The High Commissary for Hygiene and Public Health whose attention I had promptly called to the problem of distribution of medical preparations, about which you had written to me in your letter N/1803 dated 19 March 1946, has given me a detailed explanation of the situation in this matter, confirming that there has actually been undue delay in the deliveries owing to the fact that the financial Administration had requested the payment in advance of the medical preparations in order to avoid burdening the Treasury under the present difficult circumstances.

I have however been assured that, in consequence also of the intensification of assignments to various provinces during these last months, the stocks of the "Indisca" depots have decreased considerably, while all preparations which could be somehow deteriorated like radiographic material, packages for newly born babies, ether, etc. have been distributed, being assigned in rations to the various provinces.

I have anyway requested the organizations concerned to take strictly care of the matter so that in future every delay in the distribution of the medicines may be avoided and the population - and particularly the poorer classes - may receive a more efficient sanitary assistance.

SUBJECT: Distribution of Medical Supplies.
TO: Chief Commissioner.

1. With reference to progress in the matter of the distribution of medical supplies which was raised at your Conference this morning, the following is the present situation:

2. On May 6, the Director of Public Health Sub-Commission held a meeting with the Head of Mission.

Mission do not agree with the High Commissioner for Public Health that their organization is not capable of carrying out deliveries of supplies. They contend that if adequate directions and co-ordinated plans were received they could carry out such plans quickly and efficiently. About 1st May the Head of Mission had conferred with representatives of the High Commissioner for Public Health and the Treasury, and it was agreed that a credit of Lire 20,000,000 would be established to enable hospitals in poor financial condition to buy supplies. A special Committee is to be appointed to decide which are the most needy hospitals.

Mission has been in communication with the Prefects of Piemonte, Lombardia and Venezia regarding the distribution of supplies to the north, and the Head of Mission is proceeding north shortly to supervise negotiations. The supplies will go to hospitals and not pharmacies.

Mission pointed out that they advise the Office of the High Commissioner for Public Health when perishable supplies are near their expiration date, but rarely receive instructions concerning their release.

3. The matter was further discussed after your meeting with the Director of Public Health Sub-Commission, Colonel Salza and Colonel Logg of USRA.

In order to stimulate further action, it was decided that Colonel Logg would take the initiative in arranging an early meeting between representatives of the High Commissioner for Public Health, the Treasury and Mission. The Director of the Public Health Sub-Commission and Colonel Salza will attend this meeting after which it should be possible to prepare a comprehensive aide-memoire on the position.

With reference to the question of the distribution of the medical supplies with Edimea, the High Commissioner for Public Health wrote a letter to the Treasury on the financial aspect of this matter on the 17th March 1946, a copy of which is attached.

As the High Commissioner for Public Health has made no progress as regards the proposals he made to the Treasury, he addressed a letter yesterday to the Presidency of the Council of Ministers, a copy of which letter is attached.

You will observe from the letter of March 17th that the High Commissioner for Public Health considers that a considerable reserve must be maintained. The High Commissioner should be left to decide what reserve he considers adequate. From the letter of 17th April it is observed that there has been duplication of distribution of which without doubt UNRRA will have been informed. I feel that the whole matter is now one for the Italian Government and UNRRA.

The Public Health Sub-Commission will, however, keep in touch with the High Commissioner for Public Health as regards the communication he has just made to the Presidency of the Council of Ministers and are considering the points raised by the Head of Edimea with the Economic Section.

Subject : Distribution of medical supplies. Endimea.

To : Treasury.

The information contained in the letter referred to above do not seem to bring any positive contribution towards the solution of the problem which has been repeatedly brought to your attention, and which unfortunately is as yet to be solved.

In its simplest terms, the situation is as follows :

All Hospitals and Welfare Agencies are compelled, in accordance with the instructions issued by the Treasury, to pay in advance the medical supplies which are monthly allotted to them. As they lack finance, they often are unable to collect the supplies allotted to them.

If, as you suggest, after having fulfilled the immediate and real needs of the Hospitals, the balance of medical supplies should be sold to wholesalers and chemists, one cannot see how the future requirements of the hospitals could be fulfilled, as they would have to buy what they need from wholesalers and chemists, at considerably increased prices.

These supplies, which have been given to Italy by the Allies under Category "A", must not be considered as goods to be sold as soon as possible and at the most convenient price, but rather as a precious help for the Italian people, to be wisely and carefully administered so as to ensure for as long as possible, and until national production will be back to normal, the essential supplies for the hospitals.

On the basis of these considerations we had put forth the proposal ~~that a special Body should be created to ensure the continued and regular distribution of medical supplies to the proper agencies, whether they were in a position to pay for them or otherwise.~~ Since the Treasury has definitely rejected this proposal and in view of the serious situation which is arising as regards the supply of medicines to the Hospitals under the existing provisions, we wish to ~~point out~~ make the following remarks:-

1. Endimea has a scanty organisation and only a few large depots which do not contain a complete variety of supplies. It cannot therefore carry out with the necessary speed the prearranged deliveries, as it must from time to time shift a given article from one depot to another, over considerable distances.
2. It is absolutely necessary to hold on to reserves for hospitals and welfare agencies for many months to come, at least until through the utilisation of the raw materials furnished by UMBRA it will be possible to restore national production.
3. ~~Under~~ The Government is duty bound to ensure medical supplies to hospitals even if they are not in a position to pay for them in advance.

