At 3 the Italian Minister for Foreign Affairs wrote to the CC about the issuance of a decree for the desegregation of British and American assets in Italy. This decree was about to be issued when certain action taken by the French Authorities in Paris led the Italian Government to consider delaying its publication.

2. The matter was referred to Civ Aff Sec (fol 5) who stated that the decree had already been agreed and that the question raised regarding the action of the French was a political issue, and recommended that this be referred to Pol Sec.

3. This was done, and at 7 you will see that the Italian Government has been advised that the decree should be issued, but not extended to the French. Any differences between the French and Italians should be a matter for negotiation between their two Governments.

The CC may like to see this correspondence.

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that on October 29th, 1943, the villa Fiorita ,Salita Scudillo 19 , Napoli-Capodimonte , belonging to the Swiss citizen Mrs.Laura Meuricoffre , was requisitioned by the British Forces .

At present the villa is occupied by Palestinian nurses attached to the 92nd General British Hospital. Mrs.Meuricoffre, the 88 years old widow of Mr. Meuricoffre, who for 40 years was Swiss Honorary Consul in Naples, returned from Switzerland on December 1st, 1945 and tried since then to have her villa derequisitioned. All efforts to that end have failed till now, the Town Major of Naples being of the opinion that for the present there was no possibility to quarter these nurses elsewhere.

The Swiss Government would appreciate it ^{if} ~~if~~ ^{if} ~~if~~ ~~if~~ in consideration of the age of Mrs.Meuricoffre and the eminent services her husband rendered to the Swiss Government during 40 years as well as the precarious way she is living in at present in a small annex to the villa, the Allied Authorities could see their way to derequisition the aforementioned Swiss property.

2. Allied property in Italian Govt territory is controlled by neither Allies nor Italian Govt, because of (A) Terms PAN 487 and lack of personnel (B) Lack of decision by LONDON on decree of desequestration, which has been approved by WASHINGTON.
3. A.C. Property Control Division proposes recommend U.S. Embassy ROME that U.S. Govt should act unilaterally to protect interests U.S. nationals which are being imperilled by delays.
4. Transfer of northern territories to Italian Govt is imminent and terms PAN 487 and steady reduction personnel makes decision imperative. Action per para 3 being postponed for few days pending reply this signal.

I attach a copy of a memorandum from the Director of the Labour Sub-Commission on the subject of the property of the Scots College at Grottaferrata. He informs me that he has made arrangements or a representative of the Comteffazioni Generale Italiana del Lavoro (Sig. VILLANI) to discuss with the administrator of the property and a member of the Labour Sub-Commission the question of the engagement of surplus labour at the vineyard and villa. He suggests that the administrator should be prepared to state to what extent he can assist in relieving local unemployment by engaging some additional workers.

When agreement has been reached regarding the numbers that can be properly employed arrangements can be made for the removal of any surplus.

Perhaps you would pass this information on to the Secretary of State and to Consiglier Augusto Rizzo-Orsi.

Vidimare) with one of the Labour Sub-Commission officers to discuss the question of the engagement of surplus labour at the vineyard and villa belonging to Scots College at Crotto Ferrata. I suggest that the administrator of the property should be advised accordingly; and that he should be prepared to say to what extent he can assist in relieving local unemployment by engaging some additional workers. When agreement has been reached regarding the numbers that can be properly employed I think we can arrange for the removal of any surplus and this is, I understand, what the administrators desire.

1. Reference is made to Col. Talbot's memorandum, Ref: 4754/21/EC of 9 July 1945.

2. ~~His~~ Inquiries show that there is considerable unemployment in the area of Crottaferrata and that the Camera del Lavoro has been persuading employers in the district to engage as many of the unemployed as possible in order to relieve the situation. It is naturally desirable that no opportunity of employment of surplus labour on useful works should be missed, and it is assumed that the authorities concerned are prepared to engage as much labour as is possible. If more labour is being sent than is required, the question will be discussed with the Italian General Federation of Labour and the Camera del Lavoro with a view of discharging all the redundant men. Before discussion on these items can take place, however, it would be useful to know how many permanent employees there are in the vineyards and at ~~Mavella~~, how many additional workers can be properly engaged to do useful work and to relieve unemployment, and how many surplus workers have been taken on under pressure from the Camera del Lavoro. With this information, it should be possible to arrive at an acceptable solution.

3. It would also be useful to have confirmation that Scots College and the adjacent vineyard is in fact British property. It is alleged that the responsible authorities leased the property to the Germans at a substantial rent during the German occupation. Some comments on this aspect would be useful.

Dear Colonel Talbot,

The Secretariat of State have sent me a Note requesting that protection be afforded the summer villa of the Scots College and its adjacent vineyard, which are situated between Grottaferrata and Marino. This property belongs to the Scots College in Rome and the Administrator, in the present absence of the staff and students, is Monsignor Augusto Fidecicchi.

2. It is stated that the Camera del Lavoro at Grottaferrata for some time past has been sending labourers to work in the Villa in question, without any authorization on the part of the Administration of the College. The lawyer to whom the care of the College has been entrusted, made protests to the Italian General Federation of Labour and to the Head of the Camera del Lavoro at Grottaferrata, who agreed to stop these abuses. No action, however, has been taken in the matter, but larger groups of workers continue to be sent to work in the vineyard. These labourers threaten to beat the custodians of the Villa when they protest against their presence on the property. On the other hand there is said to be no need for this work, which imposes a costly and unnecessary burden upon the Administration.

3. Do you think you could perhaps have the matter brought to the knowledge of the Italian General Federation of Labour and urge them to instruct the Camera del Lavoro at Grottaferrata to take appropriate action for the protection of this British property?

