My dear General,

21, 29 June 1936.

I have had long and useful discussions here today with Admiral Stone, Maurice Lash, and Charles Purley (IE's).

I have sent you a signal on my discussions with Admiral Stone (JGD 3). Both he and Lash were at pains to impress upon me the desirability and practical necessity for a single organization, with the necessary subdivisions, but under one head, to conduct on behalf of SASO all contacts in Italy with the Italian Government. I confess I was shaken by their very arguments, but left Lash in no doubt that from what I know of views expressed in Whitehall, I did not think that SASO would wear it for the reason (as stated in the minority report to the EMB Paper) that it would be tantamount to the retention of ALOM under another name, and that such time would be wasted by putting forward such proposals. The issue will necessarily depend principally I think, on the instructions which Lord Charles receives.

SECRET

I find that officers here (in AHS) just cannot believe that the Cabinet decision to withdraw support and hand them over to the Italians is the least word on the subject, or that the Cabinet could possibly be prepared to justify it in Parliament. They take the view that, although SAS are in British custody, the effect of their being handed over to the Italians would produce some serious and ineffectual in the Combined field to which SASO, in his Combined hat, cannot turn the blind eye; and that any decision to hand them over must therefore come from OGB and not unilaterally from London. They point out that, apart from the Italian reluctance, or even refusal, to take them over (or to maintain them, on the withdrawal of British personnel and administrative support), their desire to get rid of them as quickly as possible would predispose them to comply with the inevitable Yugoslav and Russian pressure to hand over SAS and IE's under the "detachment to Allied interests" clause of the Revised Armistice Terms, or, in the case of the Yugoslavs, to better than for the return of Italians deported by the Yugoslavs from Zone A, (if any still survive, which over the Russian Political Adviser here seems to doubt).

Admiral Stone's news that the Italians will not sign the Revised Terms, if coupled with the Military Agreements in their present form, is interesting and important.

I enclose a summary of my discussions here today, also copies of the Staff proposed by ALOM for SASO, in the event of the proposals for the latter going through.

MINISTERIAL FUNCTIONS:

3. New Italian Government under formation: should SALVO, through ALOM, recommend three separate Service Ministers or a single Minister of Defense.
4. Italian Security Decree. Should this apply to UNICE? In VENETIA GILIA? No previous suggestion by Italian Govt. at the International Security Authorities? (N.B.): Problems such as these could not be handled by any organization except ALOM or its successor.

5. Great pressure is, likely to be brought to bear on the Italian Government under the Article requiring them to do nothing detrimental to the interests of the Allies.

(a) by France, for the raising of French ships in Italian harbours.
(b) by Yugoslavia,

1. for the repatriation of Obetniks and Missident Jugoslavs. Italy will be under great pressure to trade these against return of Italians deported from Zone A (if still alive).

2. For handing over persons claimed as War Criminals, including General Borardi, Chief of Italian Army Staff.

6. The only possible coordinating machinery to prevent conflicting demands (vide Para 2 of Troopship 624.27 of 15 June) is a Combined organization in KME to handle with the Italian Government all questions relating to the implementation of the Agreements. Once you get out of the Combined chord, conflicting approaches are inevitable.

7. Italian Government would not object to the differences in the Financial Clauses of the Agreements. They recognize that the U.K. has not the same financial resources as the U.S. (and Admiral Stone emphasized that the American Financial Clauses are obscure and not as favourable as might appear at first sight.)

What the Italians do object to is the exclusive rights claimed by the British Agreement and particularly the Capitulatory Rights claimed over British merchant seamen, the more so as there are no British agencies for the arrest of such men, and no British Courts in Italy in which such men could be tried. As we are still technically at war with Italy, British Consuls have no Equequitors and cannot try in Consular Courts.

8. Question of access by French and Soviet reps. to Special Staff Section set up by Article 3 of the Revised Terms.

French and Soviet reps., whilst having access to other papers at ALCOM, do not have access to papers of the Services Sub-Commissions. The French claim that in Paris they only dropped their claim to be included in the Special Staff Section on being given an assurance that their rights and privileges in this matter would be the subject of a separate agreement. Hence their insistence on this point in London and Rome.

Police Mission.

9. Proposals for this were handled on an all-British Basis. This was always a wrong approach: even if personnel were all British, any such Mission in Italy must necessarily be an Allied Mission, the more so if it is intruded under the cloak of the Land Forces Sub-Commission (itself a Combined organization under ALCOM). Present personnel will waste out shortly and should be allowed to do so. As, in any case the Mission could only cover the Carabinieri (who form part of the Army) and these form less than 50% of the total Civil Police Forces, this Mission cannot be justified.

2. For handing over persons claimed as War Criminals, including General Barardi, Chief of Italian Army Staff.

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What is required is a set-up to study the unification of all Police Forces in Italy and to make recommendations on the subject. During the recent institutional referendum there was a distinct danger that the Carabinieri would display monarchist sympathies and that the rest of the Civil Police would come out pro-Republic.

