May the Lord watch over you and may you find, wherever you are, some cheer in this Christmas season."

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

WILLIAM E. ELA, 0307190, Lieutenant Colonel, Quartermaster Corps, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 61st Quartermaster Base Depot, for heroism near Gaeta, Italy, on 8 July 1944. Thile making an inspection of battlefields for salvage materials, in the company of an officer and a civilian employee, two enemy land-mines exploded, seriously injuring both of Lieutenant Colonel Ela's companions. Even though some distance from the injured parties, and despite the obvious possibility of further mines within the area, he demonstrated complete disregard for his own life by moving quickly but carefully to the injured persons. The officer's leg was mangled and lesser wounds of the body were conspicuous by a profuse loss of blood, while the civilian had suffered less critical injuries. With a rapidity and confidence which subsequently proved the determining factor in saving the life of the wounded officer, Lieutenent Colonel Ela rendered first aid and then left in search of qualified medical aid. He returned and guided trained personnel through the mine field and aided in rendering the necessary treatment. The inherent courage and selflessness displayed by this officer and his prompt and intelligent decision in the face of great crisis reflect the highest traditions of the military service. "In this year of liberation, which has seen so many millions freed from tyranical rule, it is fitting that we give thanks with special fervor to our Heavenly Father for the mercies we have received individually and as a nation and for the blessings He has restored, through the victories of our arms and those of our Allies, to His children in other lands.

For the preservation of our way of life from the threat of destruction; for the unity of spirit which has kept our nation strong; for our abiding faith in freedom; and for the promise of an enduring beace, we should lift up our hearts in thanksgiving.

For the harvest that has sustained us and, in its fullness, brought succor to other peoples; for the bounty of our soil, which has produced the sinews of war for the protection of our liberties; and for a multitude of private blessings, known only in our hearts, we should give united thanks to God.

To the end that we may hear more earnest witness to our gratitude to Almighty God. I suggest a nation-wide reading of the Foly Scriptures during the period from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas. Let every man of every creed go to his own version of the Scriptures for a renewed and strengthening contact with those eternal truths and majestic principles which have inspired such measure of true greatness as this nation has achieved.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, in consonance with the joint resolution of the Congress approved December 26, 1941, do hereby proclaim Thursday the twenty-third day of November 1944 a day of national thanksgiving; and I call upon the people of the United States to observe it by bending every effort to hasten the day of final victory and by offering to God our devout gratitude for His goodness to us and to our fellow men."

J. J. D. McINNES, 041347, Major, Royal Engineers, Liaison Officer, Eastern Base Saction, for meritorious achievement in Morth Africa from 24 March to 24 October 1943. As British Licison Officer, Engineer Services, Eastern Base Section, with untiring energy and enthusiasm he aggressively assumed the varied responsibilities of coordinating the flow of supplies between the American and British forces, following through the details of emergency shipments of critical items to for shore tection! troops, and noting as limison officer for all engincer projects in the Eastern Pase Section involving cooperation with the British. In all his personal and official relationships, Major McInnas has continually displayed that, sound judgment and a sincere desire to further Allied cooperation in every respect.

DENNIS STEELET MUNFORD, 134902, Major, First Air Landing Light Regiment; Royal artillery, British Army, for maritorious achievement in action from 1 October to 31 December 1943 in Italy. Displaying great personal courage and leadership in reconsoltering and clearing mine fields while under intense enemy fire Major Munford, on many occasions traveled along heavily mined reads in order to arrive at an objective concurrently with leading Infantry elements, thereby miding the efficativeness of his battery in consolidating positions. His outstanding devotion to duty was an inspiration to his man and the Infantry troops which he supported.

