FIRST MEETING OF C.I.O. PIEMONTE REGION WITH
PREFECTS OF ASTI, ALESSANDRIA, CUNEO, NOVARA, VERCELLI AND TORINO PROVINCES
AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE COUNCIL OF VALLE DA AOSTA AND THE RESPECTIVE QUESTORS
ON 1st FEBRUARY 1948 AT TORINO.

The C.I.O. welcomed all present and stressed that the meeting aimed at ensuring firstly that all members present may thus get to know each other well, and secondly to discuss round the table questions of importance regarding governmental matters.

This is the first meeting of its kind since handing over of territories to the Italian government, and it appears that governmental authorities have carried on well although problems are still many and great. It, Col. Green and the Questors retired during the meeting to hold a conference of their own regarding public safety matters.

The first speaker was the Prefect of Turin. He first stressed the goodwill that had been shown by C.I.O. towards the Italian authorities, which will not be forgotten. On the whole, the situation in Turin is fair and satisfactory, with complete harmony among all parties; and any future troubles will not be of a political but of economic nature. The only matter which may disturb the tranquillity is the food position. Flour stocks are only sufficient to cover demands up to 22nd of February and it is not known when future supplies will arrive. Distribution however will go through the normal channels. The meat position appears to be the same as in all other provinces. Livestock is increasing, but slowly. If stocks had been put into cold storage, as was originally suggested, the present supplies which are fairly satisfactorily would have decreased and prices would have risen. As it is sold through municipal stores it is carefully rationed and shortage appears improbable, although butchers asked for and received supplies which had originally been scheduled for distribution in February. Sugar is in short supply and carefully rationed. Distribution was facilitated through additional UNRRA supplies; also through deliveries received from a committee in Switzerland for distribution to children. With regard to rice and pasta, assignments only appear on paper and have not been fully received. A cable from Rome urged a reduction to 500 grams per person per month; but the Prefect stated that he would have been only too happy if this amount was available. Plans are being discussed in Rome for a more regular distribution of rice. The milk position has not been bad and wholesalers and distributors now seem to be in agreement after previous discussion among each other. However, as producers were, in the habit of serving their own clients direct, a Commissioner was appointed for the amassing of milk on a bigger scale and it is hoped to have milk for everybody in the future. Evaporated and powdered milk is held in reserve to ease the position. Other feedstuffs are not rationed and are satisfactorily sold in the open market without any apparent shortage.

Industries. There are at present going through a crisis owing to shortage of material and coal. Fortunately many industrialists, who subcontracted for the Germans, managed to hide materials at the time and are now able to continue with what they have left. But it is certain that coal must be brought in by the Allies to ensure a regular program for the future. Papers have stated that Fiat works may have to close down for approximately 10 days thus throwing 200,000

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There are at present going through a crisis owing to shortage of material and coal. Fortunately many industries, who subcontracted for the Germans, managed to hide materials at the time and are now able to continue with what they have left. But it is certain that coal must be brought in by the Allies to ensure a regular program for the future. Papers have stated that Fiat works may have to close down for approximately 10 days thus throwing 200,000 workers on the dole. The Italian Government has given orders to deliver to Turin 20 to 30 car loads of coal per day, and it is understood that 25 shiploads of coal are on their way to Italy, 3 already being unloaded at Genoa partly destined for Piemonte. The electricity position is grave. According to a report by the SIP chief engineer lack of rain during the summer and the present high consumption have caused the dilemma. There is at present little water reserve for the hydroelectric plants and the next 40 to 50 days, until the thaw sets in, will present a difficult problem. Improvement will not take place before early April. Stronger rationing measures will have to be adopted otherwise industry cannot carry on. However, as this region partly supplies Emilia and Toscana with electricity, the latter two may draw their supplies from the Apennine plants leaving none for Piemonte.

The electricity rationing has already caused shorter working hours, but to make good the loss in Rome has agreed to compensate workers for their loss. 5% will have to be calculated on the 5th of February, to be increased to 8% at the later date. In order to employ these people a Public Works program is being devised

which provides for the construction of bridges and roads. In the construction industry there is slight agitation among workers. At present there is a strike involving 3000 men. The Prefect has had a meeting with employers and has pointed out that if this strike is not satisfactorily concluded at the earliest possible date there is the danger of workers, especially skilled ones, drifting over the frontier to France where higher wages are paid for such work. Elements thereby losing its skilled working potential. It is hoped the question will be satisfactorily settled within the next few days. With regard to bids for Public Works contractors have often bid on a low basis then the minimum laid down by the State, thus finding themselves in financial trouble at the conclusion of the contract. In future such offenders will be excluded from bidding.

Prefect of Asti. Food position is satisfactory, and political activities normal. There is sufficient grain amassed to last to the end of March, although supplies have been made to other Provinces. Supplies of meat are in storage for distribution in March 250 - 300 c.kg. pig farming is satisfactory and there is sufficientlard for distribution. The Rice and Pasta problem is the same as in Turin Province. Milk is also in good supply, thanks to deliveries from Cuneo Province, with evaporated and powdered milk in reserve. UNRA has also contributed with supplies. There is practically no unemployment with only the Comune of Canelli making an exception; but the trouble will shortly be removed.

The only problem in Asti Province is the freight transport question. It is laid down that freight cannot be carried over 50 Km in road transport. As the railways are not working all freight has to be carried in trucks, which involves big distances. The freight regulations are therefore causing hardship especially to the wine industry.

