C.I.O

Attended meeting of Food S/C as per folio 212. - Food Min (St) accepted the ration scale as laid down in folio 211 but suggested it be modified by keeping present pasta scale of 78.3 gr. - This to be accomplished by eliminating the 25 gr for children from 9-18 & the 20 gr supplement for heavy workers. It was brought out that by adopting the foregoing it would increase wheat requirements by 1.3%. Mr. Brains suggested that St. Govt agree to scale but if it were modified as suggested that 1.3% should be made up by Italian production. C.B.I.L. believe a propaganda program is desirable before scale is put into effect. He proposed to do it. Ch. Hall felt that new scale will not create too much trouble.

SUBJECT: Italian Food Situation

FROM : Food Sub-Commission

TO : Executive Commissioner

1. With reference to conversation of to-day's date, attached is report referred to in Food Sub-Commission monthly report for September 1945.

2. The present position with regard to loans to Austria is as follows :

17,000 Tons loaned to US/French Zone is being repaid immediately;

17,000 Tons loaned to British Zone has been requisitioned by them and has been promised by the end of this month.

3. The landed cost of wheat is 11 lire per kilo, which works out at approximately £. 27 per ton.

I. Ration scales in South - Nationally rationed foods

A. Normal ration:

B. Special rations are allowed following classes. All special rations are larger than normal ration, sometimes to favor the class, sometimes to meet larger food requirements of the class and sometimes because the class does not have an opportunity to supplement ration by purchase of non rationed foods (as prisoners).

1. Hospital patients and refugees.
2. Public Security Agents.
3. Prisoners.
4. Ship crews.
5. Consuls and families.
6. Heavy workers for Armed Forces, railway workers, miners, public utility workers.

C. The increase in rations to the special classes is both through increases in foods in normal ration and by ration of other foods (Dehyd. Soup, Dry Veggies, Meats).

D. Children and nursing and pregnant mothers get 50 grams powdered skim milk (or equivalent per day).

SUBJECT: Heavy Workers for Allied
Army Units--Supplementary Rations

SEP 25 1945

TO : Ministry of Food

1. As from 1st October 1945 the scheme for the issue of supplementary rations to heavy civilian workers for the Armed Forces, known as Scale "A" and "B" will be amended as follows:

2. Scale "B" for workers employed solely for the Armed Forces.

This scheme will be abolished entirely. The workers who have been benefiting under its provisions will be entitled to supplementary workers' rations under the new All Italy Scales, being established on October 1st, according to their individual classification--heavy, or very heavy, miners or forestry workers.

3. Scale "A" Heavy Workers 100% for the Armed Forces including Contractor's Labor.

Supplementary Cards Scale "A" will be discontinued. The workers will receive a mid-shift meal, consisting of 250 grams Bread, 50 grams Pasta, 170 grams Fresh Vegetables and 30 grams Dehydrated Soup, provided and served at the place of work by employing units.

Workers in this category will also be entitled to supplementary rations for heavy workers from Italian sources under the new scales effective October 1st. They will, with the exceptions, be classed solely as heavy workers, irrespective of their labor classification whilst working for the Armed Forces, and will receive supplementary rations of 100 grams of Bread and 20 grams Minestra daily by means of an Italian supplementary ration card. The exceptions are forestry workers and miners who will receive 400 grams Bread and 20 grams Minestra per day by means of an Italian supplementary card.
