendence of Venezia Giulia, Allied Military Government.

Plans are in preparation to extend all possible aid to teachers "old ruolo" who will find it difficult to move out of this territory. As an example the "Circolo Didattico" will be liquidated and "Didattico" will be established, instead, in order to give employment to many "old ruolo" teachers and below to this region and who should not be transferred.

(In principle this Division will not approve requests for transfers from Italy into Venezia Giulia, unless the person desiring transfer can render valuable service to the schools of this territory. Application will be considered for transfer from Slovenia spending teachers who, because of Fascist prejudice, were "quasi" deported into



# IV. TEACHERS.

Special Solutions and combination sections of the area situation. Consideration for the situation of school personnel have been established. School personnel from all school personnel are being submitted to them conditions. It is expected that the most thorough job of organization ever done in Italy by Allied Military Government will be done in Venezia Giulia Territory.

## V. TEACHERS AND RELOCATION OF TEACHERS.

Teachers from the Gorizia and Trieste who have lost their positions because they were required to leave their "posts" have been requested to ask for transfer to a school in Italy. They are asked to list ten "posts" in order of preference. While waiting for transfer they will remain assigned at one of the Government of Venezia Giulia, Allied Military Government.

Plans are in preparation to attend all possible aid to teachers "di ruolo" who will find it difficult to get out of this territory. As one example the "Circolo Didattico" will be liquidated and "Didattico" will be established, instead, in order to give employment to many "di ruolo" teachers and also to this action and who should not be transferred.

(In principle this Division will not approve requests for transfers from Italy into Venezia Giulia, unless the person desiring transfer can render valuable service to the schools of this territory. Application will be considered for transfer from Florence speaking teachers who, because of Fascist prejudice, were "quasi" deported into Italy from the Venezia Giulia Region).

## VI. SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

A complete survey of the total school buildings for this territory is under way.

The complete report on the elementary school needs for Trieste and suburbs, as regards schools requisitioned by Allied Troops, has been submitted for necessary action. A similar report will be ready shortly on the secondary schools of the city which are requisitioned and are essential for the proper functioning of schools the coming academic year.



The Education Officer has visited all elementary schools of Trieste and has recommended to the Public Works Division to encourage the earliest beginning of all repair work required on the 30 school projects as far as possible by the summer.

Projects for the completion of all repair work for the opening of the school year are not the highest; however, school authorities are hopeful that a solution will be found.

# VI. THE BOOKS, REPAIR PROGRAMS, EDUCATION PROBLEMS.

## 1. Text Books.

The Text Books problem in Venezia Giulia is similar to that encountered in Italy.

There is a complete lack of text books - Italian and Slovene.

The work accumulated so far as regards this problem is the following:

- a) Italian and Slovene elementary school text book commission have been established.
- b) In agreement with the Education Subcommission, the new set of Italian elementary school text books will be used for the Italian Schools of Venezia Giulia. (The Education Officer is awaiting nearly the first copies).
- c) Slovene elementary school text books used during the Austrian rule in these provinces are being revised and fitted to the new elementary school program by an expert board of Slovene professors and teachers. (It is expected that the first Slovene elementary school text book will go to the printers by 1. September 1945).

The SLO has refused to submit the text books which they claimed they had ready for publication. (SLO text books were prepared to enhance the nationalistic spirit created by Tito's regime).

Preparation of pamphlets dealing with the literature and history of the Slovene and Croat people is under study, and will be prepared accordingly to supplement all text books.

## 2. School Program.

The Italian 1945-6 elementary school program will be used in Venezia Giulia Schools with all references as to the promotion of Italian Nationalism omitted. Translation of the program into Slovene by the Slovene professors is about completed and both the Italian and



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Preparation of pamphlets dealing with the literature and history of the Slovene and Croat people is under study, and will be prepared accordingly to supplement all text books.

## 2. School Program.

The Italian 1945-46 elementary school program will be used in Venezia Giulia schools with all reference as to the promotion of Italian Nationalism omitted. Translation of the program into Slovene by two Slovene professors is about completed and both the Italian and Slovene versions will go to the printers by 15 September to be ready for distribution before the opening of fall examinations.

Italian programs for the secondary schools have arrived from the Education Subcommission. They will be used with serious slight modifications. For the Slovene Gimnazio-Liceo a translation of the respective programs is underway and sections on Slovene language, literature and history will be added.

## 3. Education directives.

Educational directives from Number 1 to 5 have been revised to fit the General Allied Military Government plan here. They have been approved by the Education Subcommission and by the Senior Civil Affairs Officer for publication to the school authorities of this territory. They are in English, Italian and Slovene and will be distributed to the Sovrintendenti, Area Commissioners, Civil Affairs Officers in the various commands, and to all heads of Divisions of Allied Military Government.

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VIII. THE SOUTH.

The Regional Commissioners representing the section and the non-secretaries Italian Boy Scouts Association met with the Education Officer to plan for joint cooperation in this territory.

The Catholic Boy Scout Association is better off in that it has sufficient funds to operate. The other is plain broke, and under these circumstances students may be difficult and slow.

Proper publicity has been given to each group.

The Commissioners decided to quit the term "Nationalist" and "Italian" used in their propagative titles and to encourage the organization of Slav Sections.

IX. CULTURE CLUBS.

Sections of culture clubs have been organized by the Communist party throughout the city. They met in all available premises. Their activity covers a wide range, according to reports, from political conferences to plain and simple three "day" courses. A complete report of the subject is in preparation.

X. UNIVERSITY OF TRIESTE.

The University of Trieste is a small and recently established University (1924). It has struggled to become a recognized institution and is a needed school in the life of Venezia Giulia.

Upon recommendation of the Education Officer the Senior Civil Affairs Officer has appointed young and energetic Professor Gatta Salvatore as Vice-Rector.

Professor Gatta is "Professor" or "Liberto" Professorial Officer at the University of Genova, and temporarily assigned to Trieste since 1943. Reports from the University of Genova place Professor Gatta as a known anti-Fascist, astounded and reliable.

The University was not touched by bombing and has not suffered any damage to its libraries or classrooms. The new University building, under construction, has not been completed yet.

At present there are only five professors "ordinari" in "scienze". Of these, two or three may be considered for Communist activities. There is a large and sufficient number of "cattedratici" who will be capable of running the institution. In agreement with the Public Safety Division it will be possible to recall and use professors from the University of Florence, Padova or Milan if released for duty here by the Italian Government. Professor Gatta has been instructed to prepare



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At present there are only five professors "ordinario" in Trieste. Of these, two or three may be suspended for Fascist activities. There is a large and sufficient number of "universitari" who will be capable of running the institution. In agreement with the U.S. Safety Division it will be possible to recall old and new professors from the University of Florence, Padova or Milan if released for duty here by Italian authorities. The Professor has been instructed to prepare his final regulations for the coming school year which will open in November.

### XI. STATISTICAL DIVISION.

It is the practice of this Division to submit complete monthly Statistical Reports on the school situation of all Italian cities over which it has jurisdiction, but because of the very urgent work that had to be accomplished during August the Registration Officer has asked the Soviet-Italian to postpone until September the preparation of complete statistical data.



### XII. IMMEDIATE DATES.

Through educational plans no far specifically evolved were established the following important dates:

- September 10 to 15: Registration for the Slovene Secondary Schools; - The Germanic School and the Institute Magistrate.
- September 15: All school activities held in public school buildings will cease (except for Slovene teacher-training courses now in progress, and registration). All school buildings will be repaired free for minor repairs and disinfection.
- September 17 to 22: Registration for Slovene and Great elementary schools.
- September 24 to October 10: Registration for all Italian Schools.
- October 1 to 15: Last group examinations (Idoneita, delibazione, etc.) will be held.
- October 16 to 25: 2nd group examinations (maturita, etc.) will be held.
- October 16: Lessons begin in the elementary schools.
- October 25: Lessons begin in the secondary schools.
- November 1: Opening of University of Trieste.

2. Appointed "Governing Board of Examinations" for Trieste, Gorizia and Pola.
3. Appointed Area School Inspectors (Slovene and Italian) for Trieste.
4. Selected Area School Inspectors (Slovene and Italian) for Gorizia.
5. Appointed Professor University of Trieste.
6. Appointed elementary school text book committees.
7. Recognized Regional Committees for secondary and non-secondary School Examinations, giving them full in the promotion of their activities in this region.
8. Assigned specialists to prepare Slovene text books for the elementary schools and to prepare the new elementary school program.
9. Completed Education Directives (Books 1-6) in English, Italian and Slovene (to be issued this coming week).
10. Prepared special directives and program for the continuation of the Slovene teacher-training schools started by the MEC (these have been issued in order to bring under our control such schools - one in Gorizia and one in Trieste).
11. Prepared directives for the enrollment of elementary students at both the elementary and secondary school levels.

