At the above meeting stated were obtained and now can be obtained the current position.

Only one of our employees resides at the Colonna - Bellaria. Do tell, while she has not been there very long she is nevertheless a general center from Salerno. She is employed as Interpreter and copy typist and has given of her best at all times. It may be that several are more skilled.

If turned out of the Colonies and left to find their own accommodation at say the rate of £100 lire for a room alone as mentioned in Collo 19, with the cost of living so high, these 'old fishulls' may have no alternative but to return from whence they came.

To allow them to do so would appear to be ill reward for the services they have rendered beings who are the pioneer civilization! Servants of the God of love,

I share the view, for what it may be worth, that the very least the ~~Organization~~ can do by way of return for their services is to endeavour to overcome the alleged illegality of the Colonial requisition with a view to the retention of the services of the above employees until such time as the Headquarters is reduced in size and the services of certain civilian employees are unavoidably dispensed with.

MEMORANDUM:

TO : Colonel Parkin,

1. The accommodation situation in Milan is bad and rapidly getting worse. The Diana Hotel, space in which, until now has been made available to visiting personnel of HQ AG has been taken over by the Fifth Army and a number of AG officers have been asked to move out by tomorrow. Milan is crowded and there are currently in Milan and occupying space the following units:

- (a) HQ 4th Corps
- (b) 59 Area
- (c) 5th Army (also operating Hotel Nord as a transit hotel)
- (d) No. 2 District (which will move in shortly)

2. Lombardia Region, who have undertaken the billeting of visiting AG personnel, have been extremely cooperative and have made available all possible space in the Savoia which they occupy. However, as may be seen from the above, accommodations for visiting AG personnel are extremely limited. The situation is not aided, according to Lombardia Region, by visits, the purpose of which does not appear to be entirely official.

3. It is suggested most strongly that action be taken without delay to exercise strict control over all future travel to Milan by some such means as requiring that appropriate travel orders not to be issued until and unless the personnel performing the travel have received assurance from Milan that accommodations are available to them.

My dear Admiral Stone:

Count GASTANI D'ARAGONA, Director General of the Academies and libraries in the Ministry of Public Instruction, has written me a letter of which I enclose a translation, relative to the possibility of getting 3 or 4 rooms in the Allied Commission building for the ladies of the International Red Cross, who are being turned out of the palazzo Zuccari.

The palazzo Zuccari is being emptied to return to its former function as the home of the Hertziana Library recently returned to Rome from Germany. This library together with the library of the German Archaeological Institute has been entrusted by the Italian Government and the Allied Commission to the temporary custody of the International Union of Academies in Rome, of which I am President, as representative of the American Academy. At the last meeting of the Union he was instructed to take measures to return the Hertziana Library to its original home in the palazzo Zuccari, and it is in pursuance of this that the palazzo Zuccari is being vacated now by the International Red Cross.

I believe that the rooms occupied formerly by the Subcommission of Monuments and Fine Arts in the Allied Commission building are being vacated by the Subcommission or will soon be empty and I am writing to ask if it would be possible for 3 or 4 of these rooms to be placed at the disposal of the International Red Cross, which has great need of them for storage of clothing and other supplies. This action would be a great convenience to both the International Red Cross and the International Union, and as you see from Count d'Aragona's letter, it is also earnestly desired by the Library Section of the Ministry of Public Instruction.

I am told that, due to the continual demobilization of the Allied Commission H.Q. Offices, a few premises are already available in the building of the former Ministero delle Corporazioni.

In order to facilitate a prompt settlement of the Hertziana Library, I should be grateful to you if you would kindly apply to the competent Allied Authorities, in order that the two or three International Red Cross ladies who occupy a few rooms (three or four in all) formerly belonging to the Library, may soon find convenient space in the premises vacated by the A.C. H.Q. Offices. This way the problem of nationally arranging in their former place the important Hertziana book collections - still encased, with possible prejudice to their safe-keeping - would be in the way of solution.

I thank you for the interest you will give, with your proved kindness, to this question.

SUBJECT : Colonna Hotel

TO : Executive Commissioner

The above Hotel was requisitioned through R.A.A.C. when A.C. arrived in Rome. This Hotel was to be used to house the Italian Staff who came from a distance with A.C.

