

Subject: Dumping of Allied Ammunition from the Port of Venice.

To: Allied Force Headquarters.
Attention: G-5 Section.

1. Reference is made to your signals numbers F. 73434 dated 26 November and F. 73649 dated 10 December 1946 on this subject.

2. The Ministry of Marine has informed the Navy Sub-Commission that the regulations for the loading and unloading of dangerous cargoes in the port of Venice state that these operations are to be carried out in the Tronchetto zone, where ammunition is brought by means of motor vehicles and boats. For small cargoes (under 30 tons) loading may be carried out, provided proper precautions are taken, from mole A at Marghera, where facilities exist for the direct loading from quayside to ship.

3. The Ministry of Marine, fully realizing the difficulty presented by the greater length of land transport to Ancona, which is, however, better adapted and equipped for such work, does not object to the use of the port of Venice for ammunitions traffic, as indicated in Allied Commission Signal 111240 of December 1946. The necessity is emphasized, however, that at Venice only the Tronchetto zone should be used for the loading of ammunition, and that at Marghera, should that zone be used, the stay of ships should be as short as possible.

4. This matter was brought to the attention of the Navy Sub-Commission, Allied Commission, by the Italian Ministry of Marine because, it is stated, even though the risk may be reduced to a minimum, the grave consequences of an explosion in the Venice Area in view of the industrial zone of Marghera and the technical, artistic and constructional characteristics of the buildings in Venice, cannot be ignored.

POLA TRAGEDY 'NO ACCIDENT'

THE mine explosion on a bridge near Pola, Venezia Giulia, which killed 62 people, was not accidental, reports 13 Corps.

A statement said "A Court of Inquiry has been held into the explosion, which occurred at Vergarolla, near Pola, on August 16. The court has found that the explosion could not have been accidental but was caused by the deliberate act of some person or persons unknown. The matter is now in the hands of the police."

Pola is in the British-American occupied area within the Yugoslav occupied zone of Venezia Giulia. There is much speculation among the people whether political motives were involved in the explosion.—Reuters

On the 19 Aug 46 the General Council met to examine the circumstances of the tragic explosion of a group of mines left unexploded near the beach of Vergatolla.

The Chairman of the Area gave regular authorizations for the holding of an extraordinary meeting.

The meeting began at 15.10 hrs.

Those present were: the President of the Comune, Pr. C. Angelo D'Addi; the President of the Council, Ing. Nicolo' Gianni in addition to the members: Agnese, Tinti, Brusato, Ing. Nilio Vizzo, Dott. Vittorio Andra, GIOACCHINO Francesco, SARTORI Remigio, RISIGLIO Angelo, Ing. Mazzolini Bruno and NICOLINI Franco. The substitutes ANTONIO Giuseppe, RESTAANI Enrico and BELLAZ Attilio were also present.

The General Secretary PALEO Ottavio was seated.

The report of the President and of the individual councillors was heard: from which it appears that the principal cause of the terrible incident was due to the absence of any supervision or other precautionary measures destined to foresee and prevent the presence of unauthorized persons near the dangerous war explosives. It was also established, in an examination of the relative files, that as far back as last October the communal administration had drawn the attention of the Allied authorities to the responsibility attaching to them for the presence of so much unexploded explosive material and had requested them several times to take adequate measures. The Council at the conclusion of the discussion unanimously approved the despatch of the following order of the day for the necessary measures: to the Supreme Commander of the Mediterranean, to Admiral Stone, to the Command of the 13 Corps, to Col. Bowman and to the Army Commander Col. Cipriani.

"The General Council met on the 19 August 1946 to hear the report of the new and terrible tragedy which, as a result of the explosion of mines on the beach of Vergatolla, has caused suffering and ruin to many families.
They associate themselves with the deep distress which is felt by the city and express their profound sympathy to the families who are enduring such anguish of spirit.

In front of such a spectacle of pain and death, these wish to make an ardent protest against the guilty carelessness of 292 who, although knowing of the existence and extreme danger of unexploded war material, did not take any precautions to prevent the accident, notwithstanding that the dangers had been pointed out to them by their Supervisory Administration in who had made several requests

The Colonial Secretary PAUL OTTAWA was also present.



