Minutes of a meeting on Northwest Italy Planning  
held at AC HQ on Saturday, 17 Feb '45.

Brigadier Cameron stated that while his plans were made in respect of military casualties he did not know the exact position regarding Patriots, Prisoners of War and Gruppi. If military medical installations were required to hospitalize such persons his original estimates would have to be very much increased. The Director of the Patriots Branch had informed him that it was only field medical units which would be required to hospitalise such cases in the early stages and they would then be evacuated to Italian Military Hospitals.

Colonel McQuatt thought these cases would be taken care of by Italian Military organisations all along the line.

Brigadier Cameron said that it would be very difficult to evaluate the status of a Patriot. Any wounded person could easily declare himself to be a Patriot. He had written to AFHQ asking for clarification on the whole matter.

O | Lt. Colonel Bizzozero was of the opinion that the whole question of Patriots was a political one and that they should not be hospitalised by the Army but by the Italian Red Cross.

Lt. Colonel Frizelle stated that the Italian Red Cross had already sufficient difficulties with shortage of personnel and supplies to deal with their present commitments and he imagined it would be impossible for them to assume any further responsibilities.

Brigadier Cameron asked what AC policy was in the early phases. If the Army refused to hospitalise casualties among Patriots, it ought to be in a position to offer alternative accommodation.

Brigadier Parkinson stated that in the early phases the Army had organised field units while AC had nothing until it could obtain control over Civil Hospitals. He thought the casualties should first be treated in the field units and later evacuated to Civil Hospitals.

Lt. Colonel Bizzozero said that he understood the Patriots already had a well organised underground hospital service.

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Brigadier Parkinson stated that local arrangements between Army and AC heads of Medical Services should be made locally at Regional level.

Colonel McQuatt stated that an influx of 53,000 Patriots was anticipated at Genoa. This would greatly increase evacuation problems.

Brigadier Cameron was anxious to have an early working arrangement so as to avoid misunderstanding and confusion when operations began. He feared riots between Fascist and Communist elements.

Major Norman said in his opinion civil casualties should be cared for by civil hospitals but the present problem was to know what accommodation would be found.

Major Carrier stated that he understood two wings of the hospital situated in the centre of Genoa had been damaged.

Brigadier Parkinson said that the usual AC difficulty would be lack of transport.

Major Carrier was of the opinion that he had been promised one ambulance and a number of jeeps.

Brigadier Cameron said that Field Medical Formations would be very few in number. He was anxious to obtain a site for a 1200 bedded Military Hospital.

Brigadier Parkinson remarked that the military generally requisitioned most of the available hospital accommodation and then grumbled at AC for not hospitalising the civil cases.

Major Carrier said that 5000 beds should be available in Genoa.

Brigadier Cameron said that his key plan could be made available to AC.

Lt.Colonel Frizelle said that MIA stated that the Italian Army had two field hospitals forward with the Gruppi. These would take care of Gruopi casualties and evacuate them to Italian Base Hospitals.

Brigadier Parkinson said that all information possible on conditions in NW Italy would be obtained and circulated to members of the meeting.

Lt.Colonel Rizzozero emphasised the importance of having immediately available adequate quantities of Medical Supplies.

Brigadier Parkinson said that the Medical Supply Branch had made special arrangements for this.

Major Carrier was of the opinion that the road from Leghorn to Genoa would be destroyed and that all his supplies were coming in by sea.

Colonel McQuatt thought that the Army would be in a better position to afford AC more assistance than had previously been rendered.

It was intended to be an opportunity to bring to light the various factors and considerations involved, so that the whole problem and its implications could be determined. This would provide the basis for further study and submission of recommendations on action to be taken.

OCCUPATION OF NORTHERN ITALYGENERAL

The Chairman pointed out that the purpose of the meeting was exploratory. It was intended to be an opportunity to bring to light the various factors and considerations involved, so that the whole problem and its implications could be determined. This would provide the basis for further study and submission of recommendations on action to be taken.

CIRCUMSTANCES OF OCCUPATION

- 2 G-3 Plans pointed out that the occupation of Northern Italy could occur in a variety of circumstances, namely:
- a Enemy collapse or surrender on his present line.
  - b Enemy withdrawal to the TIGR or ALPS.
  - c Enemy surrender in the course of such a withdrawal.

It was not possible at present to forecast which of the foregoing circumstances was most likely. Plans must therefore be capable of being adapted to any of them.

PARTISAN AND POLITICAL SITUATION IN NORTHERN ITALY.

- 3 It was considered likely that we should have to deal with the following numbers of partisans in Northern Italy.
- a Northwest Italy - 75,000 of which 56,000 were armed and at present active.
- b Northeast Italy - 25,000 of which 10,000 were at present armed and active.
- The total commitment was therefore 100,000.

- 4 G-2 considered it probable that the fascist divisions would disintegrate and that elements of them would take to the hills as anti-Allied partisans.

