1. Reference is made to Administrative Memorandum No. 16, to correspondence on your file C-5, DAB-S-DR, and to Signal 5363 dispatched to you 14 September.

2. Continued representations have been made for some months past, protesting strongly against the increasing employment of German prisoners of war by the Allied Forces. The instructions issued by order of the Supreme Commander required due consideration to be given to the effect of such employment in Italian labor and economy and required that Italian civilians in employment should not normally be discharged in order to permit replacement by prisoners of war; that in connection with employment on new projects consideration should be given to the local civilian unemployment situation; that Italian civilian workers not have given assistance to the Allies should not suffer by the introduction of prisoner of war labor; and that care should be taken to avoid widespread disturbances because of Italian unemployment.

3. The information now available indicates that widespread resentment is being aroused by the employment of German prisoners of war, in circumstances which suggest that the policy of the Supreme Commander is not being observed and that on the contrary the substitution of Italian workers by German prisoners of war is continuing in increasing measure. The reports state that in the region of Naples, Salerno, etc., about 6,000 Germans have been employed, whilst at Florence, for the reactivation of industrial establishments German prisoners have been employed with a consequent discharge of 400 Italian workers, including carpenters, mechanics, electricians, painters, etc. At the Compagnia Generale di Lavori at Loretto some 120 German prisoners are stated to be employed in the repair of machinery; at the Fiat works, Florence, 120 prisoners are employed; at the footwear establishment at Boboli (Florence) 600 prisoners are employed; another 120 prisoners are employed at the Florence railway station; and an unspecified number of Germans are working

at Larino di Ise in the V.I.P. establishment. At first the National Labor officer reports that 150 Italians have been discharged and replaced by German prisoners at the motor vehicle depot No. 571; 25 drivers and 60 mechanics have been discharged and substituted at No. 185 P.T. 2000 Convoy; a considerable but unspecified number of Italians have been substituted at the Quartermaster Depot; and the gradual substitution of Italians by German prisoners is stated to be continuing in the vicinity of Fasoli.

4. This increasing employment of German prisoners of war, in substitution of Italian workers, or in areas where there is unemployment among Italians, is leading to a lively discontent which has already found expression in deplorable public demonstrations such as that which took place recently at Leghorn. The Italian press is commentating freely and with increasing severity. The free movement of German prisoners is in itself resented as is the following extract from the newspaper "La Voce" of 8th September:

"German prisoners of war are free to move in our town. Often they can be seen in cars of Italian make. They have always the same face, the same uniform. They have destroyed our industries; they have burned our land; they have killed our brothers yesterday and today they have shot in a riot or an uprising which has been stolen..... We believe we have the right to say that the replacement of Italian workers with Nazi soldiers be brought to an end."

5. It is a truism to state that Italian industry has suffered destruction and is labouring under difficulties which prevent the full employment of Italian workers. The Italian workers themselves are suffering unemployment and misery and face a winter in which their economic and general conditions are expected to deteriorate even from present day standards. It should be possible to employ Italians exclusively even on new projects; but if arguments are advanced against the latter type of employment, there is only one excuse that can be offered for the substitution of present employer by German prisoners of war. That excuse is the concession of employing cheap and severely controlled labor - against free and paid labor.

6. Up to the date of conclusion of hostilities in Italy, many hundreds of thousands of Italian civilian workers have been employed by the allied Forces, and while on their side they have made a considerable contribution to the allied victory, it can be said that every case has been taken on the part of the allied authorities to not be "good employers". The allied authorities have observed Italian working conditions and have kept in line with local wage policy. But for the introduction of the con-

traversial issue of the employment of German prisoners of war, they would leave behind a reputation for giving just, and even generous, treatment to the Italian workers. That reputation will be banished and will be substituted by lasting memory of resentment and ill-will, which will more than offset the temporary advantages obtained by the employment of German prisoner labor. This result will be the more regrettable since the practices which are developing are obviously not in line with the policy set out, in principle, by order of the supreme commander.

2. In allied countries the question of unemployment of civilian workers is an acute political issue and it will be the more regrettable if allied authorities in Italy are left open to the charge of exploitation of cheap labor to the detriment of local labor that has already suffered as the result of German activities.

3. Accordingly, it cannot be too strongly urged that an instruction should immediately be issued forbidding the discharge of Italian labor to provide opportunity of substitution by German prisoner of war labor; and that a parallel instruction also be issued requiring the withdrawal of German prisoners and their substitution by available Italian labor.

Subject: Employment of German Prisoners of War.