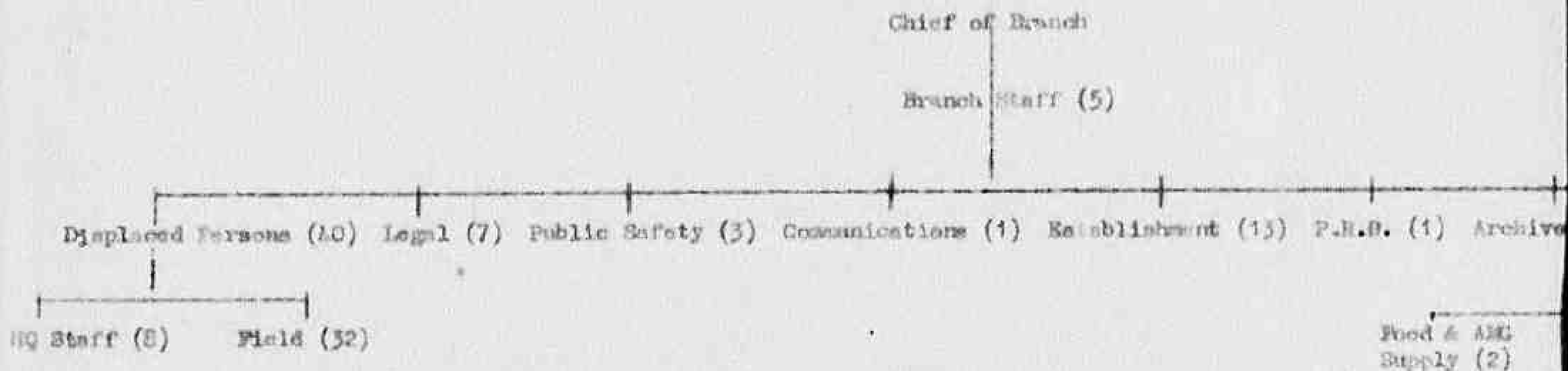

- e) Purchasing, Contracts and Claims Officer - One officer, responsible for physical payment of all civilian employees, local purchases, and investigation of claims against AIG/AC.
- f) British Detachment - Two officers, OC and 2 i/c and quartermaster.
- g) The work of these officers is supervised and co-ordinated by one officer, who is also the Executive Officer (R) of the Detachment.

2. This number will be required in the early stages to complete the essential clearing up of AIG/AC, but then can be reduced to six by combining (b) and (d) under one officer and (c) (e) and (f) under ~~two~~ ^{one} officers instead of three.

- b) Q-41157 - One officer responsible for all Q work.
- c) Camp Command - One officer responsible for maintenance of buildings, security of Hq building, billeting, supervision of civilian personnel, including payment and mid-shift meal. Responsible also for collection of hotel and ration charges.
- d) Despatch Office - One officer responsible for all RT - message - repairs, and despatch of personnel and goods by road, rail or air.
- e) Paymaster, Comptroller and Claims Officer - One officer, responsible for physical payment of all civilian employees, local purchases, and investigation of claims against A/G/AC.
- f) British Detachment - Two officers, OJ and 2 1/0 and Quartermaster.
- g) The work of these officers is supervised and co-ordinated by one officer, who is also the Executive Officer (R) of the Commission.

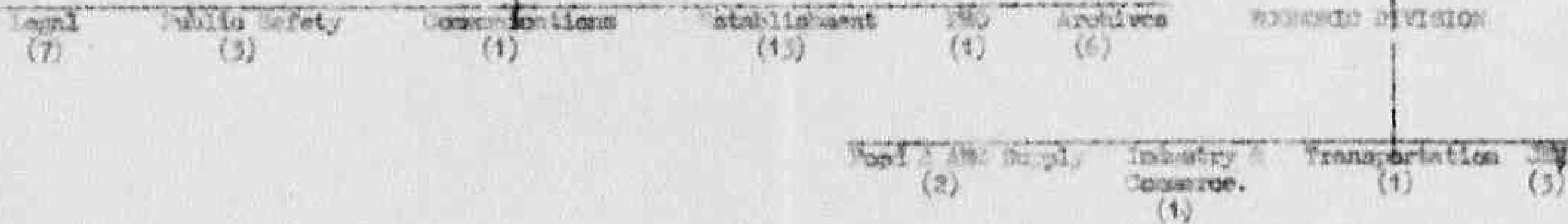

SUBJECT: Economic/Supply Functions - I.M.A.S.

TO : Executive Commissioner
Allied Commission

1. It is visualized that economic and supply functions will exist in the Italian Military Affairs Section (I.M.A.S.). The functions may be summarized as follows:

- (a) Supply to AMG territory of food, agricultural, industrial, utilities, transportation, fuel and power.
- (b) Supply to the Italian Army, Navy, and Air Force of non-military items.
- (c) Supply for displaced persons.
- (d) Channel for finance questions for above agencies.
- (e) Channel for claims and negotiations between Italian Government and the Allied Military Authorities.
- (f) Industrial rehabilitation in AMG territory.
- (g) Commerce between AMG territory, Italy, and other nations.
- (h) Commerce with British Military authorities and Italy (former Italian Colonies).
- (i) Derequisitioning of Allied-held premises.
- (j) Disposal of captured enemy material.
- (k) AMIA may require reports on economic conditions in Italy where military interests are affected.

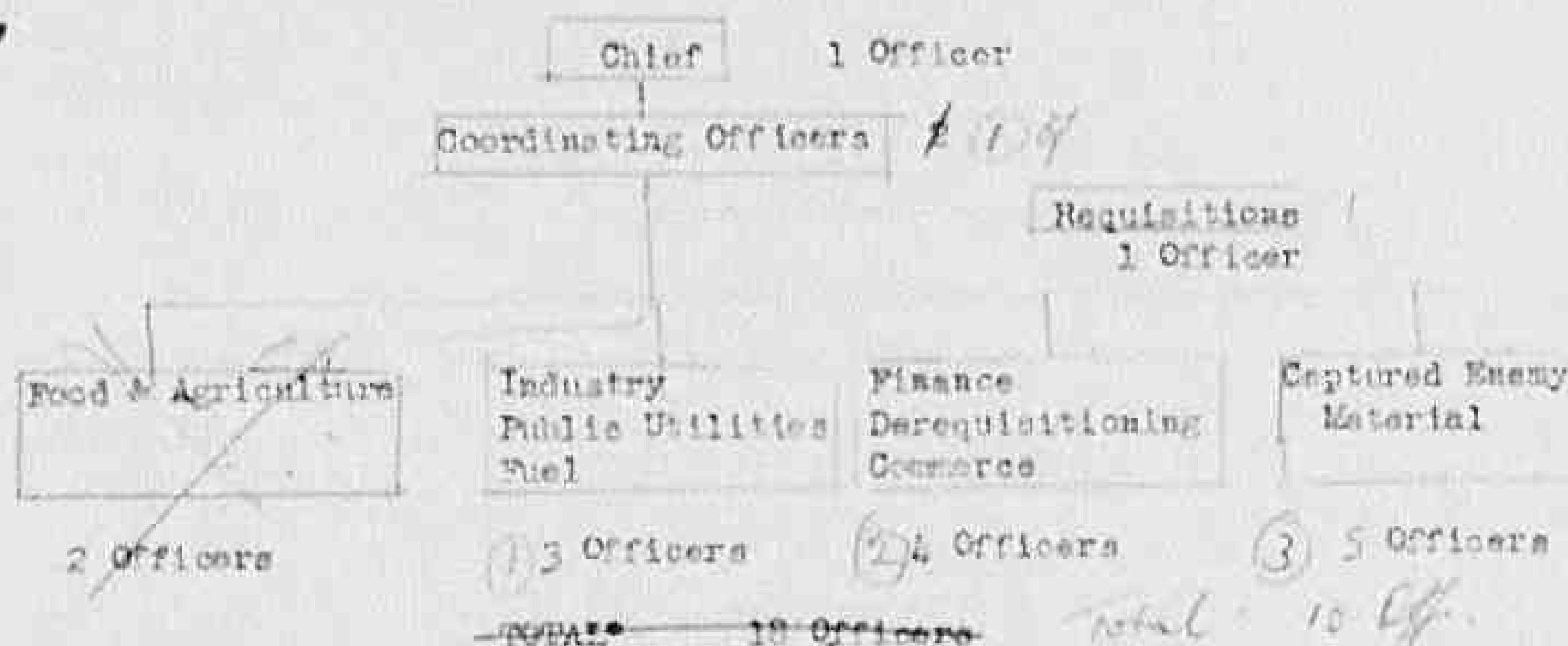
2. The following diagram represents the organizational set-up:

