SUBJECT : Supplement to Abridged Monthly Report
for August, 1945.

TO : Executive Commissioner
(Thru Civil Affairs Section).

The recruiting and training of the Civil Police for Venezia Giulia is proceeding satisfactory. Some 2000 applications have been received. All applicants are being carefully screened and vetted. 140 recruits are undergoing training at the Police School established by the Public Safety Division. This class will be ready for duty by mid September. There is the usual difficulty in procuring uniforms and equipment.

The largest civil disturbances of the month occurred in Matera Province. On the 1st at Matera about 1000 persons rioted burning several buildings and forcing the prison to release prisoners. On the 2nd at Ferrandina some 1500 rioters cut communications and set fire to government buildings. One civilian, alleged to be Fascist, was killed by the crowd at the latter place.

Mine Clearance

1. Mine Clearance in Italy is in the main now confined to Italian Government territory where the Italian Government are continuing the work started by AG/AMC. There are a number of mines in Liguria Region where civilians and one Company of Italian Engineers are operating. There are a few mines in Venesia Region but unexploded bombs and unguarded ammunition dumps are the real problem. With the withdrawal of AG/AMC the usual difficulties of transport and fuel tend to increase, the result being that the work tends to slow up considerably.

2. Three Italian Mine Clearing Companies have been put to work in the Poelli, Ravenna, Ferrara area clearing the banks of the rivers with a view to their early repair so as to avoid flooding of large areas when the rivers are in flood, probably October.

3. Maps of German Minefields on Italian territory are now coming forward and as they are in detail should lead to a speeding up of mine clearance work and a reduction in casualties. A staff of draughtsmen are engaged making copies for the Italian Ministry of War and for retention by AMC. All map records will eventually be handed over to the Italian Ministry of War for safe keeping.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUB-COMMISSION4. Preparation of electoral lists

a) Provincial Commissions for Disfranchisement of Fascists. - The Italian Government is at present selecting the Presidents of the Provincial Commissions which are to be set up in AMC territory to decide as to the disfranchisement of alleged Fascists. Instructions have been issued for the appointment of the other two members who, with the President, constitute the Commission in each Province. They will be nominated from a list of popular judges by the First President of the Court of Appeal and then formally appointed by order of the Provincial Commissioner.

The Cassellario Giudiziale of 14 Provinces have suffered damage as a result of the war. Since electoral lists containing names of persons born in such Provinces must therefore be checked and extracts of original records taken centrally in Rome, and several hundreds of thousands of names are involved, it is evident that the inefficient functioning of the Cassellario Giudiziale Centrale may ultimately affect the date on which elections can be held. The matter is being taken up with Sig. PARELLI.
 - c) Extensions of the Time Limit set for the Preparation of Electoral Lists. - Extensions of the Time Limit have been granted to 67 Communes in AMG territory; the maximum period of extension granted was 30 days.
5. National Consultative Assembly ("CONSIGLIO"). - The Italian Government have completed the appointment of the great majority of the members of this body. It is stated in the Rome press that it will hold its first meeting on 25 September. The relevant decrees of the Italian Government include provisions for the appointment

of 6 "Consulteri" to represent Venezia Giulia. These Decrees have not been implemented in Venezia Giulia; but there is nothing to prevent AMG sanctioning the making of such appointments as an administrative act. The U.S. and British Ambassadors have approved of such sanction being given. It is not necessary for the Italian Government to hold any consultations for the selection of Consulteri with the local Party organizations of UN in Venezia Giulia. The Italian Government have recently passed a Decree (which is about to be published) dispensing with these requirements.

6. Constituent Assembly ("CONSTITUENTE"). - The Minister for the Costituente has appointed a Commission to study the electoral law to be adopted for the election of the Constituent Assembly. The Ministry anticipate that the Commission will finish its labours by the end of October.

7. Venezia Giulia. - On 1 August 1945, Major Temple, Deputy Director, returned from a visit to Venezia Giulia, where he helped to prepare a plan for the organization of local government in the Region which took into consideration the jurisdictional position of the Area as still part of Italy and recognised the problems involving the presence of various national groups. The type of government set up under this plan has been approved by CNS. Essentially, it reproduces the Italian system, but uses a different nomenclature.

LEGAL SUB-COMMISSION

8. There has been a general decline in the number of AMG Court cases throughout all regions. Possession of arms cases are still numerous; ample sentences are being dealt out for such offences. Possession of Allied property and petty thefts of Allied property are prevalent among civilian employees in the port areas. Counterfeit money cases are still requiring much of the Courts' time. General Courts were held in several places dealing with murder and counterfeiting.

9. The Italian Courts in the north, though understaffed, are functioning normally.

10. Courts of Assize procedure was modified, with the approval of this Sub-Commission, by D.L. No 166 of 2 August 1945. Proceedings are thereby rendered more speedy but the amount of personnel needed for bench and prosecutor's office considerably increased.

11. EAOs have been instructed to request Italian judicial authorities to transfer to other courts for trial, cases where local feelings would be likely prevent impartial justice being done. A number of cases have been so transferred. A number of death sentences have been confirmed by the Minister and CIA and executions have been carried out.

12. The Yugoslav authorities have repeatedly requested this Sub-Commission to arrange for AMG and Italian authorities the handing over of a number of alleged Yugoslav citizens now detained in various jails of Italy. Each case has been given careful consideration but no decision has yet been arrived at. Yugoslav authorities have been requested to render executive decisions of the Court of Appeal of Trieste affecting persons and property situated in territory under their control.

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13. Difficulties have been experienced in Florence in connection with the appointment of a "Commissario" to the Fiat Works. A meeting with Sig. Gronchi and Colonel Thomas took place in Milan and a solution, acceptable to all parties concerned, appears probable. The Minister on August 10th sent, at the request of this Sub-Commission, a circular to all First Presidents, setting out that the fact of having been a member of the Fascist Republican Army did not in itself constitute an offence.

14. No general orders were issued during August.

EDUCATION SUB-COMMISSION

Regional activities

15. A meeting of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 18 August. Dates for opening schools for the autumn term, the freeing of occupied school buildings,

approval of text books, the nature of provveditori appointed by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the progress of youth activities and especially Boy and Girl Scouts, etc., were among the matters discussed.

16. Operation of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order N. 35. In no Region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.

17. Each Regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with Provveditori agli Studi. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and like worst in Venezia where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for him has been inadequate.

18. Lombardy and Venezia Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.

19. Regional text book commissions have approved a large number of new text books for 1945-46.

20. All Regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial Commissioners are making a drive to clear schools from troops, refugees, and political parties in time for the autumn opening. In Piemonte 55 schools are occupied by Allied troops, 14 by Italian troops, and 32 (mostly in Turin) by Italian civilians - political parties, "enti", and occasionally refugees. Many of these will be ousted in September. The worst situation is in four provinces of Venezia - every school in the city of Bolzano is wholly or partly occupied; in the province of Udine Allied troops have 14 schools, political parties 13, refugees 18 - these, plus 203 schools damaged or destroyed by war, make nearly half the schools of the province unavailable, and there is little hope for relief since troops are moving into the four northern provinces.

21. Repairs of school are under way in all Regions, but are slow largely because of lack of material.

22. Universities and other higher institutions are now, practically without exception, operated and reorganised throughout the north. Building repairs are under way for all damaged universities and projects are drawn up for the longer range construction.

23. The summer colonies in five provinces of Piemonte Region have been very successful, the ones in Turin opening a second session for 2,500 children. Boy Scouts are increasing in number everywhere, Girl Guides at a much slower rate.

The War Materials Disposal Division in Lombardy Region has furnished some surplus war materials to the Boy Scouts through the Regional Education Officer. Lombardy held a training course for Scout leaders 11-19 August, on a wooded tract leased, without charge, to the Boy Scouts for nine years, by the owner, Signore Oaso. In Venezia a British soldier obtained the use of a hall, and football, medicine balls, etc, from his unit, for a Scout troop.

24. School lunch programmes are being set up for the opening of schools - they have been approved for 111 communes in Venezia.

25. Progress has been made toward opening of schools in the German language in Bolzano. Swiss text books have been selected and prices for printing obtained from Rome.

26. Education in Venezia Giulia is being organized according to plan. The impatient attitude of the National Liberation Committee is causing difficulties, but in spite of this and other problems, remarkable progress has been made.

Headquarters activities

27. ANHQ has completed its survey of school requisitions. It shows that 663 schools were under requisition on 1 August, of which 232 will have been derequisitioned by 1 October. The situation generally should continue to improve except in the North where early movement is not anticipated. An ANHQ Administrative Memo **3116** is in preparation ordering commanders to derequisition educational facilities at the earliest possible date.

28. An agreement has been reached with the Minister to permit provveditori agli studi appointed and recommended by AUC to participate in national examinations for permanent positions regardless of their Civil Service grade.
29. Arrangements have been made to facilitate transfers of teachers who formerly taught in territory now under Yugoslav jurisdiction, to Italian provinces.
30. The Minister's commission on elementary school text books has approved 185 different books for 1945-46.
31. The detailed study of Italian education, its history and present organization, presented to the Minister by the Education Sub-Commission, is to be published in Italian by Garzanti, of Milan, to whom the Minister has given publication rights.
32. The new programme for teacher-training schools, prepared by a Ministerial commission, was submitted to the Education Sub-Commission for criticism. Criticism by the Education Sub-Commission has resulted in a considerable improvement in the program, which was already a long step in advance of the old one.
33. The Minister is asking assistance from the Education Sub-Commission in regard to a new program of physical education. Materials have been received from the United States and request from Great Britain to help the commission, which has to start from scratch, the previous physical education program having consisted largely of Fascist propaganda and military drill.
34. The plans for a central reference catalogue of all Rome libraries to enable both Italian and foreign students to avail themselves of the rich but scattered and badly catalogued materials, has moved forward with the preparation of a detailed plan and budget by a Ministerial commission.
35. Marked progress has been made in the joint publishing program of the Minister of Public Instruction, USIB, and Education Sub-Commission. Some manuscripts have been received and others are in preparation for a series of educational monographs to accompany the USIB Education Bulletin, and to be distributed gratis to teachers. A Professor Orosolafi has arrived from Washington and is pushing the publication of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on North and South America for elementary schools and 30,000 copies of a book on civics for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.
36. An arrangement has been made with the Library of Congress for purchase of books in America for Italian Universities and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can use books to be purchased in Italy. The Minister of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a credit of £ 200,000 in Great Britain, balanced by British Council and Embassy expenses in Italy and earmarked for book purchases through commercial channels.
37. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students to Great Britain. The Minister of Public Instruction has nominated the students.

