TO : CGS for V.P.

1. I have read through very carefully the attached correspondence about Lt. Sterne.
2. It seems to me that AFHQ is indicating to us that they do not take a very serious view of the matter, or on their own they would have sent out an investigator.
3. I feel reasonably certain that if we should take the trouble to write to the R.C. Sardinia for the information requested by AFHQ that they would simply send it on to the man's commanding officer.
4. The actual proceeding would take considerable time and the officer may be out of Sardinia now, so that investigation might be only perfunctory.
5. Nonetheless I feel that since we have gone so far as we have with AFHQ we should look a bit foolish to drop the matter now. Moreover as an American officer I feel that I should like to be clear in my own mind whether this man has violated his oath of office, and if he has not it would be better for his reputation to have himself cleared through investigation.
6. Therefore I have prepared a letter for the VP's signature to Col. Pennyquick so that we can get the information we require by the G5.