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*For the total it is planned to have 9 American and 9 British Officers.

3. (a) Supply for AMG. Requests for civil supplies are prepared by the AMGs of Venezia Giulia and Udine. These requests are channeled through Allied Commission for the purposes of:

- (i) Consolidation.
- (ii) Screening items which are available in the Italian economy. (Contacts with Italian Government and other agencies to get commitments on willingness to supply.)
- (iii) Screening items as to justifications.
- (iv) Making allocations and issuing instructions on the division of supplies as they arrive.
- (v) Borrowing and repayment from other programs of essential supplies to cover non-arrivals.
- (vi) Insuring that the supply of electric power is made available to XIII Corps from sources in Italian Government territory.

In the operations above outlined there are many signals and other communications to establish understandings on items not originally clear, or on which changes are proposed.

(b) Advice to AMG on Economic Activities. This function includes responding to AMG inquiries and requests for information and instructions. It consists largely of dealing with isolated cases as they arise and covers widely divergent matters. A few typical recent examples are:

- (i) Interpretation of Italian Government decrees, the application of which may be desirable for WG.
- (ii) Advising Udine on appropriateness of the use of AMG funds for certain purposes.

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- 3 -

- (iii) The adoption of arrangements for trade between Italy/Venezia Giulia and Zone B Venezia Giulia.
- (iv) Assisting AMG in conforming to provisions of Italian trade agreements.
- (v) Acting as channel for certain public works proposals of the Italian Government.
- (vi) Aiding in the consummation of contracts for AMG factories and other agencies.

The functions of Allied Commission with respect to AMG territory are comparable to the normal functions of an intermediate headquarters in a chain of command.

4. The non-military supply of the Italian Armed Forces, principally food, requires contacts with Ministries and agencies of the Italian Government other than the military Ministries. The personnel who are specializing in supply for AMG already have useful contacts and are able effectively to perform such functions.

5. The supply for displaced persons, while treated as a responsibility of the Italian Government, entails a considerable amount of contact with that Government in order to insure suitable arrangements. The same specialists who are required for supply to AMG have effective liaison with the appropriate agencies.

6. Financial Questions. There is a wide variety of financial problems which pertain to the Allied Forces, and for which provision should be made in the economic portion of I.M.A.S. Most prominent among the questions will be matters of claims, rights and remunerations.

7. AMG Industry. As a part of the program to avoid disease and unrest in AMG territory, industrial development and employment are important. Matters constantly arise regarding the use of AMG plants, regarding the acquisition of materials and equipment for the plants, which includes allocations from Italian Government agencies and also includes contracts to furnish supplies to Italian as well as to other countries.

8. AMG International Commerce. Arrangements are under way to conduct and control the international commerce of AMG territory. The arrangements also include Italian international trade which may pass through AMG areas. Effort is consistently made to treat the disputed area as a part of economic Italy. However, it is not practical to make blanket application of all Italian regulations because of conditions peculiar to Zone A.

9. The British military authorities in the Italian Colonies have relied upon AFHQ and its agencies to deal with the Italian Government in their procurements of Italian products or in their supply of goods to Italy. It appears likely that this activity will continue and personnel of I.M.A.S., because of contacts with the Italian Government, is best qualified to carry it on.

10. Derequisitioning. The requests for derequisitioning are constantly increasing. With the revision of the Armistice and with the new civil affairs arrangements it may be expected that there will be an up-surge in the already considerable number of such requests. It is believed that AFHQ will be well served by establishing a central activity in I.M.A.S. to treat with the Italians and the Italian Government.

11. Captured Enemy Material.

(a) After the needs of the Allied Military have been met, captured enemy material, with the exception of a few special items, is turned over to the Italian Government on quantitative receipts. GCM Branch attends to the actual turnover to the Italian agency A.R.A.R. Officers of that Branch accompany the A.R.A.R. officials and agree on the quantities. Hand receipts are taken which are followed by more formal receipts from the Government. Since the dumps of material are very diversified as to types of material, quantities and locations and the A.R.A.R. organization is not well adapted to rapid receipt and disposal, the job is difficult and the completion necessarily slow. This function will continue so long as military units are closing out and giving up previously undisclosed GCM material.

(b) There are under the control of G.Z.M. Branch certain files which pertain to the supply operation in Italy of the German RUK organization. These files are undergoing constant study and classification for the purpose of making their contents more useful to the Allied and Italian Governments. It is likely that these files may eventually go to some agency not I.M.A.S.