About a month ago R.A.A.C. Real Estate asked about this if it was possible to de-requisition, the reply from A.C. was to the effect that as portion was being used as quarters for married (A) EM this was not possible. Now other arrangements have been made for the married EM and the position in the Colonna is as follows:

Beds	80
ROOMS	53
"	11 occupied by Hotel Staff
"	40 occupied by Italian employed by A.C.
Beds	29 Beds not in use.

All the Staff of A.C. have been employed for at least one year. They have no homes in Rome and if they had to get accomodation in Rome would be unable to live on the present salary paid by us.

Now that other arrangements have been made for the married (A) EM I would suggest the Hotel be de-requisition except the accomodation for the 40 employees of A.C. As many of these people are female employees to ask them to find accomodation outside I consider would be a great hardship.

This Hotel is used also by A.C. Italian personnel in Transit.

I have made further inquiries into the question of transit accommodation at the Excelsior, and am sorry to say that the prospects of AC Officers, even of the rank of Colonel being accommodated there are not very bright.

As you know, the hotel has been earmarked by GHQ for the purpose of accommodating married families of that HQ, and they seem to think that very shortly the whole of the available accommodation will be required for that purpose. The allotment of accommodation is entirely in the hands of GHQ, and we have no voice in the matter.

What the situation will be when GHQ has gone I don't quite know, but the Excelsior may then become a transit hotel under our control, in which case the matter could be reconsidered.

In the meantime a certain amount of accommodation at the Vesuvio is reserved for the use of officers of the rank of Lt. Col. and above in transit, and officers of the A.C. are eligible to use this. I'm afraid, however, that we cannot take civilians there, and they will have to use the Patria.

In reply to your letter dated 21 Feb 46 about hotels.

It is a pity about the Boston; it is of course not a first class hotel and I know that the kitchens, etc., were not in a very good state.

I am afraid there would be difficulty about either Quirinale or the Regina.

The former of course is I think far larger than could be justified by your requirements having about 230 rooms and 340 beds, and has recently been released.

The latter was released several months ago and is now in full civilian practice, making, so I am told, very lucrative profits.

I presume a requisition would in my opinion provoke a very hostile reaction. (Incidentally, it would spoil a record of which I am proud, but that is not a decisive consideration). I would be very reluctant to advise it.

It is a great pity that we did not know at the outset the real reason for your request for the Majestic, which, you will remember, was originally asked for on quite different grounds.

Will you let me know what you think?

SUBJECT: Inspection of Hotel Boston.

TO : Assistant Headquarters Commandant, AC (Ovhd) APO 394, U.S. Army.

1. Living Room. The living rooms are numerous, well furnished, clean and adequate. Floors are either tile or wooden and in good condition.

2. Bar. The bar room is spacious, well furnished and clean. Facilities are adequate.

3. Bed rooms. There are 145 bed rooms all well furnished, neat and clean. They vary in size and contain from one to four persons at present. Thirty two of them have adjoining baths and many without baths have basins. Beds are generally single but a few double beds are available. There are a sufficient number of sheets to change the bedding weekly or for new occupancy. All have radiators that are functioning.

4. Bathing facilities. Thirty two rooms have adjoining baths that are very satisfactory. All contain a bath tub, sinks, and toilet. Hot water is available. The two lower floors each contain one community bath which consists of tub, sink and basin. The two top floors contain two community bath rooms on each floor. Two of the bath rooms were in need of slight repairing of the walls.

5. Dining room. The dining room is spacious and pleasing in appearance. Floors are wooden and well kept. Sufficient dishes and utensils are available. Tables are all covered by table cloths.

