ELECTRIC CABLES - STRAITS OF MESSINA.

Information has been received from the Italian Air Ministry that the Italian Government are faced with the problem of establishing electric power lines between Sicily and the mainland before the coming winter sets in.

2. As the Government has been unable to obtain sub-marine cable for the project they are proposing to erect six overhead cables across the straits of Messina. The height of the two pylons carrying these cables will be 800 ft and the height of the cables above the sea about 200 ft. A sketch of the lay out of the project is attached.

3. This project is considerably more costly and less efficient than if sub-marine cables were used. Moreover the cables will constitute a menace to aviation in this important and ill-weathered airway. Nevertheless the Prime Minister has turned down the Italian Air Ministry's protest on the grounds that getting the circuit to Sicily is more important.

4. In view of the threat to the safety of both Allied and Italian aircraft constituted by this project it is requested that investigation may be made into the possibility of making sub-marine cables available for purchase by the Italian Government.





1. Reference your 8756 of 5 October 1945 :
2. HQ 2 District are ultimately responsible for the maintenance of public order in a very large area covering the greater part of Northern Italy. It is therefore indispensable that this HQ be as fully informed as possible of the real situation here, making use of all available sources of information.
3. One of these sources is the Civil Censorship. Whilst it is agreed that the abolition of censorship may be desirable, it would on the other hand mean that a most useful source of information would no longer be available. This is particularly true of telephonic censorship where individuals are even less discreet than in letters.
4. The closing down of certain agencies has already limited the sources of information available to this HQ and it is felt that in the circumstances the continuance of censorship is essential.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister,

In reply to your letter, I write to inform you that it is not intended to dry dock the "Lazzaro Mocenigo" immediately, and this vessel will continue on its present service Civitavecchia - Olbia for a short time until docking facilities are available. This vessel suffered only minor damage in the mine explosion.

The situation at Civitavecchia is now normal and, after diverting ships and destroyers, all refugees in the camp had been embarked by the afternoon of 15 September. One of the ships sailed without a full complement.

Should the number of refugees increase in the near future, additional ships will be diverted to Civitavecchia to deal with any large influx of refugees, and every effort will be made to ensure that returning Sardinians are not delayed at Civitavecchia.

The "Città di Alessandria" is at present in use bringing back Italian military personnel from France, and it is doubtful if the Allied Shipping Authorities would agree to this vessel being taken off her present service.

Dear Admiral,

the motorboat 'Moenigh', employed to transport passengers from Civitavecchia to Olbia, was damaged on September 6th by the explosion of a mine. To repair it will take about a month.

The situation of transports for Sardinia appears to be very serious, for an average of about 500 repatriated soldiers arrive everyday to Civitavecchia, and want to proceed to the island. Action must be taken to prevent an ever increasing number of people from gathering in a half destroyed town.

As a first step, the Navy Department destined the torpedo boat 'Mazzabane' and the 'Ibis' for passenger transport, but such means only solve a small part of the problem. To dispose of another motor ship of sufficient capacity, it would be necessary to withdraw it temporarily from other lines which are already functioning with Sardinia and Sicily. I beg you, my dear Admiral, to ask for the motor-ship 'Città di Alessandria' to be handed back.

The transport service between the peninsula and Sardinia is most important, at the present time, not only from the economic point of view, but also from the social and political point of view, for hundreds of thousands of repatriated soldiers and refugees try to go back to their normal places of residence and work, and we must make every possible effort for the flowing of this mass to be regulated with the greatest care and discipline. I trust in your friendly comprehension for the requirements of our life, and hope you will see this request is kindly considered by the competent authorities.

The Chief Commissioner requests a report regarding the following extract of para 2 from the Minutes of Supreme Allied Commander's Conference of 6 September 1945.

"2. RETURN OF COMMUNICATIONS TO CIVILIAN USE IN ITALY

(Previous reference SAC (45) 4th Meeting, Minute 2)

LIEUTENANT GENERAL MORGAN stated that he had been informed by the Chief Signal Officer that a reply had been sent to the Communications Sub Commission of the Allied Commission, stating that their request for the release of certain circuits for civilian use throughout ITALY could be met, with the exception of a line between ROME and NAPLES. It had been suggested to the Communications Sub Commission that the Italian Government might be asked to obtain the release from the PTT of one of their seven circuits between those cities so that, by employing improved equipment, additional circuits could thus be made available for civilian traffic.

2. RETURN OF COMMUNICATIONS TO CIVILIAN USE IN ITALY.

MAJOR GENERAL LEWIS reported that the Chief Signal Officer was pursuing this matter with the Allied Commission. It appeared that it might be possible to use certain land lines jointly for both civilian and military traffic. A measure of approval for such a procedure had been received from the United States War Department and similar approval was being sought from the British War Office. It had not yet been possible, however, to settle details of the financial arrangements which joint use would involve. Meanwhile, the Combined Chiefs of Staff had authorised a relaxation of the previous security regulations, so as to allow ship owners in ITALY and GREECE to forward messages regarding shipping movements through normal commercial channels.

2. RETURN OF COMMUNICATIONS AND OTHER FACILITIES TO CIVILIAN USE
IN ITALY.

MAJOR GENERAL LEMNITZER reported that, in accordance with the direction given him at SAC (45) 2nd Meeting, Minute 3, enquiries had been made into the possibility of reducing or removing present censorship restrictions on civil communications. However, as these restrictions had been prescribed by the Combined Chiefs of Staff, it was necessary to obtain their approval to any alterations. A signal had therefore been despatched (MAT 871 dated 7 Aug 45) to the Combined Chiefs of Staff requesting authority for ship-owners and agents in ITALY and GREECE to forward messages through normal commercial telegraphic channels. With regard to the release ~~for~~ civilian use of certain communication lines now reserved for military traffic, he states that this question was most complex but that investigations were progressing. Only 65 per cent of the pre-war communications facilities of ITALY were now in operating condition and only 15 per cent of these were available for civilian use. Military requirements had not decreased since the cessation of hostilities, due to the widespread deployment of our forces throughout the country. The release of further circuits could therefore only be effected if poorer facilities for military communications were accepted. He considered that the Italian Government after examining the matter should put in a demand for the additional circuits required for the shipping commitment. The Chief Signal Officer was already taking the matter up on these lines with the Allied Commission and he would report, through the Chief of Staff in due course.

