1. Reference your DF/3.36/CA dated 22 March 45.
2. Paras 1 to 5 have been dealt with in this HQ letter RVIII/200A/245 dated 5 Apr 45, addressed to all PC's in this Region copy to you. Para 6 has also been dealt with.
3. With regard to para 7, and further to this HQ letter RVIII/200A/226 dated 2 Apr 45. A very thorough investigation has been made as to the extent to which fascist text books are in use in the schools in TOSCANA Region. It is difficult to understand the source of the information as it would appear that the question was only discussed with PC, GROSSETO who understood during his conversation with Lt-Col. WHITE that old fascist books were still in use in PISTOLA Province. PC, PISTOLA states however that he has been unable to find anyone who gave Lt-Col. WHITE such information.
4. As a result of the investigation it is difficult to reconcile the actual situation with the remarks contained in the AREZZO section of Lt-Col. WHITE's reports as follows:-

" Schools are still being taught from old fascist books. (Other Provinces made the same comment)"

The actual situation is that whilst old books are in use in a few schools in certain of the Provinces this is only due to non delivery of the new series. In all cases however such old books have been "epurated" in accordance with the instructions of the Sub-Commission.

Dear Col Kirkwood,

May I thank you for the arrangements which were made for my comfort during my recent tour. They were excellent. I enjoyed the tour and I hope that it was as useful to Provincial Commissioners as it was to this HQ and to the Italian Govt.

Brig. Upjohn has asked me to inform you apropos the retention of the Provveditore in Grosseto that, in another region in which a notorious fascist was retained because of his ability, a protest demonstration was staged which resulted in loss of life. The man in question had to be removed which gave the demonstrators every justification for concluding that they had achieved their end. Brig. Upjohn feels therefore that unless you see grounds for his retention the Provveditore in question should, unless he can immediately be brought before a commission, be suspended at once. The decision is left in your hands.

- 1 Enclosed for your information is a copy of Lt Col WHITE's report on his recent tour in Toscana.
- 2 As a coincidence the enclosed copy of a letter from the Assistant High Commissioner was received in this Office to-day for censorship before transmission and is forwarded (with sufficient copies for distribution - Toscana 7, 5 Army 5) for such action as you think desirable. It not only confirms Lt Col WHITE's view that some delegates have been acting irregularly in their assignments but shows that the Italian Government does not approve of these irregularities.
- 3 In ascertaining the proper action would appear to be for the delegates to investigate; for the EC to take action under Art 36 of DL 159, for the commission mentioned in Art 30 to adjudicate, and that Art 3 should only be used where there is some real risk of the assets being done away with; the power referred to being one to conserve property "in jeopardy". A directive on this matter will be issued shortly.
- 4 It is the western provinces in which the question has been mentioned (Pistoia, Lucca, Livorno and Grosseto in particular) but it is likely that the irregularity may in fact exist elsewhere.
- 5 With regard to arrests under part I of DL 159 I think you will agree that arrests should only be made either if the charge is serious with a death or a long sentence as a possible result or there is some real danger of the accused absconding.
- 6 No action is being taken at this HQ with regard to EC Aresso's comment re Lt Col COUSINS as that is a matter for the EC.
- 7 Can you please report as to the extent to which fascist books are in use in schools in various provinces.

I am informed that following the request of Capt. Pietro MORI, Provincial Delegate of the High Commissioner for Epuration, the President of the Tribunale of Lucca has ordered the sequestration of all the property owned by DE MICHELI Giuseppe, in pursuance of Art. 35 of LL 159 of 27 July 44. Avv. Orrado CIOMFI of Viareggio was appointed as trustee.

I wish to call your attention to the gravity of this act which constitutes evidently a violation of Art. 35 of the law of 27 Jul 44.

In fact, since the Special Section of the Provincial Commission of Direct Imposts has not yet been formed in Lucca, the President of the Tribunale may order the sequestration of the property belonging to those persons referred to in Art 36 only by request of the High Commissioner or of the Finance Department.