The Minister of Public Instruction has nominated the students. A considerable fund has been raised for scholarships for Italian advanced students who wish to study in the United States. The Minister has appointed a committee to work out plans for selection of the students, in cooperation with representatives of the United States Embassy and the Education Sub-Commission.

PUBLIC HEALTH SUB-COMMISSION

38. Political. - Both the appointment of an Alto Commissario for Public Health and a definition of the functions of the Alto Commissario have been amended by legislative decrees during the month of August.

39. Public Health. -

- a) By 27 Aug. 2,402 sick Italian repatriates have arrived at Merano. This has been such in excess of schedule and the bed capacity of the Hospital Command is strained to its limits. Difficulties are being experienced in

in obtaining sufficient Italian Red Cross personnel and this Headquarters with the Italian Red Cross, the High Commissioner for Public Health and the Ministry of Post War Assistance, is trying to meet the necessary requirements of the Mervino Reorganization Hospital Command. AMH authority for the use of captured hospital equipment, ambulance and domestic transport for the needs of the Hospital Command have been sought but not yet obtained. The project is one of such international importance that unless immediate and willing cooperation is given by all authorities concerned, serious repercussions are bound to occur.

- b) Only one case of Typhus was notified during August in a refugee from Bologna. One belated notification referable to the end of July was received from Sicily.
- c) Malaria figures both in Naples and elsewhere in Italy have shown a marked and gratifying decrease.
- d) Weekly searches at collecting stations in the Liber Delta continue to show a very low mosquito density. Although two particular areas have yielded a large increase in figures this is purely relative and causes no concern with regard to Malaria transmission.
- e) No reply has yet been received from the Italian Government regarding the AMH proposals regarding the staffing of M Hospitals by Allied Consultants.
- f) The infant mortality rates for Rome Communes for July was 77.9 as compared with 96.9 in June.
- g) Deaths from all forms of tuberculosis in Rome during July were 238 as compared with 233 in June.

40. Veterinary. - It is anticipated that the activities of the Veterinary Branch will cease at the end of August. The Italian Government has been notified accordingly. Partial distribution of all veterinary supplies has been made and it is anticipated that distribution of the remainder will soon be effected. No further imports of veterinary supplies will take place. No serious outbreak of communicable disease amongst animals has occurred during August.

41. Welfare. - The Welfare Branch has now turned over to UNRRA and UNRRA all problems pertaining to the distribution of food and clothing. 247 tons of blankets have been made available by the Commerce Sub-Commission for distribution. Increasing responsibility for Welfare matters is being turned over to the Italian authorities.

42. Medical Supplies. - UNRRA has in August only completed the distribution of its day supplies in Italian Government territory. The supplies in the Naples warehouse, valued at \$1,330,000 have been handed over to the Istituto Commerciale Veneto the organization designated by the Italian Government for accepting such supplies. The Florence warehouse is in the process of being handed over. With the dissolution of 2,665 COMED no further requisitions for medical supplies for 1946 have been submitted. The future responsibility for Category "A" medical supplies will be accepted by UNRRA and UNRRA.

- e) No reply has yet been received from the Italian Government regarding the AMO proposals regarding the staffing of 70 hospitals by Allied Consultants.
- f) The infant mortality rates for Rome Communes for July was 19.9 as compared with 96.9 in June.
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43. Personnel. - Colonel THOMAS M. PAGE has been appointed Director of this Sub-Commission. The Legion of Merit has been awarded to two officers of the Sub-Commission and the Bronze Star to two officers and one enlisted man. The staff of the Sub-Commission has been further depleted by the departure of Lt Colonel RICHMOND and Dr. MASTERS, while a number of American officers have been declared surplus to establishment.

PUBLIC SAFETY SUB-COMMISSION

44. During August the Public Safety Sub-Commission has been particularly concerned with procurement of clothing, arms and equipment for the several police agencies so that when the turnover of Northern Italy is effected, the forces of law and order may be prepared to resist sporadic mob actions. Mobile battalions of Carabinieri are being armed and supplied with Italian tanks. By cooperation of British and American units, training is being given to Carabinieri and their officers in the operation of their new equipment. However, in substituting tanks for armored cars, additional training is necessary and a serious problem of supply arises in obtaining sufficient petrol etc, for tank operation. Unless the Carabinieri are equipped with satisfactory

sidearms and automatic rifles and sufficient transport a few tanks will not suffice to maintain order. Trucks, cars and motorbikes in addition to armament are of material importance.

45. The rate of crime has reduced materially, but the extortion, on a large scale of armed robberies is of deep concern. Raids by police agencies assisted by Allied Army units have netted some small caches of arms. The presence of many large dumps of enemy arms and ammunition not strongly guarded is a threat to future safety. Efforts are underway to have collections completed speedily or proper guard maintained.

46. Mine clearance has lagged lately as arms were used for arms collection work, but will resume shortly. Counterfeiting seems to have been reduced in volume by previous police activity. Stashes are numerous based on pay or of political background but the number of people involved are small and no serious incidents have been reported. Only small public demonstrations have been reported, except in the Miravino large area, where clashes between the partisans and carabinieri are still serious.

ACCOMPLISHING THE ARTS & ANTI-ARTS SUB-COMMISSION

47. Headquarters. - The Sub-Commission has received from London the newly-published booklet of the Macmillan Commission: Losses and Survivals in the War of Works of Art in Italy, Part I, South of Bologna. The edition sold out in four days in London. It is based on first reports of the Sub-Commission and it is a pity, therefore, in view of the high percentage of inaccuracies contained, that proofs were not submitted to the Sub-Commission for corrections of fact.

48. Florence. - Through contacts with Control Commission Germany, there were discovered in Florence nine highly important French Impressionist masterpieces, which had been seized by the Nazis from French owners and then "exchanged" to the Fascist government in a fantastically shady deal. Several other centuries. Meanwhile, the pictures have been consigned for protective custody to the Superintendent of Galleries in Rome, and the French embassy has been fully informed.

49. Venezia Giulia. - It has at last been possible to assign a full-time IFAA Officer. Projects are in hand for first-aid repairs to the Basilica of San Francesco, and the Temple of Augustus in Pola, and for protective measures at San Giusto and the San Pietro in Trieste.

50. Difficulties arising from the early occupation of Castello Miravino by the 2nd Air, without formal requisition procedure, have been straightened out.

51. Venezia Region. - Concentration is still on projects for first-aid repair. During August, 37 additional projects were approved to Superintendencies of Venetia; of these the most notable is the Church of the Redentore in Padova. A Genio Civile project for the Basilica Palladiana in Vicenza was also approved.

52. Among important works of art returned to their normal locations in Venice were the Lion of St. Mark to its column in the Piazza, the famous four horses to the Church of the Friari.

The exhibition of Five Centuries of Venetian Painting continues its fine success.
53. Lombardia Region. - At Pavia, conferences have saved from complete demolition the important but damaged bridge across the Ticino. At Bergamo and Brescia protection has been obtained for monuments and parks.
54. Piemonte Region. - Projects for first-aid repair to the damaged monuments of Torino are in hand. More works of art from deposits have been returned to Novara and Torino; other deposits in the field have been examined in the course of inspections in all seven provinces of the Region.
55. Liguria Region. - Due to shortage of personnel, USAA work here is being supervised by the Education Officer, with periodic visits by USAA Officer from Piemonte. Approval of first-aid repair projects continues.

56. Archives. - The main work of the month has again been concerned with the ministerial archives. A tour of the following repositories has been made: Alessandria, Bologna, Florence, Genoa, Lucca, Mantova, Massa, Milano, Pisa, Torino, Venice and Verona.

57. Personnel and awards. - Lt Col J.E. Ward Perkins (B) has become Director of the Sub-Commission, and Major R.T. Newton (A) Deputy Director.

UNPAID DEBTS AND REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION

59. The number of Italians received during August fell rather short of the original estimate of 225,000 for the month, but almost entirely to the breakdown of bridges over the Brenner Pass route which is the main USZ/NE to Italy repatriation route carrying a daily average of 5,000 persons. Only 5,362 persons were received over the Brenner route throughout the period 11 - 15 August causing a drop of more than 30,000 in the total for the month and a subsequent delay in the completion of the repatriation of Italians.

60. During August approximately 180,000 Italians have been returned to Italy, through the Brenner and Swiss routes. In addition 4,000 were received by land, sea and air at Bari, Naples and Taranto from Greece, France, Sardinia, Yugoslavia and Albania. A total of 480,000 Italians have been received from Germany and Austria to date. Since January 1944, 693,308 Italians have been returned to their homes. On 31 August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include any numbers which have yet to come into the American, British and French zones from the Russian Areas. It has been agreed with the Soviet Authorities to move 60,000 Italians into USZ/NE from a Soviet Area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet Area in Austria. It will take a short time after that to disperse them to their homes, but by the middle of October it is hoped, all of them will be home.