REAR ADMIRAL STONE said that as a result of the termination of hostilities the secrecy of the military traffic was not as important as previously. It might therefore be possible for the military to share certain circuits with civilian users.

MAJOR GENERAL LEMNITZER added that the Commanding General MTOUSA had directed all US units to examine urgently the feasibility of releasing to the Italians accommodation and material now requisitioned for military use.

MAJOR GENERAL DUFF reported that a similar directive to British forces had been drafted and would be issued in the near future.

SUBJECT: Communications with Sardinia and Sicily
TO : Chief Commissioner, Allied Commission

1. This question has been discussed with Transportation Sub-Commission, who have prepared the attached summaries of the means of communication available, for passengers and merchandise, to and from Sardinia and Sicily (Appendices A and B, respectively). These cover communication by sea and by air between the mainland and the islands concerned, and also give a general indication of the facilities for land travel by road and rail on each island and to and from the mainland ports.

2. Transportation Sub-Commission state that all demands for movement to and from Sardinia are being met, and they have no knowledge of any backlog, either passenger or freight. Freight traffic from Sicily to the mainland by rail (train ferry) is restricted, principally because insufficient wagons are available on the mainland to meet all demands. It has been decided that shipping must provide the main lift for Sicilian exports and all demands are being met. In general, the existing services to and from the two islands provide reasonable facilities. Certain modifications to the shipping program for Sardinia, however, have been suggested by the Sardinian authorities, and these are now under consideration.

3. Misleading statements have appeared in the press regarding transport in Sardinia. In this connection, at Appendix C is a copy of a recent letter (AC/656/89/Tn 3, of 13 June 1945) addressed by Transportation Sub-Commission to Public Relations Branch with a view to correcting these statements. To meet the alleged urgent livestock program from Sardinia, additional shipping (a converted coaster and two schooners) was provided. This shipping was not used because of a dispute over price, and this resulted in a serious waste of transportation.

4. Also attached, as Appendix D, is a copy of the minutes of the meeting on the Sardinian transport situation held by the Director, Transportation Sub-Commission on 22 June 1945, at which reference was made to the points mentioned above.

SUBJECT: Transport in Sardinia

TO: Public Relations Branch

1. Reference is made to articles in the "Globo", the "Italia Libera" and the "Secolo XX", which appeared in the Daily Digest of Rome Press on July 8th 1945.

2. The assertions made in the above articles as to the state of transport in the Island of Sardinia are quite untrue, and bear no relation at all to fact. The present transport position is as follows -

(a) Road. In April 1945 there were 280 serviceable vehicles under ENAC control, and only 25 unserviceable. Since then a further 93 vehicles have been handed back to the civilians by the Italian Army.

(b) Shipping. The "Abbazia" and the "Campidoglio" make one trip each a fortnight, from Cagliari to Naples. The "Lancano" makes two trips a week from Olbia to Civitavecchia.

(c) Rail. There is no restriction at all on passenger travel, and there are daily freight services. There are two trains a day from Olbia to Cagliari 3816 (passenger) and daily freight services operate out of Cagliari to main points of the island, there being no restriction on the movement of goods.

(e) Road. In April 1945 there were 290 serviceable vehicles under TMAC control, and only 25 unserviceable. Since then a further 93 vehicles have been handed back to the civilians by the Italian Army.

(b) Shipping. The "Aibazia" and the "Campidoglio" make one trip each a fortnight, from Cagliari to Naples. The "Lancano" makes two trips a week from Olbia to Civitavecchia.

(c) Rail. There is no restriction at all on passenger travel, and there are daily freight services. There are two trains a day from Olbia to Cagliari³⁶¹⁶ (passenger) and daily freight services operate out of Cagliari to main points of the island, there being no restriction on the movement of goods. In April 24,690 tons of freight were moved. The Strada Ferrata Sarda runs a daily service from Sassari to Alghero, and two round trips daily from Sassari to Sorso. The Meridionale operates 8 round trips daily out of Iglesias to the coal mines; the line is in first class condition, and is in a position to move efficiently twice as much coal as is now produced. For the population involved Sardinia has better railway facilities than any part of Sicily or Italy.

3. Will you please bring those facts to the notice of the papers mentioned above, and ask them to publish statements on the true position of transport in Sardinia.

Colonel Sieff said, "Apparently, some of the gentlemen present do not appear to be aware of what has happened. Subsequent to the signal on the 9th of June, a meeting was held at this Headquarters at which General Pinna, Under-Secretary for Agriculture, and Snr. Storoni were present. At the meeting which took place, it was explained to the High Commissioner for Sardinia and other Italian authorities that the Allies, in order to help meet the crisis, had taken a cargo ship as requested and were having it refitted as a Livestock carrier. It was explained to them that this ship was withdrawn from general trade for a period of 16 to 20 days and would not be available until the last period in June. General Pinna assured us the Italian authorities would make use of the ship. On the 19th of June, General Pinna telephoned personally to the Shipping Branch of Movements Division and informed them that he did not require the ship because Rome was not prepared to accept the animals. The ship is ready to sail on the 24th of June. We took the matter up with the Minister of Agriculture and the High Commissioner of Food who informed us this was incorrect, and that they would confirm on that same day that the ship was required."

"We were subsequently informed in writing by the High Commissioner of Food that the ship was not required and requested it be returned to the wine trade. Before the ship can be used for general trade again, it is necessary to take out the fittings they have now installed for transporting the animals. By the time the ship is back in trade, she will have been one month without carrying any cargo whatsoever. At the same time an article appears in Stars & Stripes stating that the Allies are unable to provide shipping to move this livestock."