#### XIV. CONCLUSION.

The job of the Education Division is moving along on schedule, fitting the work and its time table to the physical tools available at this Headquarters for the performance of an efficient job. With assigned transportation coming up in the near future the Education officer will be able to visit nearly everywhere and plan the opening of schools on the spot.

We dare think in Italian evidence that the M.I. will cooperate with the local school authorities appointed by Allied Military Government. 1. SUMMARY

(1) The appointment of an Allied Commissioner for Public Health, as stated in last month's report to be imminent, has been formally announced. In the meantime, and in addition, Legislative Service No. 110 of 21st July 1945, which the Commission has received, has confirmed the Commission's Office.

(2) In 1944, the decree was proved to be a disappointment, for, although the Division of Public Health in the Ministry of Interior has been abolished, and the function of that division assumed by the High Commissioner, it is directly responsible to the Council of Ministers, no other important changes have been effected as regards the administration of Public Health matters in Italy. For example, it is specifically mentioned that the function of the Director of Public Health remains unchanged and so we still have the same position that existed at the time of each previous report, namely, the absence of a central authority for the co-ordination of health problems, while the Italian Provisional has been to the High Commissioner only through the Prefect.

(3) It has been agreed that with the formation of the High Commissioner's Office, a more drastic change in the role of Italian Public Health Administration would have been effected, but such changes will still be envisaged by the authorities.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH

(A) General Epidemiological Hospital Control.

(a) The movement of patients into hospitals has been considerably increased, and by the 27th of August 2,022 sick Italian have been received, which was much more than the original schedule called for. Such rapid arrivals are attributed to the original schedule to the extent, as the departing symptoms or reflecting sufficient hospital space only just in time to take beds away from the incoming patients. In addition, 62 patients arrived unheralded from the German zone, having been 35 days on the way, with insufficient food and no medical attention. After the receipt of this and other information to prevent







(b) One case was notified on July 14 August, no further notification was received either from the patient, or any other part of the system.

(c) SHALLOX

(1) The current figures for Shallow City and Province indicate that the epidemic may now be considered at an end. 11 cases only were reported from the City as compared with 62 in July and 47 from the Province as compared with 51 in July. This improvement can be attributed to the work of the Shallow City health officer and the services of the 3 sector ambulances referred to in the monthly reports, which were sent by air.

(2) Shallow City has been reported from only three other Italian provinces during August, as compared with eight during the July period. From the Province of Avellino, with 19 cases as compared with 44 in July, Salerno, with 8 as compared with 24 in July, and Southern Calabria, with 1. No cases were reported from Puglia Calabria last month. It would appear therefore that the epidemic has been brought under control by the Italian Government throughout the Province in at least showing its effect.

(d) SHALLOX

The Shallow Control Demonstration Unit reported that during August, weekly searches of selected residents of the Shallow City project areas showed the following results: -

(a) Similarly it is essential that sufficient be obtained for the use of medical equipment and hospital supplies from 5 Buses and 5 Autos, despite several representations to the Hospital Center, which unfortunately has not been obtained.

(2) It will be seen that for the efficient and smooth operation of the Hospital Center, much coordination is required, as the administrative problems are complex. Unless prompt action is obtained from all the agencies concerned, the whole project will face disaster, which, in view of the humanitarian importance of the issue, will be a major tragedy.

### (B) TYPING

(a) Only one case of Typing was reported during August. This occurred in a refugee camp at Toluca, who arrived at Toluca from Jalisco.

(b) The one case of Typing was reported in August as having occurred at Toluca, Jalisco, Province on 25th day. No further verification has been received either from Toluca, or any other part of Jalisco.

### (C) SHALLOA

(a) The report from Toluca for Toluca City and Province indicates that the epidemic may now be considered at an end. 11 cases only were reported from the City as compared with 22 in July and 17 from the Province as compared with 31 in July. This improvement can be attributed to the work of the Shallosa together with the services of the 3 motor ambulances referred to in last month's report, which were sent by ARA.

(b) Shallosa has been reported from only three other Jalisco Provinces during August, as compared with eight during the July period. These are from the Acolman, with 17 cases as compared with 46 in July, Jalisco, with 11 as compared with 31 in July, and San Joaquin, with 1. No cases were reported from Mexico City last month. It would appear therefore that the epidemic has been contained in Jalisco, and that the Government throughout the Province is at last winning the fight.

### (D) MALATIA

The Jalisco Central Communication Unit reports that during August, weekly percentage of catching victims of the Fiber-Delta project were as follows:

(C) SHALLPOX

(a) The current figures for Manila City and Province indicate that the epidemic has been almost entirely contained. It cases were reported from the city and with 22 in July and 7 from the Province as compared with 12 in July. This Government can be attributed to the work of the Manila City health authorities with the assistance of the 3 major laboratories referred to in last month's report, which were sent by APAC.

(b) Shallpox has been reported from only three other Italian provinces during August, as compared with eight during the July period. These provinces are Calabria, with 17 cases as compared with 18 in July, Sicily, with 6 as compared with 11 in July, and Basilicata with 1. No cases were reported from Basilicata last month. It would appear therefore that the epidemic vaccination programme initiated by the Italian Government throughout the Province is at last showing its effect.

(D) ITALY

The Italian Central Documentation Unit reports that during August, weekly exercises of catching children of the Filippi Project have shown the following results:

During the month of August there have been two persistent outbreaks of cases, one in the immediate environs of Lago Forno and the other in the vicinity of recently flooded rice fields near Pescara.



During the last week of August searches for adults in these regions showed the following: (1) Placentia Section (Lago Prieta) of 1982 stations examined 12.5 were positive for adult Anopheles with an average of 1.0 adult per station. (2) Maracaibo Section, El Estero de San Mateo, 10.3 positive with 1.05 adults per station. This represents an increase of about four times in the number of adults in the beginning of the month. In spite of this, there is no cause for concern with regard to malaria transmission.

An exhaustive investigation of the vectors concerned in the spread of malarial parasites, particularly in Venezuela, is under way, but more data are needed for definite conclusions.

During the last two weeks of August a survey to determine the status of the indigenous of the Volcanes Delta and the interior of the Volcanes Delta of the Maracaibo River was completed. Inspections of selected and blood samples were taken on children between the ages of four and fifteen years, results are not yet available.

#### (5) TUBERCULOSIS

No data has yet been received from the Italian Government to the proposals made by AUSA for attention in the July report. It is believed, however, that in summer will be forthcoming within the next few days.

#### (6) INFANT MORTALITY

During July there were in some towns 2,123 live births and 125 deaths in infants under one year of age. The resulting infant mortality rate is 5.9% as compared with 10.9% in June.

#### (7) MALARIA

The July death rate for all forms of malaria in some towns is 2.1% as compared with 2.1% in June. Of these, 192 were due to malarial fever.

#### 3. VETERINARIAN

(a) A chief veterinarian for the AUSA, (b) Corps Area War Headquarters, that in September following consultation with and action by this Branch. There is now a provincial veterinarian active in Cusco Province, one having been sent during the month. The death of the Director, Veterinary Laboratory, Pucallpa, has necessitated the temporary assignment of Dr. Sal. of Lima, to the post.

(c) NATIONAL PROTECTION AND CONSERVATION OF ANIMALS. The following is a summary of the results of the control measures employed:

(a) Malaria. The presence of this disease was first reported on about 1st August. Investigation has shown that at least 12 stations in Yucatan, Mexico and Fero's Province are infected and that a number of 17 stations in both countries. These are all minimum figures and time will probably show that the disease is much more widely spread. An outline of the control program now being of the following: (i) Veterinarians in all provinces where the infection exists are ordered to take measures to control the disease, particularly in the following:

# (5) INFANT MORTALITY.

During July 1967, there were in some provinces (14), five thousand and 157 deaths in infants below the age of one. The resulting infant mortality rate is 43.7 a thousand with 46.9 in 1966.

# (6) DEATH RATE.

The daily death rate for all forms of tuberculosis in the provinces was 2.30 a thousand with 2.10 in 1966. Of these, 1.62 were due to pulmonary tuberculosis.

# 3. RECOMMENDATIONS.

(1) A order vaccination for the 2.4.6.7 is being given with emphasis to that vaccination following vaccination with and follow by other vaccines. There is now a form of vaccination active in some provinces, one having the form of a vaccine. The death of the Director, Veterinary Services, has been noted and the temporary assignment of Dr. Shi, of Liaoning, is being made.