With a complete knowledge of American equipment with which this Brigade was equipped, he was responsible for the maintenance, repair and recovery of all the tanks during heavy fighting in two compaigns. During the preliminary days of the crossing of the Sangro River in Italy, a large number of tanks became begged on both sides of the river, and in order to support the Infantry, it was essential that these tanks should be extricated. Major Formore obtained the necessary equipment and proceeded to the river and for three days worked on the tanks in daylight, in full view of the enemy, and was for the whole period under observed and accurate morter and shall fire. By his efforts he made available fifty tanks for support of the Eighth Indian Division for their attack on Mozzagrogna. By his devotion to duty and complete disregard for both his personal safety and comfort, Major Pogmore has been an inspiration to all who have worked with him. GEORGE PETER SMART, M.C., 56288, Major, Royal Artillery, British Army, for meritorious achievement in action during the Tunision Campaign from 19 - 26 November 1943. GARDY, 13027954, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters Battery, 189th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight on 8 November 1943 near Venafro, Italy. Staff Sergeant Gardy, pilot of a liaison airplane, was flying on a mission to locate and direct artillery fire on enemy installations, when he was fired upon by enemy antiaircraft guns. One of the shells struck his aircraft and exploded inside, wounding both Staff Sergeant Cardy and his observer. Receiving wounds in his right leg and arm which rendered them useless and without disclosing to the observer the fact that he was wounded, he flew his plane to the forward division artillery airfield and landed safely on the extremely muddy field. The calmiess and presence of mind displayed by Staff Sergeant Gardy in saving the life of his observer and himself are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces. Staff Sergeant Gardy was killed in action on 13 February 1944, when his unarmed plane was attacked and shot down by enemy aircraft. Next of kin: Mrs. Sarah Gardy (Mother), RFD No. 1, Sugar Loaf, Pennsylvania.

IV -- AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS

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By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, the Distinguished Flying Cross was awarded by the Theater Commander to the following named officer:

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JACK L. MARINELLI, 0372406, Captain, Cavalry, Headquarters, 71st Field Artillery Brigade, for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flights over enemy positions in Italy from 25 October 1943 to 3 February 1944. The successful completion of these missions frequently required Captain Marinelli to fly his unarmed light observation plane over heavily fortified enemy positions in the face of hostile ground fire and enemy fighter plane attack. Many night flights were made with improvised landing lights and at times with none at all. All take-offs and landings were made from small unimproved fields in dengerous mountainous terrain, and the ordinary hazards of his trips were often increased by severe weather conditions. By his outstanding record in combat missions flown and the vital information obtained, Captain Marinelli not only reflected great credit upon himself but has encouraged and established a standard of achievement for his associates. 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

Knowing that such powder is highly inflammable and that any moment the flames would spread, Private Garner stopped the spread of fire and saved badly needed ammunition at a vital supply depot. EMIL R. STEMSTROM, 19104324, Private First Class, *** Ordnance Ammunition Company, United States Army. For heroism at Morris, Algeria, on 12 October 1943. Thile supervising Arab workers unloading 75-mm ammunition from a truck one shell exploded, setting off several others. All but one of the Arabs ran to safety. One, apparently too frightened to move, remained on the truck. Private Stenstrom, at the risk of his life, climbed on the truck and succeeded in getting this man off and to safety. Immediately after this daring rescue the remaining ammunition exploded. Entered service from Selt Lake City, Utah.

ALFRED M. CARBONNEAU, 31108900, Technician Fifth Crade, *** Quartermaster Gas Supply Company, United States Army. For heroism on 15 December 1943 at Palermo, Sicily. Technician Carbonneau was in charge of a detail of about 25 prisoners of war working at a railroad ward where, in addition to railroad cars,

there were stored several thousand empty gasoline drums. A fire started among some of the drums and was quickly spread by gasoline on the ground and by fumes. While removing the lest of these drums, it exploded in his face, causing Technician Carbonneau to he budly burned. By his courageous action, this soldier averted a series of fires and explosions, thereby probably saving loss of life and great demage to Government property. SALVATORE DISCLAMANI, 32207264, Technician Fifth Grade, Operational Group A, *** Headquarters Commany Experimental (Provisional), United States Army. Technician Dischafuni was passing along the beach when he heard the one remaining member of the boat onew calling to him to help one of the men in the water who was in grave danger of drowning. Without regard for his personal safety, Technician FiSclafani plunged into the rough sea fully clothed and went to the assistance of his fellow coldier who lost consciousness just as help reached him. Battered by the rough sea and weighted down by the lime body of the soldier he rescued, Technician DiSclafoni fourth his way to shore. Entered service from Brooklyn, New York.