"In addition to refusing this ship, the High Commissioner of Sardinia has refused during the middle of the month, two large motor schooners capable of transporting 1,150 sheep per week. The first intimation that AG had of this problem was 31 May. An extra ship was being made available by the middle of June, a large quantity of shipping to be made available by the 4th week in June, during which time the Italian authorities were kept informed of what was being done. ATIC required an explanation and wants definite information within 24 hours as to whether this ship they have refitted will be used or not used. The ships concerned with transporting live- stock are the Yacht and San Antonio. The three last ships

stock are the Longano and San Antonio. The three large schooners
represent 7% of the total Italian coastal trade available at this time."

The representative of the Ministry of Food stated he
realized that the Allied officers had done their utmost to settle this
matter. The three large schooners would be used by the Ministry of
Agriculture and Food, but first they had to submit a request to the
Ministry of Public Health to export the animals from Sardinia because
of the hoof and mouth disease prevailing in Sardinia. The Sardinia
Association appointed an individual to collect the animals and get
them to the ports for shipment to Rome, but apparently he was exper-
iencing difficulty in doing so.

The Ministry of Food representative further advised a
cable was sent on June 9th offering a price of 70 lire per kilo for
cattle, in reply to a cable from the High Commissioner of Sardinia,
in which it was stated a price of 120 lire per kilo was required.

Mr. Taylor asked: "Then the price offered by Rome
was lower than the price required by Sardinia?"

MINUTES OF MEETING ON SARDINIAN SITUATION
22 JUNE 1945

A meeting was held in the office of Director, Transportation Sub-Commission, 22 June 1945 at 4:00 P.M. to discuss transport provided for Sardinia. The Italian Government was represented by members of the Ministries of Food, Agriculture, and Transport, and Allied Commission by members of Food Sub-Commission, Agriculture Sub-Commission, Transportation Sub-Commission and Public Relations Branch.

Mr. Taylor opened the meeting with the following statement: "This meeting was called at the request of Brigadier General McKinley, Acting Vice President, Economic Section. This meeting is made necessary by the deep concern felt by the Mediterranean Shipping Board and Allied Force Headquarters in connection with the situation in Sardinia and transport provided for Sardinia. An article appeared in Stars & Stripes stating that there was a great surplus of animals in Sardinia to be transported to the mainland and the animals would die unless the Allies provided transport. The article appeared in Stars & Stripes yesterday morning. This article definitely quoted the High Commissioner of Sardinia as authority for the statement that the Allies were failing to provide transport to save this animal population, despite the fact that we had been advised that the livestock from Sardinia would not be available even though we had gone to the extent of refitting a vessel for this purpose."

"We feel it is time that the Italian authorities take action in this connection and see to it that the High Commissioner of Sardinia either retracts his statement in Stars & Stripes, or makes available these animals when ships are available to transport them. With the world shortage of shipping and the great needs of transport for Italy, it is nothing short of criminal to waste the transportation capacity that is available to us to serve the Italian people. I would like to ask the representatives of Agriculture and Food of the Italian Government whether we can or cannot expect this vessel to be put to use in carrying livestock from Sardinia to the mainland?"

The Italian representative of Agriculture stated that he did not believe the High Commissioner had made the statement which

High Commissioner, but neither representative believed the statement
appearing in the article was correct and they wanted the matter
cleared up.

Mr. Taylor then asked, "Which statement is true - are
cattle and sheep available to be transported to the mainland, or are
they not?"

To this, the agricultural representative stated he did
not know definitely outside of the cable stating cattle and sheep were
available for transport to the mainland, and upon his arrival in Sardi-
nia on the 23rd, he would investigate the matter.

The Ministry of Food representative replied that the price offered by Rome to Sardinia was a very good price, as originally they were offering a price of 50 lire which was comparable to price offered to Umbria. However, due to the serious situation in Sardinia, the price offered was increased to 70 lire. He further stated the price offered by Rome was agreed verbally by the High Commissioner of Sardinia and the Farmers Federation of Sardinia, that is, no reply had been received and they assumed the price had been accepted. It was finally pointed out, however, that a representative of the Province of Sassari has agreed verbally to the price. When Mr. Taylor asked the name of the man who agreed, he was told the man's name was Nino Costa who also represents the Shepherd's Company of Sassari, and he is a man who keeps his word.

The Ministry of Agriculture representative stated it was not thought necessary to receive a written statement of acceptance of price, and that neither the Ministry of Agriculture nor the Ministry of Food should be held responsible.

Mr. Merritt, of Agriculture Sub-Commission registered the suggestion that the High Commissioner possibly did not recognize the problem of organization in moving the livestock which might have been one of a more serious nature than the actual movement.

Colonel Steff, however, stated that the ships scheduled for Sardinia were not in excess of those programmed (assuming no epidemics) at the request of the Ministry of Agriculture, and claimed the major problem in this particular case seemed to be the lack of foresight in not advising AC until 31 of May.

The following telegram was submitted for the record:
From H.E. Bergami, High Commissioner of Food, Rome,
to H.E. Pinne, High Commissioner for Sardinia, Cagliari:

"I call your attention to the serious problems deriving from the eventual nonfulfillment of the program of livestock transportation from Sardinia as established upon your request and the execution of which you have fully guaranteed to the AC".

The Italian representatives were told that General Pinne had informed this Headquarters that he had no problem in moving

"I call your attention to the serious problems deriving from the eventual nonfulfillment of the program of livestock transportation from Sardinia as established upon your request and the execution of which you have fully guaranteed to the AC."

The Italian representatives were told that General Pinna had informed this Headquarters that he had no problem in moving livestock to ports if one ship was put in Cagliari and one ship at Olbia, which was arranged.