(2) HYGIENIC PRODUCTION AND PRODUCTION OF INFECTIOUS CONTROL. The following are the results of the investigation and the control measures employed:

(a) Deaths. The presence of this disease has first reported on August 1st August. Investigation has shown that at least 12 children in various provinces and districts are infected and that a minimum of 17 children have been infected. These are all minimum figures and time will probably show that the number is much more widely spread. An outbreak of the control program has been reported in provinces particularly, Beijing, and Guangxi. Ministry of Interior is in Liaoning and those adjacent to the infected provinces are being assembled so as to find families with the symptoms, diagnosis and control measures. Photographs of infected animals have been sent to a committee the Hygienic Clinical Institute.

(b) All infected or exposed animals will be vaccinated. This has been ordered to be done immediately in all provinces where the disease has been reported. (c) Animals and/or horses exhibiting symptoms, or which have been exposed to the infection or have been infected on the left hindfoot with the left hindfoot the administration for horse foal-like diseases. Animals having such a type may not be moved from the source province until pronounced free of infection by licensed veterinarians.

(d) Content of statistics and cases exhibiting symptoms and cases reported by the appropriate concerned veterinarian it has collected possible data.

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(c) QUALITY. The appearance of *Mytilus* Bourdin in Voronezh Region was associated to introduction of control measures there.







4. MEDICAL SUPPLIES.

(A) The Spanish Central Civilian Medical Depot has made complete shipments of all medical supplies requested by its stations from Hospital Public Health Officer of Madrid, Valencia, Barcelona, Alicante and Liria in 1945. These supplies were sufficient to take care of all requirements on the basis of Spanish Government and civilian population up to 1 September 1945. The Italian Government has been given instructions by the Spanish Public Health Officer to instruct their agency to make distribution in the territory after 1st September 1945. (Sept 1945, 1st Depot at Valencia Spain).

(B) Medical Supplies have been shipped to ASD (San Carlos) (San Carlos, Spain) on 1st September 1945. After that date, if future supplies are needed it is the responsibility of the Regional Public Health Officer to cover his supplies from ASD.

(C) The Spanish Government and the distribution of medical supplies, ASD, should be responsible for their requirements for medical supplies to include up to the 1st September 1945. These supplies have been shipped by ASD on the 1st August 1945. Future supplies, if required, for 1st September 1945 will be handled by ASD.

(D) There has been no medical supplies in 1945 were used that are being turned over to the Italian Government plus two-thirds of the last six months' supplies. In September 1945, the last care of all Italy in the hands of ASD was turned up to ASD, immediately in April 1946.

(E) Military Stationary "A" Supplies finished in 1945 of the August 1945. ASD has not it is the responsibility of the Italian Government and ASD to make the responsibility of future supplies for Italy under Category IV program.

(F) The Spanish Government of all medical supplies purchased for Italy to the Italian Government by the 26th Central Civilian Medical Depot is progressing very rapidly. Approximately 11,000,000 of medical supplies were turned over by the ASD in April. The Spanish Depot closed 20 August 1945, and the company was transferred to the Spanish Depot.

(G) The Spanish National per 11 September 1945 (1945) has assumed the responsibility of receiving at the depot of all future medical supplies purchased for Italy as of 15 August 1945.

5. CONCLUSIONS.

(A) PERSONNEL. No changes except by Special Orders 1945, para 1. Lt. Col. Kohn, 25th Infantry was relieved of duty with Company 1 and assigned to Headquarters, 25th Infantry, on 25th August.



(C) Dependent persons will be rationed sub-Com ration, No. 21100. Commission will make their requirements for medical and food supplies up to the 1st December 1945. These supplies have been shipped by UNRRA on the 15th August 1945. Future supplies, if required, as of 1st September 1945 will be supplied by UNRRA.

(D) There are sufficient supplies in the UNRRA stores that are being turned over to the Italian Government. The two-thirds of the last box contains persons and in December 1945 to take care of all Italy in the hands of UNRRA. UNRRA is to a considerable extent self-sufficient.

(E) Military category No. 21, also finished on 1st August 1945. For the year 1945 is the responsibility of the Italian Government and UNRRA. It is the responsibility of future supplies for Italy under category No. 21.

(F) The rationing order of all medical supplies earmarked for Italy to the Italian Government by the 26th Central Civilian National Department is being very much. Approximately \$1,000,000 of medical supplies are turned over by the UNRRA. The UNRRA report dated 26 August 1945 and the UNRRA was transferred to the Italian Government.

(G) The Instituto Nazionale per il Comandato Militare (ICM) has assumed the responsibility of receiving at least 10% of all future medical supplies earmarked for Italy as of 15 August 1945.

## 5. REMARKS.

(A) PERSONNEL. No changes except by Special Orders 197, Part 1, Lt. Col. Riqui, 1000000 can be relieved of duty with Company 11 and assigned to Headquarters, 2575 Regiment, on 25th August.

(B) All clothing and food all distributions are in the hands of UNRRA and UNRRA. Plans are being put in operation whereby individual cases sent to UNRRA can be investigated and cared for. This relieves the Welfare Branch of UNRRA of other serious problems.

The Committee Sub-Commission has offered to UNRRA, Welfare Branch, 217 tons of blankets for distribution. Two investigation trips were made, one north and the other south, to learn what facilities are available for storage and for distribution of this large quantity of blankets into the winter. Insulated portions which may still have great need for such material this winter. No other UNRRA has been made to UNRRA. With the withdrawal of so many of our Regional Welfare Officers it will be necessary to coordinate much more closely with UNRRA and UNRRA in such work.

(17) The Chief, Welfare Branch is collaborating with the Director of Education in an effort to get copies of equipment and clothing for the Scouts and Girl Guides of Italy. Until all the material is collected, we can partially provide with the necessary equipment in the way of clothing the Chief, Welfare Branch has given special equipment for the Scouts but we do not see that a number of uniforms can be provided in order to build the field and provide transportation for these young Italians.

An effort is being made to get various books, maps, equipment and other needed materials for the use of these organizations.

# ROUTING

(a) Two of the reports will be reviewed with Dr. Valente were transmitted because of the two trips taken by the Chief, Welfare Branch. The other quantities printed and ordered in such a way has been the incorporation of the Health Sub-Committee. The Department is being into the Italian Welfare Branch. For a collection of information to be sent to the Ministry of Health, supporting the creation of a central body for the welfare committee of the provinces and thereby, with the cooperation of the members of the Department.

The recruiting and training of the Civil Police for Venezia Giulia is proceeding satisfactorily. Some 2000 applications have been received. All applicants are being carefully screened and vetted. 140 recruits are undergoing training at the Police School established by the Public Safety Division. This class will be ready for duty by mid September. There is the usual difficulty in procuring uniforms and equipment.

The largest civil disturbances of the month occurred in Matera Province. On the 1st at Matera about 1000 persons rioted burning several buildings and forcing the prison to release prisoners. On the 2nd at Ferrandina some 1500 rioters cut communications and set fire to government buildings. One civilian, alleged to be Fascist, was killed by the crowd at the latter place.

A. SECURITY

1. General Security.

(a) The two events which affected security in this country and, in fact, the whole world during the month of August were the use of the atomic bomb and the end of the war with Japan. The former may well be the greatest invention to ensure that no country dare take hostile measures in the future, and if the human race can maintain the same progress in spiritual and moral development as in scientific achievement, it may well be that we have seen the end of military aggression.

(b) The need for security organizations however, cannot be said to have ceased to exist, but on the contrary, every vigilance must be exercised by the nations primarily responsible for the peace that advantage is not lost by any country to develop the new discovery for lethal purposes, as this would destroy that which has taken so long to achieve, and at such great cost. The world wide political conferences, however, will be tackling that problem.

2. Italian Government.



A. Summary

## 1. Renewal Security.

As is obviously very much aware of the critical condition of public order throughout the country and at the same time he cannot ignore the blunt warning which has been given to certain Italian countries by the United States and Great Britain that any but a truly democratic election will not receive their support. (c) It is interesting to note that at the moment the Death of Italy and Sicily are much more turbulent than the North. 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(c) Instead of this we have reports of certain political parties breaking their own Police Forces, we have the Italian Police, and Economic Police Force has recently disbanded. The Force not officially disbanded upon the country as a whole is only concerned in enforcing its own interpretation of what the law is or should be.



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(a) Certain sections of the Press are using their newly found "freedom" to indulge in attacks against the Police, and it cannot be ignored that their object may be to destroy public confidence in them to such an extent that the work of any body which eventually might be set up would be much easier. In a Bulletin of London recently a photograph of British Police officers in uniform was shown and their uniforms, with the remark that they dare not get similar to those of a socialist Government is given. Another remark is that the photograph was one taken after a riot in London in 1946. The only possible communication to the Police in London is that a photograph is one attempt to destroy the morale of the Police and the confidence of the public in them.