12. Economic Conditions in Italy. It is believed that AFHQ may call upon I.M.A.S. for reports on economic conditions in Italy insofar as the conditions may affect military interests. The personnel required to carry on the functions listed above will have suitable contacts and will be well qualified to prepare such reports. They will rely upon information from the Embassies, the Italian Government, and UNRRA. Such items as ration scales, food stocks, local production, fuel supplies, labor and current, and transportation availabilities may become the basis of such reports.

13. Residual Work. There is inevitably residual correspondence and work left over from Allied Commission, as the result of its almost three years of activity in the Theater, which demands some attention. It is visualized that the staff provided for the Economic Branch of I.M.A.S. will have to carry on this type of work as an added responsibility.

Reference our conversation yesterday. Assuming that Drew arrives on Friday, I would like to bring him up to Rome on Monday, 24th, and return here that night, so as to be here for the C.I.G.S.'s visit. Provided the road is dry, we should be at Rome about 1100 hrs.

I should like Drew to get a picture of the problems involved in the abolition of ALCON and its replacement by the body on which the MJPS agreed at Tuesday's Meeting. It would be most helpful if you could produce a rough outline of the organization which you think will be required for the new body, showing how the personnel now with ALCON, and who will remain available, can be fitted in. Of course, it will be no good going above the ceiling laid down in General Hamblen's letter of 7 June to R.A.A.C. (plus the 30 additional bodies who have now been approved) and I hope it will be possible to do with less on the British side.

I should also like Drew to have a talk with Pindley or Fothergill, as he is particularly interested in the problem of getting rid of our DP commitments.

III. THE ITALIAN ARMY

Description

To give you a proper idea of the new Italian Army of today, I must say a few words about its evolution from the chaotic days of 1943.

An account of the activities of the Italian Army during 8 May 43 can be divided into two parts:-

- (a) The co-belligerent Army - May 43 to 1st May 44
- (b) The Italian Army - 1st May to 4th May, and until the final general collapse.

2. THE CO-BELLIGERENT ARMY

(a) Under the terms of the Armistice the Italian Govt. undertook to make available to the Allies such Italian troops as they required. By the time of the German surrender in Italy the Italian Army serving the Allies had reached a total of 350,000. This growth was achieved by stages, first joined with the development of Allied operations on the Italian mainland, and dependent largely on the amount of ^{food} clothing, boots and equipment that the Allies were able to provide.

A sharp rise with the occupation of the Italian East Coast with the Italian Army in CALABRIA. This consisted of assistance in the maintenance of the I. of C. in the reconstruction of bridges, organization of transit areas etc. At the same time an Allied mission was making the first contacts with the Italian 7 Army in ARONA.

(b) Next came the creation of the nucleus of an Italian War Ministry and General Staff at ~~ARONA~~ and ~~ARONA~~ for which various commands

and in Allied installations, although many other types of units were formed - notably tank, light and heavy, line and signal corps, engineer corps, traffic control units and so forth.

The ITALIAN Army has always been notoriously deficient in technical and technical personnel, and it was quite a business getting together individuals for some of the more specialized units.

The combat troops were in the line first with ITALIAN Army, and subsequently, with the new units "C" (Congo Italian 1st Division) under command of the British 8th Army.

(d) In the spring of '44, the shortage of Allied manpower in this theatre led to the decision to increase the number of ITALIAN Service troops and at the same time to organize the ITALIAN combat force, to fit them out entirely with British arms and equipment and to train them on British lines.

The first infantry division (called "Cosmos Group") and about half the size of a British Division, was created within 6 months and the number increased to about monthly thereafter. Four of them took part, with credit, in several battles on the GOTHIC line and in the final northern drive. The division was ready in reserve but did not actually enter battle. The Sixth provided reinforcements. The division was formed into four battalions and various other administrative units, which were regularly needed for both ITALIAN and WESTERN Armies in the GOTHIC line.

(e) By the day the ITALIAN Army had over 50,000 combat troops and 300,000 Service troops and headquarters with the Allied Armies and in new areas. They had suffered 15,000 casualties.

The combat was more for the time being with the British Army, and not-

(4) In the morning of 14, the shortage of Allied transport in this
 theatre led to the decision to increase the number of Italian
 divisions from two to three then to organize the Italian combat
 force, so that they could entirely with British arms and equipment
 and to train them on British lines.

The first Infantry division (called "Combat Group" and about half
 the size of a British Division) was created within 6 weeks and
 the remainder successively at about weekly intervals. Four of
 them took part, with credit, in actual battle on the GUSTO line

 great numbers. They had suffered 10,000 casualties

throughout these heavy months the Italian Army had suffered
 well with the Allies, and although they were much more outnumbered
 to "earn their passage" by shedding blood in the actual fighting
 against the Germans (for which they had no but no equipment),
 they did their best to supply all the Allies needed in the way of
 auxiliary troops for service duties.

great credit is due to the soldiers who were put in charge of the new ITALIAN War Ministry (and in fact of the formations and units) at that time for what was achieved. The ITALIAN Army had more or less disintegrated, and it was no easy matter in the circumstances in which the Italian Government found themselves to impose the discipline and morale of the men and to train and equip them who were left. The ITALIAN Army had done much for the ALLIES, and for ITALY to "come back together".

3. ITALIAN ARMY

(2) The main reservations which I referred to are:

(a) The Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean Theater, has the right to assume command at any time of the whole or any part of the ITALIAN Army located in the theater and to veto any proposal not acceptable to the ALLIES.

(b) The ITALIAN Gov't has no intention to supply to the ALLIES all the information about the ITALIAN Army that may be required.

ATTENDING AGREEMENT OF THE ALLIED PRIME

About the time as the new policy for the Italian Army was discussed the ITALIAN War Ministry was informed of certain important considerations relating thereto:

(a) That it was the wish of the US and British Gov'ts that the ITALIAN Army of such a size as could reasonably be maintained by the ITALIAN Gov't should be brought to a high state of efficiency in the shortest possible time.

(b) That as far as possible the ITALIAN Army was to be organized and exercised on lines generally similar to those employed in the British Army.