We therefore request the concurrence of the Treasury for the immediate realisation of the following scheme:

1. That Endimea should immediately institute provincial depots.
2. A homogeneous distribution through all provincial depots of medical supplies as yet existing in the warehouses taken over by Endimea, which must be returned to the Ministry of War (Florence) and to the Red Cross (Naples)
3. A regular and direct distribution in each province, without intermediaries, of medical supplies to Hospitals and other Bodies, along the lines of the plan which this Office has pre-arranged, through the Medici Provinciali.
4. Sales to be made to hospitals with deferred payments, and possibly granting subsidies to hospitals in order that they may pay.

Only when the provincial depots will have been duly stocked it will be possible to gage any surplus of given items, and one will then consider the best way for placing them on the private market with a view to ensure the maximum profit for the Treasury and to avoid speculation.

It is trusted that, having superseded the ~~concept~~ financial concept of medical supplies distribution, this question may rapidly find a solution through an agreement which should mainly take into account the sanitary assistance to the poor.

Subject : - Distribution of Allied Medical Supplies

To : - The Presidency of the Council of Ministers.

Reference the complaint made by Admiral Stone to you, dated 15 March, and the remarks made concerning the functioning of Endimea and the slow distribution of Allied Medical Supplies, it is considered that the situation can be summed up as per attached letter addressed by this Office to the Treasury.

It is added that as no further arrivals of finished products have taken place, while the allocation of medical supplies in the provinces of Piedmont, Lombardy, Sicily, Calabria etc. have been increased, the balance of the supplies held by Endimea have been considerably reduced. So much so that in some places (for instance at Firenze, Castello and Roma, Torricola) it has been possible to begin vacating the premises to be returned to the Military Authorities. All perishable products, such as X Ray equipment, ether, confinement bags etc. have been rationed to the various provinces. It would appear, however, that on account of the simultaneous distributions carried out by UNRRA; the immediate absorbing capacity of the provinces is very limited and ever decreasing.

As the attitude of the Treasury concerning the payment of medical supplies and equipment remains unchanged, no way can be seen for a rational distribution of the Allied Medical Supplies.

1. The non-distribution of medical supplies was discussed.

- (a) Dott. De Jorio pointed out that ENDEBEA, since the period September-October, has been distributing supplies in accordance with instructions from the High Commissioner of Public Health. The High Commissioner of Public Health relies upon distribution through hospitals and similar institutions. Using such a channel, a comparatively small proportion of available supplies are disbursed.
- (b) Dott. De Jorio believes it would be sounder to set up ENDEBEA outlets and distribute directly to the population.
- (c) In response to a question as to why not distribute through private retail channels, Dott. De Jorio mentioned the dissatisfaction which might arise because black market prices might be obtained for some of the items.

2. Difficulties in Paying for the Medical Supplies.

Dott. De Jorio pointed out that while it is true that hospitals are called upon to pay for the medical supplies, it is equally true that in case a hospital is in such financial straits that it can prove its inability to pay they will get the supplies by special arrangement. From his experience he believes that such cases of clearance need involve no more than a few days.

3. Possible Interference from ALOCM.

Dott. De Jorio stated that there had been no practical interference by ALOCM. He was aware of certain freezing orders on supplies in Genova, but added that the freeze had, in itself, caused no non-distribution because even if unfrozen the supplies would not have been distributed during the period of the block.

With reference to the question of the distribution of medical supplies by ~~Endimela~~ the Director of the Public Health Sub-Commission has discussed the matter with the Deputy High Commissioner for Public Health.

It is understood that the Prime Minister has spoken to the Minister of the Treasury with a view to making a distribution to hospitals and clinics, either without payment or on account.

The old difficulty still persists that hospitals and clinics have not sufficient funds to pay in advance or are unable to pay at all.

As regards distribution of medical supplies to wholesalers and availability to the general public, the Deputy High Commissioner indicated that he was concentrating on meeting the needs of hospitals and clinics and that after their requirements had been met, there would be little available for the general public.

Dr. Bergami, the High Commissioner for Public Health, is in London at the moment, but is expected to return very shortly when he will take up the matter again with the Prime Minister.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister:

During the last two years the Allies have imported a very large amount of medical supplies into Italy for the prevention of suffering and disease. These supplies have been handed over to an Italian organization known as Endimex. I am informed that only a small percentage of these supplies have been distributed and that at present no less than ten thousand tons are lying in Endimex warehouses throughout the country and have lain there for months. I enclose a report from the Director General of Endimex which confirms this.

I need not tell you that a deplorable impression this state of affairs has made on those in the various allied relief organizations and in UNRRA who are doing their utmost to help the sick and suffering. It will become impossible to justify the import of further medical supplies into Italy while large stocks are lying in the warehouses, in spite of the urgent needs of the hospitals and dispensaries and the general public for all kinds of medical supplies.

Whatever may be the reason for this serious fault; whether it is that the Italian treasury has not made available the necessary credits or whether it is that Endimex insists on cash payment in advance; I feel sure, my dear Mr. Prime Minister, that you will agree that the state of affairs must be remedied and must be remedied immediately. If the problem is handled vigorously and speedily there should be no reason why the supplies could not be distributed within 45 - 60 days.