There exists no provision of law nor any interpretative regulation conferring to the Provincial Delegates of the Assistant High Commissioner for Epuration the power to apply sanctions of an economic nature. From the entire text of the law it is clearly seen, on the contrary, that the initiative for the investigations and for the subsequent requests for the forfeiture to the State of the profits derived from the regime, rests, as already said, exclusively with the Assistant High Commissioner or with the Intendente of Finance after the State Advocate has been consulted. When the Commissions are formed the power to order the sequestration is automatically given also to the President of such Commissions.

Therefore, since the sequestration effect against DE MICHELI has been ordered upon the request made by a person who, like the Provincial Delegate for Epuration, has not the legal authority to make it, the measure must be considered as annulled, since it was issued in violation of the regulations contained in Art.

Assistant High Commissioner for Spuration-LUCCA

I am informed that following the request of Capt. Pietro MORI, Provincial Delegate of the High Commissioner for Spuration, the President of the Tribunal of Lucca has ordered the sequestration of all the property owned by LE MICHELI Giuseppe, in pursuance of Art. 35 of L.L. 159 of 27 July 44. Art. 477. Corrado CIMPI of Via-reggio was appointed as trustee.

I wish to call your attention to the gravity of this act which constitutes evidently a violation of Art. 35 of the law of 27 Jul 44.

In fact, since the Special Section of the Provincial Commission of Direct Imposts has not yet been formed in Lucca, the President of the Tribunal may order the sequestration of the property belonging to those persons referred to in Art 26 only by request of the High Commissioner or of the Finance Department.

There exists no provision of law nor any interpretive regulation conferring to the Provincial Delegate of the Assistant High Commissioner for Spuration the power to apply sanctions of an economic nature. From the entire text of the law it is clearly seen, on the contrary, that the initiative for the investigations and for the subsequent requests for the forfeiture to the State of the profits derived from the regime, rests, as already said, exclusively with the Assistant High Commissioner or with the Intendente of Finance after the State Avvocatura has been consulted. When the Commissions are formed the power to order the sequestration is automatically given also to the President of such Commissions.

Therefore, since the sequestration effect against LE MICHELI has been ordered upon the request made by a person who, like the Provincial Delegate for Spuration, has not the legal authority to make it, the measure must be considered as annulled, since it was issued in violation of the regulations contained in Art. 35 of the above mentioned law, and as such may be repealed by the President of the Tribunal upon a request made by your Incassenza.

You are, therefore, asked to give the law a correct interpretation. **4033**  
This is to be done diligently, particularly to clarify to the Provincial Delegate for Spuration the limit of his powers so that regrettable interference among the various bodies having the noble aim of applying the sanctions against fascism may be avoided in the future, and also to obtain from the President of the Tribunal the respect of the sequestration order. After this is done, you will kindly begin investigations on the property of LE MICHELI Giuseppe to ascertain whether it constitutes profits derived from the regime. For these investigations you will avail yourself of the tributary police or of the judicial police.

After you have completed the investigations and requested the opinion of the State Avvocatura, you will kindly inform me of your decisions before you forward the relative papers to the President of the Tribunal.

VITERBO - 10 Mar

The Provincial Commissioner reported that all suspenses had already been judged and that everything is proceeding smoothly between the Allies and Italian officials, with which statement the Provincial Delegate agreed. All appointments of delegates and to commissions had been made.

SIENA - 11 Mar

Mai. MANZINI (A/Prov. Comm. & Mai. DEVISSA (PLD))  
An Education Commission was still in existence and in addition, on the Italian side, there was an Italian advisory commission. Instructions were given for both to cease functioning. No provision had been made for funds and it was arranged for advances to be made. There were a large number of suspenses - 166 - and instructions were given that these should be dealt with with priority. All appointments of delegates and to Commissions had been made.