(c) That with this end in view, the Allied Military Mission which had been the liaison link between Allied HQs and the ITALIAN Army since the early days of the campaign, would now advise and assist (instead of overruling) the ITALIAN Ministry of War in this new task of reorganization, training and administering the ITALIAN Army and G.I.s (in addition to carrying out the previous functions of obtaining and transmitting to the other Allied

- (c) that with it in view, the Allied Military Mission which had been the liaison link between Allied HQs and the Italian Army since the early days of the Expedition, would now advise and assist (instead of controlling) the Italian Ministry of War in this new task of reorganizing, training and administering the Italian Army and O.C. (in addition to carrying out the previous functions of obtaining and transmitting to superior Allied authorities such information about the Italian Army as was required).
- (d) that the Italian Ministry of War would normally accept the advice of the Mission.

5. RELATIONS BETWEEN NEW AND OLD ITALIAN ARMY

Before proceeding on a detailed study of the Italian Army, I ought here to make the promise that in all our dealings with the Italian War Ministry we have always endeavored to bring into account the temporary and transitional of the Italians and the initial characteristics of the Italian Army, on the principle that:

(1) anything that the ALLIES imposed that the ITALIANS did not like would be discarded as soon as our backs were turned, whereas what they willingly accept in its merits would remain.

(2) possible result to next effort, "just as long as home to the union but you can't make him afraid" - unless he wants to.

I am glad to say that this policy has paid us well, even though the policies of my Mission has been mostly tried at home. It has of course always been our aim to give the most sound and objective advice, to examine policies and not to make in purely ITALIAN affairs. This has earned for the Mission the trust and respect of the ITALIANS and thus we have got things done. Not once has it been necessary for us to appeal to the SAC (as I am entitled to do) because of the unwillingness of the War Ministry to follow our advice.

THE ITALIAN OF THE ITALIAN ARMY

of the disaster of the Gov't for the Army itself. So back to the matter during the war or the reorganization on to a peace basis was 1-1-1945. The time has now arrived however when we must make the problem and a proposal for reorganization of the War Ministry based on a simplified version of the British War Office organization has been submitted by the Ministry to the War Ministry and accepted in principle. In this connection we were able to convince the General Staff some months ago to try out the British system of British in Command. The ITALIAN immediately found this most valuable and I am sure the system has ever to stay. It is resulting in big economies of man-power and the new ITALIAN staffs are very closely to British ideas on the subject. A chief officer of the Italian side has no doubt at all meetings of the ITALIAN in Command.

(24) ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The figure of 20,000 (24 of the whole) for Administrative Services may seem low. But the peace time administration of the ITALIAN army is carried out as regards supply largely by the use of civilian contractors and is supported by the employment on permanent installations of civilian personnel. Moreover, this Italian Army is not envisaged for battle fighting on a great scale, but only locally on the frontiers. The administrative services consist of courses in command of the Peace Group allow ITALIAN Army larger than 100,000. In any event, even with only 20,000, the administration is working well.

(25) The ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES are about 20,000 (which the ITALIAN consider the minimum necessary) and are organized as shown on the chart. Their task is to uphold the authority of the ITALIAN Govt and to conduct the civil administration as a last

(iv) Administration

The figure of 25,000 (2% of the whole) for administrative services may seem low. Moreover, this Italian Army is not envisaged for battle fighting on a great scale, but only locally on the frontiers. (v) The Carabinieri (which the ITALIANS consider the military police) and are organized as shown on the chart. Their task is to uphold the authority of the Italian Gov't and to assist the civil authorities as a last resort for the maintenance of law and order in support of the civil police and Carabinieri. The five Inf Divs, which are stationed in the NORTH of ITALY in addition to the above role are also intended to serve as a deterrent to foreign aggression across the frontiers of ITALY.

These Five Inf Divs are the most modern organizations, trained and equipped by the British during the war.

The Indonesian National Armed Forces are an entirely new departure for the INDONESIAN Army. There is no RNC in each Post Region with a capacity for region of 3,600 recruits at a time - total 1,000 for the country. It has taken some time to get the necessary legislation approved fixing the terms of retirement, and of course this has had a most unsettling effect on all the other cadres. THE UNITED STATES

This is certainly the time of reference of the military situation, but it is true that the military have prepared for the future conference, perhaps for a future day of about 1970. We have been acquired by the military command that they do in their intention to use the world foundation on which the Eisenhower long to bring built on a basis for the new map, and simply to regard the various categories to meet what they consider to be essential military requirements. Each one, for instance, considering the first time to American life, are providing a new category of operating for their local and own foundation. Whatever these factors are to be, they obviously serve only as a slight deterrent to aggression across the frontiers, and something to "hold the fort" until confidence can arrive from outside. It will have to look pretty heavily on the United Nations Security Organization, or on other friendly nations around here. As regards equipment, we have already seen that the military will be entirely dependent on civilian help for their equipment (if this is to be effective) and civilian men and arms. They are trying to be allowed some modern and modern artillery in the state treasury.

(We shall be seen also how the military can contribute the future with equipment without some industrial assistance from the military. The past of years has shown us all too clearly the organizational and technical deficiencies of the military arm. SUBJECT: Problems and Tasks of Allied Commission
and those of its Successor.

With reference to 801/22A/30 of 11th June 1946, attached is a copy of a note on the present and future problems confronting the Allied Commission.

It is impossible to consider the responsibilities which will confront the successors of the Commission without any indication as to what organization will replace the Commission and what will be the scope of its activities. It has, therefore, been necessary to make certain assumptions.

I presume there is no intention of maintaining the present organization and merely changing its title. If ~~there~~ were there would be no object in differentiating between present and future responsibilities which would change more in theory than in practice though they would decrease in course of time. Moreover, such a plan, although it might be administratively convenient, would in my opinion, not be in keeping with the spirit of the terms of the revised Armistice and would, after the power which has been ~~vested~~ by the Commission, be quite contrary to well-established practice in such matters.

The attached note does not cover the Service Sub-Commissions. It is based mainly on activities with which the Civil Affairs Section has been concerned, but it is presumed that unless there remain responsibilities in connection with civil supplies for ~~VENETIA CIVILIA~~ ~~VENETIA CIVILIA~~ Economic responsibilities have already, in general, passed to other agencies.

