held on 8-9 March 1945.

The Executive Commissioner presided.

ACTION

1. Acting President's Opening Address.

The Right Hon. Mr. Harold Macmillan opened the meeting by welcoming all those present and expressed his regret at the absence of the Chief Commissioner owing to illness.

He said that the New Deal for Italy was not a new policy but merely a development of the policy which had been followed since the moment the Armistice was signed. Briefly this policy was to foster the development of Italian responsibility until the Italian Government was able fully to take over the government of the country itself. Recent developments were merely a logical conclusion to the policy adopted and followed since those early days.

Mr. Macmillan said that it was clear to him that there would be no possible distinction between the work of AID and ICI. There were differences in their functions but their work must be treated as a whole in order to make for effective planning etc. In order to obtain continuity from the first impact of AID until the final taking over of the territory by the Italian Government. The functions of AID were three-fold. Firstly, to take from the military the burden of civil administration; secondly, to assist so far as possible in the rehabilitation of the country and the suffering of its civilian population; and thirdly, to prepare the ground for the transfer of that territory to the Italian Government and the teaching of the Italians to take over this work themselves. There were very heavy tasks and he had every sympathy with those in the regions who had to undertake them.

The Acting President then expressed his appreciation to those who had been working for the past months in Italian Government territory. There had been a difficult and delicate task, handling over the Government to the Italians and at the same time well knowing that they could do the job much better themselves.

He then referred to those officers who had had the rather unpleasant task of passing the area into the Southern Regions. They had

merely a development of the policy which had been followed since the moment the armistice was signed. Briefly this policy was to foster the development of Italian responsibility until the Italian Government was able fully to take over the government of the country itself. Recent developments were merely a logical conclusion to the policy adopted and followed since those early days.

There were very heavy tasks and he had every sympathy with those in the Regions who had to undertake them.

The Acting President then expressed his appreciation to those who had been working for the past months in Italian Government territory. Their work had been a difficult and delicate task, handing over the government to the Italians and at the same time well knowing that they could do the job much better themselves.

He then referred to those officers who had had the rather tiresome task of waiting to go into the Northern Regions. They had been engaged either in planning or in attempting to bring them already in operation. This delay in going forward was regretted and was entirely due to operations.

Mr. Marshall went on to say that it was fashionable to believe that there was going to be a great deal of political trouble and even revolution in the North. However, he was of the opinion that we should find a great deal of investigating and beneficial aspects of Italian life in that territory and that the people could be more active and powerful than any we had yet come across in Italy.

He stressed the importance of the great need for coordination between Regions, between Regions and HQ, and between Regions and Sub-Commissions. He was confident that the question was really of studying would be successfully overcome and we could have confidence in the knowledge that we have so many officers going into the Northern Regions with experience in dealing with similar problems. Moreover, it was more than likely that the conditions of a stable government would not necessarily come about and that the destruction of the Italian

production potential would not be as serious as hitherto. He said that he thought that we should find better conditions than was at one time thought possible.

2. Withdrawal of officers from Italian Government Territory.

Brigadier M.S. Dumb, Executive Commissioner, said that the Chief Commissioner had asked him to express his sincere regrets at being unable to attend the meeting and to extend to those present his gratitude for the abundant help and assistance given to him during the nine months he had been the Chief Commissioner. He also wished to extend a welcome to those who were present at a Regional Commissioners' Conference for the first time.

The Executive Commissioner then turned to the problem of the withdrawal of AC officers from Italian Government Territory which was in implementation of the Directive recently received from the Combined Chiefs of Staff. He said that there were two points which the Chief Commissioner wished to emphasize. One was that if we were to carry out the policy of the Directive, it should be implemented to the maximum, and particularly the withdrawal of officers. Orders had therefore been issued that, subject to the approval of AFHQ, the withdrawal of officers would be carried out by 1 April to the maximum possible number. Unfortunately a cable had just been received from AFHQ saying that no withdrawal was to take place until the Staff Sections at AFHQ had considered the effect of the withdrawal on the military services.

The Executive Commissioner then went on to refer to a Directive on the subject issued that day by HQ A.C. The Chief Commissioner wished it to be stressed that the total withdrawal of officers from Italian Government Territory was a policy which he intended to fulfill so far as AFHQ would allow.

Executive Commissioner next referred to that part of the Directive which related to the consultation by AC officers with Italian authorities. He said that such consultation would be restricted to discussions at a high level and Heads of Sections and Sub-Sections should strictly adhere to this policy. Contact with the Italian Government should be preserved but only at the highest level.

Referring to the question of the distribution of AC officers, the Executive Commissioner said that he would only deal with this matter briefly as the Establishment Section would go into it in detail later. He said that the distribution of officers had been studied at great length, that emphasis had been given to the number required for Northern Regions not yet occupied, second priority being given to the Regions now under AF. It was necessary also to find over 200 officers

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He stated that the policy for the North would be for a close follow-up of the army headquarters by Provincial teams. It had been accepted by everyone concerned that the principle of a close and rapid follow-up of the army ARs by provincial teams was the most efficient form of effecting the initial act of military government. A great deal of planning had been done for AR and AR Italy and, as had already been pointed out by the Acting President, it was probable that we should find circumstances very different from those we had envisaged, which brought out the necessity for elasticity in our planning.

He said that a forward static HQ of Allied Commission was not contemplated. He stressed the importance of coordination between Northern Regions themselves and between the Regions and HQ A.C. who must be kept fully informed. All Sub-Commissioner officers going to Regions would come under Regional control and Heads of Sub-Commissioners should remember this when sending officers forward.

Finally, the Executive Commissioner said that the policy of giving priority to the military problem might not be as important, was to give priority to the civil needs. In his view, if military operations had to be undertaken, the civil requirements could of necessity have to take second priority.

3. Statement on Political Situation

Mr. H. Stephenson said that the British Prime Minister in his speech of 18 January 1945 foreshadowed an unhappy state of affairs when - probably at a time when the Northern Belgians would be stripped bare of food by the retreating Germans - those Germans would be thrown upon the "English" shoulders of the British Government in all the consequences which could not be so neatly foreseen and certainly not measured.

The experience of 1945 showed that the existence of organized groups of politically conscious parties was a factor with which to reckon seriously. He suggested that during the last year forces had been coordinated in the North of Italy which effected liberation and present a problem of Government from any which the Allied Commission had handled in the past in connection with partisans.

Intelligence reports from the North show that the various Committees of National Liberation and the military commands operating under the orders of the Committees - I believe a good deal about the art of government in the year-long struggle against the Fascist and the Germans. In every district "liberal" governments have been set up and the various portfolios have been distributed amongst the leaders of the different parties. In each case the Committee represents the six parties which, up till last December, were represented in the Government in 1942. In none of the Committees however has a single party was not represented and in others the Republican party forms a part of the Committee. On the whole it seemed that the idea of having there was a remarkable degree of unity of purpose in the Committees and party differences had been swept in the common desire to ensure the Germans from Italy and punish their Fascist collaboration. Some Committees were assisted in their operations by the Allied authorities and the giving of such assistance had necessarily implied recognition of the value of these operations. Arrangements had been made between the Supreme Allied Commander and the CMLI defining the areas in which the Allied military authorities were prepared to recognize the Committees.

