My dear Admiral:

For some time this Headquarters has been conducting a safety campaign under policies announced by the Theater Commander, Mediterranean Theater of Operations. This campaign has comprised unit instructions of all drivers, publicity, and a tightening up of Military Police control.

Accidents still occur and many times the fault lies with civilian drivers and pedestrians. As you have probably observed, civilian drivers exceed reasonable speeds, come into main thoroughfares from side streets without stopping, drive in the middle or on the wrong side of the road, and invariably take curves on the inside when they should be on the outside of the curve. Pedestrians appear to prefer the middle of the street to the sidewalks, cross streets indiscriminately without even looking in either direction for approaching cars, bicyclists hang onto the rear of trucks, invariably on the outside, etc.

I believe that drastic steps should be taken to correct this situation, and I am writing you hoping that you will be kind enough to bring the matter to the attention of the proper authorities.

In the course of revisiting people who helped me to escape from ITALY to SWITZERLAND after the Italian Armistice in September 1943, I came across the following situation in PIEMONTE and the country around PARMA, PIACENZA and ALESSANDRIA.

I went to visit an Italian Captain named CAMINO, who was the interpreter at No.49 Prison Camp. This Captain is at the moment connected with I.S.9 and is also connected with the local commune of CALUSO. He tries to arrange importation of food etc.

The following is a record of the experiences I had with him while he was accompanying me on my trip South to PONTANELLATO for the purpose of revisiting people who helped me escape and also for the purpose of arranging the purchase of food from that locality to CALUSO. I travelled to MILAN with him in his civilian car. There I got Public Relations transport - he led the way and I followed behind. Every 20 or 30 kms Captain CAMINO was stopped and in some cases he was asked to produce money or hand over his baggage. We did a certain amount of travelling at night, trying to cross the PO on our way back, and owing to the flooded condition of the river between PIACENZA and ALESSANDRIA we went through a lot of back roads and on many occasions CAMINO was stopped by so-called partisan police, who on more than one occasion tried to extort money out of him or asked him to deliver up his baggage. This was only averted by my presence in uniform.

In PIVENZA I managed to recover 50,000 lire for Captain CAMINO which was taken away from a lorry belonging to his concern the previous week. At CALUSO I managed to recover his car from an armed bandit who boasted he had killed 230 people. This said bandit required the car presumably for illegal purposes.

At PONTANELLATO itself (between PARMA and PIACENZA) I found the small farming community had produced 350 suits of plain clothes within twenty four hours for the British officers who escaped from the camp. They had been through an anxious time owing to the fact that some of them had been taken out of their houses and shot because they had had Germans forcibly billeted on them after they had helped us.

I got the distinct impression that all the small communes in that part of ITALY were independent of each other and were run on a kind of gangster basis.

On 1st August 1949 3 Carabinieri were detailed to proceed on duty to FIGRINO a fraction of GENOVA. They left FIGRINO on foot about 9 PM to return to their station at PEGLI. They were not seen alive after that time. Search parties were sent out and on 5th August their bodies were found partly buried in a hole in the mountains some 4 kilometers from the point where they were last seen. They had sustained many bullet wounds. Investigations commenced and 21 persons are being held for questioning enquiries continuing. Report will be submitted later. End signed HEPFORD.

On 8th and 9th June this Section held several telephone conversations with the Italian Branch of the Displaced Persons and Refugees Sub Commission of the Allied Commission for Italy relative to the arrival of the "Gripsholm". At that time the only information here was that there were approximately 585 "undesirable Italian deportees" aboard this ship. Displaced Persons and Refugees Sub Commission were informed of this and were requested to make sure that the Italian Government made plans to receive these Italian nationals.

Then, due to the anxiety of the War Shipping Administration, the American Council and Officers of G-5 this Headquarters, a signal (F-90930 of 10 June) was sent to Allied Commission asking confirmation of the notification of the Italian Government. Confirmation was later received from Allied Commission by signal (9706 of 13 June).

It is true that details of names of deportees was not furnished prior to arrival of the "Gripsholm", a review of references in the AB cable will show that the Italian Government and the Allied Commission were notified of the arrival of "undesirable deportees".

