1. Reference is your letter 3/Gen/24 dated 4 Dec 44.
2. The questions you have raised are both interesting and useful and have focused attention in this headquarters on a number of points.
3. It is regretted that there has been some delay in replying, but your questions have been the subject of interested study by various Sub-Commissions of Economic Section. In order to give you a clear picture of the reactions in this headquarters to the various points you have raised, we cannot do better than send you the attached paraphrase of the views of the various Sub-Commission directors. *16/7*
4. After consideration of the various factors involved it is, however, regretted that no general authority can be given to you to administer your region as an exceptional area. While special problems are bound to arise in NW Italy, the economic policies of AC/AMG will apply fully in PIEMONTE Region. If circumstances arise in which, in your opinion, any general AC/AMG policy should be modified in its application to your Region, you should submit details of the case and your recommendations to this headquarters for decision.

A PARAPHRASE OF VIEWS BY THE DIRECTORS OF THE SUB-COMMISSIONS (1)

" *an letter from Regional Commissioner, Gen. to dated 4 Dec 44*

1. Upon entry into Piemonte Region it is desired to apply as few restrictions in respect to trade and prices as may be compatible with operational security and assistance to Allied Forces. To this end it is suggested that no restrictions be imposed upon travel and circulation within the Region except:
 - (a) such as may be required for operational or security purposes
 - (b) such as automatically follow the control and issue of motor vehicle permits and allowances of P.O.L.
 - (c) such as are included in the regulations of any Italian Transport organization handling the distribution of food and other essential products.

The Director of the Industry S/C feels that trade in the Region and between Piemonte and other Regions ^{should} be kept as free from restrictions as possible. This keeps prices at a reasonable level and curtails black market operations. He thinks, however, that A.F.L.R.B. will exert considerable influence on free movement of goods and this factor should be considered.

The Director of the Transportation S/C proposes another restriction: the prohibition of the travel and circulation of persons in load-bearing vehicles which will be in extremely short supply for the hauling of food necessary to sustain the population of the region. This Sub-Commission will see to it that basic food commodities and other supplies necessary to sustain the population will receive priority over any other transport of goods.

2. It is further suggested that no control be exercised in respect to trade or prices of any commodity except:

- (a) Cereals in all forms
- (b) Olive oil
- (c) Sugar
- (d) Salt
- (e) Imported articles
- (f) Commodities subject to Italian Government monopoly.

The Director of the Commerce Sub-Commission says, that in addition, a very strict control be exercised over all material controlled or restricted by A.F.L.R.B. and that these materials, in addition to silk and all tartarics, must be frozen and reported to them, the Commerce S/C. In addition to the above items to be controlled should be newsprint and printing paper which should not be permitted any freedom of trade. The Director also points out that steps should be taken by the Regional Commissioner to insure

controlling "Italian Controlled Materials" properly so that the Italian Government has the opportunity to use them for the country's economic re-habilitiation.

The Director of the Food S/C recommends no advance commitment to permit distribution without control of locally produced food items due to the possible changing of ~~seed~~ situation of these locally produced food items at the time of entry.

The Price Branch feels that the proposed policy in paragraph 2 should be made applicable to a larger geographical area than Piemonte to be consistent with the previous plan of pricing farm products on a national basis.

3. The foregoing is subject to:

- (a) Continuance of present rationing system or modification ther-of that may be directed by higher authority.
- (b) Clear price marking of all items offered for retail sale."

The Director of the Food S/C says that item (a) will be in effect. However assurance cannot be given to the Commissioner for the continuation of present ration scales because changes might become necessary in the future. Item (b) should be enforced by the Regional Commissioner himself.

This is the letter which served as the agenda for our conference with the Minister. A working party has been set up for the Ministers and the S/C's to establish an action program which will be formally presented by the Italian Government. I shall forward this proposal to you for review.

My dear Sir:

You will, I am sure, agree that the time has come when we must face the facts of the present food distribution problem. I have no hesitation to indicate to you the situation is extremely grave. In light of the responsibility that rests with you, I feel it is imperative that we meet together to outline an action program.

To this end I respectfully request a meeting in my office on Tuesday, October 17 at 4:30 p.m. (1630 hrs.). So that you may be prepared for this meeting I submit for your consideration the following points on the agenda:

1. Rationing.
2. Barter.
3. Review of restrictions and controls in the distributive mechanism.
4. The movements of supply from surplus to deficit areas.
5. Review of the fishing industry restrictions.

In order that we may all point our discussion to the problem; perhaps it would be advisable to spell out, in brief, a few of the salient issues under each point of the agenda.

1. **Rationing** - The extremely short supply of both imported and domestic foods, coupled with transportation, makes it imperative that a realistic inventory of the present mechanism be reviewed. Questions that arise in this review are:

(a) Is the maximum effective use being obtained of the present available supply? If not, why not?

(b) Are the geographical features of this country recognized in the present rationing scheme? If not, why not?

(c) Are the rationed commodities equitably distributed in the proper relationship of the need? If not, why not?

(d) If bread is to be maintained on a universal basis, can we establish a selective rationing scheme for the products in the miscellaneous group of the ration diet?

2. **Barter** - Review and consideration might be given to the establishment immediately of certain practical and simple barter schemes to induce supply. The most outstanding example is the use of salt from Santa Margherita to induce the supply of potatoes from Avellino. Will this approach foster the flow of supply? If not, why not? Are there sufficient significant items, such as salt, lacking in other areas which could be introduced? If not, why not? Will this mechanism offset the need of price increases? If not, why not?

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3. Review of Restrictions and controls in the distribution mechanism -

This is an extremely controversial point but it must be faced and the criterion must be one to attain the most practical and effective result of food distribution; The theories of control are well understood. The practical aspects of free distribution are significantly required. If permit controls and all other restrictions on the movement of goods are to be eliminated would it be effective to limit this freedom to all commodities except Grain, Fats and Oils and milk Products? If not, why not? How far can we eliminate controls without endangering transport control as envisaged by ENAC? What end must we reach in order to enforce as much rationed supply and what effect will it have on the cities and of the poor in the cities? What advantage have we in blocking pulses?

4. The movements of supply from surplus to deficit areas -

Without reflection on the ENAC plan, and eliminating all pride of authorship, is this a practical plan for the emergency needs of transport facing us today? If it is determined that ENAC is administratively burdensome and operatively ineffective, serious consideration must be made to correct the situation and introduce some practical effective ad hoc program. There is no mystery to the transportation problem as such. There just isn't sufficient transport to cater to the urgent needs of liberated Italy. Hence, we must quickly and efficiently review and inventory what we have and operate it to its maximum use.

5. Review of the fishing industry restrictions - It is imperative

that we have a clear understanding of the important role the fishing industry can play in supplementing the national food position. This Commission is prepared to present a clear operational program to the Naval Command based on recommendations of the Italian Government.

Any direct action taken by the Government, if it reflects expediency measures to face a serious national problem, would be warmly applauded by your constituents. I would sincerely request that you be prepared to come to this meeting with the single purpose of finding an immediate solution to effect this result.

As I anticipate that this meeting will last until 7:00, I would be very pleased to have you join me at dinner so that we may there review and formulate the action program considered at the meeting. I have requested the following Ministers to attend and to dine with me: His Excellency Minister Guilo, His Excellency Minister Gronchi and His Excellency Under Secretary of Agriculture Bergomi.



1. The opinion is wide-spread by the Italian press and Allied diplomatic representatives that internal trade, particularly as regards the purchase and movement of food supplies, is greatly handicapped, if not almost completely blocked, by movement and trading restrictions -- some Italian and some Allied.