Under these arrangements when the areas which were from territory occupied by them the CMLI would endeavour to maintain law and order and to continue the safeguarding of the economic resources of the country until such time as Allied military government was established. Immediately upon the establishment of Allied military government, the

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Under these arrangements when the enemy withdrew from territory occupied by them the Allied would endeavour to maintain law and order and to continue the safeguarding of the economic resources of the country until such time as Allied military operations were completed. Immediately upon the establishment of Allied military governments, the Allied would recognize Allied military government and would hand over to that Government all authority and powers of local government and administration previously assumed. As the enemy withdrew all components of the General Command of the Volontiers of Liberty in liberated territory would come under the direct control of the Government-in-Italy Army Group, acting under the authority of the Supreme Allied Commander and would obey any order issued by him or by Allied military Government issued on his behalf, including orders to disarm and surrender their arms when required to do so.

The attitude of the Allied military authorities was therefore made quite clear. But there were other considerations which should be borne in mind when we came to implement the policy indicated in the above arrangements. It was in the interest of the Allies that there should be a stable Government in Italy and it was our policy to strengthen the legitimate Italian Government in every way possible and to prevent developments which would result in political divisions throughout the country. The Italian Government in 1943, which was our policy to support, must have the means and power of the Government of

Liberation in the North, or at any rate their influence there was subject to fluctuation. To begin with, the traditional scorn of the North Italian for the Southerner. There was the feeling that the population in the North had contributed more generously to the defeat of the Germans than the South had been able to do and had suffered far more heavily at their hands. There was criticism of the slow progress made by the German Government in the reconstruction of the country, in the solution of the pressing economic problems of food supply and inflation and above all in the punishment of former fascists. The Italian Government was well aware of this antipathy and in an agreement signed at the time the arrangements previously mentioned were made, they agreed further that the Supreme Allied Commander in recognizing the CMLE as their representatives in the struggle in the North, they have surrounded by this agreement in creating a certain measure of recognition of their own legitimacy by the Committees in the North but the possibility cannot be overlooked that the Committees of liberation or the component political parties would not abide by this agreement if circumstances seemed favourable for a political upheaval, which would either bring the Committees out as the Government of Italy or would prevent from the Government in Rome a measure of autonomy which might be in effect complete independence from Rome. The Italian Government was therefore anxious to establish as much contact as possible with the Committees in the North in order to be able to explain to them what was being accomplished in liberated Italy and what the Government proposed to do in the North when the Germans have been driven out. The Allied Governments were generally in favour of the establishment of such contacts and hoped that after liberation the Rome Government would be able to absorb representatives from the North and thereby become representatives and therefore stronger.

The problem facing the Allied Commission therefore was as follows: we must endeavour on the liberation of the North to reconcile the needs of Military Government with the aspirations of the political leaders of the Committees of liberation to self-government. At the same time, we must bolster the authority of the Italian Government in Rome in order that it may be able to administer the Northern territories once Allied Military Government was withdrawn. The solution of this problem might well be found to lie in the absorption of a very early date of members of the local Committees of National Liberation into the civil administration operating under Allied Military Government. If regional Commanders arrived in the North and bluntly informed the Committees of National Liberation that their task was accomplished and that they might now disappear and if, after that, Prefects, Sindaci and other administrative officers were imported from the South or even from other localities in the North, the disappointment, the antagonism even, of the Committees of liberation would be great. The danger of setting up local administrations composed of Italians who would not be acceptable

Mr. Hopkinson realized that the lack of precise information about personalities in the North due to the clandestine nature of their activities in recent months would make it difficult for Regional Commissioners to assess the relative claims of members of the Committee of Liberation to participate in local government. But in order in some measure to offset this disability, he hoped to be able to compile in the next few weeks a sort of "who's who" which might prove useful to Regional Commissioners in the task of selection.

In a discussion which followed Brigadier Upton, VP Civil Affairs Section, said a letter had been received from the Prime Minister which suggested an opposite view to the account given by Mr. Hopkinson. The letter suggested that certain named Prefects be put forward for appointment in the North. He thought this was a dangerous policy.

Col. Poletti, R.C. LAMIO-JERBA Region, considered that men coming up to fill appointments in the North would cause resentment and trouble in the local administrations. AMG must be absolutely free to decide appointments on the spot. Brig. Dunlop, R.C. SOUTHERN Region, said he would wanted to appoint career men as Prefects. The CM should be asked for names.

The Executive Commissioner said that in making the initial appointments in AGF territory all officers should be bound by the policy enunciated by Mr. Hopkinson: the decision of the Italian Government to send to the North men of administrative experience and known to the Government, was natural and we could not accept fall back on some of the men so selected. But we could not accept the principle of naming the Prefects before liberation. He also emphasized the necessity of any AM's consulting Provincial and Regional Commissioners when making appointments in local government.

4. Personnel and Transport.

Personnel.

The Deputy Executive Commissioner, Col. Piske, referred to memorandum, 7002/98/EC of 7 March, which was issued to the meeting. We now had approximately 900 British and 700 American officers which included 200 British officers for ALGERIA. It was recently decided that Allied Commission would furnish 168 American officers for the same purpose. As a result American officers had been reduced to 532. Taking the foregoing figures as a basis, an allocation of officers in Regions had been drawn up. We should have the services of the officers earmarked for ALGERIA until such time as they were needed. We would get approximately 60 additional American officers from combat and military formations and these officers were being trained and made

The Deputy Executive Commissioner stated that our V.O. vehicles were below establishment. Our V/O had been increased by 750 but this meant increasing the number of requisitioned vehicles and we were endeavouring to obtain restoration of authority for hiring which would be a satisfactory solution to the problem. Vehicles from the South were being assigned and re-allocated to Northern Regions according to their needs.

Brig. Geoffrey Smith, Chief Financial Advisor, said there was no financial obstacle to the Commission buying vehicles.

The Executive Commissioner, assuming up stated that if officers for ANZEL, had to be released before we went into the North officers for the central Regions would be found from Sections and Sub-Commissions at HQ. A further principle of HQ was necessary. As to the transport problem, we were endeavoring to obtain removal of powers of requisitioning if only for an initial period of 60 to 90 days.

Regions

5. (a) Assignment of Officers.

Col. Roman, R.C. Emilia Region, and Regional Commissioners of Northern Regions raised points concerning assignment of officers. After some discussion, Executive Commissioner said that a period would be set aside later for a discussion between Regional Commissioners, SCIO's and Establishment Section to discuss in detail.

(b) Policy on Implementation of Italian Government's Decrees in Italy.

R.C. Emilia Region, raised the question of the implementation of Italian Government decrees in AS territory. Executive Commissioner stated that Heads of Sections advised the Chief Commissioner as to whether decrees should apply to AS territory or not; this was a policy decision made by HQ.

VP Civil Affairs Section pointed out there was nothing automatic about implementation of this policy with respect to any particular decree. It was not feasible to have a decree implemented in one Region and not in another. If there was doubt about any decree, it need not be implemented until after consultation. The procedure for implementing decrees in FIFTH and EIGHTH Army was compared and it was agreed that the method adopted by FIFTH Army was preferable and would be adopted by EIGHTH Army.

(c) Disposition of Truck Pools.

Brig. Bullog, R.C. Southern Region, stated there were 366 trucks in the South organized into four transport pools under Allied officers and asked that these trucks be transferred to the Italians as soon as possible. Executive Commissioner said that everything possible would be done to obtain a decision on this from AMHQ before 1 April 1945.

(d) Turnover of Food Distribution to Italian Agencies.

Col. Kirkwood, R.C. TOSCANA Region, referred to the intention to hand over food warehouses to Italian control. He did not like accepting responsibility for food distribution in his Region under these conditions. He considered this should not be put into effect until the Italians had had proper instruction in our methods. Food Sub-Commission, Transportation Sub-Commission and the Regions were all concerned in such a hand-over.

