BRITISH ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTION NO. 23

ACCOMMODATION IN ITALY

1. MTOHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 29 dated 8 Jul 44, announced the policy that the needs of all Italian agencies, whether commercial, governmental or private, are subordinate to those of the United Nations. There can be no change in this general policy which would prejudice the redeployment programme or affect the operational efficiency of the Forces remaining in the theatre, or involve construction or alternative accommodation.
2. In order to assist in the rehabilitation of the government and economic life of ITALY, it is necessary that every consideration be given to well founded requirements of the Italian authorities. Civilian necessity for the rehabilitation of ITALY is paramount to military convenience.
3. All commanders in ITALY having requisitioned property under their control, will, upon receipt of this Instruction, take the following action:-
 - (a) Investigate immediately the use which is being made of all requisitioned accommodation within their Command to determine the necessity for such use.
 - (b) Review, from time to time, all accommodation held, in order to ensure the utmost economy of use and to release any accommodation the continued use of which cannot be justified as a military necessity.
 - (c) Derequisition all unoccupied real estate if no requirement is foreseen for it and derequisition all other accommodation, the occupancy of which is not warrantable as a military necessity. Every effort will be made to expedite the release of government administrative buildings, prisons, educational facilities, hospitals, hotels and warehouses.
 - (d) Where practicable, consolidate two or more user organisations occupying individual sets of accommodation, in order to economise in accommodation and permit releasing the excess.
4. All requests for additional accommodation will be strictly scrutinized by authorities competent to requisition and no request for accommodation will be considered unless it contains complete justification. Normal **40** requests for additional accommodation will not be approved unless such accommodation is clearly a military necessity.
5. All authorities in ITALY competent to requisition, will, at all times, be able to justify the continued use of requisitioned accommodation if so required by this Headquarters.

 - (c) Derequisition all unoccupied civil estates if no requirement is foreseen for it and derquisition all other accommodation, the occupancy or use of which is not warranted as a Military necessity. Every effort will be made to expedite the release of Government administrative buildings, prisons, civil and medical facilities, hospitals, hotels and warehouses.
 - (d) Where practicable, consolidate two or more user organisations occupying individual sets of accommodation, in order to economise in accommodation and permit releasing the excess.
4. All requests for additional accommodation will be strictly scrutinized by authorities competent to requisition and no request for accommodation will be considered unless it contains complete justification. Normal **40** requests for additional accommodation will not be approved unless such accommodation is clearly a Military necessity.
5. All Authorities in ITALY competent to requisition, will, at all times, be able to justify the continued use of requisitioned accommodation if so required by this Headquarters.
6. This Instruction in no way affects the instructions contained in AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No.14 dt 7 Mar 45, subject "Use of Commercial Facilities for Civil Requirements and in AFHQ Letter AG 004/171 GIO-O dated 11 Aug 45, subject "Release of Hotel Accommodations".

RESTRICTED.

1 - ACTION addressees will take immediate action to review and consolidate real estate holdings with a view to immediate derequisitioning of all excess real estates. Military convenience will be no excuse for non consolidation.

Real estate will not be vacated where it will be necessary to construct alternate accommodations. This cable is in lieu of letter instructions referred to in FX 35335.

2 - Report will be submitted to this headquarters by 1 September giving following information all requisitioned real estate including educational recreational facilities occupied by US forces : name, location, type of facility, present use, capacity, percentage of capacity now being used, reasons why accommodation is required, date to be released, consolidation affected or planned.

3 - Each command will be prepared to justify continued use of each requisitioned accommodation to AFHQ board.

4 - No further real estate will be requisitioned without approval of the HQ. Request should contain complete justification and will not normally be approved here unless redeployment cannot be accomplished without additional requisitioning.

5 - Each addressee will effective 1 September submit a report to this HQ on this on the 10, 20, and last day of each month listing the real estate derequisitioned during the previous 10 day period.

SUBJECT: Release of Hotel Accommodations

TO: All Concerned

1. The Italian Government, through the Allied Commission, has made strong representations for the release of hotel accommodations for civil use in order that such facilities may be made available for Governmental officials, industrial experts, foreign trade representatives and other persons travelling in Italy on essential duties relating to the Government and/or the rehabilitation of the economic life of the country.

2. The policy of this theater has always been, as announced in HQ Administrative Memorandum No. 29 of 8 July 1944, that the needs of all Italian agencies, whether commercial, governmental or private, are subordinate to those of the United Nations. Though there can be no change in this general policy which would prejudice the redeployment of forces from the theater or disturb the operational efficiency of the troops remaining in the theater, however, in order to assist in the rehabilitation of the governmental and economic life of Italy, it is necessary that certain Italian requirements essential to such rehabilitation have priority over the extravagance and unrestricted use, by the military, of hotels for rest and recreation and the excessive travel indulged in by the military.

