My dear Mr. Prime Minister:

The evolution of the post-armistice Italian Land Forces into their present form has been dictated largely by the sequence of events. Before the German surrender the primary requirement was to develop at speed ad hoc forces to take their part in the fighting against Germany. Since May 1945 the problem has been to demobilise the older clauses and reorganise the Army on to a reduced peace basis.

To avoid confusion, the pre-war set up of the Ministry of War has been maintained to date.

The crystallisation of the present "Interim" Army is now well advanced and the merging of this into the Peace Treaty Army should not present undue difficulty.

The Ministry of War, however, remains organized on the traditional lines of the past and contains many features out of keeping with modern thought and developments, particularly in view of the changed circumstances of the Italian Army, both in respect of size and armament. I might mention that considerable reorganization has begun to take place both in the British War Office and the U.S. War Department.

I feel strongly, therefore, that in order to achieve economy and efficiency in Italy's own interest, the time has now arrived when the organization of the Ministry of War should be examined comprehensively.

I would suggest that the first step should be to appoint a strong committee within the War Ministry to examine, with the assistance of my Land Forces Sub-Commission, its existing organization and to make recommendations for such reorganization as may be required.

The above remarks apply to the Italian Air Ministry as well, and I understand that a similar study, with the assistance of my Air Forces Sub-Commission, is already in progress.

The exploration of this problem will take time and should not be unduly delayed. I would therefore be glad to have your concurrence as soon as possible.

Further to the above and your recent talks with Brig. HOPE:-

1. I attach a suggested DRAFT of a letter to be sent by Chief Commissioner to the Prime Minister.
2. I feel that we should:-
  - (a) Explain why we have not proposed this reorganization before and why we do so now. Then the proposal will not come as a "sinister bomb-shell".
  - (b) Explain why it is so necessary and that the British W.O. and U.S. W.D. are doing the same. That will "save face" for them.
  - (c) Take a firm line and say it must be done now. Otherwise they may stall and procrastinate, fearing the political implications and the tackling of such a major change now.
3. The Navy say they want no change, so the answer is to start the exploration within Army and Air Ministries. Later, in the course of discussion, we can see whether it is possible or advisable to consider a combined supply service for all three service Ministries, but there is no need to raise that aspect yet.
4. The above has been agreed by Air Forces Sub-Commission, A.C.
