TRANSITION TO PEACE PLAN FOR ITALY 1945

PART I

The month of August has been a period of steady consolidation. All enemies report an improvement in public morale. There is still too much armed banditry in the region but it is nearly all based upon motives of sheer robbery and the political killings and vendetta murders have noticeably declined. The condition and morale of the communists and other police agencies continues to be a matter of concern. Not much improvement in clothing, boots or equipment had been achieved by the end of August. The signs, apparent by the end of the month, that further British troops would move into the area for the autumn, had a further sobering effect. There has been considerable activity by the political parties but all have shown reasonable moderation. Tensions between ANC, Communists and C.I.N. continued to run smoothly though the latent problems presented by the existence of two forms of local Italian authorities remained unsolved. Another problem still requiring solution was the presence in jail of many political prisoners.

On the economic side progress has been made. More shops were reopened and more goods appeared for sale, usually at high prices. There was, however, no sign of an upward curve of prices; in respect of fruit and vegetables prices were steadily throughout the month and in some cases declined. Wine continued to be relatively dear and the failure of the regional plan to import wine from Italy was disappointing. The barrels were adjudged to be in too bad condition for safe shipping. Distribution of food proceeded normally but during August both salt and fine bread were in short supply.

Much progress was made in the clearing of bomb damage and in repairing of roads and bridges. Many further rebuilding projects were started during the month by the public works department with a view to their early commencement and as a contribution towards solving the problem of unemployment. This problem is assuming serious proportions especially in central, Tuscany, Umbria and Apulia and is gradually aggravated by the return of British forces. However, the month of August passed without any serious labor disturbances.

Considerable improvement was effected in the availability of grain but the region's food supply was badly affected by a cyclonic storm of unusual violence which swept across the provinces of FENNO, VENETO, and TOSCANA on the 3rd of August, doing great damage to the maize crop due to the winds and fruit trees.

2. RE - GENEVA.

The compilation of the electoral lists has proceeded slowly but satisfactorily.

Whether the Prefect of BRESCIA will return to the Foreign Service has not yet been decided and he is remaining in office anyway for the time being.

The most serious difficulty encountered during the month has been in the province of RAVENNA where the Prefect has for some time been showing himself to be aware of the responsibilities of his position.

3. FOOD.

Sufficient foodstuffs have been drawn to meet the whole nation scale with the exception of salt.

A 200 GR. ration of salt has been distributed, and the situation improving with the arrival of shipments by rail from Margherita di Savoia.

Wine scheduled to arrive was not forthcoming. The barrels were in bad condition and movements delayed. Further progress has been arranged and shipments are already due.

Amalgamation has been made for extra ration of cheese for forestry workers who are refusing to work without this concession. Oil as firewood can be imported to the southern provinces, there will be no fuel for bakers in the winter.

The food situation is generally satisfactory although some difficulty is being experienced due to the independent and ~~high~~ headed attitude of the Soviets, who in some cases are deliberately disobeying orders.

4. CONFERENCES.

The allocation of coal for September is approx. 15,000 tons more than for August, allowing a substantial increase for Industry.

The shortage of coal continues to be the chief problem of this Division. Allocations are made by L.M.C., and it is considered that local conditions properly appreciated. It is felt that an allocation should be made to the Region who call themselves a bidding conference and at least certainly decide on Provincial allocations more satisfactorily to all concerned.

With the exception of a few controlled items control of materials is now carried out by the Italian authorities in accordance with the plan laid down by A.I. Regional Order N. 2 was published without sufficient coordination with other Regions, who did not all publish similar orders, causing complaints that Region XII was becoming an area of closed economy. As far as is known however no complaint of this order interfering with international trade.

5. INDUSTRY.

The boot-sugar building programme has commenced. 6,000 tons of coking coal per month has been allocated to Vetrocole, sufficient to enable production of neutral glass, carbide, colts-c's for tanks, and coke for the sugar factories. The block on alkali account has been lifted. Construction releases of timber have been made from Dolno and Trento provinces for railway construction and repairs to industrial plants.

The limitations on the allocation of coal will cause limitation of activity in the cement, fertiliser, metallurgical, glass and food-processing industries, resulting unemployment, and the lack of coal for domestic heating will add to the hardships of the coming winter for the civilian population.

6. FINANCIAL.

Steps are now being taken for a steady and potential reduction in the Cost of Bread and Provisions. Supreme reports indicate that this is feasible.

6. FINANCE.

310 Statist and 779 communal budgets were approved during the month. The Province of Liguria was the first to have all its communal budgets for July sent submitted and approved. Department of the turn over to the Italian Government will greatly increase work of the Finance Section for the month of September.

All Banks report increasing demands with a large surplus of available cash in the Region. Collection of every funds and bank accounts continue with Lira. 9,258,371,435 collected to date for the Region, including Lira. 736,346,000 by the 5th Army U.S. Finance Officer in the Region.

