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1. Since the receipt of HQ. A.C. 808/10/COS dated 14th of October, 1944, re. the derequisition of the above Villa, extensive enquiries have been made and the following facts elucidated.
- (a) - The Duchess of Bovino has had several different Offices dealing with the matter, none of whom were aware of the other's activity. In actual fact she was dealing verbally with Major Huggins, Town Major of Naples, on whose records the requisition had originally been placed.
 - (b) - The Town Major told her that the Villa could not be derequisitioned as it was required by A.F.H.Q. - Welfare, who are the present occupants.
 - (c) - The Duchess, given the opportunity, removed the furniture she desired, after which the present occupants made an inventory, a copy of which is attached.
 - (d) - The original requisition was made on the 16th of October, 1943.
 - (e) - Owing to military requirements no date can be given when this property will be derequisitioned.
 - (f) - Acknowledgement is made of your two other letters on this subject, the first R/4182 dated 31st Oct. 44 and the second R/4314 dated 4th Dec. 44.



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In view of having only a copy of the original communication with which it was transmitted to the Embassy, the communication is reproduced by a typewritten extract to the extent which is being exchanged with the Information Bureau. The case has been submitted to the allied authorities. 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PRO MEMORIA

The tragedy that has fallen upon the Duke and Duchess of Bovino in this war is truly of unusual gravity, especially when considered from the economic point of view.

In the province of Chieti their Castle of Greccio with its park has been completely destroyed. The pillage has been 30 beds and all hangings linen, house linen, all crockery, kitchen utensils, plate, pictures, furniture, ancient furniture (one recalls amongst other things the much admired majolica in Chieti Exhibition of 1905) collections of precious miniatures, Lukara carpets and magnificent mink fur coat etc. Nothing has remained untouched, everithing has disappeared.

The same fate has befallen the Villa at Pescara where there were also thirty beds with everithing necessary, personal outfit. Only the spot will it be possible to calculate the damage.

It should be specially noticed that in the places where the war has passed and ruined vineyards, orchards, olive plantations, and killed the castle, there are still many mines scattered by the enemy - a condition which makes any local examination very difficult unless mine specialists are sent to remove them.

The damage in these two provinces amount at the very least to 25 million lire.

This is not all. News came after the liberation of Rome that an oil-mill, the property of the Duke of Bovino at Corigliano Calabro, has been occupied, and that English troops have occupied their last remaining house in Naples, Villa Teresa Parco Grifeo. This house too has been plundered and the furniture very much damaged, one beautifull pianola of a well known maker broken to pieces. This alone could have been sold for 150,000 a sum that would have been most opportune under present circumstances.

We beg the Deputy Vicar of His Eminency the Cardinal Ascalesi Archbishop of

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Naples, to be so very kind as to order an inventor of the contents and the note of the damages caused in the Villa Teresa and to open negotiations of the requisition of the Villa.

To these serious material losses are added political persecutions.

When on Sept. 9th 1943 their Majesties, the Crown Prince, Marshal Badoglio and the other ministers in their unexpected, hurried journey to Pescara to embark for the already freed part of Italy stopped and were received at Castle Greccio, the german and fascists authorities issued a warrant against the Duke and Duchess Bovino. After many painful vicissitudes, they at last found refuge in Rome. They had been obliged (in two hours, as soon as the Germans were convinced that they must lose the Valley of the Moro and the Aciello) to leave the Castle Of Greccio in German camions taking with them only suit cases, and were taken 20 in number, including six children, to the german concentration camp of Chieti-Scalo. Soon after they succeeded at a very great expense, in escaping to Spoleto, whence with the wanderings and threats of denunciation at every moment they at last succeeded in reaching Rome.

The end of April before their habitation in Via Ponzetti, had been searched by 50 policemen at the order of the well-known Capoletti, they had taken refuge in the extra territorial institution through the personal intervention of the Supreme Pontiff, where they remained until the liberation of Rome by the allied.

Property of immense value entrusted to the Duchess in Abruzzi by the Prince of Piemont was saved by her at the risk of her own life and with many personal sacrifices. And here too the Holy Father gave proof of his great benevolence by allowing this property to be placed under his care for several months. This is the unusual or rather unique case of a noble family which has greatly suffered and in a moment has lost three magnificent dwellings and which, of the

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the 75 beds with which it was provided does not today possess even one, so that at Rome it enjoys the hospitality of friend and in Naples the exquisite kindness of His Eminence Cardinal Ascalesi, a special case for which is sought special consideration and special aid.

The protection of the Holy Father and the good will of all the members of the royal family may merit for them a particular attention.

The Duke and Duchess desired:

1. The first thing would be to ask the English Command to leave at their disposal the house at Naples, requisitioned as above noted, so that they may have at least a roof of their own, which means that the necessary repairs must be paid for to make the house habitable.

Here follows a list of the proposals which if put into practice would relieve for the moment their painful and anxious situation.

2. At Greccio the Germans stole a lorry and a motor-car, if these could be given back to the Duke and Duchess in partial payment of damage, with the necessary definitive permission they could go to the Abruzze to save whatever may remain to be saved or to Naples or to the South of Italy where this noble unfortunate family have many interest.

3. Since, despite their social and family position, the Duke and Duchess were not idle, but concerned in the export trade and still wish, and are prepared to continue their activities, they ask to have preference given them before all others, but it is to be noticed that without the permission for the lorry and the motor car, as above, any authorisation would be useless as they would not be able to move.

The Duke of Coote has already noticed Colonels Evans and Fisk about the activities

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of the Duke of Bovino, and these two officers have promised their help. The duke intends making an application to the Regional Authorities for permission to sell oranges, wine, cattle on the hoof, cheese to be used for exportation into England, or for the food supply in Italy. (The regional applications must be approved afterwards by the central authority in Rome,) that is necessary in that application should be considered at once to avoid loss of time.

At the same time these should be obtained the restoration of lycorice factory, since it was lost through the crooked dealings of the fascist and bank difficulties. This lycorice brands "Favella" and "Conte d' Alife" were sold in England. One of the lycorice brands "Favelli" was well known in England and figured in the British Farmacopea. The Duke ~~was~~ disposed of these brands because they correspond to surname and family names.

They ask the help of the allies and their support to enable them to get back their factory a proper compensation for everithing they have been through. All this might really become important because the Duke has at his disposal Corporative of transportation, and docking facilities for small tonnage, (Sormia) able to carry out any transportation necessary necessary from Sardinia and other islands, and this activity, would enable the family to supply its urgent necessities by its own work.
