Rear Admiral,

I greatly appreciated the information you sent me in your letter dated January 5th, about the situation in the Bolzano Province and the opinion expressed on such a matter by Brigadier Dunlop.

I am happy to confirm that the Italian Government, faithful to the traditions of democratic Italy, tending to respect the rights and claims of the minorities, has no intention whatever of expelling such German speaking citizens as remained there permanently even if they voted for German citizenship.

I already made such a statement in the name of the Government in the speech which I held at the Consulta Nazionale on January the 1st, and in which I solemnly stated that we would expel no person in good faith on this side of the Brenner nor would we compel such people to wander beyond it.

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

In connection with the Bolzano situation, I am taking the liberty of quoting below some views of Brigadier Dunlop, whom I believe you met recently, which you may find of interest and which you might care to adopt.

"I believe one single action that could be taken by the Italian Government to calm the Bolzano situation would be to reassure the German-speaking population that no forced emigration is intended.

"As you know, as a result of the Hitler-Mussolini agreement and as a result of the great deal of misrepresentation that accompanied that agreement very many German-speaking inhabitants 'opted' to go to Germany (or Austria). In fact as a result of war problems only a relatively small proportion did so move. The others still remain in Bolzano Province. Now, though we have said that such people should be regarded as Italian citizens - I am generalising in this statement and I appreciate that there are various categories - the Italian Government has never said so itself. The result is that there is real apprehension among the Sud Tirolese that the Italian Government may now try to turn these optants out of their homeland.

"If the Italian Government could say quite simply, that it was not their intention to turn out of Bolzano any Sud Tirolese born there, whether he voted for Germany in 1939 or not, then, I believe that a very constructive step would have been taken towards a local peaceful settlement."

1. It has been brought to the attention of this headquarters that officers in AMG Regions have been authorizing Prefects to requisition civilian motor vehicles for AMG officers use.
2. Providing transportation for AMG officers in Regions is the responsibility of this headquarters and no authority has been granted to AMG officers authorizing them to use vehicles requisitioned by Prefects.
3. Therefore, under no circumstances will officers assigned to AMG Regions of the Allied Commission be permitted to use civilian motor vehicles requisitioned by Prefects, Sindacos, or any Italian agency, and any such vehicles at present so being used will be returned to respective Prefects for disposition.

SUBJECT : Requisitioning of Cars.

Your Excellency,

I refer to Your Excellency's letter of the 26 August with regard to the requisitioning of cars. I would point out that operational troops are not under the command of this HQ and this HQ cannot undertake to interfere with their actions. However on this occasion we have made representations on your behalf and the officer concerned has agreed to waive the right he undoubtedly has to requisition these cars.

It would appear (a) that the car was on the road without proper papers, (b) that it was conveying persons who were not travelling on official business, (c) that evidence as to the car being in the possession of the High Commissioner was not produced within the time limit allowed.

If the requirement of the military authorities under which only cars are permitted to circulate are not complied with, one can hardly complain if the car infringing the regulations is seized.

1 I refer to your interview yesterday afternoon with Lt.-Col. Littlewood, AD Hirings, and Captain Ingram of this Directorate, in connection with the detention of Lancia Car 75529-ROMA, pending its requisition by ADOS RAAC.

2 I attach statement of the circumstances of the detention of this car, signed by Lt.-Col. Littlewood. It will be noted from perusal of this statement that proper procedure has been followed, and I have, as a result, given instructions that the request for the requisition of this vehicle should be submitted to ADOS RAAC, to fill a vacancy on the vehicle establishment of this Directorate.

1 Lancia Car 3242 FZ was seized by Capt Ingram of this Directorate on 24 Aug 44. The driver of the vehicle Renio Targinio, was asked to produce his authority for circulation and the attached document was produced. This being the only document in the possession of the driver, Capt Ingram instructed him to proceed to this HQ for interrogation.

2 The driver was interviewed by the undersigned, and stated that the car was the property of Doctor Pacifici (Antonio), who was employed by the Ministry of the Interior, under the control of Commissioner Mario Berlinguer. The driver stated that he was proceeding to pick up Dr Pacifici, prior to proceeding on a mission to arrest certain Fascist individuals. The driver displayed complete ignorance of any knowledge of certificates of circulation that are required to permit the circulation of motor vehicles. He was instructed to contact Dr Pacifici and ask the latter to produce the necessary authority.

3. Dr Pacifici reported to this HQ approximately one hour later. He stated that the work on which he was employed precluded the displaying of authority to circulate, and quoted a Capt Lastretti as the authority for using his car. This officer was phoned at the Ministry of the Interior, but was not contacted. A message was left asking him to produce the necessary authority. He phoned at 1300 hrs stating he had been unable to come to this HQ., but would report with car and authority to use, at 1000 hrs 25 Aug.

4. Capt Lastretti failed to keep the appointment, and he was again telephoned at 1700 hrs 26 Aug., and told that if authority, or evidence of request for authority was not produced by 1000 hrs 28 Aug., the matter would be referred to Allied Military Police RAAC.

5. Meantime, the undersigned established, after phone talks with Lt.-Col. Pollock and Major Batterby, that the organisation concerned was co-operating in the arrest of Fascist elements, and that a number of cars had been authorised for their use.

6. A list of authorised cars was obtained from the Registration Office RAAC. This list did not include the car in question.