Mr. Taylor asked: "If General Pinna has no right to establish price and refuses to ship at the price set by the High Commissioner for Food, why does not the Italian Government issue appropriate orders to Sardinia and have the livestock moved?"

The Ministry of Food representative stated that General Pinna did have the power to establish price. He further stated the disagreement over price could not be solved between the Ministry of Agriculture and Ministry of Food, but by the Ministry of Treasury, as it involves an increase in price.

Mr. Taylor told the representatives that Transportation Sub-Commission has had trouble of this kind before, particularly with pyrites when great quantities of shipping were wasted due to differences in price. "In the future," he said, "no special moves will be laid on

for the High Commissioner of Food unless there is certification by him that the price is agreed." To which the Ministry of Food representative replied that prices had to be agreed on by all members of the Ministerial committee.

Mr. Taylor stated: "With the world wide shipping shortage and the war with Japan, we cannot waste shipping while prices are haggled over. It must be the responsibility of the Italian Government to see that the supplies will move when special accommodations are provided."

"It is the responsibility of the Italian Government to see that supplies are available when special transport is provided at their request for the movement of certain commodities. The Italian Government must assume full responsibility for having agreed prices before presenting a special program for transportation. Unless we receive proper assurance from the Italian Government that the supplies will be available to move when special programs are prepared, Transportation Sub-Commission will not provide the transport."

Colonel Sieff summed up the meeting with the following remarks: "In this particular case, the following action is necessary:

- 1) An Italian Government retraction of the article attributed to General Pinna.
- 2) Allied Commission requires that they be informed within twenty-four hours whether the ship will be loaded or not.
- 3) On another subject, it would be of interest to these gentlemen that during the month of May, the Agriculture and Food consignors failed to load nearly 40,000 tons of rail wagons when they were placed."

The Ministries of Food and Agriculture representatives declared they were going to Sardinia on the following day and would clear up the first two points, and they requested a list of consignors who had failed to load rail wagons after having bid for the space.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister,

Since November 1943, the censorship of Italian civilian communications has been operated under direct control of the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean.

Operational control of censorship of Italian civilian communications has now been turned over to the Italian General Staff, except in the border provinces of CAVRIO, TORINO, AOSTA, and COMO and VENEZIA TRIDENTINA and VENEZIA GIULIA.

In as much as censorship of Italian civilian communications is a war measure, it is desired that it be operated under the supervision of the Italian General Staff which has trained censorship officers available who have been working with Allied Civil Censorship Group for many months.

It is desired that censorship of civilian communications be conducted in such a manner that it will assist the Supreme Allied Commander to perform his essential tasks, support to the utmost the allied war effort against Japan and remaining elements of the former Axis power, assist in the enforcement of effective allied economic controls, and otherwise provide a satisfactory Italian link in the United Nations' censorship network. It will be terminated upon instructions from this headquarters.

In order to implement the foregoing policy the Italian Government will be expected to impose and maintain:

a. A censorship of external postal services, whether terminal to Italy or in transit through Italy.

b. A censorship of only such internal civilian communications as in the opinion of the Supreme Allied Commander require censorship in the interest of security of the Allied Forces.

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c. A censorship of external telegraph,
cable, landline, and radio.

d. A censorship of international
telephone trunk services whether by wire or radio.

e. A censorship of papers and documents
of travellers entering and leaving Italy.

The Supreme Allied Commander has
designated an Allied Censorship Liaison Unit which will as-
sist the Italian General Staff in carrying out the censor-
ship duties assigned to it.

The Chief Allied Censorship Liaison
Officer will from time to time communicate to the Italian
censorship organization, and that organization will accept
and act upon, general policy directives concerning the censor-
ship of Italian civilian communications. All information
derived from Italian censorship which will assist in the Allied
effort will be furnished to the Chief Allied Censorship Liaison
Officer.

The above transfer of operational
control of Civil Censorship of communications and the other
provisions contained in this letter do not apply to censor-
ship of press, radio broadcast or cinema which will continue
as at present until modified by the Supreme Allied Commander,
Mediterranean.

SUBJECT: Civil Censorship.

1. It is considered of immediate importance that all restrictions placed by the Allied authorities on the Italian people for the purpose of the prosecution of the war should be relaxed at the earliest possible date wherever no longer required. Included in these restrictions is the function of Civil Censorship, established for military security.
2. Internal civil censorship on communications service within Italy does not appear to have any further justification, at least below the line of the River Piave. It is therefore requested that Civil Censorship should be immediately abolished on all internal civil communications in this area, including civil communications to members of the armed forces, Allied or Italian. It is recommended also, though this is a military matter, that all censorship of the mail of the Italian armed forces should be ceased at once.
3. On external civil communications it is recommended that considerable relaxation should be made forthwith. Permission should no longer be required for the opening of postal or telegraph services with any Allied, neutral or co-belligerent country.
4. External civil censorship is now carried out in this theatre. It is appreciated that in order to enforce the economic blockade on transfer of funds and to prevent commercial relations with black-listed firms, it is necessary to maintain a censorship control for the time being. This however is properly a function of the Italian Government, and it is urged that action to effect this transfer of responsibility should be taken as early as possible.

1. It has been the established practice in this theatre to obtain the permission of the Allied military security branches prior to the resumption of any form of internal civil communications by mail, telegraph or telephone, and to follow directions by that authority as to the extent and nature of censorship on each permitted channel of communications.

2. The situation as regards internal military security now appears to be quite different, while on the other hand the importance of accelerating the restoration of internal communications from both practical and economic aspects is very much greater than in the past.

3. The only restrictions that it seems necessary to apply on internal communications (other than mentioned in para 4 below) are those desirable for political reasons or for reasons of controlled economy e.g. the "sanitary cordon". These matters are best judged by this Commission in collaboration with the Italian Government.