I would urge you therefore to urge all your responsible Ministers to make a coordinated effort to effect a speedy, regular, and efficient distribution of medical supplies to hospitals and the pharmaceutical trade. Only by such action can justification be made for further imports of medical supplies.

1. With reference to the request of your secretary, I thereby enclose the return of ENIDELIA pharmaceutical and medical supplies available in the centres of Naples, Florence, Ancona, Catania, Genoa, Leghorn, Venice, Bari, Rome.

2. Movements in a/m centres are carried out according to a perfect administrative procedure. Notwithstanding this, it is impossible to have a complete list of the supplies at hand. As a matter of fact, while I am writing to you, distributions are being carried out. Moreover, the shipping orders concerning the distributions which have been effected a few days ago have not yet reached our centre.

3. In order to bring up to date the lists, which I hereby enclose, you should deduct about 1.5% from the quantities shown in a/m lists.



SUBJECT: Release of Medical Supplies Owned by Italian Army in Sardinia to UNRRA in Sardinia for Distribution to Civilian Hospitals

During the first week in June 1945, the Italian Army together with MIA were planning to move a quantity of Italian Army medical supplies from Sardinia to the mainland. We learned of this and undertook negotiations to borrow certain quantities of these supplies for civilian distribution in Sardinia against repayment in kind to the Italian Army on the mainland of Italy.

The matter dragged along until we were told in the last week of July that these medical supplies had been moved from Sardinia; however, the last week in August we learned that General Pinna had somehow blocked the movements of these supplies to the mainland. Then we reopened negotiations to borrow these supplies against repayment in kind on the mainland. As matters now stand, the Italian Army is willing to authorize the release of these medical supplies to UNRRA for distribution in Sardinia provided they can have the permission of MIA.

We have a copy of the inventory of these medical supplies, we know what we are importing in our program, and we propose that our district health officer in Sardinia together with the medico provinciale study the two lists to determine which of the Italian medical supplies we can use for civilian distribution and which we can repay from our supplies here on the mainland. Many of the supplies we can repay in kind immediately and others we can repay in October and November.

This is a request that you use your influence to obtain consent by MIA to allow the Italian Army to proceed with this negotiation.

Memorandum for General Browning:

Lt. Col. Reekie of UNRRA called this morning at my invitation to discuss the above subject and the letter Lt. Col. Reekie wrote the Chief Commissioner under date of 12 September.

Lt. Col. Holman, ADMS, MMIA, was present at the conference.

The following points were covered:

1. UNRRA has attempted to handle direct with the Italian Army officials who referred UNRRA to MMIA, but UNRRA had not discussed with us.
2. The only information we had was from Col. Albert in Sardinia who had reported that UNRRA had approached him and were referred to us.
3. It was explained to Col. Reekie that (1) the medical supply of the Italian Army is a British responsibility and is therefore controlled, (2) the Italian Army is not a free-agent in regard to medical supplies, as all supplies in Italian depots are available for the entire army in order to save Allied supplies, (3) discussions with the Italian Army or our liaison officers will not be productive of results and (4) the letter to the Chief Commissioner was uncalled for until after UNRRA had first discussed the matter with us.
4. Col. Holman has discussed the matter with the Surgeon General of the Italian Army. The Italian Army is opposed to selling its supplies to UNRRA for cash, but is willing to exchange supplies in Sardinia for supplies on the mainland. The Surgeon General's desire is approved.
5. In order to save transportation, MMIA is willing to deliver to UNRRA in Sardinia any supplies available, surplus to Army levels, for like supplies to be turned over by UNRRA on the mainland. UNRRA will submit the list to Col. Holman, who will handle.
6. UNRRA will submit to Col. Holman a list of supplies now needed, but which cannot now be exchanged in kind as UNRRA has not

yet received the supplies and cannot guarantee a date for repayment in kind. If any such supplies are available in Italian Depots surplus to the foreseeable needs of the Army, we will release on the promise of repayment by UNRRA. It was pointed out that this will only be done where we are able to clearly see that such action will not cause any demands to be made on the Allies by the Italian Army for such items prior to repayment in kind by UNRRA.

7. The Italian Army will not be allowed to sell, loan, or dispose of any Allied supplies without authority of MMIA, nor will the Italian Army be allowed to dispose of any of its own stocks where such action would require replacement from British Army stocks.

I am considerably alarmed at reports I have received concerning the lack of adequate distribution of Allied medical supplies by the organization known as FIDIMEA which has been set up to effect distribution.

It appears that the chief source of delay is the fact that the Treasury has instructed FIDIMEA to receive payment for supplies prior to distribution. Where large accounts are concerned it is often difficult for the receiving agency to produce the required sum at short notice with the result that the ordinary man in the street is deprived of his much needed medical supplies.

I should be grateful if you would interest yourself in this matter with a view to persuading the Treasury to rescind their ruling on payment and so obtain an immediate release of supplies which are at present lying in the warehouses of FIDIMEA in large quantities.

SUBJECT: Four Notes by Executive Commissioner.

TO : Civil Affairs Section.