(a) Everything must be done to improve the morale of the Police, and certainly, to encourage them to do their duty without fear or favour. Otherwise the Police, who have succeeded in their efforts to preserve military security in Italy, will find they have entrusted civilian activities to men and women who are hardly able to stand the strain. It is suggested that in addition to providing adequate equipment, every effort is made to help the individual men achieve that moral coup or without which a policeman is merely a uniform carrier.

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20. Issue of Travel Orders.

The volume of work in connection with the issue of travel orders continues to increase. There are no security aspects involved, and the work is presently not a matter for this Section. The responsibility of reviewing authorized travel agencies and those granting travel vouchers to civilians is improved even though the issue of issuing military travel orders has been reported upon. The Civilian Commission has been asked to. A report has also been submitted to the Commission so the fact that this provision has been referred to the American General in the case of persons already in possession of travel orders issued under their authority at the grounds of the Commission do not fall within any of the categories of travel permitted under war Department Circular 411, dated 25 November, 1945. It has come to notice that the Commission, through the Commission, issued travel orders to a motor vehicle to enable him to take a six days leave in Italy. Prison population figures from all across the country are static, and official, distortion. Practically every male prison in Italy is filled to capacity and there is but little prospect that the situation will ease up significantly in the near future. This constitutes a continuing threat to the internal security of Italy, evidenced by a series of violent incidents throughout the prisons of the country. The ongoing winter will make a dangerous condition even more critical.

27. Deinstitutionalization.

Attempts by the European Commission to facilitate the release of prison inmates have not been successful. Ministry of Justice and Justice have been largely unsuccessful. Seventeen prisons are still partially or wholly in the hands of Allied authorities and renewed efforts are being made to effect their return to civil authorities.

28. Prison Personnel.

There is a great scarcity of guard personnel throughout Italy, with the greatest need existing in the regions under Allied control. Partisans are still being used in large numbers and have frequently convinced it will break or illegal releases of ex-prisoner prisoners. # RELATIONS WITH THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

1. Throughout August excellent collaborative contacts have been maintained with the Undersecretary (of Public Instruction) for Fine Arts, with the Direction General of Antiquities and Fine Arts, with the Office for Recovery of Works of Art, and with the Commissary for State Archives. Considering the organizational difficulty under which the Italian government are still laboring, the offices named have functioned very well.

2. In order to insure continuity of policy after the hand-over of all territory in the North, matters of personnel in those areas have been referred to the Direction General for their concurrence prior to appointment by the Regional RMA Officers. This has worked out well, and should prove of considerable aid to the Italian government in the months ahead.

3. Documentation of losses of works of art, with emphasis on gifts and sales to leading Nazis by the Marxist regime, goes forward steadily. Prof. G. Melli, of the Direction General, was sent to ROMA to examine in this connection at the Museum Region the seized archives of the Fascist Direction General of the arts.

4. The assistance of the Direction General was requested in the search for two sculptures still missing from OFFICIALS.

# RELATIONS WITH OTHER AGENCIES

5. Contacts, with particular reference to interchange of information on displaced works of art, have been maintained by correspondence with the Central Commissions for Germany and for Austria.

6. The most exciting result of these contacts, during August, was the discovery in Florence of nine French Impressionist masterpieces of great importance, which had been seized by the Nazis as their spoils from the French owners and then "exchanged" to an Italian art-dealer in a fraudulent study deal. While investigations continue, the pictures have been committed for protective custody to the Superintendent of Galleries in Milan, and the French Embassy has been fully informed.
7. The Subcommittee received from London several copies of the newly-published booklet of the War Reliefs Commission: Loose and Survivals in the War of the Works of Art in Italy, Part I, South of Bologna. The edition sold out in four days in London. It is based on first reports of the Subcommittee and it is a pity, therefore, in view of the high percentage of inaccuracies contained, that proofs were not submitted to the Subcommittee for corrections of fact.
8. The Director of the Subcommittee is in London during August for conference with the War Office regarding international contribution of works of art. The lack of a single Allied coordinating body is regrettable. Both American and British are however pledged to a policy of inter-Allied cooperation, and the return of works of art to the identity and ownership of which are beyond dispute. All claims must come from governments and not from individuals. This is going to be a long drawn out business.

#### VENEZIA, ITALIA

9. During August it has at last been possible to assign a full-time Italian officer. Projects are being approved for repairs to Duomo, S. Rocco, and San Marco at present. Restoration has been submitted for minor protective measures at S. Marco and San Marco in Venice.
10. Conferences regarding the military occupation of Castello di Venezia have put the question of responsibility on an even keel.

#### VENEZIA REGIONE

11. Major concentration is still on preparation and approval of first-aid repair projects in this, the worst damaged Region of Northern Italy; during August 17 more Superintendence projects were approved for a total of over 21 million lire. Among these are: Chiesa del Santo Spirito in Milano; S. Marco, S. Rocco, Biblioteca Civica, and Biblioteca Castello in Venice; Duomo and Chiesa del Santo Spirito in Verona; S. Lorenzo, S. Maria della Salute, and S. Maria della Salute in Trento; Battistero di Cambrino in Verona; San Rocco in Verona; and a series of medieval houses in Verona. Further projects are now in process for San Rocco, Verona, Verona, and Verona. Several San Rocco projects were also approved, including that for the San Rocco in Verona.

dua; S. Marco, S. Bernardino, Biblioteca Civica, and Biblioteca Capitol-  
ina in Venezia; Palazzo della Giustizia in Milano; S. Lorenzo, S. Maria della Salute, and S. Maria della Salute in Trieste; Restoration of Concor-  
dia in Salerno, near Potenza; and a series of medieval houses in UE-  
na and Verona. Several Civic Service projects were also approved, including that for the Racine Palladium in Venezia.

12. The first-aid protection was finally removed from the Caravaggio degli  
Servizi (Area 1) in Padova, from the Temple of S. Maria in Valle  
in Udine, from the Scaligeri Palace in Venezia, and from further churches  
in Venezia.

13. In VENEZIA the great Titian assumption was restored to the Papa, the four  
houses were removed to S. Marco, and the Monastery of S. Marco was put back on  
its column in the Piazza. The statue of Teodoro was found to need no  
much repair (short depreciation, not survival) that decision was reached  
not to put it back in place.

14. The exhibition of Five Centuries of Venetian Painting has been eminently  
successful, and the Italian Ministry has asked that it be continued into  
the autumn. It will remain open at least until 31 October.



15. Fourteen cases of material from Lulu, finally traced to the Palazzo Orsini in Venice, have been carefully checked and listed.

#### LIBERIA REGION

16. Italian personnel problems are still requiring much of the UNLH Officer's time, as are also negotiations to and obtaining adequate underground quarters in URBINO for the officers of the Superintendent.
17. In collaboration with Property Control Section, the task of documenting the numerous allied properties formerly in the Leonardo Exhibition is moving to a successful conclusion.
18. At 6000 various works of art, including the altar of S. Abbondio, have been brought back to the Cathedral. At P.V.A. a series of conferences has resulted in agreement for ultimate reconstruction of the notable bridge across the Tevere, to include the two Roman bridges recently discovered. Further discussions were held at URBINO and RAVENNA regarding protection and repair of monuments and parks.

#### PERMANENT REGION

19. Approval, planning, and initiation of work on repair projects continues to be the major preoccupation of the UNLH Officer. During August new approvals amounting to more than 15 million lire were obtained for work in the city of URBINO.
20. Works of art in deposits were safely returned to TORINO and ROMA; other deposits were inspected at PERUGIA, LUGLIANO, and DIODORIS. Study continues, in close collaboration with Italian authorities, for the handling and administration of museums at URBINO, VENEZIA, and ROMA.
21. Routine inspections were accomplished in all seven provinces of the Region.

#### LIBERIA REGION

22. Because of shortage of UNLH personnel, administration of projects in URBINO is being handled by the Regional Education Officer, with periodic visits by the UNLH Officer of PERUGIA.
23. Inspections at VENEZIA indicate considerable damage from shelling. Projects for first-aid repair are being prepared by the Genio Civile.

#### PIEMONTE REGION

19. Approval, financing, and initiation of work on public projects continues to be the major preoccupation of the REGIA Officer. During August new approvals amounting to more than 10 million lire were obtained for work in the city of VERCELLI.
20. Works of art in deposits were safely returned to TORINO and MILANO; other deposits were inspected at MONZA, LEGNANO, and DEDUGGIO. Study continues, in close collaboration with Italian authorities, for the transfer and administration of museums at VERONA, VARESE, and NOVARA.
21. Routine inspections were accomplished in all seven provinces of the Region.

