1. Public Safety Liaison Officers report public order normal in Italian Government territory during past 24 hours.

2. The senior Civil Service Police Officer Venetian District reports that at 6.15 p.m. on 12th June 1946, an unauthorized anti-Italian demonstration by about 2,000 persons took place in Trieste City.

3. The demonstrators resisted police instructions to disperse, they dug up the road using the material so obtained as missiles and opened fire on the police. The police returned the fire (30 shots were exchanged) without causing casualties.

4. Finally, at 1130 p.m., two tear gas bombs were used by allied public safety officers which effectively dispersed the crowd.

5. Casualties:

23 Civilians (none serious)



My dear Hawke.

I have just been eye-witness to an incident which has made a disagreeable impression upon me. Attracted by shouting I looked out of the windows on the North side of the Headquarters overlooking Via Quattro Novembre.

It appeared that a small Monarchist procession had been marching down the street towards the Piazza Venezia and by the time I arrived the 3rd Reparto Celere was breaking it up. Their method consisted principally in driving vehicles loaded with policemen round and round on, to and off pavements, scattering chairs, notice-boards, etc., etc., and leaping off, in numbers, to set upon individuals. I saw several men beaten up, man-handled and carried away. One man I particularly noticed was standing stationary on the pavement and so far as I could see completely inoffensive and inactive. He was set upon by at least 6 P.S. agents who belaboured him with their truncheons and carried him a good deal the worse for wear to their truck. Other men I saw arrested or beaten were certainly being so far provocative as to carry Royalist flags.

It was quite clear to me that the Police were concerned, not so much to maintain order, for there was nothing that could really be described as disorder, as to make an example of individuals known or shewing themselves to be Royalist sympathisers. The action of the Police was in my view brutal, provocative and definitely partisan. Unhappily only too reminiscent of Fascist days. I much fear that action of this sort by Police during the present explosive period may well lead to serious breaches of the peace.

It is of interest to take note of the unit which was concerned in view of what we have heard of them in the past. You will recall a well-authenticated report that this unit, called upon some few days ago to disperse a Republican crowd which was so I understand lawlessly invading private property, refused to do so and left them to their own devices.

My personal opinion of course is of little value but I must say that a few more incidents of this sort would go far towards erasing the most favourable impression left upon me by the manner in which the elections were conducted.

The following information was received by phone from Capt. Brown, P.S. Officer Naples, at 16.30 hours 7th June 1946.

Between 13.30 and 14.00 hours today, groups of Monarchists each several hundred strong demonstrated for the Monarchy in various parts of the City. Some travelling around the main roads in motor trucks with Italian flags.

Between 1400 and 1430 hours all above groups collected on Via Roma where several hundred thousands marched in procession and are still marching round main roads.

Mobile squads of P.S. Agents, CO.RR. and Italian Troops are continually patrolling.

In one instance shots were fired from a building near the University at a P.S. patrol and patrol returned fire. 1 Italian soldier reported killed, 6 civilians wounded, 40 arrests. Otherwise quiet.

SUBJECT : Political Activity

TO : A/Director, Public Safety Sub-Commission.

1. This Division has received the following information in connection with activities during the present elections. The source has not been previously used and its general reliability cannot, therefore, be correctly gauged but it is significant to say that a high police official for whom I have the highest regard has also been informed in much the same way.

2. It is said that either this evening or tomorrow (Tuesday) there will be a mass demonstration of Leftist parties and people in favour of the new Republic. The object is to announce the new Republic although the official results will not be published for some four or five days.

3. All public offices will be seized and in particular such Government offices as the Ministry of Interior and other places where votes are being stored and counted.

4. It is also said that the Republicans staging this 'coup d'etat' are in possession of about 500 CC.RR. uniforms which will be used by members selected to carry out arrests amongst higher Government officials known to have Monarchist sympathies or who are opposed to the Left Wing parties.

5. As mentioned above the reliability of this information cannot be checked at the moment but the situation generally is being closely watched through contacts who have been known to us for a long time.

MIAMI, 11 May 1946.

The Directory of the Communist Party has been the source of the following information which we have received:

On Friday night at 11.00 hrs a telegram in cipher arrived from the General Direction of the Communist Party, ordering a state of emergency in the whole Communist Party in all Italy.