AREZZO - 12 Mar

Lt. Col. QUINN-SMITH.  
The delegates had been appointed but there had been delay because of the death of the first appointed and a new delegate. Work has now started. The Commission had not yet been appointed and names were obtained. Apart from this, there were no difficulties and the delegates had got to work. The Commissions and Delegates were completed. An Education Commission had existed but was now no longer functioning. The Provincial Commissioner desired an authority for the transfer of schools and also precise instructions from the Ministry of the Interior authorising the provisions of funds for operation and laying down the procedure to be followed in connection therewith. He also asked that it might be confirmed that the Italian Railway and Education Sub-Commissions which were acting in FLORENCE were regularly appointed as he had received no official information on that point.

He considered that it was desirable that there should be a power to separate private concerns. There were important concerns in FLORENCE from the management of which he considered it desirable that fascists should be removed.

Wing/Commander DICKIS required whether it would be possible for arrangements to be made for him to go to AVIGNON.

MISSISSIPPI - 14 Mar.

In the Education Sub-Commission had been functioning. The question is whether the PC was right in laying upon the Prefect the onus of dismissing state employees and related. There had been a large number of suggestions for alleged improper enrichment. conditions and he decided to recover from the upper the list of suspended  
persons which had already been sent to them and to go through the list again  
with a view to cancelling suspensions of persons whose cases did not fulfill  
the conditions. It was finally decided, however, merely to remove the names  
of persons who perhaps would not have been suspended from the list to be  
published and not to cancel their suspension but to bring them speedily before  
the Commission so as to avoid any chance of a re-instatement being shortly  
followed by dismissal.

The Delegate had not only been active in requisitioning but also had  
ordered a large number of arrests for fascist crimes. Such arrests appeared  
to be ordered irrespective of whether the accused was likely to abscond.  
Prisons were being unnecessarily crowded and persons were being held for  
considerable periods awaiting trial. In no case had charges yet been  
formulated. From AC's point of view, because of the insufficiency of  
prison accommodation, it is desirable to require that arrests should not  
be made unless there is a real probability of the accused absconding and

secondly, they should not, except for particularly serious cases (e.g. involving a possible sentence to death), be made until the charges were ready. It appeared possible that the Delegate was unduly influenced by the CIA.

The PC had received information, which he had as yet been unable to corroborate, that the Delegate had suggested sequestration of the property of a certain alleged fascist and that within a few days thereafter, the same had been approached by a third party, suggesting that prevention of the sequestration could be arranged. The PC had been unable to obtain any corroboration because the threatened person would not speak but his information indicated that the UCCIA Delegate had been threatening persons resident in FISDIA Province with sequestration and he contemplated the possibility that reciprocal targets were being made to alleged fascists in UCCIA.

Lt. Col. WALTERS.

FISA - 15 Mar

The PC said that there was only one Delegate, but Dr. Ambrugi gave him the names of the other two Delegates who had been appointed and they, in fact, arrived at the conference almost immediately thereafter. One of them was the Medico Provinciale who had been appointed to that post by the PC and was, therefore, quite acceptable.

An Education Exoneration Commission had been active but was not now functioning. There had been a number of sequestrations and a number of arrests. Delegates and commissions were functioning and the work was practically concluded. No difficulties existed.

A reference was made to the dismissal of professors under the machinery of 7 M 76. It was considered by the delegates that certain professors who should have been dismissed had not been and that the dismissal of other professors which had been made were quite unjustified on grounds of fascism. Instructions were given that the decisions made must stand, the Hecctorial elections which were to take place on Saturday, 17 Mar 77 would proceed on the basis of the dismissals so ordered but the cases of all persons who had been dismissed should be given priority before the appropriate commission and if cleared they should be re-instated. The Delegates would be entitled to have the cases of any undiminished fascist professors investigated.

