TRANSLATION

THE UNION OF SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS

27 January 1947.

Dear Admiral,

In connection with my departure to the Soviet Union I have handed over the Villa Abamelek with all property therein, and also the requisition order for the villa issued to me by Rome Area Allied Command, to the Ambassador of the U.S.S.R. in Italy, Mr. M. A. Kostylev.

Such handover of the requisition order and villa was necessary by the particular status of the villa, since, according to the Will of the owner, Mr. Abamelek Lazateo, the villa is bequeathed to the Soviet Union.

In principle this question is decided as between the Italian Government and the Government of the U.S.S.R.

Today, the 7th Jan at 1000 hrs, a Citroen car bearing the number plate RM 85309 belonging to this Ministry, was going from Via Mercadante and arrived at the corner of Via Bruno Buazzani where it pulled up to give way to a car coming from Via Bruno Buazzani; the latter however, instead of proceeding, pulled its brakes and owing to the icy condition of the road, skidded and hit the left front side of the 85309.

As you may know, the Soviet Government protested to the American Embassy at Moscow in mid-September at obstacles allegedly placed in the way of the Soviet Representatives on the Allied Commission, the Advisory Council for Italy, and the Mission for the Repatriation of Soviet Citizens from Italy in the matter of their travel throughout Italy.

On October 2, Brig. Lush informed Mr. Greene, at the latter's request, of the present position regarding the travel of Russian Representatives in Italy.

I think you and other officers of the Allied Commission concerned will be interested to know that the United States Embassy in Moscow has now been instructed to reply to the Soviet Foreign Office, in concert with the British Embassy, expressing the surprise of the United States Government at the Soviet protest and continuing along the following lines:

The procedure for travel of Soviet Representatives in Italy was designed primarily for the convenience of the Officers concerned and as an assistance to local commanders, who need advance notice in order to extend full cooperation in providing military facilities, such as accommodations, fuel, etc. Moreover, since there are no general restrictions on areas which may be visited by Allied Officers, they are free to travel to any part of Italy except AMG territory without recourse to the Allied Commission. The information of the United States Government is that in actual practice many Allied Officers travel about Italy without obtaining travel orders from the Allied Commission, or even notifying it of their trips.

Furthermore, the Soviet Foreign Office must be aware that no request by the Soviet Representative on the Allied Commission for travel orders has been refused during recent months and that, far from any complaint having been lodged with the Allied Commission, it is understood that the Soviet Representative has expressed himself as more than satisfied with the arrangements made for him.

The Embassy is also instructed to state to the Soviet Foreign Office that the procedure followed for Allied Officers in Italy appears to the United States Government to be far more satisfactory than procedures in effect in Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, and that the United States Government, therefore, sees no basis for the Soviet protest. For its part the United States Government would be more than pleased if its representatives in Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria were to be accorded the same degree of freedom of travel which is enjoyed by Soviet Representatives in Italy.

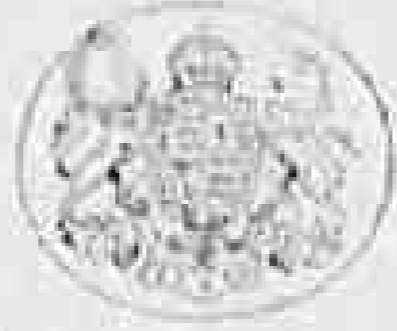

Present position is as follows. In order to obtain petrol at military points and accommodation in requisitioned hotels all Allied Officers travelling in Italy whatever their nationality require movement orders. In applying for these it is customary to state briefly object of journey, e.g. on leave or temporary duty. Far from making any difficulties, the officer in charge of the issue of movement orders is actively helpful in e.g. reserving accommodation at destination when requested to do so.

2. No objection has been made to this procedure by representatives of any nationality. Russian representative Colonel Savko, when asked on September 20th by Officer concerned in Allied Commission whether he was satisfied declared that he was and that no complaint in Moscow could have originated with him.

Thank you so much for sending me the Soviet's reply to your Embassy in Moscow on its participation in the Allied Control Commission in the Balkans.

The credentials of the Soviet member of the Allied Commission were laid down in the Chief of Staff's (ASMG) letter of 26th January 1944 (attached), which were implemented in General Mason Macfarlane's memorandum of 31st January. As you will see from both these documents, the Russian member attends the weekly meetings of Vice Presidents, works on a Vice President's and Director's level, he has complete access to officers on that level, and copies of reports and correspondence considered of interest to him are forwarded to him.

As you know, matters of policy are invariably discussed, generally before their execution, at the Vice Presidents' meeting, and the Russian member has full opportunity to join in this discussion which takes place every Wednesday morning. You will doubtless also remember that only on one occasion in the past year has the Russian member joined in the deliberations of this meeting. That was when he raised his voice in protest against the action of the military police who fired upon some Russian General who broke a military police road block.