Deequestration of UNITED NATIONS Property in ITALY is subject.

1. In October after considerable discussion, AC and Italian Government reached agreement on decree of dequstration of UNITED NATIONS Property. Decree was approved by Council of Ministers of 24 January 47 and published in official gazette on 27 February, 1945. Copies of decree have been transmitted to LONDON and WASHINGTON by UK and US Embassies in ROME, and publication of supplemental decree by which application becomes effective was delayed with thought that views of 2 governments might be received.
2. On 3 we recd your office advised this Headquarters that decree of 24 January was considered seriously prejudicial British interests and requested suspension of publication of supplemental decree until considered comments could be forwarded. In view of WAT 437 the AC did not request the Italian Government to suspend publication of the supplemental decree, but the British Embassy, on the basis of a request it had received from the FOREIGN OFFICE, did arrange for suspension.

Copies of decree have been transmitted to LONDON and WASHINGTON by UK and US Ambassies in ROME, and publication of supplemental decree by which application becomes effective was delayed with thought that views of 2 governments might be received.
2. On 3 Jan 1946 Office advised this headquarters that decree of 24 January was considered seriously prejudicial British interests and requested suspension of publication of supplemental decree until considered comments could be forwarded. In view of PAM 437 the AC did not request the Italian Government to suspend publication of the supplemental decree, but the British Embassy, on the basis of a request it had received from 4254 FOREIGN OFFICE, did arrange for suspension.
3. My dear Mr. Ambassador,

The new directive of the combined Chiefs of Staff to the Allied Commission contemplates that normal diplomatic processes shall be employed for the protection of property of foreign nationals located in Italian Government territory.

There is a total of 795 parcels of property owned by nationals of the United States located in that part of Italy which has been restored to the Italian Government. These consist of 496 parcels of real estate, 45 industrial or commercial enterprises and 254 parcels of securities, accounts, and other miscellaneous items. Since the landing in Sicily, these properties have been under the protection of the Property Control Division of the Finance Sub-Commission whose files will be freely available to assist your staff in their new duties.

In accordance with the instructions of the Acting Chief Commissioner, a representative of the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs was informed verbally today that in the opinion of the Political Section the Decree for the desequstration of British and American assets in Italy should be issued with a clause extending it to all the United Nations. It was pointed out that France was not technically one of the United Nations and that if the French authorities enquired whether the Decree was applicable to French property their attention might be drawn to the action of the French Provisional Government in regard to Italian property in French territory with the suggestion that informal negotiations should be entered into with a view to reciprocal treatment being accorded in the two countries.

1. I enclose papers dealing with the /m subject matter. You will observe that I am directed to take the necessary action, but I regret that I am at present not in a position to do so.

2. So far as the decree is concerned it has been agreed, ~~in~~ ^{to} I am informed, between the Chief of Property Control Division and the Italian Government in accordance with policy approved by the A/GO some time ago.

3. It is a matter of indifference to the Finance sub-commission and to this section as to whether or not France is included in the decree. If France is included her nationals will have the benefit of having their property administered by Italian agencies with Allied supervision. If she is not included the property of her nationals will be administered by Italian agencies without such supervision.

4. The question is one which is entirely political as it depends solely upon the relationship between the Italians and the French, and until the Chief Commissioner has decided what attitude he proposes to adopt from the political point of view I am unable to take any action.

5. The papers are therefore resubmitted with the recommendation that the matter be handled by the Political Section.

Dear Minister,

I believe you personally interested in the question of the issuance of the decree relative to the de-sequestration of British & American assets in Italy, and I am therefore glad to be able to inform you that the decree, from the formal standpoint, has already been elaborated.

It was our intention to issue the decree in question in the course of the present week, extending the provisions therein contained to all the United Nations, since included, and in this sense the decree had been drawn up.

However, just within the last few days, we have learnt that one of the first acts of the Government in Italy, was that of sequestering them as enemy assets on the same plane as the German assets. Not only, but an even greater provision has been made, so-called "totalitarian", affecting its installation in Italy, was that of sequestering all Italian property belonging to persons of enemy origin, which for years to here has been adopted in Italy where Italian State property has been confiscated outright.

This information was fortunately swerved as; the measures agreed to be utilized apparently did originally nothing in respect of Italy's financial position towards the United Nations, which for over one year has been that of a combatant and not of an enemy Country, and in consideration of our desire, many times expressed to the qualified representatives of the French Government, to reach a sincere classification and normalization of Franco-Italian relations.

The question is at present under consideration, with the opportunity consequence of a postponement, which I trust will be brief, of the issue of the decree in question, and for this reason I hasten to inform you accordingly.

I take this opportunity to inform you that I have suggested to the Italian Ambassador to the Quirinal that the de-sequestration of Italian assets in Italy, expressed the hope that a similar initiative might be taken by the allied Governments in respect of Italian assets in the United States and in Great Britain.

This information has painfully surprised us; the measures appear to be utterly arbitrary and unjustified both in respect of Italy's juridical position vis-a-vis the United Nations, which for over one year has been that of a co-belligerent and not of an enemy Country, and in consideration of our desire, very strong expressed to the qualified representatives of the French Government, to reach a sincere clarification and normalization of Franco-Italian relations.

The question is at present under consideration, with the unfortunate consequence of a postponement, which I trust will be brief, of the issue of the decree in question, and I beg this reason to hasten to inform you accordingly.

To take this opportunity to inform you that 785017 is still pending in accounting Amassadors Kirk and Charles with the 4240 combat issue of the Decree concerning the de-sequestration of Allied assets in Italy, expressed the hope that a similar initiative might be taken by the allied Governments in respect of Italian assets in the United States and in Great Britain.

I believe we, when advised, will be in a position to act.
