  3. Conversation with Col. Miller, CIO Bolzano has yielded the information that there is very little likelihood of an "international incident" arising out of this case. Grastan is likely to be deported in the near future by the Italian authorities. He will then probably be tried in absentia.
  4. He is still at liberty in Bolzano and the Quarters has confirmed that the position is unchanged pending a reply from the Ministry of the Interior.

1. With reference to your letter number 600/EC or the 9th of August 1946, I attach hereto three copies of a report on the gentleman concerned, submitted by the Prefect of Bolzano to the Ministry of the Interior on the 17th of July 1946.

2. There is very little I can add to it except to say that the Questura today confirms the situation is unchanged and the reply from the Ministry of the Interior is still awaited. Perhaps this will be brought to Bolzano by Dr. Innocenti, who is interested in the case.

3. Crastan came to see me in mid-July to report that he had heard his house and property were to be sequestered. (He feared the Italians might put this threat into effect). I informed him that Lt. Col. HORN would shortly arrive in Bolzano and would personally investigate his case, and gave him a letter to the effect that none of his property would be removed without reference to me, pending the decision of Lt. Col. Horn, and his committee. The house has been visited and Lt. Col. Horn has taken a full report on this subject to Rome.

The a/m alien has been arrested on 27 May at Merano and denounced for appropriation of CFM and for collaboration with members of the ex-Wehrmacht.

Crastan came in 1935 from Pontedera to Merano, where he settled down buying Castle Garzets.

During German occupation he was on friendly terms with General Bruner, Head of the German Police in the Operation Zone of the Presalpe (Provinces Bolzano, Trento and Belluno). He was also a friend of Mr. Schrent, attached to the SS HQ, of Mr. van Haden, who alleged to be president of a hypothetical Committee of the International Red Cross and was a frequent visitor of Castello Garzets - Merano, HQ of SS, so that by public opinion he was known as active cooperator of the Gestapo.

Information has arrived at the U.S. Office of Merano that Crastan, soon after the end of the war, in agreement with van Haden and probably with high German HQs, has gathered in his castle huge quantities of material of all kind, from cars to foodstuffs; besides he is alleged to have participated in the printing of forged pound-sterlings, which printing took place in Castle Labers during German occupation, and in the sale of these forged notes on the national market.

This information appeared confirmed by the fact that, when in June 1946 CIC arrested van Haden, Crastan informed CIC that in his flat there was a safe, military type, which he stated had been there deposited by Crastan and the contents of which he said he did not know, and which resulted to be of several thousands of forged pound notes, printed as above. At Crastan's, in two further searches made by the P.S. Agents, motorcar materials, petrol, and large quantities of foodstuffs were found.

The same was found with Verdier Giuseppe, peasant, a/cve collaborator of Crastan.

The Prefecture of Merano has issued on 10 June arrest warrant No. 26/46 against Crastan, because charged of unlawful appropriation, subtraction, normal use of important quantities of foodstuffs, petrol drums, rolls of copper-wire, tyres for motorcars and for having dealt in rationed goods.

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It besides appears that Crastan tried to influence his employees to sign the motion for annexation of South-Tyrol to Austria which has been then sent to Paris.

By order of the Procura di Stato and of the Pretura of Merano a/m alien has been released on provisional liberty on 11 June.

Owing to the fact that a/m alien has carried out dirty activities and contrary to national interests, and that his presence in Alto Adige not only is subject to unfavourable comments, but may be dangerous for security reasons, it is proposed to intern Crastan in a concentration camp, whilst awaiting the sentence of the trial against him and his accomplices.

1. M. de Weck, the Swiss Minister in Rome, communicated the following information to me this morning. I pointed out that this was not in any way within my Terms of Reference, but he insisted, on the ground that perhaps it might be treated in confidence. As I know him well personally, and as he has been recently of service to A.P.H.Q. I agreed to inform you personally.
2. Alberto Crastan was the Swiss Consular Agent at MERANO, which depends on VENICE. (Swiss Consulate General).
3. He was relieved of his Official duties in the summer of 1945, as it had been brought to the notice of the Allied Authorities, who then informed the Swiss Government, that he was in close relationship with the German SS Representatives.
4. The Italian authorities at MERANO, (Dottore MODRINI, Publica Sicurezza), have initiated proceedings on the ground that he is in illegal possession of large quantities of German material which belonged to the Wehrmacht. He is further charged with collaboration.
5. The Captured Enemy Material Section, Milan, are also interested in the case. The Officers dealing with the case appear to be Lieut. Colonel HORN (Br), Major MCWORTH (Br), and Colonel MILLER (US). BOLSAFO.
6. Crastan is provisionally at liberty at MERANO.
7. M. de Weck, the Swiss Minister in Rome, has been instructed by his Government to ascertain how the case stands, and to obtain any relevant information.
8. My personal impression is that what M. de Weck intends to convey,

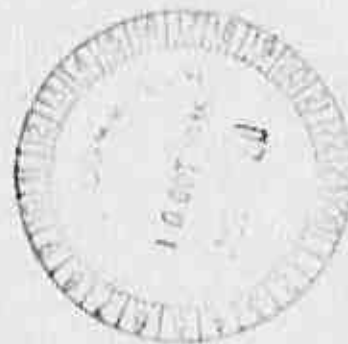