6. Kitchen. The kitchen is completely unsatisfactory. Floors and walls are in a very run down condition. The stoves are heated by an oil burning apparatus and fumes collect. No ventilation system is present. Washing facilities are inadequate and in need of considerable repair. Storage facilities are inadequate and need a great deal of reconstruction. Heating apparatuses for hot water are scattered around in various locations that communicate with the kitchen. Barrels of oil are stored in part of the kitchen where dishes are washed. Stoves are adequate but in need of cleaning and new racks. All wooden tables and counters are inadequate and have to be replaced. The hotel officials offered to reconstruct the whole kitchen and basement. They have sufficient tile on hand to cover the floors and one half the walls of entire basement. They also offered to completely separate the kitchen from all other portions of the basement and install all new marble topped tables, and washing facilities, and storage construction. This could all be completed in thirty days from the date it is evacuated by the present inhabitants. The officials requested that we obtain cement, paint and sufficient transportation to haul sand and calcium lime to the hotel. They would reimburse the army for the above supplies.

1. The hotel facilities are adequate with the exception of the kitchen which is completely unacceptable.
2. If the kitchen and basement is remodelled as planned it should be acceptable; but before final approval is given the new facilities should be inspected.
3. If possible the requested cement, paint and transportation should be obtained for the hotel management.
4. Before occupancy each room and all furniture should be sprayed with DDT powder, the lavatories washed with a $\frac{1}{2}$ cresol solution, and all bedding aired for two or three days.

Thank you so much for your letter D0 205 of 4 February and for the hopes you hold out of being able to help us.

There are one or two further points that I should like to put to you, if I may. It would be of great help to us if you would consider accommodating officers of the rank of Lt. Colonel and above and - this is always a considerable preoccupation for us - civilian State and Embassy visitors, and so on if they are of equivalent military status.

A very rough estimate of figures based on the above would result in about ten visitors each fortnight, at any one time it is improbable that there would be more than three or four and the average duration of their stay would be about three days.

I should really be most grateful if you find that you can agree to something on the above lines.

My Dear Maurice,

Your 550/160/EC dated 31 Jan 46.

I shall certainly do my best to meet your wishes as regards accommodating senior officers in transit at the Excelsior.

As you are aware, however, this hotel is to be used primarily to accommodate married families, for whom alternative accommodation is now virtually impossible to find in Naples, and the amount of accommodation we are able to reserve for transit purposes will depend on the number of families to be accommodated - at present a very uncertain number.

Actually we have not yet taken over the hotel from the R.N. but expect to do so about the middle of the month.

In the meantime it would help us to know approximately what the commitment would amount to, i.e. how many officers would require accommodation at any one time and the average duration of their stay.

I suggest that only officers of the rank of Colonel and above should be considered.

May I put in a plea for the officers of the Allied Commission and their accommodation in NAPLES. In the early days of occupation the Allied Commission found the Excelsior Hotel much damaged and uninhabitable. We spent a great deal of labour and money in getting it put right with the idea that our own officers would use it. It was finished only just before the occupation of ROME and so we handed it over to the Royal Navy with the assurance that there would always be 10 rooms at our disposal for either permanent residents or visiting officers.

Under the most recent ruling I understand GPO require the hotel for families which is quite understandable. We have, however, been told that we may no longer use the rooms. We are not constant visitors but I should like to know that senior officers could have the advantage of transit accommodation in the Excelsior and I should be most grateful for anything you could do to help us.

1. The position as regards accommodation in Naples requires clarifying and unless A.C.HQ can take action it will not be possible for accommodation to be reserved for senior officers after the first of February.
2. At present the Excelsior Hotel is an R.N.Mess and by arrangement, on account of funds provided by the Allied Commission, 10 rooms (18 beds) are reserved for the use of A.C. personnel. Allowing for Senior UNRRA personnel 6 of these rooms are now taken up leaving 4 for emergencies and officers in transit.
3. From the first of February it appears the Navy will only require one floor of the hotel and are surrendering the remainder, and 56 Area have obtained a ruling that all the remainder of the hotel is at their disposal.
4. We were not informed that this ruling was being discussed, but the position is that after the first of February, we shall no longer be able to arrange accommodation for senior visiting officers. Unless the ruling can be modified, this should, therefore, be made widely known as there is a constant stream of visitors passing through and no certain alternative accommodation.
5. I understand from 56 Area that the accommodation in the Excelsior is to be used for married families and that until they arrive and fill the place up the A.C. officers now living permanently in the Excelsior will not be turned out. I repeat that I was



Accommodation in Milan.