Executive Commissioner said that before action was taken a survey should be made by the Regions. He warned Regions that in any question of handing over it was the responsibility of the R.C. to ensure that proper distribution of food etc would be carried out. On the other hand R.C. must be fully consulted by HQ A.C. before any handover arrangements were made by it.

Col. French, R.C. ARUNACHAL-PRACHIN Region, stated that the salaries of State employees were not sufficient for existence. He cited several examples of the difference between salaries and cost of living which left the worker heavily in debt. In ARN territory State employees did not get the bonuses which were allowed in AC territory. Many deputations had asked for help. He asked if it was not possible to raise salaries in ARN territory.

Mr. Binaire, Labour Sub-Commissioner, said that the Government had recently concluded an agreement providing for substantial increases for State employees, which would apply throughout the country, including the North after liberation. The new agreement would consolidate the bonuses and indemnities hitherto granted for special reasons and in certain localities.

(f) Allowances and rations for civil and employees.

The question of inadequate allowances and rations for civils, both drivers away from HQ overnight and clerks who lived away from their homes, was raised.

VP Establishment Section referred to All Rations Order 252 of 1944 and read this to the meeting. A recommendation had been made that all civils be placed on the same basis. Allowances of 135 - 250 lire per day, based on wage rates, had been proposed.

(g) Transport for Civil Supply.

F. G. TOSSANA Region, said that when Arden went forward they took General Transport Coys with them and regions were left with insufficient transport. Transportation Sub-Commissioner said it was now arranged that SMC would take over. Executive Commissioner directed R.C. Toscan Region to put up a case, setting out deficiencies in vehicles and rate on which they were required to be made up. It was appreciated that some Regions had a greater deficiency of transport than others.

(h) Translators.

It was agreed that the present system re. min. translation of documents should continue.

(i) Provision of Supplies for Regions.

R.C. TOSSANA Region alleged there was lack of coordination between Sub-Commissions and cited the transaction of sulphur and copper sulphate. The transaction involved Industry, Transportation and

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(i) Provision of Supplies for Regions

(j) Titles of Regional and Provincial Commissioners

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R.C. TOSCANA Region put forward the suggestion that Regional Commissioners and Provincial Commissioners be designated Regional and Provincial Governors. R.C. LAZIO-UMBRIA Region considered it was too late to make an alteration but suggested that the Executive Officer should be called Deputy Regional Commissioner.

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PART IIIHQ AC SectionsACTION.6. (a) Economic Section.(1) 300 gram ration and price of bread and pasta.

Col. Legg, Food Sub-Commission, reported that an Administrative Memorandum had been prepared setting out the basic formula on which the economic price of bread had been established. The 300 gram ration became effective throughout all Italian Government territory on 1 March and in AMG territory on 12 March. It comprised 200 grams bread and 80 grams pasta per day issued weekly or bi-monthly. All cereals to be milled for human consumption would be controlled by the Consorzio Agrario through the medium of the local Consorzio. All expenses relative to the milling, transportation etc. of the grain would be borne by the Consorzio. The price for milling had been established at between 60-70 lire per quintal. The price of flour ex-mill 1396.50 lire per quintal. In AMG territory the Provincial Commissioner would approve the price of bread as submitted to him by the Consorzio. The Administrative Memorandum referred to would be sent out that day.

Regional Commissioners should establish a price for bread immediately on entering the North and for their guidance further study would be given to the subject.

It was thought that the reaction of the population to an immediate rise in price, even to 16 lire per kilo would be severe. A/VP Economic Section asked if we could subsidize the price from AMG funds. Chief Financial Advisor said he was very much against this. Col. Legg said that the 'impact' ration would be made from imported white flour whereas the local flour was of very poor quality and this might help matters. It was decided that Economic Section would hold a separate meeting to discuss the price of cereals and bread.

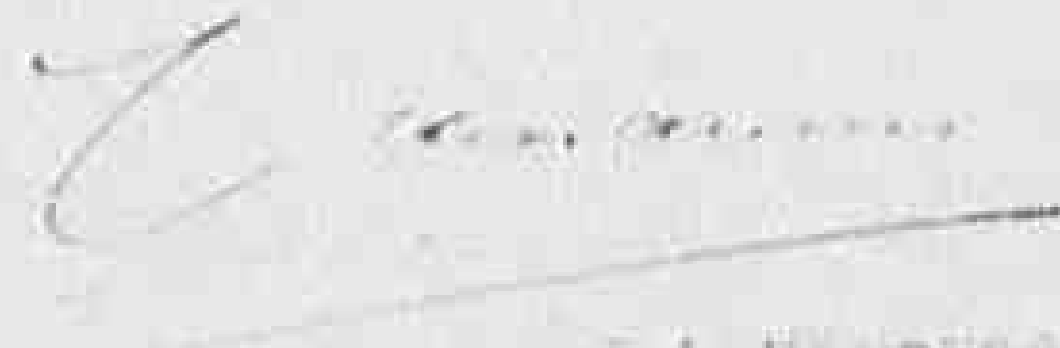

1. I have signalled your headquarters today as follows:

SUGGEST FOLLOWING FOR AGENDA THURSDAY MEETING.
POLICY ON IMPLEMENTATION ITALIAN GOVERNMENT
DECREES NORTH ITALY. OFFICER TRANSPORT PRO-
BLEM. PLANS REGARDING DETACHMENT OF ATTACHED
OFFICERS AND CONTROL BY ULTIMATE REGIONS
PRIOR TO DETACHMENT.

2. Points one and two are probably sufficiently self-explanatory.

3. On point three, I feel that the following explanation is called for.

4. Emilia Region, either in its special aspect as a component of AMG 2nd Army or in the 5th Army area, is making use, at the present time, of attached personnel to the number of twenty-five officers.

5. Some of these officers have been "attached" ab initio. Others (provincial officers, for the most part) have been changed from an "assigned" to an "attached" basis with notice to us, and opportunity to voice objections. The status of these is clear and so long as we are fairly treated as regards total numbers we raise no issues concerning them.

6. There is, however, a third class of officers recently changed from an "attached" to an "assigned" basis, whose continued presence with this region for a considerable further period of time is absolutely vital.

We hear rumors of others, regarded by northern regional commissioners as "belonging" to them, though we have received no notice or orders.

7. It should be obvious that the departure from Emilia Region of any of these officers prior to the completion of the first-phase job, would be disastrous. Yet we are, in the present state of affairs, vulnerable to their loss on 48 hours notice by the regional commissioner to whose team they are "assigned".

8. I cannot help but feel that the action which has been taken in these and other similar cases arises out of an unconscious grouping of Emilia Region with regions farther south who have been exercising territorial jurisdiction for a considerable period and should quite logically be prepared now to begin to surrender personnel.

9. Nothing could be more misleading than this idea. I call attention to the fact that Emilia Region has not at this time one square inch of territorial jurisdiction. It is a "northern", "unopened" region to exactly the same extent as Liguria, Piemonte, Lombardia and Venezia. The entire regional job is still to be done, and if it is to be done well the Region must be permitted to retain an adequate staff to do it. It must particularly be permitted to keep its heads of special divisions, (especially as in the above cases where they have no assistants or understudies) and important specialist officers of provinces still to be liberated, until the completion of a job which has not yet begun.

63

10. A particularly unhappy consequence of the existing arrangement is the present exercise of dominion over these officers by Regional Commissioners of regions farther north. For example, my only education officer, after three weeks in the hospital and in the midst of an attempt to open schools with Army consent under quasi-combat conditions, was recently summoned to a meeting in Rome to discuss plans for Lombardy with the Regional Commissioner of that region. The message was received after the date of the proposed meeting so attendance was impossible in any event but the difficulty is apparent.