LIVERO - 15 Mar

75 persons were under arrest for alleged fascist crimes. Most of these had been arrested in the last few days and the PC was anxious in case this was merely the beginning of a larger number. As far as he knew the arrests were made merely because the persons were fascists. No charges had been preferred. As prisons were over-crowded, he could not take more and strongly objected to the arrests. From the point of view of the medical and he wanted

An Education Transition Commission had been set up but was not now functioning. There had been a number of acquiescences and a number of arrests. Delegates and commissions were functioning and the work was practically concluded. No difficulties existed.

A reference was made to the dismissal of professors under the authority of 2 M 76. It was considered by the delegates that certain professors who should have been dismissed had not been and that the dismissals of other professors which had been made were quite unjustified on grounds of fascism. Instructions were given that the decisions made must stand, the electoral elections which were to take place on Saturday, 17 Mar 47 would proceed on the basis of the dismissals so ordered but the cases of all persons who had been dismissed should be given priority before the appropriate commission and if cleared they should be re-instated. The delegates would be entitled to have the cases of any undismissed fascist professors investigated.

LIVORNO - 15 Mar

75 persons were under arrest for alleged fascist crimes. Most of these had been arrested in the last few days and the P.C. was anxious in case this was merely the beginning of a larger number. As far as he knew the arrests were made solely because the persons were fascists. No charges had been preferred. As prisons were over-crowded, he could not take more and strongly objected to the arrests. From the point of view of prison conditions these arrests were quite intractable and he wanted them stopped. He claimed that everything had been done and that emigration, so far as the Province was concerned, was practically completed. An Education Commission which had been active, was suspended. In LIVORNO a certain number of acquiescences had taken place.

GRONERO - 16 Mar

There had been some arrests for fascist crimes but he had ordered the release of all those except those in which the charges seemed to be more serious. Some of the cases were 20 years old. Persons had recently been sentenced to 10 and 5 years imprisonment for political murders committed 20 years ago, and to 5 and 9 years for extortion, also committed many years ago. Other persons had been sentenced for forcing persons to drink caustic oil and sentenced in one such case totalled about 67 years. It was expected that the cases of all persons not under arrest would be completed by May.

There were many cases of expropriation. These had been originated by the Incendario di Firenze. An information from the INL. Action was under the ordinary civil code and the Commission referred to in Art. 30 of UL 159 had not yet been set up.

The Regional Education Officer had objected to the removal of the Provveditori agli Studi who was a notorious Fascist on the grounds of indisposability. The P.C. had ordered his retention and the delegates objected.

I informed the P.C. that the policy with regard to such questions was the removal would only be refused in the interest of the Allied war effort and not if the only interests affected were Italian. In the order had already been made. It would stand, and the best course was for him to see that the Provveditori were brought before the separation commission at the earliest possible moment.

GENUALLY

At two provinces (FLORENCE and UOCCA) at which the arrangements for the care of the two Italian officials was delegated to the Prefect the latter failed to make reasonable or any arrangements for meals. There is no suggestion that any meal should have been provided but arrangements should have been made as to where they should feed and to ensure that the charge was reasonable. Instead they were left as strangers to find their own meals. At FLORENCE they were charged 225 lire each for meals; at UOCCA they were asked 950 each for a meal and when they protested and asked for the bill to be put in writing they were informed that a mistake had been made and that the charge was 150 each. Italian officials on tour cannot be expected to pay such prices.

RIETI

MAJ CRIMEN (A)

No AME Expiration Commission existed. The Delegate expressed himself as well satisfied with the situation in this province, everything was in order, he had no questions or complaints.

The High Commissioner's representative made a special mention of satisfaction.

MONDAY 13 Feb 45

TREVI

LT COL FLICKER (B)

The Education Expiration Commission was still acting in an advisory capacity. Suspensions had recently been made. The position was explained and it was arranged that suspenses should receive priority of hearing. The suspensions would be regularised by the Delegate and the Prefect.