1. Continued representations have been made for some months past, protesting strongly against the increasing employment of German prisoners of war by the Allied Forces. The instructions issued by Order of the Supreme Commander required due consideration to be given to the effect of such employment on Italian labour and economy and required that Italian civilians in employment should not normally be discharged in order to permit replacement by prisoners of war; that in connection with employment on new projects consideration should be given to the local civilian unemployment situation; that Italian civilian workers who have given assistance to the Allies should not suffer by the introduction of prisoner of war labour; and that care should be taken to avoid widespread disturbances because of Italian unemployment.
2. The information now available indicates that widespread resentment is being aroused by the employment of German prisoners of war, in circumstances which suggest that the policy of the Supreme Commander is not being observed and that on the contrary the substitution of Italian workers by German prisoners of war is continuing in increasing measure. The reports state that in the region of Naples, Caserta, etc. about 6,000 Germans have been employed, whilst at Florence, for the reactivation of industrial establishments German prisoners have been employed with a consequent discharge of 400 Italian workers, including carpenters, mechanics, electricians, painters, etc. At the Compagnia Generale di Elettricità at Florence some 250 German prisoners are stated to be employed in the repair of machinery; at the Fiat Works, Florence, 350 prisoners are employed; at the footwear establishment at Boboli (Florence) 60 prisoners are employed; another 130 prisoners are employed at the Florence railway station; and an unspecified number of Germans are working at Marina di Pisa in the C.M.A.S.A. establishment. At Bari the Regional Labour Officer reports that 130 Italians have been discharged by replaced by German prisoners at the motor vehicle depot No. 571; 85 drivers and 60 assistants have been discharged and substituted at No. 263 G.T. Camp Convoy; a considerable but unspecified number of Italians have been substituted at the Quartermaster Depot; and the gradual substitution of Italians by German prisoners is stated ~~~to be~~ continuing in the vicinity of Bari.

1. Reference is made to your Memoranda S/14.05 of 9, 17 and 30 July and year 1945/510 of 14 July.

2. As the places to which you refer are within IBS the matter has been taken up through CG MTOUSA channels. The ruling has been obtained that paragraph 1 of AFM Administrative Memorandum 35 does not necessarily contemplate the removal of German POW's from Italian industries operated by the allied forces and as stated in the Memorandum, it is the policy to utilize PW labour ~~to avoid wherever possible practices which are not consistent with AFM employment policy~~ for Italian civilians. It is considered accordingly that the fact that POW labour is employed in some industries in Florence is not of itself a violation of the policy laid down and it is not considered that the specific cases of complaint made show that the provision of the Memorandum have been violated.

3. So far as the Fiat plant at Florence is concerned, CG MTOUSA states that the plant in question was not operating and was devoid of machinery at the time when it was first occupied by 5 Army. It was repaired and put into operating condition by the U. S. Forces and it is evident that there was then no obligation to engage Italian civilians. It is further stated that the civilian employees who were working in the plant prior to the introduction of PW labour are still employed by the U. S. Forces and no Italian civilians therefore have been discharged to permit replacement by PW. CG MTOUSA is of the opinion that the replacement of the PW labour at the plant by Italian civilian employees would result in an appreciable loss of efficiency and retarding of operations and he is not prepared to accede to the request for replacement which has been made.

4. With regard to conditions in Leghorn it is stated that so far as is known the eviction of civilians in order to house POW is not contemplated. Italian Service Units were formerly billeted in an area in the city which forms an island bounded by the city's canals and it is in that area that the POW are being accommodated because of its accessibility to their places of work. The area in question was originally a residential area but it is stated it was not occupied by civilians at the time when the U. S. Forces billeted Italian Service Units there.

MEMORANDUM:

TO : Lt Col Talbot

1. After yesterday's meeting in the Food Subcommission, Signor Barbareschi, Italian Minister of Labor, and Mr. Braine, Director of Labor Subcommission, both expressed their concern over increasing employment in industry, etc., of surrendered enemy forces. Signor Barbareschi stated that this has now become quite serious particularly in the northern cities; however, the use of POWs has now spread to Bari and other cities in the South.

2. Considerable correspondence and cables have been received and written on the subject, some by the President of the Council of Ministers, some by industrial associations and labor organizations, as well as letters from this Headquarters to AFHQ and PBS requesting that a decision be made regarding the employment of POWs over Italian civilians.