11. Since my purpose is to state the problem and not to belabor it, I have probably already said too much. The burden of the plea I desire to express on Thursday is that Emilia Region, with no territorial jurisdiction as yet, is in exactly the same position as other northern regions, and must be permitted to retain a basic organization of specialists until its mission is accomplished--which, if north Italy opens up suddenly, is not likely to be much earlier than the same point is reached in other "northern" regions.

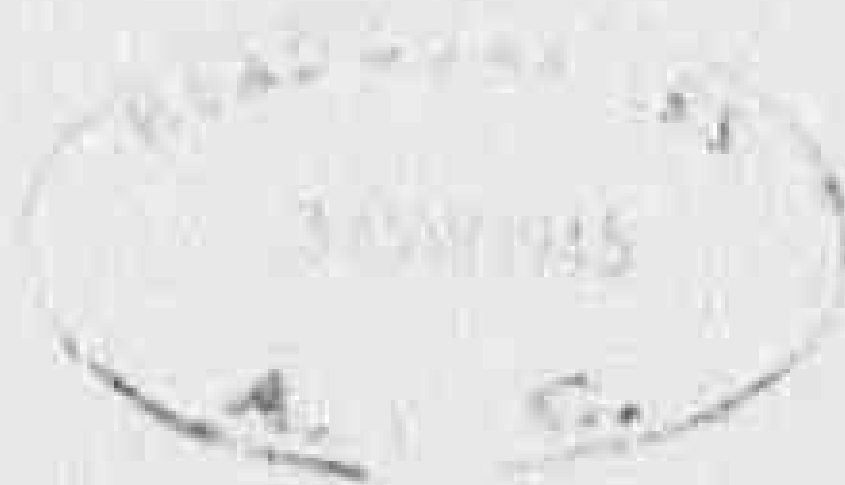

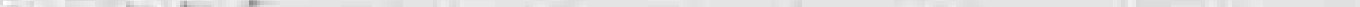

APPENDIX 'A'.

1. Harvest estimates are based on the assumption that there was a good harvest this year in Northern Italy. Reports from 3 areas support this point of view.
2. Assessing estimates are based upon the probability that 40% of the total crop will be assessed although we have reports from only one province that this figure has in fact been obtained. Estimate of losses and damage has been retained at the figure of 300,000 tons used in the first survey of wheat position submitted to Washington. Information from three widely separated provinces indicates that considerable amounts have been moved by the Germans and that appreciable losses have been sustained because of wheat remaining untreshed in the fields.
3. Present consumption has been estimated at the rate of 235 grams bread per day plus 12½% supplementary rations. Reports of ration scales now existing differ in the various regions but an average indicates that the consumption is in the neighborhood of the figure quoted.
4. (a) It is assumed that there are 17,400,000 rations card holders in the North and that 12½% or 2,175,000 people are entitled to supplementary ration cards.
 - (b) At 200 grams of bread per day, the monthly requirement is 104,000 tons.

MINUTES OF ACTING PRESIDENT'S CONFERENCE - 20 NOVEMBER 1944.

The following Memoranda were submitted in support of the points outlined in the Agenda:-

- Memorandum "A" - ²²⁶ Functions of the Sub-Commission of the Civil Affairs Section in Italian Government Territory (By CA Sec).
- Memorandum "B" - ²⁴⁴ Nature of the Commission (By Chief of Staff).
- Memorandum "C" - ²³ Approval of Appointments of Italian Officials by the Allied Commission (By CA Section).
- Memorandum "D" - ¹⁷ Approval of Decrees passed by the Italian Government (By CA Section).

1. Future of the Allied Commission.

The President asked the meeting to give special consideration as to what the implications were in connection with the removal of "Control" from the title of the Commission. He invited Brigadier Upjohn to read his Memorandum on the functions of the Sub-Commissions of the Civil Affairs Section in Italian Government Territory (Memorandum "A").

There were no comments on the introduction.

PART I.

Item 1(a) - Legal Sub-Com. No comments.

Item 1(b) - Local Government Sub-Com. This Sub-Com is represented in the field by Civil Affairs Officers.

Item 1(c) - Public Safety Sub-Com. A President asked whether in the

6. Future of the Allied Commission.

The President asked the meeting to give special consideration as to what the implications were in connection with the removal of "Control" from the title of the Commission. He invited Brigadier Upjohn to read his memorandum on the functions of the Sub-Commissioners of the Civil Affairs Section in Italian Government Territory (Memorandum "A").

There were no comments on the introduction.

PART I.

Para A(a) - Legal Sub-Com. 16 comments.

Para A(b) - Local Government Sub-Com. This sub-com is represented in the field by Civil Affairs Officers.

Para A(c) - Public Safety Sub-Com. A President asked whether in the event of Allied Public Safety Officers being withdrawn the Public Safety Sub-Com could be incorporated in the Legal Sub-Com for purposes of control. The answer was in the negative.

Para A(d) - Public Health Sub-Com. Chief of Staff mentioned that the arrival of UNRRA would be of some assistance in the event of the withdrawal of Public Health Officers.

Para A(e) and (f) were the subject of detailed discussion later in the meeting under item 2(b) of the agenda.

The general feeling of the meeting on this point was that many Italian functions performed by Allied officers in Italian Government territory would not be dispersed with.

2. Concurrence which might be made by Allied Commission in implementation of the above of Title.

Chief of Staff read out Memorandum "A". Chief Commissioner queried the second sentence in para 2 regarding the exercise of control. He thought that up till recently a good degree of control had in fact existed, as for example, when the price of wheat was decided in May. Later, however, when the Italian Government announced the change in wheat rates our control was very nominal. A/President queried the situation to the control exercised by the House of Lords. The discussion then turned to:-

- (a) Removal of officers in the field from the Italian and Southern Region.
- Chief of Staff said that even if we withdrew Provincial Commissioners retention of specialist officers of Economic Section would be necessary. Some air facts were proposed to give us field control and would involve control from HQ. Economic Sub-Com were in agreement but thought that this would need to authorize certain aircrew men. Political Section thought that it would be helpful for the overall political position if such officers could be converted to Liaison Officers. A/President said that the functions of our officers were:

- (1) to protect our direct military and allied Commission interests;
- (ii) to protect our good name, i.e., for example, a school or hospital was requisitioned.

Major-General Lewis said that if AG officers were withdrawn it might throw extra functions on to Areas and Districts who would have to be equipped. A/President said that we should have to go sometime, the point was, what, and how little damage need be done. A good instance was the withdrawal of transportation and public utility officers of whom there were 26 in Southern Region. Major-General Lewis said that their withdrawal might be dangerous to military interests.

The consensus of the meeting was that officers could be withdrawn from their appointments under the Allied Commission but in several instances would have to be replaced or returned under another name, e.g., as Liaison Officers attached to military formations (District, Area HQ).

- (b) Removal of certain functions of HQ and in the field.
- Economic Section were prepared to withdraw certain officers in the field, for example, Supply Officers, but not from HQ. In the Section, Brigadier Upjohn said that Memoranda & Plans Arts Sub-Com could be withdrawn from Italian Government territory and the Chief Commissioner approved. Liaison officers were definitely required in that territory. The decision as to whether they could be withdrawn from Italian Government territory depended on whether our policy was to abandon our control of administration in Italy. The withdrawal of other Sub-Commissioners officers would depend on the decision taken on point 2(c) in the agenda.