#### VAL D'AOSTA REGION

22. Because of shortage of REGIA personnel, administration of projects in VAL D'AOSTA is being handled by the Regional Education Officer, with periodic visits by the REGIA Officer of PIAZZA.
23. Inspections at VIGEVANO indicate considerable damage from shelling. Projects for first-aid repair are being prepared by two German Civilians.

#### VALLE D'AOSTA REGION OF AOSTA AND AVALANCHES

24. A report was completed and distributed regarding the theft by German troops in June 1944 of several valuable paintings from the Trossi-Vanelli collection in village near PAVIA. The search for these, and for the responsible German officers, is being continued.
25. Further inquiries were made during August regarding the still missing items: from the Lombari collection, which disappeared at VERI; from the Villa Giustiniani, LEGNANO; and from the REGIA deposit, moved to the Alto Adige by the Germans.
26. Upon instructions of REGIA, the Italian government were advised to request through diplomatic channels their allegations relative to looting of material from the REGIA. REGIA Museum by French troops.



REMARKS OF MEMBERS

27. AMN have publicly stated the desire of the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean, to limit further requisition of properties for military use, and to commence a program of declassification.
28. On behalf of the Italian government, inquiries have been made during August regarding the derequisitioning of several monuments in BRIT. The difficult NAPLES problem is to be thoroughly examined by an officer of the Subcommission beginning 15 September; permanent reports has thus far prevented this inspection.
29. Prompt intercession of the Allied Commission blocked the proposed action from the deposit at GABRIELI 1942 INDEX of antiquities belonging to the Museum of BRIT. GENERAL(u) Paris Conference, 17 August, 1945.

A meeting of the Combined Displaced Persons Executive, USFPA and, attended by a representative of this Sub-Commission, was held in Paris on 17 August, 1945. For the most part the matters discussed were routine such as the daily movements of Italians, repatriation of Italians from Russian areas, the movement of Jews, the movement of Austrians out of Italy back to Austria, Italians in Norway, the repatriation of Albanians from USSR to Italy and the movement of Germans out of Italy. The great value of these conferences lies in the speed with which agreements are reached, eliminating the rather prolonged business of the interchange of cables or letters.

(b) Movement during August.

Italians are now being removed at the rate of approximately 5,000 per day over the Brenner Pass route, 2,500 per day over the Brenner route, 2,000 per week from Larousse to Gogo and small numbers from France to Switzerland. Additionally Germans are being received from Switzerland at the rate of about 100 per week. They are transported south to Bari from where they are shipped to Greece. During August the number of Italians received fell rather short of the original estimate of 25,000 for the month. This was due almost entirely to the breakdown of bridges over the Brenner Pass route. Only 2,362 persons were received over the Brenner route during the period 11th-16th August opening a drop of more than 30,000 in the total for the month and a subsequent delay in the completion of the repatriation of Italians. A party of 100 Jews arrived, after much discussion and interchange of cables, from Switzerland. They have been moved south and are now waiting around for movement to Palestine.

(c) Future Estimates.

On 21st August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include any numbers which have yet to come into the American, British and French zones from the Russian areas. It has been agreed with the Soviet authorities to move 60,000 Italians into USSR from a Soviet area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet area in Austria. There are 1,150 Italians in Norway, 90% of whom fought with the Germans. These will not be moved until more concerning Italian disbursements have been repatriated, and until the Italian Government has facilities for movement. The repatriation of Italians

(c) Future Estimates.

On 31st August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include the numbers which have yet to come into the Americas, British and French zones from the Russian zone. It has been agreed with the Soviet authorities to move 60,000 Italians into USSR from a Soviet area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet zone in Austria. There are 1,150 Italians in Norway, 90% of whom fought with the Germans. These will not be moved until more deserting Italians elsewhere have been repatriated, and until the Italian Government has facilities for internment. The repatriation of Italians should near completion by the end of September. It will take a short time after that to disperse them all to their homes, but by the middle of October it is hoped, all of them will be home. This does not, of course, apply to the large numbers of Italian POWs in England, America, North Africa and elsewhere.

2. ORGANISATION.(a) General.

There has been very little change in the organization since July. Four Cues in the North have been closed down during the month at VILLI, VINCENNA, GERM 4, TRENTO and TUNGO. It had been agreed that all American Officers and BN of 1st Airborne from 5th Army may be retained until 1 October, 1945. The conclusion of the war with J.A.F. may lead to earlier release.

(2) Itinerary.

Rail. The problem appeared serious at the beginning of the month when it appeared that northbound Italians from Padua, Piacenza and Milan were all being sent to Bologna and no additional rail transport was available from Bologna onwards. On 24 August arrangements were made for the rail programme to include 3 trains a day from Milan to the South via Bologna, 7 trains from Piacenza to the South, 3 from Bologna to the South via Rome, and 1 to the South via the East Coast. Northern Italian air was being transported East and West by trains instead of by road, and train running from Piacenza to Milan and return every day, and one from Piacenza to Udine and return every other day.

Road. Great difficulty has been experienced over road transport. Housekeeping transport from 5th Army was withdrawn on 10 August. Regional unit, apparently, having been given prior notice. 5th Army transport for East and West moves ended 2 August and have been substituted by the rail services.

(3) Future Organization.

Progress is being made in the plans for the organization of Collecting Hospitalization Centre by Nationalities, Shipping, Transit and Consistent, Supplies and Jewish Camps.

3. Medical.(a) Supplies.

All medical supplies are now concentrated in a Central Medical Store at Bologna. A large consignment of drugs which cover the run factor of the Sub-Commission's commitments in the North have been received during the month. (c) Future Administration.

Progress is being made in the plans for the organization of collecting Repatriation Centers of Italian soldiers, Shipyard, Transit and Disposition, Soldiers and Jewish Camps.

3. Medical.(a) Quarantine.

All medical supplies are now concentrated in a Central Medical Store at Bologna. (b) Surveys.

The two Italian Field Hospitals which were installed at VERONA in receiving Italian sick repatriates from Germany were handed over to the Public Health Sub-Commission on 4 August, 1945. A scheme is being formulated whereby a sanatorium at Lido, South of MODENA, will be partly used for the hospitalization of Allied N.G. and T.B. patients. Attention is being given to the provision of a hospital for Allied Nationals in the Modena area. There is some doubt as to whether it will be the Yugoslavs would work well together if an Italian Field Hospital were installed in an area where the Camps mainly concerned to Yugoslavs. ...F.H.G. are pressing for the dispatch of Yugoslav Military Patients of a long term nature who are hospitalized in British Military Hospitals. However, the matter is pending as the last available information is that after investigation of these patients' military histories some will revert to POW status and there will be repatriation to their home country by the Yugoslav Government.



(iv) Health and Welfare.

Health of camp residents is the main goal. The treatment of patients is easier than difficulty due to the lack of the necessary medical supplies. Most camps report a fairly high incidence of measles and what is termed is not a serious skin disease, neglect leads to investigations skin complaints and other conditions. Health Scale No. 24 was introduced in August in all Allied National Camps. This scale is a 6 x 6 scale which provides a well balanced diet. No authority exists, however, on the scale for supplementary food for children although young children can be provided with an intake of milk and fresh fruit. One case of typhoid was reported from CSMO in 21 camps but the incubation period showed that the patients had become infected in Germany. Reports indicate that Italian repatriates from Yugoslavia are arriving in a deplorable condition. As this constitutes a channel by which typhoid could very well be introduced all efforts concentrated in the handling of these people have been taken to be extremely vigilant with regard to disinfection.

5. Italian Repatriates and Displaced Persons.

During August approximately 120,000 Italians have been returned to Italy through the Bremer and Swiss routes. In addition 4,000 were repatriated by land, sea and air at Bari, Naples and Trieste, from France, Greece, Samos, Yugoslavia and Albania. A total of 40,000 Italians have been repatriated from Germany and Austria up to the end of August. Since January 1944, 652,388 Italians have been returned to their homes. Throughout the month 60,652 Italians have been repatriated from Italy. Since the end of the month of Italy, and 55,449 have been repatriated from the North. About 3,000 Italians have been shipped from Florence, Messina and Sicily during the month.

5. Repatriation.(a) Italy and General Conditions.

At the present time many Allied and Other National Displaced Persons are not inclined to move, or to move, until they are sure, one way or the other, what policy and what recognition will be shown towards them in the country to which they wish to go. PATRIOTIC SERVICE - REPORT FOR AUGUST 1949.

MINISTRY OF POST WAR AID

1. The Ministry of Occupied Italy has now completely closed down and the Ministry of Post War Aid has taken over all responsibility for Patriotic Service. Weekly meetings have been held between the Director, Local Government and Commission and Sir Bernardine of the Ministry of Post War Aid when the policy after handover and various other matters were discussed.