A peremptory order that all partisan formations depending from the Communist Party should be kept on a war footing, and armed guards placed at all the offices of the municipal and provincial federations.

Armed patrols to be placed in the establishments ready to intervene immediately in the struggle, according to Order No. 2 dated 20 March 1946.

The city is divided into eight Regi. as with eight autonomous commands, in direct contact with the Federations of the Communist Party.

Ten control posts have been fixed for every region. Lists of war criminals and reactionaries have been distributed, who are to be taken immediately as hostages.

TRANSLATIONMINISTRY OF THE INTERIOR

For the coming political elections and the referendum, the predisposed plan for the public services refers to two distinct periods: the first during the voting, i.e. from 2 to 4 June; the second comprising the proclamation of the results of the elections and of the referendum from 4 to 10 June and immediately following days.

The two moments require entirely different measures of public order. For the first it is necessary to make arrangements for watching approximately 36.000 electoral sections with consequent scattering of the forces; for the second, on the contrary, it is necessary to have the forces together in order to control eventual demonstrations and also eventually to assume the defense of public offices and public services of particular importance.

For the first period it has been arranged that to each Section be assigned 4 men, of which possibly two - and in any case at least one - P.S. agents or carabinieri. To achieve this, it has been necessary to reduce to the minimum or even close all the less important offices and commands of P.S., of the carabinieri and of the finance guards for the period between 31 May and 4 June, and to utilise - besides the P.S. agents, the carabinieri and the finance guards thus made available - also the Forestal and the Municipal Guards, the Firemen not on duty for their units, and finally the sworn guards.

There will remain at the disposal of the Ministry, in order to be used in each region, mobile battalions of carabinieri and P.S. agents on trucks so that they are in condition to hurry without delay should the occasion arise.

For Northern Italy it is hoped that it will be possible to use for this purpose detachments of the five mobilized Divisions, even taking as minimum unit the battalion or the group.

To complete the forces who will attend to watch the electoral sections (consider that 144.000 men are necessary to have only 4 in each section), it has been arranged that should also concur, not in substitution, but only as integration - with prohibition of entering the premises where the elections are taking place and all wearing the same armband in the Italian colors, with the main task of pacifying and persuading eventual troublemakers - the listed representatives who ought to be two for every list submitted in the college, according to the articles 16, 20 and 51 of the Decree of 10 March 1946, Nr. 74.

For the second period which, as has already been said, goes from 4 to 10 June and the following days, it has been arranged that all the forces which have been displaced in the provinces should instead be concentrated in those centers where the Prefects, with their competence, consider it suitable to concentrate them in order to have them at their disposal.



Excellency,

Without doubt the Allied Commission is in possession of all the information in order to foresee the result of the imminent political elections in this country.

If the Allied Commission has not sufficient observers to ascertain the illegality, the injury, as well as the fraud which will be committed by the social-communists; and if the Allied Commission has not sufficient force to repress, and to suffocate a growing revolution, it would be better to postpone the elections to an indefinite date.

A minority, who are addicted to violence, have a great quantity of money and fire-arms (heavy and light, with a great provision of munitions) and their passions are in flame. They will overcome the majority who desire peace, true liberty, and who are above all, monarchists.

Otherwise we shall see the "Maresciallo Russo Togliatti" possess himself of the Government with all the consequences which are easy to imagine.

It will be observed that subparagraph 4 of the resolution as given in my report does not correspond to the meaning of the Italian text. In other words, the information conveyed to me was incorrect with respect to that item, and the elimination by violence referred to fascists who for one reason or another have been able to avoid epuration or have been able to save themselves in the Fascist breakup of April 1945.