That control of labour was necessary because

the functions of our officers were:

- (1) to protect our direct military and Allied Commission interests;
- (2) to protect our good name, i.e., for example, a school or hospital was requisitioned.

Major-General Lewis said that if 10 officers were withdrawn it might throw extra functions on to areas and districts that would have to be carried. A President said that we should have to go to the point, then, when, and how little damage need be done. A good instance was the withdrawal of transportation and public utility officers if when there were 26 in southern region. Major-General Lewis said that their withdrawal might be dangerous to military interest.

The consensus of the meeting was that officers could be withdrawn from their appointments under the Allied Commission but in several instances would have to be replaced or returned under another name, e.g., as liaison officers attached to military formations (District, Area, etc.).

(3) Abandonment of certain functions at HQ and in the field.

Some of the functions were proposed to be withdrawn from officers in the field, for example, Supply Officers, but not from HQ. In C. Section, Brigadier Uysgho said that Monuments & Fine Arts could be withdrawn from Italian Government territory and the Chief Commissioner approved. Liaison officers were definitely required in all territory. The decision as to whether they could be withdrawn from Italian Government territory depended on whether our policy was to consider our control of education in Italy. The withdrawal of other sub-commissioners officers would depend on the decision taken on point 2(c) in the agenda.

Chief of Staff thought that control of labour was necessary because of its relation with the armed forces. A President thought that this would insist on some control as long as they were dealing in supplies for transportation in Italy. Chief Commissioner said he thought the most important points of control were the control of appointment of officials and submission of Italian documents for approval by Allied Commission (See Para. 2(c)).

The consensus of the meeting was that all sub-commissioners must remain in order to carry on the functions of Allied Commission in all territory and to plan for Keesler's Italy; but that in respect of some sub-commissioners (Education, Monuments & Fine Arts) all functions, and in respect of others, some functions, could be dispersed with in dealing with Italian Government Italy unless the Italian Government asked for assistance.

(c) Demilitarization.

Colonel Zano was doubtful whether this proposal had been fully considered in detail. /President referred to three divisions of Italy in two of which uniform was essential, i.e., Rome, Naples and the Adriatic. Demarcation Section raised the point of the expediency of civilians collected in replacement. /President asked whether there should be a balance between British and Americans in receiving Italian and military personnel. Chief Commissioner said he would be a proper balance. Chief of Staff continued the question of exchange of "loot". The general opinion of the meeting was that it was impossible for officers in the territory to perform their duties unless they were in uniform, and difficult in the territory. /President said he thought that there should be a balance maintained between British and Americans and, as regards intercommunal responsibility, that it might be possible to make certain appointments of civilians to posts in the, when each came about, he decided on its merits.

The consensus of the meeting was that at this stage the appointment of civilians to posts in the field, either in the Italian Government territory, was impracticable - the demilitarization of the Allied Commission should be confined to certain posts at the, the holders of which would clearly remain at the, maintaining as far as possible a balance between Americans and British.

(d) Appointment of Civilian Advisors.

Chief of Staff proposed the appointment of certain civilian advisors to be appointed to Ministries of the Italian Government as surrogates of the Italian Government, with residual responsibility to the Allied Commission. The general opinion of the meeting was that the adoption of such a measure would be premature although it might be desirable after hostilities had ceased. Political Section said the Italian Government wanted the reverse procedure - Italian advisors appointed to the Allied Commission. /President said that, if his conception of Allied control was correct, the performance of the Ad-Commission was to act as advisors. He would prefer the role to be reversed and for the Italian Government, after the withdrawal of the Allied Commission (at end of hostilities) to come forward with a request for advisors.

(e) Surrender of Control by Allied Commission of Legislation and Appointment of Italian Officials.(1) Appointment of Italian Officials.

Brigadier Upjohn produced Memorandum "C" on the question of appointment of Italian officials. /President read this out. Chief Commissioner said that this surrogacy was the most important contribution he could make in the administration of "control" in the zone of the Italian Government. In appendix "A" & Memorandum "B" were the appointments which the Italian Government suggested should still be submitted to the for approval. /President asked whether he had

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of civilians to posts in the field, either in fact or Italian Government territory, was questionable and that localization of the Allied Commission should be confined to certain points at HQ, the holders of which would closely remain at HQ, maintaining as far as possible a balance between American and British.

(2) Appointment of Italian Advisors.

Chief of Staff proposed the appointment of certain civilian advisors to be appointed to positions of the Italian Government in service of the Italian Government, with residual responsibility to the Allied Commission. The General advised of this matter and that the adoption of such a measure would be premature although it might be useful after hostilities had ceased. Political action under the Italian Government suited the reverse procedure - Italian advisors appointed to the Allied Commission. A/President said that if his conception of Allied control was correct, the performance of the advisors was to act as advisors. He said that the rules to be governed and for the Italian Government, after the withdrawal of the Allied Commission (at end of hostilities) to come forward with a request for advisors.

(3) Transfer of Control by Allied Commission of Localization and Appointment of Italian Officials.

(a) Appointment of Italian Officials.

Brigadier Upjohn produced Memorandum "a" on the question of appointment of Italian officials. A/President read this out. Chief Commission said that this memorandum was the most important contribution it could make in the situation of "control" in the year of the Italian Government. In Appendix "a" to Memorandum "a" were the appointments which the Italian Government suggested should still be made to HQ for approval. A/President asked whether it was his right to veto ministers. Chief of Commission said that as long by virtue of the secret agreement between General MacFarlane and General Brindley, which had been recognized by the present Government. A/President asked about diplomatic representation. Political Section said that the Italian Government was permitted to have for heads of missions but not for junior officials. The latter, however, would be controlled if necessary by the withholding of military travel authorizations.

A/President expressed doubt as to the propriety of Allied Commission exercising control over appointment of ministers. 487 said that this was a matter for the Allied Government to decide. It was decided to accept List "C" as it stood with a very few additions to be made by civil affairs and economic section.

(4) Approval of Decrees.

Brigadier Upjohn produced Memorandum "b" which the A/President read out. After discussion as to our legal rights over the approval of decrees, it was generally agreed that though HQ had no specific right to be consulted on all decrees, the Italian Government would

submitted the more important decisions for approval, if not their recommendation by Council of Ministers, at least before publication. Exceptions to this were the Labour laws, decrees and the laws on the distribution of undistributed land to the peasants. The President said that we could not discuss to see whether it is right but it would be useful if we were consulted.

It was agreed that the J. J. had no legal right and should not attempt to obtain the right to administrative decisions, but that the Ministry should exercise of mutual confidence should be built up (even-though perhaps by exercise of pressure), so that the Italian Government spontaneously submitted draft decrees on important subjects for discussion before they became law.

3. Organization of the Economic Section.

Dr. De Gasperi, Minister of Economy, read his paper on the subject of the setting up of his Section, and explained the functions of each Division and Sub-Commission. (Copy of this paper is with the J. J. President).

(a) Committee of Industrial Reconstruction.

He referred to this Committee as the central authority to which the various Ministries should refer.

(b) Labour Sub-Commission.

The Chief of Staff gave names of a cable just received from Francesco Craxi, Mr. Craxi's appointment, on the authority of the Ministry of Labour. The Commission of this Sub-Commission with the Finance Sub-Commission was discussed but rejected.

(c) Transportation Sub-Commission.

Dr. De Gasperi described this Sub-Commission as having the function of implementing the planning made by the Priorities & Movement Division of his Section staff.

4. Implementation of General Wilson's Mar 810.

(a) Food Position of Italy.