Nella notte dal 9 al 10 maggio di questo anno, alle ore 24, due persone suonavano alla Casa Canonica di Tagliolo di Ovada (Alessandria) e domandavano che il Parroco venisse con loro, perchè, essendo stato condannato a morte un repubblicano, che trovavasi prigioniero, questi desiderava il conforto del Sacerdote.

Il Parroco don Pelizzari Francesco scendeva subito, portando con sè la borsa degli Olii Santi. Circa mezz'ora dopo, si udiva nei dintorni una scarica di fucile mitragliatore: il Parroco non faceva più ritorno, nè fino ad oggi (29 giugno) si è potuto aver notizie o tracce della sua scomparsa, nè trovare la sua salma.

Tutte le Autorità possibili furono interessate, ma con esito del tutto negativo. La Parrocchia è ancora oggi priva del suo pastore: ogni domenica viene inviato un Sacerdote per la celebrazione della Messa.

Poco dopo accadeva un altro fatto grave. Il 22 maggio ricevevo la seguente lettera:

"Eccellenza Reverendissima,

In considerazione delle benemeritenze che il Clero della Diocesi di Acqui si è acquistata nella lotta per la liberazione, questo Comando ritiene segnalare direttamente a S. Eccellenza che a carico del Parroco di Masone, Don Franco Buffa, stanno per essere presi gravissimi provvedimenti, che noi, per evitare anche uno scandalo spiritualmente dannoso, vorremmo evitare. Naturalmente chiamai subito il Parroco di Masone (Genova) in Acqui e lo consigliai ad allontanarsi temporaneamente. Intanto a Masone avveniva l'uccisione del Segretario Comunale, e continuava una serie di lettere minatorie al Vescovo e al Parroco: quali se questi fosse ritornato!

Poco dopo questa lettera, ecco un ordine di allontanamento di Religiose di cui trascrivo il contenuto.

"Rev.ma Superiora,

Scusi se proprio a Lei di cui abbiamo la massima stima dobbiamo rivolgerci. Con l'allontanamento di Rebellino, l'unico che patrocinava la causa di sacerdoti e di suore è possibile una radicale epurazione. Suor Valentina e Suor Antonia siano subito allontanate da Masone se non vogliono attendersi gravi provvedimenti.

"E' pregata di non far parola a nessuno del paese di questa lettera. Facciamo grazia della vita alle due indegne suore in vista dei vostri meriti.

"F.to Mirko."

Le due Suore naturalmente per cautela vennero allontanate.

Il Vescovo fece personalmente e a mezzo di un suo incaricato una minuziosa inchiesta, sostituendo anche il Vice parroco con un altro Sacerdote.

Risultato dell'inchiesta:

- 1) false le accuse contro il Sac. don Franco Buffa, Parroco e contro le Suore
- 2) il Comandante Mirko la cui firma è ai documenti, nega l'autenticità della firma alle lettere minatorie. Dice di voler scoprire l'autore di queste falsificazioni.
- 3) la popolazione è quasi unanime in favore del Parroco.

Frattanto giunse una nuova lettera minatoria contro un altro Sacerdote, pure di Masone, il Rev.do don Agostino Pastorino, il quale dovette fuggire ed attualmente ignorasi ove si trovi.

Quando si pensi che in questa Diocesi già due Parroci sono stati assassinati/

assassinati in questo modo ed altri gravemente minacciati non è a dubitare quanto il Vescovo sia perplesso e addolorato.

Sono in sue mani molti documenti; ma occorrerebbe fosse dato incarico per una minuta e severa inchiesta a persona designata, capace ed estranea a questa Diocesi, appoggiata da Autorità con forti poteri, per por fine a questo stato di cose che rende impossibile lo svolgimento del ministero in questa Diocesi tanto travagliata.

During the night of the 9th to the 10th of May, at 21 hours, two individuals rang the bell at the Canon house of Tegliolo di Gvada (Alessandria) and asked for the Priest to come with them, for a republican who was a prisoner had been condemned to death, and asked for the Priest.

The Priest, don Palisari Francesco came down immediately, taking with him the Holy Oil. About half an hour later, the rattle of a sub-machine-gun was heard in the neighbourhood. The Priest never came back, and up to now, (June 3th) it has been impossible to find out anything about his disappearance nor has the body been found.

Every possible Authorities have been contacted but with an entirely negative result. The Parish is still without its Priest; every Sunday, a Priest is sent there to celebrate Mass.