A/Ex C stated that the forward sections of Industry and Commerce S/Cs had practically filled the small building allocated for AC and that he was going to ask for the IV Corps HQ building to be made available.

To solve the billeting problem, a telegram was being sent to-day asking that the Continental Hotel be reserved for AC when IV Corps moved out; he proposed that the Continental be run on similar lines to the Grand Hotel in Rome, i.e. for the use of AC and Italian civilians. Pol Adviser (S) strongly supported this. There would have to be double feeding arrangements, as in the Grand.

Extract of Minutes of Executive Commissioners' Meeting held on 15 June 1945.

Accommodation in Milan.

Pol Advisor (B) reported that the Diana Hotel had been taken over by Fifth Army as a rest house. There was thus no accommodation for Italian Government officials visiting Milan and very limited accommodation for visiting A.G. officers; the P. being a Savoia being now the only hotel available. Lt. C said the time had passed when accommodation for troops had first priority and directed Adm Sec to telephone 2610 Fifth Army with a view to the retention of the Hotel Diana as an A.G. hotel. If this failed Lt. C would ask CO to take the matter up himself.

Lt. C had received a letter from Lombardia Region asking for a ruling on the reception and billeting of the many Italian officials, A.G. officers and secretaries who were visiting Milan. Lt. C would pass the letter to Adm Sec for action.

1 I regret to have to bother you again on the subject of the above note but I do so in response to very strong pressure from the Directors of several Sub-Commissions.

2 It seems that the arrangements which the employees living in the Colonna Hotel were attempting to make on their own initiative have now fallen through and as the owner is attempting to charge some 3,000 lire a month for the room alone a deadlock has been reached.

3 Heads of Sub-Commissions are concerned not only from the feeling that this Commission has an obligation to the employees but also because if, as seems likely, certain employees have no alternative but to leave, the Sub-Commissions will be losing personnel whom they cannot spare.

4 I must, therefore, request that this matter be again approached and would suggest that even though an illegality exists it might well be allowed to continue until such time as Sub-Commissions can start to reduce.

1. Will you please take up the matter of the Diana Hotel with 4 Corps and 5 Army. It is essential that there should be sufficient good hotel accommodation in MILAN for AMG and for the very many visitors from AD. It is unreasonable for us to expect Lombardia Region to put up AD visitors, missions from the War Dept and War Office, etc., unless they have proper hotel accommodation.
2. I think this is a case where military necessity must become military convenience and where the AD necessity must have priority.
3. Will you also ensure that when the IVB leave the Plaza Hotel is made available for visiting Italian officials. The administration will be a matter for Lombardia Region but 4 Corps makes the allocation.

1. Due to the extreme shortage of accommodations in Milan, effective immediately travel orders to that city will be issued for Allied Military personnel, and for Italian personnel, only as indicated below:

2. Orders will not be issued

a. To Italian civilian personnel, except in case of Italian officials travelling by AC Starier plane, whose orders will bear the instruction: "The procurement of billet and messing facilities in the city of Milan is the responsibility of the traveller, and Allied Commission/Allied Military Government assumes no liability in connection therewith."

b. To Allied Civilian personnel, with the exception of those having assimilated commissioned ranks indicated on their WD, AGO Forms 65-8 (Identification Card). (It is not anticipated that need will exist for the services of female civilian employees on such journeys, and no orders will be issued for the travel of female civilian employees, Allied or Italian, to the City of Milan.)

c. Under no circumstances, will orders be issued for travel to Milan for leave or recreational purposes.

3. All requests for orders to Milan will contain a clear description of the mission to be performed there; such notations as "AC activities" will NOT be accepted.

4. Orders specifying travel in North Italy generally will be worded to include the statement "excluding the city of Milan", unless specific request is made for orders authorizing entry into Milan. Such requests will comply with the provisions set forth above, and the orders will then include the additional statement, "including the city of Milan."

SUBJECT: Accommodations-Milan

TO : S.C.A.O. 5th Army

1. The attention of this Headquarters has been invited to the fact that the Diana Hotel, in Milan, hitherto occupied by AC/ANG personnel of Lombardia Region, and used as a transient hotel for visiting AC officials, has been taken over by Fifth Army, who propose to use it as a Rest Center.