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NOTE ON PROBLEMS AND TASKS OF THE ALLIED COMMISSION AND
THOSE OF ITS SUCCESSOR.

1. PRESENT PROBLEMS AND TASKS

These tasks fall under four main headings:-

- (A) Technical matters connected with A.M.G. in UDINE and VENEZIA GIULIA.
- (B) Acting as a medium for correspondence and representations between the Italian Government and representatives of Governments not in diplomatic relationship with the Italian Government.
- (C) Outstanding functions and residual matters (other than A.M.G.)
- (D) Information.
- (E) Personnel.

(A) A.M.G.

As regards A.M.G. in both UDINE AND VENEZIA GIULIA, the Commission reviews A.M.G. Court cases of a defined category and is responsible for general supervision of A.M.G. Courts.

In view of the fact that UDINE is under A.M.G. solely for military purposes, administration in this territory is left, as far as possible to the Italian authorities. Italian law has full effect and any new decrees passed automatically have effect in the Province. In many matters such as Education, Public Health, appointment of subordinate officials etc., local Italian authorities deal direct with the Italian Government in Rome. The Commission's responsibilities as regards UDINE are, therefore, less those which might normally apply.

As regards VENEZIA GIULIA, Italian law does not have effect in the territory and direct correspondence between local Italian officials and the Italian Government is prohibited.

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The Commission, therefore, advises on drafting of A.M.G. Orders and especially on those which keep A.M.G. legislation in line with that enacted in the remainder of Italy and acts as a medium for correspondence with the Italian Government on such matters as Education, promotion and pay of officials etc., It also advises on war booty problems.

Other matters such as Public Health, Public Safety, Local Government are dealt with almost exclusively by III Corps., A.M.G.

There may also be certain economic matters connected with civil supply for and industrial rehabilitation in VENETIA GIULIA.

(B) DIPLOMATIC MATTERS

The principal function of the Commission is to act as medium between the representative of the Yugoslav Government on the Advisory Council and the Italian Government in matters outside the province of the Advisory Council. These include such matters as alleged seizure of Italian fishing vessels by the Yugoslavs, arrest of Yugoslavs by the Italian authorities, and claims made by the Yugoslavs in respect of property and war booty.

(C) OUTSTANDING MATTERS AND RESIDUAL MATTERS (OTHER THAN AMB)

(a) Directions etc., from higher authority.

The Commission conveys to the Italian Government the directions, views or requests of the Supreme Allied Commander.

(b) Displaced Persons.

One of the main outstanding functions is that of Displaced Persons. Certain camps have recently been taken back from UNRRA bringing the total number of camps under the Commission to 15.

Unless there should be a rush of illegal Jewish entrants into Italy in connection with immigration into Palestine and except for a certain incidence of routine illegal entrants, the number of displaced persons and Refugees can be considered as static.

(b) Legal.

The Legal Sub-Commission are completing a review of all Court cases with a view to adjustment of all deterrent sentences. A careful check is also being made of all prisoners held under Allied authority in Italian prisons. The work should be completed by August 31st 1946. The Legal Sub-Commission also advises and expresses opinion on current matters and deals with such questions as trial of Merchant seamen.

(d) Local Government.

Now that the main Italian elections are over, the closing work on Local Government is mainly historical.

(e) Control of Munitions Production.

The control of production of arms and munitions is a function which, the Commission, though charged with it, has never been able to perform mainly through lack of personnel.

(f) Minor Matters.

Minor residual matters comprise certain current matters, some few matters pertaining to Sub-Commissions or Branches which have ceased to exist such as Education, Monuments and Fine Arts, Patriots etc., and enquiries from outside sources regarding individuals and property.

(g) INFORMATION.

By reason of the fact that the Commission has Liaison Groups or Officers in many areas in Italy, a large amount of information is obtained by means of D/O letters, telegrams, 'phone messages and monthly reports on matters which have long since been the responsibility of the Italian Government.

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Much information which duplicates the above is also obtained from Italian Government sources all of which has to be translated. All appropriate information is disseminated and further is collated into a monthly report normally about two months in arrears. It is not known of what interest such a report is to Washington and London.

Items of interest are transmitted to AFHQ and to the U.K. and U.S. Embassies, thus supplementing information obtained through Military and Consular channels respectively. This information service occupies much of the working time of many officers and a considerable number of civilian employees.

(E) PERSONNEL.

This Commission has already dropped functions solely by reason of lack of personnel caused by redeployment and release. Such process will continue. As regards the future, for instance, it could not be possible to continue the present activities of the Local Government Sub-Commission which will have lost all its key personnel by early July 1946.

The number of Legal officers available is insufficient to meet present requirements and the situation may continue to deteriorate. The provision of Public Safety Officers also presents a problem.

2. PROBLEMS WHICH WILL CONFRONT THE SUCCESSORS OF THE COMMISSION.

- (a) It is difficult to make an appreciation of these problems in the absence of any precise information as to what organization will replace the Allied Commission.

It is, therefore, necessary to make certain assumptions.

It is assumed that when the Allied Commission is abolished it will cease to exist in its present form.

It is further assumed that Allied Commission Liaison Groups and officers will be withdrawn and that collection of information on matters which are solely the responsibility of the Italian Government will cease and that AFHQ will rely on such military facilities as remain and the U.K. and U.S. Embassies on the peace-time source of Consular Offices. The press and radio will also be available.

On the above assumption it is presumed that in accordance with the revised Armistice the successors of the Allied Commission will be:-

Review of Court cases, co-ordination with Italian Government, supervision of A.M.G. legislation, advice on sundry civil affairs matters, medium for correspondence between Italian Government and Italian officials in AMG territory. (Note: There may be some economic functions to be included.)

- (ii) DISPLACED PERSONS.

To continue to act as medium between the Italian Government and the Yugoslav representative in Italy.

- (iii) DISPLACED PERSONS.

