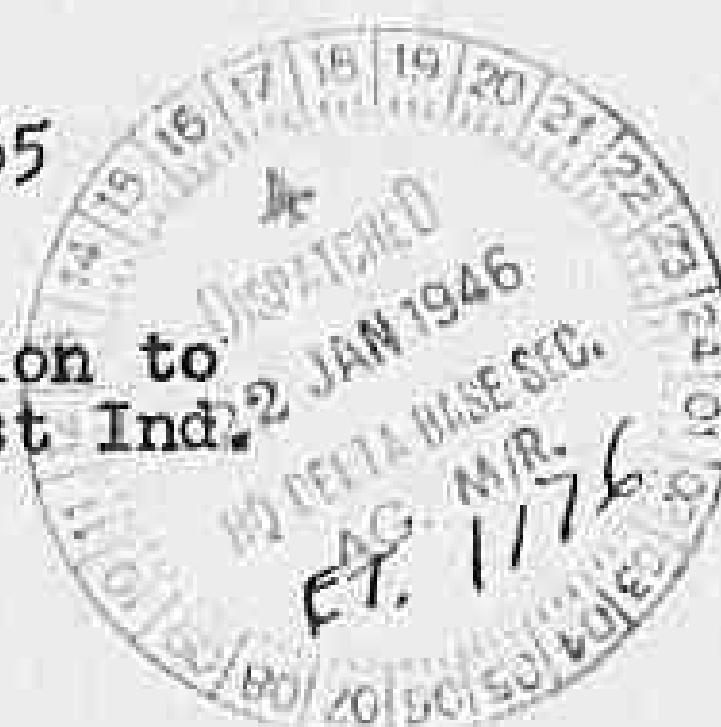

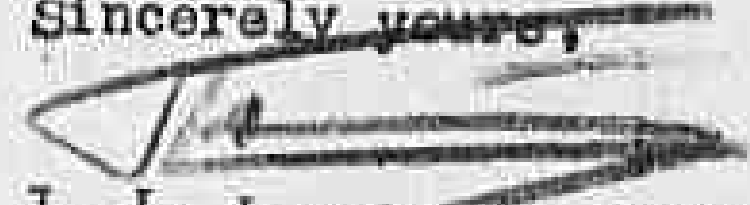

I haven't heard from you for over 1 1/2 year, and war came so near from you. And, leaving aside my great wish to see you again and my filial devotion, as your only child I also have duties towards you, and it is very painful for me not to know whether you need anything, and what: let me know by the bearer of this letter - so that, if there is a possibility to do so, I may take it or at least send it to you.

I should love to come and see you, even if it was only for one day or for a few hours - just to see you again and hear your dear voices. At present, separation is so awful.

Mario's brothers are all safe and sound. His mother is here at present.

Herta's eldest daughter got married last year; they are all well.

Alvira and family are well.

Dear Father and Mother, I am longing to see you again. Please do all you can to send me at least a few lines. Kisses.

On the 5 of May 1945 the U.S. Claims Service Commission in Rome, informed me that with decision n.R. 1040 P.D., the claim presented by me on June 15th, 1944 to said Claims Office on the aim of obtaining an indemnity of damages for "asportation of property" made by an american soldier on June 7th, 1944, had been disallowed.

No reason was given me to justify said disallowance, nor could there be any legitimate reason, because the deed had really taken place and had been verified by the U.S. Military Police immediately after.

In fact, on June 7th, 1944, the "Royal Einfeld" small truck, belonging to me, had been left for a few minutes in front of my shop, in via S. Maria dell' Anima n. 44, when a American soldier jumped on it and started the motor.

The Writer rushed out of his store and grasped himself to the rear part of the vehicle, while the american soldier was already going at fast speed. The writer tried many times to stop the vehicle and talk to the thief, but he would not listen - he only said that he was going to get some gasoline.

He went on in via Aurelia and at the 12th Km. stopped in front of an American camp, in front of which were two sentries.

The undersigned tried at once to explain things to them, but, not knowing english, he was not listened to.