61. In addition to the movement of Italians from Northern Europe, Greeks are also being transported from Switzerland through Italy to Bari for repatriation to Greece. They are arriving at the rate of about 800 per week and are shipped from Bari to Patras. So far approximately 5,000 have been received in Bari of which 4,500 have been repatriated to Greece. A party of 700 Jews from Switzerland, destined for Palestine have, after much discussion and interchange of cables, arrived and are now awaiting onward sea movement to Palestine.

62. Four Camps in the North have been closed down during the month. These were at Villa Viontina, Grosena, Treviso and Orsco. The position with regard to rail transport appeared serious at the beginning of the month, when it seemed that about 100,000 Italians from Padua, Pescantina and Milan were all being sent to Bologna, and no additional rail transport was available from Bologna onwards. On 24 August, however, arrangements were made for the rail programme to include 3 trains a week from Milan to the South via Bologna; 7 trains from Pescantina to the South; 3 from Bologna to the

South via Rome, and 4 via the East Coast. Northern Italians are now transported

East and West by trains instead of by road, one train running from Pescoantina to Milan and return every day, and one from Pescoantina to Udine and return every other day.

63. A scheme is being formulated whereby a sanatorium at Leca, south of Modena, will be partly used for the hospitalization of Allied National T.B. patients. Nation Scale No 24 was introduced on 1 August for all refugees. This scale is a good one and will provide a well balanced diet. No authority exists, however, on the scale for supplementary food for invalids although young children can be provided with an issue of milk and fresh fruits. One case of typhoid was reported from Cosso on 21 August but the incubation period showed that the patient had become infected in Germany.

64. Re-istration under the SHAEF system continues satisfactorily. On 31 Aug, 17,646 persons had been registered out of a total population of 20,528. A total of 4,980 persons were repatriated or evacuated out of Italy during the month in groups under the SHAEF system. These were mainly Greeks to Greece and the remainder represented a shipment of Jews to Palestine.

65. By the end of August 1945, 106,220 Displaced Persons had been recorded by the Record Bureau. This shows an increase of 10,784 names over the 95,439 registered at the end of the previous month and it is also the highest number of persons to be registered in any single month during the year. A total of 6,900 communications were dealt with during the month of August.

66. All IFR S/C Officers, except those operating Camps in the Ancona Area and the South were instructed to retire their AC Imprest Warrants by 20 Aug thereby placing the financing of all Camps in the North under the respective Prefects who now furnish the funds and personnel for making all cash payments. 70. Insignia of Honour. - Conditions under which the Insignia of Honour is to be awarded have been forwarded to Regions.

1. Provincial Commissions for Disarmament of Pards.

(a) After considerable discussion with the Italian Government, the method to be followed in appointing the Provincial Commissions for Disarmament of Pards has been defined in a Directive issued by the Sub-Commission on 3 September 1945 (reference AG/45/4/16).

(b) The provincial officer of the Commission (by virtue of Article 1 of Decree 107 of 27 July 1944, as modified by Article 2 of Decree 1945, 1945, of 1945) has been only implemented and are in effect in all territory, in a letter to be submitted by the President of the Council of Ministers after consultation with the Minister of Grace and Justice and the High Commissioner for Disarmament against Pards. The Italian Government is at present selecting the President of the said Commission for each province, whose name will be published in the Gazzetta Ufficiale and duly legislated so that they are to be effective in all territory.

(c) Inasmuch as it is not specifically indicated who should actually appoint the other members of the Provincial Commissions, it has been agreed that the Provincial Commissions shall consist of a first President of the Court of Appeals to nominate the members; the appointment of such members to be made legal by formal order of the Provincial Commission.

2. Cassellario Giudiziale Centrale

On 28 August 1945, Major Ralph R. Temple, Deputy Director, visited the Cassellario Giudiziale Centrale in Rome. Major Temple has reported the conditions there to be chaotic and the system employed archaic. The judicial system, which provides a ready means of maintaining the state of an individual convicted and the nature of his crime, has not been kept up since 1930, so that information from judicial records of convictions for the last 15 years can be given five or six times as much as of convictions and up to 100 per cent. The Cassellario Giudiziale of several provinces have suffered damage as a result of the war and other clerical lists of such provinces must therefore be checked carefully in Rome, and several hundreds of thousands of cases are involved, it is evident that the inefficient functioning of the Cassellario Giudiziale Centrale has ultimately affected the state in which elections can be held. Adviser has been received that no further extensions are possible for the units and Materials Division; the final position in Verona is still pending. The situation is not yet known.

6. Political Organization, Stability (Continued)

(a) The Italian Government has completed the organization of the new government of the state of Milan. It is expected that the new government will be formed by the end of the year.

(b) The relevant details of the Italian Government include provisions for the organization of 6 "Constituent" to represent Veneto-Giulia. These details have not been finalized in Verona. It is noted that there is nothing to suggest that the organization of the new government will be an administrative matter. The Italian Government is aware of such action being taken. It is not necessary for the Italian Government to hold any consultation for the election of representatives of the new government of Milan in Verona-Giulia. The Italian Government is aware of the situation in Verona (which is noted to be published in the Italian press) and the requirements.

5. Constitutional Assembly (Continued)

The Minister for the Constitution and Secretary, Constitution to study the electoral law to be adopted for the election of the Constituent Assembly. The Ministry will study the situation with regard to the law by the end of October.

6. Political Organization

LEGAL AND COMMISSION

1. In northern Italy the main attention of the Courts is still focused on the possession of arms. There are indications however that the sentences of these courts and the publicity attached to them are having an effect. In Venice for example many piles of arms have been discovered abandoned by their owners, presumably for fear of the consequences of retaining them. The largest number of cases of this nature as in Lombardy where there were 106 trials.

2. There are still a large number of ^{cases of} wrongful possession of Allied property. These cases still form the bulk of the calendar in Naples and La Spezia, and are on the increase in Venice.

3. Cases are still occurring of counterfeiting. A large organization has been unearthed in Milan, dating five pre-occupation days, which equipped itself against the Allied arrival with large orders of the U.S. and English money, in addition to the more common lire and all currency. The counterfeit currency involved has a total face value of about 300 million lire.

4. Ten other serious cases were tried by General Courts, both on charges of murder.

LEGAL AND COMMISSION

5. The extraordinary Courts of Venice are making considerable progress but there is still considerable delay in obtaining from the Ministry of Justice an opinion on the merits of petitions against death sentences. Great dissatisfaction is expressed throughout the north at the length of time taken in the execution of these prisoners.

6. The atmosphere of the trials is becoming calmer and more acquiescent and being recorded. Out of 12 cases in Lombardy 12 death sentences were imposed. In Venice 14 out of 217. In Lombardy 11 out of 113. In Piemonte 9 out of 136.

7. The number of new cases is decreasing and it is the opinion of the Minister of Justice that the work of these courts should be brought to a close as soon as possible and all serious cases referred to the regular courts of the country. The extraordinary Courts have been

2. There are still a large number of unresolved cases of alleged property damage and still from the bulk of the evidence in Naples and Palermo, and are on the increase in Venice.

3. There are still concerns of counterfeiting. A large organization was unearthed in Milan, dealing from reconstruction days, which equipped itself against the alleged arrival of the new money of (G.M.I.), and English money, in addition to the new German lire and the currency. The counterfeiting currency identified has a total face value of about 300 million lire.

4. Ten other ancient cases were tried by General Courts, both on charges of murder.

ITALIAN COURTS

5. The extraordinary cases of justice are making considerable progress but there is still considerable delay in dealing from the Ministry of Justice on opinion on the merits of petition against death sentences. About 100 cases of petition is concerned though about the order at the length of time taken in the execution of these prisoners.

6. The statistics of the trials is becoming fuller and more complete are being recorded. Of 49 cases in Liguria 12 death sentences were imposed: in Veneto 11 out of 217; in Lombardy 11 out of 134; in Piemonte 9 out of 136.

7. The number of new cases is decreasing and it is the opinion of the Minister of Justice that the work of these courts should be brought to a close as soon as possible on all unresolved cases referred to the regular courts of justice. In the meantime the procedure of the extraordinary courts has been modified by a new decree, which speeds up the procedure and makes more personnel available for service with the courts.

8. Experience in each case has shown that had officers or clerks obtain a full trial in their own surroundings owing to popular feeling. Arrangements have therefore been made, with the concurrence of the Minister of Justice, for such cases to be transferred to another court. It may well be that this transfer will not affect the final result of the trials but the trials themselves will be more satisfactory.

9. An important decision of the Italian Courts was reached during the past year, under which it was held that the mere fact of having been a member of the Fascist Republic may not in itself constitute the element of collaboration with the Germans. This decision was followed by the Minister of Justice to all courts. In some cases the decision was very badly received.

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10. Possible difficulties have been experienced in Trieste over the question of supplies in cases where the matter of first instance is under Jugoslav control but the matter of appeal is at Trieste. The problem has been brought to the notice of the Jugoslav Delegation who are negotiating with the solution.

SECRET

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11. There has been no General Order of the published during the month.

12. The Italian Government has passed a law (inter alia):

- a. Extending the Italian law for currency.
- b. Preventing the holding of, or dealing in, gold and foreign currencies.

13. In the period of 1945 in Italy seems to be moving to a slow, it may not be too premature to remark that the train of Italian justice appears to be moving along, with a much heavier load and a far heavier permanent staff, but not much more quickly or slowly than it did before the war. While the overwhelming majority of the legal sub-commissioners are looking eyes over their shoulders as they currow with Cicero: "Stabat hic toga."

Monthly Report for August

INTRODUCTION:

The two matters of greatest general interest among the Education Subcommission's activities of the past month have to do with the situation in Bolzano and Venezia Giulia. The other activities, being for the most part a continuation of the work previously reported, are therefore summarized briefly, and the Director's full report on Bolzano and the complete report of 1st Lieutenant JOHN A. SINGER, Chief Education Officer for 13th Corps on the program in Venezia Giulia are given as Appendix 2 and 3.