With regard to the Construction Industry the same applies, as in Torino Province.

Prefect of ALESSANDRIA. Problems are similar to those in Turin. The main worry is the preparation of electoral lists. Alessandria, Cuneo and Asti form certain zones under the supervision of a special Prefect, sent from Rome. It was planned to hold the elections early, but in the last 2 months there was a marked lack of efficiency on the part of those working on the lists. Lately the position has improved and 163 out of 164 communes will hold their elections in Alessandria Province except in April. Three separate zones will hold elections on the 17th, 24th and 31st March respectively, and sufficient Public Safety assistance will be given. The Prefect gave a lot of details regarding the work and arrangements for the elections.

The food position is similar to Turin and Asti. The flour question, however, is critical, and out of a necessary 375000 quintals only 275000 have been amassed. Hopes are based on US grain shipments of which 6000 quintals being unloaded at Genoa are assigned for Alessandria. The situation has been aggravated through faked ration cards. The forgery was only discovered after bakers presented them against real supplies. It is assumed that 2000 to 3000 quintals of flour have thus been illegally obtained. Another matter which added to the dilemma is that the population have been using their ration cards in advance up to the end of February and additional ones had to be printed owing to hardship in the near future. Matters are now well under control again and no advance rations are allowed.

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The unemployment question is not serious and although there are approx 7000 unemployed, an occasional strikes occur, partisans and others behave well. Unemployment benefit contributions used to be borne by employers only until AMG issued instructions that part should be paid by workers, the advantage of the workers. This order was later suspended by the Italian authorities to the advantage of the workers. After the November increase of wages however, the AMG order was re-introduced and it appears that workers are now much dissatisfied with this decision. Workers' contributions are therefore being suspended for the time being until decision has been reached in discussions being held at Milan at present.

Province of CUNEO The general position is much the same as in other Provinces except for the Partisans' and ex-Internos question. Cuneo Provinces used to have more Partisan activity than the other Provinces with the result that reprisals by the Germans have caused many homeless people and breaking up of families.

Public Welfare is there is the most important question. Includes the urgent need of reconstruction of hundreds of homes, a very difficult matter at present in view of the snow and general weather conditions. The matter is further aggravated by the fact that the Italian Government promised compensation for damages sustained by ordinary warfare. This however does not include damages caused by German reprisals against partisans. In other words people who actively took part in the struggle against the Nazis are now actually worse off with regard to compensation than those who merely looked on. An appeal has been made to the Italian Government for payment of damages to those unfortunate. Curzon province also had many soldiers fighting against Russia and it is known that these Italian divisions were partly wiped out. Therefore a great number of fatherless children and orphans (roughly twice as many as in other provinces) add to this strain on Public Welfare.

The food position is similar to that in other Provinces. Normally grain supplies are sufficient, but this year quantities had to be imported. There are at present stocks sufficient for only one week's consumption in the warehouses. Here again Great hopes are based on grain arrivals from USA. The population has been using ration cards ahead of time and flour has now to be refused to those who have used up their rations. For the future it is ensured that rations are being issued on a daily scale.

The electoral lists are in order and elections will be held by end of March/early April. This only can be done of course if roads are clear of snow etc.

Prefect of NOVARA
The present situation is good, but may become worse through the difficult food question which faces the Province in the future, and through the future conditions of the workers. Farmers are not showing much cooperation and flour stocks in the warehouses will not last beyond 12 February. Although Novara is a big rice producer it has not sufficient for its own demands; this is partly caused by the fact that prices obtainable in Lombardia and Liguria are 200 lire per qtl in excess of prices prevailing in Novara Province. Cats are practically nonexistent and with regard to reserves of condensed and powdered milk the Prefect stated that he had received no authority from the Allies for distribution. On the contrary he received orders to send certain quantities to Verocelli Province which naturally worsened the position. The Regional Food Officer stated that the Prefect probably misinterpreted the fact that fresh milk issues can always be supplemented by evaporated and powdered milk in cases of need, without special authority from the Allies.

The unemployment question is grave, mainly caused by the lack of coal supplies and energy. A part of the latter is supplied to Tescana with the result that Novara has not sufficient left for itself. Factories had to close down because too much electricity had been consumed, and unemployment increased. It is feared that another factory employing 1500 men will have to close down this week.

Prefect of VERCELLI
The general outlook is quite fair. 120 communes out of 169 have got their electoral lists already prepared. There is practically no unemployment and the food position is similar to that of the other Provinces. Amassing of rice has only produced 700000 qtls against a necessary 1,700,000. Stocks of grain in the warehouses are sufficient to cover needs up to the end of February.

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Industry is seeking for an outlet for its goods, especially woollen materials of which there is a stock of 16 billions lire value. In this connection an appeal made at the end of the meeting by the Prefect of Turin is mentioned. It concerns the high productive potential of the North Italian industries, who in the past did a flourishing export trade especially with their neighbouring countries. There is at present a great surplus of goods, especially woollen materials for which the domestic market is insufficient. It would be greatly appreciated if the Allied authorities could contribute towards disposal of these stocks by facilitating exports regulations. Colonel Jordan promised to broach the matter on his next visit to Rome and pointed out that he had recently listened to a radio broadcast in which unrestricted exchange of goods between Italy and USA was urged.