In fact, consultation needs cooperation, thought and work. This has not been found with our Russian members.

Provided they obtain permission from the Commission and ASMG and obtain proper travel orders, there is no general restriction on the Russian members visiting any part of Italy. They are not, however, encouraged to visit AGO Territory, for this is outside the scope of the Commission. The mention of a 50 kilometre limit is, of course, quite inaccurate.

I shall be glad to discuss with you whenever you are next in the Commission building.

The Soviet Government does not agree with the assertion that the decisions taken at the Berlin Conference regarding revision of the Allied Control Commissions in Bulgaria and Hungary have not yet been practically implemented in these countries.

The statement made in your letter that the U.S. Delegate has not been consulted on the principal matters handled by the ACC in Bulgaria and that he has not been supplied with necessary information, is not in accordance with the facts. The Soviet Representative, the U.S. and British representatives consult on all important questions. The U.S. Representative has been provided with information and comprehensive knowledge on questions of interest to him, excepting on questions which have nothing to do with the armistice and which concern only the Soviet representation. In addition, the Deputy Chairman of the ACC Bulgaria, Colonel General Biryuzov, continually works out by agreement (soglasovnydet) with the British and U.S. representatives, plans for the work of the ACC, which include, among other things, questions to be put up for discussion by the U.S. representative. One such question is the discussion of the plans for the work of the ACC with which the U.S. representative on the ACC Bulgaria expressed his satisfaction and agreement in his letter dated September 12, 1948, addressed to the Deputy Chairman of the ACC Bulgaria, and questions concerning the execution of individual clauses of the Armistice Agreement.

The Soviet Government also finds it impossible to agree with the statement of the American Government that the Soviet representatives, are by arbitrary action, abridging the rights and privileges of the U.S. representative on the ACC Bulgaria, especially in the question of the utilization of American aircraft. According to information at the Soviet Government's disposal, during the period from December 1, 1944 to February 23, 1948, there were received from the U.S. representative, requests for 123 American aircraft to enter Bulgaria. All 123 clearances were granted and in this period, 100 American aircraft left Bulgaria and 102 arrived there. The ACC puts no obstacles in the movement of American representatives in Bulgaria, Hungary or Rumania. The Soviet military authorities in Bulgaria have only asked the U.S. representative, in accordance with existing statutes of the ACC, to inform the Soviet authorities in sufficient time of the dates and itineraries of these trips, which American officials have in some cases omitted to do.

Regarding the work of the Allied Control Commissions in Rumania and Hungary, the Soviet representatives there have concerted (soglasovnyvali) with the American representatives in planning the work of the ACC and have consulted with them on the main questions in discussing which at ACC meetings the U.S. representatives have actively participated. Questions considered by the ACC, with the U.S. and British

representatives participating, included the expulsion of Germans from Hungary, elections to the Hungarian Parliament, reduction of armies, UNRRA assistance, trials and arrest of Hungarian war criminals and a number of others. For example, in Rumania, the ACC recently held four sessions devoted to Rumanian economic problems, the U.S. and British representatives being present.

All requests for flights into Hungary and Rumania submitted by the American representatives, excepting several cases for Rumania, have been granted.

The foregoing shows that the work of the ACC's in Bulgaria, Rumania and Hungary has been in accordance with the decisions taken at the Berlin Conference for a revision of ACC procedure and the Soviet Government, therefore, cannot agree with the statements made on this subject by the government of the United States of America.

At the same time, the Soviet Government deems it necessary to draw the attention of the Government of the United States to the position of the Soviet representative on the ACC for Italy. Not only are decisions of the AC for Italy on questions of principle not concerted (soglasovnyvayutsya) with the Soviet representative, but the Soviet representative is not even informed in time of decisions adopted by the AC on questions of principle. Such important decisions of the Allied Commission for Italy as the reorganization of the AC, transfer of the northern provinces and islands and ports to the Italian government, transfer to UNRRA of the economic functions of the AC, permitting of the Italian government to form a transitional government, and others have been adopted without preliminary consultation and concerting (soglasovaniye) with the Soviet representative. He and his colleagues are almost entirely deprived of opportunities to make trips in Italy to regions more than 50 kilometers from Rome.

This situation is regarded by the Soviet Government as utterly abnormal and the hope is expressed that the Government of the United States will take immediate measures to lay down proper conditions for the work of the Soviet Representative on the AC for Italy."

1. I refer to your letters Nos. 135/A/46 of 1 January, and 137/A/46 of 11 February, 1946, and to our letters 13002/P of 7 January and 13005/P of 12 February, 1946.