1 - Regional Activities.

1. A meeting of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 18 August. Delegates for evening schools for the autumn term, the freeing of occupied school buildings, approval of text books, the future of provveditori regulated by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the progress of youth activities and especially Boy and Girl Scouts, etc., were among the matters discussed.
2. Separation of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order Number 56. In no Region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.
3. Each Regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with provveditori and staff. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and least in Venezia where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for him has been inadequate.
4. Lombardy and Veneto Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.
5. Regional text book commissions have approved a large number of new text books for 1945-6.
6. All Regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial

I - Regional Activities.

1. A session of all Education Officers was held in Rome, 15 August. Before opening schools for the autumn term, the framing of occupied school buildings, approval of text books, the failure of provveditori appointed by Allied Military Government, paper and school supplies, the strength of youth activities and especially boy and girl scouts, etc., were among the matters discussed.
2. Operation of schools in the North is proceeding under General Order Number 35. In no Region is it completed, but commissions are being urged to speed the work.
3. Each Regional Education Officer is keeping in close touch with Provveditori and staff. This proceeds best in Piemonte where there are two Education Officers for seven provinces and adequate transport, and least worst in Veneto where one Education Officer has ten provinces and transport for his has been inadequate.
4. Lombardy and Veneto Regions are arranging to open the autumn term early in order to allow schools to close during the severe weather, owing to lack of fuel.
5. Regional text book commissions have approved a list of number of new text books for 1945-6.
6. All Regional Education Officers, with assistance from Provincial Commissioners, are making a drive to clear schools from troops, refugees, and political parties in time for the autumn opening. In Piemonte 55 schools are occupied by Allied troops, 11 by Italian troops, and 32 (mostly in Turin) by Italian civilians -- political parties, "anti", and occasionally refugees. Many of these will be cleared in September. The worst situation is in four provinces of Veneto -- every school in the city of Padova is wholly or partly occupied; in the province of Treviso Allied troops have 13 schools, political parties 13, refugees 11 -- thus, plus 303 schools damaged or destroyed by war, make nearly half the schools of the province unavailable, and there is little hope for relief since troops are moving into the four northern provinces.
7. Repairs of schools are under way in all Regions, but are slow largely because of lack of material.
8. Universities and other higher institutions are new, practically without exception, created and reorganized throughout the North. The

Catholic University in Milan was operated under Decree-Memorandum 76, modified, by agreement with the Vatican, to set the special relationship which exists between the University and the Vatican. The situation committee has submitted its report, which will be accepted and put into effect on receipt of approval from the Vatican. The University of Milan selected as rector the senator, though not suspended by the operation committee, had served as rector under the socialist Lombardian regime; this caused such an outcry that it was persuaded to resign, and now elections will be held later.

Building repairs are under way for all damaged universities and projects are under way for the longer range construction.

9. The market collapsed in five provinces of the north. Regions have been very successful, the ones in Turin, Genoa, a second session for 2800 children. Boy Scouts are increasing in number everywhere, Girl Guides at a much slower rate.

The Carabinieri Division in Lombardy Division has furnished some complete war materials to the Boy Scouts through the Regional Education Officer. Lombardy held a training course for Scout leaders 11-19 August, on a wooded tract leased, without charge, to the Boy Scouts for nine years, by the mayor, Signor Onno. In Varese a British soldier obtained the use of a hall, for football, badminton, ball, etc., from his wife, for a Scout troop.

10. School lunch program are being set up for the opening of schools -- they have been approved for all courses in Varese.

11. Much progress has been made toward opening of schools in the German language in Solzano. Older text books have been collected and prices on printing obtained from Rome. See child report in Annex 2.

12. Education in Varese Division is being organized according to plan. The instrumental attitude of the National Liberation Committee is causing difficulties, but in spite of this and other problems, remarkable progress has been made. See last Lt. Director's full report in Annex 3.

II - Headquarters activities.

13. ANG has completed its survey of school regulations. It shows that 663 schools were under regulation on 1 August, of which 232 will have been deregulated by 1 October. The situation generally should continue to improve except in the South where early movement is not anticipated. An ANG Administrative Memorandum is in preparation ordering commanders to deregulation educational facilities at the

The War Materials Disposal Division in Leningrad is furnishing new surplus war materials to the Boy Scouts through the National Education Office. Leningrad has a training course for Scout leaders 11-12 August, on a wooded tract leased, without charge, to the Boy Scouts for one year, by the Govt. Dnepropetrovsk. In Vologda a Polish soldier obtained the use of a hall, and football, medicine balls, etc., from his unit, for a Scout troop.

10. School lunch programs are being set up for the opening of schools -- they have been approved for all communes in Ukraine.

11. Much progress has been made toward opening of schools in the Vologda Leningrad in Ukraine. Since that books have been collected and printed on printing obtained from arms. See full report in Annex 2.

12. Education in Ukraine is being organized according to plan. The instrumental attitude of the National Education Committee is causing difficulties, but is able to solve other problems, repairable progress has been made. See let 11. Annex 2 full report in Annex 3.

11 - Unpublished activities.

13. AEG has completed its survey of school requisitions. It shows that 663 schools were under requisition on 1 August, of which 232 will have been requisitioned by 1 October. The situation generally should continue to improve except in the South where early movement is not anticipated. An AEG Administrative Management is in preparation ordering equipment to requisition educational facilities at the earliest possible date.

14. An agreement has been reached with the Minister to provide (provisional) full study appointed and recommended by AEG to participate in national examinations for permanent positions regardless of their Civil Service grade.

15. Arrangements have been made to facilitate transfers of teachers who formerly taught in territory now under Yugoslav jurisdiction, to Russian provinces.

16. The Minister's consideration on elementary school text books has approved 18,000 different books for 1945-6 -- not too good, for the cost part, but at least there will be some competition for provincial adoptions. Allied paper will probably be supplemented by paper returned at low cost by the Ministry of Industry and Commerce, but this is still under negotiation.

17. The detailed study of Italian education, its history and present organization, prepared by Major A. A. Vercillo and presented to the Minister by the Education Subcommission, is to be published in Italian by Sargentini, of Milan, so that the Minister has given publication rights.
18. The new program for teacher-training schools, prepared by a Ministerial commission, was submitted to the Education Subcommission for criticism. A long report from the Education Subcommission and two all-day conferences with the commission have resulted, it is believed, in a considerable improvement in the program, which was already a long step in advance of the old one.
19. The Minister is asking assistance from the Education Subcommission to prepare to a new program of physical education. Materials have been received from the United States and requested from Great Britain to help the commission, which has to start from scratch. The previous physical education program having consisted largely of fascist propaganda and military drills.
20. The plans for a central reference catalogue of all Rome libraries to include both Italian and foreign students to swell the shelves of the rich but scattered and badly catalogued materials, has moved forward with the preparation of a detailed plan and budget by a Ministerial commission.
21. A started program has been made in the joint publishing program of the Minister of Public Instruction, IMI, and Education Subcommission. Some manuscripts have been received and others are in preparation for a series of educational monographs to accompany the IMI Education Bulletin, and to be distributed gratis to teachers. A professor of psychology has arrived from Washington and is studying the publication of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on ports and ports series for elementary schools and 20,000 copies of a book on civics for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.
22. An arrangement has been made with the Library of Congress for purchase of books in accession for Italian Universities and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can use books to be purchased in Italy. The Minister of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a series of 2,000,000 in Great Britain, followed by British Council and Embassy expenses in Italy and earmarked for book purchases through consular channels.
23. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students to Great Britain. The Minister of Public Instruction

20. The plan for a central reference catalogue of all new literature to enable both Italian and foreign students to avail themselves of the rich but scattered and badly catalogued materials, has moved forward with the preparation of a detailed plan and budget by a bilateral committee.
21. Mutual progress has been made in the joint publishing program of the Ministry of Public Instruction, ENI, and Education Subcommission. Two universities have been received and others are in preparation for a series of educational exchanges to accompany the ENI Education Institute, and to be distributed gratis to teachers. A professor of 100,000 copies of a history and geography book on North and South America for elementary schools and 25,000 copies of a book on civics for secondary schools. These will be distributed through the Ministry of Public Instruction, without charge, to schools for their libraries.
22. An agreement has been made with the Library of Congress for exchange of books in America for Italian Uniperation and libraries to the extent that the Library of Congress can afford to be purchased in Italy. The Ministry of Public Instruction has set up a 500,000 lire fund for this purpose. The British Council has worked out a different plan, setting up a credit of 200,000 in Great Britain, balanced by British Council and Embassy expenses in Italy and unworked for book purchases through commercial channels.
23. The British Council has provided four scholarships for Italian students in Great Britain. The Ministry of Public Instruction has nominated the students. A considerable fund has been raised for scholarships for Italian students who wish to study in the United States. The Minister has appointed a committee to work out plans for selection of the students, in cooperation with representatives of the United States Embassy and the Education Subcommission.
24. As for the recent agreement continues. 150 for the non-constitutional by Scouts has been received from the International Boy Scouts.
25. In general, the Education Subcommission has acted as a clearing center for a great variety of activities, information, and counsel. Allied sources in Italy and individuals and organizations in Allied nations turn to the Education Subcommission for information, counsel, and contacts with Italian agencies. Conversely the Ministry of Public Instruction and Italian organizations and individuals turn to the Education Subcommission for information from and contacts with the Allies. The fact that the Education Subcommission has had two years of intimate contact with Italian Education, cultural institutions,

and conduct, and that members of the Education Subcommittee are specialists who know education, and educational organizations and personnel in the Allied countries such as Italy and other Allied countries in Italy, knows its services to be used and appreciated. Only the matters of wide general interest are summarized in these reports; a continuous stream of such activities flows through the Education Subcommittee in a two-way stream between Italy and the Allies, with not infrequent advice from one Allied agency to another or one Italian agency to another. In Annex I, the principal lines of contact are illustrated.