A short time after that, another serious incident took place. On MAY 22nd, I received the following letter:

Brigade 413 Command.
Date 21/5/45.

Your Excellency,

considering all that the clergy of the Diocese of Aqvi did for the fight for liberation, this Command wants to inform your excellency directly that very severe orders are going to be issued against the Priest of Masone, Don Franco Buffa; we should like to avoid this, also to avoid a scandal which is spiritually harmful. It is nevertheless indispensable that Don Buffa, the man who gained favour in a thousand ways, who publicly and enthusiastically applauded the declaration of war; who always praised and admired the Germans without ever finding the courage to condemn the worse crimes they committed in this village; who always ignored the partisans, who were suffering and dying in the neighbouring mountains, BE IMMEDIATELY REMOVED FROM THE VILLAGE.

The Brigade Commander: G. Birko'

Of course, I immediately summoned the Priest of Masone (Genoa) to Aqvi and I advised him to go away temporarily. Meanwhile, the Secretary of the Command was killed in Masone, and a series of threatening letters went on being sent to the Bishop and Priest, with the latter if he came back!

A short time after this letter, there was an order for the removal of guns, the content of which I transcribe.

Reverend Mother Superior,

Will you forgive our writing to you for whom we have the greatest consideration. As Rebellino, the only man who supported the cause of the priests and nuns, has been removed, a radical operation is now possible. Sister Valentine and Sister Antonia must be at once removed from Masone otherwise, strong action will be taken against them.

Please do not mention this letter to anybody in the village. We shall spare the life of the two unworthy sisters out of consideration for your merits.

For prudence's sake, the two sisters were of course removed.

The Bishop investigated personally and by means of a delegate, going into every detail, and even replacing the Deputy of the priest by another priest.

Results of the investigation:

- 1) false charges against the priest Don Franco Ruffa, parish priest, and against the sisters.
- 2) Commander Mirko whose signature is on the documents denies the authenticity of the signature on the threatening letters. He says he wants to find out the author of this forgery.
- 3) The population is almost unanimously in favour of the priest.

Meanwhile, another letter was sent, threatening another priest, also of Masone, Don Agostino Pastorino, who had to leave; at present, we do not know where he is.

When we remember that two priests have already been murdered in this diocese, in this way, and others seriously threatened, we can have no doubt about the anxiety and sorrow of the Bishop.

Many documents are in his hands; but it is necessary to appoint and entrust with a detailed and strict inquiry an able person, that does not belong to this diocese; and that would be supported by powerful authorities, to put an end to this state of things which makes it impossible for the priests to carry on their ministry in this diocese which is in such a state of unrest.

Dear Admiral,

The Allied Public Safety Sub-Commission was asked yesterday, in note n. 500/13873, from the Interior Department, to express its opinion on the case of Mr. and Mrs. Martinez. For motives of a general character as well as for particular considerations, I want to draw your special attention on this case, which I shall explain.

The Italian citizen Emanuele Martinez, domiciliated from 1902 till 1944 in Genoa, where he had reached a prominent position in the hotel industry after working for many years, was arrested by the French Police, while he was in Milan, about a month ago. He was for three days under arrest, without being given any reasons; without making any receipt, the police sequestered jewels for an important value, and a large amount of money from his wife and from himself. He was then set free, but the police insisted on his returning to France without delay; Martinez himself was very keen to do so; but, naturally, now on his guards, he preferred to clear up a situation that the treatment inflicted on him by the French police showed as not very clear. Together with his wife, he came to Rome, and contacted at once my Ministry and the French Consulate.

The things stood thus when, the day before yesterday, the Rome Gestapo received from the French Military Command in Italy - via Bucconi 10 - a request for Mr. and Mrs. Martinez to be arrested without delay and transferred at once to France, to Nice, where, according to the French note, they are being asked for by the French Military Security as agents of the Gestapo. Martinez has been condemned in contumacy to 20 years hard labour, under this charge, by the Nice Tribunal. - It is on this request that we should like to have the opinion of the Allied Commission.