They listened instead to the soldier, and after a few words, they ordered me to get down pointing their rifles at me.

Having got rid of me, the soldier went into the camp and go out again by another opening, disappearing toward Civitavecchia.

The writer, soon after, met a Military Police patrol to whom he told the story.

They immediately went with the writer to the campentrance, interrogated the sentries, and had the confirmation of his statement, and were told that the thief, to make the sentries order to get me off the truck, had told them that I was the owner of the truck, but that he had paid me for it. This was believed by them and I had been obliged to leave my truck under threat with arms, allowing thus that the theft could be accomplished.

All this was reported by the U.S. M.P. soldiers to their superiors, and I was advised by them to make at once a claim to the U.S. Claims Service to obtain an indemnity of damages. I did this on June 15th, 1944.

The Claims Office made an investigation, and found out that my statement was truthful and that the soldier was american and belonged to the Artillery Corps.

In fact the decision, against which I make a complaint, does not deny the criminal action, not the fact that the thief belongs to the U.S. Army, and admits that I was badly damaged.

This special relation of public right, founded in the duty of every citizen to serve his Country, obliges said Country to answer for every action that he may commit, outside of war actions, because the uniform that he wears, represents the Nation that armed him and his Honour.

The decision R. 1040 P.D. of the Claims Service Commission of Rome

163

not only failed to follow the principles of right acknowledged and protected by the same United States Nation, but denying every indemnity to the person damaged by a criminal action committed by a U.S. soldier, outside of any war action, and of any necessity of requisition, would exclude these criminal action in the number of the lawful actions and would affirm a solidarity that, fortunately for the Honour of the U.S. Army, does not exist.

And this judgement is in its self an insult, not so much to Italy, as to the same United States.

For these reasons I request the revocation of the decision and the acknowledgment of the indemnity to the claimant.

Alessandroni Attilio, of Giusto, residing in Rome, via Alfredo Pacarini, n. 5, had an accident on June the 5th, 1945, for on the request of some American soldiers, he was on a jeep to show them the way and the jeep turned over. After 17 months of sufferings, and after staying in hospital for a long time, he hasn't been given any indemnity for the heavy expenses he incurred during that time, without mentioning the fact that his right leg has remained shorter than the other. He begs you to intervene in his favour with the Claims Service - Largo dei Lombardi, 21 - where his request has been rejected under the pretext that he went on the jeep at his own risk, while he only obeyed the request of the soldiers. Having received no attention from the various offices I contacted, I now find myself obliged to appeal to you, for my financial circumstances are very bad, and I am heavily indebted.

On December 22nd, I was knocked down by an American jeep and my left leg was broken. After lying about a month in hospital, my leg had to be amputated. It must now be amputated again to enable me to have an artificial leg.

Meanwhile, I had to spend over 400,000 L. for the nursing home, surgical and medical cares, medicines (sulfamidici, penicilline, anaesthetics, etc.), orthopedic device, crutches, etc.

I must submit to another operation, otherwise I shall never be able to work again, and yet I cannot spend several hundred thousand lire.

About 6 months ago, I was examined by the U.S. Claims Service, together with the witnesses, and I supplied all required documents; from then on, the files have been complete.

Vainly, I sent requests. The last news I received through the channel of an advocate who took a friendly interest in the case, were that the case had been passed on to the General Staff in U.S.A.

I must add that:

1) In April 1944, while I was in Aquila with my car, a Fiat 1500, American soldiers told me to get down and took my car. It has been neither returned, nor paid. The U.S. Claims Service told me the Italian Govt. would pay. When? How much? I had to purchase a truck which I paid 780,000 L., and compelled by need, I had to sell it back for 120,000 L. after my accident.

2) I had a truck Fiat 8L; it was taken from me by the American command of Avezzano. I got it back after two months during which I had to pay for the drivers, fuel, etc... It was impossible to use the car, and it took two months to have it repaired. I had to pay 78,000 L. to the garage workshop at Avezzano. I had previously paid 37,000 L. for the drivers, etc. and only paid back 10,000 L.