4. Exceptions to the above may occur in areas of special military importance.

5. It is therefore proposed that internal civil communications be permitted to be restored throughout Italy as and when practicable, without reference to your headquarters, subject only to communications into certain areas that you may wish to define. The establishment of communications would then only be cleared internally in this Commission to ensure any necessary political or economic control, and the censorship would be regulated with these objects in mind and not with a view to military security.

You may rest assured that every effort will be made to insure that construction of military communication facilities is carried out with the least possible disturbance to civilian plant.

We have received a report from the Director of the Cire lo Costruzione Telegrafiche e Telefoniche of Foligno, of which we transmit the following passage:

The interior communications of the Foligno office have been re-established and we have started to repair the Fermi office where the general switchboard and the switchboards for the sets are being repaired.

The Foligno Bevagna line which has three wires has been completely repaired.

Communications are therefore impossible between Perugia-Ponte S. Giovanni-Bastia-Assisi-S. Maria degli Angeli-Spoleto and Foligno.

A squad of Italian soldiers commanded by an English officer is now demolishing all the wires of the line between Arezzo and Anghiari.

Other demolitions of the same kind have been made inside Perugia and on the Corretto di Spoleto-Spoleto line.
I do not need to stress the importance of these facts, especially in what concerns this Ministry.

As the SIGNAL OFFICE of Foligno had authorized the repair works, we really couldn't expect that the lines which had just been repaired should be demolished.

We feel very badly about the fact that the demolition was made in such a way as makes it impossible for us to use the material again. Considering the present shortage, the fact that the wires have been cut at every pole, that the insulators have been broken, that our agents were not allowed to do the demolition themselves, caused us a serious loss.

Besides, we cannot understand why our request to demolish only the number of wires strictly necessary to make room for those which the C.G.O. had to put up, wasn't granted; the other wires would have remained on the line for civilian uses. Anyhow, we don't want to dismiss a question which isn't in the sphere of dispositions is possible that for superior reasons connected with the state of war, that which was done answers an absolute necessity before which there is nothing to be said.

We do not believe that this was done without strong motives and without keeping in mind our needs and the opportunity not to make worse the situation in which we find ourselves because of the war.

Nevertheless, we hope that the Allied Authorities will keep in mind our needs, and considering what happened, supply us the means to repair what we lost and reestablish the public services which are indispensable for the rehabilitation of national life.

Hoping that your answer will be such as to enable us to resume the hard work we started with trust and tranquillity, we remain,

My dear Sir Noel:

So far as I am aware, the Italian Government has the same rights as any other to decline to accept the terms under which any form of commercial activity can be resumed in their country. No agreement has yet been reached on the resumption of commercial radio or cablegrams and the service has never started; the U.S. authorities have declined to open service up to the 20 December on their own terms, although no reply has been received from the British authorities on this point.

The Communications Subcommission has been acting throughout in complete accord with my instructions; I have been present at most of the discussions and have approved all the correspondence from this Commission. At the final meeting which Mr. Livengood and Mr. Nosworthy attended I was not present, but I am informed that the attitude of the Communications Subcommission was that they were merely present to pass the views of the Allied Governments to the Italian Government representative and obtain his reply. This reply is not made by Dr. Fano personally but is the considered reply of the Italian Ministries concerned, including the Finance and Foreign Office.

There has never been any suggestion that the functions of Italcable should be completely discontinued, although they are temporarily prevented by military circumstances from the operation of their cables and radio stations. It was intended that all international traffic should pass through the offices of Italcable in both directions with the object of simplifying the return to pre-war routine under which Italcable operated the external cable and radio terminals and also the major internal domestic circuits. It may be noted that permission has been given for the Italcable Company to resume operation of the Moscow radio circuit.

This Commission considers it its duty to ensure that Italian Government claims are fully and fairly represented. In no case have the arguments for an Italian share in the transmission tolls been initiated by this Commission, but we should not feel justified in failing to place their claims before the Allied Governments, nor in bringing pressure on the Italian Government to accept a settlement of a commercial matter in which they do not feel that they are being justly treated. The views of the British Government are fully understood. The views of the Italian Government are that in protection of Italian rights and interests they must claim a share of the transmission tolls, even if it only amounts to a token payment of ten percent. This is partly to claim continued ownership

of the cables, equipment, radio stations, buildings, etc; and partly to maintain their rights to grant concessions to commercial exploitation in their own country. These rights are not met by the Allied proposal. Only recently has an offer to pay rental been made by the British company (in the first instance it was specifically refused) and this does not necessarily mean any payment to Italcable as the installations can be made in any building. Nor are the rights of the Italian Government recognised in respect of the grant of commercial concessions in their own country; Italcable holds the Italian Government concession on all commercial external traffic from Italy and the Italian Government consider this concession within their powers to grant. Their claim for a share in the transmission tolls is largely for this right to be acknowledged, while recognising that military circumstances now require the actual operating to be done by allied companies. Their statements of their case has also the support of A.Y.H.Q. as shown in the copy of cable inclosed.

The implications in your letter that the Communications Subcommission is following a policy at variance with that laid down by me, or that it is doing anything other than present the Allied and Italian cases to the respective Governments, are not at all accurate and can only be the result of some misunderstanding which I trust that this letter will serve to clarify.

Subsequent to this correspondence, the Italian Government has presented a further statement, a copy of the translation of which is enclosed.

Subject: International telegraph traffic.

Further to our letter No.S/8.4/4337, dated 6-12-1944 and with reference to the communication dated 17-12-1944 of the State Dept. in Washington D.C. we wish to inform you that the Italian Govt. has again examined the problem referred to and that with the desire of restoring international telegraph traffic with the United Nations, presents the following proposals:

1. As already put forth in our previous letter, we agree on the terminal charges concerning the international telegraph communications referred to, but we stress the fact that, in our opinion, the rates to be applied should be equal both for incoming and outgoing communications; recognizing for incoming communications the division in two zones, admitted for the outgoing ones. In order to avoid differences in incoming and outgoing rates, in case an agreement were not reached, it would be advisable to limit for the time being the transmission and the acceptance of cables to the city of Rome, for which the problem does not exist.