The following four notes have been received from the Executive Commissioner and are passed to you for information and appropriate action:

1. German Disbanded Army. Discussed with Colonel SMITH and BROWN, total numbers 17,000 in about 15 camps. Great care has been taken with local population and less than 1,000 will be evicted.
2. Brigadier Dawson, in command of 21st Tank Brigade, is the operating officer and has the matter entirely in hand.
3. There appears to be no necessity for a proclamation on fraternisation but use will be made of the notice issued by 5th Army which is in the hands of Malta Region.
4. Medical Supplies. There is a shortage of disinfectants and also chlorine compound for water treatment. Chlorine has been supplied but in penny packets and as an example at MILIA alone the consumption is estimated at 1 1/2 quintals per week. There are disadvantages to the chlorine solution which has been offered as it is contained in cylinders which have to be returned and for some technical reason it is not such a simple process as the use of compound.

Reference para 10 of Executive Commissioner's Notes on Four of MILIA Region dated 28 May 1945, Major Borden's notes therein referred to are repeated below:

1. Public Safety. 400 CS, BR reinforcements are scheduled for the Region, 200 of which have now arrived, but nearly all are badly clothed and shod. For example, of 100 allotted to MILIA City it is doubtful if more than 50 can be made fit for duty as the remainder are without boots. There is also a shortage of axes and ammunition. An endeavour was made to obtain weapons from those handed in by the patriots but out of 5 truck-loads only 6 CS BR weapons were returned, the majority being CS.

1. German Disbanded Army. Discussed with Colonel ZHASEK and BOWMAN, total numbers 174,000 in about 15 camps. Great care has been taken with local population and less than 1,000 will be evicted.

2. Brigadier Denny, in command of 21st Tank Brigade, is the operating officer and has the matter entirely in hand.

3. There appears to be no necessity for a proclamation on fraternisation but use will be made of the notice issued by 5th Army which is in the hands of Emilia Region.

4. Medical Supplies. There is a shortage of disinfectants and also chlorine compound for water treatment. Chlorine has been supplied but in penny packets and as an example at FOHLI along the consumption is estimated at 1 1/2 quintals per week. There are disadvantages to the chlorine solution which has been offered as it is contained in cylinders which have to be returned and for some technical reason it is not such a simple process as the use of compound.

Reference para 10 of Executive Commissioner's Notes on Tour of SALLIA Region dated 28 May 1945, Major Norden's notes therein referred to are repeated below.

1. Public Safety. 400 O.C.B.R. reinforcements are scheduled for the Region, 200 of which have now arrived, but nearly all are badly clothed and shod. For example, of 100 allotted to BOLAGHA City it is doubtful if more than 50 can be made fit for duty as the remainder are without boots. There is also a shortage of arms and ammunition. An endeavour was made to obtain weapons from those handed in by the patriots but out of 3 truck-loads only 6 suitable weapons were retrieved, the majority being German rifles and other rather heavy weapons. I understood that all O.C.B.R. reinforcements sent North were to have been properly equipped in all respects.

2. There is the problem of the "recuperati". These are the O.C.B.R. who drifted Northwards, some hundreds of which are now returning. Not only do they need reclothing but it is thought that they are no longer suitable for duty in the North as (a) many of them have been working with the patriots and (b) some are at an equal disadvantage because they have not joined the ranks of the patriots. It is suggested that these should be exchanged with O.C.B.R. from the South.

as it appears from an interview with
Prof. Burno

Coming distribution of products supplied by the Allies. All confiscated goods will be handed over to hospitals and the people at minimum prices.

The repeated hoarding of drugs and abusive increase in prices on which the press has recently commented several times, encouraged us to ask the medico provinciale, Prof. Burno, if he would make a statement with regard to the situation of pharmaceutical products in our city and the measures that have been taken.

-What can you tell us about the present deficiency of medicines?

-With the whole of Northern Italy in the hands of the Germans it is easy to understand the deficiency in drugs. Florence was the last city that could get its supplies from the North. The freezing of all drugs by the Allies and the strict control ordered by us on all requests for export could not prevent a considerable outflow of goods, partly because it was after all necessary to supply so many hospitals in Southern Italy, and partly because of the increasing activity of speculators against whom all possible repressive measures have been taken.

-What can you tell us about the scarcity of drugs for curing diseases caused by lack of food?

-There is no doubt that vitamins are very important at a time when food is scarce, as it is now, but one must not exaggerate their importance and this for several reasons: In the first place I do not think that food can be replaced by vitamins. These do have a specific nutritive value of great scientific and practical interest, but they must remain in the field of pure pharmaceutical appliances. Vitamins must be used to cure those diseases which result from the lack of certain foodstuffs and which the "clinic" has gradually found out and used as a substitute at a given stage of special morbid forms, particularly of communicable diseases.

-Then, as it is not possible to obtain the amount of vitamins which the public asks for, it is wiser to calm down this excessive enthusiasm for these products. This applies particularly to doctors who must not lightly proclaim the absolute necessity of vitamins. Vitamins at present are very short and if they were to be used as they should, in certain cases, they must be given in large quantities. The Allies will distribute many, but they cannot suffice for all those who want them.

-When and in what way will Allied drugs be distributed?

-The Allies have imported, particularly from America, large quantities of drugs, of which the first distribution was made in the south of Rome 263.11

A second distribution will be made in the first days of February. The Italian Government has set up an agency for the distribution of Allied medical supplies. Through the wholesalers they will be distributed to the pharmacies and so to the public. The first to be supplied will be the hospitals which have the largest number of patients and which do not manufacture their drugs.