3. Apparently, cables and letters sent to AFHQ have not resulted in anything more definite than a reply to the effect that this matter is under consideration. Because of the repercussions now being felt throughout Italy due to the present policy of using POW labor, and in view of SACMED's concern to avoid unrest, it would seem appropriate that this matter be pressed strongly with the "powers that be" by telephone or, better still, by sending representatives from AC to AFHQ in order to attempt to force a definite decision now, before passive discontent turns to some form more serious and one with which it will be more difficult to cope. This appears to be the only recourse this Headquarters seems to have in view of the apathetic attitude of AFHQ to this problem.

4. May I therefore suggest that in view of the urgency of this problem, this memo be placed before the Executive Commissioner for his consideration of the action suggested in para 3.

1. Reference your cable #14097, dated 26 June, a decision as to the removal of German prisoners of war, employed in various industries in Florence is urgently requested. Their continued employment is certain to lead to serious labor unrest. Discontent among the civilian laborers is already apparent. It is strongly recommended, therefore, that Paragraph 1 of AFHQ Administrative Memorandum Number 35, be implemented immediately.

2. In a telegram to this Headquarters, Prime Minister Perri of the Italian government discussed the proposed billeting of ten thousand German prisoners of war in Leghorn. Such a move would deny shelter to the greater portion of thirty-five thousand homeless civilians in that city, which faces a critical housing shortage. It is strongly urged that measures be taken to billet these German prisoners elsewhere.

Joint Disposal CommitteeI-- USE OF GERMAN POW AND SURRENDERED PERSONNEL

1. It is the policy of this headquarters to make full use of German POW and Surrendered Personnel. At the same time, due consideration of the effect of such labor on Italian labor and economy will be given, provided it does not impede the progress of the redeployment program. To insure uniformity of procedure and policy the following will govern:

a. Presently hired civilians will not normally be discharged in order to permit replacement by POW/SP. This is not intended to prevent replacement with POW/SP in the case of employees who are discharged for cause or who leave employment voluntarily.

b. Italian Cooperator Service Units will be replaced by POW/SP labor, except that the loss of skilled, key personnel caused by the withdrawal or demobilization of Italian Cooperator Service Units may, in so far as is practicable, be avoided by the hiring of such individuals as civilian employees.

c. Where an Italian business, factory or facility is presently operating or may in the future be operated by or for the Allies the civilian employees of such concern will not in general be replaced by POW/SP. Augmentation of labor may be by civilian labor or POW/SP as considered preferable.

d. POW/SP's and civilian labor will not be intermingled in work areas. POW/SP work gangs may, however, work on the same job with civilian laborers provided it is practicable to avoid close contact. Individual POW/SP's may work on administrative and clerical duties in offices provided avoidance of close contact with civilian employees is practicable.

e. On new projects, such as depots and rest areas, the use of POW/SP will be the general rule. Consideration will be given to the local civilian unemployment situation in all such cases. If such situation is acute, civilian labor should where practicable be employed at least on a supplementary basis, but the mere availability of local labor imposes no urgent obligation to hire.

f. When specific questions arise which are not covered by these instructions, the following generalities will be given consideration. Italian civilian labor has been of great assistance to the Allies. Faithful workers should not suffer by the introduction of free labor. The Allies are definitely concerned that there shall be no wide spread disturbances because of Italian unemployment. The adoption of a fair employment policy and consideration of the right of the individual will do much not only to inculcate a receptive attitude toward allied democratic institutions but also to introduce such policies into Italian labor relations.

N 17709. With reference to the conversation the Secretary of State of this Presidency had to day with Admiral STONE, I wish to call the attention of the ALLIED COMMISSION of my preceding telegram dated the 24th of June last N.20441/11862 and I seize the opportunity to beg you again to kindly examine the possibility of excluding German Prisoners of War from mechanical workshops and factories in FLORENCE in order to avoid labor disoccupation and a possible resentment among the labourers of that city. I beg you also to suspend the projected settlement of the 10,000 German Prisoners of War in the central zone of LUCCHINO, which, instead, could be profitably used to shelter greater part of the 35,000 inhabitants of same city, who presently are without a roof because of the destruction of houses by serial bombings.

No. 20441/11862 Cab. Ref. telegram of the 1st, from my predecessor, bearing the same number, I want you to know that the German prisoners have been set to work in the following industrial plants of Florence:

- 200 prisoners in the Compagnia Generale Elettricità (C.G.E.) in via Francesco Miocinesi, to repair the machinery;
- 350 prisoners in the Fiat plant of Novoli (Florence) which has to be almost entirely rebuilt;
- 600 prisoners in the premises for the manufacture of shoes established by the allied military administration in the Royal Boboli Gardens (Florence);
- 120 prisoners to work at the rehabilitation of the railway station of Florence Campo Marte.