2. As far as the participation of the Italian State in the transmission tolls is concerned, the Italian Govt. has examined the problem with a view to finding a provisional solution of the matter. Given that for operational necessities the Allied Military Authorities have arranged that the R.C.A.s and the C. & W. Companies send to Italy their own personnel and equipment to ensure the international communications of the operating armies with their Govt. and Countries; given that, according to the terms of the armistice those Companies have been authorized to make use of, for said military purposes, radio equipment, sub-marine cables and apparatus, property of the State as well as of private concessionary Companies;

Given that the Italian Govt., in view of the political and social importance of the restoration of private telegraph communications between the Italian population and the United Nations, is desirous of facilitating in every way restoration of such communications;

In our previous letter, we agree on the terminal charges concerning the international telegraph communications referred to, but we stress the fact that, in our opinion, the rates to be applied should be equal both for incoming and outgoing communications; recognizing for incoming communications the division in two zones, admitted for the outgoing ones. In order to avoid differences in incoming and outgoing rates, in case an agreement were not reached, it would be advisable to limit for the time being the transmission and the acceptance of cables to the city of Rome, for which the problem does not exist.

2. As far as the participation of the Italian State in the transmission to be concerned, the Italian Govt. has examined the problem with a view to finding a provisional solution of the matter, given that for operational necessities the Allied Military Authorities have arranged that the R.C.A. and the U. & W. Companies send to Italy their own personnel and equipment to ensure the international communications of the operating armies with their Govt. and Countries!

Given that, according to the terms of the armistice these Companies have been authorized to make use of, for said military purposes, radio equipment, sub-marine cables and apparatus, property of the State as well as of private concessionary Companies;

given that the Italian Govt., in view of the political and social importance of the restoration of private telegraph communications between the Italian population and the United Nations, is desirous of facilitating in every way restoration of such communications;

given that the Italian State desires within the limits of its capabilities to contribute to the war effort of the United Nations;

Given that the above-mentioned extraordinary circumstances and the importance of the service to be restored, are such as to justify an exceptional arrangement, even not strictly in accordance with legislative requirements and international agreements;

The Italian Govt. grants to the R.C.A. and to the C. & F. the rights to extend the use of radio stations, submarine cables and all equipment existing in Italy for use in connection with international telegraph traffic, to the transmission of paid telegrams as long as hostilities continue on the Italian territory.

The above-mentioned concession, however, is made with the definite understanding that as soon as the whole of Italian territory is liberated this concession will automatically cease and as of that date the rights of the Italian Govt. in connection with telecommunications, the international agreements in force and the rights anyhow previously recognized, will be considered to have been unprivileged.

3. As far as the messages in obedience with the I.M.R.E.B. and the Govt. offices, and the consequent political situation, we have to stress upon the urgent necessity of taking an immediate and definite decision of the matter (not later than the 25 inst.)
We trust that you will entirely accept the above proposals, which in our opinion proves the complete comprehension of the Italian Govt. of the importance of the situation.

My Dear Admirals:

You will have been following the controversy between R.C.A. and Cable & Wireless on one side and Italcom on the other on the subject of the division of revenues accruing on the telegraphic traffic with the United States and the United Kingdom. A memorandum on the subject was sent by the Allied Commission to A.F. N.C. on the 20th of November, and you wrote me on the 2nd December. Putting it very briefly the position is that, while there is no dispute as to the allocation of the Italian terminal rates nor of the delivery charges, the Italian Government have claimed a proportion of the transmission tolls and, moreover, have been holding up the transmission of commercial telegrams to the United States and the United Kingdom pending a settlement of the issue.

On receipt of your letter of the 2nd December, I telegraphed to the Foreign Office. Correspondence has been passing between London and Washington and, on the 5th December, I received my instructions. The American and British Companies were prepared to accept a solution on lines which had been proposed by the State Department, namely, that the terminal charges and a rental for the physical facilities be paid to the Italian Government but that the Italians be excluded from any share in the transmission tolls. This solution was acceptable also to His Majesty's Government and I was to bring it at once, in conjunction with my American colleague, to the attention of the Allied Commission and the appropriate Italian authorities with a view to obtain concurrence and an early commencement of transmission of the telegrams.

The American Ambassador had received similar instructions and, on the 7th December, a meeting was held at the Commission, attended by Colonel Henderson and Colonel Scudder as representing the Commission, Dr. Fano, the Under-Secretary of Posts & Telegraphs as representing the Italian Government, and Mr. Livengood and Mr. Mosworthy as representing the two Embassies. The meeting produced little or no useful result. Dr. Fano reduced his claim on the transmission tolls from 3% to 1%. Beyond this

he would not move. Moreover, he insisted that, in the absence of agreement, the Italian Government would be compelled by a certain date to give public notice through the Press and the Radio of the suspension of the commercial telegraphic facilities to the United States and the United Kingdom, and the most that could be obtained from him was the postponement of this date from the 15th to the 20th December. Throughout the meeting Colonel Henderson and Colonel Souder supported these claims of the Italian Government.

A report of the discussion was telegraphed to London together with a translation of the memorandum that Dr. Fano had brought to the meeting. I have now received an urgent reply from London:-

"His Majesty's Government do not understand why the Italian Government is able to obstruct the re-opening of commercial services on terms considered reasonable by the British and United States Governments and acceptable to the British and American Companies who are operating at the instance of the military authorities. The Italian Cable Company is prevented, by the decision of the Allied authorities, from operating at present and it can therefore have no claim to any part of the transmission tolls either direct or through the Italian Government."

I am required to report urgently the reasons why your representatives on the Communications Sub-Commission support the Italian view. I feel sure that your instructions to that Sub-Commission will have been to follow the instructions of His Majesty's and the United States Governments.