2. Your requests for additional advances of funds to the USSR Representative to ALCOM for the first quarter of 1946 were referred to higher authority for decision. I am now directed by the Combined Chiefs of Staff and Allied Force Headquarters to inform you that quarterly advances to the National Delegations to the Allied Commission will be limited to amounts not in excess of the maximum quarterly amounts previously drawn by the USSR Delegation. It is the agreed policy of the United States and United Kingdom Governments to moderate the burden of the Armistice Terms and it is not possible to issue lire in unrestricted amounts in view of the US/UK concern for the Italian economy. For this reason, Allied Commission expenditure which is ultimately chargeable to the Italian Government must be restricted to the minimum necessary for the personal expenditures of the individuals concerned. This will be estimated on a uniform basis and at a reasonable and generous rate per head, but drawings will be limited to the maximum previous drawings over a period of time, as set out above.

3. I am directed to explain to you that under the terms of the Currency Agreement recently concluded with the Italian Government, the latter is responsible for the issue of all Italian currency including currency required by the Allies. Should your Delegation require amounts of currency over and above the amounts which the Allied Commission is authorized to supply to you, you may utilize the normal banking remittance channels which were especially authorized for your benefit. Alternatively you may approach the Italian Ministry of the Treasury direct for any further currency you may need over the amounts supplied to you by ABCOM.

4. I am further directed to state for your information that the expenses of the National Delegations to the Advisory Council for Italy are not chargeable to the Italian Government under the Armistice, since the Advisory Council for Italy was not set up under the Armistice Terms, but under the Moscow Declaration of October, 1941.

SUBJECT : Advances of Lire to Soviet Representative, ALCOM.

TO : Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 Section, AFHQ.

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1. I refer to your G-5/123-3 of 15 February, 1946.
2. I note that in para. 3 you state "it appears that AFHQ has no authority to limit lire advances to the Russian Delegation". You will remember that in my letter 13005/P of 9 January, 1946, I indicated that, in view of TAM 707, and what I believe to be its intent, I do not intend to advance to the Soviet Representative on the Allied Commission an amount in excess of the maximum quarterly amount previously drawn, i.e., 7,500,000 lire unless I received instructions to the contrary from your HQ. Your HQ, in MAT 974 of 9 January, 1946, requested confirmation from CCS that this course of action was in accord with TAM 707.
3. Having thus taken a definite stand and placed the question before CCS, I do not think we would be justified in conveying to the Soviet Delegation the sense of your para 3, of which the logical corollary is that if the Soviet Delegation is prepared to press its original demand for 25,000,000 lire for the first quarter, plus an additional 125% because of the rate change, the Allied Commission would have no alternative but to grant the entire amount requested. We stated in our 13005/P of 12 February, 1946, that 7,500,000 lire per quarter would appear sufficient to cover the expenses of the Soviet Delegation, even though the lire cost of certain items obtained from Allied sources has increased. You agree with this view in para. 2 of your reference letter.

4. I therefore suggest that no answer be made to the Soviet Representative until a reply to WAF 974 has been received from OCS. In order that OCS may have the whole picture before them, it might be well to inform OCS of the further Soviet request for a 15% increase on their present drawings for the first quarter of 1946.

5. I should be grateful for an expression of your views on these suggestions.

Reference is made to your letters 13005/R dated 1 January and 13005/T dated 21 February also to 13005/S dated 2 January and 8-3/13-1 of 25 February 1946.

1. A reply has not been received from the Combined Chiefs of Staff to the 5th in which approval is given of the action taken by you outlined in para 4 of the cable under reference.

2. This Headquarters is directed to inform you that quarterly advances in the National Delegations to the Allied Commission will be limited to amounts not in excess of various quarterly amounts previously agreed by the Allied Delegation.

3. You will explain to the USSR Representative that it is the agreed United States/United Kingdom policy to moderate the burden of the restrictive terms and that it is not possible to issue life in unrestricted quantities in view of United States/United Kingdom concern for the Italian Economy. For this reason, Allied Commission expenditures which is ultimately chargeable to the Italian Government must be restricted to the minimum necessary for personal expenditures of individuals concerned. This will be estimated on a per capita basis and at reasonable and constant rate per head, but limited to various previous drawings over period of time as in para 4.

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4. The Combined Chiefs of Staff directs that you will also explain to the UNK representative that under the terms of the agreement between the Italian Government, you latter is responsible for the issue of all UNK staff by, including services required by the UNK, and that the UNK Representative will not have to seek the Italian Government's consent for any further agreement which may be required and above that provided by you. Alternatively the UNK Representative and the Italian Government will have been previously notified for their benefit.

5. It is necessary you will explain the UNK representative with the fact that as under the UNK Agreement to the Advisory Council are not responsible to the Italian Government under the UNK Agreement and the Advisory Council was set up under the UNK Agreement, but under the UNK Agreement of Oct 1951.

6. You are also directed to report the outcome of any discussion you may have with the UNK Representative on the above lines for onward transmission to the Combined Chiefs of Staff in order that the matter may be considered by them in relation to the question of obtaining agreement for delegation to control operations in ex-occupied states.