This surplus of goods, especially woollen materials, in Northern Italy appears rather abnormal, if one considers the real shortage that still prevails in the South of the country. A more regular distribution for the needs of the entire Italian domestic market may open up better prospects for the disposal of such goods than could be achieved through exports to countries which are still all labouring under the export licensing and quota regulations which practically no money for imports. The North Italian industries probably hope for better prices when exporting their goods, which of course is an unfair attitude towards the needy Italian population.

Council of Valle d'Aosta. Problems are very much the same as in other Provinces, but additional difficulties occur as it is the first time that separate autonomy has been tried out. Four main points require careful attention:

- (1) Organization of the administration.
- (2) Substitution and creation of offices.
- (3) Introduction of the decree of 7th September 45 and other legislative decrees.
- (4) Submission of proposals to the council in regard to elections.

The population is becoming more attached to this new experience although it has not yet given its approval, but it appears that since the creation of the autonomy the individual is becoming a more active member of the community. Hope is generally expressed that success will crown the new venture. Further details can be obtained on request. Public Safety is well under control and trouble in the future is not expected. Partisans, ex-internees, do not present a problem. Absorption of any unemployed in the future is hoped to be achieved by extensive public works programs (in collaboration with Cogne S.A.), which included irrigation canals. This question is graver than in other Provinces owing to Aosta's high altitude.

With regard to the food position there is a grave shortage of sugar and fats. Fortunately quantities of rice and grain have not only been received from other provinces but also from USA and there are sufficient stocks for the moment. Shortage of coal is affecting industrial activities. Although elections lists were suppressed by the fascists it is hoped to have the communal lists reestablished by the first of March so that elections may be held in May.

Captain Perry (Food Division) stated that since 31 Dec 45 all food matters had been in the hands of the Italian Government, with him in the capacity of an observer only. One of the difficulties appears to be the lack of clear statements from Rome on policy regarding the Aosta. Instructions were given to utilize stocks in accordance with ration scales, and it appears that the Region is now better off than it was under AMG jurisdiction, when available grain stocks were usually sufficient for 3 to 7 days only. There is also assistance from INRGA supplies, where nearly the whole shipment programme from USA consists of grain. It is important that distribution of grain is made through the prescribed channels, viz. from the Ispettor Generale at Rome through the Ispettor Alimentazione to the local Sopral. Only in this manner can supplies be guaranteed. There is always a shortage of fats, and with regard to Rice the Ente Risi has had complete control since 24 Dec 45. A regular ration of 200 gr of Sugar p.m. was anticipated, but the December issue arrived too late for regular distribution and no statement has been received from the Federazione since 10 Dec 45. The present stocks exist only because ration scales were strictly observed in the past.

C. L. JONAS, CLO, added a few words regarding electricity supplies for the region so says that life ahead. He has had many conferences with the various Prefects, and it is essential that strict economy of consumption is observed. AC is doing all in its power to bring coal supplies to Piedmont so that a continued flow of energy may be assured.

A suggestion for another meeting in a month's time was adopted, and the exact date will be notified later.

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Col. JOHANN, GIC, added a few words regarding electricity supplies for the Prefects, and it is essential that strict economy of consumption is observed. AC is doing all in its power to bring coal supplies to Piemonte so that a continued flow of energy may be ensured.

1. Reasons for Plan

The Executive Commissioner opened by saying that he regretted, from the personnel aspect above all, that the plan they had come to discuss was to do with the fold-up of Regions which had done such a good job. He had not mentioned this plan last week when he was up here in the North as it was then in the uncertain stage and he had not had an opportunity of discussing it with the Economic Section. The reasons for the plan were two-fold:-

- a) The time had come to look ahead and prepare for the hand-over, and he felt that if the change was to be beneficial from the administrative point of view it had better come at once. The scheme was to make the best use of limited personnel available and it was the opinion that the maintenance of 3 HQs instead of 1 was a waste of personnel. AFHQ had been pressing to keep VANUZIA GIULIA and UDINE PROVINCE at full strength, and every man who could be spared from the new set up would be sent to VANUZIA GIULIA.
- b) One HQ was by far the best solution from the Economic Section point of view at the present time, and now was the best time to make such a change. Mr. Cleveland, however, would explain later the Economic point of view.

The scheme was the following:-

The scheme was the following:-

- a) The Office of the Chief Commissioner and Economic Group (Milan Office of the Allied Commission) was to be dissolved, and whatever might be the reactions of those present to what followed, there was no going back on this decision, which was final. The work, and some of the Officers, would be absorbed into HQ LOMBARDIA Region.
- b) LIGURIA and PIEMONTE Regional HQs were to be dissolved and the matters affecting these Regions would be handled by 2 Deputy Regional Commissioners whose offices would be at HQ in MILAN. A PC and FPSO, and possibly a CAO, would be left in each Province. There might have to be an realignment of some of the Provinces. Heads of the Economic Section would be attached to PCs of INOA, TURIN and SAVONA.

The PC LOMBARDIA would have three deputies, and the administrative staff to look after the three Regions would be

in one office in MILAN.

As the NIIC (CIAI) was in MILAN it was wise that centralisation on our side should be in MILAN. NIIC could then be supervised from one place.

Difficulties of communication with certain PCs would be overcome by D/PCs being mobile. The Officers and members of the Economic side would also be mobile.