Riunione Esecutivo Comunista in
Milano il Giorno 26 Marzo 1946

Ponte molto attendibile che per ragioni di riservatezza e sicurezza personale desidere mantenere l'incognito, segnala che in Milano il giorno 26 marzo 46 si è riunita una sezione particolare dell'esecutivo comunista: In detta riunione è stato letto un'ordine del giorno nel quale si danno agli elementi dipendenti le seguenti disposizioni:

1. Appena avvenuta la Costituente, se con esito favorevole per il P.C. verrà dato l'ordine di arresto immediato per tutti gli appartenenti alla Casa Reale ed i rami collaterali; pertanto necessita fin da ora individuare l'indirizzo esatto di ciascun membro di Casa Reale.
2. Con la proclamazione della Costituente avverrà da parte di operai comunisti l'occupazione delle fabbriche.
3. Nelle campagne si provvederà immediatamente alla distribuzione delle terre ai contadini eliminando sia la proprietà che i latifondisti i quali si opponessero al provvedimento.
4. Si procederà immediatamente alla eliminazione violenta di tutti i fascisti non epurati, assolti dalle Corti, o che in un modo o nell'altro sono riusciti a salvarsi durante l'insurrezione popolare del 25 aprile 1945.

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"To an independent observer the election activities of the Communist Party in this area reflect a directive organization of great efficiency. The campaign is extraordinarily well managed, and apparently financial resources are abundantly adequate and liberally applied. Compared with the other political parties the activities of the Communists are so superior that a comparison is almost without point. Every village is provided with a speaker at least once a week, mostly on Sundays. Public buildings are plastered with the Communist insignia. The radio at all hours of the day gives out Communist propaganda and in Milan itself auxiliary organizations are ceaselessly active. For instance, there was recently established in Milan a local entity known as La Casa della Cultura. Notices of the establishment of this organization included a long list of names of Italian intelligenzia and the inaugural ceremonies were held in the quarters of the former Union Club of Milan, although only the street address was given. The Communist Party took over the Union Club during the last days of the German occupation of Milan and it has been reluctant to release the quarters even though it has no use for them. The establishment of the Casa della Cultura was merely a subterfuge employed to retain these quarters. Signor FARRI, ex-prime minister of Italy, spoke at the inaugural ceremonies which were attended by some 500 persons many of whom did not realize until later that it was a Communist manoeuvre. Likewise the Unione Donne Italiane, or the Women's Organization of the Communist Party, gave an exhibition of domestic handicraft which attracted large crowds. The outstanding public manifestation consisted of an orderly procession estimated to have consisted of some 100,000 persons who paraded in the center of the city on March 14, which stopped all traffic and caused some retail stores to close their doors. The purpose of the demonstration was difficult to learn, but banners and placards referred to the desire of the workers to be free from security insurance payments and pleaded for a staying order against the dismissal of employees in accordance with recent efforts to effect an orderly reduction of employees in those industries which have no need for them. Altogether, the Communist Party activities during the elections have reflected excellent organization, the disbursement of funds on a large scale and a considerable public interest. The Russian Consul in Milan who appears to be liberally supplied with money is now engaged in purchasing real estate both in Milan and Genoa.

From a reliable source it has been learned that MOSCATELLI, assisted by an associate known as HULG, whose real name is FOLDINI, is the most influential and dangerous Communist in this vicinity. He is said to have recently received the sum of 500 million lire from Russia. He is Counselor of the Communist Party and the head of ANPI (Associazione Nazionale Partisani Italiani), the headquarters of which are now being transferred from Milan to Rome. This is the central organization for a possible uprising in Italy and passes as a non-partisan

organization. Mazzatelli is said to dress like Tito and is talked about as the proposed leader, at the appropriate time, for a march on Rome. He takes orders from Togliatti and Russia. It is this organization that deserves watching in Rome.

Togliatti spoke in the Piazza del Duomo in Milan on Sunday, March 31. There was a crowd estimated at 200,000 persons in the public square to hear him. Some observers state that the Piazza had the appearance on that occasion of Fascist days when these congregations were of frequent occurrence. All men in uniform were rigorously excluded from the Piazza. It was an orderly crowd and the meeting provided the opportunity for many Communist processions of a noisy nature through the streets to the center of the town. Togliatti attacked the Christian Democratic Party, indicating that the Communists have some fear from that direction, and also attacked the monarchists. He thanked the Allied governments, including Russia, for aid given to Italy, but made some remark to the effect that they have the obligation to help Italy. He resorted to a common election manœuvre in giving assurances that no one need have fears of what the Communists will do in a government directed by them, and he attempted to allay anxiety on the score of division of the wealth.