-By what means is the sale of drugs controlled?

-I have tried to control the distribution in the best way possible. However at times drugs are wasted. For instance, liver extracts instead of being used for the cure of pernicious anemia, are often prescribed for any kind of anemia. Prices of drugs are severely controlled. For drugs imported by the Allies there will soon be a price-list available which the public will be able to consult.

The public already knows of some of the successful measures taken against illegal hoarding and speculators. We know there are other hiding places where drugs of all kinds are kept for sale on the black market. The confiscated goods are handed over to me by the Attorney of the Crown, and they will be sold at low prices to the hospitals and to the public both of which will benefit by this action.

-Could the *Milico Provinciale* ask the physicians to prescribe medicines that can be prepared in the chemists' shops instead of prescribing "specialties"?

-I have already asked doctors to do this. Many "specialties" are only patented synthetic substances, to which new names are given. Their production requires big plants and specialized labour. However the basic problem is always that of the lack of raw materials which the chemists must procure at prices so high that the preparation made in the pharmacy is also expensive.

The Allies have brought many useful things and we hope they will continue to do so even in larger quantities in the future but we cannot pretend that they should think only of us. All Europe awaits everything from America and Britain: foodstuffs, drugs, raw materials and machinery. These big nations have created the miracle of a grandiose organization thanks to which they supply everybody, overcoming distances and every interference and coming to the rescue of the vanquished people who were their enemies, a unique fact in history.

I very much regret that it is impossible to obtain release of Penicillin from Army sources for cases of civilian illness. The only stocks of Penicillin held in this Theater are in possession of the military and are scarcely sufficient for the treatment of casualties.

In consequence, the Director of Medical Services, AFHQ, has issued an order to the effect that, while he regrets to make this decision, he cannot authorize any supply of Penicillin to be made available for civilian use.

I am sorry to say, therefore, that there is nothing further I can do to assist in this matter.

1. From the beginning of Allied Military Government activities in Italy, up to 1 January 1945, there have been imported into Italy approximately 3500 long tons of medical supplies, having an approximate value of 6,000,000 dollars. Practically all of these medical supplies were of United States origin, the bulk of them having been shipped to this theater direct from the United States. A small portion was shipped from U.S. Medical Supply depots within this theater. A negligible amount was of British origin being principally supplies which were furnished direct from British Medical depots to AMG installations in emergency.

2. It must be remembered that the amounts of medical supplies furnished to Italy by the Combined Chiefs of Staff, is only that amount of supplies that will save life and prevent the spread of disease to Allied troops. For Italy this represents five-thirteenths of the estimated requirements as computed on the status of medical practice in Italy and the numbers of hospital beds. The kinds of supplies allowed, and the quantity are limited by this policy, and it is not possible to fill all requests made by the Italian civilian population. Penicillin is one example of an excellent drug which is not available to Italian civilians because of its short supply to the Allied troops. Medical supplies are therefore furnished on an emergency basis, and first priority is given to the AMG Army areas; second to the hospitals, clinics, and ambulatories; third to doctors; and lastly to pharmacies for general sale to the public. The Italian system of requiring a doctors prescription for practically all drugs is not generally known by Allied personnel. Pharmacies are more completely controlled by Italian law than is the case in the U.S or U.K., and all Allied drugs require a doctor's prescription. This has been done to prevent a "black market" of Allied drugs.

3. Up to 1 November 1944 the system of distribution of medical supplies in liberated Italy was as follows:

a. A Central Medical Depot, ACC was established in Naples, with branches located wherever necessity demanded. At one time there was a branch at Bari, later in Rome, and now in Florence. Supplies from the United States were received in this Central Depot, and were distributed to the various Regions. All accounting was done at this Central Depot, which operated under the direct control of the Medical Supply Branch, Public Health Sub-Commission.

b. Italy was divided into Regions for administrative purposes and in each of these Regions there was a Regional Public Health Officer who was responsible for the distribution of medical supplies within his Region.

Each of these Regional Public Health Officers obtained the monthly requirements for the several provinces within his Region, he consolidated these requirements into a monthly requisition, this was forwarded to the Public Health Sub-Commission, HQ, ACC, where it was screened against the allowances for the Region, based on population, and on the allowances as prescribed by higher authority. This requisition was then sent to the Central Depot, or to the proper branch of this Depot, and the supplies were shipped to the Regional warehouse which was either operated by the Regional Public Health Officer or by a wholesale drug firm, under his supervision. The Medico Provinciale of each province, working under the Prefect of the province, was held responsible by the Regional Public Health Officer for the final distribution of medical supplies in the province. This system required a Regional Public Health Officer in each Region, and further required additional personnel to assist in the supervision of distribution. As more and more Regions were liberated, it was soon found that there was not sufficient personnel to accomplish this mission, and more and more reliance was placed in the use of civilian wholesale drug firms, who operated under the supervision of the Medico Provinciale of the provinces. Under this system the medical supplies were paid for by the Medico Provinciale or by the wholesale drug firm, upon delivery from the Regional warehouse, by depositing the money value of the supplies in the AMFA account to the credit of Public Health Sub-Commission.