5 The Political Advisers stressed the need for speed in establishing occupational forces and Allied military government, otherwise there was a danger, especially in Northwest Italy that the partisans would regard themselves as the rightful government of Italy, whereas the allies were pledged to support the KING Government. Allied Commission in agreeing with this view concluded that as a result it would be necessary for ANC personnel to move in at the same time as the occupational task forces.

NORTHWEST ITALY

Occupational Forces - Requirements and Availability.

- 6 It was considered that forces of the order of 2 Allied Divisions with supporting Italian troops would be required for occupational duties in Northwest Italy. These forces would be sufficient to those necessary to deal with any German threat to the area, existing at the time of its occupation.

- 7 G-2 plans and G-9 Ops pointed out that in the event of German withdrawal, the diversion of forces to a purely occupational task in Northwest Italy would be most undesirable from the operational point of view. In the event of such withdrawal, all our available forces are likely to be required to seize the opportunity of achieving our military object - the destruction of the maximum enemy forces. As soon, however, as the enemy falls back or is driven back, to a general line ADIGE + ALPS, considerable forces could be made available for the occupation of Northwest Italy without prejudice to further operations against the enemy in this theatre. In any case, we are likely to have to accept some delay in carrying out the effective occupation of Northwest Italy (see paragraph 11 below), and in the event of a rapid enemy withdrawal to the ADIGE + ALPS line, the time taken in such withdrawal might correspond reasonably closely to such delay.

8 On the other hand, the political necessity for early and rapid occupation of Northwest Italy may compel the diversion of forces from this main battle to this task. In these circumstances, it suggests that while all plans and arrangements (including the securing of the appropriate formations) for the occupation of Northwest Italy should be made, due consideration should be given to the possibility of a rapid withdrawal.

Allied Commission in agreeing with this view concluded that as a result it would be necessary for Axis personnel to move in at the same time as the occupational task forces.

#### NORTHWEST ITALY

##### Occupational Forces - Requirements and Availability.

- 5 It was considered that forces of the order of 2 Allied Divisions with supporting Italian troops would be required for occupational duties in Northwest Italy. These forces would be additional to those necessary to deal with any German threat to the area, existing at the time of its occupation.

6 G-2 plans and G-3 Ops pointed out that in the event of German withdrawal, the diversion of forces to a purely occupational task in Northwest Italy would be most undesirable from the operational point of view. As soon, however, as the enemy falls back or is driven back, to a general line Alpine - Alps, considerable forces could be made available for the occupation of Northwest Italy without prejudice to further operations against the enemy in this theatre. In any case, we are likely to have to accent some delay in carrying out the effective occupation of Northwest Italy (see paragraph 11 below), and in the event of a rapid enemy withdrawal to the Alpine - Alps line, the time taken in such withdrawal might correspond reasonably closely to such delay.

7 On the other hand, the political necessity for early and rapid occupation of Northwest Italy may compel the diversion of forces from the main battle to this task. In these circumstances, it emerges that while all plans and arrangements (including the earmarking of the appropriate formations) for the occupation of Northwest Italy should be made now, the actual decision to carry out this operation should be made by SACTT in the light of the whole situation existing when the opportunity to occupy Northwest Italy arises.

##### Key Points and Priorities.

- 8 It was agreed that the establishment of occupational forces and LND should be a steady process, being effected area by area, as the advance into Northwest Italy progressed. Undue dispersion of troops in the early stages was to be avoided.

- 10 It was considered that the key areas in order of priority were:

MILAN  
TURIN  
GENOVA

To establish ourselves in any of these areas it would first be necessary to secure TURIN.

Section II Section Speed of Occupation.

- 11 The time required for the establishment of occupation forces by land would depend on the degree of demolition carried out by the enemy. In the event of German withdrawal, a delay of three weeks, before TURIN could be reached, was likely. In the event of enemy collapse or surrender, the scale of demolition would be less and a more speedy occupation could be effected. G-2 agreed to examine this further.

- 12 The introduction of occupational forces by air was limited by the availability of 2 P-47 fighters and no such operation was possible in the near future. It would be desirable to prepare a modified plan for operation CHARGE for a landing in the TURIN area as an alternative to TURIN.

WESTERN ITALY.

Occupational Forces.

- 13 In the event of German withdrawal, all key points in Northeast Italy would necessarily be occupied in the course of continued operations. In the event of German collapse, the area south of he occupied in the course of PIEDMONT operations. No special occupational task forces were therefore required in this area. It was felt, however, essential that ANP personnel should be present in the area after initial establishment of the new frontier.

Cooperation with ANP.

- 14 The disengagement of partisans and establishment of forces in Northeast Italy could require the cooperation of ANP.

PROVISION FOR PARTISANS.

- 15 Provisions for partisans in Northern Italy should be based on a commitment for 100,000 for three months. In view of the partisans' services to the Allies, which should be rewarded, and because of the absence of civil supplies, provision of food and clothing should be undertaken as a military requirement.
- 16 By offering food, clothing, and money, the partisans should be ready to concentrate in convenient areas as soon as, but not before, the world is ready to supply them. They would then be disarmed, a procedure which would be enlisted in their interest, and otherwise would be demanded under terms for

To establish ourselves in any of these areas it would first be necessary to secure PIEMONTE.