From a source which I believe should be given full credence, it has also been learned that the Executive Committee of the Communist Party in a meeting held in Milan on March 26, 1946 adopted the following resolutions:

1. In the event that the political elections are favorable, the following orders will be immediately promulgated:
 - a. all factories will be taken over by the workers;
 - b. farmers will take possession of the land and will distribute it among themselves, eliminating all property rights;
 - c. the arrest will be made of all members of the Royal family;
 - d. the elimination by violence will take place of all persons who are not sympathetic with Communist ideas.

Paragraph no. 1 was elucidated by the statement that favorable elections meant favorable to the left parties and did not necessarily mean a complete Communist victory. The underscored part of sub-paragraph "d" is in the actual reading of the text of the resolution.

Italians, other than monarchists, express their belief **1416** that the results of the referendum in June will be unfavorable to the monarchy. The monarchists limit themselves to a hope that the middle and southern parts of Italy will vote to preserve the monarchy. In other than monarchist circles, there appears to be a general belief that unless there is a preponderant majority in favor of the monarchy there will be trouble.

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- { In other words, there seems to be a widespread opinion that if the voting is favorable to the monarchy by a very small percentage disturbances are likely to follow any attempt by the monarchy to preserve itself. As there does not seem to be, at least in this area, any preponderant class of voters favoring the monarchy an overwhelming vote in favor of the monarchy does not seem to be possible."

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The Noiseless Red Terror

It is known that the I.C.P. to comply with orders from Moscow joined the Govt. Coalition and has since been approving of bills and laws which are plainly contrary to Marx, policy.

The passing of the compulsory vote bill so stirred the Communist Party H.Q. that Togliatti was forced to tell the press the Party would quit the Govt. should the bill be passed.

As a matter of fact the law was passed and the Communists did not resign for the Soviet Political circles directed them to do so, and advised them as to how they should manage to have the law changed and the penalties against non voters abolished.

In fact, later the law was changed and modified so as to meet Moscow's wishes, and consequently it was deprived of all the efficacy the ruler had intended to give it.

The only substantial paragraph left is the No. 6 which forbids political propaganda to churchmen. The approval of this article originated deep discrepancies between the Vatican and the Christian Democratic Party which was accused with having slavishly given up to Social Communist pressure.

Once they had tested the Political weakness of their opposers, the Social-Communists had the Govt pass a lot of measures on their favour with the definite purpose of showing the Allies that everything is effected with lawfulness and justice.

The rightist parties fearing reprisal, slavishly approved of all the Communists proposed, turning thus into their hands the weapons to fight them on a field that, although perfectly lawful to the unexperienced, really makes it possible to adhere tightly to Moscow directions, which plan in Communist circles is being referred to as the "Noiseless dread". The plan consists in obtaining all they want from their political opposers, by checking up every activity, securing the least details of both their political and private life - Such enquiry is effected even in regard of their farthest relatives in order to set up a record to be used in due time to blackmail and soften them.

On this subject De Gasperi's case is quoted, in regard of whom a bulky "dossier" including speeches that the Christian Democratic leader is alleged to have made at the Austrian Dict when he was a Parliament-member of that country. On his regard, besides some circumstances, allegedly very serious one, have been gathered concerning his part in the occasion of Battisti's hanging.

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Evidently De Gasperi was purposely made understand something about it and the consequence of that are allegedly De Gasperi's numerous compromises with the Social-Communists, which made him be called by Orlando "Master of compromises".

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In some responsible circles the rumour was spread with a certain suspicious frequency of an alliance treaty existing between De Gasperi and Logliatti, according to which the former was offered the Presidency of the Republic and the latter in return was given the assurance that Christian Democrats will not hinder the Communist propaganda or at least, very softly.

With this "noiseless terror" and the socialists' help a light minority dominates today the country's life.

Meantime the Communists to take a better stand in the forthcoming elections and neutralize the rightist parties' activity were able to obtain some regularions to be approved of, such as:
 1) - : the law diminishing press freedom issued for wartime and which was skeduled to cease w.e.f. 15/4/46 has been extended to the end of July 1946 in order that no new newspapers can be issued and the old ones supporting the opposition can be boycotted.

And as though that would not be sufficient, Social-Communists have got hold of all the available paper.