You see that this is a request for the extradition of an Italian citizen, supposed to have committed in France, in the past and at an undetermined epoch, a political offence. I feel sure that you will agree with me that such a request, made in such an unusual form, seems in opposition with the fundamental principles, concerning the substance as well as the proceedings, acknowledged in past acts of extradition by the usual international right as well as by the Italo-French convention of May 12th, 1870, principles which have been explicitly admitted in the Italian legislation. I add for your personal information, and without commenting on this particular case, that the officials of our consulate who did arrive in Cannes, picture Martinez as a man who had no political activity, and was only concerned with his commercial activity; the last of them had to observe his attitude during the period of German occupation in France till September 1943. - Mr. Martinez respected the laws which always regulated in France the activity of the foreigners.

I trust that you will understand our point of view and that the Public Safety Sub-Commission will take in consideration what I have just told you before making a decision.

SUMMARY

1. The French Military Command in Italy have requested the Rome Questura to arrest the Italian citizens Signor MARTINEZ and his wife and to transfer them to Nice where, according to the French note, they "are claimed by the French police as agents of the Gestapo. Martinez has been condemned in default, on this charge, to 20 years hard labour by the Nice Tribunal".

The Ministry of Interior have asked for the Public Safety Sub-Commission's opinion on this request with note 500/75873 of 20th inst.

2. Signor Emanuele Martinez has resided at Genoa since 1902 up to 1944 and has acquired a prominent position there as an hotel-keeper.

For your personal knowledge I may add that we have very favourable information as regards Signor Martinez' conduct in France before and during the German occupation. By the former Italian consuls at Nice he is stated to have been always adverse to all political activities and to have always favoured all persons persecuted on racial and political grounds. It is only natural, on the other hand, that the conspicuous position acquired by him, may have given rise to many activities and personal services.

About a month ago, he was arrested at Milan by the French police who detained him for three days without giving him any reason for such action. They subsequently released him, insisting that he should immediately return to France. Signor Martinez came instead to Rome, where he reported to the Ministry of Interior and contacted the French Consulate.

3. It should be furthermore pointed out that the French request envisages the extradition of an Italian subject charged with having committed in France, in former times, a political crime. I am sure you will agree with me that to such a request, submitted in such a peculiar fashion, the Italian Government cannot but give a negative answer. This attitude is based on fundamental principles of international law nor does there appear to be in the Convention of Ardistice any clause which authorizes such a request on the part of the French Authorities nor the treatment meted out to Signor Martinez' persons and property in Milan.

Our point of view is that Signor Martinez' case should be handled through the normal diplomatic channels, all the more so as this Ministry has already interested in the question the French Embassy.

Their disappearance would be most regrettable, for such fauna is rare and valuable and of national importance.

I appeal to your courtesy and comprehension asking for your intervention with the Allied Authorities of Cuneo to eliminate or at least moderate the above mentioned abuses.

TO : Alcoa Rome (Attention Brig. Lush)

1. During the conference of Regional Commissioners held in Rome 14 July certain action was requested by you of the Regions. Please be advised that in Piemonte Region the situation is as follows:

- a) Arms in hands of Italians. Raids are being staged whenever information is received regarding arms or ammunition. Several truckloads have been removed from the Asti area. Raids are being conducted by police, Carabinieri and S.A. Forces. The mobile groups have not sufficient transport nor ammo for guns in armored vehicles.
- b) Close watch is being kept in Novara Province with certain persons being given close attention.
- c) Reduction of those police who were Partisans. Schools for Questura police are being held. Many former Partigiani do not qualify for these schools and are being dismissed and other more suitable personnel being recruited to take their places.
- d) The Regional Commissioners were requested to comb out prisons. The process of combing out prisons has been activated some time ago and is being pushed at this date.
- e) It is standard practice in this Region to place political prisoners in large jails.

Death Toll 36 In ARC Blast

By SCL BERNIE YUDAIN Staff Correspondent

VIAREGGIO, July 19.—A tremendous explosion believed to have been caused by mines stored in an adjacent building, virtually demolished the swanky American Red Cross Enlisted Men's Club here late yesterday afternoon, and caused 31 casualties among American enlisted men and Italian civilians.

The official death toll lists this afternoon stood at 24 soldiers killed and 48 seriously injured, most of them civilians killed and eight injured. All of the soldiers killed or injured were Negro members of the 92nd Division or attached corps or divisional staffs.

The civilians included men, women and children. No names were available. The names of the

soldiers dead or injured will not be released until their next of kin in the U. S. have been notified. Capt. L. V. Bluffin of Laramie, Wyo., division public relations officer, said today.