I am required further to report why and to what extent the office of Italocable is functioning. Reference to the office of Italocable was made in the third paragraph of Dr. Fano's memorandum. It is the understanding of His Majesty's Government that the Italian State Administration would accept and deliver telegrams. In any event, it is their definite view that neither the Administration nor Italocable would be entitled to share the transmission tolls for these services, as their recompence would be from terminal charges regarding which there is no dispute.

In view of the concern expressed by you some time ago as to the possible dislocation of the mail service, following the anticipated removal of Naval vessels running between the Mainland and Sardinia, I believe you will welcome the arrangements which have just been completed. Beginning on or about 25 December the S.S. ABIAZIA will operate between Naples and the Island doing two round trips a month. The capacity of this vessel is about 250 personnel and 1000 tons of cargo.

I am also advising H.E. Dr. Pratas of this arrangement.

AT HQ informed that a regular service from Gardinia to Naples is to be initiated starting approx 25 Dec.

The SS "ALBIZIA" has been selected for this ferry service and will do two round trips per month. Her capacity will be about 950 personnel and 1,300 tons cargo.

The personnel accommodation will not be comfortable as it will be necessary to put some people in a tween deck, there being cabin accommodation for 30 only. These personnel will have to provide their own bedding and food if want also be put on board. There are no bunks in the tween decks and passenger must travel 'hard'. However, the voyage is short and it will be no more uncomfortable than the crew were at present. Women and children should not be carried in tween deck accommodation.

The only reason, at present operating on the lottery, will end October, 1869, probably be removed after lottery 18 complete, i.e., the lottery of 1869 will be closed on the 1st of November.

The SS 'ABBAZZA' has been selected for this Ferry service and will do two round trips per month. Her capacity will be about 250 personnel and 1,000 tons cargo.

The personnel accommodation will not be comfortable as it will be necessary to put some people in a tween deck, there being cabin accommodation for 30 only. These personnel will have to provide their own bedding and food must also be put on board. There are no bulk in the tween decks and passenger must travel 'hard'. However, the voyage is short and it will be no more uncomfortable than the cruisers are at present. Women and children should not be carried in tween deck accommodation.

The cruisers, at present operating on the Ferry, will probably be removed after priority list 7 is complete, i.e. the end of December. If, however, a back-log occurs or a special trip of the cruisers is required, application should be made to AFHQ.

Rates and fares, freight to be carried and freight charges will be advised by CO.GE.MA.

It may be necessary to use a part of the available accommodation, on occasions, for movement of Italian military personnel.

1. I am sending you under the same cover a letter from the Italcable applying for the payment of the cable and radio tolls for the transmission of all paid private messages both military and civilians transmitted or received on the circuits since the occupation of Italy by the Allied Forces.

2. The undersigned fully acknowledges the justice of the Italcable's applications which he had not personally presented on the part of the Ministry owing to the fact that he has always felt and still feels that the operations of the Italcable's means of communication must be considered among the items which undoubtedly will be one of the assets of the settlement which will be made on the re-establishment of the normal conditions existing before the outbreak of the war.

3. For the same reason the Italian Administration had not until now considered it necessary to point out their right to the payment of the terminal taxes on the incoming and the outgoing traffic. In calling your attention to the claims of the Italcable Company I consider it advisable to make known that the Italian Administration is thoroughly convinced that all paid messages exchanged by Allied Authorities in Italy entail a right to the corresponding credit on the terminal taxes to the Italian Administration themselves.

1. With reference to the AFHQ telegram, copy attached, with the substance of which it is understood you have been acquainted through your diplomatic channels, it is recommended that action be initiated by your offices to hasten the decision on the subject.

2. The present position is awkward and must result in a most difficult situation if left for much longer.

Telegraph service to the U.S. and U.K. was declared open by public notice on 15th November and has not been closed; at the moment about a thousand telegrams are awaiting transmission and it is now becoming generally known that the messages are not being forwarded. Either the services must be opened very soon or a public notice must be issued stating that service has not been opened and arrangements made for cancellation of the messages and return of the money accepted for their transmission.

3. In view of the above, it is suggested that a communication be sent from your offices to the State Department, Washington, and the Foreign Office, London, respectively, substantially in the following form:

"PROPOSED THAT PUBLIC NOTICE BE ISSUED BY ITALIAN GOVERNMENT CANCELLING TELEGRAPH SERVICE TO U.S. AND U.K.

1. Lt. Harvey, Naval Sub Commission, advises that there are several cruisers used alternatively on the run between SARDINIA and the mainland. He anticipates that in order to carry out the military requirements a cruiser will be maintained on this run for at least another four weeks. It is, of course, possible that these naval vessels could be ordered elsewhere at a moment's notice and it would be only a common sense precaution for the Italian Government to set up a permanent mail run and get away from dependency on naval vessels at the earliest possible moment.

Under the arrangements laid down by Allied Force Headquarters in accordance with paragraph 25b of the Inter-Allied Terms, all Italian communications to their representatives abroad are supposed to be made through the Allied Commission. In practice this has worked out as follows:

- 1) Italian telegrams to their representatives in neutral countries are either sent in a cypher of which a key is deposited with us, or are sent in British and American ciphers. In both cases an en clair copy is sent to the Political Section.

- 2) In the case of Russia, the Italians, until recently, sent their messages in Soviet ciphers, no copy being sent to the Allied Commission.

Recently the Ministry of Foreign Affairs started sending their telegrams to the Political Section with the request that they should be despatched through Allied channels. The Foreign Office refused to send them for fear of upsetting the Russians and told the Embassy to inform the Italian Government that such telegrams should be sent through commercial or through Russian channels. After consultation with the Chief Commissioner, the Embassy suggested that these instructions should be reconsidered on the grounds that a) we should be openly flouting the arrangements referred to in paragraph 1) above, and b) that the whole question of providing

the Italian representative in Moscow with his own cypher was under consideration by Allied Force Headquarters (i.e. the Soviet representative on the Allied Commission had previously supported the proposal that the Italian representative in Moscow should be given his own cypher).