Till a few days ago, about a hundred Italian workers were working with the prisoners in the C.G.E. plant. They have been dismissed for they expressed their disappointment at the introduction of German manpower.

In the Fiat plants near Novoli, the Italian manpower which, during the last months, had reached the figure of 2000 employed - in turn - to remove the wreckage, is now reduced to 12 workers only.

Begging for your intervention to bring relief to the working classes, I thank you.

PROPOSED SOURCE FOR EMPLOYMENT OF CIVILIAN VOLUNTEERS
OF THE LINE CLEARANCE IN ITALY.

1. Introduction.

Many thousands of mines have been laid in Italy by the Germans and it has been proposed that Germans ~~not~~ should be employed on clearing mines in Italy.

2. Personnel required.

Up to 10,000 men can be fully employed on Line Clearance and this figure has been proposed on the assumption that 10,000 will ultimately be released for this purpose.

3. Administration and discipline of men.

The men will continue to be the prisoners of ~~the~~ the Allied Nations and will be maintained and administered by them. The Line Clearance service will be carried out by the Ministry of War under supervision of the Allied Commandant in so far as the territory is concerned and under the guidance of Italian officers in so far as Italian Government territory is concerned. All questions of discipline and general administration of the personnel placed in charge will be dealt with by the Allied personnel will take their work without the permission and consent of the allied personnel in charge, and must be returned to their place of origin so as to be sent back to their home country.

4. Italian Military Administration in Italy. - Notes.

(a) Italy for purposes of military administration is divided into territorial commands and comprises a large area whose boundaries are the same as those of these commands. For line clearance purposes Italy has been divided into three districts.

2 Personnel required.

Up to 10,000 men can be fully employed on the clearance of Italy. The Allied nations will be entitled and authorized by themselves to have the clearance work performed for them.

3. Administration and discipline of men.

The personnel will consist to be the personnel of the Allied territory. The personnel will be maintained and administered by the military authorities concerned and under the guidance of liaison officers in so far as Italian Government territories are concerned. All personnel to be dealt with by the liaison personnel placed in charge of the various units from whom the Italian Government administration is to be carried out by the military authorities will not be sent to their place of instruction. Personnel will be sent to their place of work without the permission and consent of the allied personnel in charge, and must be returned to their units when ordered to do so.

Italian Military Administration in Italy. - Duties.

- (a) Italy for purposes of military administration is divided into territorial commands and districts. For the ultimate purposes Italy has been divided into seven which have the same boundaries as the "parties" of these commandes. The territorial commands and districts are shown in Appendix I, above the boundaries of certain districts.

(b) Appendix I shows the names of the districts.

- (c) The areas are under command of and receive their instructions direct from the Ministry of War (Ministry of Defense) on all occasions concerning the clearing of areas of objectives or of areas of interest, contracts, supplies, etc., and also in administrative matters.

(d) The Ministry of War will be responsible for the conduct of the administration and distribution of equipment, transportation and supplies allotted for the clearance work.

All questions of discipline and administration of Italian military or civilians will be dealt with through the territorial Command of the Corps of Engineers.

5. Selection and posting of men.

(a) It is estimated that, provided transport and equipment are made available, 3000 men would take 20 months to clear all mines in Italy, 10,000 men would take 17 to 18 months.

(b) In view of the fact that many engineering units of the German Army surrendered intact it is suggested that these units be employed on the work and allocated as a body without their officers. This would result in the men carrying day as under their own NCOs and would enable each discipline to be maintained, as far as providing leadership in the work. The allocation of men will be carried out by Allied Commission in conjunction with the Ministry of War.

(c) DAF will be formed into units or working parties of 100 men or multiples of 100 and these will be built to hold the required number.

(d) Appendix "B" sets out the establishment including Allied guards and administrative staff necessary.

(e) It is proposed that 3000 men be allocated initially. They would be assigned to the following places:

6. Guarding of prisoners of war.

- (a) The guarding of prisoners will be a responsibility of the Italian Government who will find the guards necessary. For the purpose of guarding 3000 prisoners, administration etc. the Italian Government will require 150 Guards and 750 Infantry men. Permission is therefore requested from G.H.Q. to release such personnel from their present duties to do this guarding.

Provision is necessary for replacement of damaged or

obsolescent parts of car for looking after material allotted to them.