The plan would mean a better centralised policy for time of hand-over. He was still without news as to when this was to take place, but he was now in a position to say that when it did take place BOLZANO would be returned with the whole of N. Italy (except, of course, the VALLE D'AOSTA area). He referred these points to the recent BEVIN statement which had appeared in the press, and which made him hope that the hand-over would take place before the end of the year, though there were possible hindrances.

The present change was in preparation for the setting up of the Eisen groups. VANZINI LIGION was NOT being brought into the plan from PC LOBBERIA on Economic matters. Their anxiety was to get on with the Economic side of the business as here, through no fault of anybody's, had not been a success. The present plan was similar to the one put into effect prior to the hand-over in the SCUI, where such a scheme had proved its value. At this point he asked Mr. Cleveland to illustrate the plan from the Economic point of view.

Mr. Harlan Cleveland began by saying that they had to look at the situation on the basis of WASHINGTON and LONDON considerations rather than local ones.

The basis of their economic policy was now clearly that of the Economic time schedule. 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The basis of their economic policy was now clearly that of the economic time schedule. PC LOMBARDIA began by observing that MILAN had always formed the apex of the triangle MILAN-GENOVA-TURIN, and that everything centred on MILAN. Add a few more Provinces to LOMBARDIA Region HQ and you would get more uniformity of policy. It was necessary to work through your key Italian officials, whilst a good PC would always keep you well informed of local trends.

On the economic side NICO was in MILAN and we should follow the Italian pattern. There had been no proper industrial plan as to what industry was to produce. We must decide what ITALY must manufacture for its internal economy and what for its export trade. Stagnant labour and inoperative machinery must be put to work in the general interest of Europe. He also pointed out how industries in other Regions, such as the woollen industry which was centred at Biella and Vicenza and their Association Offices in MILAN. For all these reasons he felt that the argument was strong enough for the centralisation of everything in MILAN.

19.

PO PLACENTA observed that his Region viewed with suspicion and dissatisfaction the Committees which had been set up in MILAN.

There followed a discussion as to the weakness of CMI, which it was agreed was an emergency organisation.

20.

Decision.

Summing up the discussion the Executive Commissioner suggested, and it was agreed, that the present set-up should be maintained (except that MILAN HQ should be absorbed into LOMBARDIA Region). PO Lombardia would now be the head for all economic matters in NW ITALY, and that the head of the economic side of LOMBARDIA Region would be the top representative of all the Regional Economic Groups. PC would have an Economic Staff Officer to coordinate the various branches.

LOMBARDIA Region would look after domestic transportation of all the Regions and would have to arrange for a more even distribution of vehicles. PCs were invited to turn in all their non-runners so that they could be issued with replacements. A British and US G-4 would be sent to MILAN to deal with transportation problems and obtain a uniform policy.

On the economic side copies of correspondence would be sent only to MILAN HQ, and specialist officers would take action only on instructions from MILAN HQ, though at times it would be left to the discretion of IOs for independent action to be taken. It was agreed that the same policy would apply to WAB, who would come under the economic section.

A title for IO LOMBARDIA would have to be found in connection with economic section.

Other matters.

The occasion was seized to discuss a few other matters, some of which had been touched upon by IOs in the morning before the arrival of the Executive Commissioner.

a) Receivers (Commissari Stordinar) - Executive Commissioner promised to take up with Civil Affairs Section the question as to whether we should now hand these over to Prefects, and in what manner.

b) Electric Power - owing to serious situation in power supply IC LOMBARDIA announced that he had just signed a Decree severely limiting use of electricity as from Monday next, Nov 26. The decree had been drawn up after consultation with all concerned including 2 Dist Engineers, and it would affect all NW ITALY. 13 Corps area also involved. FC VENEZIA promised to look into the question in his area and that of 13 Corps.

c) Gaming Houses - IC LOMBARDIA pointed out that he had followed the policy, supported by Headquarters, of not allowing any gaming houses to be opened in his area (COMIGRA was an exception), but that his position was weakened by the opening of gaming houses in other regions, i.e. SAN RAFAEL, 3430466100 and the LIDO VENEZIA. His experience was that these places attracted the worst type of person, and he felt that if the home press gave publicity to them, there would be a bad repercussion both in the USA and in ENGLAND while so much aid for Italy is being invoked. He asked for uniform policy.

FC LOMBARDIA stated that SAN RAFAEL was not yet open. He did not feel so strongly about gaming houses, and pointed out that so far as his Region was concerned their opening would relieve the unemployment situation since they attracted tourists and tourists meant opening of hotels and employment of hotel staffs.

FC PIAACENTIA had no knowledge of the opening of a gaming house at STALIA, but promised to investigate.

FC VENEZIA stated that he had obtained authority even from the Italian Government for the opening of the Casino at the LIDO. The local authorities had all been in favour and there had not been many protests. VENEZIA was in a bad financial situation and this was a way of remedying it.

Executive Commissioner suggested that applications for the opening of Gaming Houses should be put off until the Italian Government took over.

d) PCs reported that most of their non-career Prefects originally put in by the CLN had done extremely well, but that many were now anxious to return to their jobs because they were finding the work too heavy, especially as most of them were not men with any local government experience. PC VENEZIA stressed the need now of having career prefects, but NOT Southerners.

CLNs were still enjoying their privileges, especially local CLNs. PC LIQUORI reported having discovered that in CAMBR the CLN had been levying a 2 lire tax on all telegrams. PCs agreed that they had outlived their usefulness and were now a hindrance to the administration.

