Submit that signal 3203 issued 6 June 45 constitutes an intolerable assumption of operational authority over a Regional officer. Major STURGEON is charged responsibility for all industry this Region and his 3 day absence as result this ill considered announcement made without consultation with me not only suspends operations but nullifies my direct orders that no Regional Officer cross Region lines without my permission. Same remarks apply recent kidnapping Major AT&T Telecommunications Officer by Lt Col MILLER in my absence. Major AT&T has been in actual service this Region not more than 1 day out of 5 since Headquarters arrived SOLLIMA and progress of Telecommunications work more critical here than anywhere is not satisfactory. Have tried to be tolerant and cooperative in such matters but have as yet not had as much as 5 minutes talk from any officer of another Region and success of my mission depends on control of assigned officers I now find it necessary to instruct that all communications along lines of cited signal be disregarded.

1. Lignite from Trieste.

Coal Section are investigating the question of Lignite supplies for the synthetic rubber and sugar beet factories in Ferrara. As soon as it is known that supply of lignite is firm, Transportation Sub-Commission will endeavour to arrange movement through 15 Army Group and 8 Army, who control all movement to, from and within the Trieste Area.

2. Hemp.

Every available vehicle has been sent to 15 Army Group, who have allocated user, and we have no additional road transport at the moment which can be sent forward to assist with the Hemp lift. The questions of Hemp and other large movements required within Army Territory have been brought to the notice of 15 Army Group and all concerned by this HQ. signal 8997 dated 2 June '45.

3. Cattle Manure - Bologna.

Representative of Transportation Sub-Commission held a meeting with the Regional Commissioner, Emilia Region on 25th May. The subject of this meeting was Road Transportation for Food Supplies for Bologna and the position regarding Cattle Manure was mentioned. It was found that out of a pool of 300 Civilian trucks only 60 were on the road, due to an alleged lack of petrol. An emergency and additional release of 84,000 Gals. PGL was obtained for Bologna and it was stated this would enable all Civilian trucks available to be brought on the road immediately. The overall PGL allotment to Emilia is sufficient to assure continuous operation of local civilian MT.

4. It should be appreciated that during phase 1, all the above is the responsibility of the Armies who, as already stated, have every vehicle under their control which we can spare from Italian Government Territory. There has been certain difficulties in the formation of Q.M. Truck and G.T. Cos., but it is hoped that an additional G.T. Coy will be in position in Emilia Region during the second half of this month, and this Coy which will operate under control of Regional Commissioner should provide assistance with Hemp, Cattle Manure plus other commitments.

SUBJ: Your notes by Executive Committee.

No. 1. Second question.

The following note from letter was reported from the Executive Committee and can be passed to you for information and appropriate action:

1. Mining from 1944. At PERAKA is a suitable mining area in the mining center and has all the necessary facilities for further cement plant. It is intended to use limestone and sand to be locally supplied by barges and take up by barge factory designed to use barges. Arrangements should be made as soon as possible for the transport of limestone and sand to the two important factories working. The use of barges will be required for the barges.

2. Log. There is said to be in the region 15,000 tons of logs a large amount of which has already been landed but there have been some difficulties in getting logs to KELANG and to KLUANG. It is estimated that there will be no difficulty in getting logs to KLUANG.

3. Cattle. There are said to be in the region 15,000 head of cattle but the only type of cattle which have been retained for the last six months. There are very large numbers of cattle which are said to have been brought in from the interior of China. It is estimated that there are less than 10,000 cattle fitting requirements. There are very few cattle available for the present. If transport could be arranged to get cattle from the interior long term employment would also account for the present.

As you can see, we are still in the process of getting our order and have only received a portion of what was requested. It is currently estimated that we will receive all of the remaining items of which are estimated to be delivered by August 15th. (c) Miscellaneous Purposes Committee

Meeting 17 March 45. The Committee was instructed to reconsider its recommendations on priorities of allocation of Hemp products in view of the urgent needs of ALCOM for these commodities, giving particular attention to the question of the reduction of Sack production, which would have serious repercussions on the food distribution problem.

With the exception of the above, the report of the Committee was accepted. In view of the importance of Hemp and Hemp products to the Allied Armed Forces, the Board requested ALCOM to ensure that Hemp production in no way suffers from the hand-over of the industry to the Italian Government.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES COMMITTEE - MINUTES

44. MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING:

Representative HQ, AC stated that the Italian Government had agreed to a price for hemp of 7000 lire per quintal in territory under their control. In A.M.G. territory HQ, AC hoped to be able to establish a lower price. The Committee requested HQ, AC to arrange that any price set in A.M.G. territory be sufficiently high to ensure that raw hemp comes onto the market in adequate quantities.

45. FUTURE AVAILABILITY OF RAW HEMP

The Committee received a report from HQ, AC on the estimated availability of raw hemp. As the balance of raw hemp from the current crop would not be sufficient to maintain the production of hemp products at its present level the Committee agreed that until the new season's crop became available:

- (a) Future demands submitted by services, including those on behalf of Italian Forces, will be strictly for current use and not for export or stockpiling and will be certified as such.
- (b) Services requirements will be met before AC demands are considered.
- (c) Production of cereal type sacks for the coming month will be eliminated, thereby saving approximately 106 tons of raw hemp.