ADMINISTRATION OF PATRIOTIC SERVICE HANDOVER IN AND NORTH

2. Instructions have now been issued to the Prefects by the Ministry of the Interior, and to the Regions by this HQ, regarding the administration of Patriotic Service territory in handed over.

REPORT ON THE HANDOVER

3. A draft decree concerning the employment of war veterans was forwarded to this branch for comment. After discussion with Economic and Social Section a reply was sent to the Ministry of Post War Aid stating that the only comment on the provision might be made for clarification of claims arising out of the decree being referred to the Ufficio del Lavoro for adjustment.

RECEIVED AND RECOMMENDATIONS

4. The position of Patriotic Service being discharged from Military Hospital after 60 days has been discussed with the Ministry of Post War Aid. It is alleged that individuals are discharged before complete cure and suffering from tuberculosis. In conjunction with Public Health and Social Commission and the Ministry of Post War Aid the situation is being examined and an effort is being made to make provision for further treatment in civilian hospitals. To this end a hospital at Udine is to be put into operation solely for Patriotic personnel.

REPORT OF ALFRED PATRIOTIC SERVICE



2. instructions have been issued to the Prefects by the Ministry of the Interior, and to the Regions by this Ministry, regarding the administration of Patriots when territory is handed over.
3. A draft decree concerning the employment of War Patriots was forwarded to this branch for comment. After discussion with Economic and Social Section a reply was sent to the Ministry of Post War Aid stating that the only comment was that provision must be made for dismissal of claims arising out of the decree being referred to the Ufficio del Lavoro for adjustment.
4. The position of Patriots being discharged from Military Hospitals after 60 days has been discussed with the Ministry of Post War Aid. It is alleged that individuals are discharged before complete cure and therefore are tubercular. In conjunction with Public Health and Social Services and the Ministry of Post War Aid the situation is being studied and an agreement is being made to make provision for further treatment in civilian hospitals. To this end a hospital at Lodi is to be put into operation solely for Patriot personnel.
5. INSTRUCTIONS HAVE BEEN ISSUED TO ALL REGIONS THAT THE ISSUES OF ALL WAR PATRIOT CERTIFICATES SHOULD BE COMPLETED BY THE END OF AUGUST. IN SOME PROVINCES IT CANNOT HOWEVER BE COMPLETED UNTIL THE FIRST OF OCTOBER WITH OF SEPTEMBER. ISSUES ARE BEING COMPLETED AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE AND THE PAYMENTS OF BONUSES WILL BE COMPLETED BY THE MIDDLE OF THE MONTH. 16,000 CERTIFICATES ARE BEING PREPARED FOR PATRIOTS IN ONE PROVINCE AND GENERAL ITALY AND WILL BE ISSUED SHORTLY.
6. CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE ISSUES OF BONUSES ARE AWARDED TO PATRIOTS HAVE BEEN FORWARDED TO REGIONS. THESE HAVE BEEN INSTRUCTED TO PREPARE NOMINAL ROLLS TO AVOID DELAY WHEN THE DECREE HAS BEEN IMPLEMENTED.

Mine Clearance

1. Mine Clearance in Italy is in the main now confined to Italian Government territory where the Italian Government are continuing the work started by AG/AM. There are a number of mines in Liguria Region where civilians and one Company of Italian Engineers are operating. There are a few mines in Venezia Region but unexploded bombs and unguarded ammunition dumps are the real problem. With the withdrawal of AMG/AC the usual difficulties of transport and POL tend to increase, the result being that the work tends to slow up considerably.

2. Three Italian Mine Clearing Companies have been put to work in the Po Valley, Ravenna, Ferrara area clearing the banks of the rivers with a view to their early repair so as to avoid flooding of large areas when the rivers are in flood, probably October.

3. Maps of German Minefields on Italian territory are now coming forward and as they are in detail should lead to a speeding up of mine clearance work and a reduction in casualties. A staff of draughtsmen are engaged making copies for the Italian Ministry of War and for retention by AMG. All map records will eventually be handed over to the Italian Ministry of War for safe keeping.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUB-COMMISSION4. Preparation of electoral lists

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUB-COMMISSION

##### 4. Preparation of electoral lists.

- a) Provincial Commissions for Disfranchisement of Fascists. - The Italian Government is at present selecting the Presidents of the Provincial Commissions which are to be set up in AME territory to decide as to the disfranchisement of alleged Fascists. Instructions have been issued for the appointment of the other two members who, with the President, constitute the Commission in each Province. They will be nominated from a list of popular judges by the First President of the Court of Appeal and then formally appointed by order of the Provincial Commissioner.
- b) Casellario Giudiziale Centrale. - Major Temple, Deputy Director, has visited the Casellario Giudiziale Centrale in Rome; he reports the conditions there to be chaotic and the system employed archaic. The Casellario Giudiziale of 14 Provinces have suffered damage as a result of the war. Since electoral lists containing names of persons born in such Provinces must therefore be checked and extracts of criminal records taken centrally in Rome, and several hundreds of thousands of names are involved, it is evident that the inefficient functioning of the Casellario Giudiziale Centrale may ultimately affect the date on which elections can be held. The matter is being taken up with Sig. PABRI.
- c) Extensions of the Time Limit set for the Preparation of Electoral Lists. - Extensions of the Time Limit have been granted to 67 Communes in AME territory; the maximum period of extension granted was 30 days.
5. National Consultative Assembly ("CONSULTA"). - The Italian Government have completed the appointment of the great majority of the members of this body. It is stated in the Rome press that it will hold its first meeting on 25 September. The relevant decrees of the Italian Government include provisions for the appointment

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of 6 "Consulenti" to represent Venezia Giulia. These Decrees have not been implemented in Venezia Giulia; but there is nothing to prevent AMG sanctioning the making of such appointments as an administrative act. The U.S. and British Ambassadors have approved of such sanction being given. It is not necessary for the Italian Government to hold any consultations for the selection of Consulenti with the local Party organisations of UH in Venezia Giulia. The Italian Government have recently passed a Decree (which is about to be published) dispensing with these requirements.

6. Constituent Assembly ("CONSTITUENTE"). - The Minister for the Constitution has appointed a Commission to study the electoral law to be adopted for the election of the Constituent Assembly. The Ministry anticipate that the Commission will finish its labours by the end of October.

7. Venezia Giulia. - On 1 August 1945, Major Temple, Deputy Director, returned from a visit to Venezia Giulia, where he helped to prepare a plan for the organisation of local government in the Region which took into consideration the juridical position of the Area as still part of Italy and recognised the problems involving the presence of various national groups. The type of government set up under this plan has been approved by OCS. Essentially, it reproduces the Italian system, but uses a different nomenclature.

#### LEGAL SUB-COMMISSION

8. There has been a general decline in the number of AMG Court cases throughout all regions. Possession of arms cases are still numerous; ample sentences are being dealt out for such offences. Possession of Allied property and petty thefts of Allied property are prevalent among civilian employees in the port areas. Counterfeit money cases are still requiring much of the Courts' time. General Courts were held in several places dealing with murder and counterfeiting.

9. The Italian Courts in the north, though understaffed, are functioning normally.

10. Courts of Assize procedure was modified, with the approval of this Sub-Commission, by D.L. No 466 of 2 August 1945. Proceedings are thereby rendered more speedy but the amount of personnel needed for bench and prosecutor's office considerably increased.

11. RCOs have been instructed to request Italian judicial authorities to transfer to other courts for trial, cases where local feelings would be likely prevent impartial justice being done. A number of cases have been so transferred. A number of death sentences have been confirmed by the Minister and CDA and executions have been carried out.

12. The Yugoslav authorities have repeatedly requested this Sub-Commission to arrange for AMG and Italian authorities the handing over of a number of alleged Yugoslav citizens now detained in various jails of Italy. Each case has been given careful consideration but no decision has yet been arrived at. Yugoslav authorities have been requested to render executive decisions of the Court of Appeal of Trieste



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13. Difficulties have been experienced in Piacenza in connection with the appointment of a "Comissario" to the Fiat Works. A meeting with Sig. Gracchi and Colonel Thomas took place in Milan and a solution, acceptable to all parties concerned, appears probable. The Minister on August 10th sent, at the request of this Sub-Commission, a circular to all First Presidents, setting out that the fact of having been a member of the Fascist Republican Army did not in itself constitute an offence.

14. No general orders were issued during August.

#### EDUCATION SUB-COMMISSION

##### Regional activities

15. A meeting of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 18 August. Dates for opening schools for the autumn term, the freeing of occupied school buildings,



approval of text books, the future of provveditori appointed by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the progress of youth activities and especially Boy and Girl Scouts, etc., were among the matters discussed.

16. Eparation of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order N. 35. In no Region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.