3. All commands in this theater, therefore, upon receipt of this directive, immediately will investigate, and thereafter from time to time review, the extent and use to which hotels in their respective areas are being operated in order that those hotels, which can be released without jeopardizing Allied interests, may be returned to the Italians.

4. Any hotel which does not have a daily average occupancy of at least sixty (60) per cent during a thirty day period will be deregquisitioned unless its retention can be fully justified by a well-founded future need therefor.

5. In cases where hotels individually are occupied by different organizations, arrangements will be made, where possible, to accommodate, as joint users, two or more of such organizations in the same hotels in order to provide for the release of other hotels.



1. The following is the text of a signal received from TUSCANY Region.

"PBS propose eviction from their homes of 125 families approx 1000 Italian residents of MONTECATINI. Have explained that if these Italians are evicted from MONTECATINI they will be made destitute while in MONTECATINI they are self supporting. Have proposed that Italians be permitted to use part of their homes so that they can continue their employment and remain self supporting. PBS has submitted the question to MCUSA. Recommend action be taken to impress MCUSA with importance of avoiding making destitute this 1000 self supporting Italians"

2. It is suggested that MCUSA be asked to erect tented camps since roofed accommodation for 22,000 has already been found and the above signal concerns only 3,000 surplus. The alternative would seem to be partial requisition, as suggested in the signal.

TO ; Civil Affairs Section

1. Reference your memorandum 4/41A/CA, of 23 December 1944, above subject, requesting the comments of the Economic Section on the draft memorandum of 21 December 1944, which was attached.
2. It is not understood why it is considered necessary to have now another memorandum repeating at greater length the recommendations made in the memorandum of 9 December 1944 (9/21.1/CA) from the Chief of Staff to AFHQ, G-5 Section.
3. You are of course familiar with Administrative Memorandum No. 57, dated 11 December 1944, paragraph 2 of which is extracted below:

"The Allied Forces have retained the power to requisition private and public property and services in Italian Government territory but it is emphasized that this must be exercised sparingly and only for reasons of genuine military necessity. This will be exercised through the Italian authorities. If for example it is necessary to requisition a building it should be done through the Sindaco of the town where the building is situated with the assistance of the nearest provincial officer of the Allied Commission. The usual formalities of requisitioning will be followed."

4. The underlined sentence in the above quoted paragraph does not appear to be followed in many cases, and AC might appropriately ask AFHQ to draw this provision forcibly to the attention of all military services operating in Italian Government territory. Beyond this, it is felt that the Chief of Staff's memorandum, and our current discussions with AFHQ on the requisitioning and de-requisitioning of industrial premises, adequately cover the subject for the moment as far as this Section is concerned.

- 1 AFHQ has recently issued a letter drawing attention to and emphasising the direction contained in its Admin Memo 29 and this HQ has already received demands referring to this memo which it considers to be unreasonable. Attached is the draft of a letter which it is suggested should be addressed to AFHQ because of the wording of para 3 of the Admin Memo (a copy of which is for your convenience appended to the draft) and because of the way that Memo is being interpreted.
- 2 If CA itself directly administered the country and required premises for that purpose which it would itself occupy, its right could not be denied but because, in order to save man power, it administers territory by means of existing agencies, it is apparently not realised that these agencies have any right to accommodation or other facilities.
- 3 Will you please let me have your comments on the draft.
- 4 With regard to para 3 thereof, it is proposed to append copies representations which it has been found necessary to address to AFHQ on various subjects such as
 Requisition of the Medical School Pisa.
 Request for the Gabelli Institute.

That, of course, goes wide but it is submitted that it is essential to the Armed Forces, that facilities to a reasonable minimum to enable the proper administration of the country (including Italian Govt Territory) must be available to the governmental and commercial agencies through which AC works and that para 3b requires modification to prevent its usual too literal interpretation.
- 8 It is submitted that in respect of some services, certain classes of buildings should be entirely exempt from requisition, that others should be requisitioned only where the commander certifies the necessity; in the case of other services

the minimum scale of facilities to be left for say every 100,000 population should be laid down. Such classes or scales might be different in Army Areas Regions and Italian Govt Territory.

- 9 It is recommended that a Staff study of the minimum facilities which should be left to the civil administration to meet essential administrative requirements and the differences in such minima in Army Areas, Regions and IGT be undertaken as a matter of urgency.