46. ASSISTANCE FROM SERVICES TO THE HEMP INDUSTRY:

HQ, AC presented a list of requirements necessary for the efficient working of Hemp Factories now in operation. The Committee considered that this should be channeled through G-5, AFHQ, in order that appropriate services might be approached.

The subject is fertiliser for hemp.

In continuation of our conversation of 13th December, I forward the promised paper from your Hemp Control Office (HCC. O/AP/1 dated 13th December), which has been addressed to me but should, I think, go to you in the first instance.

You will see that the technique of the matter is not quite clear since from paragraph 6 it is to be assumed that if the super-phosphates were made available we should be no worse off in 1945 than we were in 1944. You were to consult your experts on the question of importing the necessary material, and having done so you will no doubt be in a position to take whatever action is necessary to ensure an adequate crop for 1945. Until we have a firm statement of the import difficulties we cannot do much to assist you from the shipping point of view.

SUBJECT: Fertilizer for the production of Hemp

Reference our conversation of 12th December '44.

1. For the crop produced in 1944 the farmers were supplied with

1000 Tons of Ammonium Nitrate

5 tons

4000 Tons of Super Phosphates

25 tons

2. This produced a short crop of about 10,000 Tons of hemp which is being entirely absorbed by the local industry, leaving no margin for export of raw material to the U.K. for feeding the mills there with raw hemp for making ropes, also for the Allied Armed Forces.

3. From the 1943 crop amounting to about 14,000 Tons we were able to ship well over 3000 Tons of the raw material to the U.K. for feeding the Home Mills, given the acute shortage of Sisal and other fibres, which shortage unfortunately continues.

4. For the next hemp crop we are informed that there will be no super phosphates available for hemp production, everything available being used up for the autumnal and winter crops of food-stuffa.

5. As regards ammonium nitrate for the next hemp crop we have so far been supplied with 1000 Tons, but are given to understand that not exceeding a further 100 Tons will be allotted for the cultivation of hemp.

6. Given the non-availability of super phosphate^{for} hemp in order to obtain even a short crop of, say, 10,000 Tons next year, we still need a further 1500 Tons of ammonium nitrate.

7. The Allied Armed Forces in Italy alone are absorbing

These figures do not include sewing twine, machine
thread, etc., for which there is a constantly increasing
demand.

8. Should no further ammonium nitrate become available
for the production of hemp we can only expect next year a
very short crop of about 4/5000 Tons, which not only will be
insufficient for the requirements of the Allied Armed Forces
but will leave nothing at all for essential civilian needs,
including, say, 1000 Tons of binder twine for the wheat harvest,
and several hundred tons of sacks for A.C. Food Commission which
otherwise must be imported. And of course no raw material
will be available for the Home Mills.

9. In conclusion I might add that this question of the
vital need of fertilizer for hemp production has been constantly
pressed since the month of August with the Agricultural Sub-
Commission A.C. by the Hemp Control Office.

MEMORANDUM: Nitrate Fertiliser for Hemp.

FROM : Lt. Cdr. J. Schlee.

1. I am informed that it is most unlikely that there will be any quantity of Ammonium Nitrate available for hemp production next season. If this is the case hemp production will be negligible. The amount of hemp required for military, naval and essential civilian services such as shelter for refugees, grain sacks, fishing lines, bed linen for hospitals etc is 1300 tons a year. In addition Ministry of Supply have intimated that they will be requiring a further 12,000 tons, presumably for war material.
2. To produce this amount of hemp 5,000 tons of fertiliser is necessary of which we have ~~xx~~ 1,000 tons in stock.
3. Agriculture Sub-Commission advise me that they expect an allotment of rather less than the estimated requirements for essential food. It would appear that the only prospect of obtaining the fertiliser is via direct military requisition for the purpose of growing hemp.
4. Planting of hemp commences in the middle of March and fertiliser must be available by 1 March 1945.

MEMORANDUM : Control of Hemp.
FROM : Lt. Cdr. Schlee.

1. In order effectively to control hemp and to assure that the needs of the services and essential civilian requirements are met, it is absolutely necessary that full control of the industry must be retained by the Hemp Division AC. The National Consorzio set up by the present Commissario is endeavouring to work on precisely the same lines as the old Fascist Association as this is the only method they appear to understand.
2. It is essential that in view of the present slow amassing of raw material that Regional autonomy under AC direction must be maintained. This could be obtained either :
 - (i) By requisitioning the whole industry including the Italian Consorzio organisation, or
 - (ii) By agreement with the Prime Minister instructing the Commissario of the Consorzio that he is to set up his organisation in such a way as to allow freedom of action of Regional Managers as advised by AC Hemp Officers in all matters appertaining to the allocation of raw material, production, factories and distribution of finished products. The central office being purely a coordinating office with control over financial expenditure of the Regional offices, giving considerable latitude to Regional Managers with regard to the employment and dismissal of staff and expenditure with regard to repair of transportation, buildings, etc. The Rome office to avoid as far as possible any semblance of the bureaucratic set-up of the old Fascist organisation.
3. It is considered that the requisitioning of the industry should be avoided if possible as it may possibly lead to obstruction on the part of the Italian officials, who are adept at this game. It is recommended that the second alternative be tried first and requisitioning be only resorted to if the second method fails.
4. This recommendation is made on the experience of 11 months in the control of hemp and knowledge of the loyalty and assistance which has been given by the Naples Manager, who has proved himself thoroughly capable and absolutely loyal towards all the needs of the Allies.