MONDAY 13 Feb 45

FERUGIA

CAPT FALK (B)

The PC did not attend but left the conference to his Legal officer. An Education Commission had existed but had been abolished, but apparently still acted in some sort of advisory capacity. The 900 Suspenses would receive priority of hearing. There was a difficulty over pay. The Prefect had ordered that all persons suspended should be paid under Art 22 whereas over 100 such persons were avventisti and it was thought that they were not entitled to be paid and the Provincial Commissioner desired to know what was correct.

The Prefect asked that a Vice Prefetto Isottoro Consigliere and a Segretario might be sent to Ferugia; also a Career Questore.

The general attitude with regard to defascising was that Ferugia had made a very good job of it. There was no appreciation of the fact that it had been excessive or that it was undesirable that services should be disorganised.

No comments. The High Commissioner's Representative made a special mention of his satisfaction.

Everything seems to be under control and working well.

TUESDAY 14 Feb 45

FESARO

Maj KOORMAN, WALD

Lt Col Elves was sick and I did not see him.

In both these Provinces Education Advisory Commissions exist and instructions were given for their disbandment. No other problems appeared to have arisen except that PESARO complained that Guglielmo Vincenzo was still under arrest at the request of the Italian Govt and that instructions for his disposal had not been received. He had been Italian Consul at San Marino and if released would probably escape to neutral territory and it be extremely difficult to re-appearand him.

Maj Koorman was not clear as to whether DILL 150 had in fact been extended to his territory and if so, on what date. If it had not been extended he desired to have GO 35 put into operation.

ASCOLI

Lt Col MUTTER (B)

Appointments to the Commission have not yet been completed but all necessary names have been submitted and the Commission will be completed shortly.

The Director of the Consorzio, one RIGHI, had been a very high fascist official and the head of the Federale. It was agreed that his retention from some angles was somewhat undesirable but he was said to be extremely efficient. The Delegate wanted him removed. The PC was most definitely averse to this being done. He was instructed that RIGHI should be suspended but that he might, if a breakdown of supplies was really to be feared, object, but that only the most exceptional circumstances would justify an exception. I gathered that RIGHI would be removed but there was certainly great reluctance to part with him.

The Delegate spoke otherwise with satisfaction of the position.

Note. The Head of the Federale was so senior a position that it is one of those who loses his franchise. I think he should certainly go.

TERAMO

Maj STEVENS (B)

Maj Stevens was not present at the interview which was attended by Capt BELLAMY, (B). There had been an incident the previous night and the Italian flag had been erected at the Provinciale and removed under Maj STEVEN's orders. The names to complete the Commission were obtained. No points were raised.

PERNO

Attention was drawn to a picture by E.P. Michetti which was stated to be of particular value and which was insecurely stored and guarded.

THURSDAY 15 Feb 45

PESCARA

No one was present. The Delegate had not been warned. The offices were closed.

CHIETI

Maj MAUNDERS (B)

I discussed with Maj MAUNDERS both the conditions at PESCARA and CHIETI. The Delegate had no particular points to raise with the exception of the non-removal of Dr. Galeazzi whose suspension had been ordered by the Ministry of Agriculture a long ago as last November and was still in office and of Carota whose removal had been ordered by the Ministry of the Interior. The Delegate stated that the Prefect had in both instances informed him that orders had been received from AMG that these persons should not be removed. Maj MAUNDERS denied that any such instructions had been given and would take the matter up with the Prefect. It was pointed out that though these orders had been given last November the PC had confined himself to denying that AMG had issued any order, he had taken no step to see where the misunderstanding

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PERCY HQ

No local AMG Coman existed. The Delegate had no queries, everything appeared to be under control and proceeding satisfactorily except that the dismissal of a Provveditore agli Studi is alleged to have been stopped by the Ed S/C. The PC will investigate, he was informed that the removal should be carried out.