Some of the injured are in critical condition, and the death toll may rise, officials said. It was estimated that about 50 soldiers and a few civilians who were in the club at the time of the blast escaped uninjured.

Rescue squads worked all through the night removing tons of rubble in their search for bodies. Engineers of the 92nd Division, which was the principal user of the club, worked in shifts with a battalion taking over every four hours, aided by villagers. They worked under floodlights powered by mobile generators, and by 7 o'clock this morning they

had dragged out the last mangled body, after removing tons of rubble and debris that represented the remains of the rear section of the two-story edifice.

Periodically, the dust-covered sweating workers would abate, stretch and eat. They would climb into the wreckage and remove a victim.

Officially, no cause was given for the explosion, but Raymond E. Miller of Philadelphia Red Cross Field Director attached to the 92nd Division and in charge of the club, said it was caused by the mines.

He said that the club, formerly an exclusive Fascist headquarters situated about 25 yards from the beach and in the heart of the resort area, was requisitioned by the 92nd Division in December, 1944.

However, when the division moved north, the building remained vacant until the 92nd arrived from Genoa last month. The club officially reopened Sunday, June 25.

During the division's absence, Miller said, Italian workers under AMG director Giovanni A. Riccio, of the Italian mines from the club, had stored them in a three-story building in the back of the Red Cross building. The two structures were separated only by a narrow alley.

He said that when he discovered the mines were stored so close to the club, he sought to have them removed, but without success. He stated that only the day before the explosion, the mines had been removed and sent to Pisa for disposal. For some reason they were rejected there and returned to the store room in the back of the Red Cross.

In the evening, as rescue workers continued, Brig. Gen. JOHN R. Wood, assistant commander of the 92nd Division, arrived on the scene with high-ranking members of his staff. Maj. Gen. R. W. Almond, commanding general of the division, is temporarily out of the theater.

Immediately after the explosion, an emergency medical station was set up and a command center established. Scores of military police were on duty—most of them from the 92nd Division—to keep the throng of spectators in check.

Miller said that while the club, which was called The Allied Revue, was used mainly by the 92nd troops, many PWS men were frequent visitors and it was also popular with the large number of men who are at the various rest camps hotels in the vicinity. Most of them, officials said, are high-level soldiers, including many air corps men awaiting shipment home.

He named L. Westery of Boston, Mass., Calif., a member of the 758th Tank Battalion, was one of the first on the scene after the explosion occurred.

He said that the way everyone pitched in to help was the greatest example of unselfish cooperation he has seen since he watched the people pitch in together during the big flood of 1937 in Paducah, Ky.

Another GI who was in the vicinity said that right after the blast he saw a column of smoke more than 200 feet high spiraling above

The explosion blasted the windows out of building within a radius of 500 blocks. Miss Marie Leach of Montclair, N. J., a Red Cross girl in charge of the snack bar, said she was in a hotel seven blocks away at the time and the concussion shook the hotel violently.

The roof of the Red Cross Club collapsed. Side walls of the rear section and the back wall were blown down. In the forward section of the building the interior was half-burnt and crumbled and jagged features bent the outside brick walls at intervals. The masonry stairs and veranda in the front of the building with imposing marble columns was still standing. The building was still standing. The building was built of reinforced concrete with a red-brick exterior. Engineers removed large sections of the wall and ceiling while hundreds of soldiers used rocks and shovels to help remove the rubble.

The rear half of the Red Cross building housed the popular coffee room and latrines. The building behind it, where the mines had been stored, was almost completely destroyed also.

In the evening, as rescue workers continued, Brig. Gen. John R. Word, assistant commander of the 2nd Division, arrived on the scene with high-ranking members of his staff. Maj. Gen. F. M. Alford, commanding general of the division, is temporarily out of the theater. Immediately after the explosion, an emergency medical station was set up and a command center established. Scores of military police were on duty—most of them from the 2nd Division—to keep the throng of spectators in check.

Miller said that while the club, which was called The Albert Rensselaers, was used mainly by the 2nd Division, many PWS men were frequent visitors and it was also popular with the large number of men who are at the various rest camps in the vicinity. Most of them, officials said, are high-level soldiers, including many air corps men awaiting shipment home. Gen. Thomas H. Newberg of Manila, Mo., a member of the 75th Tank Battalion, was one of the first on the scene after the explosion occurred.