10 It is not desired to burden this letter with details, but in nearly all branches of administration AC has examples of what it feels has been unreasonable deprivation of the facilities necessary for proper administration. Police Stations, Hospitals, Prisons, Ambulances and other means of transportation have frequently been taken so as to leave insufficient for effective administration or for the reasonable minimum requirements of the population. Attached to this letter as appendices are examples on which immediate assistance is requested irrespective of the decision on the point of policy raised by this letter.

ACCOMMODATION IN ITALY

- 1 In order that there may be no misapprehension as to the attitude which should be adopted towards Italian private individuals, officials, and corporations in respect to obtaining necessary accommodations for military agencies or civilian agencies working for the Armed Forces, the following instructions will be strictly observed by all persons whose duty it is to obtain or allot accommodations.
 - 2 It is desired to emphasize that strict adherence to this policy becomes increasingly necessary as more and more of the great centers of population in Italy come under our control. Every effort must be made to remove underground influences which might tend to limit the proper accommodation of military personnel and installations or civilian agencies working on their account.
 - 3
 - a The needs of all Italian agencies, whether commercial, governmental or private, are subordinate to those of the United Nations.
 - b The fact that an Italian commercial or governmental agency or an Italian private individual or group of individuals may suffer inconvenience or hardship if evicted to provide for the needs of United Nations personnel will not be regarded as a valid reason for acceptance of less suitable accommodations offered alternatively.
 - c In implementing these two principles the responsible officials of the United Nations agencies will not make unreasonable demands, but at the same time will not accept anything less than that which is necessary completely to fulfill their requirements.
 - d Intervention by Italian personnel, either by private individuals or through unauthorised channels, will not be accepted by any official of the United Nations. Persons making such approaches will be referred to the approved Italian agencies.

1. Reference your AG 386.2/179 GM-8 of the 26th November, 1944, and Administrative Memorandum No. 29 dated 8th July, 1944, on the subject of accommodation in Italy, while the necessity for ensuring that adequate accommodation is available for military personnel and civilian agencies working on their account is appreciated, it is felt that paras 5 (a) and (b) of the above Administrative Memorandum need clarification.

2. Para 5 (a) states: "The needs of all Italian agencies whether commercial, governmental or private, are subordinate to those of the United Nations." It is, as you are well aware, to the army's direct interest that the administrative machinery should work smoothly, but we cannot expect Local Governments, whether they be AMG or Italian, to function if they are bereft of accommodation. Regional and Provincial AMG Headquarters are operational and it is felt that they should be given a certain operational priority with regard to accommodation. AMG has often had to establish itself in offices divorced from the natural centre of administration and away from existing facilities, while Police Stations, hospitals and buildings marked as exempt from requisition have nevertheless been requisitioned.

3. As it stands at present Administrative Memorandum No. 29 is capable of causing most unfortunate repercussions to Military Government. I shall, therefore, be glad if it can be amended to provide that Italian Government agencies working under this Commission shall be entitled to accommodation as agencies working for the armed forces, and that A.M.G. officers are entitled to establish themselves in reasonable and appropriate offices.

My dear Colonel,

Since your visit to the Area Commander things have taken an ugly turn as regards prospects of AMG accommodation. That has worried us more than anything in the extraordinary attitude adopted by the Brigadier.

Forgive my troubling you again, but since the consequences may have important results and you are seeing Brig. Lush this weekend, I think it well to let you know what is in the wind.

This morning at about 11 o'clock the Area Comd went to the S.P.C.C.'s office with the A.M. and demanded to see all over this building, the Province, which as you know is full to the brim with AMG, AG Port Detachment and Prefecture etc. This without reference to me or to Robert Hunt. He burst into my room in an extremely rude manner, saying "I've just come in to look round this building as I may have to take it for a Service-men's Club". Robert and Shad were both in with me and we were spellbound. All I could say was "where am I to go?", his reply was "that's not my problem I don't know".

This afternoon he sent a Corporal from the Town Major's office to look all over our Mess, where we have been for 4 months - this again without reference to me or to Robert. We have told the Corporal, Town Major being sick, that we will furnish full particulars by tomorrow.

It is not that we cannot deal with the situation ourselves, but that if the Area Comd presses his demands we want you and AG HQ to be forewarned and ready with the support we feel confident we shall get.

I need not add that AMG accommodation in ANCONA is absolutely minimum and that if the Province were taken away we might as well pack up- the refect as well. The accommodation problem is already a big headache and we have always done our best to make things easy for the military.