Parts will be supplied by the authorities concerned by the Ministry of Defense, Defense, Police, Home, Places, Roads and Resources, and
by Army, which will be responsible for distribution to established temporarily

of each party of 100 men is stored at command posts.

leaving the stores in the event of there being
any emergency).
- (b) Prisoners will bear on their clothes some mark for
identification. It will be a zone responsibility to contact
the local police authority by the police in the event of there being
any emergency.

The mine clearing zones will collect information on mine fields and mines belts within their areas. They are responsible for recording areas which have been cleared and mines removed and destroyed and generally set themselves up for mining areas to work on those areas still requiring clearing. This requires little initial cost as all costs dealing with mines.

b. Souvenant (Mine clearing).

The equipment and demolition equipment required for each party of 100 men to move at Appendix "A". This appendix shows the transport which must be made available to these parties if the scheme is to operate successfully. Throughout transport, the question of guarding and supervising these prisoners will become very difficult and will prevent extension of the scheme.

It is said with the material, transport, etc., to release by 1971, it is necessary to pass them through two main depots in Rome, which will be responsible for distribution to sub-depots at Genova, Bolzano, Cesena, Florence, Roma and Venezia. Appendix "B" shows the establishment proposed by the Italian Ministry of War for loading after material allotted to them.

Provision is necessary for replacing men of degraded or worn out equipment, including spare parts for transport.

c. Prisons.

It is hoped that with the provision of personnel, firms engineers and military trained in mine clearance or in the building of mines, little training will require to be done, but selected units will be built up into teams of five men and supervising the squads working. Initially to such teams will be set up and they will be disbanded as follows:

1. I refer to our signal No. 9745 of 14 June 45 and to your memorandum of 17 May 45 setting forth the conditions under which you propose German POW's might be made available for employment in Italy. The question has been discussed with the Italian Government in some detail but at the moment it would appear that the number of prisoners they wish to employ is only about 80,000. In a letter which I have received from the Prime Minister dated the 9th June, he proposes that they be disposed as follows:

(S) 3,000 In the lower part of the Po Valley on works of excavation and canalization.

5,000 To be similarly employed in the lower part of the Tiber valley in the Fiumicini area.

5,000 Rising eventually to 10,000 for mine clearance - disposed initially as follows:

Pescara, Chieti 500 - Ancona 500 - Pescaro 200 - Rimini, Cesena, Faenza, Forli, 1000 - Firenze 100 - Pistoia 100 - Lucca 100 - Pisa 100 - Livorno 500 - Siena 100 - Viterbo 100 - La Spezia 100 - Genoa 200 - Venice 200.

4,000 Employed in the Sardinian coal, lead and zinc mines.

5,000 Employed in the lignite and pyrites mines in the Grosseto Province.

2. It appears to me that the next step is to settle the detail of employment on the ground and to go into questions of administration, accommodation, and guarding. It would be in accordance with normal practice to make a reconnaissance with a party consisting of representatives of each branch of AFHQ and AC concerned and of the Italian Government Departments.

3. I request therefore that you set up such reconnaissance parties and that you include the following:

- A. Representatives of the Branch or Branches of ATTC who will be responsible for administering and maintaining the prisoners.
- B. Representatives of the Italian Ministries of Industry Commerce & Labour, Agriculture, Public Works and War according to the nature of the work project under examination.
- C. Representative of S.M.I.L.
- D. Representative of the Allied Commission.

4. At present the Italian Government has 80 troops under its command from which to provide guards as above. Either ITI-IFI guard battalions (all now under Allied command) would have to be released to the Italian Government or the necessary allotment of soldiers would have to be made from BR-IFI or US-IFI contingents. In either case it would be necessary for these troops to be rationed by the Allies, as at present.

5. It should be possible to carry out a number of the reconnaissances simultaneously and I should be glad if you would agree to them being commenced at as early a date as may be possible.

1. In view of events now in progress and a possibility of US being confronted with the necessity of guarding, feeding and employing a large number of German prisoners of war it will be necessary to construct main prisoners of war enclosures.
2. The location of these enclosures will be determined by the ability of the major commands to utilize these prisoners. These main enclosures will be guarded and administered by HQ.
3. It is desired to utilize these prisoners to the maximum.
4. Base on the above, it is requested that this Headquarters be furnished:
 - A. The number of German prisoners of war which can be used by your command.
 - B. Approximately where prisoners are to be used and for what duties.
 - C. Length of time German prisoners of war may be usefully employed.
5. Reports are to reach this Headquarters on 10 March 1945 current.