c. In the Army areas, each AMG Army has its own medical supply officer who operates his own medical depot, under the direction of the Senior Public Health Officer of the AMG Army, who is responsible for medical supplies in his area. The requests for medical supplies for these areas are forwarded to the Public Health Sub-Commission, as for the Regions, and the supplies are shipped to the AMG Army Medical Depot. The accounting for these supplies is carried as a "free issue" in that no deposits are made to AMFA accounts, since in Army areas there is found usually no organized Italian Government to take care of this financial obligation. Collections for these supplies is made by the Finance Sub-Commission by debiting the value of supplies shipped to these AMG Army areas to the Italian Government. This same system of supply continues to be used for each of the two Army AMGs, and will continue to be used until the Armies release all of Italian territory to the control of the Italian Government. In the AMG Army areas, the Senior Public Health Officer has attached to his staff American Red Cross personnel who supervise the final distribution of medical supplies, and who ascertain the requirements of the hospitals in the area. It is the opinion of ~~this office~~ that in the Army areas because the requirements and the follow-up are done by personnel working directly under the military that the system of distribution is adequate and that no black market activities of Allied furnished supplies occurs.

d. Medical supplies for Refugees and Displaced Persons Camps are drawn from the Central Medical Depot, on requisitions approved by Public Health Sub-Commission each month. These supplies are shipped to a central point and the final distribution is the responsibility of the Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission. These supplies are shipped on an issue voucher, with the final payment being made by the Italian Government, in that no deposits are made by the Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission. No change is to be made in this system of supply, so long as the Allied Commission is responsible for the supply of these camps.

4. The last distribution of medical supplies to the several Regions on the system enumerated in paragraph 3 above was made in October, and was for the month of November. Starting 1 November 1944, the responsibility of medical supply distribution in Liberated Italy, not including AMG Army areas, was passed to the Italian Government. The Italian Government, with the assistance of the Public Health Sub-Commission, had organized an Italian corporation, known as ENDIMEA (Ente Nazionale Distribuzione Medicinale Degli Alleati).

This organization as initially organized, was composed of three Italian wholesale drug firms, that had been handling Allied supplies under the Regional system, and had been found to be quite efficient in the areas where they operated. This Corporation is responsible to the Italian Government, for distribution of required medical supplies from the Central Medical Depot, to the Provinces. Deliveries are made to wholesale druggists in the provinces as indicated by the Sanita' Pubblica. The Sanita' Pubblica obtains the requirements from the several provinces of Liberated Italy, from the Medico Provinciale, and passes these to the Public Health Sub-Commission who checks each request to see that the amounts are within the allowance for the province as determined by the population of the province and the rules of higher authority. The approved requisition is then filled by the Central Medical Depot and turned over to ENDIMEA for the distribution as indicated by the Sanita' Pubblica. ENDIMEA obtains through the Prefects of the several provinces payment for the supplies delivered, from the wholesale druggists who are to distribute these supplies, and deposits this money in the Bank of Labor. The Public Health Sub-Commission no longer makes any collections but furnishes the Italian Government with a copy of all issue vouchers to ENDIMEA, with a copy to the Finance Sub-Commission. These accounts are now kept by the Finance Sub-Commission as either dollar or pound accounts, not Lire accounts as formerly. Public Health Officers of the Public Health Sub-Commission working in the Regions are giving ENDIMEA every possible assistance in their distribution work, as is the Medical Supply Branch, Public Health Sub-Commission. This assistance consists of helping this agency find transportation, tires, gasoline and obtaining required passes so that their personnel may travel from province to province to supervise their work. With the acute shortage of cars and tires, this has been a major problem. This office has also arranged for both train and boat transport for medical supplies in order to accelerate distribution.

5. The Italian Government is wholly responsible for the final distribution of imported medical supplies, and has delegated this responsibility down to the prefects of provinces with the Medico Provinciale of the province. A standard system of in and out bookkeeping is kept by each wholesale distributor and by each pharmacy, and this is checked by an inspection service of the Sanita' Pubblica. In the past month instances of irregularities have been found, and persons properly punished. Insulin is handled as a doctor's prescription item, and its sale is absolutely controlled, so that only a diabetic patient who can produce a doctor's prescription may purchase this item. The same is true of all narcotic drugs. The only action that the Public Health Sub-Commission can take to ensure equitable distribution, is first to check requests to see that each province obtains what is allowed that province, and second by occasional inspections by our limited field personnel to see that hospitals and clinics have supplies, and that the wholesalers are furnishing all items possible to the pharmacies.

6. In an effort to send more supplies to the provinces, with the hope that the pharmacies may receive adequate supplies, this office is now insisting that each province obtain during this month, two months supplies. This action is considered advisable since there has been practically a month's delay in the effective distribution of medical supplies by the Italian Government. In spite of this delay, this office has had no report of shortages in hospitals and clinics. It is the opinion of this office that this new system of distribution will be working satisfactorily in another two weeks, and that it will continue to function effectively if political activities are not infiltrated into this organization.

