He in turn spoke with Dr. De Marchi of Azienda Rilievi Alienazione Residenti (ARAR) who has promised to help. I suggest that you contact Dr. De Marchi at 25, Corso d'Italia whom I hope you will find of some assistance.

American officers and enlisted men of the Allied Commission managed to obtain about 1 1/2 truck-loads of worn clothing from the American Salvage dump at Leghorn and this consignment was handed over to the home for the Sciuscia at 143, Via Quattro Fontane. I have asked for a further consignment and in addition have had boxes placed in the hotels for collection purposes and hope that these will also produce results.