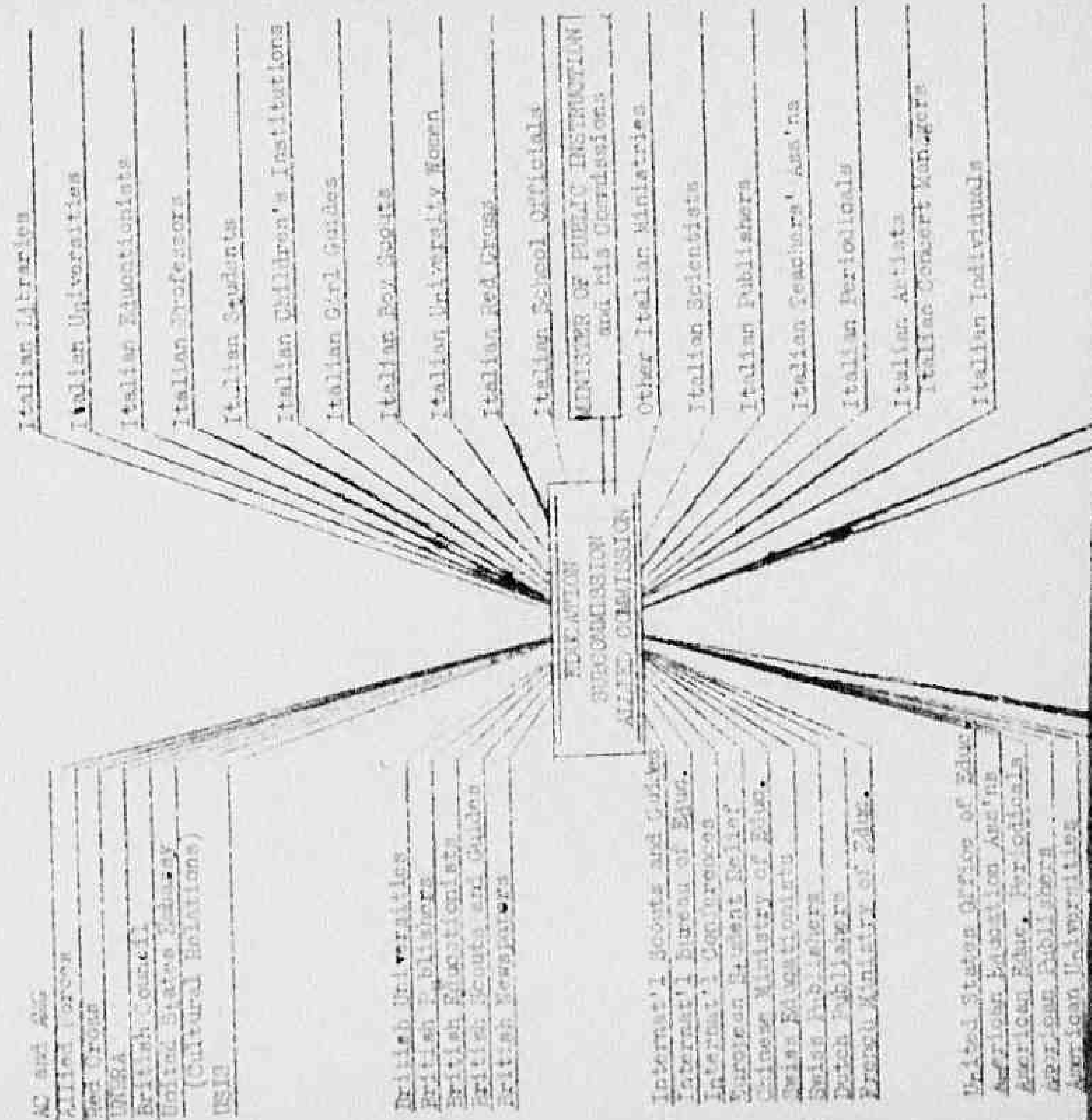

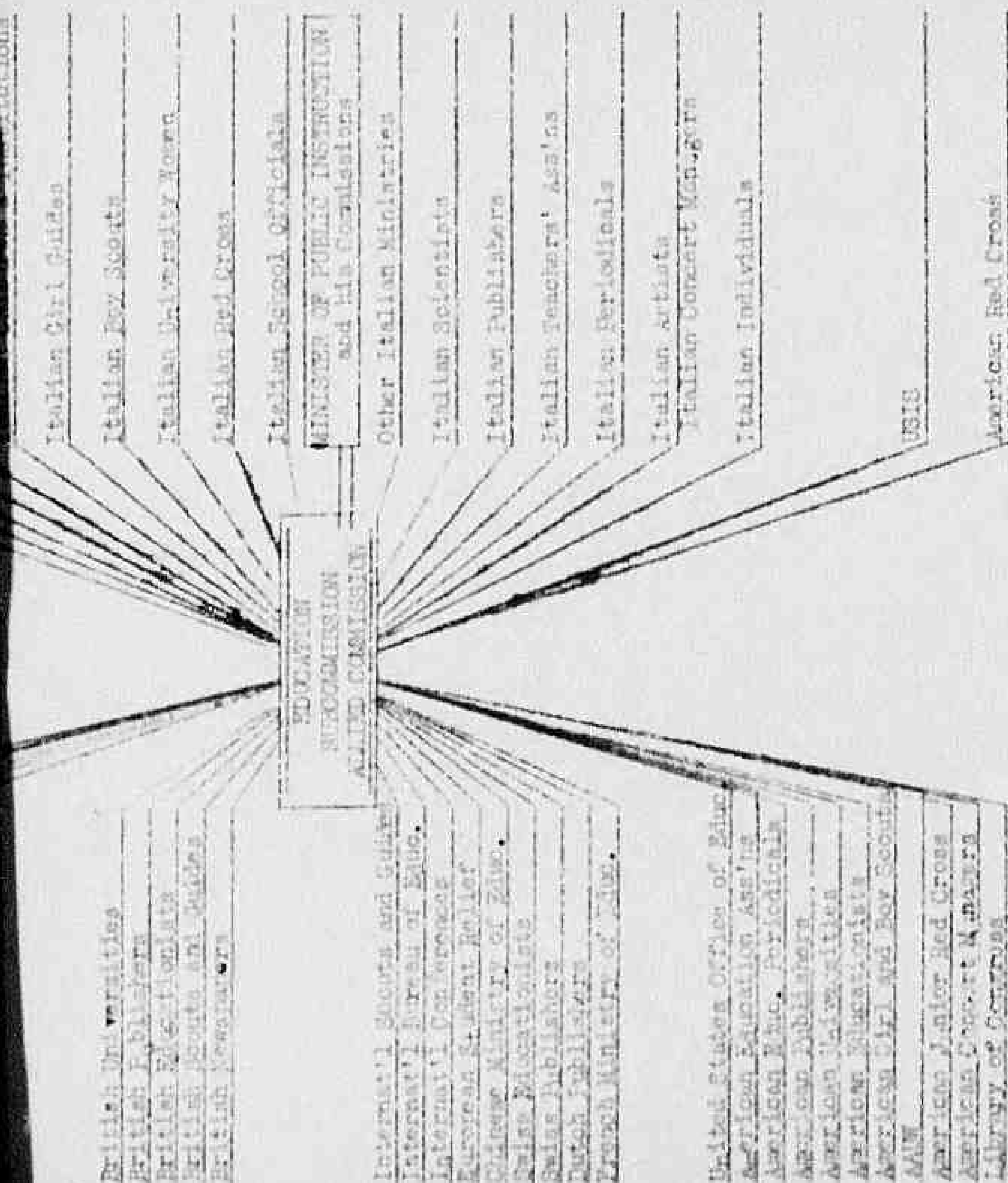

2. In June, 1937, the question of cultural autonomy for the German-speaking Germans in Poland (and the few Germans in the adjacent provinces of Russia and Rumania) has concerned the Education Subcommission ever since the resignation of its members. After 1000, the Tyrol was successively a part of the Holy Roman Empire, a holder of the bishops of Trent and Brixen, and a part of independent feudal fiefs of the family in the county of Tyrol, from which the region derived its name. In 1303, when this family died out, the Tyrol became a part of Austria under the Hapsburgs, and so remained to the close of the first World War.

Italian irredentists, even before 1914, had been urging that Trent, the province just south of Bolzano, which had since the middle ages been included in the Tyrol in spite of its predominantly Italian population, be attached to Italy. Then, in 1915, Germany and Britain were hurried to join Italy to join their respective sides of the conflict, Italy made the annexation of the South Tyrol her price. Austria agreed to ceding Trent, which was formerly Italian, but refused Bolzano, which in history, race, language and

culture was almost pure German. Because of the strategic value of the Brenner Pass, all the north boundaries of Bolzano, however, Italy insisted on the annexation of Bolzano as well; Britain agreed to this in the secret Treaty of London in May 1915, and Italy came into the war on the side of the British and French.

At the time of the Treaty the inhabitants of the Tyrol bitterly opposed being annexed to Italy; but the Treaty of London held. Later, Woodrow Wilson acknowledged this, a misfortune of justice had been committed -- as have many historians and commentators.

That at the 1919 Peace Conference Italy was not required to guarantee minority rights to these people, Tito and declared publicly in January, 1920, that Italy was under moral obligation to apply the provisions of the minorities treaties toward her own minorities. 1. INTRODUCTION.

1. Education Division.

The Chief Education Officer for Headquarters, 13 Corps, Allied Military Government, Lt. Lt. JOHN B. ADAMS, reported for duty on 30 July 1945.

The first task undertaken by the Education Officer was the selection of a qualified and efficient staff for the Education Division.

Civilian education specialists were employed as soon as possible to deal with the large load of routine administrative problems arising from the many months during which the schools were deprived of proper leadership.

