MINISTRY OF OCCUPIED ITALY

1. The draft decree establishing a Ministry for Occupied Italy divides the proposed activity into three main divisions:

- (a) Liaison and communication with the occupants of territory while it is still in enemy occupation, including the direction of the resistance movement in such territory;
- (b) Assistance to, and rehabilitation of patriots in newly liberated territory; and
- (c) Liaison in conjunction with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs with Italian patriots in territories outside Italy.

2. The first of these provisions (Arts. 1, 2 and 4) for liaison and communication with these enemy occupied territories goes, it is submitted, too far. The only communication with organizations or individuals on the other side of the line which can be permitted should be those conducted through military channels for purposes approved by AFHQ, and this has already been indicated to the Minister.

3. It will be for SACM to say what communication served Allied aims. It may well be that some communication from the Italian Government may be desirable as furthering those aims by political means but SACM will be the only authorizing authority. A directive on the subject matter and machinery for submission of matter for approval may be desirable.

4. The second provision (Art. 5 (1)) for assisting patriots is not acceptable to this Commission. Experience has shown that to have civilian representatives operating in AFHQ territory on patriot matters is most undesirable. It is considered that the rehabilitation of patriots in a matter which must be dealt with solely by this Commission through the Patriot Branch. The Italian Government would, however, be responsible for making provision for paying and, so far as it is able, for clothing patriots. Recruiting agencies would be permitted in forward areas.

5. The third provision (Art. 4) is for liaison with patriots outside Italy. The purposes and control of such communications to be permitted is a matter for AFHQ rather than for this Commission.

6. This Commission has recommended to AFHQ that the Italian Government be informed that their proposals go too far having in view the military requirements of a theatre of operations; that communication with enemy occupied territory can only be permitted through AFHQ and then only in matters which will be laid down in an AFHQ directive; that the rehabilitation of patriots in forward areas will only be undertaken through the Patriots Branch of this Commission; and finally that communication with patriots in other countries can only be carried out through AFHQ in a manner to be determined by that Headquarters.

7. It is further recommended that this Commission should 527 set to

The Italian Government would, however, be responsible for making provision for paying and, so far as it is able, for clothing patriots. Recruiting agencies would be permitted in forward areas.

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7. It is further recommended that this Commission should 527 to the Italian Government that the real work of the Ministry should, at the present stage, be of a planning rather than an operational nature; that a very large field requires study by the Ministry and that the rehabilitation of the people of the vital industrial north requires immediate planning; in particular, programmes to prevent unemployment, to clothe and rehabilitate the homeless and to prepare for the full resumption of civilian and political life are essential and appropriate activities for the Ministry to undertake. Further, that in the immediate future its operational activities should be confined to the remuneration, finding of employment, and the contribution of clothing for patriots through the agency of the Patriotic Branch of this Commission.

- 1 The Italian Govt is tackling the problem methodically and consistently. It may not be generally realised that since Jul 43 it has published 83 decrees on this subject, 10 of which it had published before the invasion of the mainland had commenced and this does not take into account decrees which merely appoint new controllers to bodies set up under the Fascist Regime.
- 2 The Principal Decree dealing with Defascism is DDL 159 of 27 Jul 44; this established a High Commission for supervising the eradication of fascism. The High Commissionership is at present vacant. The Commission is divided into four Departments each under an Asst High Commissioner and the decree is correspondingly divided into four parts
 - Pt I declares certain acts to be crimes against the state, prescribes penalties and sets up a High Court to try them. The ANI charged with supervision of action under this part of the decree is Mario Berlinguer.
 - Pt II provides machinery for removing fascists from positions of authority in the Central Govt, Local Govt and in Public, Commercial and Industrial concerns of National Importance. The ANI responsible is Ruggiero Grieco who has recently replaced Scoccimarro.
 - Pt III provides machinery for forfeiture of corruptly gained fortunes.
 - Pt IV contains directions for the realisation and disposal of the property of disbanded fascist organisations.
- 3 With regard to Fascist "Crimes" for which punishment from death downward may be awarded, over one thousand four hundred cases have been investigated; trials have already commenced. Most of these cases will go to assizes, very few will go to the Special Court. The important fascists all retreated to North Italy.
- 4 The principle on which epuration is being conducted is that fascists in positions of authority must go, but that the little man who had to conform to keep his appointment will not be epurated unless he has been an active protagonist of fascism. After all, practically everybody was a professed fascist and if all were removed, not only would chaos result but an impossible unemployment problem would result and a hard core created of those whose only hope was revolution.
- 5 The original decree has been fortified by two ^{not} one to expedite the removal of the most senior officials (Grades 1-IV), the other lays down Rules of Procedure for the tribunals established by the principal decree and also amends the principal decree itself.
- 6 Of the most senior grades, 60% has been completed. It is expected that

review of the whole will be completed within the next fortnight (ten out of the thirteen Ministries have already been completed). Of the middle grades, 20% has already been reviewed. Under the present decree all cases to be considered by Epuration tribunals have to be lodged by the 28 Jan. It is obvious that it will not be possible to conclude the investigation of the remainder of these cases in the next three weeks and a decree is in preparation extending this time limit by one month. Of the lowest class of employees, only 1% has so far been investigated; neither the Allied Commission nor the High Commissioner is intending to concern itself very greatly with the lowest grades, with the exception of a few who may have been notorious and of school teachers who constitute an exceptional class.

- 7 Provincial Epuration which deals with less important bodies is not so satisfactory; comparatively few provincial commissions have got into their stride, a considerable number have not yet even been appointed. The new decree proposes an extension of time of three months for these cases.
- 8 The two principal causes of delay are lack of transport which delays investigations not only as to who shall be prosecuted and as to searches for evidence, but also as to those suitable to be appointed members of the investigating tribunals. A second cause is the difficulty of finding judges. In accordance with the Italian desire to epurate fairly the decree provides that a judge shall sit on every tribunal. Already over a hundred tribunals have been formed and something like another hundred will be required. So many judges have been taken for this purpose that the administration of Justice has been affected. No more can be spared. The employment of selected advocates of standing for this type of work has been suggested to the Italian Govt and is under investigation.
- 9 42,000 cases have been or are under consideration. Over 16,000 cases (38%) have been referred to the hearing Commissions; 4,000 (25%) hearings have been concluded; 600 persons have been dismissed; 1500 have received some lesser punishment.
- 10 The Allied Commission has regarded the forfeiture of corruptly gained fortunes and the disposal of fascist funds as matters mainly domestic to the Italian people and beyond watching that nothing unreasonable is proposed it has taken no active action.
- 11 Industrial centres in the North may be restless if they do not see active progress of defascism within a relatively short time. With bad communications and with the present deficiency of transport it is doubtful whether the Italian Govt would be able to set up its own machinery sufficiently quickly and secondly even if it could whether we should desire the Italian Govt to function where there is pronounced unrest. The AC has therefore prepared its own defascising machinery (GO 35) under which it will set up investigatory boards of Italians, who will suspend suspects. Persons so suspended will remain suspended until the tribunal under the Italian decree is constituted and decides whether the suspended persons shall be dismissed or the suspension terminated. This scheme will only be put into operation if ordered by this HQ.