SUBJECT : Conference for imports into Switzerland.

TO : G-5, A.F.H.Q.

1. On 29th and 30th June 1945 a conference was held at Berne, Switzerland, between representatives of Allied Force Headquarters, and Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, and representatives of the Swiss Federal Council.

2. The subjects discussed were :-

- (a) Repatriation of displaced persons from and through Switzerland.
- (b) Allied Military movement through Switzerland
- (c) Resumption of Swiss import and export traffic through Italy and the ports of Genoa and Savona.

In addition, the Swiss authorities asked that urgent consideration be given by the Allies to the following points :-

- (a) The relaxation of the present ban on the movement of Swiss nationals by road and rail between Italy and Switzerland. The Swiss Government could not take the responsibility of admitting Allied military movement through Switzerland while the border remains closed for the passage of its own civilians.
- (b) The resumption of direct postal facilities between Switzerland and Italy.

3. Brigadier A.T. de Rhe Philippe, D.Q.M.G. (Mov & Tr) represented A.F.H.Q. at this conference.

4. I understand that the question of resumption of essential imports into Switzerland through the ports of Genoa and Savona, thence by rail, has been raised by the Swiss Federal Council on the highest diplomatic level through the Foreign Office in London.

5. In order that satisfactory decisions may be reached on all questions, and as it is apparent that the decision must be a diplomatic one, it is requested that an early conference be called by you with diplomatic representatives of the Governments concerned. These representatives should be empowered to take final decisions at the proposed conference.

6. Will you please advise me of your decision in this matter.

It is not yet known whether he will be attached to Rome Area Allied Command as Signals Liaison Officer, or whether he will be transferred to the Allied Commission. HQ AMG Lazio-Umbria Region will inform Rome Area Allied Command when a decision is known.

Electricity

14. A civilian electricity commission has been set up which will screen civilian demands.

15. This Commission will also arrange running schedules for tramways and railways under CRE's direction.

16. The Electricity Companies will apply for petrol, etc, to the Chamber of Commerce and for tyres to the Prefect.

Medical

17. The changeover has been discussed by the Medical Branches concerned and no difficulties are anticipated.

Accommodation, Quartering and Requisitioning

18. Rome Area Allied Command deal principally with the Sindaco or his representative. Any requisition affecting monuments, museums, etc, would be referred to the Ministero. For details see Sub-Commission AG.

Signal Communications

13. No difficulty is anticipated since Major Hawke is remaining in Rome for the present. It is not yet known whether he will be attached to Rome Area Allied Command as Signals Liaison Officer, or whether he will be transferred to the Allied Commission. HQ AMG Lazio-Umbria Region will inform Rome Area Allied Command when a decision is known.

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Medical

17. The changeover has been discussed by the Medical Branches concerned and no difficulties are anticipated.

Accommodation, Quartering and Requisitioning

18. Rome Area Allied Command deal principally with the Sindaco or his representative. Any requisition affecting monuments, museums, etc, would be referred to Monuments, Fine Arts & Archives Sub-Commission AC.

19. Comparatively few schools have been requisitioned by the Military, but are chiefly occupied by refugees and political parties. Since it is not anticipated that military requirements in this respect will increase no problem is envisaged.

Requisitioning of essential town buildings and experimental institutes etc, and encroachments and damage during military exercises

20. Rome Area Allied Command will deal with applications for the derequisition of property. HQ AMG Lazio-Umbria Region will arrange for claims in connection with damage arising from military exercises to be referred to Genio Militare.

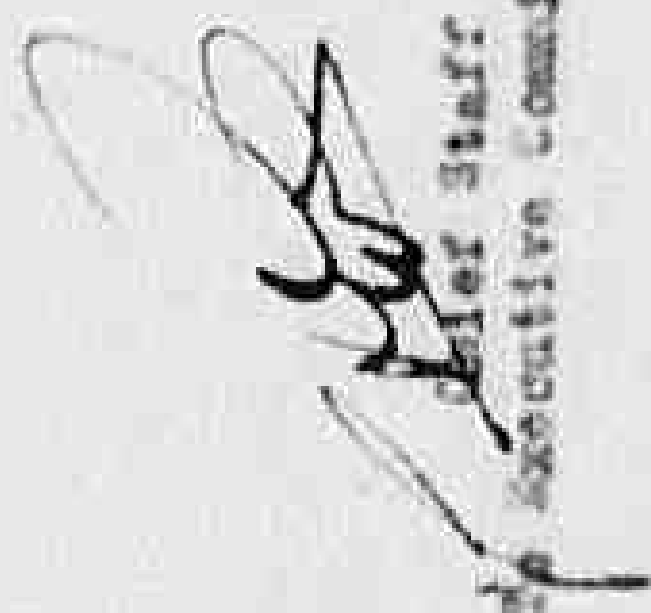

1. CONGRATULATIONS

The Regional Commissioner congratulated those American officers who had recently received promotion.

2. GENERAL POLICY

The Regional Commissioner asked Heads of Sections to read the full report of the Rt. Hon. Harold Macmillan's speech to the press to be circulated shortly. This was a most important statement of future policy.

3. OLIVE OIL CAMPAIGN

The Regional Commissioner drew the attention of Heads of Sections to the directive which he had issued on the renewed olive oil marketing campaign (ref R/MS of 20 January). Lt. Col. Hershenson had been appointed Staff Officer in charge of the coordination of the general policy of the campaign in Southern Region, and Signor Patrissi was the representative of the Italian Government.