Dr. De Gasperi described a paper showing the wheat waste and liabilities in the balance for the North which included all Northern Italy as well as the North-East portion. The J. J. President asked Dr. De Gasperi to give him the references of the various letters and cables on which Dr. De Gasperi based his probable import figure of 788,000 tons from November 1944 through June 1945, as mentioned in Para 14 of the paper. In regard to the amounts of wheat that we might find available in the North when we went in, Dr. De Gasperi mentioned a figure of 850,000 tons. The J. J. President asked him for a note on this. Dr. De Gasperi stressed the importance of discussing a decision to raise the ration to 500 grams. He mentioned that if it were decided to raise the ration 100% of the available wheat it would have no effect in this before 15 December.

- (a) Committee of Industrial Reorganization.
He referred to this Committee as the central authority to which the various Ministries should refer.
- (b) Labour Sub-Commission.
The Chief of Staff gave news of a cable just received from ZACHAREWICZ concerning Mr. Bogren's appointment, on the authority of the Ministry of Labour. Consideration of this Sub-Commission with the Finance Sub-Commission was discussed but rejected.
- (c) Transportation Sub-Commission.
DUC, Economic Section described this Sub-Commission as having the function of implementing the planning made by the Priorities & Movement Division of his Section Staff.

4. Implementation of General Wilson's W.P. 810.

(a) Food Situation of Italy.

DUC, Economic Section submitted a paper showing the wheat needs and limitations and the balance for the North which included all Northern Italy as well as the North-East portion. The President asked Mr. Antolini to give him the references of the various letters and signals on which Mr. Antolini based his probable import figure of 788,000 tons from November 1944, through June 1945, as mentioned in Part II of the paper. In regard to the amounts of wheat that we might find available in the North when we went in, Mr. Antolini submitted a figure of 800,000 tons. The President asked him for a note on this. Mr. Antolini stressed the importance of obtaining a decision to raise the ration to 300 grams. He mentioned that if it were decided to raise the ration North of the Gulliv- line it would not be possible to give effect to this before 15 December. The Chief Commissioner endorsed the importance of raising the ration if disorders were to be avoided.

(b) Miscellaneous Facts.

DUC, Economic Section produced a paper on this, copy of which is with the President.

(1) Wheat.

The President asked what was the present wheat supply in Italy, to which he received the answer - negligible. Mr. Antolini was instructed to give the President a note on this.

(2) Crude Oil.

DUC Economic Section thought that with successful measures the oil situation would not be bad.

(c) Price of grain.
Mr. Antolini submitted a paper on this, copy of which is with the /President. After discussion it was agreed that the price release concerning the increase of the price of bread from 5 lire to 8 lire a kilo should be withheld until 1 September. General Spettini hoped that within this period of time he would receive the approval of the CCS to raise the bread ration to 500 grams. In meeting to the /President stated that the price of bread should not be raised in 1943 territory unless a 500 gram ration had been approved through and that the Italian Government should be strongly urged to follow the same procedure in the territory for which they were responsible.

(d) Increased demand for Italy under management of EAC.
The Economic Section presented a paper on this, copy of which is with the /President, who read it through and agreed it was possible. Mr. Antolini pointed out that the plan required good administrative personnel. In short, he said, be careful not to hand back territory too soon.

(e) Essential Civilian Requirements.
The Economic Section submitted a paper on this, copy of which is with the /President. The /President said that the vital points at issue were, were these requirements to be supplied as a military commitment for all Italy, including the Italian Government portion, or was there to be a distinction between the requirements for Italian Government territory and Allied Military Government territory. The /President also stressed that there were four important points in regard to this matter:

- (i) Ships.
- (ii) Availability.
- (iii) Shipping.
- (iv) Port Clearance.

The first three were the responsibility of the CCS and port clearances was the problem of AFHQ and Allied Commission.

5. UNRRA.
After a short discussion it was agreed that Allied Commission could only accept UNRRA's proposals provided they were self-supporting in respect of:

The /President said that there were some matters which could be handled direct with CCS or the ARMC with out even a copy to ARMC, other matters which could be handled direct but with a copy to ARMC, and that there were, of course, matters of a more technical nature (for instance, G-4 matters) which should continue to be handled by G-5 Section. He directed that General Spafford's report should be considered by the Allied Commission and specific proposals submitted in due course.

7. Relations between Allied Commission with the Political Section and the Allied Headquarters.
The /President read a paper he had himself prepared on this subject. Reference was made to a letter written by the Chief Commissioner on 5th November, 1943, L/CC 201, on the subject of relations between the Italian Government and the United Nations. The /President said that as far as it there were two problems:

(a) Can the Italian Government communicate with other Governments without their communications being scrutinized?

(b) If so, can they use ciphers?

It was agreed that to allow communications but to forbid ciphers really implied prohibition of communications of a secret nature. Mr. Hoffmann said that all outgoing communications of the Italian Government were, at present, sent, except in the case of the Russians. Mr. Hoffmann also said there was a technical matter in regard to ciphers in which he would like to be provided the give consideration and on which he promised to submit a note.

SUBJECT: Function of the Sub-Commission of Civil Affairs Section in Italian Government territory.

TO: Chief of Staff.

REFERENCE:

1. The purpose of this memorandum is to set out shortly the functions and tasks entrusted by the Sub-Commission of Civil Affairs Section in Italian Government territory.
a) In so far as the Sub-Commission exercises Sub-Commissionary functions;
b) The tasks of the Civil Affairs Section in the regions.

2. The Sub-Commission exercises the following functions:

- Judicial Personnel and Italian Personnel;
- Personnel;
- Local Government Sub-Commissionary and National Personnel;
- Municipalities, Towns and Provinces;
- Public Health;
- Public Safety.

The main body of this Commission is divided into two parts, one part dealing with the functions in general of Sub-Commissions in Italian Government territory, and the other dealing with the particular functions which derive directly from presence of Allied Forces in Italian Government territory. It is emphasized that this memorandum is not concerned with the many and various functions of Sub-Commissions, both at Headquarters and in the field, with regard to Allied Military Government territory.

NOTES ON ARGENTIA

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1. Future of Commission.

The Commission has consistently agreed that there should be no fundamental change in its organization until the end of hostilities. This was contained in a memorandum of July 29th and telegram of September 14th, both sent to ARG but, as it is believed, not forwarded by ARG to GCHQ. The War Office have received both documents and the War Department certainly the latter through the Channel in Rome.

There is both in Britain and in Argentina a growing opinion on the part of the War Departments to divert themselves from responsibilities regarding rehabilitation in Italy. But however decided may be this desire, the above policy which it is proposed to adopt on other sides of the Atlantic bears little relation to reality. The proposal that the headquarters of the Commission should be decentralized (with the exception of the Administrative Section) has already been covered by the Chief Commissioner's letter of 4.11.44. Therefore, the War Office through declining channels. The other proposal adopted in London that the authority for Allied military government in Italy (Answerable through ARGENT to the War Office) should be made distinct from the Allied Commission which it is proposed should be made answerable to the Foreign Office, is equally unacceptable. This point was dealt with in the memorandum of July 29th, written when the possibility of the total 150 million was probable by the end of the year, and the arguments are even more cogent now than before. For your information the following is a brief history of the policy hitherto adopted by the Allied Commission, and a statement of the present position.

2. Shortly after the first handover of territory to the Italian Government which took place on the 11th February '44, there was an exchange of letters between the then Chief Commissioner, Lt. Gen. Sir Noel Mason Macfarlane and the then Prime Minister Marshal Badoglio. (Copies of these letters are at Am. "A"). In effect by these letters it was agreed that all senior Government appointments would be subject to the prior approval of the Commission.