- 2) The law on the epuration which was to cease w.e.f. on 31/3/36 has been extended for North Italy to 31/5/46 in order to prevent some 500.000 persons still under epuration screening from voting. The Social-Communists had the date for the elections established as June 2 in order to prevent some 600.000 P.O.W.s still abroad from voting since they are mostly against leftist parties.
- 3) The act of Pardon for servicemen in order to give them the impression that they could only obtain so much through Togliatti's kind consideration. The victories achieved by Social Communists in the recent elections are considered mostly due to De Gasperi who is forced to keep abreast with the leftist parties in promising social reforms in order not to loose the masses which are now disconcerted and drugged by Social-~~Dem~~¹² leftist propaganda.

The evidence of this weakness can be found in many key ministers having been left in leftist hands, above all the Interior's to the Socialist Romita who although he himself an honest man, is obliged to accomplish the Communists' wishes who ordered him to effect the administrative elections before the political ones only in those town where the Communist majority could be foreseen and to postpone the voting in the other towns to after the Constituent.

Still according to the "Noiseless red terror" plan, the following directions were issued to the various Communist H.Q.s:

Meantime the Communists to take a better stand in the forthcoming elections and neutralize the rightist parties' activity were able to obtain some regularions to be approved of, such as:

1) - the law diminishing press freedom issued for wartime and which was scheduled to cease w.e.f. 15/4/45 has been extended to the end of July 1945 in order that no new newspapers can be issued and the old ones supporting the opposition can be boycotted.

And as though that would not be sufficient, Social-Communists have got hold of all the available paper.

- 2) The law on the epuration which was to cease w.e.f. on 31/3/45 has been extended for North Italy to 31/5/46 in order to prevent some 500.000 persons still under epuration screening from voting. The Social-Communists had the date for the elections established as June 2 in order to prevent some 600.000 P.O.W.s still abroad from voting since they are mostly against leftist parties.
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Still according to the "Noiseless red terror" plan, the following directions were issued to the various Communist H.Q.s:

- 1) number of "People's patrols" and of "pioneers" to be increased;
- 2) electoral certificates to be bought from poor voters at top-price of 1.000 lire each;
- 3) directions to be given to communist members in post Offices to delay delivery of mail addressed to rightist parties and such personalities contrary to leftist parties as will be

pointed out.

Delivery of electoral certificates not to be affected or to be delayed, mostly in large towns. By this system more than 150,000 electoral certificates were not delivered in Milan, which gave the elections a different outcome.

- 4) Communist members in jails to keep ready to fling the doors open on short notice in order to upset public order.

As to the institutional question it is reported that social Communists took advantage of either the weakness or partnership of De Gasperi to make the political elections in a hurried-up way and simultaneously with the referendum in order to compel the various candidates to declare themselves either for or against the republic; this as they reckon that most of the candidates are not prepared to face in open meetings the fanatic and excited communists and therefore they will at least stand for the republic or at least assume an undecided attitude as to the constitutional problem.

To the whole of the Communist activity, the threats, the enticements must be added, especially towards the farmers who are being promised that the 1946 harvest will be entirely left to them and nothing will be given to land-owners. The Social-Communists are only worrying as to whether the elections will be postponed, since they fear that :

- 1) the delay might soften the enthusiasm and the wits of the masses after the Social Communists victory in the administrative elections;
- 2) Should that case, the promises to the farmers would not be kept because it is felt that Police forces will in the meantime be reinforced;
- 3) After a test-period of Social Communist administration in the various towns the situation would completely overturn since the new officials were chosen no more for their moral and technical qualities than for their revolutionary principles, as most of them are ex-convicts and adventurers and their methods could not therefore last long without raising discontent and possibly reaction.

I have heard for the last few days rumours and received yesterday official confirmation that Train Guard duties, hitherto performed in and around Rome by the 63rd Lt AA Regiment, are in the immediate future to be taken over by Polish troops.

Hitherto of course your policy has been to confine the number of Polish troops in and around Rome within strict limits and hitherto no Polish troops have been employed on armed duties in Rome.

I am of course well aware of the necessity which compels this change of policy, but I feel that I must observe the following two likely reactions: (1) I think there is no doubt that certain circles in the Second Polish Corps will represent that we have till now arbitrarily limited their numbers in Rome and now that it suits our convenience we are increasing them. (2) There is certain to be a brisk Italian reaction both at the increase of Polish numbers in Rome and at the fact that they are now to be employed on duties which will certainly cause them to open fire on frequent occasions at the Italians. I think, moreover, that it is very probable that it may be represented both by certain Italian political parties and by Delegations of our Allies in Rome as being a move prompted by our apprehensions as to the outcome of the forthcoming elections.