Meanwhile we beg your excellency to dispose so that efficient precautions be taken in order that such misfortunes shall not happen again.

Moreover this Confederazione trusts that the Allied Authorities will provide for the granting of an adequate indemnity to the families of the victims.

The Nola explosion resulted in the death of two British
W.O.s and sixteen Italian workers engaged in loading up a lorry with
anti-personnel grenades and mines. The lorry literally disappeared,
there was a bit of a tyre and small parts of the vehicle near the
crater and nothing much else. As all the people round the lorry
were killed, no one will know just what happened, but I think it is
another example of the dangerousness of high explosive.

Much of this explosive has now been exposed to the hot sun
of at least one summer and I am not too happy about it with more hot
weather coming on. I attach a copy of a letter I wrote on 11 March
in case it has not reached you. In my opinion the responsibility
rests entirely with the Army. My letter was written before the
Nola explosion, anyone can drive a vehicle through the dunes and
load up with explosives by day or by night as far as I could see.



SUBJECT: The sinking of the Allied munitions. 103

Following letter No. 65156/56024.2/19.10 dated 5 April we communicate that the Navy Department states, that the preference in choosing a port for the embarkation of the munitions for sinking in the sea, should depend on the convenience. This is manifested by the Torre Annunziata incident. It should be avoided for the traffic of the engaged munitions to take place near the inhabited localities, or those frequented by the civil population, in other words, where there would be difficulty to inspect and to control.

These considerations justify the objections raised by the General Director of the Navy Department, General Matteini, against the request made by the Allied Authorities to use the ports of Ancona and Molfetta for the embarkation of the munitions for sinking. As regards the port of Molfetta the operations could only be done in the very centre of the dwellings and at Ancona only in a place frequented by the work people of the port and very difficult to watch over.

On account of circumstances obliging the Allies to use the a/m ports, it is necessary that the Comm'd in charge of the embarking operations, in concord with the harbour master, shall give instructions, and adopt cautionary measures, so as to guarantee as far as possible, the safety of the public.

Under these conditions the Navy Department will 245^e to the use of the ports in question for the purpose already expressed, confirming all that has already been referred to your communication, which is, that the port of Ancona is already in use, ~~since~~ more than a month, by the Allies for the embarkation of the munitions,

and that the local marine authorities have protested for the danger to the citizenship, on account of the prolonged deposit of the explosives in the warfs of the port.

The Mexican Ministry in order to avoid as far as possible damage to the fishing industry, in consequence of the sinking of naval substance, stated that the occasion requires the greatest exigency, and that the poisonous explosives must be sunk at a determined distance from the coast, where the depth of the sea will give a sufficient safety, but no harm will be forthcoming for the fishermen.

It appears that a lorry was being loaded with explosives including antipersonnel bombs or grenades when the load detonated. 2 British NCOs superintending the loading and 18 Italian men and women (one child) working round the lorry were killed. Two small farm-houses were damaged and persons in them received contusions, but otherwise no one else was hurt. The lorry and its load disintegrated, there is little left but a couple of shallow craters, and most of the people killed were literally blown to pieces.
3. There is still a very large tonnage of ammunition all round Nola forming part of the 16 B.A.D. and some of this has already been exposed to the full heat of a hot summer. The explosive is spread over a very large area and the majority of the stacks are away from buildings.

In reply to the letter dated 16 March last, sent by Admiral
Stone to the President of the Council regarding the use of some British ports
for the loading and dumper in the port of Amiens, the Ministry of Marine is
being questioned by us, has stated that for some time past the allied authorities
have been using the port of Amiens for such operations.

As it takes the Englishmen a long time at the quay before being
loaded onto the ships, the Harbour Port of Amiens has agreed to the usual
Allied R. its known for the danger to which the people and buildings are
exposed and requests that the authorities should only be loaded at the quay
just before the loading takes place.

The British in its re. have no real difficulties of an engineering
nature which have however been objected to by the harbour authorities in the
interests of the public safety.

This is not granted, the Ministry of Marine has already given the
consent for the use of the port of Amiens on the understanding that the pre-
cautionary measures requested by the Harbour Port be applied.

Further information will be sent you as soon as possible regarding the