2. As you are no doubt aware, one of Allied Commission's most difficult tasks is the reuniting of North and South Italy. To this end, it has been necessary to provide travelling facilities and accommodations for both a number of AC personnel and various officials of the Italian Government. In connection with this, it is vitally important that adequate accommodations be available, that this work may proceed without hitch.

3. It is understood that Fifth Army has already extensive rest centre facilities in the Lago Di Como area, and it is a source of some surprise that a rest centre should be set up in Milan, already crowded and notoriously the hottest city in Italy, in the summer months.

4. It is requested that urgent and strong representations be made to the Commanding General, Fifth Army, that the Hotel Diana, or alternatively, an equivalent amount of space, be made available to Allied Military Government, Lombardia Region, for the accommodation of AC officials on temporary duty in Milan, and for the accommodation of high officials of the Italian Government, travelling to Milan at Allied Commission's request, or at the request of their own government.

SUBJECT: Billets.

TO : Brigadier M. S. Lush, Executive Commissioner, Hq AG.

1. Milan is still being invaded by Italian officials who are coming up under authority of Sub-Commissioners of Hq AG. With all hotels of any size requisitioned, this uncoordinated influx of Italian officials presents an insoluble problem to the billeting office of the Prefettura which attempts to handle such cases. For example, yesterday 18 civilian engineers arrived from Naples on the authorization of AMG Naples. They are here to purchase materials, but the purpose of these purchases is unclear. Could we have some relief?

2. Allied officers from Hq AG are arriving with secretaries. On the admission of officers themselves, the secretaries go off on tours of the lakes. These secretaries, when Allied, usually do not have officer status, and we have difficulty in billeting them. When these secretaries are Italian, we cannot billet them at all, and the officers become displeased. Could this practice be stopped?

3. For Allied personnel who have assimilated rank and who can show documents to that effect, there are no difficulties. Am I to accept as valid assimilated rank when vouched for only by Sub-Commissioners with no other documents available?

My dear Maurice

Thank you for your letter 550/EU of 5th June enclosing J. V. Dunlop's letter. I have gone into the matter at this end, but I do not wish to bring it before the CAC until we have rather more definite information.

G-1 tell me that if any building is occupied to an extent far below its capacity, it is impossible to make a case for retaining it. Thus if the Storione hotel held 120 and there were only 60 A.M.C. officers in it, I do not think we have a case. If, on the other hand, it holds 80 and there were 60 in it, then it is quite clear to me we can stop any attempt at infiltration.

Will you be good enough to let me have more definite details if and when Sub-Area goes any further.

SUBJECT: Visitors to Northern Regions.

TO : Distribution below.

1. Embarrassment is being caused to Regional Commissioners in the North by the large number of Italian civilians and others of non Allied nationality who are sent to them by Sub-Commissions for accommodation and messing.
2. It is not the desire of Regional Commissioners to refuse hospitality but Directors of Sub-Commissions must realise that accommodation is often stretched to the utmost and rations cannot be drawn for other than Allied military personnel. Therefore, it must be borne in mind that only persons of the category mentioned above who are of special importance should be offered SC accommodation.
3. Naturally, Regional Commissioners must always be consulted in advance as to the availability of accommodation.

My dear Hanic

I may need your help on a high level. I heard this afternoon that Colonel Percy Jones, Commander 210 Sub Area, incidentally without any previous notice, was in the Storione Hotel looking over accommodations. I got him on the telephone and asked him what it was all about. He said that there was very heavy pressure from lots of formations, etc., etc.

I said that I felt bound to make the point at once, on behalf of the Allied Commission, that we were in the Hotel, had been in the Hotel for nearly a month, and that the Storione was known by this time not only in Padova but pretty widely in Northeast Italy as the home of A.M.G.

If, therefore, we were forced to move out of this accommodation in favour of any military formation - short of course of A.M.G. itself - the result on the prestige of AC/A.M.G. would be quite deplorable, and I could not agree to any such step without direct reference to my H.Q.

Fortunately you, Tom Henn, Gerald Upjohn, Antonini and many others know the whole situation and I am confident of your help if the emergency does arise.