I have no doubt that these considerations have been fully weighed in reaching the present decision, but feel it my duty to mention to you what I apprehend.



A very reliable source reports that on 26/3/46 in Milan a particular branch of the Communist Party held a meeting wherein an order of the day giving the following directions was read :

- 1) Soon after the Constituent Assembly if favourable to the Communist Party a warrant of arrest will be issued for any member of the Royal family and its side-branches; it is therefore necessary to get the exact whereabouts of all of them as soon as possible.
- 2) Plants and factories will be occupied by Communist workers on the declaration of the Constituent Assembly.
- 3) In the country the land will be immediately distributed to farmers thus eliminating ownership and landowners who might oppose the move.
- 4) All non expatriated or acquitted or in any way whatsoever survived fascists will be violently eliminated.

A reliable source reports that the completion of enquiry on the Communist Party's activity revealed that at n.77 Viale Regina Margherita, Milan, in the house formerly occupied by Mr. Ceccarelli, Piscitelli, Mesiano and another person whose name is not known, all of whom left Milan for Rome being members of the Italian Social Republic, and later impounded by Communists the secret files of the Communist Party are being kept including documents of broad national and possibly international interest (Soviet correspondence).

Further the organization and propaganda activity of the Communist reaction in Italy is being effected in the centres of Communist reconstruction, namely in Milan, n.3 Via Boggiano, in Rome, n.68 Via Palestro, In Venezia, Ca Roscarri, in Turin, address unknown.

Seemingly secret meetings are being held where all the subjects concerning the utter elimination of non Communist parties most of all monarchic groups and ex-fascists are dealt with. It seems doubtful that long lists of persons to be eliminated were compiled.

It was also ascertained that the most important G.A.P. and S.A.P. leaders of the new reactionary movement (Communist) used to gather in the house of Mrs. Grossi Emilie, n.6 Piazza Bocconi.

Neither the day nor the time of such meetings could be learned as the organization is based on such a complicated and strict connection system as to be impossible for a stranger, even through a communist, to attend them.

Even in case you could, it would mean a certain death.

It is not possible for the time being to supply further details, as in view of the forthcoming elections the watch has been heavily intensified and elements reported dangerous for the Communist Party are being kept under strict observation.

TRANSLATION

The Communist Party in agreement with the Socialists are preparing a surprise uprising which is scheduled for 3/6/46. Orders to that effect allegedly have already been issued to the depending Federations to which a sealed envelope to be opened only on 1/6/46 has been sent through special messengers.

According to such order between 2 and 3 June a large demonstration as if the referendum results were yet known to be favourable to the republic should take place before the referendum results are actually known.

According to the directions given, the large towns should be occupied and reprisals against ex fascists whom the epuration failed to strike, against monarchists and P.S. Officers including CC.RR.s in order to discard Police forces should be carried out.

Social-Communists believe that Police Forces will not react fearing the referendum-results are actually for the republic, so P.S. agents and CC.RR.s will endeavour to gain the Social Communists' favour.

To solve every detail the most famed partisan leaders have been called to Rome, including Moscatelli, who talking to a friend is alleged to have told him about the uprising being scheduled for 7/6/46 before issuing the referendum results.

In case of favourable results the uprising will be legalized by politicians.

The movement center is to be in Milan acknowledged as the natural Social-Communists fortress.

To materialize and carry out in every least detail the plot the decision has been taken of moving the INPI HQ to Milan and to postpone the deadlock day for epuration in the North to 3/5/46 to prevent 50.000 people approaching the pcls.

The only point which worries the leaders is the Allies' attitude as they would like to know what reaction would the plot cause amongst them.

The Communist Party HQ upon seeing that the Italian population has a stronger tendency towards the Christian Democratic Party, has received orders to contact De Gasperi and offer him the Presidency of the Italian Republic.

That is provided De Gasperi will do his best to drive 1400 Christian Democratic Party on a republican ground,

De Gasperi is said to have been pleased with the proposal.