7. Effective as of 6 January 1945, the 2665th Central Civilian Medical Depot (Ovhd) took over the activities of the Central Medical Depot, AC, which relieved the Allied Commission of the responsibility of storage, and shipment of supplies in Italy. This office is still responsible for estimating the six months' advance requirements of the civilian population of Italy, for the screening of all requests from the Italian Government, and acts in an advisory capacity to ENDIMEA and the Italian Government in the distribution of Allied supplies, and renders such assistance in obtaining required transport for these medical supplies. There is now in the CCMD sufficient stocks to handle all Liberated Italy through the month of March. Supplies for the period 1 July to 31 December 1945 were requisitioned in September, and should have started arriving this month, but to date cables indicate this requisition has not received final approval and allocation by the Combined Chiefs of Staff. Plans have been made for the orderly distribution in the northern provinces of Italy when liberated. Transport difficulties continue to be the major problem in distribution.

8. In addition to imported Allied supplies, there has been found a fair amount of Italian and other supplies, with a small amount of medical supplies being manufactured in Italy. Biological products are being manufactured on a modest scale, and the distribution of these Italian made products is the complete responsibility of the Italian Government. Prices for all medical supplies have been established by Government decree, and persons found dealing in "black market" activities are properly prosecuted.

One of the best surgeons in Rome, Prof. Aurelio Stoppoloni, living in Piazza Mincio, 2, has been suffering for about a month from an 'abscess of the left lung'. 25

He is very ill and in absolute need of a treatment of 'penicillina', as can be seen from the enclosed certificate by Prof. Frugoni, Director of the Clinica Medica of the R. University.

As there is a very great shortage of the said medicine, also by the Allied Armies, I shouldn't take the liberty of making this request for my friend if he hadn't some particular merits in the eyes of the Allies:

In November 1943, while Rome was occupied by the nazis, Prof. Stoppoloni was called by me to operate Sergeant Major Ralph Burns, of South Africa, escaped prisoner of war who lived in hiding with the Narbona family (Via Guattani, 18 - Tel. 86.5105).

For many days, not caring about the danger of being found out by the nazi-fascists, Prof. Stoppoloni and I cured disinterestedly the Allied soldier, till he was quite well again, prompted by feelings of Christian charity and of sympathy for the Allies.

Now that Prof. Stoppoloni's life is endangered, I hope that moved by the same feelings, you will let him have the quantity of 'penicillina' which is required to save his life (10 phials of 100000 u.)

You would thus be doing once more one of these acts of kindness and justice which have endeared you to all Italians

Dear Mr. Byron Taylor,

As I know how interested you are in helping the Italian people in obtaining relief of all kinds, I have had some notes prepared for us by Col. Griffin who is in charge of the Medical Supply Branch, to show how it is proposed that the new S.I.I.S.A. should work.

I know there has been a certain amount of criticism regarding the shortage of drugs in certain areas and while no organization is perfect, I do not think that the Public Health Sub-Commission has altogether failed in a very difficult task, having handled more than 3000 long tons of medical supplies valued at five million dollars. Lack of transport has made distribution difficult and while drugs have been available at provincial headquarters, the consequent flow to distant centers has often been interrupted for the reason stated.

As I think it will interest you, I am enclosing a copy of the instructions which have been sent out from the Ministry of the Interior to the Prefects of the provinces of liberated Italy and to the High Commissioners of Sicily and Sardinia regarding the distribution of medical supplies by S.I.I.S.A. (Servizio Nazionale Distribuzione Medicinali Alieati), which is sponsored by the Italian Government. This agency is composed of members of the wholesale drug organizations of Italy, members of the Ministry of the Interior and Ministry of the Treasury. This body took over the duties formerly performed by the Medical Supply Branch of this Sub-Commission on November 1, 1944. They receive their supplies from our warehouses in Naples and Florence and are now responsible for supplying the provinces except those in the Army area. In these forward areas, medical supplies are under the control of medical officers assigned to A.I.G. in each Army area and this arrangement continues until such time as the provinces come under the control of the Italian Government.

In any new undertaking of this nature there may be defects at the beginning but it is felt that those who are responsible for the work in hand are competent and well trained men who have the future of Italy and the maintenance of the health of the people at heart. It should be mentioned that all work is carried out on a non-profit basis.

In Sicily and Sardinia, because of their more or less isolated position it will not be possible for S.I.I.S.A. to operate there for possibly another two months. It is felt that it is better to perfect this new system of handling medical supplies in

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the mainland before introducing it into the islands and in the meantime this is carried out under the High Commissioner in each case and from past reports this has proved satisfactory.

Two letters have recently been received from the Pont. Commissione Assistenza Profughi, signed by Mons. Carroll-Abbey which show that the instructions issued from the Ministry of the Interior regarding the distribution of medicinals have not had a sufficiently wide circulation or that instructions have not been carried out regarding the functioning of E.H.D.I.H.E.A. These letters have been answered and I have attached a copy of the reply.

I shall always be glad if you will let me know if you hear of other cases where this new system of medical supply distribution is at fault or when the Italian Government fails to take prompt action. If we have this information we can always get into touch with the Ministry of the Interior to ensure that any defects found are remedied.

As I have already pointed out, the shortage of transport makes the movement of both medical supplies and of food to isolated parts of the provinces most difficult.

The main function of this Sub-Commission is to try to maintain a normal flow of medical supplies of the type considered as essential by the Civil Affairs Division, War Department, and it is quite impossible to cater for the special needs of individual doctors who from time to time make use of medicaments not considered essential by higher authority.

And I add that like yourself, all the members of this Sub-Commission are anxious to render to the Italian Government and to the Italian people every possible assistance especially in the distressed areas.