2. The question of the provision of independent ciphers for the Italian representatives in London and Washington has been raised by the Italians and has been referred by

Allied Force Headquarters to the Combined Chiefs. Meanwhile, the Italian representative in London has taken with him a cypher of which a key is deposited with us.

3. If the Italian representatives in London, Washington and Moscow are to be given their own cyphers there seems to be no reason why this should not be accorded in the cases of their representatives in other countries. The original insistence of their communicating copies of all telegrams to the Political Section were presumably a) control and b) military security.

The time seems to have come when control in this respect could be dropped. There remains military security. In this connection it should be noted that members of the Advisory Council have their own cyphers and the Brazilian Chargé d'affaires has now been accorded a similar privilege. Other United Nations representatives and neutrals accredited to the Quirinale are still denied cypher facilities but the representatives of the same powers accredited to the Vatican are allowed cyphers. There therefore seems to be no logical reason why the same facilities should not be granted to the Italian Government and the United Nations representatives and to neutrals accredited to the Quirinale except that the more missions there are which enjoy cypher facilities the more risk there is of any leak.

4. Italians have bag facilities with their missions abroad but their contents have to be submitted to the Political Section and are sent in Allied bags. Recently however, by Allied Force Headquarters and the Foreign Office agreed to a number of Count Caramanini's Party taking a bag with him.

In view of the fact that this service would not be for ordinary civilian use but would be a means of accelerating military and rehabilitation projects, and pursuant to the joint Pact Declaration of the President and Prime Minister since reinforced by the recognition of diplomatic relations between Italy and the United States, I wish to express my strong support of this project and my urgent recommendation that this service be authorized as desired by the U.S. State Department.

Subject: Radio Telephone Service from Italy.

To: A.F.M.Q.

1. It appears probable that radio circuits from Italy to the U.S. and U.K. may become available for international telephone service in the near future.

2. It is the opinion of this Commission that it would be beneficial to have such circuits established as promptly as possible; it is appreciated that for the present, at least, the use of such circuits should be confined to Allied authorities and accredited Allied Press representatives.

3. It is understood that the Department of State in Washington and the Board of War Communications are in favour of the restoration of the pre-war circuit between Rome and New York, subject to the approval of the Allied authorities in the Italian theatre. Mr. William Thompson, Assistant Vice President of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company has visited this country in this connection, and has made the necessary technical and financial arrangements for the opening of service. It is proposed to utilise the existing Italcable equipment in Rome, previously used for the pre-war service, if released from its present P.W.B. commitment.

4. It is believed that Cable and Wireless are also making the necessary preparations to be ready to open service with the U.K. in the near future. This was not a pre-war service and would probably only be a provisional arrangement pending restoration of the international overland telephone cable circuits. 375L

5. Action on the following lines is therefore requested:-
(a) Release of the Italcable equipment. This matter is being represented to you by Lieut. Colonel Reeves, Rome Allied Area Command Signals.

(b) Allocation of the necessary frequencies. This matter is being represented to you by Lieut. Colonel Green, Radio Officer, A.F.H.Q.

(c) Authorisation for the early opening of services, together with the regulations defining permitted users and the mode and extent of censorship.

2. While I am unaware of any plans or discussions regarding the disposition of the Italian cables, I think, for the record, that it would be wise to send a communication to the Commissario to the effect that no negotiations, either of a commercial or internationally political nature, should be entered into by him with respect to the Italian cables without reference to this Commission.

REMARKS: AGO cipher traffic.

20. R.C. Regions I, Southern, & VII.

1. Due to the progressive demilitarization of the Southern Regions of Italy, it has become necessary for arrangements to be made for the handling of AGO cipher traffic by other means than by military signal facilities.

2. Arrangements have been made for the handling of this traffic over civilian teletypewriter circuits between Regional Headquarters and HQ AGO. Allied armies in Italy have approved the use of Italian cipher personnel and Italian ciphers to serve the Regional Headquarters and HQ AGO.

3. As a result, an Italian cipher team composed of three (3) non-commissioned officers has been delegated to serve each of your Regional Headquarters. It is planned that as other Regions are demilitarized, similar teams will be sent out until there is a complete network of Italian communications between Regions and Headquarters.

4. Only the approved ciphers in use by these teams will be utilized. These teams will be under the direct control of the Regional Comintman, and local security precautions will be his responsibility.

5. Italian military authorities in Rome have informed this HQ that housing and messing facilities for these cipher teams will be provided by the Italian military establishments in each of your regions.

6. Will R.C. Southern Region please note that the arrangements referred to in para. 2 above are not yet complete in respect of his Headquarters and for the time being and until further notice traffic between Southern Region and HQ AGO will continue to be handled over military circuits and through Signal Comintman as at present.

MEMORANDUM ON MEANS OF TRANSPORT

Three lists have been made for the cars (1, 2, 3):

- a) the first list deals with the requirements of the Construction Enterprises and refers therefore to the trucks necessary for the rehabilitation of the telegraph and telephone (in the air) net of the State: trucks in various number and of different types have been allowed to every enterprise according to the state of rehabilitation of the line that the enterprise has to deal with.

As only light and heavy trucks are deemed necessary for the maintenance, we mean to send North the medium trucks as the repairs of the South and Central Italy lines are being completed.

- b) The second list deals with the requirements of the PP.TT. Provincial Directions, and refers therefore to the trucks for mail transportation in town or for urgent services.

It is thought that one of the trucks (light type or medium type) might be used for urgent repairs of the telegraph and telephone lines.

- c) The third list deals with the requirements of the Grantee Telephone Societies (S.E.T., T.E.T.I., TIMO, TELVE, STIFEL) and of the State Agency for the maintenance of the cable.