The Regional Legal Officer pointed out that Italian courts were already in a highly congested condition and that if large numbers of prosecutions under the olive oil drive were to be added to their work, they would either be unable to cope with them at all or at best very slowly. The Regional Commissioner agreed to take this and the question of suitable sentences up with H.Q. A.C.

The Regional Labour Officer asked whether the Italian officials concerned would come under the terms of the threatened strike in Bari.

Hershenson had been appointed Staff Officer in charge of the coordination of the general policy of the campaign in Southern Region, and Signor Patrissi was the representative of the Italian Government.

The Regional Legal Officer pointed out that Italian courts were already in a highly congested condition and that if large numbers of prosecutions under the olive oil drive were to be added to their work, they would either be unable to cope with them at all or at best very slowly. The Regional Commissioner agreed to take this and the question of suitable sentences up with H.Q. A.C.

The Regional Labour Officer asked whether the Italian officials concerned would come under the terms of the threatened strike in Bari.

4. STRIKES

The Regional Commissioner gave details of the mass meeting of steel and parastatal employees which was held in Bari on 5th January. As a result of this meeting, a commission had left on 11th January for Rome to set the grievances of the workers before the Government. A further meeting would be held in Bari on 25 January when the commission returned. The Regional Commissioner said that he had represented to Rome in no uncertain terms the seriousness of the situation and was waiting for a declaration of a policy from H.Q. A.C. as to what action was to be taken by Southern Region should a general strike occur.

5. STAFF ORGANISATION

The Regional Commissioner said that Staff reorganisation had ²⁰¹

so far not been imp. wanted in full owing to the non-arrival of an officer to take over the Secretariat. He hoped that this officer would arrive shortly.

6. MONTHLY REPORT

The monthly report was in course of preparation. It was slightly altered in form, as Part I would now consist of a resume' written by the Regional Commissioner which would go to London and Washington. Part II, containing more detailed reports, would go as before, to A.S. H.Q.

7. COMMUNICATIONS

The Regional Commissioner said that during the first winter that Southern Region had operated as a whole, it was the responsibility of this H.Q. to ensure that communications were maintained with the Zones. Every officer would check that documents originated by him, reached their destination safely. The Executive Officer and the Transportation Section would in turn, a scheme for the organization of a rail courier service to the outlying zones to replace motor courier. He asked all officers to keep both the Intelligence Officer and the P.W.U. informed of any details regarding road conditions, broken bridges, etc. which came to their knowledge.

8. TRANSPORTATION

The Regional Commissioner discussed the reorganization of the Transportation Sub-Commission. This branch would continue to be responsible for all motor maintenance and repairs, while G-4 would maintain records and procure spare parts and supplies.

He had hoped that there were a number of tyres available in Rome and informed the Agriculture Section that, if any were required in connection with the olive oil campaign, they would receive a high priority.

9. OFFICE HOURS

The Regional Commissioner stated that, as from week commencing 15th January, this H.Q. would be closed on Sundays, except for a duty officer and clerk. A normal six day week would be worked by all staff. The Regional Commissioner, the Executive Officer, or staff superior officer would be available for major decisions on Sunday.

The Regional Commissioner said that during the first winter that Southern Region had operated as a whole, it was the responsibility of this H.Q. to ensure that communications were maintained with the Zones. Every officer would check that documents originated by him, reached their destination safely. The A/Executive Officer and the Transportation Section would prepare a scheme for the organization of a rail courier service to the outlying zones to replace motor courier. He asked all officers to keep both the Intelligence Officer and the P.W.U. informed of any details regarding road conditions, broken bridges, etc. which came to their knowledge.

8. TRANSPORTATION

The Regional Commissioner dismissed the reorganization of the Transportation Sub Commission. This branch would continue to be responsible for all motor maintenance and repairs, while G-4 would maintain records and procure spare parts and supplies.

He had heard that there were a number of tyres available in Rome and informed the Agriculture Section that, if any were required in connection with the olive oil campaign, they would receive a high priority.

9. OFFICE HOURS

The Regional Commissioner stated that, as from week commencing 17th January, this H.Q. would be closed on Sundays, except for a duty officer and clerk. A normal six day week would be worked by all staff. The Regional Commissioner, the Executive Officer, or staff senior officer would be available for major decisions on Sunday.

H.E.F. 28th January, office hours would be from 0830 hours to 1730 hours, with one hour off for lunch.

10. NESSIMI ATTACHEMENTS

It was generally agreed that, once the new Public Safety Mess was open, all pending attachments, both American and British would be satisfactory.

11. ITALIAN LESSONS

The Regional Commissioner drew the attention of all officers to the recent letter from H.E.F. regarding officers learning Italian. He stressed the importance of this and mentioned the great potential

danger of officers also were to rely too much on their interpreters. He said, that if interpreters were used, officers should use more than one and change them frequently.

24. The following points were then raised by Section Heads and Zone Commissioners.

FINANCE

Lt Col. Battarby asked that H.Q. A.C. might be approached to reconsider their decision that the Allies could give no financial assistance in Southern Region outside of Naples Germany. The Regional Commissioner agreed to represent these views to A.C.

SAFETY

Extract from Southern Region letter R/4000 of 17 Dec 44.