3. Details were worked out between the Sub-Commissioners and the Ministries concerned as to the level down to which appointments made by the Italian Government would be subject to the Commission's approval. Appendix "B" Part I gives a list of officers as finally agreed between the Commission and the Government which were to be subject to the Commission's approval.

With regard to Sub-Commissions in the Economic Section, no detailed arrangements were made, but the practice grew up whereby the Ministries concerned did in fact submit for approval, to the appropriate Sub-Commission, appointments down to the level set out in App. "B" Pt II.

4. The arrangements so made have worked quite smoothly in practice. It is fair to say that in the vast majority of cases no difficulty has arisen and appointments have been agreed almost as a matter of course, but the right of approval has proved useful in practice, and occasionally approval for good reason has been withheld and the Italian Government has been required to submit another appointee for the office.

5. Recently, and in view of the change of name of the Commission, the Italian Government has requested that the practice be revised and they have submitted a very short list of offices which they suggest should be submitted to the Commission for approval. (App. 'C').

6. It appears to be a matter of overall policy as to whether or not the Commission should agree to the revised list. It is the opinion of the Civil Affairs Section that the list is too short, and that at any rate the names of directors of personnel in each Ministry should be submitted to the Commission for approval. The main reason for this is that appointments in Allied Military Government territory are always made by the Allied Commission, but in practice the Italian Government is usually consulted over such appointments, and it is desirable that the Director of personnel should be the person approved by the Commission.

7. In view also of the importance of the C.C.A.B. in Military Government territory, and the important negotiations now in train with

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regard to the reorganization of that body, it is suggested that the senior staff officers of the Commanding General G.I.A. should be subject to approval, and also appointments to the Court of Cassation, the supreme judicial body of the country.

B. In this connection it must be remembered that in the secret terms agreed between the Commission and the Italian Government on such successive restoration of territory to the administration of the Government, it is always provided that no person appointed by the allied military Government may be removed, except with the consent of the Commission. If policy demands that the Italian Government is to have greater latitude in future, then it would seem necessary to modify or abandon this term, because no such amendments involve removal or transfer which requires the consent of the Commission, and thus indirectly the Commission controls appointments in many cases on a far lower level than those indicated in App. "B". Except as a matter of "major interest" there does not seem to be any objection to abandoning this provision.

Recent events over certain appointments have shown that it is clearly desirable for us to have a mutually satisfactory arrangement to prevent misunderstanding and subsequent difficulties which it is in all our interests to avoid. I would suggest, therefore, that it should be agreed that you will let me know before any appointment to the Government is actually announced. Equally, I should be glad if you will impress upon all members of your Government that they should, in turn, consult the appropriate authorities in the Allied Control Commission before making any senior appointments in their own department's either at the seat of the Italian Government or in those provinces under Italian jurisdiction. As they already enjoy close and friendly relations with the Sub-Commissions with whom they work, this should be an easy matter to arrange. It is clear that each minister must be strictly accountable for all appointments in his department, and the arrangement which I propose should be to their interests in carrying out the work which we are doing together.

I should be glad if you will let me know whether you are in full agreement with the proposals made in this letter. If so, I will give the necessary instructions to the various heads of Sections and Sub-Commissions of the Allied Control Commission as soon as you confirm that members of your government have been notified of our agreement.

SUBJECT: Approval of Decrees passed by the Italian Government.

FOR: Acting President, Allied Commission.

1. It is desirable that policy should be clarified with regard to the attitude of the Allied Commission in approving Decrees proposed by the Italian Government.

2. Up to the present time no definite arrangements have been made with the Italian Government, but in practice a large proportion of decrees proposed by them are in fact studied with the Sub-Commission concerned. It has occasionally happened, however, that some decrees of importance, such as the decree raising wage rates, are discussed by the Council of Ministers without receiving prior detailed approval from the Allied Commission, and difficulty has resulted.

3. Although it is comparatively easy to lay down principles and to say that all decrees coming within a certain category must be submitted for approval by the Allied Commission before being discussed at a Council of Ministers, it is exceedingly difficult to work out the detailed application of such principles. For instance, it has been suggested that all decrees which may have the following effects should be submitted for approval to the Commission:-

- a) Interferences with Allied war effort,
- b) Increase of the degree to which Italy is a drag on the economy of the United Nations, or
- c) re-introduction of practices or practices identified with Fascism into the functioning of the economic and governmental machinery.

In practice it is very difficult to determine what decrees fall within the above categories and what do not, and it is for this reason that a decision must be made as to whether or not decrees are to be approved by Allied Commission. If they are to be approved, then to be on the safe side, it is recommended that they should be submitted for detailed approval to the Allied Commission.

2. Up to the present time no definite arrangements have been made with the Italian Government, but in practice a large proportion of decrees proposed by them are in fact studied with the Sub-Commission concerned. It has occasionally happened, however, that some decrees of importance, such as the decrees relating to rates, are discussed by the Council of Ministers without receiving prior detailed approval from the Allied Commission, and difficulty has resulted.

3. Although it is comparatively easy to lay down principles and to say that all decrees coming within a certain category must be submitted for approval by the Allied Commission before being discussed at a Council of Ministers, it is exceedingly difficult to work out the detailed application of such principles. For instance, it has been suggested that all decrees which may have the following effects should be submitted for approval to the Commission:-

- a) interference with Allied war effort,
- b) increase of the degree to which Italy is a drag on the economy of the United Nations, or
- c) re-introduction of persons or practices identified with Fascism into the functioning of the economic and governmental machinery.

In practice it is very difficult to determine what decrees fall within the above categories and what do not, and it is for this reason that a decision must be made as to whether or not decrees are to be approved by Allied Commission. If they are to be approved, then to be on the safe side, it is recommended that all decrees should be submitted for scrutiny for determination by ALCON to whether or not they are interested.

4. This, however, does not entirely dispense with the question, for within the Commission it is desirable to lay down principles indicating in what decrees are of interest. Primarily any decrees affecting the operation of the armistice terms is one which should receive detailed scrutiny, but this category would not cover a number of decrees in which the Commission would be interested, such as decrees affecting overall economic policies, and it is requested that the lines on which the Commission is to operate in this respect be clarified.

Recent events over certain appointments have shown that it is clearly desirable for us to have a mutually satisfactory arrangement to prevent misunderstandings and subsequent difficulties which it is in all our interests to avoid. I would suggest, therefore, that it should be agreed that you will let me know before any appointment to the Government is actually announced. Equally, I should be glad if you will impress upon all the members of your Government that they should, in turn, consult the appropriate authorities in the Allied Control Commission before making any senior appointments in their own departments either at the seat of the Italian Government or in those provinces under Italian jurisdiction. As they already enjoy close and friendly relations with the Sub-Commission with whom they work, this should be an easy matter to arrange. It is clear that each minister must be strictly accountable for all appointments in his department and the arrangement which I propose should be to their interests in carrying out the work which we are doing together.

If so, I will give the necessary instructions to the various heads of Sections and Sub-Commissions of the Allied Control Commission as soon as you confirm that members of your government have been notified of our agreement.

B. MISCELLANEOUS FOODS

1. Dried Vegetables, Dehydrated Soups, Meat and Vegetable Stew

Stocks of all these foods are very low, with no additional shipments approved (although bids were put into Washington two months ago). If general issues are continued, stocks will last as follows:

Dried Vegetables - until 20 December
Dehydrated Soup - until 15 January
Meat & Vegetables - until 1 March

In order to keep some stocks of these foods on hand for special needy consumer groups, the Economic Section will discontinue the general issue of dried vegetables and soup on 1 December, and of meat on 1 January. The stocks will then be furnished only to special classes such as hospitals, public safety agents, school children, relief and welfare institutions, and civilians working for Allied agencies.