On 3 September at 1945 hours the Education Division will open the series of Radio Programs presented by Allied Military Government over the Trieste-Radio Station. IV. DISPATCHES

Special Sections and combination sections of the Area Separation Commissions for the creation of school personnel have been established. School personnel from all school personnel are being submitted to these commissions. V. TRANSFER AND EMPLOYMENT OF TEACHERS

Teachers from the Veneto and Friuli who have lost their positions because they were required to leave their "scuole" have been requested to ask for transfer to a zone in Italy. They were asked to list ten "scuole" in order of preference. While waiting for transfer they will remain assigned at one of the Government schools of Venezia Giulia, Allied Military Government.

Plans are in preparation to extend all possible aid to teachers "di ruolo" who will find it difficult to move out of this territory. As an example the "Circolo Didattico" will be liquidated and "Circolo Didattico" will be established, instead, in order to give employment to many "di ruolo" teachers who belong to this region and who should not be transferred.

IV. SPAIN

V. TRANSFER AND EMPLOYMENT OF TEACHERS

Teachers from the German and Italian who have lost their positions because they were required to leave their "old" have been requested to ask for transfer to a school in Italy. They were asked to list two "needs" in order of preference. While waiting for transfer they will remain assigned at one of the Government of Venezia Giulia, Allied Military Government.

Plans are in preparation to extend all possible aid to teachers "old" who will find it difficult to move out of this territory. As one example the "German Dialects" will be liquidated and "German Dialects" will be established, instead, in order to give employment to many "old" teachers who belong to this region and who should not be transferred.

(In principle this Division will not approve requests for transfers from Italy into Venezia Giulia, unless the person desiring transfer can render valuable service to the schools of this territory. Application will be considered for transfer from Slovenia and German teachers who, because of Fascist prejudice, were "quasi" absorbed into Italy from the Venezia Giulia Region).

VI. SCHOOL BUILDINGS

A complete survey of the total school buildings for this territory is under way.

The complete report on the elementary school needs for Trieste and suburbs, as regards schools requisitioned by Allied Forces, has been submitted for necessary action. A similar report will be ready shortly on the secondary schools of the city which are requisitioned and are essential for the proper functioning of schools the coming academic year.

The Education Officer has visited all elementary schools of Trieste and has recommended to the Public Works Division to encourage the earliest beginning of all repair work required on the 30 school projects as far as submitted by the owners.

Provisions for the completion of all repair work for the opening of the school year are not the brightest; however, school authorities are keen and that a solution will be found.

VII. TEXT BOOKS, SCHOOL PROGRAMS, EDUCATIONAL UNIFORMS.

1. Text Books.

The Text Books problem in Venezia Giulia is similar to that encountered in Italy.

There is a complete lack of text books - Italian and Slovene.

The work accomplished so far as regards this problem is the following:

- a) Italian and Slovene elementary School text book committees have been established.
- b) In agreement with the Education Subcommission the new set of Italian elementary school text books will be used for the Italian Schools of Venezia Giulia. (The Education Officer is handling eagerly the first copies).
- c) Slovene elementary school text books used during the Austrian rule in these provinces are being revised and fitted to the new elementary school program by an expert board of Slovene professors and teachers. (It is expected that the first Slovene elementary school text book will go to the printers by 15 September 1945).

The HLU has refused to admit the text books which they claimed they had ready for publication. (The text books were prepared to encourage the nationalistic spirit created by Tito's regime).

Preparation of pamphlets dealing with the literature and history of the Slovene and Croat people is under study, and will be prepared accordingly to supplement all text books.

2. School Program.

The Italian 1945-6 elementary school program will be used in Venezia Giulia Schools with all references as to the promotion of Italian Nationalism omitted. Translation of the program into Slovene by two Slovene professors is about completed and both the Italian and

2. School programs.

The Italian 1925-6 elementary school program will be used in Venezia Giulia schools with all reference as to the promotion of Italian Nationalism omitted. Translation of the program into Slovene by two Slovene professors is about completed and both the Italian and Slovene versions will go to the printers by 10 September to be ready for distribution before the opening of fall examinations.

Italian programs for the secondary schools have arrived from the Education Subcommission. They will be used with perhaps slight modifications. For the Slovene language classes a translation of the respective program is underway and sections on Slovene language, literature and history will be added.

3. Education directive.

Educational directives from Number 1 to 9 have been revised to fit the General Allied Military Government plan here. They have been approved by the Education Subcommission and by the Senior Civil Affairs Officer for publication to the school authorities of this territory. They are in English, Italian and Slovene and will be distributed to the Government, Area Commissioners, Civil Affairs Officers in the various commands, and to all Heads of Divisions of Allied Military Government.

VIII. RAY SOURCE.

The National Commissioners representing the sectorial and the non-sectorial Italian Ray Source Associations met with the Education Officer to plan for joint cooperation in this territory.

The Catholic Ray Source Association is better off in that it has sufficient funds to operate. The other, in plain words, and under these circumstances, success may be difficult and slow.

Spies' publicity has been given to each group.

The Commissioners decided to add the terms "National" and "Italian" used in their respective titles and to encourage the organization of Ray Sections.

IX. CHURCH CLANS.

Scores of military clubs have been organized by the Communist party throughout the city. They meet in all available premises. Their activity covers a wide range, according to reports, from political conferences to plain and simple "gun" courses. A complete report on the subject is in preparation.

X. UNIVERSITY OF TRIESTE.

The University of Trieste is a small and recently established University (1924). It has struggled to become a recognized institution and is a needed school in the life of Venezia Giulia.

Upon recommendation of the Education Officer the Senior Civil Affairs Officer has appointed young and energetic Professor Satta Salvatore as Vice-Rector.

Professor Satta is "ordinario" or "professore regolare" at the University of Genova, and temporarily assigned to Trieste since 1943. Reports from the University of Genova place Professor Satta as a known anti-Fascist, educated and reliable.

The University was not touched by bombing and has not suffered any damage to its libraries or classrooms. The new University building, under construction, has not been completed yet.

At present there are only five professors "ordinari" in "sesto". Of these, two or three may be suspected for Fascist activities. There is a large and sufficient number of "licenziati" who will be capable of running the institution. In agreement with the Public Safety Division it will be possible to recall and use professors from the University of Florence, Padova or Milan if released for duty here by

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XI. STATISTICAL BUREAU

It is the practice of this Division to submit complete monthly Statistical Reports on the social situation of all localities over which it has jurisdiction, but because of the very urgent work that had to be accomplished during August the Executive Officer has asked the Governatore to postpone until September the preparation of complete statistical data.

XII. IMPORTANT DATES.

- October 26 : Lessons begin in the secondary schools.
- November 1 : Opening of University of Trieste.

1. PUBLIC

(A) The Commission of the Alto Comandante for Public Health, as stated in last month's report to be inactive, has been formally announced in the Commission and in addition, Legislative Decree No. 145 of 11st July 1945 sets the transmission and function of the High Commissioner's Office.

(B) In June when this Bureau was proved to be a disappointment, some although the Division of Public Health in the Ministry of Interior has been abolished, and the function of that Division assumed by the High Commissioner, who is currently responsible to the Council of Ministers, no other important changes have been suggested as regards the administration of Public Health matters in Italy. For example, it is specifically mentioned that the function of the Ministry of Interior for Public Health matters remains unchanged and so we still have the traditional position that is in force at the head of each province is to be the for the administration of that province's health problems, while the High Commissioner's Office is the High Commissioner only through the Prefect.

(C) It has been noted that with the formation of the High Commissioner's Office, a more drastic change in the role of Italian Public Health Administration would have to be effected, but such changes may still be envisaged by the authorities.

2. PUBLIC HEALTH

(A) Berone Repatriation Hospital forward.

(a) The movement of patients into Berone has been considerably slower than up until the 27th of August 2152 sick Italians have been received, which was much more than the original schedule called for. Such rapid arrivals are straining hospital accommodation to the utmost, as the departing Germans are returning to their homes only just in time to take beds until the 1st of the following September. In addition, 62 patients arrived unharmed from the Berone Camp, having been 35 days on the way, with insufficient food and no medical attention. As has been stated if this and all endeavours to prevent repetition of such an occurrence.

After having therefore been requested to allocate for the sole use of the Hospital 20 ambulances, 6 ambulances, 2 buses, 6 Medical trucks, and 8 heavy trucks together with adequate facilities for supervising and maintaining.

(a) Since, by its consent that authority be obtained for the use of medical equipment and hospital supplies already at its disposal, due to several requests made to the Authority, was unfortunately not obtained.

(b) It will be seen that for the efficient and smooth operation of the Medical Service, such coordination is required, as the administrative services are complex. In the present action is obtained from all the administrative services, the whole project is a face disaster, which, in view of the humanitarian importance of the work, could be a major tragedy.

(B) TYPUS

(a) Only one case of Typus was reported during August. This occurred in a refugee aged 24 years, who arrived at the hospital from Bologna.

(b) One case was notified early in August as having occurred at Lantini, Spina, Province of Pisa. No further notification has been received either from Lantini, or any other part of the Province.

(C) MALARIA

(a) The August figures for Malaria City and Province indicate that the epidemic may not be considered at an end. In cases only were reported from the City as compared with 23 in July and 17 from the Province as compared with 23 in July. This improvement can be attributed to the work of the Malaria Service, which with the services of the 3 motor ambulances referred to in last month's report, which were sent by APV.

(b) Since the last report, 100 cases from only three other districts in the Province during August 19, as compared with eight during the only period. The figures are 100, with 17 cases as compared with 48 in July, Bologna, with 8 as compared with 24 in July, and Reggio Calabria, with 1. No cases were reported from Reggio Calabria last month. It would appear therefore that the Malaria Control Demonstration Unit, which is being run by the Italian Government throughout the Province is at least making its effect.