"I have read with great care Lt Col White's notes of our meeting and I wish that they were a most excellent record of what took place. There are only two points upon which I should like to make comment.

a) Paragraph 1 (c) might, I think, be worded somewhat differently.

I suggest: "The basis of the transfer of work and responsibility to Italian hands should be the transfer to properly organized Italian administrative machinery outside our own office. It should not mean a further Italianization within our own organization. It should be made clear that when we passed over the work to Italian channels, we also passed over the responsibility for the proper fulfillment of the work".

b) Para 5 (e) might be omitted. Further investigation after the conference showed that, in fact, very few civilian vehicles had been stopped by the "safe driving" patrols."

Infant Mortality. Col. Nylon was visited and he reported that on the change over from powdered to pasteurized milk the infant mortality rate had gone up. In one instance, out of 14 babies, 3 had died. He had that morning, as a matter of fact, had a courtesy visit from a Sub. A. Captain, JTB, who was on a private visit to Naples. She was a division on the strength of Colonel Nylon's, but was working temporarily with Colonel Nylon's. He had a house and a mother with her and she expressed the opinion that powdered milk was quite suitable for babies if properly mixed. He earnestly desired the verities possible attachment of Sub. A. Captain for not more than two weeks, to conduct an investigation on the babies' diet, to demonstrate her to prepare the powdered milk and to start a center of instruction at one of the hospitals where nurses from other hospitals could come for instruction. Col. Nylon very much hoped that this could be arranged quickly.

Ambulances. Every single ambulance at his disposal was broken down. He was to handle cases to be transferred in ambulances but borrowed trucks. As far as ambulances were concerned, the need for ambulances was particularly serious. He was forced to leave ambulances even three or four days in their hands before they could be moved and it just meant that a local epidemic started for every case.

Medical Service.

Clerical work. Naples as a chief post of exit was simply swamped with cases. Applicants literally queued up for 2 days before the boats sailed. There was no time to send the forms to AMI as instructed. One officer (Fineman) had written 100 papers dispatched on an boat to terminate movement in this country of abductions from AMI to which they were entitled.

Welfare inquiries were taking an unreasonable amount of time.

It was not appreciated how much clerical work was required. The monthly report on all heads which they were asked to report data to began. In addition they were required to take a return of certain particulars such as forged banknotes. This meant they had to go to report and the preparation of the Appendix alone took ten weeks. It was essential that paper work should be reduced if a smaller staff was to carry on.

Liaison. The military authorities in general were still too ignorant of the duties and functions of Allied Commission. They had attended lectures and refresher courses were appreciation of these lectures and had a far better understanding of what cooperation and assistance they could look for. It was considered that such work would be extended.

LEGAL.

Legal was visited but had no documents.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

It was most important that Mancini, the Vice Prefect of Salerno who had been ordered to Salerno should remain in Salerno until the arrival of the new Prefect.

has reviewed in broad terms the general outline of their approach. This outline, which is tentative and primarily so, reflects priority allocation. The Italian Government lacks, however, two fundamental facts to establish the total cost picture: (1) the price of goods in Italy, and (2) the price of goods in the rest of the world. Their tentative outline establishes priority allocation in this fashion:

- 1 - Transport
- 2 - Equipment for the Rehabilitation of Electric Power
- 3 - Fertilizers and Agricultural Equipment

industries that have productive capacity. (An example, in Sardinia, where the plants which have the facilities and power to start manufacturing the island itself, but which lack raw materials.)

They also said that they be called a "contingency reserve" out of which, for example, funds for taxation purposes (e.g. coffee) might be purchased.

The Minister says he will hand the detailed information to the Sub-Commission as to work on them with the experts to his office.

ADDENDUM: Should we set up within our visit as Sub-Commissioners a working party and request the Ministers to set up a counter part within the Government?

(This arrangement proposed by the Sub-Commission represent a very different.)

ANTHONY: I explained our operating plan to set up a working party within each Sub-Commission and requested the Italian Government to do likewise. They have agreed. They have raised a question as to whether the working party should be large or small?

(Sub-Commission representatives agreed that working party should have 3 members on each side.)

Messrs. Berlusconi and Sciascia have been designated as Coordinators on the Italian side. On the AC side, coordination will be effected through the Economic Section, which will aid in coordinating the program in terms of end-products.