7. At 1000 hrs 28 Aug., Capt Lastretti reported with Dr Pacifici. The circumstances of the stopping of the car and subsequent action were complained to him, and he was asked to produce authority. This was not forthcoming, but he stated that this had been requested, but he did not know to whom. When asked if the car was available, Dr Pacifici stated that the tyres had been removed and put on to another car which had authority to circulate. When asked where this second vehicle was located, I was informed that they had reported in it, and it was outside this HQ. Capt Ingram went with Dr Pacifici and saw Lancia Car 7552 ROMA. A temporary receipt in lieu of AF AB 361 was given and he was informed that unless authority or evidence of request for authority was produced by 1100 hrs 29 Aug., this Directorate would apply to ADOS RAAC for the requisition of the vehicle, under authority AAI 2057/2/Q2 of 31/7/43, to fill a vacancy on this HQ establishment.

8 Lt.-Col Carter, ADOS RAAC phoned the undersigned at 1730 hrs 28 Aug., stating that temporary receipt given by this Directorate had been presented to him. The circumstances of the detention of the vehicle were explained and Col Carter agreed that he would requisition the vehicle when the request was submitted.

9 At 1100 hrs 29 Aug, Capt Ingram was instructed to submit request for requisition, as nothing had been heard from Capt Lastretti.

SUBJECT : Transportation.TO : Vice President, Economic Section.

1 Now that the Allied Troops have advanced further to the North, a larger number of civilian cars have become available for requisition but the real difficulty arises in respect of tyres and batteries.

2 If only tyres and batteries could be provided it would I think be possible for us to give to the Italian Governmental agencies assistance which they urgently and seriously need.

I will give three examples only:

(a) Education Sub-Commission urgently require transportation for the "provveditori" to get out into the country to open schools. Without transport they cannot get out and the schools remain closed or if open go without much needed supervision.

(b) Interior Sub-Commission urgently require transport for the Vice Prefetto (Ispettore) to get out into the communes and maintain much needed contact, frequently prefects are out of touch with their communes for months at a time.

(c) Legal Sub-Commission urgently require transport for the procuratori generali and procuratori del re to supervise out-lying pretori. Transport is also badly needed to serve process, to bring witnesses to Court and so on.

3 I fully appreciate the difficulties over transport but I feel that at this juncture the matter should again be tackled. The lack of transport for Italian civilian agencies is seriously hampering the administration of Italian Government territory and if anything can be done to help their genuine needs I am sure you will agree with me that it should be done.

4 I shall be glad therefore if you will examine the possibility of providing tyres and batteries which will go far to alleviate the present position.

SUBJECT : Transportation

TO : Vice President, Economic section.

1. Now that the Allied Troops have advanced further to the North a larger number of civilian cars have become available for requisition but the real difficulty arises in respect of tyres and batteries.

2. If only tyres and batteries could be provided it would be I think be possible for us to give to the Italian Governmental agencies assistance which they urgently and seriously need.

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b. Interior sub-Commission urgently require transport for the Vice Prefetti (Inspectors) to get out into the communes and maintain much needed contact. Frequently prefects are out of touch with their communes for months at a time.

c. Legal sub-Commission urgently require transport for the procuratori regionali and procuratori del re to supervise outlying pretori. Transport is also badly needed to serve process, to bring witnesses to Court and so on.

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4. I shall be glad therefore if you will examine the possibility of providing tyres and batteries which will go far to alleviate the present position.

Dear T.V.

If any one asked any ACG officer in the field or any Italian Government official what the greatest need is today for asking the government function in both ACG territory and Italian Government territory, I think that without question the unanimous shout would be 'TRANSPORT'!

There are now, in liberated Italy, enough civilian cars and trucks to answer this demand, if we had tires and batteries.

The number of tires and batteries needed is not excessive-I estimate, roughly, the following number of cars which we should have to equip:

3 for each ministry	45	
3 for each subcommission	45	
3 for each provincial administration, through Region 9	180	
25 for each ACG region (3,4,5, 8, 9)	125	
10 for each ACG region (1, 2, 7, 6)	40	<i>299</i>
		435

These figures are rough, of course. Let's allow a little margin and call it 500. That means 2500 tires and 500 batteries. Jeep tires fit several standard types of Italian cars and others can be

adapted to the. The addition of this transport to that now available would make more difference to the effectiveness of both Italian Government and Military Government than would any other thing.

I believe that if some one of us who sees the whole picture—who has worked in regions and at headquarters, who has talked with Italian officials and allied officials, and who has a bit of energy and salesmanship, could be sent by HQ. ACC direct to Washington, cutting red tape, and could go straight to General Hildring, this small fraction of a shipload could be released and on its way here in a short time.

Hildring could see that such an emissary got to top flight people direct—people with power to act.

However busy any one of us is, we could be spared for two or three weeks for such a mission. It only takes a day or two to fly over. If one starts at the top it does not take too long to see important officials.

Whatever Subcommission or region spared an officer to do this work would reap the benefit of the work along with others, in a measure that would far outweigh the loss of an officer for three weeks.

Every one here knows the urgency of the need. But everyone is so concerned with his job that he merely curses the inefficiency resultant from lack of transport and wishes somebody would do something about it.

Education is as much interested as any other Subcommission. I can't get my 'provveditori' to do a good job, you can't get your minister to do so if they don't have transport. I know first hand that machines with tires are relatively rare, machines without tires and batteries, plentiful. Will you go to bat, as high as you can get, to have someone competent assigned to this job for a brief period?