(D) MALARIA

(C) Malaria

The overcrowding winter will make a dangerous condition even more critical.

27. The Administration.

Attempts by the UN-Commission to facilitate the release of prison accommodations now in operation to the Ministry of the Interior have been largely unavailing. Inmates of the prison, and still particularly of those of Allied authorities and released efforts are being made to effect their return to civil authorities.

28. Prison Personnel.

There is a great shortage of guard personnel throughout Italy, with the greatest need existing in the regions under AMI control. Prisoners are still being used in large numbers and have frequently conveyed at jail breaks or illegal releases of ex-prison prisoners. Prisoners who are now in operation are being handicapped by lack of accommodations, low military inducement, and the lack of further secured thin personnel.

29. New Accommodations.

Accommodations for five hundred prisoners are now available at the new prison establishment in the vicinity of Casa del Pozzi, about 10 km northeast of Rome, and transfer of that number of prisoners from Regina Coeli is now in progress. Following this transfer Regina Coeli will contain but 900 inmates.

studies by the Sub-Commission to facilitate the release of prison recommendations now under consideration to the Ministry of Justice and Justice have been largely unavailing. Nevertheless, prison, and still partially or wholly in the hands of Allied authorities and renewed efforts are being made to effect their return to civil service.

11. Prison Personnel.

There is a great necessity of guard personnel throughout Italy, with the exception of existing in the regions under Allied control. Personnel are still being used in large numbers and are increasingly involved in jail breaks or illegal releases of prisoners. Prisoner vehicles now in operation are being subjected by lack of recommendations, low salary inducements, and the lack of release recorded this provision.

30. Clothing and Equipment.

(a) The impending hand over of the Northern Regions to Italian Government administration has caused all regional Public Safety Officers to make special efforts to ensure that the various Police Forces are brought to the highest possible state of efficiency.

(b) This work is seriously hampered by the lack of proper clothing, equipment, arms and transport, and at the present time there appears to be little likelihood that the necessary items will be made available. The full needs of the Carabinieri as to clothing

RELATIONS WITH THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

1. Throughout August excellent collaborative contacts have been maintained with the Undersecretary (of Public Instruction) for Fine Arts, with the Director General of Antiquities and Fine Arts, with the Office for Recovery of Works of Art, and with the Commissary for State Archives. Considering the organizational difficulty under which the Italian government are still laboring, the offices named have functioned very well.
2. In order to insure continuity of policy after the hand-over of the territory in the North, matters of personnel in these areas have been referred to the Director General for their concurrence prior to appointment by the Regional RMA Officers. RELATIONS WITH THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

1. Throughout August excellent collaborative contacts have been maintained with the Undersecretary (of Public Instruction) for Fine Arts, with the Direction General of Antiquities and Fine Arts, with the Office for Recovery of Works of Art, and with the Commissary for State Archives. Considering the organizational difficulties under which the Italian government are still laboring, the offices named have functioned very well.

2. In order to insure continuity of policy after the hand-over of all territory in the North, matters of personnel in these areas have been referred to the Direction General for their concurrence prior to appointment by the Regional High Officers. This has worked out well, and should prove of considerable aid to the Italian government in the months ahead.

3. Documentation of losses of works of art, with emphasis on gifts and sales to leading Nazis by the Fascist regime, goes forward steadily. Prof. Annelli, of the Direction General, was sent to PADOVA to examine in this connection at R. VENEZIA Region the seized archives of the Fascist Direction General of the arts.

4. The assistance of the Direction General was requested in the search for two sculptures still missing from CORTINA.

RELATIONS WITH OTHER STATES

5. Contacts, with particular reference to interchange of information on displaced works of art, have been maintained by correspondence with the Central Commissions for Germany and for Austria.

6. The most exciting result of these contacts, during August, was the discovery in Milan of nine French Impressionist masterpieces of great importance, which had been seized by the Nazis or their puppets from the French owners and then "exchanged" to an Italian art-dealer in a fantastically shady deal. While investigations continue, the pictures have been consigned for protective custody to the Superintendent of Galleries in Milan, and the French Embassy has been fully informed.
7. The Subcommittee received from London several copies of the newly-published booklet of the Moravian Commission: Louvre and Survivals in the War of the Works of Art in Italy, Part I, South of Bologna. The edition sold out in four days in London. It is based on first reports of the Subcommittee and it is a pity, therefore, in view of the high percentage of inaccuracies contained, that prints were put submitted to the Subcommittee for corrections of fact.
8. The Director of the Subcommittee was in London during August for conferences with the War Office regarding international certification of works of art. The lack of a single Allied coordinating body is regrettable. Both America and Britain are however pledged to a policy of interior certification, i.e., the return of works of art to the identity and ownership of which are beyond dispute. All claims must come from governments and not from individuals. This is going to be a long drawn out business.

VENEZIA REGION

9. During August it has at last been possible to assign a full-time ITA officer. Projects are being approved for repairs to Basilica S. Francesco and Temple d'Augusto at Roma. Estimates have been submitted for minor protective measures at S. Giusto and Teatro Romano in Trieste.
10. Conference regarding the military occupation of Castello di Miramare have put the question of responsibility on an even keel.

VENEZIA REGION

11. Major concentration is still on preparation and approval of first-aid repair projects in this, the most damaged Region of Northern Italy; during August 37 more Superintendentary projects were approved for a total of over 21 million lire. Among these are: Chiesa degli Eremitani in Padova; S. Pietro, S. Bernardino, Biblioteca Civica, and Biblioteca Capitolare in Venezia; Basilica del Lionione in Belluno; S. Lorenzo, S. Maria Annunziata, and S. Maria Maggiore in Udine; Battistero di Oderzo and Sanctuary near Povegliano; and a series of medieval houses in Treviso. Further projects are now in process for Basilica, Venezia, Verona, and Trieste. Several Gothic Civic projects were also approved, including that for the Basilica Palladiana in Vicenza.

15. Fourteen cases of material from 1944, finally traced to the Palazzo Reale in 1948, have been carefully checked and listed.

LAZIO REGION

16. Italian personnel problems are still requiring much of the USA Officer's time. He will also be negotiating toward obtaining adequate underground quarters in 1949 for the officers of the Superintendent's office.
17. In collaboration with Property Control Section, the task of documenting the numerous allied properties formerly in the Palazzo Reale is drawing to a successful conclusion.
18. At 1948 various works of art, including the altar of S. Apollonia, have been brought back to the Cathedral. At 1948 a series of conferences has resulted in agreement for ultimate reconstruction of the notable bridge across the Tiber, to include the two Roman arches recently discovered. Further discussions will hold at 1949 and 1950 regarding protection and repair of monuments and parks.

PIEMONTE REGION

19. Approval, planning, and initiation of work on repair projects continues to be the major preoccupation of the USA Officer. During August 1948 provisions amounting to more than 1/2 million lire were obtained for work in the city of Turin.
20. Works of art in deposits were safely returned to TORINO and NOVARA; other deposits were inspected at MILAN, INTRA, and VERCELLI. Study continues, in close collaboration with Italian authorities, for the housing and administration of museums at TORINO, VERCELLI, and NOVARA.
21. Routine inspections were accomplished in all seven provinces of the Region.

VAL D'AOSTA REGION

22. Because of shortage of USA personnel, administration of projects in VAL D'AOSTA is being handled by the Regional Education Officer, with periodic visits by the USA Officer of PIEMONTE.
23. Inspections at VERCELLI indicate considerable damage from shelling. Projects for first-aid repair are being prepared by the Civil Service.

MISSING ITALIAN WORKS OF ART AND ANTIQUITIES

24. A report was completed and distributed regarding the theft by German soldiers of several valuable paintings from the Torchi-Ven.

PIEMONTE REGION

19. Approval, financing, and initiation of work on repair projects continued to be the major responsibility of the Regional Office. During August new projects were initiated to meet the needs of the region and to provide protection and repair of monuments and parks in the city of Turin.
20. Works of art in deposits were safely returned to TORINO and NOVARA; other deposits were inspected at VERBA, INTRA, and BIELLA. Study continues, in close collaboration with Italian authorities, for the housing and administration of museums at VERBA, INTRA, and NOVARA.
21. Further inspections were accomplished in all seven provinces of the Region.

VALLE D'AOSTA REGION

22. Because of shortage of staff personnel, administration of projects in Valle is being handled by the Regional Education Office, with periodic visits by the Regional Office of PAVIA.
23. Inspections at VALLE D'AOSTA indicate considerable damage from shelling. Projects for first-aid repair are being prepared by the Civil Service.

REGIONE TIGRINA, MONTE ROSSO, AND VALLE D'AOSTA

24. .. report was completed and distributed regarding the theft by German troops in June 1944 of several valuable paintings from the Rocca di Tanaro collection in Valle d'Aosta. The search for these, and for the responsible German officers, is being continued.
25. Further inquiries were made during August regarding the still missing items: from the Rocca collection, which disappeared at VERBA; from the Villa Cisterna, MONTE ROSSO; and from the Rocca di Tanaro, moved to the Alto Adige by the Germans.
26. Upon instructions of ARPA, the Italian government was advised to present through diplomatic channels their allegations relative to looting of material from the MONTE ROSSO Museum by German troops.

REQUISITION OF MATERIALS

27. We have publicly stated the desire of the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean, to limit further requisition of properties for military use, and to commence a program of derequisitioning.
28. On behalf of the Italian Government, inquiries have been made during August regarding the derequisitioning of several monuments in UFFICIA. The difficult REQUISITIONING problem is to be thoroughly examined by an officer of the Subcommission beginning 15 September; personnel shortage has thus far prevented their inspection.
29. Prompt derequisitioning of the Allied Commission blocked the proposed action from the deposit at CASANO VIZI KINGS of antiquities belonging to the Museum of UFFICIA. This material cannot yet be moved back to its normal and secure location; unfortunately still dictates the use of the houses for military purposes.