CHARLES D. MCKAIN, 13107735, Corporel, *** Engineer Petroleum Distribution Unit Operating Detachment, United States Army. For heroism on 25 July 1943, At Conde Smendou, Algeria. Corporal McKein, 'mowing that there was poisonous gas at the bottom of a 40-foot vertical mine shaft, against which his service gas most would not protect him, volunterily descended and attempted to rescue his platoon leader, Lieutemant William R. S. Jones, and a commade Staff Sergeant Hey Smith, who were overcome by the cas and were lying unconscious at the bottom of the shoft. With a rope tied about his chest, Corporal McKain went down and booked a winch line through Staff Sargeant Smith's belt, ofter which he was overcome by the gas but was bulled out and revived shortly ofterward. Entered service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

LUCIEI KATZENEERG, JR., OS36496, First Lieutenant, Company B, *** Fort Battalion, Transportation Comps, United States Army. For heroism on 23 Suptember 1945, at Pouissaville, Algeria. Men two members of a switching party were trapped in a strong undertow and were in grove danger, Lieutenest Estzenberg swan to their avaistance. With considerable difficulty, he brought both exhausted men to chare. His heroism probably saved the lives of two persons. Entered service from Philadelphia, Parasylvania.

Upon hearing a muffled explosion and seeing flames shooting from a residence, Sergeant Gorse broke open the door with the butt of his rifle, and fourd a woman end seven children overcome by smoke and surrounded by flames. He entered the flaming building several times, heedless of his own safety, fully aware that the fierceness of the fire was due to quantities of sun-nowder stored therein. Through Sergeant Gorse's efforts all persons were removed and the lives of all but three of the children were seved. His courage and heroism in the presence of co-builderent people reflect the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New Cumberland, Pennsylvania.

III -- AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL



ANTHONY T. PORTANTE, 33246671, Corporal, *** Engineer Petroleum Distribution Unit Operating Detachment, United States Army. For heroism on 25 July 1943 ret Conde Smendou, Algeria. Corporal Portante, knowing that there was poisocous chips at the bottom of a 40-foot vertical mine shaft, voluntarily went down and attempted to rescue his plateon leader, Lieutenant William R. S. Jones, and his commade Staff Sergeant Roy Smith, who had been overcome by the gas and were lying unconscious at the bottom of the shaft. With a rope tied about his chest, and wearing an imprevised exygen face mask, he went down and tied ropes around both of the victims, and was himself pulled safely out. During his movements at the bottom of the shaft, his face mask was partially disarranged, and when he was lifted out he had almost lost consciousness. Is a result of his action the bodies of Lieutenant Jones and Staff Sergeant Smith were both taken from the shaft, although efforts to revive them upon their withdrawal failed. Captain Griswold as Civil Defense Officer of the City of Naples under Allied Military Government made a personal reconnaissance of a fire which was then raging in a grotte at that location used by the Chemical Warfare Service, United States (rmy, as a place for storage of munitions. Military and civilian firemen were gathering to combat the blaze but Captain Griswold ordered them to a place of safety after a preliminary inspection of the grotte. While a more thorough inspection of the grotte was being made by him without regard for his safety, a severe explosion occurred and he was killed. By the prompt, efficient, and courageous action of this officer the lives of many firemen present were saved. Hext of kin: Mrs. Lucille H. Griswold (wife), 6029 Hereford Drive, East Los Angeles, California.

II -- AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL

By direction of the President, the Soldier's Medal was awarded by the War Donartment to the following named personnel:

FREDERICK J. SCHAFFER, 35327745, Private, Battery D, *** Coast Artillery Battalion (Antiaircraft) (Automatic Weapons), United States Army. For heroism on 14 December 1943, at Palermo, Sicily. Sparks from a passing locomotive set fire to 19 interlaced camouflage nets, which formed a canopy over the bettery motor pool area. The fire was soon out of control and loss of the 13 vehicles parked therein seemed imminent. In an effort to remove some of the vehicles, a section of the burning nets foll on one of the trucks, completely enveloping it. This truck was blazing furiously and was in great danger of exploding a say moment. Private Schaffer ran to this truck and after struggling with the flaming net, managed to enter the truck and drive it into the sea. In doing this, the other nets were pulled with him and the fire extinguished. By his fearless conduct and quick action, he undoubtedly prevented destruction of 18 Government vehicles and mossible in jury to enlisted personnel in the vicinity. ALEXANDER A. CAPPELLA, 6906501, Technician Fifth Grade, Battery F, *** Coast Artillery (Antiaircraft), United States Army. For heroism on 2 January 1944. A mountainous wave broke over the north jettes in Palermo harbor just before daybreak, sweeping a kitchen but and equipment and two members of a 40mm gun section into an exceptionally rough sea. Technician Cappella, awakened by the cries for help, rushed out of his but and, at the risk of his life, plunged into the turbulent water.