2. Sugar

Ration is 125 grams per person per month, on a when and if basis. Only issues that can be made will be from imports (one ship is due in a couple of weeks), and the ration is foregone as often as it is issued.

3. Milk

No stockpile whatever on hand, and no advice of any future arrivals.

4. Butter

Distribution and ration depend on the success in smearing the Italian crop of olive oil. If smearing estimates are realized a ration of 400 grams per person can be issued.

From November arrives a stockpile is being built for the North, but it will only be large enough to last one month (2,200 tons, which will take care of 17,000,000 people at 125 grams per capita).

5. Soap - No imports of soap are scheduled. Production in territory controlled by the Italian Government is sufficient only for ration of 100 grams per head per month.

Distribution and ration depend on the success in amassing the Italian crop of olive oil. If amassing estimates are realized a ration of 400 grams per person can be issued.

From November arrivals a stockpile is being built for the North; but it will only be large enough to last one month (2,200 tons, which will take care of 17,000,000 people at 125 grams per capita).

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THE PRICE OF BREAD AND PASTA

(Report of a meeting held between representatives of the Economic Section, EC, and of the Italian Government, 18 November 1944.)

1. A Committee of the Italian Government composed of the Minister of Treasury, Solari; Minister of Agriculture, Gullo; and Minister (without portfolio) Sigispari, has submitted a proposal to increase the price of bread from 5 lire per kilo to 8 lire per kilo.
2. The cost of bread, otherwise known as the economic price, was formerly 12 lire and is now 15 lire a kilo. Hence, the increase in the retail price is in direct relation to the increase in cost, i.e. 3 lire per kilo. The Government intends to continue to subsidize the spread between the economic price and the price paid by the public.
3. The Government intends to establish some special provision for certain categories of consumers such as the unemployed and displaced persons. The Committee is not prepared at this moment to present any formal plan but we have indicated that we shall review the matter with them and offer some suggestions on the categories to be included in any "special ration" scheme.
4. The Government has indicated that the price of pasta will be correspondingly increased. It is now 7 lire and will be increased to a maximum of 12 lire.
5. While agreeing in principle with the proposition that the price of bread should be increased, the Economic Section suggested that the publication of the new price should be so timed as to tie in with a possible increase in the ration to 300 grams, and the transfer to the Italian Government of administrative responsibility for feeding of Italy.
6. The Ministers have agreed that a single press release should be issued on all these points. In the event that we are unable by 23 November 1944 to assure them of a satisfactory solution of the bread ration problem, the information on the price increase will be released.

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SUMMARY OF PROPOSED PLAN FOR THE
UNION-REGULATED MARKET OF FOOD

1. To assess only wheat and olive oil.
2. To ration only Bread, Pasta, Olive Oil and imported commodities such as sugar.
3. To leave other locally produced foodstuffs to free enterprise, subject only to transport control, leaving these to find their own price level.
4. As fixed and low income classes will not be able to buy sufficient foodstuffs at these expected high prices, and low range of rationed commodities will not cover their fundamental food needs, to make provision for these by:
 - (a) Organising Cooperatives of State Employees, workers, etc., and assign foodstuffs, other than rationed items, to them. These to be controlled by a Commissioner for Cooperatives, who will be an expert executive directly under the Under Secretary of Food.
 - (b) Supplies for these Cooperatives will be obtained by:
 - (1) Direct purchases by the State of a certain amount. This not fixed and modus operandi not yet stated.
 - (11) Taking a percentage (not stated) of commodities imported from surplus regions into large towns in this free market system.
 - (c) The responsibility for obtaining these supplies will be vested in a Commissioner for Supplies who will be an expert executive directly under the Under Secretary of Food. He will be assisted in the obtaining of information about surpluses by Regional officials who will assess surpluses, have them allocated to needy areas by his superior, and then assist in the movement. Control that these will, in fact, go to the areas nominated will be exercised by control of transport media only - all permits to move goods, etc., will be abolished. Food movement permits would be needed only for these specific surpluses.
5. Existing Direzione Generale di Alimentazione will be retained for control of rationing system, supervision of the Consorzio Agrario and the movement and distribution of rationed items only.

MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: Status of Joint Programming of Essential Civilian Requirements

1. On 31 October 1944, the Economic Section of the Allied Commission was authorized to begin the job of programming with the Italian Government essential civilian supplies over and above those provided by the military. The authorization is contained in Appendix 'A' attached and resulted from a series of meetings held in Rome and in AFHQ.

2. The terms of reference within which it is necessary to program are somewhat indefinite, but can be summarized as follows:

a. The Combined Chiefs of Staff will approve only those supplies which they consider to fall within the military mission of 'preventing disease and unrest'. Roughly, this includes limited amounts of food, fuel, medical and sanitary supplies, electric generating plants, transportation equipment, and a few miscellaneous finished products.

b. The U.S. Government is making available to the Italian Government a limited amount of foreign exchange in dollars, which is represented by the dollar equivalent of net troop pay, immigrant remittances, and the proceeds from exports to the U.S. with which to purchase 'non-military' equipment.

c. The British Government, while it has not made a similar arrangement, has indicated that it will provide the agreed British share of an agreed 'non-military' program.

3. The Allied Commission had already done a considerable amount of work with the Italian Government in developing plans for first aid repairs to essential industries, for the provision of needed transportation facilities, and for the limited rehabilitation of the electric power industries on which nearly all other forms of economic activity depend. A quick summary of the thinking up to October 1944 was prepared in the form of a 'Summary Outline of Essential Italian Imports,' which is attached at Appendix 'B'. Also attached, as Appendix 'C' is an outline of an 'Emergency Industrial Program for the rehabilitation of certain basic Italian industries during the year 1944. Appendix 'D' is a summary of plans for the rehabilitation of the electric power industry in Italy, and Appendix 'E' summarizes the status

Roughly, this includes limited amounts of food, fuel, medical and sanitary supplies, electric generating plants, transportation equipment, and a few miscellaneous finished products.

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4. As soon as the authority was given, a meeting was held between the Economic Section, Allied Commission, and Ministers of the Italian Government concerned with economic problems. The agenda for this meeting is attached as Appendix "F", and the minutes as Appendix "G". At this meeting, the Italian Government agreed to prepare a first draft of a program of essential Italian imports, related to three possible levels of foreign exchange which might become available to Italy - 150, 200, 250 million dollars. The establishment of these hypothetical credit limits made it unnecessary to give the Italian Government one specific figure which might be taken as firm.

5. Following this meeting, the Italian Government set up a Committee for Reconstruction (Comitato del Riconstruzione) headed by Bartolomeo Rinaldi, Minister without Portfolio. This Committee is to coordinate the planning for all reconstruction in the Italian Government, and for the time being will assume the direct administrative responsibility for the present task of programming essential non-military imports.
6. The Committee for Reconstruction has now established transportation, electric power, and agricultural supplies as being the top most priority groups, followed by textile and other industries. Their priority thinking is conditioned by the fact that it is unrealistic to plan for the repair of essential industries until the transportation and power bottlenecks have been first dealt with. A draft program, based on these priorities, will be submitted to the Allied Commission by 24 November. As soon as we have agreed with the Italian Government on an overall scheme of non-military imports, the various ministries and sub-commissions will translate that scheme into specific requisitions to be transmitted to the Combined Liberated Areas Committee in Washington.