3) My house in Avezzano was partly destroyed by air bombardments, and also looted, so that there too I had to spend a large sum.

4) I cannot go back to Tripoli where most of my work takes place, and my industries have been entrusted to a co. of speculators which was formed on purpose, has been managing them for two years and pays neither the rent nor the materials supplied by me, amounting to about one million, which were coded for less than their re-war cost, without my being able to send a trust-

worthy person to supervise the consignment, so that the amount of such materials was made to appear less than half what it actually was. The concern (a paper-mill) is being completely wrecked. And the ltd. company which manager cannot be made to answer for it.

I trust in your intervention to have at least an indemnity and the expenses of my amputation paid, so that I and my family may be able to manage till we are allowed to go back to Tripoli.

The whole nation should be made to pay for a lost war, but not single individuals.

Lo stabilimento (un cartiera) sta per essere ridotto un ammasso di ferrivecchi. E la società ANONIMA che l'esercisce non può risponderà di nulla.

The undersigned, Alessandro Attilio, of Clusto, victim of an accident which took place on June 5th 1944, near Rome, was informed on October 18th, 1945, by note R.O. M. R. 1045 PI DICO M. R. 11884, that his claim for indemnity had been rejected. He cannot understand how this commission came to such a decision, and begs to have his case re-examined, pointing out that the incident of which he was a victim is due to the fact that American soldiers asked him to get on their jeep to show them the road. This he would never have done on his own initiative if he had thought he could say no to the soldiers. Besides, on the above mentioned date, no one knew that civilians were not allowed to go on military cars.

Because of this incident he had to spend 14 months in hospital, and is now disabled. He must add that his family was put to heavy expenses, and that he is himself without a job. It is therefore easy to imagine how he felt on receiving the above mentioned communication.

I hope that my claim may be acknowledged as just and accepted,

I sent, in due time, to the American Claim Office (in Piazza dei Lombardi) all the documents required (medical reports, treatment lists, etc.) and was on purpose interrogated by the competent American authorities. My requests were entirely acknowledged.

At the present time, on account of my poor health, after the above mentioned aggression, and also owing to the great expenses which I have had, I should be very much in need of the sum which is due to me as an indemnity for the suffered damages.

I dare apply to your well known sense of justice and to your kindness in order to obtain, with your authoritative help a more prompt settlement of my demand.

In reply to your recent letter concerning your claim for damages resulting from an accident in which you were involved with an Allied truck, I have had this entire matter carefully investigated. I am sorry to have to tell you that the decision of the U.S. Claims Commission rejecting your claim cannot be changed. The conflicting evidence of the witnesses has made it quite impossible to accurately reconstruct the case, and accordingly no negligence on the part of the driver of the alleged Allied vehicle can be proved.

The Claims Commission, as all official agencies, operates under very rigid regulations which absolutely prohibit them from approving a claim in which evidence presented is of a conflicting character.

Again I wish to assure you that your case has been very carefully investigated.

On August 23rd, 1944, he was knocked down by an American car at 'contrade Lago Carbona' (Marseilles) and severely wounded. He was ill for a long time and unable to work, this meant a serious financial loss to him.

He asked for 18,000 lire damages, and after several months, he received from some lire 1,600 only; he has not received anything else though his request was perfectly just, as he asked only for the expenses during his illness to be paid, and for the money he was unable to earn because of the incident which made him unable to work.

He vainly sent various claims to the various Allied offices.

He is therefore appealing to you, asking you to order the people concerned to pay him the difference, for the undersigned is still unemployed and therefore in miserable conditions.

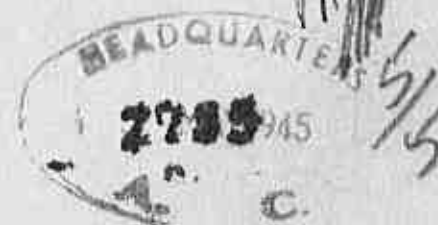