SUBJECT: - Distribution of Medicines supplies by the Allies.

In addition to the dispositions given until now on the distribu-
tion of medicines supplies by the Allies, we inform you of what follows:

DISTRIBUTION:

According to the agreements with the AC the distribution of
the a/m medicines to the various provinces will take place from now on by
single items and not by units as before.

From the 1st of October a new Office called "ENDIMEA" (Ente
Nazionale Distribuzione Medicinali Alleati) is taking care of the distribu-
tion.

From the 1st of January 1945, assignments will be made according
to requests. The provincial Public Health Offices will have to send ²³⁰³
request every 3 months. Once they have sent a list of what they need for the
first 3 months they only have to inform us if they want changes in it.

According to the requests of the first 3 months and to the quantity
of available products our Direction will fix the assignments and notify them
to the ENDIMEA which will provide to the delivery.

The payment of the medicines must be made in advance within 5 days
of the date of the note sent out by ENDIMEA. Otherwise the products will be
assigned to others.

As soon as the payment is cashed, the delivery will be made.

For the time being the Provincial Public Health Offices will be
in charge of the distribution.

The distribution to drug stores, hospitals and first-aid places
will take place according to the instructions given in Circular No.5/1304 dated
27.3.44.

It is necessary that:

- 1) What is needed by the various drugstores be agreed upon by the Provincial Public Health Offices.
- 2) Requests made by Hospitals, Sanatoria, first-aid places be agreed upon by the Provincial Doctor.
- 3) Requests of surgical instruments and of confinement bags be agreed upon by the local doctor and midwife.
- 4) Requests of trousseaus for new-born children be agreed upon by the Provincial Committee "ONMI".

The provincial Veterinarian will have to send another list of the medicines needed for veterinary use.

SALE

Once the assignments have been delivered the Provincial Public Health Offices will have to give them out to those who have a right to get them and take care that nothing is taken and sold underhand.

The sale of insuline has to be particularly controlled. Said medicine has to be sold only if a medical prescription is presented.

PAYMENT

As we already said the payment must be made in advance through the Banks pointed out by the ENDIMEA.

The sale price to the population will be determined as follows:

For the price of	L. 100
1) Rise for distribution service	16
2) Rise for provincial wholesalers	15
3) Rise for drugstores	35
Price of sale to population	L. 166

The price of the medicines will be published in newspapers, so that the population will be acquainted with them.

The prefects of the various provinces will have to give their support to the ENDIMEA for the fulfillment of its task

This office acknowledges receipt of your letters N 1599 and N 1595. These two letters have been referred to the Italian Government, Ministry of Interior, Public Health for necessary action.

For your information there is attached hereto a copy of a recent letter sent out by the Ministry of Interior which should be helpful to your office in future medical supply problems.

This office now furnishes bulk supplies to the Italian Government as represented by EMDIMEA and does not handle final distribution except in the forward or AMI areas where the Armies are still in control.

Messina has been under Italian control for several months and the Archbishop should have called upon the Medico Provinciale of Sicily if he had trouble in the province of Messina. For Pesaro, the Medico Provinciale of Pesaro should be contacted first with reference to Ministry of Interior, Public Health if that approach failed.

This office will be most willing to assist in any problems regarding medical supplies but we do not wish to interfere with the Italian Government operations except when action by this office might help expedite the supply.

We will appreciate any information at any time which would indicate a failure of proper distribution of medical supplies and will at all times give every possible assistance to your office.

1. I refer to your A.J. dated 5 October 1944 on the a/s subject matter.
2. It is regretted that the Commission has not been kept informed by you of the progress of events through the normal state channels. It is suggested that following on your signal of 2300L of 5 September it would have been better to have all your proposals before this Commission so that policy could have been considered at the proper level rather than to have proceeded immediately to discussions with the technical officer concerned.

3. The Commission does not concur with the issue of your proposed directive for the following reasons: -

a. owing to acute shortage of personnel the Commission is not in a position to undertake any work which does not relate entirely and strictly to the functions of the Commission in Italy.

b. It is not considered that the work of the CCMI at Naples and the functions formerly performed by the Commission in the distribution of medical supplies in Italy can conveniently be carried on by one organization situated at Naples. The distribution of medical supplies particularly in the areas must be directed from this HQ in Rome and the Commission could not for operational reasons, erect its medical supply branch to be established at Naples.

c. The work of the CCMI and the work of distribution in Italy are essentially different. The former is concerned with the organization of supplies from outside Italy to Naples and the distribution to bases in various countries, G.I. Greece and Yugoslavia. The Commission is concerned with the distribution from the base in Naples to regions and provinces in Italy.

d. 5. It is estimated that the number of personnel who could be released would be: -
3 officers of whom one is on temporary duty subject to recall by AFHQ.

6. 22/23 of whom four are on temporary duty and are subject to recall by AFHQ.

This is on the footing that AFHQ would be able to draw in detail from COM at Naples and it would not be required to organize a sub-branch there.

7. For your information this would only leave the Commission with the following medical supply personnel: -
3 officers (of whom two are attached to 5 and 8 Army)
2 NCOs.

8. In writing the above the Commission has not taken into account the fact that may shortly be played by AFHQ in the distribution of medical supplies, as the Commission has no knowledge of their plans.