7. TRANSPORTS AND UTILITIES.

Every effort has been made by the Banco Cattile during the past month to get as many projects as possible approved by the before their closing down. The total number submitted was 730.

It is noted that the dismantlement of damaged river and canal embankments and the removal of bridges which would hold up the flood water will be completed before the autumn rains.

Progress has been made in the demolition of dangerous buildings and numerous projects have been approved for the repair of damaged schools, hospitals and public buildings.

Much work has been put in hand during the month on military highways. The military have expressed concern at the closing of the Region and it is intended to establish a liaison officer at 1/2 Corps to organize the Italian road organization 4656 during the coming months. Ten long carrying vehicles have been purchased which will help materially in the maintenance of the military highways. The electrical position in the Region remains very satisfactory.

10. DISASTER.

52 Superior and 253 Summary Courts have been held. The majority of the former are for possession of arms and sentences have stiffened. The latter are mostly for wrongful possession of W.D. property.

The shortage of Italian judicial personnel continues. The Extraordinary Courts of Justice also constitute a drain on the personnel.

There has been a definite improvement in the work of the Extraordinary Courts of Justice, but much dissatisfaction is expressed at the long delay by Ministry of Justice in considering appeals against the death sentence. This is likely to lead to public disturbances, and it also undermines public confidence further the chance of ever crowning in the goals.

Provincial Commissioners have been advised to set up Commissions under D.L. L. 419 of 1944, to prepare lists of persons who should for their own safety or in order to prevent incidents, be placed in confinement prior to the transfer of territory. 1. A half day strike took place in Venice on the morning of Wednesday, July 18th. It was fairly complete as far as most works and shops were concerned, though bakers and chemists remained open. Electric light and water were not cut off except in certain isolated cases. On the other hand the telephone service was interrupted for a short period.

2. The strike was political in character, purporting to be a protest against the dissolution, by the Provincial Commissioner, of the former Epuration Committees and the cancellation of their acts. As two members of these committees had recently been sentenced by Italian courts to five years' imprisonment for extortion by menace, it appeared that there was considerable justification for Lt Col McCleary's action.

3. The demonstration was entirely orderly, no blows were struck, and the crowd dispersed quietly after an agreement was announced between the Provincial Commissioner, the Prefect and the President of the CLN.

4. 86 Army Area acted efficiently and promptly and were ready for all emergencies.

5. I feel, however, that this incident does raise important questions in connection with the future status of the port of Venice.

6. I discussed the matter with Brigadier Richards, Area Commander, yesterday afternoon and learned from him that, so far as can be foreseen, there will be, at 1st September, some 6,000 to 8,000 British troops in and near Venice, exclusive of leave parties at the Lido. There will be large reserve dumps of food, POL and engineer stores. There will be some ammunition. Military unloading will be at the rate of 1200 - 2000 tons per day, but the port organization must at all times be able to step up its tonnage, if, for any reason, Trieste could not be worked.

7. It is clear therefore that the Area Commander has very serious responsibilities in respect of the maintenance of the British forces in Austria and such as remain in North East Italy.

8. It appears important to define at an early date what would be his powers in respect of the Italian civil administration after September 1st. Should a strike or civil disturbance occur which threatens services vital to military supplies what recourse will he have?

9. The situation will be without exact precedent for though, during the past winter the port of Bari was carried on without AMO control, there was in fact a strong AC zone organization on the spot which was able to exert considerable local influence.

Moreover, it was at all times within the power of the Chief Commissioner to reimpose AMG control if, in his opinion, this was desirable.

10. It is realized that there may be grave political objections to the maintenance of AMG rule at the port of Venice after September 1st, however desirable that might be from the military point of view.

11. On the other hand it does appear very desirable that,
- (a) there should be a strong liaison group of Allied Mission Officers who could assist the Area Commander in his relations with the civil authorities,
  - (b) that there should be a close understanding with the Italian Government in respect of the local authority of the Area Commander.

12. I should add that I spoke yesterday morning to the Prefect and the President of the CLN and told them inter alia that any interference with telephone services or other services essential to troops could not be tolerated and that any future similar action would lead to the arrest of all responsible.

They segregated 73 political prisoners both men and women into 2 rooms and opened fire with automatics. 30 men and 13 women killed outright. 4 more died in hospital 26 wounded in hospital. Among killed women of 70 and girl of 17. Provincial Commissioner deputy Regional Commissioner and team experts with US Military Police have proceeded SCHIO and I await their full reports. In meantime have arranged publication local P&B papers of factual statement as above. For you confidential information some evidence as to identity criminals already hopeful. Will decide further action as to Allied Court of Inquiry at SCHIO or immediate trial of criminals if apprehended after receipt of report from Provincial Commissioner and in consultation with 5TH ARMY. Have ordered withdrawal political prisoners from small local gaols even at risk of overcrowding.