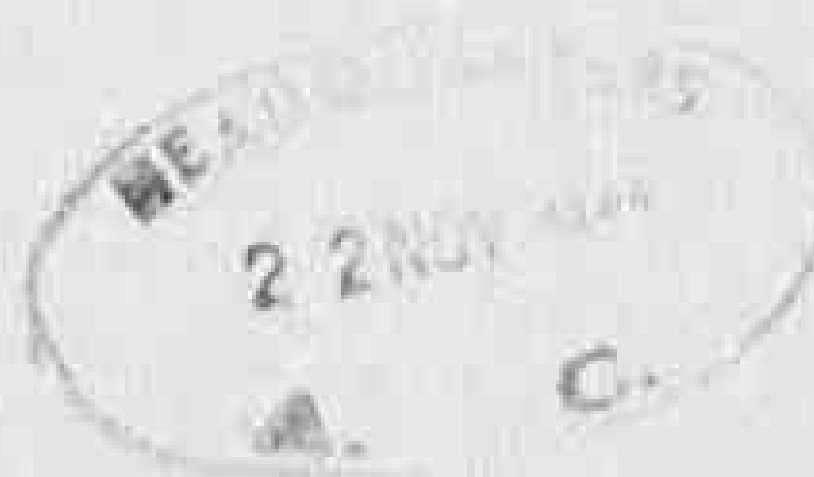

1. CHANNELS OF COMMAND: The Regional Commissioner referred to the new Headquarters Allied Commission directive on the channels of command. . . except for purely technical matters all communications in the future would pass from the Chief of Staff through the Regional Commissioner to the Zone Commissioners. In addition, the Chief of Staff had recently ruled that the Regional Commissioner would be responsible for the discipline of all Allied Commission Officers in the Region and for the supervision and control of their work and a Regional Directive to this effect had been issued. Zone Commissioners must remember that the purpose of the Directive was to help Allied Commission officers whose tasks had been set by HQ AC but whose work lay within the Region; they were from now on to be members of the Regional Team.
2. FOOD: In the early days the main problem was to get food, in whatever quantities available, to the local inhabitants. In these later days, the problem is to coordinate the distribution of food throughout Italy. The time has come when ration scales must be closely adhered to. Zone Commissioners should keep an eye on this.
3. OLIVE OIL CONTROL OFFICERS: The response for volunteers as Olive Oil Control Officers had been below requirements. If Zone Commissioners could obtain volunteers from local Departments (by agreement with Commanding Officers), so much the better.
4. TRANSPORTATION: The Southern Region scheme for an Italy-wide control of transport had been submitted to the Italian Government with a recommendation. If and when the scheme came into force, Zone Commissioner should put AC drive behind it. Proper control of transport would go a long way towards solving many of Italy's problems.
5. ENAC: The Regional Transport Officer announced that the ENAC scheme would be in force before the end of the current month. He reported that additional Allied personnel were expected to be posted to the Region to assist in maintenance; some tires had arrived but, they did not fit WD vehicles, they would be sold to the Italians (The price of 25 for a second-hand tire was far too high but it was hoped to amend it).
6. LEGAL: As all efforts to stimulate the Italian Courts on the East Side into the proper exercise of their functions had failed, AMG Courts would shortly be authorized. HQ AC will supply the officers. There would be one permanent Court at BITONTO (B.A.D.) two in Bari, and a Mobile Court on circuit.
7. FINANCE: Zone Commissioners were urged to cable freely to Regional HQ whenever Allied interests were being prejudiced by lack of prompt financial action by the Italian Government.

8. ACC versus AC: The Regional Commissioner pointed out that ACC was only authorized to advise and not to control. Accordingly, the change from ACC to AC was largely a matter of sentiment. No doubt, Zone Commissioners would still be able to safeguard Allied interests by appro-

private "requests", when occasions arise. The Regional Commissioner foresaw that the functions of AC Officers would more and more become that of transmitting, through Region to Rome, particulars of all incidents in which the Italian Government failed to perform its essential minimum task - thus enabling HQ AC gradually to streamline the Italian Government into an efficient organization.

9. MONTHLY PROVINCIAL REPORTS: The uniform Monthly Reports from Provincial Authorities were generally welcomed. After some discussion it was decided to leave the present arrangement, whereby the reports run from the 21st of one month to the 20th of the next month, unless, on investigation, HQ sections considered another date would be much more convenient.

10. SALE OF WD EQUIPMENT TO ITALIANS: RPSO reported that no British Equipment had been sold officially to the Italians and that sales of American equipment had ceased in August. The defence that the possession of WD articles was legal because it had been authorized should therefore fail in the case of all British equipment, but would be tenable for American equipment. The sale, loan or issue of W.D. tires to civilians was discussed. At present the Issuing Units used a variety of forms of permit. A uniform printed permit should be issued throughout Italy, signed by the issuing unit and endorsed by Allied Commission. (For attention by P.S. Section).

11. BLACKOUT: The suggestion of the Italian Government that there should be a blackout throughout Italy from 2100 to 0500 hours was discussed. Such military commanders as had been consulted had mostly indicated that a blackout was quite unnecessary under the present circumstances, but had refused to assume responsibility in writing. It was agreed that this should be a question of policy to be settled by AFHQ who presumably alone knows the prospects of air-raids. (For attention by P.S. Section).

12. POWERS OF ITALIAN POLICE: The wide, but welcome, powers of Italian Police to deal with Allied Soldiers, as set out in a recent PS Sub-Commission letter, were discussed. It was agreed that it would be unwise to communicate these terms to the police or military commanders, until a similar directive had been transmitted to Military Commanders through military channels. (For attention by P.S. Section)

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13. GAS PLANTS: Col. HENGLIN stated that plans were in hand for reactivating the gas plants in Foggia and Canzanaro.

14. CIVILIAN AMBULANCES: The RPK pointed out the urgent need for civilian ambulances in the coming winter months. The HC asked ZO's to cooperate in urging the Prefects to requisition the necessary vehicles.

15. CLOTHING: The Regional Welfare Officer stated that clothing was expected from America and that he proposed arranging distribution through the Anti Communist Assistants who had functioned well in previous issues.

CONFIDENTIAL

16. REGIONAL COMMISSIONER'S DEPARTURE: The RC expressed his real regrets at leaving the Region when its tasks was but half done. He thanked all his officers for the remarkably quick way in which they had built themselves into a happy and cooperative Regional Team.