Factors Affecting Speed of Occupation.

11. The time required for the establishment of combatant naval forces by land would depend on the degree of demolition carried out by the enemy. In the event of German withdrawal, a delay of three weeks, before TUTTAN could be reached, was likely. In the event of enemy collapse or surrender, the scale of demolition would be less and a more speedy occupation could be expected. G-2 agreed to examine this further.
12. The introduction of combatant forces by air was limited by the availability of 222nd Brigade and no such operation was possible in the near future. It would be desirable to prepare a modified plan for Operation COUNTER for a landing in the TIAN area as an alternative to TUTTAN.
- NORTHEAST ITALY.
- Occupational Forces.
13. In the event of German withdrawal, all key points in Northeast Italy would necessarily be occupied in the course of continued operations. In the event of German collapse the area would be occupied in the course of PERNAR operations. No special occupational task forces were therefore required in this area. It was, however, essential that all personnel should receive onward and establish military government immediately.
14. Although there was some doubt as to the treatment of VENETO CIVILI, 15 Army Group should be prepared to establish occupational forces and Air up to the 1939 frontier.
- Cooperation with TUTTAN.
15. The disbursement of partisans and establishment of forces in Northeast Italy would require the cooperation of TUTTAN.
- PROVISION FOR PARTISANS.
16. Provisioning for partisans in Northern Italy should be based on a commitment for 100,000 for three months. In view of the partisans' services to the Allies, which should be rewarded, and because of the absence of civil supplies, the provisioning of food and clothing should be undertaken as a military commitment.
17. By offering food, clothing and money, the partisans should be induced to concentrate in convenient areas as soon as, but not before, we would be ready to supply them. They would then be disengaged, a proportion would be enlisted into the Italian Army and others would be formed into labor units for employment by AIC and for military purposes. The balance would need to be cared for until they could be absorbed into normal employment. Arrangements would be made for partisans returning at the concentration areas to be screened by members of their own organizations.
18. It was considered that except when they were enlisted into the Italian Army, partisans treated in accordance with Paragraph 17, should not be held against any of the existing ceilings for the Italian Army, but should form a fresh

category of Partisans, the military responsibility for whom would be shared equally between BRITAIN and the U.S.

- 19 Authorization for feeding and clothing Italians on this basis would need to be obtained from the Combined Chiefs of Staff.
- 20 The availability of rations and clothing to meet this commitment was doubtful but Log Plans and G-3 Plans agreed to examine it further.
- 21 Money for the partisans would be provided by the Italian Government and issued through AMG. No difficulty was foreseen in this respect.

ORDERS TO PARTISANS

- 22 G-3 Special Ops in conjunction with Allied Commission agreed to prepare a draft of orders which would need to be issued to the partisans instructing them to:
  - a Carry out anti-sabotage activities during the German withdrawal.
  - b Concentrate in agreed areas at such times as the Allies would be ready to supply them.
- 23 The channels for issue of orders to partisans when necessary would be:
  - c Through special operational channels to LDCs who would pass the instructions to partisan units.
  - d By PWD means (including the use of the broadcasts and leaflet dropings).

- i. GENOA - ALESSANDRI.

- iii. PIACENZA - MITIAH

Priorities for repair would be in the order listed above.

e. Traffic Control

Responsibility for traffic control on the main arteries of military supplies.

f. Public Utilities and Signal Communications

Responsibility for co-ordination of the work of rehabilitating electric power and water systems at GENOA, and possibly certain other places, and co-ordination of the repair of the main State cable routes.

3. It was emphasised that military personnel were not available to meet completely the above commitments and that the maximum use of civil resources would be required by the military.

These proposals were accepted by the Chief of Staff, Allied Commission, who stated that civilian personnel could be provided to assist in the opening and operation of the port of GENOA. I.B.R. personnel were also available to assist railway development.

g. Road Transport

The main problem was to move civil supplies to NW ITALY in the initial stages of the occupation during the period prior to GENOA being developed. The O.C. stated that he was prepared to move, under military arrangements, a certain daily tonnage of civil supplies from existing stockpiles to some point between PIACENZA and PIACENZA, from which point on carriage would be an AC responsibility. The choice of point and the precise tonnage were now under study and would be advised to AC in due course. Application had already been made to Combined Chiefs of Staff for 2,000 vehicles for NW ITALY for the movement of civil supplies (in addition to the 1,700 x 1½ ton vehicles already on order).

6. It was agreed that drivers for these additional vehicles should be Italian military personnel. They would assist in their training, but the responsibility for their raising would rest with the I.B.R. Commission.

7. Deciding on LIGURIA

As roads serving this Compartimento are likely to be long-term repair commitments, the Allied Commission considered that the civil supplies for LIGURIA should be imported by sea. SO(P), I.S.R. stated that mines would be cleared to enable schooners to use one or two of the smaller Ligurian Ports.

Part 14. 5. Communication.

It was determined whether supplies should be brought in through LIBADI or TAKOUI, or through a combination of both. Para 19. 9. Roads.
