Subject: Furniture of the Czech Historical Institute.

1. The Legation of Czechoslovakia has applied to the Ministry for Foreign Affairs requesting the restitution of furniture belonging to the Czech Historical Institute. Said furniture was removed by the Germans in 1942 and at present is still kept under sequestration in the premises of the German Archaeological Institute of Via Sardegna, where a part of the rooms of the building are occupied by an UNRRA's office.

2. A list of the above furniture is herewith given:

- 19 book-shelves;
- 1 large wooden cupboard for books;
- 1 archive with 22 drawers;
- 1 cupboard with 21 drawers for "fiches";
- 1 cupboard-archive with shutter and 32 drawers;
- 8 chairs of curved wood;
- 4 large tables for office;
- 2 folding ladders;
- 1 typewriter and a small table.

3. The aforesaid Legation has made known that it is in possession of the receipts proving that the a/m furniture had been handed over to the German Archaeological Institute and has put said receipts at the disposal of the sequesteror of the Institute who has made the checking of the sequestered items.

4. The Ministry for Foreign Affairs beg to ask the Allied Commission whether they deem advisable to grant the necessary authorization in order that the a/m furniture should be desequestered and then handed over to the Czech Historical Institute.



1. reference is made to your memorandum on the above subject dated 5 March 1946.

The Czechoslovak Legation begs the ALLIED COMMISSION to find out the whereabouts of two Czechoslovak citizens Dr. Ferdinand DURCANSKY and Stanislav MERCIAR to arrest and extradit the same.

Dr. Ferdinand DURCANSKY born 1907 in Rajec, Czechoslovakia, was formerly Minister of Foreign Affairs under the fascist president of Slovakia Mr. Tuka. Dr. Durcansky fled from Slovakia with the Germans in 1945 and in December 1945 managed to come to Italy and it is believed that he lives in the surroundings of Rome, the precise place is not known.

Dr. Stanislav MERCIAR born in 1906 was Secretary of Matice of Slovakia /Slovak Cultural Academy/, is also a Fascist whom the Czechoslovak Government holds responsible for the denunciation of a great number of Slovak patriots and handing them over to the Germans. He also is according informations living near Rome.





On March 16th 1939, the Germans occupied the Czechoslovak Consulate General in Trieste and transferred it, together with all furniture and archives, to Via Geppa, 2.

In April this year the offices of the Consulate and their contents were found intact and sealed by the Czechoslovak National Committee and Czechoslovak Military Mission. The Yugoslav forces respected this arrangement and a former official of the Consulate, Mr. Bartoš, took over the Consular offices and their contents.

When the Allies entered Trieste, that is, the 1st New Zealand Division, the seals were torn down, the furniture smashed, the archives dispersed and the offices of the Consulate turned into a night club. The damage done amounts to one million lire.

I should greatly appreciate it, therefore, if the Allied authorities in Trieste could be requested to return to us these Consular offices together with all their contents and in such a state of repair as originally found.

At the same time I beg to inform you that the Czechoslovak Consulate in Trieste has been re-opened at the address of Via Nizza 14, and is administered for the time being by its former official, Mr. Bartoš, who was a member of the Czechoslovak National Committee. Dear Sir,

I beg to refer to my previous letter and to our conversation of June 14th and, as the living conditions of our units in Northern Italy are daily worsening and we are suffering most privations, am writing to urge you to treat us as Allies and not as forces who have surrendered which is not at all the case.

At the same time I should be grateful if the repatriation of these units could be arranged as early as possible. The railway line through the Brenner Pass is to be re-opened on July 1st for the repatriation of German prisoners of war. I trust that Czechoslovak units will be granted priority over the German prisoners and that as soon as this line begins to function it will be first used for repatriation to the Czechoslovak frontiers of our units here.

The Czechoslovak Mission accredited to I.I. & R.S.C. is taking the necessary steps to arrange for the repatriation of 1700 civilians from the Repatriation Centre in a camp near Verona, that is, near the Czechoslovak units in Northern Italy and the Brenner Pass railway line, and I should appreciate it very much indeed if you would be so kind as to support our efforts in this connection with the I.I. & R.S.C.

PRO MEMORIA.

The position of Czechoslovak citizens at present in Italy is as follows:

There are at present in Southern and Central Italy up to the former demarcation line about 500 Czechoslovak citizens who, for the most part, are people who were interned here during the war for various reasons. To these can be 200 or 300 more who came down from Northern Italy after the end of hostilities and who are mostly workmen sent to Italy by the Germans for forced labour. The number of people belonging to this category is continuously growing as more and more people come down from Northern Italy.