To continue to administer Displaced Persons not acceptable to UNRRA until some other organization accepts responsibility or until agreement is reached with the Italian Government that they will accept responsibility on the withdrawal of Allied Military support.

- (iv) GENERAL.

To act in a Liaison capacity between AMHQ and the Italian Government.

To deal with residual matters, to transfer matters to other agencies in accordance with policy and generally to wind up the affairs of the Allied Commission.

SUBJECT: Economic Section - Functions.

TO : The Chief Commissioner

1. With the cessation of the ABCOM supply line, and the successive transfers of control in various areas to the Italian Government, the Economic Section has been drastically reduced. The volume of work in connection with the remaining functions is scaled down. However, the diversity and scope of business tends to cover the whole field formerly comprised in the activities of the Section when it had 7 Sub-Commissions and 2 Branches. Matters arising are of such varied nature and the number of occasions on which a type of problem arises per month is uncertain. Hence the following statement of functions should be interpreted as listing only the more important activities.

2. The remaining functions of the Economic Section fall generally under one of the following headings:

- a. Clearing, consolidating and allocating the Venezia Giulia/Udine Supply Program.
- b. Advice on VG/Ud economic activities.
- c. Disposal of Captured Enemy Material to Italian Government.
- d. Collecting evaluating information and reporting upon economic conditions in Italy.
- e. Furnishing advice and assistance to the Italian Government, when requested.
- f. Liaison for Allied Military formations with Italian Government --

De-requisitioning
Supply of timber
Utilities
Power
Highways
Transportation and shipping.

- g. Attending to residual correspondence.

3. Venezia Giulia Supply

Requests for civil supplies are prepared by the AMOs of Venezia Giulia and U line. These requests are channeled through Allied Commission for purposes of:

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(32)

- a. Consolidation.
- b. Screening items which are available in the Italian economy. (Contacts with Italian Government and other agencies to get commitments on willingness to supply.)
- c. Screening items as to justifications.
- d. Making allocations and issuing instructions on the division of supplies as they arrive.
- e. Borrowing and repayment from other programs of essential supplies to cover non-arrivals.
- f. Insuring that the supply of electric power is made available to XIII Corps from sources in Italian Government territory.

In the operations above outlined there are many signals and other communications to establish understandings on items not originally clear, or on which changes are proposed.

4. Advice on VG/34 Economic Activities

This function includes responding to AMG inquiries and requests for information and instructions. It consists largely of dealing with isolated cases as they arise and covers widely divergent matters. A few typical recent examples are:

- a. Aiding toward the consummation of a contract for textile manufacture between VG mills and the Commodity Credit Corporation (US).
- b. Arranging contacts with the appropriate Italian Ministries on an extensive road construction project which extends beyond VG proper.
- c. Acting as channel for certain public works proposals of the Italian Government.
- d. Advising Udine on appropriateness of the use of AMG funds for certain purposes.
- e. Interpretation of Italian Government decrees, the application of which may be desirable for VG.
- f. Intercession with Italian Government for loan of 50,000,000 lire to reconstruct a cotton factory - Udine.
- g. The adoption of arrangements for trade between Italy/Venezia Giulia and Zona B Venezia Giulia.
- h. Assisting AMG in conforming to provisions of Italian trade agreements.

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The functions of Allied Commission with respect to AMG territory are somewhat comparable to those of an intermediate headquarters in a chain of command.

5. Disposal of Captured Enemy Material

- a. After the needs of the Allied Military have been met, captured enemy material, with the exception of a few special items, is turned over to the Italian Government on quantitative receipts. CEM Branch attends to the actual turnover to the Italian agency A.R.A.R. Officers of that Branch accompany the A.R.A.R. officials and agree on the quantities. Hand receipts are taken which are followed by more formal receipts from the Government. Since the dumps of material are very diversified as to types of material, quantities and locations and the A.R.A.R. organization is not well adapted to ready receipt and disposal, the job is difficult and the completion necessarily slow. This function will continue so long as military units are closing out and giving up previously undisclosed G.E.M. material.
- b. There are under the control of C.E.M. Branch certain files which pertain to the supply operation in Italy of the German RIK organization. These files are undergoing constant study and classification for the purpose of making their contents more useful to the Allied and Italian Governments. It appears that some organization must continue to handle C.E.M. until both American and British units are redeployed. The present volume of business is higher than usual, about 890 vehicles having been handed over this month by the Allies.

6. Economic Conditions in Italy

The personnel remaining in the Economic Section undertake to follow the basic economic conditions in Italy. The principal sources of information are AG Liaison Officers, the Italian Government, and ISERMA. Items which are observed include food stocks, rationing, agricultural production and supply, fuel and raw materials, supplies, electric power, labor and unrest, and transportation. (See Appendix A). Reports are made to SACMED when it is deemed that the information merits his attention.

7. Advice to the Italian Government

When requested, effort is made to advise and assist the Italian Government on economic problems. Here again the matters are of diverse nature. A few examples are:

- a. Furthering of international trade.
- b. Trading with British military administrations of occupied countries (ex-Italian colonies).

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c. Assisting in obtaining additional guards for property acquired from the Allies by the Italian Government.

d. Advice on agricultural problems.

e. Channeling inquiries from the War Office regarding availability of materials in Italy.

8. Residual Correspondence

The former Sub-Commissions of the Economic Section were active in their fields. Their shrinking or abolition has still left a considerable quantity of correspondence on which writers expect to receive action and replies. In instances the reply is limited to redirection to an appropriate agency, but in many cases some form of action may be justly expected by the writer. The correspondence covers the areas of:

Industry
Fuels

Finance
Surplus Property

In all areas work is continuously underway to clear files and prepare them for the Archives.

Registered unemployed is 1,334,596 for the month of March, 1946. To this must be added unregistered and concealed unemployment, as, for example, by the retention under the ban on dismissals of workers for whom there is not full employment, which is estimated to bring the total figure of unemployed in Italy to approximately 2 million. This estimated figure has not varied much over the past 12 months.

VII. Electric Power

The following sets forth the position with respect to the rehabilitation of electric power systems of the islands and the mainland of Italy from the date of liberation to 31 Dec. 1945.