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Seeing one of the victims already being rescued he struck for the other about 25 yards from the jettee. The stormy condition of the harbor plus the fact that the mun could not swim made his rescue a most difficult and dangerous task. He was finally brought to a ladder on the jettee and hauled out. This display of courage and quick action by Technician Cappella was responsible for saving a soldier from drowning. Entered service from Buffalo, New York.

CHARLES E. GOSS, 8149802, Technician Fifth Grade, Battery F, *** Coast Artillery (Antiaircraft), United States Army. For heroism on 2 January 1944. A mountainous wave broke over the north jettee in Palermo herbor just before daybreak, sweeping a kitchen hut and equipment and two members of a 40mm gun section into an exceptionally rough sea. Technician Goss, awakened by the cries for help, dashed out of his hut and, at the risk of his life, plunged into the turbulent water. About 25 yards from the jettee, he reached one of the men who was panic stricken and not able to swim. Despite the unusual violence of the sea, and in a state of virtual exhaustion, Technician Coss brought the victim to a ladder on the jettee where he was hauled up by a rope. The man would have undoubtedly drowned were it not for the bravery and complete disregard for personal safety on the part of Technician Goss. Entered service from Providence, Rhode Island.

ANTHOMY J. MARGURIET, 13060890, Technician Fourth Grade, Headquarters Company, Island Base Section, United States Army. For heroism at Siracusa, Sicily, on 7 December 1943. In the small galley of a railroad car a defective gasoline burning heating unit burst into flame, igniting gasoline flowing over the floor and enveloping the small kitchen in smoke and flame. There was imminent denger that the fire would reach the Diesel fuel tanks and cause an explosion. Technician Marguriet, at the risk of his life, entered the galley, covered the burning unit with blankets, and threw it from the car. In so doing, he saved the life of a railroad employee who was trapped in the forward operating cab and prevented further spread of the fire. Entered service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

CLARENCE V. 

General Grane planned brilliantly and coordinated all artillery operations in support of the *** Corps in the Sicilian Campaign and in support of the *** Corps in the Italian Campaign. His skillful integration of the many and divorse artillery elements under his direction and the employment of their fires under the highly organized system of control which he exercised brought remarkably successful results. By his adopt use of artillary fires, the energy often was surprised and demoralized, repeated counterattacks were dissipated, hostile forces were routed, and the advance of our orn troops was assured. Throughout every phase of operations General Grone went about tirelessly, synchronizing the activities of his write with that of the other elements of the command, and succeeded in constantly improving their dispositions. In the Italian Compaign, through the intelligent application and crushing weight of his artillery fires, the capture of the key town of Avallino was made possible. The rapid advance to and the first crossing of the Voltumo River, a major obstacle which followed, were attributable directly to the effectiveness of the ertillery fir s which supported and sustained the action throughout. When-two members of a swimming party cried for help as they were drawn out to sea by a strong undertow, Sergeant Powell, with disregard for personal danger, swam through the treacherous water to their assistance. He sustained them for several minutes, but they finally slipped from his grasp and went under the sea. Becoming so exhausted by his great exertion, he barely succeeded in reaching the shore. His brave action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

JAMES McLEAN, 183494, Captain, Royal Army Medical Corps, British Army, for heroism on 22 June 1943, on the island of Pantelleria. When an American soldier had been blown over a cliff by a bomb explosion and was lying severely wounded directly under a loosened over-hanging orag, Captain McLean courageously and unhesitatingly made his way to the injured man, efficiently rendered medical aid and assisted in removing him to a place of sofety. These acts were performed with the full knowledge that the mass of rocks might slide at any moment and actually did fall soon after the rescue. The heroism displayed by Captain McLean reflects the highest credit upon himself and the military service.