In Northern Italy there are about 1000 civilians, most of whom are also workmen sent here on forced labour by the Germans and a small number of refugees who came here before the war and were put in Italian concentration camps. Beside these civilians there are the members of a number of army units, i.e. about 5400 pertaining to the regular army of the former Protectorate and the remnants of Slovak formations amounting to 6500 men. Both these groups are still under the command of their own officers.

As the Czechoslovak State is deeply interested in the return home of these military units and groups of workmen which are badly needed there both for the economic reconstruction and rebuilding of the country, the Czechoslovak Mission would greatly appreciate it if a favourable decision with regard to the repatriation of these groups at an early date could be taken. The remaining refugees could be repatriated later.

The Mission would also be grateful if the flow to Southern Italy of Czechoslovak citizens could be stopped as these people, in moving down from the North, are moving further away from their homeland.



It is pointed out that the repatriation of Czechoslovak citizens to Czechoslovakia is on a purely voluntary basis and that repatriated people will have no difficulty in entering the country.

The above-given figures are only approximate as the numbers of these people are continuously changing.

The Czechoslovak Mission begs to express its thanks and gratitude for the helpful interest taken in our difficult problems.

1. Reference is made to your 584/453 of 22 May.
2. As a result of considering your letter and its inclosure a signal has been sent 7 June to HQ 15 Army Group and the Czechoslovak Military Mission the substance of which is paraphrased below.
 - a. Reference has been made to CC5 on question whether any change of status is to be accorded to surrendered Czechoslovak units and personnel in this theatre.
 - b. Pending further instructions and except as below Czechoslovak units and personnel will continue to be treated in same way as surrendered enemy personnel.
 - c. Czechoslovak units may however retain their own unit organization under own officers. Czechoslovak personnel discovered in German units may be formed into Czech units. So far as possible and except for consideration of work all Czechoslovak units and personnel will be accommodated in same general area.
 - d. The formation by the Czechoslovak Military Mission of a small HQ to organize and supervise Czechoslovak units under orders 15 Army Group has been approved.
3. The outgoing message above referred to was classified Top Secret and this paraphrase is so classified accordingly.

Dear Sir,

I beg to enclose herewith a copy of a note received from the British Embassy. According to this note as well as according to other reports received direct, there are, in Northern Italy, several Czechoslovak units composed of men deported to Italy by the Germans. They were put on technical jobs and guard duty and either managed to escape to the partisan or Allied lines or were kept in concentration camps and prisons.

A so-called Slovak technical brigade of about 6500 men and 11 Czechoslovak Army battalions comprising 7000 men are involved. Part of these men worked clandestinely in the rearguard of the German Army. They got in touch with Allied Liaison Officers and partisans and carried on an underground information service. 300 of these Czechoslovak citizens who have succeeded in escaping through the Swiss frontier have been incorporated in the Czechoslovak Army in England and have sworn allegiance to the Czechoslovak Republic. A detailed report as to the placing of these men has already been made by the Czechoslovak Military Mission to the Allied Headquarters.

I should be very grateful, therefore, if the Allied Commission could recommend and support the recognition of the above-mentioned units as part of the Allied Armies as these have now become regular Czechoslovak units.

NOTE VERBALE.

The British Embassy presents its compliments to the Czechoslovak Legation and has the honour to inform the Legation that on the 29th April a Milan broadcast in Slovak from the Czechoslovak National Committee in Italy was monitored in London. It stated -

- /a/ that the Slovak Legation in Bellaggio had ceased to exist and that a Committee had been formed under the authority of the Czechoslovak Government in Košice, and
- /b/ that this had been communicated to the Swiss Governments in a note dated 26th April, arrangements having been prepared since January through the Czechoslovak Legation in Berne.

2. The Broadcast went on to say that members of a Slovak technical division in Italy had voluntarily declared themselves as part of the Czechoslovak armed forces and were willing to fight at the side of the Allies. The Committee requested that the Allied Command in Italy should be approached. The manifesto was signed Josef Beleslava /?/, major of General Staff and Dr. F. Lichy /?/.

3. The Czechoslovak Government representative in London broadcast in reply that these Slovaks should obey the instructions of the Allied Command. The Foreign Office are asking the Czechoslovak Government for its views as to the eventual disposal of these men.

4. The British Embassy is communicating the above to the Czechoslovak Legation, for information, at the request of the Foreign Office.
