It is understood that Brig. Lush on return from his last tour expressed his opinion that many of our Camps were understaffed in Officers - having found an average of about 1 per Camp.

I entirely concur with his opinion and our aim has always been to have an Establishment of 2 Officers per Camp in "Groups" and 3 Officers for isolated and important Transit Camps. I agree that this aim has been rarely if ever achieved. I see no reason why this principle should not apply to Venezia. Although owing to the extreme shortage in other areas I doubt exceedingly if Venezia would see the bodies! For example Bari Transit Camp had one Officer (now in hospital) and we have had to transfer the 2nd Officer from Avversa.

1. You will remember that, when we talked about the establishment in the North after 'X' day, we made a large provision for officers in the Displaced persons Sub-Commission, fourteen such officers were provided for Venezia Region.

2. I have just been having a very interesting talk with Major Henry Hudson and I feel that, in the light of present facts, that estimate can be considerably reduced.

The reasons are threefold

(a) owing to the postponement of 'X' day the weight of Refugee movement across the Brenner route has already taken place under regional auspices.

The flow has now dropped to above 25% of the peak figure - 1500 a day.

(b) The improvement in railway services which is now taking place with increasing rapidity, makes the whole problem of handling refugees very much easier.

(c) The expected flow of Italian refugees out of Russia did not materialise.

FUNCTIONS OF ALLIED COMMISSION LIAISON OFFICERS

1. The first duty of Allied Commission Liaison Officers will be to keep themselves, at all times, informed of the situation in the areas with which they are concerned. This will involve the use of all available means of information: Press, intelligence, summaries, etc. They will inform HQ Allied Commission direct of any circumstances arising which may in their opinion adversely affect Allied interests or influence the general policy of the Commission. They will submit a monthly report to HQ which will include comment on the political situation.

2. Liaison Officers will, by study of previous Regional monthly reports and other records, inform themselves of the present position of various Commission functions now being handed over to Italian agencies. They will specially watch those cases where previous difficulties have been encountered.

Liaison Officers will bear in mind that HQ Allied Commission and AFHQ are interested in activities in all parts of the area with which Liaison Officers are concerned and not merely with the situation in the leading cities. Consequently Liaison Officers should make frequent trips to the smaller towns and country districts and acquaint themselves with the political and economic conditions in such districts. They must endeavour to be on the spot where trouble is expected and observe any incidents, strikes, demonstrations and the like in their areas. All Liaison Officers will remember, however, that their role is solely that of observers and reporters and they will not interfere in any way in such incidents, nor will they give any advice to the Italian authorities in the handling thereof. Liaison Officers have no authority to pledge the use of Allied troops in quelling any disturbance: this is a matter for the local Allied Commander. They should, however, keep Allied Commanders informed of the course of events. In cases where they consider safety of Allied property or nationals likely to become endangered, they must inform the Allied Commanders concerned, advising HQ-AC of such action.

3. Liaison Officers will keep close touch with the senior military formation, American and British, in their areas. They will endeavour at all times to assist military formations in their relations with Italian Government departments and agencies. They must, however, remember that they are Liaison Officers and not Executive Officers and will not be able to carry out in any sense the former functions of Provincial Commissioners.

Points which require special attention are:-

- a) Disease and unrest.
- b) Law cases affecting Allied personnel and property.
- c) Requisitioning and demobilization.
- d) Relations between Allied forces and Italian police forces.

Liaison Officers will also keep in touch with British and U.S. Consul Officers, as well as any U.S. Information Service and British Press Officials in their areas.

4. They will at all times avoid being involved in questions of Italian local Government and, even if asked, they will not give official advice, on behalf of the Commission, to Prefects or other State employees. They will, in all cases, refer the Italian local official to his Ministry in Rome. On the question of the preparation of electoral lists they have an important duty to perform. The Allied Governments are most anxious to promote free and secret elections and an essential preliminary is the preparation of a proper electoral list. Hence one of the main duties of Liaison Officers is to ensure the proper preparation of these lists.

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3. Liaison Officers will keep close touch with the senior military formation, American and British, in their areas. They will endeavour at all times to assist military formations in their relations with Italian Government Departments and agencies. They must, however, remember that they are Liaison Officers and not Executive Officers and will not be able to carry out in any sense the former functions of Provincial Commissioners.

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- a) Disease and unrest.
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5. The officer in charge Liaison Group will be responsible for discipline and administration of all Allied Commission officers in his area.

2. I have now read through the directive which you attached to your letter and have the following comments to make.

3. In the first paragraph, 3rd sentence, the reference to the allied war effort appears now somewhat out of place, and I suggest the alternative "the general allied policy towards the peaceful resettlement of Europe".

4. In paragraph 2, Second half, "Public Safety officers in particular must be mobile and should, wherever possible, etc". I suggest that any differentiation in this respect between Public Safety officers and liaison officers generally is not advisable because we will not have enough officers to allow us to give specialist jobs.

5. In paragraph 4 towards the end "hence the main duty of Local Government Liaison Officers is to observe on the progress etc.". Here again the reference to Local Government Liaison Officers as a specialist branch appears undesirable. It is suggested that this function should apply to all Liaison Officers.

1. The following are my very provisional suggestions for appointments as AC Liaison Officers. They have been made on the principle that the Regional Commissioner should not become the Liaison Officer in his late Region. Another principle which I think should be followed is that in no case should the AC Liaison Officer continue to occupy the offices of the Regional or Provincial Commissioner:

4. I note the decision of the Chief Commissioner in respect of Bolzano. I have already reported to you the situation in respect of important dumps in this area, and, in correspondence with the Civil Affairs Section, many matters have been discussed in connection with the status of aliens. On the advice of the Civil Affairs Section, Region Order No. 17 dealing with the special problems of aliens in Bolzano, and certain communes of Belluno, Udine and Trento, is now in preparation and will be issued very shortly. It appears very desirable that there be a carry over of all such policy with the Italian Government and for that purpose I am recommending that a strong liaison team be left in Bolzano for a period of at least two months. I shall submit to you my suggestions for the compilation of that liaison team. In this connection I think it highly desirable that Lt. Col. McBratney be left at Bolzano during the period of handing over to the Italian Government.

I note from the minutes of your Executive Commissioners meeting of the 3rd August that you wish to have urgently our proposals for liaison officers in the north. I admit that I have been slow in sending this list forward largely because there were quite a number of outstanding points upon which we wished further information from you.

However, I realize that time is getting on and we must help you by producing some outline scheme. I have written to you today specifically on Udine and Bolzano, and I shall now get to work to let you have what I conclude to be our requirements in officers on 1st October, 1st November and 1st December. Further than that I do not think it is possible to foresee at present.

4. Regional Personnel. Ex C pointed out that Emilia Region was being handed back to the Italian Government to-day and he required from Est Sec a list of all the officers from that Region and what had happened to them. Ex C directed Est Sec to press for proposals from RCs on the retention of liaison officers in the North. So far the only replies had come from RCs Liguria and Emilia Regions.
- Ex C said a strong appeal had been made at Sacred's meeting for Allied supervision over elections which, if approved, would mean retention of more officers. He directed Est Sec to work out a plan to deal with the problem of the reduction of Regional and HQ staff following the handback of nearly all Italy to the Italian Government.