He said that the way everyone pitched in to help was the greatest example of unselfish cooperation he has seen since he watched the people pitch in to sweep during the big flood of 1937 in Paducah, Ky.

Another GI who was in the vicinity said that right after the blast he saw a column of smoke more than 200 feet high, spiralling above the wreckage.



1. On June 17th I instructed, in your absence, your Chief Staff Officer and the Deputy Director of the Public Safety Sub-Commission, to produce for me a memorandum showing the trend of crime in Northern Italy with special reference to killings, murders, etc. The Deputy Director produced a memorandum the next day which merely brought the picture up to about May 25th. I explained that this was not what I wanted and asked him to do something better.

2. I still have no information. I find that telegram No. 142 of 19 June from Public Safety Sub-Commission has extracted an extremely good reply from Venetia Region, vide their telegram RIII/PS/7.1 of 22 June.

3. Will you instruct the Public Safety Sub-Commission to obtain immediately from the Regional Commissioners the same kind of information as is given in this telegram and to submit a short but comprehensive note on the situation before June 27th when I wish to discuss it with Regional Commissioners and yourself.

The land owners of the Bologna Region who have already suffered greatly on account of the war through destruction of houses, complete disorganization of cultivated regions and the removal of almost 90% of the cattle now find their already precarious situation getting worse through various disturbances of public order.

These disturbances consist in imposing substantial alterations of the existing contracts. Consequently the "mezzadria" system which is a characteristic of the agriculture of this region and has given in the past such good results, will become economically impossible.

Such impositions are in many cases followed by threats and acts of violence and also by illegal extortion of money and murder. This situation of disorder and anarchy, with its excesses is very much similar to the one which provoked on their turn the fascist exactions.

The Bolognese land owners do not refuse to discuss with peasants organizations in order to bring to conclusion equitable agreements for both sides, according to exceptional circumstances created by the war, as have been laid down in other provinces of central and southern Italy. But they do not want to carry on discussions in an atmosphere of illegal coercion and in that condition of inferiority in which an isolated person finds himself in front of an organized community.

A fair agreement may be reached only when both parties are placed on a really equal conditions, also as far as organization is concerned and in an atmosphere of order and legality.

This abnormal situation must be immediately dealt with, otherwise the consequences may become very serious and perhaps hopeless, politically as well as economical.

ly, because while some weeks ago this situation was restricted to some of a few commons, it is now gradually extending to neighbouring provinces.

In the province of Ravenna for instance acts of violence are now very frequent; every day some farmer or other is robbed and then found dead in the fields; farm conductors cannot visit their estates and keep in contact with peasants the majority of whom don't follow the ideas of an evil-minded and violent minority; but who are powerless in front of death threats, because left out any protection.

His Royal Highness, the Lieutenant General of the Kingdom received the enclosed telegram signed by Mrs Esther Di Consiglio who is asking for the liberation of her husband Cesare Spizzichino, who has been in jail two months in Florence, because of a verdict of the Allied Court.

As you can see, the petitioner is closely related to seven of the people who were shot in the Fosse Ardeatine, and belongs to a family who had twenty five members deported to Germany.

According to the wish of His Royal Highness and considering the circumstances mentioned by Mrs Di Consiglio, I want to draw your personal attention on this case for whatever action you will deem advisable to take.

CONFEDERAZIONE ITALIANA DEGLI AGRICOLTORI

C O N F I D A

Rome 28 May 1945.

The land owners of the Bologna Region who have already suffered greatly on account of the war through destruction of houses, complete desorganisation of cultivated regions and the removal of almost 90% of the cattle now find their already precarious situation getting worse through serious disturbances of the public order.

These disturbances consist in imposing substantial alterations of the existing contracts. Consequently the "mezzadria" system which is a characteristic of the agriculture of this region and has given in the past such good results, will become economically impossible.

Such impositions are in many cases followed by threats and acts of violence and also by final extortion of money and murder. This situation of disorder and alarm with its excesses is very much similar to the one which provoked on their turn the fascist excesses.

The Bolognese land owners do not refuse to discuss with peasants organisations in order to bring to conclusion suitable agreements for both sides, according to exceptional circumstances created by the war, as have been laid down in other Provinces of central and Southern Italy. But they do not want to carry on discussions in an atmosphere of illegal coercion and in that condition of inferiority in which an isolated person finds himself in front of an organised community.