17. Each Regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with Provveditori agli Studi. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and least worst in Venezia where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for him has been inadequate.

18. Lombardia and Venezia Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.

19. Regional text book commissions have approved a large number of new text books for 1945-46.

20. All Regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial Commissioners are making a drive to clear schools from troops, refugees, and political parties in time for the autumn opening. In Piemonte 55 schools are occupied by Allied troops, 11 by Italian troops, and 32 (mostly in Turin) by Italian civilians - political parties, "enti", and occasionally refugees. Many of these will be ousted in September. The worst situation is in four provinces of Venezia - every school in the city of Bolzano is wholly or partly occupied; in the province of Udine Allied troops have 14 schools, political parties 13, refugees 16 - these, plus 203 schools damaged or destroyed by war, make nearly half the schools of the province unavailable, and there is little hope for relief since troops are moving into the four northern provinces.

21. Repairs of school are under way in all Regions, but are slow largely because of lack of material.

22. Universities and other higher institutions are now, practically without exception, opened and reorganised throughout the north. Building repairs are under way for all damaged universities and projects are drawn up for the longer range construction.

23. The summer colonies in five provinces of Piemonte Region have been very successful, the ones in Turin opening a second session for 2,500 children. Boy Scouts are increasing in number everywhere, Girl Guides at a much slower rate.

The War Materials Disposal Division in Lombardia Region has furnished some surplus war materials to the Boy Scouts through the Regional Education Officer. Lombardia held a training course for Scout leaders 11-19 August, on a wooded tract leased, without charge, to the Boy Scouts for nine years, by the owner, Signore Oase. In Venezia a British soldier obtained the use of a hall, and football, medicine balls, etc, from his unit, for a Scout troop.

24. School lunch programmes are being set up for the opening of schools - they



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25. Progress has been made toward opening of schools in the German language in Bolzano. Swiss text books have been selected and prices for printing obtained from Bern.

26. Education in Venezia Giulia is being organised according to plan. The impatient attitude of the National Liberation Committee is causing difficulties, but in spite of this and other problems, remarkable progress has been made. 2083

#### Headquarters activities

27. ANHQ has completed its survey of school requisitions. It shows that 663 schools were under requisition on 1 August, of which 232 will have been derequisitioned by 1 October. The situation generally should continue to improve except in the South where early movement is not anticipated. An ANHQ Administrative Memorandum is in preparation ordering commanders to derequisition educational facilities at the earliest possible date.



28. An agreement has been reached with the Minister to permit provveditori agli studi appointed and recommended by AUS to participate in national examinations for permanent positions regardless of their Civil Service grade.
29. Arrangements have been made to facilitate transfers of teachers who formerly taught in territory now under Yugoslav jurisdiction, to Italian provinces.
30. The Minister's commission on elementary school text books has approved 103 different books for 1945-46.
31. The detailed study of Italian education, its history and present organization, presented to the Minister by the Education Sub-Commission, is to be published in Italian by Garganti, of Milan, to whom the Minister has given publication rights.
32. The new programs for teacher-training schools, prepared by a Ministerial commission, was submitted to the Education Sub-Commission for criticism. Criticism by the Education Sub-Commission have resulted in a considerable improvement in the program, which was already a long step in advance of the old one.
33. The Minister is asking assistance from the Education Sub-Commission in regard to a new program of physical education. Materials have been received from the United States and request from Great Britain to help the commission, which has to start from scratch, the previous physical education program having consisted largely of fascist propaganda and military drills.
34. The plans for a central reference catalogue of all Rome libraries to enable both Italian and foreign students to avail themselves of the rich but scattered and badly catalogued materials, has moved forward with the preparation of a detailed plan and budget by a Ministerial commission.
35. Marked progress has been made in the joint publishing program of the Minister of Public Instruction, USIS, and Education Sub-Commission. Some manuscripts have been received and others are in preparation for a series of educational monographs to accompany the USIS Education Bulletin, and to be distributed gratis to teachers. A Professor Girosoli has arrived from Washington and is pushing the publication of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on North and South America for elementary schools and 30,000 copies of a book on civics for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.
36. An arrangement has been made with the Library of Congress for purchase of books in America for Italian Universities and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can use books to be purchased in Italy. The Minister of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a credit of £ 200,000 in Great Britain, balanced by British Council and Embassy expenses in Italy and earmarked for book purchases through commercial channels.



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38. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students to Great Britain. The Minister of Public Instruction has nominated the students. A considerable fund has been raised for scholarships for Italian advanced students who wish to study in the United States. The Minister has appointed a committee to work out plans for selection of the students, in cooperation with representatives of the United States Embassy and the Education Sub-Commission.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH SUB-COMMISSION

39. Political. - Both the appointment of an Alto Commissario for Public Health and a definition of the functions of the Alto Commissario have been amended by legislative decrees during the month of August.

40. Public Health. -

a) Up to 27 Aug, 2,402 Sick Italian repatriates have arrived at Merano. This has been much in excess of schedule and the bed capacity of the Hospital Command is strained to its limits. Difficulties are being experienced in



in obtaining sufficient Italian Red Cross personnel and this Headquarters with the Italian Red Cross, the High Commissioner for Public Health and the Ministry of Post War Assistance, is trying to meet the necessary requirements of the Merano Repatriation Hospital Command. APHQ authority for the use of captured hospital equipment, ambulances and domestic transport for the needs of the Hospital Command have been sought but not yet obtained. The project is one of such international importance that unless immediate and willing cooperation is given by all authorities concerned, serious repercussions are bound to occur.

- b) Only one case of Typhus was notified during August in a refugee from Belgrade. One belated notification referable to the end of July was received from Biadly.
- c) Smallpox figures both in Naples and elsewhere in Italy have shown a marked and gratifying decrease.
- d) Weekly searches at collecting stations in the River Delta continue to show a very low mosquito density. Although two particular areas have yielded a large increase in figures this is purely relative and causes no concern with regard to Malaria Transmission.
- e) No reply has yet been received from the Italian Government regarding the APHQ proposals regarding the staffing of VD Hospitals by Allied Consultants.
- f) The infant mortality rates for Rome Communes for July was 79.9 as compared with 96.9 in June.
- g) Deaths from all forms of tuberculosis in Rome during July were 238 as compared with 233 in June.

40. Veterinary. - It is anticipated that the activities of the Veterinary Branch will cease at the end of August. The Italian Government has been notified accordingly. Partial distribution of all veterinary supplies has been made and it is anticipated that distribution of the remainder will soon be effected. No further imports of veterinary supplies will take place. No serious outbreak of communicable disease amongst animals has occurred during August.

41. Welfare. - The Welfare Branch has now turned over to UNRRA and EMUHEI all problems pertaining to the distribution of food and clothing. 217 tons of blankets have been made available by the Commerce Sub-Commission for distribution. Increasing responsibility for welfare matters is being turned over to the Italian authorities.

42. Medical Supplies. - EMUHEI has in August only completed the distribution of its May supplies in Italian Government territory. The supplies in the Naples warehouse, valued at \$1,330,000 have been handed over to the Istituto Commerciale Estero the organization designated by the Italian Government for accepting such supplies. The Florence warehouse is in the process of being handed over. With the dissolution of 2,665 COMED no further requisitions for medical supplies for 1946 have been submitted. The future responsibility for Category "B" medical supplies will be accepted by UNRRA and EMUHEI.



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43. Personnel. - Colonel THOMAS H. Vago has been appointed Director of this Sub-Commission. The Legion of Merit has been awarded to two officers of the Sub-Commission and the Bronze Star to two officers and one enlisted man. The staff of the Sub-Commission has been further depleted by the departure of Lt Colonel BIZZINERO and Dr. MARSHALL, while a number of American Officers have been declared surplus to establishment.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY SUB-COMMISSION

44. During August the Public Safety Sub-Commission has been particularly concerned with procurement of clothing, arms and equipment for the several police agencies so that when the turnover of Northern Italy is effected, the forces of law and order may be prepared to resist sporadic mob actions. Mobile battalions of Carabinieri are being armed and supplied with Italian tanks. By cooperation of British and American Army Units, training is being given to Carabinieri and their officers in the operation of their new equipment. However, in substituting tanks for armoured cars, additional training is necessary and a serious problem of supply arises in obtaining sufficient petrol etc, for tank operation. Unless the Carabinieri are equipped with satisfactory



sidearms and automatic rifles and sufficient transport a few tanks will not suffice to maintain order. Trucks, cars and motorcycles in addition to armament are of material importance.

45. The rate of crime has reduced materially, but the continuance, on a large scale of armed robberies is of deep concern. Raids by Police agencies assisted by Allied Army units have netted some small caches of arms. The presence of many large dumps of enemy arms and ammunition not strongly guarded is a threat to future safety. Efforts are underway to have collections completed speedily or proper guard maintained.