The data is set up by areas in order to reflect the degree of damage and repairs completed as some areas were more severely affected than others.

The date of liberation is the approximate date on which the particular area was liberated.

The data on generating plants covers approximately 90% of the facilities of Italy. The remaining 10% consists of plants of 2000 KW and smaller and small isolated and privately owned plants not connected to any transmission grids. Neither are electric plants installed in industrial plants included whose output is entirely utilized by the particular industry.

The generating plants and transmission line facilities of the Italian State Railways are included since they are inter-connected with the grid systems.

The area "Southern Italy", used below, comprises the mainland beginning at approximately the Volturno and Biferno rivers and extending south to the toe of Italy. "Central Italy" comprises the area from the Volturno and Biferno rivers north to a line across Italy approximately half way between Florence and Bologna excepting the Pescara River plants which are included in Southern Italy since most of their output was utilized there. The area above the latter line is considered Northern Italy.

In accordance with the above quoted reference the following remarks are forwarded :-

The Navy Sub Commission, Headquarters Allied Commission is responsible for all matters relating to policy in connection with the Italian Navy under the Terms of Armistice and the supervision of the general Administration of the Italian Navy not directly affecting the operation of the Italian Fleet under the Cunningham-de-Courten Agreement. It is therefore the executive agency by which decisions of the Combined Chiefs of Staff, as they affect the Italian Navy, are implemented. It is emphasized that in accordance with the terms of the Combined Chiefs of Staff directive No. 515/1 dated 19th March, 1944, the Italian Navy is employed under the operational command of the Allied Naval Area Commander, who is the British Naval Commander-in-Chief, Mediterranean Station. The Chief of the Navy Sub Commission is also the Flag Officer Liaison Italy and as such is responsible to the Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean for the operation of the Italian Fleet.

It is assumed that the operational command will not alter and no problem of this nature should confront the successors of the Navy Sub Commission.

2. The work of the Navy Sub Commission can be conveniently divided into four broad divisions :

(A) Administration : this division is responsible for such matters as the enforcement of Armistice Terms. Port Organisation, Legal and Financial Matters, Transportation, Repair and Salvage, Mercantile Marine and general administrative questions.

(B) Personnel : this division is responsible for such matters as the Allocation, Training, Discipline, Control of the Movement of Personnel as well as certain duties which are now diminishing in connection with the Exemption of Civilians from Military Service, return of deserters, Prisoners of War and the appointment and removal of Italian Officers in the more important appointments.

This section will also be responsible for the reduction of the Italian Naval Personnel to the strength eventually agreed upon by the terms of the Peace Treaty.

(C) Supply : in accordance with the policy of the Combined Chiefs of Staff concerning the repair, maintenance and supply of Italian Naval vessels, laid down in C.C.S. 515 dated 19th March, 1944, the United Kingdom is primarily responsible for the maintenance of the Italian Navy. This involves the supply of food, medicine, fuel Motor Transport, Naval stores and equipment for which the supply division is responsible.

The predominant problems confronting the supply section at present are :-

- (a) Food : The Italian Government having assumed the responsibility for feeding the Italian Armed Forces as from the 1st June, 1946, and teething troubles are expected to arise.
- (b) The supply of minesweeping stores, equipment and coal for the maintenance and operation of the British minesweeping trawlers which have been transferred to the Italian Navy to assist in the clearance of mines from Italian waters.
- (c) Questions arising out of the transfer of responsibility to the Italian Government for the fuelling of the Italian Navy trawlers whereby POL products and coal for the maintenance of Italian Naval vessels are included in the Italian Government's overall import programme.
- (d) The turn over of surplus naval stores and equipment to the Italian Navy.

As regards future problems that may confront the supply division, these are mainly dependent on any changes that may be made in the Combined Chiefs of Staff policy towards the Italian Navy as a result of the signing of the Peace Treaty with Italy.

(D) Liaison : is the personal link between the Italian Ministry of Marine and the Navy Sub Commission. This division is also responsible for the collection of data on the Italian Navy, Maintenance of records of the activities of the Italian Navy, dissemination of information on organisation and policy of the Ministry of Marine, and the disposal of captured enemy material.

3. Most of the above duties can be expected to continue in a varying degree and will confront the successors of the Navy Sub Commission. The more important residual problems which will continue to arise are as follows :-

- (a) Requests for information on Naval Vessels and Merchant Ships between Italian Government Ministries and Allied Governments.
- (b) Status of rehabilitation of Italian shipbuilding industry.
- (c) Disposition of Captured Enemy Material.
- (d) Survey of War Materials held by the Italian Navy.
- (e) Status of Italian Navy in regard to material condition of ships and training of personnel.
- (f) Navy Sub Commission responsibilities and control over matters pertaining to the Merchant Marine.
- (g) The major problem of reducing the Italian Navy in Ships and personnel to the size eventually agreed upon under the terms of the Peace Treaty.

4. There is no problem at present in this Sub Commission relative to the preponderance of British personnel. Every effort has been made to maintain equal representation of British and U.S. personnel and distribution of duties equitably.

It further protects these individuals from forcible repatriation, with regard to which, there appears no machinery to compel the Italian Government to maintain the Allied Policy of not forcibly repatriating dissidents, except through Diplomatic channels.

1. In accordance with your memorandum of 11 June 1946, ref. 801/224/EC, submitted herewith suggested briefing on Communications Sub-Commission.

2. The field of activity of the Communications Sub-Commission comprises postal, telephone, telegraph and radio and in these fields it acts as the principal liason agency between the Allied Military and Italian civilian agencies. In the past it has also acted in an advisory capacity to the Italian Ministry of Posts and Telecommunications but this role is expected to cease with the closing of the Allied Commission.

3. The necessity of maintaining liason with the Italian Government, however, will remain regardless of the future of the Allied Commission. All liason on technical matters will be carried out by Signals and transfer of this work is already under way. Liason on policy matters affecting both telecommunications and postal matters cannot properly be handled by Signals and it is therefore proposed that this work be retained by whatever body succeeds the Allied Commission.