PHOTOGRAPHIC RECORD

30. Excellent progress has been made in regard to the program of microfilming; the records and photographic films of the Subcommission.

ARCHIVES

31. The main work of the month has been concerned with the ministerial archives, on which a detailed report has been submitted to the Vice President, Civil Affairs Section.
32. Major H. L. Bell accompanied the Commissary of State Archives on a tour of the following collections: Alessandria, Bologna, Florence, Genoa, Intra, Mantova, Massa, Milano, Modena, Pisto, Torino, Venezia and Verona. At all these archives the Commissary had useful conversations with staffs, and is therefore well placed to take over full administrative responsibility.

PERSONNEL

33. Lt Col J. B. Ward P. Jones has become Director of the Subcommission. Maj R. C. Henton, formerly USA Officer of the Eighth Army and later of VFFICIA Region, was transferred to Rome as Deputy Director. Capt Deane Keller, on completing his work with Fifth Army, has been assigned to VFFICIA Region. Lt P. B. Gott, USA, and Lt Frederick Marti, USA Officers of the Eighth and Tenth Regions, respectively, finished the work for which they were being held over, and departed for AUSGIL. Capt C. B. Bennett became USA Officer of AUSGIL Region. Capt Basil Harriott and Capt R. B. Andrews, continued as USA Officers of AUSGIL and PFFICIA Regions, respectively.

REPLACEMENT PERSONS AND RELOCATION STRATEGIES

1. GENERAL

(a) Paris Conference, 17 August, 1945.

A meeting of the Combined Displaced Persons Executive, USDPET and attended by a representative of this Sub-Commission, was held in Paris on 17 August, 1945. For the most part the matters discussed were routine such as the daily movements of Italians, repatriation of Italians from Russian areas, the movement of Jews, the movement of Austrians out of Italy back to Austria, Italians in Norway, the repatriation of Albanians from USDPET to Italy and the movement of Germans out of Italy. The great value of these conferences lies in the speed with which agreements are reached, eliminating the rather prolonged business of the interchange of cables or letters.

(b) Movement during August.

Italians are now being received at the rate of approximately 5,000 per day over the Brenner Pass route, 2,500 per day over the Brenner route, 2,000 per week from automobiles to Germany and small numbers from France to Switzerland. Additionally Germans are being received from Switzerland at the rate of about 100 per week. They are transported north to Berlin from where they are shipped to Germany. During August the number of Italians received fell rather short of the original estimate of 225,000 for the month. This was due almost entirely to the breakdown of bridges over the Brenner Pass route. Only 5,362 persons were received over the Brenner route during the period 1st-15th August causing a drop of more than 30,000 in the total for the month and a subsequent delay in the completion of the repatriation of Italians. A party of 700 Jews arrived, after much discussion and later a group of Cubans, from Switzerland. They have been moved south and are now waiting onward movement to Palestine.

(c) Future Estimates.

On 1st August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include any numbers which have yet to come into the American, British and French zones from the Russian areas. It has been agreed with the Soviet authorities to move 60,000 Italians into USDPET from a Soviet area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet area in Austria. There are 1,150 Italians in Norway, 90% of whom fought with the Germans. These will not be moved until more German and Italian elsewhere have been repatriated, and until the Italian Government has agreed to the movement of Italians.

A party of 700 Jews arrived, after much discussion and delays of cables, from Switzerland. They have been moved south and are now being moved for movement in Palestine.

(c) Future Developments

On 21st August it was estimated that only 75,000 Italians remained to be repatriated from Germany and Austria. This number does not, of course, include any numbers which have yet to come into the American, British and French Zones from the Russian area. It has been agreed with the Soviet authorities to move 60,000 Italians into West Germany from a Soviet area north of Czechoslovakia. There are a further 15,000 reported to be in the Soviet army in Austria. There are 1,150 Italians in Norway, 90% of whom fought with the Germans. These will not be moved until more deserving Italian prisoners have been repatriated, and until the Italian Government has facilities for internment. The repatriation of Italians should not be completed by the end of September. It will take a short time after that to disperse them all to their homes, but by the middle of October it is hoped, all of them will be home. This does not, of course, apply to the large numbers of Italian POWs in England, America, North Africa and elsewhere.

(iii) General:

There has been very little change in the organization since July 1945. Four groups in the North have been closed down during the month at Villavieja, GEMCO, 24EVI50 and GUNCO. It had been agreed that all American offenders and PW in issue from 5th Army - to be released until 1 October, 1945. The conclusion of the war with J.P.M. may lead to earlier release.

(a) Future Organization.

Progress is being made in the plans for the organization of collecting hospitals in Europe by nationalities, Shipping, Transit and Liaison, Stages and Jewish Camps.

MEDICAL.

(a) General.

All medical supplies are now concentrated in a Central Medical Store at Bologna. A large consignment of drugs which cover the requirements of the Sub-Commission's commitments in the North have been received during the month. All vaccines are under expiry dates but is understood they are still effective if stored under proper conditions. There are in cold storage at Bologna and Bari. One great difficulty which is being experienced is in obtaining supplies for the treatment of scabies. There is a shortage of sulphur ointment in M.F. stocks and a request has been made to the Italian Government for the purchase of a large amount of Italian manufactured ointment. Meanwhile, the Institute curative measures for scabies are being made to obtain an amount of Benzyl benzoate or Sulphur ointment through army channels on a D.O.S. M.F.C. authority. If this obtained, an anti-Scabies campaign will be started. A request has been approved by M.F.C. for the release of a certain amount of Dental and Gynaecological equipment from 5th Army stocks of captured enemy materials. This equipment is needed for use in the permanent holding Camps which it is intended to set up to hold a 35,000 population during the winter months.

(b) Servicing.

The two Italian Field Hospitals which were installed at MERANO to receive Italian sick repatriates from Germany were handed over to the Public Health Sub-Commission on 4 August, 1945. A scheme is being formulated whereby a sanatorium at Lido, South of MERANO, will be partly used for the hospitalization of allied National I.R. patients. Attention is being given to the provision of a hospital for allied Nationals in the same area. There is some doubt as to whether Italians and Yugoslavs could work well together if an Italian Field Hospital were installed in an area where the Camps mainly accommodate Yugoslavs. M.F.C. are preparing for the dispatch of Yugoslav Military patients of a long term nature who are hospitalized in British Military Hospitals. However, the matter is pending as the latest available information has shown that a further investigation of these patients' military histories some will revert to IOW status and there will be repatriated to their home country by the Yugoslav Government.

(d) Mailings

A few outstandingly deserving or politically important cases were brought to a satisfactory conclusion during the month. The Government of the Emperor of Ethiopia were reported. Final arrangements were made for the repatriation of Prince Sultan bin Abdulaziz and a family. Prince Sultan bin Abdulaziz is the leading noble of Tripolitania and has been living in Rome at the expense of the Italian Government. Permission was obtained for a blind Yugoslav socialist officer to travel to England where he was to be admitted to St. Dunstan's hospital for the blind. He had not, however, left Italy by the end of August.

6. RECORDS

At the end of August a total of 106,220 disclosed persons had been recorded by the record Bureau. This shows an increase of 10,781 over the July total of 95,439 and is the highest number of persons to be registered in any one month in the past year. There had been a marked drop in the number of inquiries/averages dealt with by the Inquiry/Message Section of the record Bureau. During August, 6,400 communications have been dealt with. Parcels of drugs have been received by air from England and delivered to the addressees at this end. One ill man dying of cancer in an Italian hospital received such a parcel sent on behalf of his brother in England. A few days later, only he had endeavored to commit suicide and the doctors felt real relief that he had received this taken that he was not dying then. The young man himself was overjoyed.

"For statistically comparing a politically important group with or without a satisfactory conclusion during the month, the Bureau of the Superior of Belgium were requested. All E.C.E.C. Officers, except those operating in the Western area and the South were instructed to retire their E.C. interest payments by 31 August thereby placing the financing of all Europe in the hands of the respective prefects who now furnish the funds and personnel for making all cash payments.

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(c) Planning of operations in South Africa.

Arrangements were completed for notifying the Government in the various areas and all of South Africa that the presence of the troops is to supply funds and personnel for making. It must be pointed out that the troops will have to be moved by 15th September. Thereof, on 15 September 1945, the U.S.C. Camp or Centre will be in an U.S. Forest Warrant, all being financed by the Italian Government.

PATRIOT'S STATUS - REPORT FOR AUGUST 1947.

MINISTRY OF POST WAR AID

1. The Ministry of Overseas Italy has now completely closed and the Ministry of Post War Aid has taken over all responsibility for Patriot war. Weekly meetings have been held between the Director, Local Government Civil Commission and Sir Bernardine of the Ministry of Post War Aid when the policy after handover and various other matters were discussed.

ADMINISTRATION OF PATRIOTS AFTER HANDOVER IN THE NORTH

2. Instructions have now been issued to the Prefects by the Ministry of the Interior, and to the Regions by this HQ, regarding the administration of Patriots when territory is handed over.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE MINISTERS

3. A draft decree concerning the employment of War Veterans was forwarded to this branch for comment. After discussion with Economic and Social Section a reply was sent to the Ministry of Post War Aid stating that the only comment was that provision might be made for disabled or injured war veterans of the decree being referred to the Ufficio del Lavoro for adjustment.

REPORT FOR THE PATRIOTS

4. The position of Patriots being discharged from military hospitals after 60 days has been discussed with the Ministry of Post War Aid. It is alleged that individuals are discharged but complete care and attention from tuberculosis. In conjunction with Public Health San Commission and the Ministry of Post War Aid the situation is being examined and an agreement is being made to make provision for further treatment in civilian hospitals. In this and a hospital at present is to be put into operation solely for Patriot personnel.