46. Mine clearance has lagged lately as crews were used for arms collection work, but will resume shortly. Counterfeiting seems to have been reduced in volume by previous police activity. Stripes are numerous based on pay or of political background but the number of people involved are small and no serious incidents have been reported. Only small public demonstrations have been reported, except in the Miraflores large area, where clashes between the populace and carabinieri are still serious.

#### MONUMENTS, FINE ARTS & ARCHIVES SUB-COMMISSION

47. Headquarters. - The Sub-Commission has received from London the newly-published booklet of the Macmillan Commission: Losses and Survivals in the War of Works of Art in Italy, Part I, South of Bologna. The edition sold out in four days in London. It is based on first reports of the Sub-Commission and it is a pity, therefore, in view of the high percentage of inaccuracies contained, that proofs were not submitted to the Sub-Commission for corrections of fact.

48. Florence. - Through contacts with Control Commission Germany, there were discovered in Florence nine highly important French Impressionist masterpieces, which had been seized by the Nazis from French owners and then "exchanged" to the Fascist Government in a fantastically shady deal. Investigation continues. Meanwhile, the pictures have been assigned for protective custody to the Superintendent of Galleries in Rome, and the French embassy has been fully informed.

49. Venezia Giulia. - It has at last been possible to assign a full-time IFAA officer. Projects are in hand for first-aid repairs to the Duomo, S. Francesco, and the Temple of Augustus in Fola, and for protective measures at S. Giusto and the Vespro Romano in Trieste.

50. Difficulties arising from the early completion of Castello Miraflores by SO 284 Mir, without formal requisition procedure, have been straightened out.

51. Venezia Region. - Concentration is still on projects for first-aid repair. During August, 37 additional projects were approved to Superintendencies of Monuments; of these the most notable is the Church of the Eremitani in Padova. A Genio Civile project for the Basilica Palladiana in Vicenza was also approved.

52. Among important works of art returned to their normal locations in Venice



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49. Tonessa Giulia. - It has at last been possible to assign a full-time FAO Officer. Projects are in hand for first-aid repairs to the Duomo, S. Francesco, and the Temple of Augustus in Fola, and for protective measures at S. Giusto and the Teatro Farnese in Trieste.

50. Difficulties arising from the early occupation of Castello Miravere by HQ 2 NZ Div. without formal requisition procedure, have been straightened out.

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52. Among important works of art returned to their normal locations in Venice were the Lion of St. Mark to its column in the Piazza, the Carus four horses to the facade of St. Mark's, and the great Titian Assumption to the Church of the Friari. The Exhibition of Five Centuries of Venetian Painting continues its fine success.

53. Lombardia Region. - At Paria, conferences have saved from complete demolition the important but damaged bridge across the Ticino. At Bergamo and Brescia protection has been obtained for monuments and parks.

54. Piemonte Region. - Projects for first-aid repair to the damaged monuments of Torino are in hand. More works of art from deposits have been returned to Novara and Torino; other deposits in the field have been examined in the course of August in all seven provinces of the Region.

55. Liguria Region. - Due to shortage of personnel, FAO work here is being supervised by the Education Officer, with periodic visits by FAO Officer from Menton. Approval of first-aid repair projects continues.

56. Archives - The main work of the month has again been concerned with the ministerial archives. A tour of the following repositories has been made: Alessandria, Bologna, Florence, Genoa, Ince, Lucce, Mantova, Massa, Milano, Modena, Pisa, Torino, Venice and Verona.

57. Personnel and awards. - Lt Col J.B. Ward Perkins (B) has become Director of the Sub-Commission, and Major M.T. Newton (A) Deputy Director.

#### DISPATCHED PRISONS AND REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION

59. The number of Italians received during August fell rather short of the original estimate of 225,000 for the month, this almost entirely to the breakdown of bridges over the Brenner Pass route which is the main route to Italy repatriation route carrying a daily average of 5,000 persons. Only 5,362 persons were received over the Brenner route throughout the period 11 - 16 August causing a drop of more than 30,000 in the total for the month and a subsequent delay in the completion of the repatriation of Italians.

60. During August approximately 180,000 Italians have been returned to Italy, through the Brenner and Swiss routes. In addition 4,000 were received by land, sea and air at Bari, Naples and Taranto from Greece, France, Sardinia, Yugoslavia and Albania. A total of 480,000 Italians have been received from Germany and Austria to date. Since January 1944, 693,308 Italians have been returned to their homes. On 31 August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include any numbers which have yet to come into the American, British and French Zones from the Russian Areas. It has been agreed with the Soviet Authorities to move 60,000 Italians into USSR from a Soviet Area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet Area in Austria. There are 1,150 Italians in Norway, 20 of whom fought with the Germans. These will not be moved until Italian Government has facilities for internment. In any case the more deserving Italians elsewhere will be repatriated first. The present rate of receiving Italians from Germany and Austria into Italy is approximately 5,000 per day through the Brenner Pass; 2,500 per day over the Brenner route from Switzerland; and 2,000 per week through Anvers to Congo. Small numbers are coming through to Nordhilders from France. Throughout the month 60,652 Italians have been transported from home to destinations in the South of Italy, and 59,469 have been moved down to Rome from the North. Almost 3,000 Italians have been shipped from Fiumicino to Messina and Sardinia during the month. The repatriation of Italians should near completion by the end of September. It will take a short time after that to disperse them to their homes, but by the middle of October it is hoped, all of them will be home.

61. In addition to the movement of Italians from Northern Europe, Greeks are



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61. In addition to the movement of Italians from Northern Europe, Greeks are also being transported from Switzerland through Italy to Bari for repatriation to Greece. They are arriving at the rate of about 800 per week and are shipped from Bari to Patras. So far approximately 5,000 have been received in Bari of which 1,500 have been repatriated to Greece. A party of 700 Jews from Switzerland, destined for Palestine have, after much discussion and interchange of cables, arrived and are now awaiting onward sea movement to Palestine.

62. Four Camps in the North have been closed down during the month. These were at Villa Vicentina, Crenone, Treviso and Cuneo. The position with regard to rail transport appeared serious at the beginning of the month, when it seemed that South-bound Italians from Padua, Pescentina and Milan were all being sent to 3081 and no additional rail transport was available from Bologna onwards. On 24 August, arrangements were made for the rail programme to include 3 trains a week from Milan to the South via Bologna; 7 trains from Pescentina to the South; 3 from Bologna to the

South via Rome, and 4 via the East Coast. Northern Italians are now transported

East and West by trains instead of by road, one train running from Pescentina to Milan and return every day, and one from Pescentina to Milano and return every other day.

63. A scheme is being formulated whereby a sanatorium at Lera, south of Modena, will be partly used for the hospitalization of Allied National T.B. patients. Nation Scale No 24 was introduced on 1 August for all refugees. This scale is a good one and will provide a well balanced diet. No authority exists, however, on the scale for supplementary food for invalids although young children can be provided with an issue of milk and fresh fruits. One case of typhoid was reported from Como on 24 August but the incubation period showed that the patient had become infected in Germany.

64. Registration under the SHAN system continues satisfactorily. On 31 Aug, 17,646 persons had been registered out of a total population of 21,128. A total of 4,900 persons were repatriated or evacuated out of Italy during the month in groups under the SHAN system. These were mainly Greeks to Greece and the remainder repatriated a shipment of Jews to Palestine.

65. By the end of August 1945, 106,220 Displaced Persons had been recorded by the Record Bureau. This shows an increase of 10,781 names over the 95,439 registered at the end of the previous month and it is also the highest number of persons to be registered in any single month during the year. A total of 6,900 communications were dealt with during the month of August.

66. All IIR S/O Officers, except those operating Camps in the Ancona Area and the South were instructed to retire their AC Inquest Warrants by 20 Aug thereby placing the financing of all Camps in the North under the respective Prefects who now furnish the funds and personnel for making all cash payments. It is contemplated that Prefects will have taken over the provision of funds and personnel for making all cash payments in Allied Nationals Camps by 15 Sep 45. Thus, on or about 15 Sep no IIR Sub-Commission Officer will hold an AC Inquest Warrant and all Camps will be financed by the Italian Government.

#### PATRIOT BRANCH

67. Ministry of Post War Aid - Ministry of Post War Aid has now taken over Patriot work from Ministry of Occupied Italy.

68. Employment of War Veterans. - This Branch has received and commented upon a draft decree concerning the employment of war veterans.

69. Medical aid for Patriots. - A hospital at Trento is to be put into operation solely for Patriot personnel.

70. Insignia of Honour. - Conditions under which the Insignia of Honour is to be awarded have been forwarded to Regions.