A fair agreement may be reached only when both parties are placed on equally based conditions, also as far as organisation is concerned and in an atmosphere of order and legality.

This abnormal situation must be immediately dealt with, otherwise the consequences may be come very serious and perhaps hopeless, politically as well as economically, because while some weeks ago this situation was restricted to zone of a few commons, it is now gradually extending to neighbouring provinces.

In the province of Ravenna for instance acts of violence are now very frequent; every day some farmer or other is robbed and then found dead in the fields; farm conductors cannot visit their estates and keep in contact with peasants the majority of whom don't follow the ideal of an evil minded and violent minority; but who are powerless in front of death threats, because left without any protection.

Dear Dr. Prunas,

I am now able to reply to your letter 11/86522/17 dated 2 May 1945. I find that Gallo was properly tried and convicted of violating Proclamation 3 on 9 April 1945. The sentence was 30 days imprisonment which was suspended upon condition that he would not reside within 50 miles of Citta della Castello during the continuance of Allied Military Government and in addition he was fined 5,000 lire.

As you know, Citta della Castello is in territory which has recently been handed back to the Italian Government so that the ban on Gallo visiting the district is automatically lifted.

There can be no doubt that a violation of the Proclamation took place and I am satisfied that the case was dealt with most expeditiously and that the Court took as indulgent a view as was possible in the circumstances.

Reference your FX 75396 dated 15 May. Subject is TITO's imposter son.

1. Local patriots in PADUA contacted AC Regional staff PADUA and said they had TITO's son with them.
2. The individual was produced by them and taken to Brig DUNLOP Regional Commissioner AC. The individual then said to Brig DUNLOP that he was in fact Marshal TITO's son.
3. The individual was taken to HQ 8th Army by Capt ERSKINE AMG LO of 8 Indian Division. On arrival HQ 8th Army he again asserted to AMG that he was Marshal TITO's son.
4. He stated he had not seen his supposed father for 18 months and that his father was annoyed with him for not returning home sooner.
5. On being conducted to AMG billet Capt ERSKINE said to him 'if you are an imposter there will be serious consequences for you' so he thereupon confessed he was not Marshal TITO's son and added that he had been persuaded by his companions to adopt this guise.
6. Is reputed to bear some resemblance to one of Marshal TITO's sons.
7. The patriots from PADUA have since apologised to Provisional Commissioner for their action in this matter.

AIDE - MEMOIRS

SUBJECT: Minister TALAMO

On the 27th of April, at about 15,30 hours, a n.c.o. of the British M.P., together with a Carabinieri of the Salaria Station, presented themselves at Minister TALAMO's house (Piazzale delle Arti n.1) to carry out a search.

In the absence of the Minister, his wife objected that they lacked the necessary warrant. The n.c.o. answered that he would provide to it immediately and returned soon after with the enclosed note, which, it is believed, he wrote himself.

The search was carried out, but no explanation was offered as regards its object.

Minister TALAMO interested in the matter the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the latter pending further steps, gave him a certificate stating that no search could be carried out in his house without previous agreement between the Allied Commission and the Ministry.

Subsequently, Minister TALAMO learnt that a similar search had been carried out in his brother's apartment at via Lima 36. It appeared, however, in this case, that object of this search was Minister TALAMO's nephew, Alexander KINGSLAND, who had recently crossed the lines near Genoa and had to be questioned according to the normal procedure.

The aforesaid searches appear to be all the more surprising as KINGSLAND lives in Rome, via Paganini n. 24, and does not make any effort to conceal his identity or whereabouts.

Minister TALAMO, together with his brother, went to his nephew's house to see what had happened. Having found the house blocked, he assured the n.c.o. of the M.P. that, should he meet his nephew, he would not fail to tell him to return home at once. On the same evening, at about 21,30 hours the same n.c.o. presented himself again at Minister TALAMO's home, while armed Carabinieri blocked all the exits and the telephone was disconnected.

The Minister showed to the n.c.o. the certificate, but the latter insolently replied that he did not believe it was authentic and insisted upon carrying out a further search.

Some time after the police left the house and the phone was again connected.

Minister TALAMO has been subsequently informed that in the evening of the 27th, his nephew was arrested as he was returning to his house.
